Dear Shareholders,

I hope you and your loved ones are keeping well. It is a privilege to address you, our valued shareholders, and share the Company & performance, key milestones and strategic priorities as we move forward.

India's expanding manufacturing ecosystem, rising consumption, infrastructure development and increasing emphasis on domestic production continue to create a favourable environment for the packaging industry. The progress towards "Viksit Bharat 2047" is expected to provide further impetus to manufacturing, logistics and industrial activity. Your Company sees these developments as opportunities to broaden our market presence. The Financial Year 2025-26 represented a period of meaningful progress, enhanced capabilities and strategic advancement for the Company. Operating in an environment characterised by fluctuations in raw material prices, inflationary pressures and competitive intensity. Your Company remained agile and committed to building a stronger operating platform. During the year, we concentrated our efforts on improving productivity, optimising costs, enhancing product quality and strengthening our manufacturing and business processes.

A significant milestone during the year was the expansion of the business's manufacturing capacity by setting up a Greenfield manufacturing facility in Indore with the latest machines and automation, which marks an important step in preparing the Company for its next phase of growth. The enhanced manufacturing infrastructure provides greater production flexibility, enables us to respond more effectively to customer requirements and creates additional headroom to pursue new customer opportunities. We believe this investment will support economies of scale and sustainable growth in the years ahead.

I am pleased to share that the new manufacturing facility has started production from the 1st of August 2026.

Our corrugated packaging business also made encouraging progress during FY 2025-26. We expanded our engagement with customers, improved product consistency, streamlined manufacturing processes and widened our market outreach. These initiatives have helped create a more robust platform for future expansion and positioned the Company to participate more effectively in the growing demand for quality and sustainable packaging solutions.

Now let me take this opportunity to report back to you on your Companies performance as well as the future outlook:

Manufacturing excellence remains a key pillar of the Company's growth strategy, supported by investments in advanced equipment, technology and R & D. The Company continues to enhance production efficiency, product quality and operational capabilities to meet evolving customer requirements. Going forward, the Company aims to scale the production and market reach of its core products—corrugated boxes and sheets—while pursuing sustainable and profitable growth. Further, reporting about the current year numbers, I am pleased to inform you that this year, Your Company's revenue increased from INR 19,470.84 (In Lakhs) in the previous year to INR 20,953.85 (In Lakhs) during the year and we earned a net profit of INR 1,763.35 (In Lakhs) as compared to INR 1,580.32 (In Lakhs) in the previous year.

The Company's equity shares were listed on the Main Board of BSE Limited, highlighting an important achievement in its corporate journey. A total of 1,57,51,000 equity shares of face value Rs. 10 each were admitted to trading with effect from Tuesday, October 14, 2025.

In view of the Company's operational and financial performance during the year, the Company has declared a Final Dividend of Rs. 1 (Rupees One only) per share of Rs. 10 (Rupees Ten each) at a rate of 10% for the F.Y. 2025-26 subject to your approval at the ensuing Annual General Meeting.

During the F.Y. 2025-26, Your Company spent Rs 43,00,000/- towards implementing Corporate Social Responsibility (CSR) initiatives through eligible NGOs in the areas of healthcare, education, support and empowerment of children with special needs, and promotion of sports.

The progress achieved by the Company has been made possible by the dedication, commitment and collective efforts of our entire team. I extend my sincere appreciation to the Worth family for their unwavering support and contribution to our journey.

I am equally grateful to all our stakeholders for their continued trust and confidence in the Company. We remain committed to honouring this trust, meeting their expectations and delivering sustainable, long-term value.

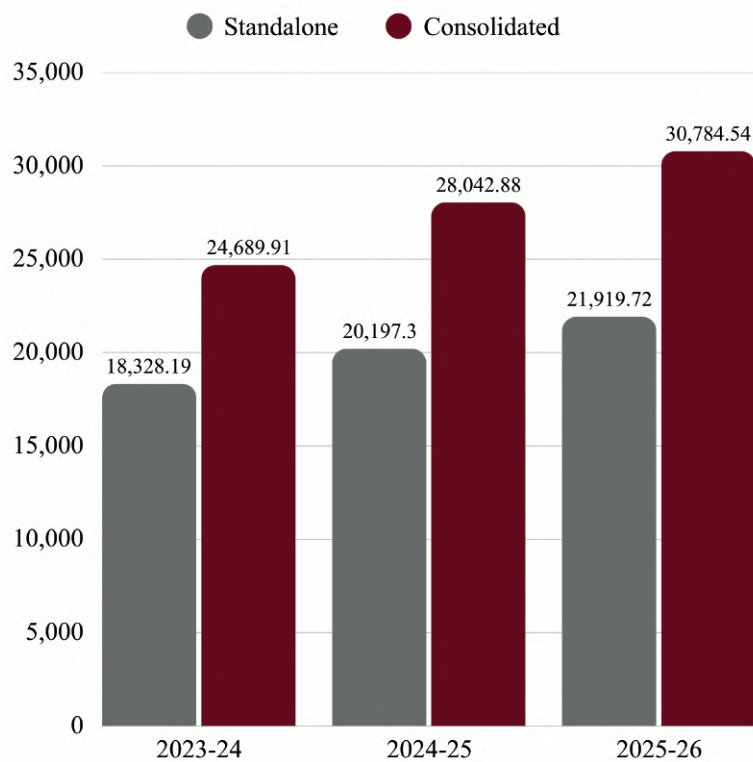




Revenue from Operations (in lakhs)

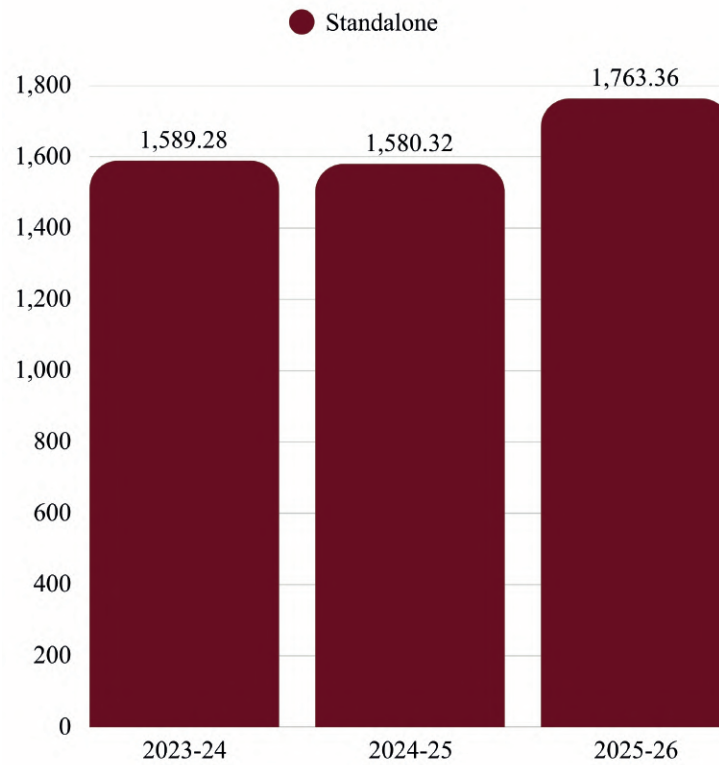

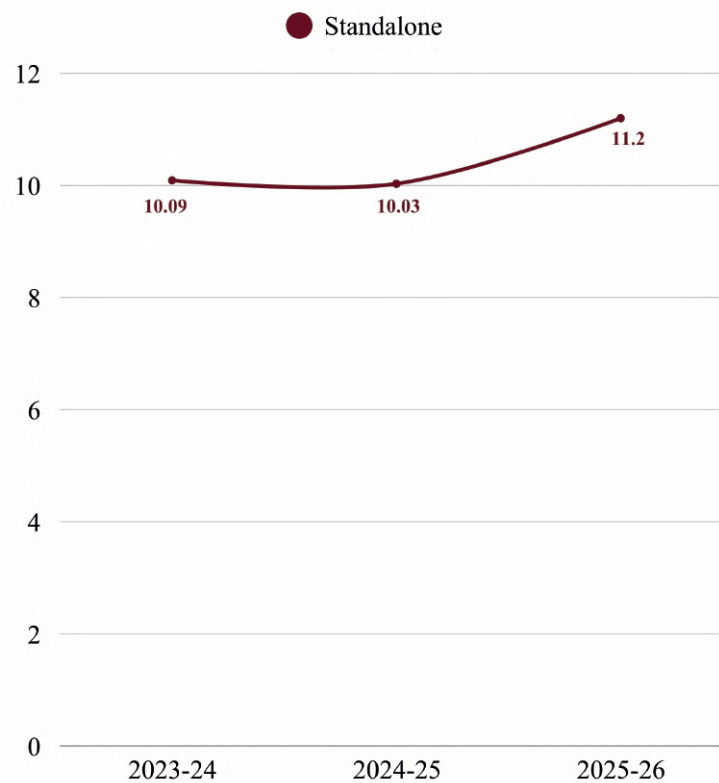




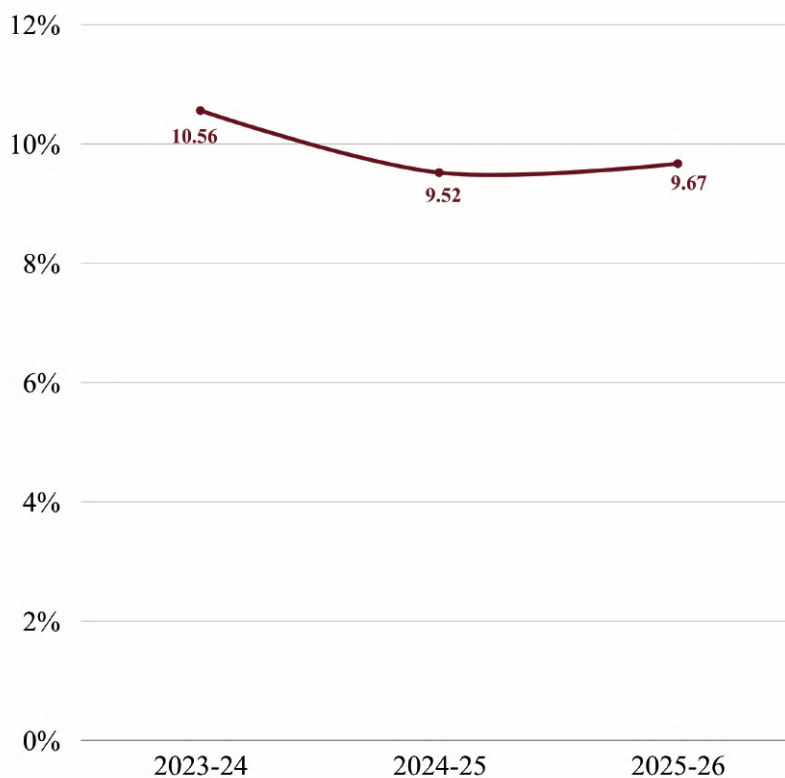
Profit After Tax (in lakhs)



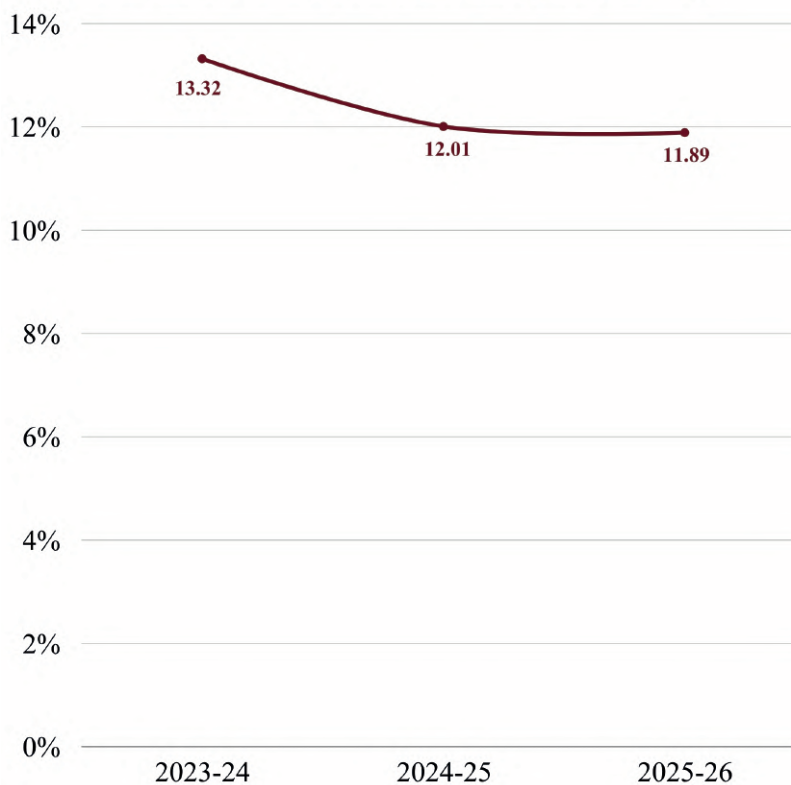

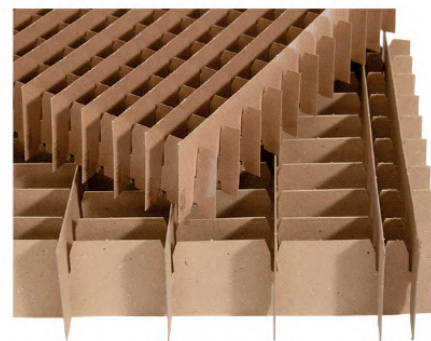

SEBI/LADNRO/ GN/2022/66 dated 24 January 2022) and Pursuant to SEBI Circular (Circular no. SEBI/HO/MIRSD/MIRSD_RTAMB/P/CIR/2022/8) dated January 25, 2022, the listed companies shall issue the securities in dematerialized form only, while processing any service requests from members viz., issue of duplicate share certificates, endorsement, transmission, transposition, etc. After processing the service request, a "Letter of Confirmation" will be issued to the members which shall be valid for a period of 120 days, within which the member shall make a request to the Depository Participant for dematerializing those shares. If the member fails to submit the dematerialisation request within 120 days, then the Company shall credit those shares to the Suspense Escrow Demat Account held by the Company. 17. In case of joint holders, the Member whose name appears as the first holder in the order of names as per the Register of Members of the Company will be entitled to vote at the AGM.
18. Members who are holding Shares in identical order of names in more than one Folio, are requested to apply to the RTA along with the relevant Share Certificates for consolidation of such Folios in one Folio.
19. Members whose shareholding is in electronic mode are requested to notify any change in address or bank account details to their respective depository participant(s) (DP). Members whose shareholding is in physical mode are requested to opt for the Electronic Clearing System (ECS) mode to receive dividend on time in line with the Circulars. We urge members to utilize the ECS for receiving dividends.
20. Members holding shares in physical form may nominate a person in respect of all the shares held by them whether singly or jointly. Members who hold shares singly are advised to avail of nomination facility in their own interest. Members holding shares in demat form may contact their respective Depository Participants for recording of nomination.
21. 22. As per Regulation 40 of the Listing Regulations, as amended, securities of listed companies can be transferred only in dematerialized form with effect from, April 1, 2019, except in case of request received for transmission or transposition of securities. In view of this and to eliminate all risks associated with physical shares and for ease of portfolio management, members holding shares in physical form are requested to consider converting their holdings to dematerialized form. 23. Nomination Form can be obtained from the RTA. The duly filled in Nomination Form shall be sent to RTA at the above-mentioned address by the Members holding shares in physical mode. 25. Mr. Burhanuddin Maksi Wala (ACS: 41988 and CP: 23193), Proprietor of M/s. B Maksi Wala & Associates, Practicing Company Secretaries, Indore have been appointed as the Scrutinizer to scrutinize the e-voting process in a fair and transparent manner.
26. The Scrutinizers shall immediately, after the conclusion of voting at the AGM, first count the votes cast during the meeting and thereafter unblock the votes cast through remote e-voting and make, within 48 hours from the conclusion of the meeting, a Consolidated Scrutinizer's Report of the total votes cast in favour or against of the resolutions transacted in the AGM and submit forthwith the same to the Chairman of the Company or a person authorised by him in writing who shall countersign the same.
27. If the final dividend, as recommended by the Board of Directors, is approved at the AGM, would be paid/credited/dispatched on or before 15th October, 2026 but within thirty days from the date of declaration of dividend to those persons (or their mandates):
 - i. To all Beneficial Owners in respect of shares held in dematerialized form as per the data as may be made available by the National Securities Depository Limited ("NSDL") and the Central Depository Services (India) Limited ("CDSL"), collectively "Depositories", as of the close of business hours on 09th September, 2026.
 - ii. To all Members in respect of shares held in physical form after giving effect to valid transfer, transmission or transposition requests lodged with the Company / Company's Registrar and Transfer Agents, Big Shares Services Private Limited, as of the close of business hours on 09th September, 2026.



28. The Results along-with the report of the Scrutinizer shall be placed on the website of the Company www.worthindia.com and on the website of CDSL immediately after the declaration of result by the Chairman or a person authorized by him in writing. The results shall also be immediately forwarded to the National Stock Exchange of India Limited.
29. Subject to receipt of requisite number of votes, the Resolutions shall be deemed to have been passed on the date of the 30th AGM i.e. 16th September, 2026.

COMMUNICATION TO SHAREHOLDERS ON TAX DEDUCTED AT SOURCE (TDS) FOR DIVIDEND DISTRIBUTION

Members may note that pursuant to the requirement of the Income-Tax Act, 2025, the Company will be required to withhold taxes at the prescribed rates on the dividend paid to its members. The Company shall therefore be required to deduct tax at source (TDS) at the time of making the payment of final dividend. To enable us to determine the appropriate TDS rate as applicable, members are requested to submit relevant documents, as specified in the below paragraphs, in accordance with the provisions of the IT Act. For resident shareholders, taxes shall be deducted at source under Section 393 of the IT Act as follows:

- Members having valid Permanent Account Number (PAN) TDS will deducted @ 10% or as notified by the Government of India (GOI).
- Members not having PAN / Valid PAN/ PAN is not linked with AADHAR in case of an individual TDS will be deducted @ 20% as provided under Section 397(2) of the Income Tax Act, 2025, regardless of dividend amount.

However, no tax shall be deducted on the dividend payable to resident member if:

- i) In case of Individual shareholders if the total dividend does not exceed ₹ 10,000 and also in cases where members provide Form 121 with valid & operative PAN, subject to conditions specified in the IT Act.
- ii) In case of Member covered u/s 393(5) of the Income-Tax Act, 2025 such as Government, RBI, Corporations established by Central Act & mutual funds if Valid documentary evidence for coverage u/s 393(5) of the Income-Tax Act, 2025 is provided.
- iii) In case of Category I and II Alternate Investment Fund if SEBI registration certificate to claim benefit under section 400(1) of the Income-Tax Act, 2025.
- iv) Any resident member exempted from TDS deduction as per the provisions of the Income-Tax Act, 2025 or by any other law or notification if Valid documentary evidence substantiating exemption from deduction of TDS.

For non-resident shareholders such as Foreign Institutional Investors (FIIs) / Foreign Portfolio Investors (FPIs) / Other Non-Resident members, taxes are required to be withheld in accordance with the provisions of Section 394 and other applicable sections of the IT Act, at the rates in force. The withholding tax shall be at the rate of 20% (plus applicable surcharge and cess) or as notified by the GOI on the amount of dividend payable.

However, To avail beneficial rate of tax treaty following tax documents would be required:

- i) Tax Residency certificate issued by revenue authority of country of residence of member for the year in which dividend is received.
- ii) PAN or declaration as per Rule 217 of the Income-Tax Rules, 2026 in a specified format.
- iii) E-filed Form 41.
- iv) Self-declaration for non-existence of permanent establishment/ fixed base in India.
- v) Self-declaration of beneficial ownership by the non-resident shareholder.
- vi) Any other documents as prescribed under the IT Act for lower withholding of taxes, if applicable, duly attested by the shareholders.

(Note: Application of beneficial Tax Treaty Rate shall depend upon the completeness of the documents submitted by the Non-Resident member and review to the satisfaction of the Company).

The aforementioned documents are required to be mailed to the company at cs@worthindia.com on or before 09th September, 2026. No communication would be accepted from members 09th September, 2026 regarding tax-withholding matters.

Unclaimed Dividends and IEPF:

Dividends, if not encashed for a period of 7 years from the date of transfer to Unpaid Dividend Account of the Company, are liable to be transferred to the Investor Education and Protection Fund (“IEPF”). Further, the shares in respect of which dividend has remained unclaimed for 7 consecutive years or more from the date of transfer to unpaid dividend account shall also be transferred to IEPF. In view of this, Members are requested to claim their dividends from the Company, within the stipulated timeline. The Members whose unclaimed dividends and/or shares have been transferred to IEPF, may contact the Company or RTA and submit the required documents for issue of Entitlement Letter. The Members can attach the Entitlement Letter and other required documents and file web Form IEPF-5 for claiming the dividend and/or shares available on www.mca.gov.in.

THE INSTRUCTIONS FOR MEMBERS FOR REMOTE E-VOTING AND JOINING GENERAL MEETING ARE AS UNDER:-

1. As you are aware, in view of the situation arising due to COVID-19 global pandemic, the general meetings of the companies shall be conducted as per the guidelines issued by the Ministry of Corporate Affairs (MCA) vide Circular No. 14/2020 dated April 8, 2020, Circular No. 17/2020 dated April 13, 2020 and Circular No. 20/2020 dated May 05, 2020. The forthcoming AGM/GM will thus be held through through video conferencing (VC) or other audio visual means (OAVM). Hence, Members can attend and participate in the ensuing AGM/EGM through VC/OAVM.
2. Pursuant to the provisions of Section 108 of the Companies Act, 2013 read with Rule 20 of the Companies (Management and Administration) Rules, 2014 (as amended) and Regulation 44 of SEBI (Listing Obligations & Disclosure Requirements) Regulations 2015 (as amended), and MCA Circulars dated April 08, 2020, April 13, 2020 and May 05, 2020 the Company is



providing facility of remote e-voting to its Members in respect of the business to be transacted at the AGM/EGM. For this purpose, the Company has entered into an agreement with Central Depository Services (India) Limited (CDSL) for facilitating voting through electronic means, as the authorized e-Voting's agency. The facility of casting votes by a member using remote e-voting as well as the e-voting system on the date of the EGM/AGM will be provided by CDSL.

3. The Members can join the EGM/AGM in the VC/OAVM mode 15 minutes before and after the scheduled time of the commencement of the Meeting by following the procedure mentioned in the Notice. The facility of participation at the EGM/AGM through VC/OAVM will be made available to atleast 1000 members on first come first served basis. This will not include large Shareholders (Shareholders holding 2% or more shareholding), Promoters, Institutional Investors, Directors, Key Managerial Personnel, the Chairpersons of the Audit Committee, Nomination and Remuneration Committee and Stakeholders Relationship Committee, Auditors etc. who are allowed to attend the EGM/AGM without restriction on account of first come first served basis.

6. In line with the Ministry of Corporate Affairs (MCA) Circular No. 17/2020 dated April 13, 2020, the Notice calling the AGM/EGM has been uploaded on the website of the Company at www.worthindia.com. The Notice can also be accessed from the websites of the Stock Exchanges i.e. BSE Limited and National Stock Exchange of India Limited at www.bseindia.com and www.nseindia.com respectively. The AGM/EGM Notice is also disseminated on the website of CDSL (agency for providing the Remote e-Voting facility and e-voting system during the AGM/EGM) i.e. www.evotingindia.com.
7. The AGM/EGM has been convened through VC/OAVM in compliance with applicable provisions of the Companies Act, 2013 read with MCA Circular No. 14/2020 dated April 8, 2020 and MCA Circular No. 17/2020 dated April 13, 2020 and MCA Circular No. 20/2020 dated May 05, 2020.
8. In continuation to this Ministry & **General Circular No. 20/2020** dated 05.05.2020, General Circular No. 02/2022 dated 05.05.2022 and General Circular No. 10/2022 dated 28.12.2022 and after due examination, it has been decided to allow companies whose AGMs are due in the Year 2023 or 2024, to conduct their AGMs through VC or OAVM on or before 30th September, 2024 in accordance with the requirements laid down in Para 3 and Para 4 of the General Circular No. 20/2020 dated 05.05.2020.

THE INTRUCTIONS OF SHAREHOLDERS FOR E-VOTING AND JOINING VIRTUAL MEETINGS ARE AS UNDER:

Step 1 : Access through Depositories CDSL/NSDL e-Voting system in case of individual shareholders holding shares in demat mode.

Step 2 : Access through CDSL e-Voting system in case of shareholders holding shares in physical mode and non-individual shareholders in demat mode.

- (i) The voting period begins on Sunday, September 13, 2026 on 09:00 A.M. (IST) and end on Tuesday, September 15, 2026 on 05:00 P.M. (IST). During this period shareholders' of the Company, holding shares either in physical form or in dematerialized form, as on the cut-off date September 09, 2026 may cast their vote electronically. Currently, there are multiple e-voting service providers (ESPs) providing e-voting facility to listed entities in India. This necessitates registration on various ESPs and maintenance of multiple user IDs and passwords by the shareholders.

In order to increase the efficiency of the voting process, pursuant to a public consultation, it has been decided to enable e-voting to all the demat account holders, by way of a single login credential, through their demat accounts/websites of Depositories/ Depository Participants. Demat account holders would be able to cast their vote without having to register again with the ESPs, thereby, not only facilitating seamless authentication but also enhancing ease and convenience of participating in e-voting process.

Step 1 : Access through Depositories CDSL/NSDL e-Voting system in case of individual shareholders holding shares in demat mode.

In terms of SEBI circular no. **SEBI/HO/CFD/CMD/CIR/P/2020/242** dated December 9, 2020 on e-Voting facility provided by Listed Companies, Individual shareholders holding securities in demat mode are allowed to vote through their demat account maintained with Depositories and Depository Participants. **MANAGEMENT DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS REPORT****1. Industry Structure and Developments**

The corrugated packaging industry is undergoing a phase of structural transformation, characterized by increasing consolidation, capacity expansion, and a gradual shift from a highly fragmented landscape toward a more organized and integrated structure. Large paper manufacturers are entering the corrugation segment to achieve backward and forward integration, intensifying competition and driving efficiency across the value chain. Simultaneously, both existing players and new entrants are investing in capacity augmentation and advanced automated technologies to cater to the growing demand from sectors such as e-commerce, FMCG, pharmaceuticals, and food processing. The industry also continues to benefit from a strong shift toward sustainable and recyclable packaging solutions, positioning corrugated products as a preferred alternative to plastic. However, rising raw material costs, particularly craft paper, and volatility in global supply chains have exerted pressure on margins across the sector.

Despite these challenges and evolving dynamics, the Worth Peripherals Limited (to be referred to as “the Company” in future text) industry outlook remains positive, supported by steady demand growth and increasing formalization.

2. Opportunities and Threats

With industry experience spanning decades, robust business relationships with existing customers and additions of new customers, the Company is amongst the largest manufacturers of corrugated boxes in the country. Equipped with state-of-the-art machinery from Europe, Taiwan and Japan, the Company is consistently growing year on year.

While successfully onboarding prospective customers, the Company also sees an opportunity to add value to customer’s packaging needs by using high graphics while printing corrugated boxes, since these arts and graphics act as a medium of advertising and marketing towards end consumers.

Alternatives to corrugated packing would serve as a threat to the company as well as the entire industry. However, keeping in mind the initiatives undertaken globally, corrugated packaging is known to be a biodegradable, recyclable and sustainable packing medium that in turn has the potential to replace non-sustainable packaging options.

3. Segment wise or Product wise performance

The Company has identified “Manufacture and Sale of Corrugated Boxes” as the single operating segment.

The sale of corrugated boxes in the financial year 2025-26 amounted to Rs. 20,710.69 /- lakhs on standalone basis & Rs. 30,247.43 /- lakhs on consolidation basis bifurcated amongst the Corrugated Boxes and Partitions.

4. Outlook

With a growth in the economy, the purchasing power of the population is improving. Increased consumption will result in demand for packaging, including corrugated boxes. Additionally, due the initiatives taken by the Indian Government with regards to sustainable and recyclable material usage, corrugated packaging can witness a favourable increase in demand.

5. Risks and Concerns

One of the major risks in the corrugated industry is fluctuations in the prices of basic raw material, i.e. Kraft Paper, which may have an adverse impact on our operations and financials.

6. Internal Control System and their adequacy

The Company has an adequate internal control system and a defined organizational structure besides, internal rules and regulations for conducting the business. The Management reviews actual performance with reference to budgets periodically. The Company has an Audit Committee, Independent Statutory Auditors and Internal Auditors who submit reports periodically which are reviewed and acted upon

7. Financial Performance with respect to operational performance:

Sales The Total Income of the Company for the year ended 31st March 2026 on standalone basis is Rs. 21,919.72 /- lakhs (previous year Rs. 20,197.30/- lakhs) and on consolidation basis it is Rs. 30,784.54/- lakhs (previous year Rs. 28,042.88/- lakhs).

Profit: Profit after Tax for the year ended 31st March 2026 on standalone basis amounts to Rs. 1,763.36 lakhs/-(previous year Rs. 1,580.32 lakhs/-) and on consolidation basis it amounts to Rs.1,852.82/- lakhs (previous year 1,734.38/- lakhs)

The Board took note of the penalty imposed by the Exchange amounting to Rs. 10,000/- plus applicable GST.
2. The Board further noted that the Company has since complied with the regulatory requirements and has paid the aforementioned fine within the stipulated time frame.
3. It was observed that the notice for the Board Meeting was issued on February 7, 2025, for the meeting scheduled on February 11, 2025, thus maintaining a clear gap of more than two days, assuming Saturday is considered a working day. The delay was an unintentional oversight and purely inadvertent.
4. The Board has taken cognizance of the matter and has advised the Key Managerial Personnel (KMP) to ensure strict and timely adherence to all applicable regulatory requirements. Additionally, the Compliance Team has been instructed to strengthen monitoring mechanisms for regulatory filings and obligations to prevent any such occurrences in the future. This is aimed at safeguarding investor interests and reinforcing the Company's corporate governance practices.

**GENERAL INFORMATION AND MATERIAL ACCOUNTING POLICIES****A. Corporate Information**

The Company was originally incorporated as Versatile Investments Private Limited at Indore, Madhya Pradesh as a Private Limited Company on 9th May 1996. The name of the Company was changed to Vestal Pack Private Limited. Then again, the name of the Company was changed to Worth Peripherals Private Limited. Subsequently, the Company was converted into a Public Limited Company on 24th April, 2017. The Company listed on NSE-SME EMERGE on September 26, 2017 and Migrated on Main Board of NSE on August 4, 2020. The company listed on BSE Main Board on October 14, 2025. The Corporate Identification Number of the Company is L67120MP1996PLC010808. The Standalone financial statements were approved for issue by the Board of Directors on May 12, 2026.

Worth Peripherals Limited ('the Company') is engaged in the business of manufacturing and sale of Corrugated Boxes. The Company is having manufacturing unit at Pithampur District Dhar (MP) and Registered and Corporate office is situated at 102, Sanskriti apartment, 44, Saketnagar, Indore (MP).

B. Material accounting policies**i. Statement of compliance of Indian Accounting Standards (Ind AS)-**

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Indian Accounting standards ("Ind AS") as notified under the companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Rules, 2015 and presentation requirements of Division II of schedule III of Companies Act, 2013 as applicable to standalone financial statement, read with section 133 of the Companies Act, 2013.

ii. Basis of Preparation

The financial statements have been prepared on accrual basis and under the historical cost convention except for certain financial instruments which are measured at fair value at the end of each reporting period, as explained in the accounting policies mentioned below.

All assets and liabilities have been classified as current or non-current as per the Company's normal operating cycle and other criteria set out in Schedule III to the Companies Act, 2013. The Company has ascertained its operating cycle as 12 months for the purpose of current and non-current classification of assets and liabilities.

Deferred tax assets and liabilities are classified as non-current assets and liabilities.

The operating cycle is the time between the acquisition of assets for processing and their realization in cash and cash equivalents.

Functional and presentation currency

These financial statements including notes thereon are presented in Indian Rupees ("Rupees" or "INR"), which is Company's functional and presentation currency. All amounts disclosed in the Financial Statements including notes thereon have been rounded off to the nearest Rs. in Lakhs as per the requirement of Schedule III to the Act, unless stated otherwise.

iii. Use of Estimates, Judgments and Assumptions

The preparation of financial statements in accordance with Ind AS requires management to make judgments, estimates and assumptions that affect the application of accounting policies and the reported amount of assets, liabilities, income and expenses. Actual results may differ from these estimates. Estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognized in the period in which the estimates are revised and in any future periods affected.

Significant areas of estimation, uncertainty and critical judgements in applying accounting policies that have significant effect on amount recognized in the financial statements are:

- a. Allowance for bad and doubtful trade receivable.
- b. Recognition and measurement of provision and contingencies.
- c. Depreciation/Amortisation and useful lives of Property, plant and equipment / Intangible Assets.
- d. Recognition of deferred tax.
- e. Income Taxes.
- f. Measurement of defined benefit obligation.
- g. Impairment of Non-financial assets and financial assets.
- h. Fair value of financial instruments

iv. Investment in subsidiaries, associates and joint ventures

A subsidiary is an entity that is controlled by another entity.

An associate is an entity over which the Company has significant influence. Significant influence is the power to participate in the financial and operating policy decisions of the investee but is not control or joint control over those policies.

A joint venture is a type of joint arrangement whereby the parties that have joint control of the arrangement have rights to the net assets of the joint venture. Joint control is the contractually agreed sharing of control of an arrangement, which exists only when decisions about the relevant activities require unanimous consent of the parties sharing control.



The company's investments in its subsidiaries, associates and joint ventures are accounted as cost less impairment.

Impairment of investments

The company reviews its carrying value of investments carried at cost annually, or more frequently when there is indication for impairment. If the recoverable amount is less than its carrying amount, the impairment loss is recorded in the Statement of Profit and Loss.

When impairment loss subsequently reverses, the carrying amount of the investment is increased to the revised estimate of its recoverable amount, so that the increased carrying amount does not exceed the cost of the investment. A reversal of an impairment loss is recognised immediately in P&L.

v. Revenue

(A) Recognition

The company recognised revenue i.e. account for a contract with a customer only when all of the following criteria are met:

- a. the parties to the contract have approved the contract (in writing, orally or in accordance with other customary business practices) and are committed to perform their respective obligations;
- b. the entity can identify each party's rights regarding the goods or services to be transferred;
- c. the entity can identify the payment terms for the goods or services to be transferred;
- d. the contract has commercial substance (i.e. the risk, timing or amount of the entity's future cash flows is expected to change as a result of the contract); and
- e. it is probable that the entity will collect the consideration to which it will be entitled in exchange for the goods or services that will be transferred to the customer. In evaluating whether collectability of an amount of consideration is probable, an entity shall consider only the customer's ability and intention to pay that amount of consideration when it is due. The amount of consideration to which the entity will be entitled may be less than the price stated in the contract if the consideration is variable because the entity may offer the customer a price concession.

(B) Measurement

When (or as) a performance obligation is satisfied, company recognise as revenue the amount of the transaction price (which excludes estimates of variable consideration that are constrained) that is allocated to that performance obligation.

The transaction price is the amount that the entity expects to be entitled to in exchange for transferring promised goods or services to a customer, excluding amounts collected on behalf of third parties (for example, some taxes on sales). The consideration promised may include fixed amounts, variable amounts, or both.

a. Sale of goods

Revenue is recognised upon transfer of control of promised goods to customers in an amount that reflects the consideration which the Company expects to receive in exchange for those goods. Revenue from the sale of goods is recognised at the point in time when control is transferred to the customer which is usually on dispatch / delivery of goods, based on contracts with the customers. Revenue is measured based on the transaction price, which is the consideration, adjusted for volume discounts, price concessions, incentives, and returns, if any, as specified in the contracts with the customers. Revenue excludes taxes collected from customers on behalf of the government. Due to the short nature of credit period given to customers, there is no financing component in the contract.

b. Sale of Services

Revenue from services rendered is recognised as the services are rendered and is booked based on agreements/arrangements with the concerned parties.

c. Interest and Dividend

Interest income is recognized on accrual basis using the effective interest method. Dividend income is recognised in profit or loss on the date on which the company's right to receive payment is established.

vi. Inventories

Inventories are valued at cost or net realizable value whichever is lower. The cost of inventories of Raw Materials, Ancillary Raw Materials and Consumables Spares comprises all costs of purchase including duties and taxes (other than those subsequently recoverable from the taxing authorities), and other costs incurred in bringing the inventories to their present location and condition.

The cost of inventories of Finished Goods & Work-in-progress includes cost of direct materials and labour and a proportion of manufacturing overheads based on the normal operating capacity but excluding borrowing cost.

The cost formulas used are First-in- First Out ('FIFO') method in case of Raw Material, Ancillary Raw Material and Consumable Spares, Work-in-progress and Finished Goods.

vii. Property, Plant and Equipment

a. Recognition and measurement

The cost of an item of property, plant and equipment is recognized as an asset if, and only if:

- (a) it is probable that future economic benefits associated with the item will flow to the enterprise; and
- (b) the cost of the item can be measured reliably.



Items of property, plant and equipment are measured at cost less accumulated depreciation and any accumulated impairment losses (if any). Freehold land is measured at costs.

The cost of an item of property, plant and equipment comprises its purchase price, including import duties and non-refundable purchase taxes, after deducting trade discounts and rebates, acquisition or construction cost including borrowing costs, any costs directly attributable to bringing the asset to the location and condition necessary for it to be capable of operating in the manner intended by management, initial estimate of the costs of dismantling and removing the item and restoring the site on which it is located.

If significant parts of an item of property, plant and equipment have different useful lives, then they are accounted for as separate items (major components) of property, plant and equipment.

Any gain or loss on disposal of an item of property, plant and equipment is recognised in statement of profit or loss.

b. Subsequent expenditure

Subsequent expenditure is capitalised only if it is probable that the future economic benefits associated with the expenditure will flow to the company and costs of item can be measured reliably. The company recognizes in the carrying amount of an item of Property, Plant & Equipment, and the cost of replacing a part of an item, when that cost is incurred provided the recognition criteria as mentioned above are met. The carrying amount of those parts that are replaced is derecognized in accordance with the de-recognition provisions mentioned in the Indian Accounting Standards. The cost of day to day servicing of an item of Property, Plant & Equipment is recognized in the Statement of Profit or Loss as and when incurred.

c. Depreciation

Depreciation on property, plant and equipment is provided using Straight Line method on depreciable amount as per the useful life of the assets in the manner as specified in Schedule II to the Companies Act, 2013. The estimated useful life of assets and estimated residual value is taken as prescribed under Schedule II to the Companies Act, 2013.

Depreciation on additions during the year is provided on pro rata basis with reference to date of addition/installation. Depreciation on assets disposed/discarded is charged up to the date on which such asset is sold.

The estimated useful lives, residual value and depreciation method are reviewed at the end of each balance sheet date, any changes therein are considered as changes in estimate and accordingly accounted for prospectively.

d. Capital Work in Progress

Assets under erection/installation are shown as “Capital work in progress”, Expenditure during construction period are shown as “pre-operative expenses” to be capitalized on erection/installations of the assets.

Capital work in progress is stated as cost, net of accumulated impairment loss, if any.

viii. Employee benefits

a. Short term employee benefits

Short-term employee benefits are expensed as the related service is provided. A liability is recognised for the amount expected to be paid if the company has a present legal or constructive obligation to pay this amount as a result of past service provided by the employee and the obligation can be estimated reliably.

b. Defined benefit plans

The liability for gratuity a defined benefit plan is determined annually by a qualified actuary using the projected unit credit method.

The company pays gratuity to the employees, who have completed five years of service with company at the time when the employee leaves the company, as per the payment of gratuity act 1972.

Remeasurement of the net defined benefit plans in respect of post-employment are charged to other comprehensive income. Net interest expense and other expenses related to defined benefit plans are recognised in statement of profit or loss.

c. Defined Contribution Plan

The company's payments to the defined contribution plans are recognized as expenses during the period in which the employees perform the services that payment covers. Defined contribution plan comprise of contribution to the employees' provident fund with government, Employees' State Insurance and Pension Scheme.

ix. Taxes

A. Income Taxes

Income tax expense comprises current and deferred tax. It is recognised in profit or loss except to the extent that it relates to other comprehensive income or a business combination, or items recognised directly in equity.

a. Current tax

Current tax comprises the expected tax payable to or receivable from the taxation authorities on the taxable income or loss for the year and any adjustment to the tax payable or receivable in respect of previous years. It is measured using tax rates enacted or substantively enacted at the reporting date.

Current tax assets and liabilities are offset only if, the Company:



- a) has a legally enforceable right to set off the recognised amounts; and
- b) intends either to settle on a net basis, or to realise the asset and settle the liability simultaneously.

b. Deferred tax

Deferred tax is provided using the balance sheet approach. It is recognised on temporary differences between the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities in the financial statements and the corresponding tax bases used in the computation of taxable profit.

Deferred tax liabilities are generally recognised for all taxable temporary differences. Deferred tax assets are generally recognised for all deductible temporary differences to the extent that it is probable that taxable profits will be available against which those deductible temporary differences can be utilised.

The carrying amount of deferred tax assets and liabilities are reviewed at the end of each reporting period.

Deferred tax liabilities and assets are measured at the tax rates that are expected to apply in the period in which the liability is settled or the asset realised, based on tax rates (and tax laws) that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the end of the reporting period.

Deferred tax assets and liabilities are offset only if:

- a) the entity has a legally enforceable right to set off current tax assets against current tax liabilities; and
- b) the deferred tax assets and the deferred tax liabilities relate to income taxes levied by the same taxation authority on the same taxable entity.

B. Goods and Service Tax (GST) paid on acquisition of assets or on incurring expenses

Expenses and assets as recognized net of the amount of GST paid, except:

- a) When the tax incurred on a purchase of assets or services is not recoverable from the taxation authority, in which case, the tax paid is recognized as part of the cost of acquisition of the asset or as the part the expense item, as applicable;
- b) When receivables and payables are stated with the amount of tax included

The net amount of tax recoverable from, or payable to, the taxation authority is included as part of other current/non-current assets/liabilities in the balance sheet.

ix. Foreign currency transactions and translations

Transactions in foreign currencies are recorded at the exchange rates prevailing on the date of the transaction.

Monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are translated into the functional currency at the exchange rate at the reporting date. Differences arising on settlement of monetary items are recognised in statement of profit or loss except to the extent of exchange differences which are regarded as an adjustment to interest costs on foreign currency borrowings that are directly attributable to the acquisition or construction of qualifying assets which are capitalized as cost of assets.

Non-monetary items that are measured based on historical cost in a foreign currency are recorded using the exchange rates at the date of the transaction. Non-monetary assets and liabilities that are measured at fair value in a foreign currency are translated into the functional currency at the exchange rate when the fair value was determined. Exchange differences arising out of these transactions are generally recognised in statement of profit or loss.

x. Borrowing cost

Borrowing costs that are directly attributable to the acquisition, construction or production of qualifying asset are capitalised as part of the cost of that asset till the date it is ready for its intended use or sale. Qualifying asset are the assets that necessarily takes a substantial period of time to get ready for its intended use. All other borrowing costs are charged to the statement of profit or loss in the period in which they are incurred.

Borrowing cost consist of interest and amortization of ancillary cost incurred in connection with the arrangement of borrowed funds. Borrowing cost also includes exchange differences to the extent regarded as an adjustment to the borrowing costs.

xi. Cash and Cash Equivalent

Cash and cash equivalent includes the cash and Cheques in hand, bank balances, demand deposits with bank and other short term, highly liquid investments with original maturity of three months or less that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and which are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value.



Bank overdrafts are shown within borrowings in current liabilities in the balance sheet and forms part of financing activities in the cash flow statement. Book overdraft are shown within other financial liabilities in the balance sheet and forms part of operating activities in the cash flow statement.

xii. Cash Flow Statement

Cash flows are reported using indirect method, whereby profit/ (loss) before tax is adjusted for the effect of transactions of non-cash nature and any deferrals or accruals of past or future cash receipts or payments and items of income or expenses associated with investing or financing cash flow. The cash flow from operating, investing and financing activities of the company is segregated based on the available information.

xiii. Provisions, Contingent Liabilities and Contingent Assets

Provisions are recognized when there is a present legal or constructive obligation as a result of past events and it is probable that an outflow of resources embodying economic benefits will be required to settle the obligation and the amount can be reliably estimated. Provisions are not recognized for future operating losses. Expense relating to a provision is presented in statement of profit & loss, net of any reimbursement.

A contingent liability is a possible obligation that arises from past events whose existence will be confirmed by the occurrence or non-occurrence of one or more uncertain future events beyond the control of the Company or a present obligation that is not recognized because it is not probable that an outflow of resources will be required to settle the obligation, or the amount of the obligation cannot be measured with sufficient reliability. The Company does not recognize a contingent liability but discloses its existence in the notes to financial statements

A contingent asset is a possible asset that arises from past events and whose existence will be confirmed only by the occurrence or non-occurrence of one or more uncertain future events not wholly within the control of the Company. Contingent assets are not recognized, but its existence is disclosed in the notes to the financial statements

Provisions, Contingent Liabilities & Contingent Assets are reviewed at the end of each reporting period.

xiv. Leases

A contract is, or contains, a lease if the contract conveys the right to control the use of an identified asset for a period of time in exchange for consideration.

As per the requirements of Ind AS 116 the company evaluates whether an arrangement qualifies to be a lease. In identifying a lease, the company uses significant judgement in assessing the lease term (including anticipated renewals) and the applicable discount rate.

The Company determines the lease term as the non-cancellable period of a lease, together with both periods covered by an option to extend the lease if the company is reasonably certain to exercise that option; and periods covered by an option to terminate the lease if the Company is reasonably certain not to exercise that option. The Company revises the lease term if there is a change in the non-cancellable period of a lease.

Company as a lessee

The Company accounts for each lease component within the contract as a lease separately from non-lease components of the contract and allocates the consideration in the contract to each lease component on the basis of the relative stand-alone price of the lease component and the aggregate stand-alone price of the non-lease components.

Right of Use Assets

The Company recognises right-of-use asset representing its right to use the underlying asset for the lease term at the lease commencement date. The cost of the right-of-use asset measured at inception shall comprise of the amount of the initial measurement of the lease liability adjusted for any lease payments made at or before the commencement date less any lease incentives received, plus any initial direct costs incurred and an estimate of costs to be incurred by the lessee in dismantling and removing the underlying asset or restoring the underlying asset or site on which it is located.

The right-of-use assets is subsequently measured at cost less any accumulated depreciation, accumulated impairment losses, if any and adjusted for any remeasurement of the lease liability. The right-of-use assets is depreciated using the straight-line method from the commencement date over the lease term. Right-of-use assets are tested for impairment whenever there is any indication that their carrying amounts may not be recoverable and impairment loss, if any, is recognised in the statement of profit or loss.

Lease hold land are amortised over period of lease and considered as Right of Use assets as per Ind AS 116 and classified accordingly.

Lease Liability

The Company measures the lease liability at the present value of the lease payments that are not paid at the commencement date of the lease to be paid over the lease term. The lease payments are discounted using the interest rate implicit in the lease, if that rate can be readily determined. If that rate cannot be readily determined, the Company uses incremental borrowing rate. For leases with reasonably similar characteristics, the Company, on a lease by lease basis, may adopt either the incremental borrowing rate specific to the lease or the incremental borrowing rate for the portfolio as a whole.

The lease liability is subsequently re-measured by increasing the carrying amount to reflect interest on the lease liability, reducing the carrying amount to reflect the lease payments made and re-measuring the carrying amount to reflect any reassessment or lease modifications. The company recognises the amount of the re-measurement of lease liability due to modification as an adjustment to the right-of-use asset and statement of profit or loss depending upon the nature of modification. Where the carrying amount of the right-of-use asset is reduced to zero and there is a further reduction in the measurement of the lease liability, the Company recognises any remaining amount of the re-measurement in statement of profit or loss.

The Company has elected not to apply the requirements of Ind AS 116 Leases to short-term leases of all assets that have a lease term of 12 months or less and leases for which the underlying asset is of low value. The lease payments associated with these leases are recognized as an expense on a straight-line basis over the lease term.

Operating leases

The Company has also used the practical expedient provided by the standard when applying Ind AS 116 to leases previously classified as operating leases under Ind AS 17 and therefore, has not reassessed whether a contract, is or contains a lease, at the date of initial application, relied on its assessment of whether leases are onerous, applying Ind AS 37 immediately before the date of initial application as an alternative to performing an impairment review, excluded initial direct costs from measuring the right-of-use asset at the date of initial application and used hindsight when determining the lease term if the contract contains options to extend or terminate the lease. The Company has used a single discount rate to a portfolio of leases with similar characteristics.

a. Financial assets

(i) Classification

The Company classifies financial assets in the following measurement categories:

- a) Those measured at amortised cost and
- b) Those measured subsequently at fair value through other comprehensive income or fair value through profit or loss on the basis of its business model for managing the financial assets and the contractual cash flow characteristics of the financial asset.

(ii) Initial recognition and measurement

All financial assets are recognised initially at fair value. Transaction costs that are attributable to the acquisition of the financial asset are adjusted to fair value in case of financial assets not recorded at fair value through profit or loss. Purchases or sales of financial assets that require delivery of assets within a time frame established by regulation or convention in the market place (regular way trades) are recognised on the trade date, i.e., the date that the company commits to purchase or sell the asset.

(iii) Subsequent measurement

(a) Measured at amortised cost

A financial asset is measured at the amortised cost if both the following conditions are met:

- a) The asset is held within a business model whose objective is to hold assets for collecting contractual cash flows, and
- b) Contractual terms of the asset give rise on specified dates to cash flows that are solely payments of principal and interest (SPPI) on the principal amount outstanding.

After initial measurement, such financial assets are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest rate (EIR) method. Amortised cost is calculated by taking into account any discount or premium on acquisition and fees or costs that are an integral part of the EIR. The EIR amortisation is included in finance income in the statement of profit or loss. The losses arising from impairment are recognised in the statement of profit or loss. This category generally applies to trade and other receivables.

(b) Measured at fair value through other comprehensive income (FVOCI)

A financial asset is measured at FVOCI if both of the following criteria are met:

- a) The objective of the business model is achieved both by collecting contractual cash flows and selling the financial assets, and
- b) The asset's contractual cash flows represent SPPI.

Financial assets included within the FVOCI category are measured initially as well as at each reporting date at fair value. Fair value movements are recognized in the other comprehensive income (OCI). However, the company recognizes interest income, impairment losses & reversals and foreign exchange gain or loss in the profit or loss. On derecognition of the asset, cumulative gain or loss previously recognised in OCI is reclassified from the equity to profit or loss. Interest earned whilst holding FVOCI debt instrument is reported as interest income using the EIR method.

(c) Financial Asset at fair value through profit or loss (FVTPL)

FVTPL is a residual category for financial asset. Any financial asset, which does not meet the criteria for categorization as at amortized cost or as FVOCI, is classified as at FVTPL.

In addition, the group company may elect to classify a financial asset, which otherwise meets amortized cost or FVOCI criteria, as at FVTPL. However, such election is allowed only if doing so reduces or eliminates a measurement or recognition inconsistency (referred to as 'accounting mismatch').

Financial assets included within the FVTPL category are measured at fair value with all changes recognized in the profit or loss.

Derecognition

A financial asset (or, where applicable, a part of a financial asset or part of a company of similar financial assets) is primarily derecognised (i.e. removed from the company's balance sheet) when:

- a) The rights to receive cash flows from the asset have expired, or
- b) The company has transferred its rights to receive cash flows from the asset or has assumed an obligation to pay the received cash flows in full without material delay to a third party under a 'pass-through' arrangement; and either (a) the company has transferred substantially all the risks and rewards of the asset, or (b) the company has neither transferred nor retained substantially all the risks and rewards of the asset, but has transferred control of the asset.
- c) When the company has transferred its rights to receive cash flows from an asset or has entered into a pass-through arrangement, it evaluates if and to what extent it has retained the risks and rewards of ownership. When it has neither transferred nor retained substantially all of the risks and rewards of the asset, nor transferred control of the asset, the company continues to recognise the transferred asset to the extent of the company's continuing involvement. In that case, the company also recognises an associated liability. The transferred asset and the associated liability are measured on a basis that reflects the rights and obligations that the company has retained.
- d) Continuing involvement that takes the form of a guarantee over the transferred asset is measured at the lower of the original carrying amount of the asset and the maximum amount of consideration that the company could be required to repay.

Impairment of financial assets

In accordance with Ind-AS 109, the Company applies expected credit loss (ECL) model for measurement and recognition of impairment loss on the following financial assets and credit risk exposure:

- a) Financial assets that are debt instruments, and are measured at amortised cost e.g., loans, debt securities, deposits, and bank balance.
- b) Trade receivables.

The Company follows 'simplified approach' for recognition of impairment loss allowance on:

- a) Trade receivables which do not contain a significant financing component.

The application of simplified approach does not require the Company to track changes in credit risk. Rather, it recognises impairment loss allowance based on lifetime ECLs at each reporting date, right from its initial recognition.

- b) For recognition of impairment loss on other financial assets and risk exposure, the Company determines that whether there has been a significant increase in the credit risk since initial recognition. If credit risk has not increased significantly, 12-month ECL is used to provide for impairment loss. However, if credit risk has increased significantly, lifetime ECL is used. If, in a subsequent period, credit quality of the instrument improves such that there is no longer a significant increase in credit risk since initial recognition, then the entity reverts to recognising impairment loss allowance based on 12-month ECL.

b. Financial liabilities**(i) Classification**

The Company classifies all financial liabilities as subsequently measured at amortised cost, except for financial liabilities at fair value through profit or loss. Such liabilities, including derivatives that are liabilities, shall be subsequently measured at fair value.

(ii) Initial recognition and measurement

Financial liabilities are classified, at initial recognition, as financial liabilities at fair value through profit or loss or amortised costs.

All financial liabilities are recognised initially at fair value and, in the case of loans and borrowings and payables, net of directly attributable transaction costs.

The company's financial liabilities include trade and other payables, loans and borrowings, financial guarantee contracts and derivative financial instruments.

(iii) Subsequent measurement**Financial Liabilities at fair value through profit or loss**

Financial liabilities at fair value through profit or loss include financial liabilities held for trading and financial liabilities designated upon initial recognition as at fair value through profit or loss. Financial liabilities are classified as held for trading if they are incurred for the purpose of repurchasing in the near term. This category also includes derivative financial instruments entered into by the group that are not designated as hedging instruments in hedge relationships as defined by Ind-AS 109. Separated embedded derivatives are also classified as held for trading unless they are designated as effective hedging instruments.

Gains or losses on liabilities held for trading are recognised in the profit or loss.

Financial liabilities designated upon initial recognition at fair value through profit or loss are designated at the initial date of recognition, and only if the criteria in Ind-AS 109 are satisfied. For liabilities designated as FVTPL, fair value gains/ losses attributable to changes in own credit risk are recognized in OCI. These gains/loss are not subsequently transferred to P&L. However, the company may transfer the cumulative gain or loss within equity. All other changes in fair value of such liability are recognised in the statement of profit or loss.

Loans and borrowings

After initial recognition, interest-bearing loans and borrowings are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the EIR method. Gains and losses are recognised in profit or loss when the liabilities are derecognised as well as through the EIR amortisation process.

Amortised cost is calculated by taking into account any discount or premium on acquisition and fees or costs that are an integral part of the EIR. The EIR amortisation is included as finance costs in the statement of profit or loss.

This category generally applies to interest-bearing loans and borrowings.

Derecognition

A financial liability is derecognised when the obligation under the liability is discharged or cancelled or expires. When an existing financial liability is replaced by another from the same lender on substantially different terms, or the terms of an existing liability are substantially modified, such an exchange or modification is treated as the derecognition of the original liability and the recognition of a new liability. The difference in the respective carrying amounts is recognised in the statement of profit or loss.

Derivative financial instruments

The company uses derivative financial instruments, such as forward currency contracts, interest rate swaps and forward commodity contracts, to hedge its foreign currency risks, interest rate risks and commodity price risks, respectively. Such derivative financial instruments are initially recognised at fair value on the date on which a derivative contract is entered into and are subsequently re-measured at fair value. Derivatives are carried as financial assets when the fair value is positive and as financial liabilities when the fair value is negative.

Offsetting

Financial assets and financial liabilities are offset and the net amount is presented in the balance sheet when, and when the company has a legally enforceable right to set off the amount and it intends either to settle on a net basis or to realize the asset and settle the liability simultaneously.

Measurement of fair values

The Company's accounting policies and disclosures require the measurement of fair values, for financial instruments.

The Company has an established control framework with respect to the measurement of fair values. The management regularly reviews significant unobservable inputs and valuation adjustments. If third party information, such as broker quotes or pricing services, is used to measure fair values, then the management assesses the evidence obtained from the third parties to support the conclusion that such valuations meet the requirements of Ind AS, including the level in the fair value hierarchy in which such valuations should be classified.

When measuring the fair value of an asset or a liability, the Company uses observable market data as far as possible. Fair values are categorised into different levels in a fair value hierarchy based on the inputs used in the valuation techniques as follows.

Level 1: quoted prices (unadjusted) in active markets for identical assets or liabilities.

Level 2: inputs other than quoted prices included in Level 1 that are observable for the asset or liability, either directly (i.e. as prices) or indirectly (i.e. derived from prices).

Level 3: inputs for the asset or liability that are not based on observable market data (unobservable inputs).

If the inputs used to measure the fair value of an asset or a liability fall into different levels of the fair value hierarchy, then the fair value measurement is categorised in its entirety in the same level of the fair value hierarchy as the lowest level input that is significant to the entire measurement.

The Company recognises transfers between levels of the fair value hierarchy at the end of the reporting period during which the change has occurred.

xv. Government Grants

Government Grants and subsidies from Government are recognised when there is reasonable certainty that the grant/subsidy will be received and all attaching conditions will be complied with.

When the government grant relates to income, it is recognised in the Statement of Profit or Loss on a systematic basis over the period in which the Company recognizes as expenses the related costs for which the grant is intended to compensate.

For grants related to asset the grant is deducted in calculating the carrying amount of the asset. The grant is recognised in profit or loss over the life of a depreciable asset as a reduced depreciation expense.

xvi. Earnings per share

Basic earnings per share is calculated by dividing the net profit or loss attributable to equity holders of company (after deducting preference dividends and attributable taxes) the weighted average number of equity shares outstanding during the period.

Partly paid equity shares are treated as a fraction of an equity share to the extent that they are entitled to participate in dividends relative to a fully paid equity share during the reporting period. The weighted average number of equity shares outstanding during the period is adjusted for events such as bonus issue, bonus element in right issue, share split, and reverse share split (consolidation of shares) that have changed the number of equity shares outstanding, without a corresponding change in resources.



For the purpose of calculating diluted earnings per share, the net profit or loss for the period attributable to equity shareholders of the company and the weighted average number of shares outstanding during the period are adjusted for the effects of all dilutive potential equity shares.

xvii. New and Amended Standards

The Ministry of Corporate Affairs (“MCA”) has notified new standards and amendments to existing standards under the Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Rules, as amended from time to time. During the year ended March 31, 2026, MCA notified the Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Amendment Rules, 2025, effective from April 1, 2025. The Company has applied the amendments that became effective during the year. The Company has not early adopted any standard, interpretation or amendment that has been issued but is not yet effective.

(i) Amendments to Ind AS 21 – Lack of Exchangeability

The amendments to Ind AS 21 *The Effects of Changes in Foreign Exchange Rates* specify how an entity should assess whether a currency is exchangeable and determine the spot exchange rate when exchangeability between two currencies is lacking. The amendments also introduce additional disclosure requirements to enable users of financial statements to understand the impact of a lack of exchangeability on the entity’s financial performance, financial position and cash flows.

The amendments are effective for annual reporting periods beginning on or after April 1, 2025. Comparative information is not required to be restated on initial application.

The amendments do not have any impact on the Company’s financial statements.

(ii) Amendments to Ind AS 1 – Classification of Liabilities as Current or Non-current and Non-current Liabilities with Covenants

The amendments clarify the requirements for classifying liabilities as current or non-current. The amendments clarify:

- What is meant by a right to defer settlement;
- That the right to defer settlement must exist at the end of the reporting period;
- That classification is unaffected by management’s expectations regarding the exercise of the right to defer settlement; and
- That only if an embedded derivative in a convertible liability is itself an equity instrument would the terms of a liability not affect its classification.

The amendments also require additional disclosures where an entity’s right to defer settlement of a liability for at least twelve months after the reporting period is subject to compliance with future covenants.

Where a breach of a material covenant occurs on or before the reporting date, resulting in the liability becoming payable on demand, and the lender subsequently agrees, after the reporting period but before approval of the financial statements, not to demand repayment for at least twelve months, such event is not treated as an adjusting event. Accordingly, the liability is classified as current.

The amendments are effective for annual reporting periods beginning on or after April 1, 2025 and are applied retrospectively in accordance with Ind AS 8.

The amendments do not have a material impact on the Company’s financial statements.

(iii) Amendments to Ind AS 7 and Ind AS 107 – Supplier Finance Arrangements

The amendments to Ind AS 7 *Statement of Cash Flows* and Ind AS 107 *Financial Instruments: Disclosures* clarify the characteristics of supplier finance arrangements and introduce additional disclosure requirements to enhance transparency regarding their impact on an entity’s liabilities, cash flows and liquidity risk exposure.

The amendments did not have any impact on the recognition, measurement or classification of the Company’s liabilities in the financial statements.

(iv) International Tax Reform – Pillar Two Model Rules – Amendments to Ind AS 12

The amendments to Ind AS 12 *Income Taxes* were introduced in response to the OECD’s BEPS Pillar Two Model Rules and include:

- A mandatory temporary exception from the recognition and disclosure of deferred tax assets and liabilities related to Pillar Two income taxes; and
- Specific disclosure requirements to assist users in understanding an entity’s exposure to Pillar Two income taxes.

The mandatory temporary exception applies immediately and its application is required to be disclosed. The remaining disclosure requirements are applicable for annual reporting periods beginning on or after April 1, 2025.

The amendments have no impact on the Company’s financial statements as the Company is not within the scope of the Pillar Two Model Rules.

Revenue is measured net of returns and allowances, trade discounts and volume rebates (collectively ‘Discount and rebates’). There is a risk that these discount and rebates are incorrectly recorded as it also requires ascertain degree of estimation, resulting in understatement of the associated expenses and accrual. Accordingly, due to the significant risk associated with revenue recognition in accordance with terms of Ind AS 115 ‘Revenue from Contracts with Customers’, it was determined to be a key audit matter in our audit of the Ind AS Consolidated Financial Statements.	We assessed the Group’s process to identify the impact of adoption of Ind AS 115. Our audit approach included assessment of design and testing of operating effectiveness of internal controls related to revenue recognition, calculation of discounts and rebates and other substantive testing. We carried out: Evaluation of the design of internal controls relating to implementation of the revenue accounting standard. • Selection of samples of both continuing and new contracts for - testing of operating effectiveness of the internal control - identification of contract wise performance obligations and - Determination of transaction price. • Verification of individual sales transaction on sample basis and traced to sales invoices, sales orders and other related documents. Further, the samples were checked for revenue recognition as per the shipping terms.

	• Sample of sales transactions were selected pre-and post year end, agreeing the period of revenue recognition to third party support, such as transporter invoice and customer confirmation of receipt of goods. • Direct confirmations were obtained from customers to support existence assertion of trade receivables and assessed the relevant disclosures made in the Consolidated Financial Statements; to ensure revenue from contracts with customers are in accordance with the requirements of relevant accounting standards. • In the cases where direct confirmations are not available, additional procedures were applied in respect of receipts in the Subsequent period.

We have determined that there are no other key audit matters to communicate in our report.

Information Other than the Financial Statements and Auditor's Report Thereon

The Holding Company's Board of Directors is responsible for the other information. The other information comprises the information included in the Annual Report 2025-26, but does not include the Ind AS Consolidated financial statements and our auditor's report thereon.

**GENERAL INFORMATION AND MATERIAL ACCOUNTING POLICIES****A. Corporate Information**

The Company was originally incorporated as Versatile Investments Private Limited at Indore, Madhya Pradesh as a Private Limited Company on 9th May 1996. The name of the Company was changed to Vestal Pack Private Limited. Then again, the name of the Company was changed to Worth Peripherals Private Limited. Subsequently, the Company was converted into a Public Limited Company on 24th April, 2017. The Company listed on NSE-SME EMERGE on September 26, 2017 and Migrated on Main Board of NSE on August 4, 2020. The company listed on BSE Main Board on October 14, 2025. The Corporate Identification Number of the Company is L67120 MP1996PLC010808.

Worth Peripherals Limited ('the Company') is engaged in the business of manufacturing and sale of Corrugated Boxes. The Company is having manufacturing unit at Pithampur District Dhar (MP) and Registered and Corporate office is situated at 102, Sanskriti apartment, 44, Saket nagar, Indore (MP). The Company is having 50% holding in a Partnership Firm M/s Yash Packers engaged in manufacturing and sale of Corrugated Boxes at Valsad, Gujarat, Registered Office Situated at Mumbai. The company is also having 100% holding in Worth Wellness Private Limited engaged in manufacturing and sale of Corrugated Boxes. The Company and its subsidiaries are collectively referred to as "the group". The consolidated financial statements as at March 31, 2026 presents the financial position of the group.

The Consolidated financial statements were approved for issue by the Board of Directors on May 12, 2026.

B. Material accounting policies**i. Statement of compliance of Indian Accounting Standards (Ind AS)**

These financial statements are consolidated financial statements of the Group (also called consolidated financial statements). The Group has prepared and presented its consolidated financial statements for the year ended March 31, 2026 together with the comparative period information as at and for the year ended March 31, 2025 in accordance with Indian Accounting Standards (Ind AS) notified under the Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Rules, 2015 (as amended).

ii. Basis of Preparation

The consolidated financial statements have been prepared on accrual basis and under the historical cost convention except for certain financial instruments which are measured at fair value at the end of each reporting period, as explained in the accounting policies mentioned below.

All assets and liabilities have been classified as current or non-current as per the Group's normal operating cycle and other criteria set out in Schedule III to the Companies Act, 2013. The Group has ascertained its operating cycle as 12 months for the purpose of current and non-current classification of assets and liabilities.

Deferred tax assets and liabilities are classified as non-current assets and liabilities.

The operating cycle is the time between the acquisition of assets for processing and their realisation in cash and cash equivalents.

Functional and presentation currency

These consolidated financial statements are presented in Indian rupees, which is the Group's functional currency. All amounts have been rounded to the nearest Rupees in lacs unless otherwise indicated.

iii. Basis of Consolidation

a) The Consolidated financial statements relates to Worth Peripherals Limited (the group) and its subsidiaries is as under:

b) The consolidated financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Indian Accounting Standards ("Ind AS") notified under section 133 of Companies Act, 2013 read with Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Rule, 2015 and Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Amendment Rules 2016 and recognized accounting practices and policies on the following basis:

- The financial statements of the group and its subsidiary have been combined on a line to line basis by adding together like item of assets, liabilities, income, expenses, equity and cash flows.
- Intragroup balances, intragroup transaction and resulting unrealised profits/losses have been eliminated in full.
- Non-controlling interest in the net assets of subsidiary has been identified separately from the group's equity. Total Comprehensive Incomes attributed to non-controlling interests even if it results in the non-controlling interest having debit balances.
- Figures pertaining to the subsidiary have been reclassified to bring them in line with parent Group's financial statements.
- The excess of/shortfall in the cost to the group of its investment over the group's portion of equity as at the date of investment is recognised in consolidated financial statements as goodwill/capital reserve. The resultant goodwill, if any, is capitalized.



- vi. The Consolidated Financial Statements have been prepared using uniform accounting policies for like transactions and other events in similar circumstances.

iv. Use of Estimates, Judgments and Assumptions

The preparation of consolidated financial statements in accordance with Ind AS requires management to make judgments, estimates and assumptions that affect the application of accounting policies and the reported amount of assets, liabilities, income and expenses. Actual results may differ from these estimates. Estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognized in the period in which the estimates are revised and in any future periods affected.

All the assets and liabilities have been classified as current or non-current as per the group's normal operating cycle of twelve months and other criteria set out in Schedule III to the Companies Act, 2013.

Significant areas of estimation, uncertainty and critical judgements in applying accounting policies that have significant effect on amount recognized in the consolidated financial statements are:

- a. Allowance for bad and doubtful trade receivable.
- b. Recognition and measurement of provision and contingencies.
- c. Depreciation/Amortisation and useful lives of Property, plant and equipment / Intangible Assets.
- d. Recognition of deferred tax.
- e. Income Taxes.
- f. Measurement of defined benefit obligation.
- g. Impairment of Non-financial assets and financial assets.

v. Revenue

Recognition

The group recognised revenue i.e. account for a contract with a customer only when all of the following criteria are met:

- a. The parties to the contract have approved the contract (in writing, orally or in accordance with other customary business practices) and are committed to perform their respective obligations;
- b. The entity can identify each party's rights regarding the goods or services to be transferred;
- c. The entity can identify the payment terms for the goods or services to be transferred;
- d. The contract has commercial substance (i.e. the risk, timing or amount of the entity's future cash flows is expected to change as a result of the contract); and
- e. It is probable that the entity will collect the consideration to which it will be entitled in exchange for the goods or services that will be transferred to the customer. In evaluating whether collectability of an amount of consideration is probable, an entity shall consider only the customer's ability and intention to pay that amount of consideration when it is due. The amount of consideration to which the entity will be entitled may be less than the price stated in the contract if the consideration is variable because the entity may offer the customer a price concession.

Measurement

When (or as) a performance obligation is satisfied, group recognize as revenue the amount of the transaction price (which excludes estimates of variable consideration that are constrained) that is allocated to that performance obligation.

The transaction price is the amount that the entity expects to be entitled to in exchange for transferring promised goods or services to a customer, excluding amounts collected on behalf of third parties (for example, some taxes on sales). The consideration promised may include fixed amounts, variable amounts, or both.

a. Sale of goods

Revenue is recognised upon transfer of control of promised goods to customers in an amount that reflects the consideration which the Group expects to receive in exchange for those goods. Revenue from the sale of goods is recognised at the point in time when control is transferred to the customer which is usually on dispatch / delivery of goods, based on contracts with the customers. Revenue is measured based on the transaction price, which is the consideration, adjusted for volume discounts, price concessions, incentives, and returns, if any, as specified in the contracts with the customers. Revenue excludes taxes collected from customers on behalf of the government. Due to the short nature of credit period given to customers, there is no financing component in the contract.

b. Sale of Services

Revenue from services rendered is recognised as the services are rendered and is booked based on agreements/arrangements with the concerned parties.

c. Interest and Dividend

Interest income is recognized on accrual basis using the effective interest method. Dividend income is recognised in profit or loss on the date on which the group's right to receive payment is established.

vi. Inventories

Inventories are valued at cost or net realizable value whichever is lower. The cost of inventories of Raw Materials, Ancillary Raw Materials and Consumables Spares comprises all costs of purchase including duties and taxes (other than those subsequently recoverable from the taxing authorities), and other costs incurred in bringing the inventories to their present location and condition.



The cost of inventories of Finished Goods & Work-in-progress includes cost of direct materials and labour and a proportion of manufacturing overheads based on the normal operating capacity but excluding borrowing cost.

The cost formulas used are First-in- First Out ('FIFO') method in case of Raw Material, Ancillary Raw Material and Consumable Spares, Work-in-progress and Finished Goods.

vii. Property, Plant and Equipment

a. Recognition and measurement

The cost of an item of property, plant and equipment is recognized as an asset if, and only if:

- (a) It is probable that future economic benefits associated with the item will flow to the enterprise; and
- (b) The cost of the item can be measured reliably.

Items of property, plant and equipment are measured at cost less accumulated depreciation and any accumulated impairment losses (if any). Freehold land is measured at costs.

The cost of an item of property, plant and equipment comprises its purchase price, including import duties and non-refundable purchase taxes, after deducting trade discounts and rebates, acquisition or construction cost including borrowing costs, any costs directly attributable to bringing the asset to the location and condition necessary for it to be capable of operating in the manner intended by management, initial estimate of the costs of dismantling and removing the item and restoring the site on which it is located.

If significant parts of an item of property, plant and equipment have different useful lives, then they are accounted for as separate items (major components) of property, plant and equipment.

Any gain or loss on disposal of an item of property, plant and equipment is recognised in statement of profit or loss.

b. Subsequent expenditure

Subsequent expenditure is capitalised only if it is probable that the future economic benefits associated with the expenditure will flow to the group and cost of item can be reliably measured. The group recognizes in the carrying amount of an item of Property, Plant & Equipment, and the cost of replacing a part of an item, when that cost is incurred provided the recognition criteria as mentioned above are met. The carrying amount of those parts that are replaced is derecognized in accordance with the de-recognition provisions mentioned in the Indian Accounting Standards. The cost of day to day servicing of an item of Property, Plant & Equipment is recognized in the Statement of Profit or Loss as and when incurred.

c. Depreciation

Depreciation on property, plant and equipment is provided using Straight Line method on depreciable amount as per the useful life of the assets in the manner as specified in Schedule II to the Companies Act, 2013. The estimated useful life of assets and estimated residual value is taken as prescribed under Schedule II to the Companies Act, 2013.

The estimated useful lives, residual value and depreciation method are reviewed at the end of each balance sheet date, any changes therein are considered as changes in estimate and accordingly accounted for prospectively.

d. Capital Work in Progress

Assets under erection/installation are shown as "Capital work in progress", Expenditure during construction period are shown as "pre-operative expenses" to be capitalized on erection/installations of the assets.

viii. Employee benefits

a. Short term employee benefits

Short-term employee benefits are charged as the related service is provided. A liability is recognised for the amount expected to be paid if the group has a present legal or constructive obligation to pay this amount as a result of past service provided by the employee and the obligation can be estimated reliably.

b. Defined benefit plans

The liability for gratuity a defined benefit plan is determined annually by a qualified actuary using the projected unit credit method.

Remeasurement of the net defined benefit plans in respect of post-employment are charged to other comprehensive income. Net interest expense and other expenses related to defined benefit plans are recognised in statement of profit or loss.

c. Defined Contribution Plan

The group's payments to the defined contribution plans are recognized as expenses during the period in which the employees perform the services that payment covers. Defined contribution plan comprise of contribution to the employees' provident fund with government, Employees' State Insurance and Pension Scheme.

ix. Income Tax

Income tax expense comprises current and deferred tax. It is recognised in profit or loss except to the extent that it relates to other comprehensive income or a business combination, or items recognised directly in equity.

a. Current tax

Current tax comprises the expected tax payable or receivable on the taxable income or loss for the year and any adjustment to the tax payable or receivable in respect of previous years. It is measured using tax rates enacted or substantively enacted at the reporting date.

Current tax assets and liabilities are offset only if, the Group:

- a) Has a legally enforceable right to set off the recognised amounts; and



b) Intends either to settle on a net basis, or to realise the asset and settle the liability simultaneously.

b. Deferred tax

Deferred tax is recognised on temporary differences between the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities in the financial statements and the corresponding tax bases used in the computation of taxable profit.

Deferred tax liabilities are generally recognised for all taxable temporary differences. Deferred tax assets are generally recognised for all deductible temporary differences to the extent that it is probable that taxable profits will be available against which those deductible temporary differences can be utilised.

The carrying amount of deferred tax assets and liabilities are reviewed at the end of each reporting period.

Deferred tax liabilities and assets are measured at the tax rates that are expected to apply in the period in which the liability is settled or the asset realised, based on tax rates (and tax laws) that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the end of the reporting period.

Deferred tax assets and liabilities are offset only if:

- a) The entity has a legally enforceable right to set off current tax assets against current tax liabilities; and
- b) The deferred tax assets and the deferred tax liabilities relate to income taxes levied by the same taxation authority on the same taxable entity.

ix. Foreign currency transactions and translations

Transactions in foreign currencies are recorded at the exchange rates prevailing on the date of the transaction.

Monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are translated into the functional currency at the exchange rate at the reporting date. Differences arising on settlement of monetary items are recognised in statement of profit or loss except to the extent of exchange differences which are regarded as an adjustment to interest costs on foreign currency borrowings that are directly attributable to the acquisition or construction of qualifying assets which are capitalized as cost of assets.

Non-monetary items that are measured based on historical cost in a foreign currency are recorded using the exchange rates at the date of the transaction. Non-monetary assets and liabilities that are measured at fair value in a foreign currency are translated into the functional currency at the exchange rate when the fair value was determined. Exchange differences arising out of these transactions are generally recognised in statement of profit or loss.

x. Borrowing cost

Borrowing costs that are directly attributable to the acquisition, construction or production of qualifying asset are capitalised as part of the cost of that asset till the date it is ready for its intended use or sale. Qualifying asset are the assets that necessarily takes a substantial period of time to get ready for its intended use. All other borrowing costs are charged to the statement of profit or loss in the period in which they are incurred.

xi. Cash and Cash Equivalent

Cash and cash equivalent includes the cash and Cheques in hand, bank balances, demand deposits with bank and other short term, highly liquid investments with original maturity of three months or less that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and which are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value.

Bank overdrafts are shown within borrowings in current liabilities in the balance sheet and forms part of financing activities in the cash flow statement. Book overdraft are shown within other financial liabilities in the balance sheet and forms part of operating activities in the cash flow statement.

xii. Cash Flow Statement

Cash flows are reported using indirect method, whereby profit/ (loss) before tax is adjusted for the effect of transactions of non-cash nature and any deferrals or accruals of past or future cash receipts or payments and items of income or expenses associated with investing or financing cash flow. The cash flow from operating, investing and financing activities of the group is segregated based on the available information.

xiii. Provisions, Contingent Liabilities and Contingent Assets

Provisions are recognised when there is a present legal or constructive obligation as a result of past events and it is probable that an outflow of resources embodying economic benefits will be required to settle the obligation and the amount can be reliably estimated. Provisions are not recognized for future operating losses.

A contingent liability is a possible obligation that arises from past events whose existence will be confirmed by the occurrence or non-occurrence of one or more uncertain future events beyond the control of the Group or a present obligation that is not recognized because it is not probable that an outflow of resources will be required to settle the obligation, or the amount of the obligation cannot be measured with sufficient reliability. The Group does not recognize a contingent liability but discloses its existence in the financial statements

A contingent asset is a possible asset that arises from past events and whose existence will be confirmed only by the occurrence or non-occurrence of one or more uncertain future events not wholly within the control of the Group. Contingent assets are not recognized, but its existence is disclosed in the financial statements

xiv. Leases

A contract is, or contains, a lease if the contract conveys the right to control the use of an identified asset for a period of time in exchange for consideration.

As per the requirements of Ind AS 116 the group evaluates whether an arrangement qualifies to be a lease. In identifying a lease, the group uses significant judgement in assessing the lease term (including anticipated renewals) and the applicable discount rate.

The Group determines the lease term as the non-cancellable period of a lease, together with both periods covered by an option to extend the lease if the group is reasonably certain to exercise that option; and periods covered by an option to terminate the lease if the Group is reasonably certain not to exercise that option. The Group revises the lease term if there is a change in the non-cancellable period of a lease.



Group as a lessee

The Group accounts for each lease component within the contract as a lease separately from non-lease components of the contract and allocates the consideration in the contract to each lease component on the basis of the relative stand-alone price of the lease component and the aggregate stand-alone price of the non-lease components.

Right of Use Assets

The Group recognises right-of-use asset representing its right to use the underlying asset for the lease term at the lease commencement date. The cost of the right-of-use asset measured at inception shall comprise of the amount of the initial measurement of the lease liability adjusted for any lease payments made at or before the commencement date less any lease incentives received, plus any initial direct costs incurred and an estimate of costs to be incurred by the lessee in dismantling and removing the underlying asset or restoring the underlying asset or site on which it is located.

The right-of-use assets is subsequently measured at cost less any accumulated depreciation, accumulated impairment losses, if any and adjusted for any remeasurement of the lease liability. The right-of-use assets are depreciated using the straight-line method from the commencement date over the lease term. Right-of-use assets are tested for impairment whenever there is any indication that their carrying amounts may not be recoverable and impairment loss, if any, is recognised in the statement of profit or loss.

Lease Liability

The Group measures the lease liability at the present value of the lease payments that are not paid at the commencement date of the lease. The lease payments are discounted using the interest rate implicit in the lease, if that rate can be readily determined. If that rate cannot be readily determined, the Group uses incremental borrowing rate. For leases with reasonably similar characteristics, the Group, on a lease by lease basis, may adopt either the incremental borrowing rate specific to the lease or the incremental borrowing rate for the portfolio as a whole.

The lease liability is subsequently re-measured by increasing the carrying amount to reflect interest on the lease liability, reducing the carrying amount to reflect the lease payments made and re-measuring the carrying amount to reflect any reassessment or lease modifications. The group recognises the amount of the re-measurement of lease liability due to modification as an adjustment to the right-of-use asset and statement of profit or loss depending upon the nature of modification. Where the carrying amount of the right-of-use asset is reduced to zero and there is a further reduction in the measurement of the lease liability, the Group recognises any remaining amount of the re-measurement in statement of profit or loss.

The Group has elected not to apply the requirements of Ind AS 116 Leases to short-term leases of all assets that have a lease term of 12 months or less and leases for which the underlying asset is of low value. The lease payments associated with these leases are recognized as an expense on a straight-line basis over the lease term.

Operating leases

The Group has also used the practical expedient provided by the standard when applying Ind AS 116 to leases previously classified as operating leases under Ind AS 17 and therefore, has not reassessed whether a contract, is or contains a lease, at the date of initial application, relied on its assessment of whether leases are onerous, applying Ind AS 37 immediately before the date of initial application as an alternative to performing an impairment review, excluded initial direct costs from measuring the right-of-use asset at the date of initial application and used hindsight when determining the lease term if the contract contains options to extend or terminate the lease. The Group has used a single discount rate to a portfolio of leases with similar characteristics.

a. Financial assets

Classification

The Group classifies financial assets in the following measurement categories:

- a) Those measured at amortised cost and
- b) Those measured subsequently at fair value through other comprehensive income or fair value through profit or loss on the basis of its business model for managing the financial assets and the contractual cash flow characteristics of the financial asset.

Initial recognition and measurement

All financial assets are recognised initially at fair value plus transaction costs that are attributable to the acquisition of the financial asset, in the case of financial assets not recorded at fair value through profit or loss. Purchases or sales of financial assets that require delivery of assets within a time frame established by regulation or convention in the market place (regular way trades) are recognised on the trade date, i.e., the date that the group commits to purchase or sell the asset.

Measured at amortised cost

A financial asset is measured at the amortised cost if both the following conditions are met:

- a) The asset is held within a business model whose objective is to hold assets for collecting contractual cash flows, and
- b) Contractual terms of the asset give rise on specified dates to cash flows that are solely payments of principal and interest (SPPI) on the principal amount outstanding.

After initial measurement, such financial assets are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest rate (EIR) method. Amortised cost is calculated by taking into account any discount or premium on acquisition and fees or costs that are an integral part of the EIR. The EIR amortisation is included in finance income in the statement of profit or loss. The losses arising from impairment are recognised in the statement of profit or loss. This category generally applies to trade and other receivables.

Measured at fair value through other comprehensive income (FVOCI)

A financial asset is measured at FVOCI if both of the following criteria are met:



- a) The objective of the business model is achieved both by collecting contractual cash flows and selling the financial assets, and
- b) The asset's contractual cash flows represent SPPI.

Financial assets included within the FVOCI category are measured initially as well as at each reporting date at fair value. Fair value movements are recognized in the other comprehensive income (OCI). However, the group recognizes interest income, impairment losses & reversals and foreign exchange gain or loss in the profit or loss. On derecognition of the asset, cumulative gain or loss previously recognised in OCI is reclassified from the equity to profit or loss. Interest earned whilst holding FVOCI debt instrument is reported as interest income using the EIR method.

Financial Asset at fair value through profit or loss (FVTPL)

FVTPL is a residual category for financial asset. Any financial asset, which does not meet the criteria for categorization as at amortized cost or as FVOCI, is classified as at FVTPL.

In addition, the group may elect to classify a financial asset, which otherwise meets amortized cost or FVOCI criteria, as at FVTPL. However, such election is allowed only if doing so reduces or eliminates a measurement or recognition inconsistency (referred to as 'accounting mismatch').

Financial assets included within the FVTPL category are measured at fair value with all changes recognized in the profit or loss.

Derecognition

A financial asset (or, where applicable, a part of a financial asset or part of a group of similar financial assets) is primarily derecognised (i.e. removed from the group's balance sheet) when:

- a) The rights to receive cash flows from the asset have expired, or
- b) The group has transferred its rights to receive cash flows from the asset or has assumed an obligation to pay the received cash flows in full without material delay to a third party under a 'pass-through' arrangement; and either (a) the group has transferred substantially all the risks and rewards of the asset, or (b) the group has neither transferred nor retained substantially all the risks and rewards of the asset, but has transferred control of the asset.
- c) When the group has transferred its rights to receive cash flows from an asset or has entered into a pass-through arrangement, it evaluates if and to what extent it has retained the risks and rewards of ownership. When it has neither transferred nor retained substantially all of the risks and rewards of the asset, nor transferred control of the asset, the group continues to recognise the transferred asset to the extent of the group's continuing involvement. In that case, the group also recognises an associated liability. The transferred asset and the associated liability are measured on a basis that reflects the rights and obligations that the group has retained.
- d) Continuing involvement that takes the form of a guarantee over the transferred asset is measured at the lower of the original carrying amount of the asset and the maximum amount of consideration that the group could be required to repay.

Impairment of financial assets

In accordance with Ind-AS 109, the Group applies expected credit loss (ECL) model for measurement and recognition of impairment loss on the following financial assets and credit risk exposure:

- a) Financial assets that are debt instruments, and are measured at amortised cost e.g., loans, debt securities, deposits, and bank balance.
- b) Trade receivables.

The Group follows 'simplified approach' for recognition of impairment loss allowance on:

- a) Trade receivables which do not contain a significant financing component.
The application of simplified approach does not require the Group to track changes in credit risk. Rather, it recognises impairment loss allowance based on lifetime ECLs at each reporting date, right from its initial recognition.
- b) For recognition of impairment loss on other financial assets and risk exposure, the Group determines that whether there has been a significant increase in the credit risk since initial recognition. If credit risk has not increased significantly, 12-month ECL is used to provide for impairment loss. However, if credit risk has increased significantly, lifetime ECL is used. If, in a subsequent period, credit quality of the instrument improves such that there is no longer a significant increase in credit risk since initial recognition, then the entity reverts to recognising impairment loss allowance based on 12-month ECL.

b. Financial liabilities

Classification

The Group classifies all financial liabilities as subsequently measured at amortised cost, except for financial liabilities at fair value through profit or loss. Such liabilities, including derivatives that are liabilities, shall be subsequently measured at fair value.

Initial recognition and measurement

Financial liabilities are classified, at initial recognition, as financial liabilities at fair value through profit or loss or amortised costs.

All financial liabilities are recognised initially at fair value and, in the case of loans and borrowings and payables, net of directly attributable transaction costs.

The group's financial liabilities include trade and other payables, loans and borrowings, financial guarantee contracts and derivative financial instruments.

Financial Liabilities at fair value through profit or loss (FVTPL)

Financial liabilities at fair value through profit or loss include financial liabilities held for trading and financial liabilities designated upon initial recognition as at fair value through profit or loss. Financial liabilities are classified as held for trading if they are incurred for the

purpose of repurchasing in the near term. This category also includes derivative financial instruments entered into by the group that are not designated as hedging instruments in hedge relationships as defined by Ind-AS 109. Separated embedded derivatives are also classified as held for trading unless they are designated as effective hedging instruments.

Gains or losses on liabilities held for trading are recognised in the profit or loss.

Financial liabilities designated upon initial recognition at fair value through profit or loss are designated at the initial date of recognition, and only if the criteria in Ind-AS 109 are satisfied. For liabilities designated as FVTPL, fair value gains/ losses attributable to changes in own credit risks are recognized in OCI. These gains/loss are not subsequently transferred to P&L. However, the group may transfer the cumulative gain or loss within equity. All other changes in fair value of such liability are recognised in the statement of profit or loss.

Loans and borrowings

After initial recognition, interest-bearing loans and borrowings are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the EIR method. Gains and losses are recognised in profit or loss when the liabilities are derecognised as well as through the EIR amortisation process.

Amortised cost is calculated by taking into account any discount or premium on acquisition and fees or costs that are an integral part of the EIR. The EIR amortisation is included as finance costs in the statement of profit or loss.

This category generally applies to interest-bearing loans and borrowings.

Derecognition

A financial liability is derecognised when the obligation under the liability is discharged or cancelled or expires. When an existing financial liability is replaced by another from the same lender on substantially different terms, or the terms of an existing liability are substantially modified, such an exchange or modification is treated as the derecognition of the original liability and the recognition of a new liability. The difference in the respective carrying amounts is recognised in the statement of profit or loss.

Derivative financial instruments

The group uses derivative financial instruments, such as forward currency contracts, interest rate swaps and forward commodity contracts, to hedge its foreign currency risks, interest rate risks and commodity price risks, respectively. Such derivative financial instruments are initially recognised at fair value on the date on which a derivative contract is entered into and are subsequently re-measured at fair value. Derivatives are carried as financial assets when the fair value is positive and as financial liabilities when the fair value is negative.

Offsetting

Financial assets and financial liabilities are offset and the net amount is presented in the balance sheet when, and when the group has a legally enforceable right to set off the amount and it intends either to settle then a net basis or to realize the asset and settle the liability simultaneously.

Measurement of fair values

The Group's accounting policies and disclosures require the measurement of fair values, for financial instruments.

The Group has an established control framework with respect to the measurement of fair values. The management regularly reviews significant unobservable inputs and valuation adjustments. If third party information, such as broker quotes or pricing services, is used to measure fair values, then the management assesses the evidence obtained from the third parties to support the conclusion that such valuations meet the requirements of Ind AS, including the level in the fair value hierarchy in which such valuations should be classified.

When measuring the fair value of an asset or a liability, the Group uses observable market data as far as possible. Fair values are categorised into different levels in a fair value hierarchy based on the inputs used in the valuation techniques as follows.

Level 1: Quoted prices (unadjusted) in active markets for identical assets or liabilities.

Level 2: Inputs other than quoted prices included in Level 1 that are observable for the asset or liability, either directly (i.e. as prices) or indirectly (i.e. derived from prices).

Level 3: Inputs for the asset or liability that are not based on observable market data (unobservable inputs).

If the inputs used to measure the fair value of an asset or a liability fall into different levels of the fair value hierarchy, then the fair value measurement is categorised in its entirety in the same level of the fair value hierarchy as the lowest level input that is significant to the entire measurement.

The Group recognises transfers between levels of the fair value hierarchy at the end of the reporting period during which the change has occurred.

xv. Government Grants

Government Grants and subsidies from Government are recognised when there is reasonable certainty that the grant/subsidy will be received and all attaching conditions will be complied with.

When the government grant relates to income, it is recognised in the Statement of Profit or Loss on a systematic basis over the period in which the Company recognizes as expenses the related costs for which the grant is intended to compensate.

For grants related to asset the grant is deducted in calculating the carrying amount of the asset. The grant is recognised in profit or loss over the life of a depreciable asset as a reduced depreciation expense

xvi. Earnings per share

Basic earnings per share is calculated by dividing the net profit or loss attributable to equity holders of company (after deducting preference dividends and attributable taxes) the weighted average number of equity shares outstanding during the period.



Partly paid equity shares are treated as a fraction of an equity share to the extent that they are entitled to participate in dividends relative to a fully paid equity share during the reporting period. The weighted average number of equity shares outstanding during the period is adjusted for events such as bonus issue, bonus element in right issue, share split, and reverse share split (consolidation of shares) that have changed the number of equity shares outstanding, without a corresponding change in resources.

For the purpose of calculating diluted earnings per share, the net profit or loss for the period attributable to equity shareholders of the company and the weighted average number of shares outstanding during the period are adjusted for the effects of all dilutive potential equity shares.

xvii. New and Amended Standards

The Ministry of Corporate Affairs (“MCA”) has notified new standards and amendments to existing standards under the Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Rules, as amended from time to time. During the year ended March 31, 2026, MCA notified the Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Amendment Rules, 2025, effective from April 1, 2025. The Company has applied the amendments that became effective during the year. The Company has not early adopted any standard, interpretation or amendment that has been issued but is not yet effective.

(i) Amendments to Ind AS 21 – Lack of Exchangeability

The amendments to Ind AS 21 *The Effects of Changes in Foreign Exchange Rates* specify how an entity should assess whether a currency is exchangeable and determine the spot exchange rate when exchangeability between two currencies is lacking. The amendments also introduce additional disclosure requirements to enable users of financial statements to understand the impact of a lack of exchangeability on the entity’s financial performance, financial position and cash flows.

The amendments are effective for annual reporting periods beginning on or after April 1, 2025. Comparative information is not required to be restated on initial application.

The amendments do not have any impact on the Company’s financial statements.

(ii) Amendments to Ind AS 1 – Classification of Liabilities as Current or Non-current and Non-current Liabilities with Covenants

The amendments clarify the requirements for classifying liabilities as current or non-current. The amendments clarify:

- What is meant by a right to defer settlement;
- That the right to defer settlement must exist at the end of the reporting period;
- That classification is unaffected by management’s expectations regarding the exercise of the right to defer settlement; and
- That only if an embedded derivative in a convertible liability is itself an equity instrument would the terms of a liability not affect its classification.

The amendments also require additional disclosures where an entity’s right to defer settlement of a liability for at least twelve months after the reporting period is subject to compliance with future covenants.

Where a breach of a material covenant occurs on or before the reporting date, resulting in the liability becoming payable on demand, and the lender subsequently agrees, after the reporting period but before approval of the financial statements, not to demand repayment for at least twelve months, such event is not treated as an adjusting event. Accordingly, the liability is classified as current.

The amendments are effective for annual reporting periods beginning on or after April 1, 2025 and are applied retrospectively in accordance with Ind AS 8.

The amendments do not have a material impact on the Company’s financial statements.

(iii) Amendments to Ind AS 7 and Ind AS 107 – Supplier Finance Arrangements

The amendments to Ind AS 7 *Statement of Cash Flows* and Ind AS 107 *Financial Instruments: Disclosures* clarify the characteristics of supplier finance arrangements and introduce additional disclosure requirements to enhance transparency regarding their impact on an entity’s liabilities, cash flows and liquidity risk exposure.

The amendments did not have any impact on the recognition, measurement or classification of the Company’s liabilities in the financial statements.

(iv) International Tax Reform – Pillar Two Model Rules – Amendments to Ind AS 12

The amendments to Ind AS 12 *Income Taxes* were introduced in response to the OECD’s BEPS Pillar Two Model Rules and include:

- A mandatory temporary exception from the recognition and disclosure of deferred tax assets and liabilities related to Pillar Two income taxes; and
- Specific disclosure requirements to assist users in understanding an entity’s exposure to Pillar Two income taxes.

The mandatory temporary exception applies immediately and its application is required to be disclosed. The remaining disclosure requirements are applicable for annual reporting periods beginning on or after April 1, 2025.

The amendments have no impact on the Company’s financial statements as the Company is not within the scope of the Pillar Two Model Rules.

A corporate hedging policy is a formal governance framework used by company to manage and mitigate financial risks, such as foreign exchange, interest rate, and commodity price exposures. Its primary goal is to minimize uncertainty and protect cash flows rather than generate speculative profits. During the year ended 31st March 2026 and 31st March 2025, the Company had not entered into any derivative contracts.

Note - 37 Capital Management

The Company's policy is to maintain a strong capital base so as to maintain investor, creditor and market confidence and to sustain future development of the business. Management monitors the return on capital as well as the level of dividends to ordinary shareholders.

The company monitors capital using a Net gearing ratio. For this purpose, adjusted net debt is defined as total liabilities, comprising interest-bearing loans and borrowings and obligations under finance leases, less cash and cash equivalents. Equity comprise of Equity share capital and other equity.

The Company's policy is to keep the ratio at optimum level.
