

Peshawar still remembers Borders divided nations, cinema united souls

From the smoke-laden gullies of ancient Peshawar to the glittering dream-factories of Mumbai stretched a journey far larger than migration. It was a caravan of songs, sorrows, theatre lamps, Urdu couplets, harmoniums, and unspoken longing. Long before borders sliced the subcontinent into wounded geographies, art travelled freely like monsoon wind. And somewhere in that forgotten current stood two homes now trembling on the edge of extinction, the ancestral havelis of Raj Kapoor and Dilip Kumar.

Today, those structures no longer resemble houses. They feel like exhausted old film reels, scratched by rain, burnt by time, yet still flickering with fragments of glory. Inside the legendary lanes of Qissa Khwani Bazaar, where storytellers once embroidered nights with legends and tea steam curled through crowded courtyards, Kapoor Haveli still stands with fading dignity. Its arches appear like tired eyelids refusing sleep. Its balconies lean forward as though listening to echoes that no longer arrive. Rainwater slips through fractured ceilings. Earthquakes have bruised their ancient spine. Every monsoon descends upon it like a villain entering the climax of a tragic Bollywood epic.

The haveli breathes cinema even in decay. One can almost imagine a young Prithviraj Kapoor rehearsing lines beneath lantern light while distant azaan mingled with horse carts and marketplace chatter. Those corridors once carried the first footsteps of a family destined to shape the emotional vocabulary of Indian cinema. From these aging walls emerged a dynasty that gifted generations romance, rebellion, music, tragedy, and idealism. And then came Raj Kapoor,



the eternal showman with sorrow hidden behind a clown's smile. Like his immortal tramp wandering through films with hope stitched into torn shoes, Raj Kapoor carried Peshawar's emotional dust into Bombay's cinematic bloodstream. His cinema was never merely entertainment. It was migration transformed into melody. Beneath the laughter of *Shree 420* and the tenderness of *Awara* lingered the ache of displacement and the stubborn optimism of survival.

Today, however, the haveli that once nourished those dreams resembles a deserted film set after shooting has ended forever. Wooden beams sag like aging shoulders. Crumbling plaster falls silently into alleyways below. Nervous shopkeepers glance upward whenever thunder rolls across the sky. Children who once chased kites beneath carved windows now avoid walking near the structure altogether. Residents fear that one violent cloudburst may erase forever this living relic of cinematic ancestry.

Not far away, in Mohalla Khudadad, another wounded monument waits helplessly against time, the ancestral residence of Yusuf Khan, the boy who became Dilip Kumar. If Raj Kapoor embodied Hindi cinema's dreaming heart, Dilip Kumar became its silent soul.

His face carried pauses like poetry. His eyes performed grief more eloquently than dialogues ever could. In films such as

Devdas, *Mughal-e-Azam*, and *Ganga Jamuna*, he transformed pain into elegance. Yet the house where that emotional universe first began now survives like a fading ghazal abandoned mid-verse.

The balconies droop beneath decades of neglect. Narrow courtyards lie buried beneath broken timber and cracked stone. Rain trickles through collapsing ceilings like tears escaping old memories. Once, festive evenings must have filled these rooms with laughter, aromas of kebabs and dry fruits, conversations floating beneath warm lantern light. Today only silence resides there thick, dusty, and unbearable.

There is heartbreaking irony in this destruction. Dilip Kumar spent his life carrying Peshawar inside him like an unfinished prayer. Even after Partition carved maps and memories apart, he spoke repeatedly of the city with aching affection, its orchards, bustling bazaars, fragrant markets, generous people, and winter evenings wrapped in nostalgia. For him, Peshawar was not simply birthplace. It was emotional ancestry.

These homes therefore belong to far more than Pakistan or India alone. They belong equally to Lahore and Lucknow, to Karachi and Kolkata, to Delhi and Peshawar. Within their crumbling walls survives the final fragrance of a pre-Partition civilisation, plural, syncretic, artistic and profoundly humane.

Kovai Knights crowned TNCA V Division champions

Chennai, May 22: Tamil Nadu Cricket Association announced the winners of the TNCA League Championship 2025-26 for the Dr. P. Subbarayan Shield in the V Division categories, with Kovai Knights emerging as the overall champions after winning the promotion play-off.

In the V Division 'A' Zone for the P. Ananda Rau Shield, Ethiraj SA finished as table toppers after winning nine of their 11 matches and securing 36 points. Lustraj CC also won nine matches and finished second with 36 points.

In the V Division 'B' Zone for the V.P. Raghavan Shield, Prasad CC topped the table with nine wins and one drawn match, collecting 37 points. Netaji CC finished second with an identical record and points tally.

Youth Centre CC emerged as champions in the V Division 'C' Zone for the M.V. Kasturi Rangan Shield, winning nine matches and securing 36 points. CCL finished runners-up with eight wins and one draw, earning 33 points.

Kovai Knights dominated the V Division 'D' Zone for the S. Annadorai Shield, winning all 11

matches to secure a perfect 44 points. Indian Oil (RO) S & RC finished second with 33 points from eight wins and one draw.

In the promotion play-off for the Dr. P. Subbarayan Shield, Kovai Knights defeated Prasad CC to emerge as the overall champions of the V Division League Championship.

Kovai Knights, Prasad CC, Youth Centre CC and Ethiraj SA earned promotion to the IV Division for the next season.

Meanwhile, AISC, IAF (Tambaram) CC, NUC and BSNL Chennai Telephones RC were relegated to the VI Division. Top Performers

In the V Division 'A' Zone batting charts, Premal M. Joshi of Madras Emmanuel CC topped the list with 476 runs in 11 matches, followed by Sudhakar K of Sir Ashley Biggs Institute with 465 runs and Jayasurya M of Lustraj CC with 448 runs.

Among bowlers in the same zone, Narasiman V of Ethiraj SA claimed 40 wickets, while Gohulmoorthi S of Venkat CC took 39 wickets and Rohan S of Varsity Occasionals picked up 27 wickets.

In the V Division 'B' Zone, Jenish J of Prasad CC led the batting charts with 431 runs, followed by Dhushyanth B of Netaji CC with 415 runs and Abishek KR of Prasad CC with 394 runs.

Ebenezer N of Gandhi Nagar SCC topped the bowling list with 37 wickets, while Praveen Kumar A of Egmore Excelsiors and Selvakumar S of YMCC took 23 wickets each.

For the V Division 'C' Zone, Gowthama Raj TK of Youth Centre CC scored 418 runs to lead the batting table, ahead of Karthick K of Bharathi SC with 411 runs and Ashwin K of Eagle CC with 400 runs.

Ganesh V of Youth Centre CC starred with the ball, taking 32 wickets, followed by Allen Joseph J of Universal RC with 31 wickets and Huzefa M Patel of Youth Centre CC with 28 wickets.

In the V Division 'D' Zone batting standings, Kanish Prabhu P of Indian Oil (RO) S & RC scored 412 runs in six matches, while Barath of Grove CC scored 369 runs in nine matches.

Ilaiyaraaja's tune for Karthik Subbaraj's 10th film

Filmmaker Karthik Subbaraj has completed shooting for his 10th directorial venture, which brings him together for the first time with maestro Ilaiyaraaja as music composer. The film, produced by Sikhya Entertainment in association with Jio Studios, marks a major collaboration between one of contemporary cinema's most distinctive directors and one of Indian music's most celebrated legends. Ilaiyaraaja's involvement adds special significance



to the project, as the film becomes the 1540th in his storied musical career. The composer said he was moved by the honesty of the story and noted that the background score sessions were so

Karthik Subbaraj said working with Ilaiyaraaja had long been a dream and described the collaboration as deeply personal and creatively fulfilling. He also expressed excitement

Jio Studios president Jyoti Deshpande said the film represents a powerful blend of storytelling and music, while Sikhya Entertainment producers Guneet Monga Kapoor and Achin Jain called the project a meaningful creative partnership that feels destined. The makers said they are confident the film will deliver a memorable big-screen experience.

Focus on wetland conservation, sustainable agriculture

The International Day of Biological Diversity was observed across the world on Friday with renewed calls for the protection of ecosystems, conservation of traditional crops, and preservation of wetlands that play a vital role in maintaining ecological balance and food security.

Observed annually on May 22, the day aims to raise awareness about the rapid loss of biodiversity and the urgent need for collective action to protect the planet's living resources. The 2026 theme, "Acting Locally for Global Impact," highlights the importance of community-level conservation efforts in addressing global environmental challenges.

Experts noted that biodiversity includes not only the wide variety of plants, animals, and microorganisms, but also genetic diversity within species and the diversity of ecosystems such as forests, wetlands, lakes, and grasslands.

Environmentalists pointed out that biodiversity forms the foundation of human civilisation. Globally, fish provide nearly 20 per cent of animal protein for around three billion people, while plants account for more than 80 per cent of the human diet. Traditional plant-based medicines continue to serve as the primary healthcare source for millions living in rural regions of developing countries.

Scientists also warned that biodiversity loss increases the risk of zoonotic diseases — infections transmitted from animals to humans — while healthy ecosystems can help reduce the spread of pandemics and improve environmental resilience.

India, recognised as one of the world's mega-diverse countries, depends heavily on agricultural biodiversity for food security, rural livelihoods, and climate resilience. Indigenous crop varieties, traditional landraces, native

livestock breeds, and pollinators such as bees and butterflies play a crucial role in sustainable agriculture.

Environmental experts stressed that wetlands in South India, including Vedanthangal Bird Sanctuary, Pallikarai Marsh and Pulicat Lake, support hundreds of bird species, including migratory and endangered birds such as the glossy ibis, purple swamphen and greater flamingo.

Apart from supporting biodiversity, wetlands act as natural carbon sinks, help recharge groundwater, regulate urban temperatures, and reduce flood damage during heavy rains and cyclones. Experts emphasised the need to prevent encroachments, untreated waste disposal, and ecological degradation in marshland regions.

They also highlighted the importance of desilting projects, scientific monitoring, and community participation in wetland conservation efforts.

Conservationists welcomed recent efforts by the Tamil Nadu government to protect biodiversity-rich regions. Elathur Lake in Erode district was recently notified as Tamil Nadu's third Biodiversity Heritage Site under the Biological Diversity Act, 2002. Spread across 37.42 hectares, the lake supports 187 bird species, including the endangered Steppe Eagle and the vulnerable River Tern, while attracting nearly 5,000 migratory birds during peak seasons.

The lake joins Arittapatti Biodiversity Heritage Site and Kasarpatti Biodiversity Heritage Site in receiving Biodiversity Heritage Site recognition in Tamil Nadu. Experts said the observance serves as a reminder that protecting biodiversity is essential for ensuring environmental sustainability, agricultural productivity, water security, and the well-being of future generations.
