1. Pursuant to the General Circular No. 03/2025 dated September 22, 2025, 09/2024 dated September 19, 2024, issued by the Ministry of Corporate Affairs (MCA) and circular issued by SEBI vide circular no. SEBI/HO/CFD/CFDPoD-2/P/ CIR/ 2024/ 133 dated October 3, 2024 ("SEBI Circular") and other applicable circulars and notifications issued (including any statutory modifications or re-enactment thereof for the time being in force and as amended from time to time, companies are allowed to hold AGM through Video Conferencing (VC) or other audio visual means (OAVM), without the physical presence of members at a common venue. In compliance with the said Circulars, AGM shall be conducted through VC / OAVM.

In view of the aforementioned, this AGM of the Members is being held through VC/OAVM. Members are requested to join and participate in the AGM through VC/OAVM only. The detailed procedure for participating in the meeting through VC/OAVM is provided in the notice.

2. Corporate members intending to send their authorized representative to attend the meeting pursuant to the section 113 of the Companies Act, 2013 are requested to send to the company a certified true copy of the relevant board resolution together with their respective specimen signatures authorizing their representative(s) to attend and vote on their behalf at the meeting.
3. The Members can join the AGM in the VC/OAVM mode 15 minutes before and after the scheduled time of the commencement of the Meeting by following the procedure mentioned in the Notice. The facility of participation at the AGM through VC/ OAVM will be made available for 1000 members on first come first served basis. This will not include large Shareholders (Shareholders holding 2% or more shareholding), Promoters, Institutional Investors, Directors, Key Managerial Personnel, the chairman of the Audit Committee, Nomination and Remuneration Committee and Stakeholders Relationship Committee, Auditors etc. who are allowed to attend the AGM without restriction on account of first come first served basis.
4. The attendance of the Members attending the AGM through VC/OAVM will be counted for the purpose of reckoning the quorum under Section 103 of the Companies Act, 2013.
5. Since the AGM is being conducted through VC/OAVM, there is no provision for appointment of proxies. Accordingly, the facility for appointment of proxies by the members will not be available.
6. Pursuant to the provisions of Section 108 of the Companies Act, 2013 read with Rule 20 of the Companies (Management and Administration) Rules, 2014 (as amended) and Regulation 44 of SEBI (Listing Obligations & Disclosure Requirements) Regulations 2015 (as amended), and the Circulars issued by the Ministry of Corporate Affairs dated April 08, 2020, April 13, 2020, May 05, 2020 and January 13, 2021 the Company is providing facility of remote e-voting to its Members in respect of the business to be transacted at the AGM. For this purpose, the Company has entered into an agreement with National Securities Depository Limited (NSDL) for facilitating voting through electronic means, as the authorized agency. The facility of casting votes by a member using remote e-voting system as well as venue voting on the date of the AGM will be provided by NSDL.
7. In line with the Ministry of Corporate Affairs (MCA) Circular No. 17/2020 dated April 13, 2020, the Notice calling the AGM has been uploaded on the website of the Company at www.rmhil.com. The Notice can also be accessed from the websites of the Stock Exchanges i.e. BSE Limited at www.bseindia.com and the AGM Notice is also available on the website of NSDL (agency for providing the Remote e-Voting facility) i.e. www.evoting.nsdl.com.

8. AGM has been convened through VC/OAVM in compliance with applicable provisions of the Companies Act, 2013 read with MCA Circulars No. 14/2020 dated April 08, 2020 and MCA Circular No. 17/2020 dated April 13, 2020, MCA Circular No. 20/2020 dated May 05, 2020 and MCA Circular No. 2/2021 dated January 13, 2021, 10/2021 dated June 23, 2021, 19/2021 dated December 8, 2021, Circular No. 02/2022 dated May 05, 2022, Circular No. 10/2022 dated December 28, 2022 and Circular No. 09/2023 dated September 25, 2023.
9. A Statement pursuant to Section 102(1) of the Companies Act, 2013 ("the Act"), relating to the Special Business to be transacted at the Annual General Meeting ("Meeting") is annexed hereto.
10. The Register of Members and Share Transfer Books of the Company will remain closed from September 22, 2026 to September 28, 2026 (both days inclusive).
11. The requisite Registers as required under the Act will be available electronically for inspection by the members during the AGM. All documents referred to in the Notice will also be available for electronic inspection without any fee by the members from the date of circulation of this Notice up to the date of AGM. Members seeking to inspect such document can send an email to royalemanorhotels@rediffmail.com.
12. Pursuant to Section 101 and Section 136 of the Companies Act, 2013 read with relevant Rules made there under, Companies can serve Annual Reports and other communications through electronic mode to those Members who have registered their e-mail address either with the Company or with the Depository. Members holding shares in demat form are requested to register their e-mail address with their Depository Participant(s) only. Members of the Company, who have registered their e-mail address, are entitled to receive such communication in physical form upon request.
13. Securities and Exchange Board of India ("SEBI") has mandated that securities of listed companies can be transferred only in dematerialized form w.e.f. April 1, 2019. Accordingly, the Company/MCS has stopped accepting any fresh lodgement of transfer of shares in physical form. Members holding shares in physical form are advised to avail of the facility of dematerialization.
14. In compliance with the aforesaid MCA Circulars, Notice of the AGM along with the Annual Report and Audited Financial Statements for the financial year 2025-26 is being sent only through electronic mode to those Members whose email addresses are registered with the Company or the Depository Participant(s).
15. Members holding shares in demat form are hereby informed that bank particulars registered with their respective Depository Participant(s), with whom they maintain their demat accounts; will be used by the Company for payment of dividend. The Company or its Registrar cannot act on any request received directly from the Members holding shares in demat form for any change in bank particulars. Members holding shares in demat form are requested to intimate any change in their address and / or bank mandate to their Depository Participants immediately.
16. Members holding shares in physical form are requested to intimate any change of address and / or bank mandate to MCS Share Transfer Agent Limited – Registrar and Share Transfer agent of the Company immediately.
17. Members are requested to note that the company does not have any amount which required to be transferred to the Investor Education and Protection Fund (IEPF).
18. The Securities and Exchange Board of India has mandated submission of Permanent Account Number (PAN) by every participant in securities market. Members holding shares in demat form are, therefore, requested to submit PAN details to the Depository Participants with whom they have demat accounts. Members holding shares in physical form can submit their PAN details to MCS Share Transfer Agent Limited, Ahmedabad, Registrar and Share Transfer agent of the Company.

19. Members desiring any information relating to the accounts are requested to write to the Company well in advance so as to enable the management to keep the information ready.
20. The Board of Directors of the Company has appointed Ms. Rupal Patel, Practicing Company Secretary as Scrutinizer to scrutinize the voting and remote e-voting process in a fair & transparent manner and they have communicated their willingness to the said appointment and **has confirmed her willingness to act as Scrutinizer for the said purpose.**
21. The voting period begins on Friday, September 25, 2026 from 9:00 a.m. and ends on Sunday, September 27, 2026 to 05:00 pm. During this period, the shareholders of the Company, holding shares either in physical form or in dematerialized form, as on the cut-off date September 21, 2026 may cast their vote electronically.
22. Shareholders who have already voted prior to the meeting date would not be entitled to vote during the meeting.
23. Voting rights shall be reckoned on the paid-up value of shares registered in the name of the member / beneficial owner (in case of electronic shareholding) as on the cut-off date i.e. September 21, 2026.
24. The Scrutinizer, after scrutinizing the votes cast at the meeting and through remote e-voting, will, not later than forty-eight hours from the conclusion of the Meeting, make a consolidated scrutinizer's report and submit the same to the Chairman or a person authorized by him in writing. The results declared along with the scrutinizer's report shall be placed on the website of the Company www.rmhil.com. The results shall simultaneously be communicated to the Stock Exchanges.

THE INSTRUCTIONS FOR MEMBERS FOR REMOTE E-VOTING AND JOINING GENERAL MEETING ARE ASUNDER: -

The remote e-voting period begins on Friday, September 25, 2026 at 9:00 A.M. and ends on Sunday, September 27, 2026 at 05:00 P.M. The remote e-voting module shall be disabled by NSDL for voting thereafter. The Members, whose names appear in the Register of Members / Beneficial Owners as on the record date (cut-off date) i.e. September 21, 2026, may cast their vote electronically. The voting right of shareholders shall be in proportion to their share in the paid-up equity share capital of the Company as on the cut-off date.

How do I vote electronically using NSDL e-Voting system?

The way to vote electronically on NSDL e-Voting system consists of "Two Steps" which are mentioned below:

Step 1: Access to NSDL e-Voting system

A) Login method for e-Voting and joining virtual meeting for Individual shareholders holding securities in demat mode

In terms of SEBI circular dated December 9, 2020 on e-Voting facility provided by Listed Companies, Individual shareholders holding securities in demat mode are allowed to vote through their demat account maintained with Depositories and Depository Participants. Shareholders are advised to update their mobile number and email Id in their demat accounts in order to access e-Voting facility.

How to cast your vote electronically and join General Meeting on NSDL e-Voting system?

After successful login at Step 1, you will be able to see all the companies "EVEN" in which you are holding shares and whose voting cycle and General Meeting is in active status.

Select "EVEN" of company for which you wish to cast your vote during the remote e-Voting period and casting your vote during the General Meeting. For joining virtual meeting, you need to click on "VC/OAVM" link placed under "Join General Meeting".

Now you are ready for e-Voting as the Voting page opens.

Cast your vote by selecting appropriate options i.e. assent or dissent, verify/modify the number of shares for which you wish to cast your vote and click on "Submit" and also "Confirm" when prompted.

Upon confirmation, the message "Vote cast successfully" will be displayed.

You can also take the printout of the votes cast by you by clicking on the print option on the confirmation page.

Once you confirm your vote on the resolution, you will not be allowed to modify your vote.

General Guidelines for shareholders

Institutional shareholders (i.e. other than individuals, HUF, NRI etc.) are required to send scanned copy (PDF/JPG Format) of the relevant Board Resolution/ Authority letter etc. with attested specimen signature of the duly authorized signatory(ies) who are authorized to vote, to the Scrutinizer by e-mail to roopalcs2001p@gmail.com with a copy marked to evoting@nsdl.co.in.

It is strongly recommended not to share your password with any other person and take utmost care to keep your password confidential. Login to the e-voting website will be disabled upon five unsuccessful attempts to key in the correct password. In such an event, you will need to go through the "Forgot User Details/Password?" or "Physical User Reset Password?" option available on www.evoting.nsdl.com to reset the password.

In terms of SEBI circular dated December 9, 2020 on e-Voting facility provided by Listed Companies, Individual shareholders holding securities in demat mode are allowed to vote through their demat account maintained with Depositories and Depository Participants. Shareholders are required to update their mobile number and email ID correctly in their demat account in order to access e-Voting facility.

THE INSTRUCTIONS FOR MEMBERS FOR E-VOTING ON THE DAY OF THE AGM ARE AS UNDER:-

1. The procedure for e-Voting on the day of the AGM is same as the instructions mentioned above for remote e-voting.
2. Only those Members/ shareholders, who will be present in the AGM through VC/OAVM facility and have not casted their vote on the Resolutions through remote e-Voting and are otherwise not barred from doing so, shall be eligible to vote through e-Voting system in the AGM.
3. Members who have voted through Remote e-Voting will be eligible to attend the AGM. However, they will not be eligible to vote at the AGM.

MANAGEMENT DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS REPORT

1. OVERALL REVIEW

India remains the fastest-growing major economy in the world. As per the First Advance Estimates of National Income for FY 2025-26, India's Real GDP growth is placed at 7.4 per cent, showing strong growth momentum sustained from a 6.4 per cent growth in FY 2024-25. Growth has been largely driven by robust domestic demand, private consumption, and fixed investment. On the supply side, the tertiary (services) and secondary (manufacturing/construction) sectors expanded at a faster pace. For instance, during the first quarter of the fiscal year, the tertiary sector grew by 8.0 per cent, with professional, financial, and real estate services showing significant strength, while the secondary sector recorded steady expansion. Manufacturing activity has notably strengthened, and the agriculture sector has provided underlying stability despite structural constraints.

Apart from domestic GDP estimates, other indicators tracking the global performance also point towards complex challenges mixed with growth resilience. Global FDI flows and trade policy risks continue to present challenges due to persistent geopolitical tensions, high borrowing costs, and economic fragmentation. Furthermore, global supply chain risks and tariff uncertainties continue to affect external demand. The Economic Survey 2025-26 highlights that despite these headwinds, India's external sector has played a long game. Services exports reached an all-time high, while India's foreign exchange reserves increased to USD 701.4 billion as of mid-January 2026, providing a solid cushion of roughly 11 months of import cover. On the inflation front, a significant disinflationary phase was observed, with headline retail inflation averaging 2.2 per cent during the first half of FY 2025-26.

The global growth trajectory remains cautious. The IMF and other multilateral organizations note risks from geoeconomic fragmentation, expansionary fiscal burdens, and high-frequency trade shifts. The World Bank and global indices reflect a slow but steady decadal growth trend for the global economy averaging around 3.3 per cent. In light of these domestic strengths and external headwinds, the Reserve Bank of India (RBI) has projected India's real GDP growth forecast for the upcoming period at 6.75 per cent to 6.8 per cent, up from its conservative earlier baseline.

According to the latest UN Tourism (formerly UNWTO) World Tourism Barometer, international tourism has fully recovered from the pandemic crisis, with international tourist arrivals in 2024 reaching an estimated 1.4 billion, representing a virtual 99% recovery of pre-pandemic levels. This momentum continued robustly into 2025, with international tourist arrivals growing by 5% in the first half of 2025 compared to the same period in 2024 (standing 3% above 2019 levels). The economic contribution of the sector has surged, with total export revenues from international tourism hitting a record USD 2.0 trillion, which is roughly 15% above pre-pandemic benchmarks. Despite global economic headwinds and heightened travel tracking costs, demand remains highly resilient, particularly driven by a strong rebound across Asia and the Pacific markets.

2. SECTOR OUTLOOK IN INDIA

India's travel industry is on a strong upswing, driven by structured behavioural shifts as post-pandemic "revenge travel" transitions into sustainable, regularized travel habits. According to latest market evaluations and insights from CRISIL Ratings reports, India's tour and travel operators are projected to maintain double-digit revenue growth. The momentum in international leisure and outbound travel continues to register record highs, further supported by decentralized growth, where non-metro cities now drive approximately 63% of outbound travel demand. This sustained expansion is fuelled by a combination of factors, including higher disposable incomes, visa-free access or simplified entry processes introduced across multiple countries, and strategic expansions by Indian low-cost carriers into newer destinations across Southeast and Central Asia. Concurrently, domestic tourism has seen an unprecedented surge—reaching record benchmarks of nearly

2.9 billion domestic tourist visits—buoyed by the rise of “micro-holidays” (quick weekend getaways) and highly upgraded infrastructure across critical spiritual, heritage, and regional destinations.

The global footprint of India’s tourism ecosystem has also strengthened significantly. In the biennial Travel and Tourism Development Index (TTDI) published by the World Economic Forum (WEF), India secured the 39th position globally. These ranking highlights India’s status as the top-performing tourism economy in South Asia, driven by excellent standings in core resource categories, including ranking 6th globally in Natural Resources and 9th in Cultural Resources. Substantial multi-year advancements in price competitiveness, air transport infrastructure, and targeted government capital investments—including the operationalization of over 517 new air routes and extensive upgrades to regional airports—have structurally transformed India’s competitive positioning. Additionally, long-term indicators from the World Travel & Tourism Council (WTTC) highlight that India’s travel sector grew by 7.3%, outperforming the global average and setting a trajectory to contribute significantly to the national GDP while supporting roughly 48 million jobs.

- Strategic location of the hotel in the immediate vicinity of Airport with well-developed infrastructure gives it an added advantage over other competitors.

- The GST (Goods and Services Tax) Council announced a cut in the tax rate on hotel room tariffs, a move aimed at giving a boost to the hospitality sector. The GST rate on hotel rooms with tariffs of up to Rs 7,500 per night has been cut to 12% from the existing 18%.
- GST on restaurants eateries has been brought down to 5% irrespective of whether they are air-conditioned or not. If a restaurant is located within the premises of hotels, inns, guest houses, club or any commercial place meant for residential or lodging purposes with a daily tariff of Rs.7500 per day per unit or above, the tax will be 18%.
- Improvement of Road connectivity and Way Side amenities to the important Tourist Destinations with the help of Ministry of Road. Transport & Highways (MoRTH). Ministry of Tourism (MoT) has been pursuing the matter regarding improvement of road connectivity to important tourist destinations with the Ministry of Road Transport & Highways (MoRTH) and had submitted a list of 50 Tourism Destinations to MoRTH for taking up in the first phase. MoRTH has been requested to consider setting up of Wayside Amenities, prominent sign-ages and beautification of the area, at a distance of 15-20 km where good road connectivity already exists. Out of these 50 destinations, only 23 fall under the purview of MoRTH / NHAI, where working in progress. The rest comes under the purview of PWD, BRO and the respective State Govt. The Ministry has accordingly addressed letters to the State Governments, PWD and BRO for improvement of road connectivity and provision of way side facilities. Ministry of Tourism is further in the process of finalizing a further list of 50 Tourist Destinations to be sent to MoRTH to take up in the second phase. For this, Ministry is coordinating with States/UTs for their inputs.

3. SWOT ANALYSIS

STRENGTHS

- A major strength for our hotel is its preferred owned brands with its vast portfolio commanding leadership in their market segments. Quality service from the said brand strengthens the market position of hotels, giving it a competitive edge as it seeks to take advantage of increasing business. Individual services continue to be strengthened in the areas of exclusive business meetings, food, and spa to offer a wide spectrum of hospitality services in accommodations and beyond.
- The Ministry of Tourism continues to systematically expand its core infrastructure programs. Under the revamped Swadesh Darshan 2.0 (SD 2.0) and Challenge Based Destination Development (CBDD) sub-schemes, the focus has successfully shifted from broad circuits to holistic, destination-centric tourist experiences. Concurrently, the PRASHAD Scheme (Pilgrimage Rejuvenation and Spiritual, Heritage Augmentation Drive) has scaled up significantly, with 54 major projects sanctioned across 28 States and UTs to enhance livelihoods, security, accessibility, and pilgrim facility complexes.

- The promoters have an established track record, having created a niche for themselves in the hospitality industry with a stellar brand image spanning over 24 years.
- A deeply loyal clientele base of corporate accounts built up over the years provides a steady, high-margin, and ready customer cushion.
- The strategic location of the hotel in the immediate vicinity of the airport with well-developed infrastructure gives it an added advantage over downstream city competitors.
- Your Company continuously renovates its properties to meet the increasing premium competition in the market and maintains robust property insurance covers against natural and man-made disasters.
- The Ummed Ahmedabad, Ahmedabad’s very first Five-star hotel, continues to successfully proceed on its journey with peak market pride.
- The hotel property of the company is situated just 1 km from the airport. Its close proximity to government offices and developing industrial areas makes this location an apt choice for corporate travelers. The property is surrounded by dense greenery and perfectly manicured lawns that complement the city’s biggest open-air swimming pool. Guests can enjoy the tranquility of our premium rooms and suites, or explore local and global cuisines at the 24-hour coffee shop and fine dining restaurant. The hotel remains widely known for patronizing global dignitaries, business leaders, and celebrities.
- The GST (Goods and Services Tax) Council’s streamlined tax framework provides clear operational advantages. The GST rate on hotel rooms with tariffs up to ₹7,500 per night stands at a competitive 12%, keeping mid-to-high tiers accessible.
- GST on regular standalone restaurants and eateries is maintained at a flat 5%. For luxury dining setups located within the premises of hotels with daily room tariffs of ₹7,500 or above, the structural rate is positioned at 18% to capture premium corporate spending.
- The Ministry of Road Transport & Highways (MoRTH) and the Ministry of Tourism (MoT) have successfully elevated infrastructure connectivity. Under MoRTH’s aggressive development pipeline, the government is establishing thousands of state-of-the-art Wayside Amenities (WSAs) every 30 to 50 km along National Highways and Expressways. Moving into a franchise model on private land via the National Highways Logistics Management Limited (NHLML), this robust network integrates electric vehicle charging stations, food courts, and medical clinics, systematically scaling up regional tourist transit and boosting highway-driven hospitality footprints.

Weaknesses

- The hospitality industry remains highly vulnerable to systemic event risks, such as prolonged public health crises, sudden localized administrative lockdowns, regional security disruptions, and sudden changes in government stability. Operating a premium property within a high-traffic zone exposes the company to these unavoidable external shocks. Additionally, macro-financial challenges—including sharp Indian Rupee (INR) devaluations and global foreign currency volatility—can instantly distort cross-border operational procurement budgets and impact premium international booking values.
- Hotel operations are inherently hyper-sensitive to broader economic fluctuations and shifting gross corporate budgets. While domestic business segments continue to serve as a reliable anchor, any threat

of global economic slowdown or persistent inflationary pressures immediately compresses absolute corporate spend, cooling luxury room demand and directly impacting optimal Average Daily Rates (ADRs).

- Because tourism and high-end commercial travel are globally connected phenomena, escalating geopolitical conflicts, air transport corridor fragmentations, and volatile international financial markets present persistent headwinds. The forward visibility of top-tier luxury property bookings remains highly dependent on a stable global security environment. Any persistent cross-border tension or geoeconomic fracturing can abruptly restrict international business traveler flows into major economic zones.
- A structural challenge facing premium properties is the simultaneous pressure of rising operational input costs and intensifying talent crises. Escalating wage bills, driven by structural adjustments in human capital retention, directly compete against bottom-line profitability. When combined with volatile commercial utility tariffs, rising food and beverage (F&B) supply costs, and the ongoing expense of necessary technological upgrades, managing premium profit margins requires aggressive operational oversight.

Opportunities

- Rising Premium Corporate Footprint: Ahmedabad's positioning as a premier commercial hub continues to strengthen, driven by the expansion of the Gujarat International Finance Tec-City (GIFT City), localized commercial corridors, and stable policy frameworks. The city's growing global profile allows the hotel to aggressively capture premium corporate, expatriate, and business travel segments.
- UNESCO World Heritage Stature: As India's first UNESCO World Heritage City, Ahmedabad continues to attract international heritage tourists, cultural researchers, and high-spending leisure travelers, providing a reliable stream of inbound bookings.
- In an environment of cautious global capital deployment, international investors prioritize markets offering structural stability and predictable growth. Gujarat remains a premier destination for foreign direct investment (FDI), and the ongoing momentum from the Vibrant Gujarat Global Summit serves as a direct driver for high-value corporate travel, diplomatic delegations, and multinational conventions.
- The sustained expansion of mega industrial clusters—such as the Sanand Automobile Hub and nearby electronics manufacturing zones—continues to attract high-yield international technical experts, corporate auditors, and global supply chain executives who require premium lodging.
- The accelerating growth of the Gujarati film, OTT, and entertainment industry has increased the movement of high-profile production teams, artists, and media executives. The hotel's premium privacy features make it a highly preferred choice for this demographic.
- Spanning four acres of meticulously landscaped gardens, The Umed Ahmedabad offers a distinct competitive advantage over dense, high-rise urban hotels. The low-rise estate features 91 elegantly appointed rooms and suites styled with custom-crafted teak furniture, classic Indian art, and views of the manicured lawns or the pool. This layout positions the property perfectly to capture high-margin boutique weddings, premium wellness retreats, and exclusive corporate stays.

Threats

- The rapid growth of premium serviced apartments, specialized corporate guest houses, and structured co-living spaces presents an ongoing challenge. These flexible models appeal directly to cost-conscious corporate travelers and long-stay consultants, creating downward pressure on traditional luxury room volumes.
- Evolving global hospitality standards demand rapid integration of advanced property technologies (such as contactless guest journeys and automated energy management) alongside strict Environmental, Social, and Governance (ESG) compliance. Given high capital costs, executing these rapid, asset-heavy upgrades poses a risk to near-term cash flows.

- Total reliance on volatile foreign tourist arrivals (FTAs) presents inherent risks due to sudden shifts in cross-border travel patterns, air corridor capacities, and international economic conditions. To mitigate this exposure, marketing strategies must be continuously balanced to leverage robust domestic luxury demand alongside international business segments.

The Committee was reconstituted on August 05, 2024 due to completion of tenure of Ramprakash Ramvallabh Kothari. Mr. Surendra Khemka, Non-Executive Independent Director was appointed as Chairman of the Committee in place of Mr. Ramprakash Kothari.

- 4) Reviewing, with the management, the annual financial statements and auditors' report thereon before submission to the board for approval, with particular reference to:
 - a) Matters required to be included in the Directors' Responsibility Statement to be included in the Board's Report in terms of clause (c) of sub-section 3 of section 134 of the Companies Act, 2013;
 - b) Changes, if any, in accounting policies and practices and reasons for the same;
 - c) Major accounting entries involving estimates based on the exercise of judgment by management;
 - d) Significant adjustments made in the financial statements arising out of audit findings;
 - e) Compliance with listing and other legal requirements relating to financial statements;
 - f) Disclosure of any related party transactions;
 - g) Qualifications in the draft audit report.
- 5) Reviewing, with the management, the quarterly financial statements before submission to the board for approval;
- 6) Reviewing, with the management, the statement of uses / application of funds raised through an issue (public issue, rights issue, preferential issue etc.), the statement of funds utilized for purposes other than those stated in the offer document / prospectus / notice and the report submitted by the monitoring agency monitoring the utilization of proceeds of a public or rights issue and making appropriate recommendations to the Board to take up steps in this matter;
- 7) Review and monitor the auditor's independence and performance and effectiveness of audit process;
- 8) Approval or any subsequent modification of transactions of the company with related parties;
- 9) Scrutiny of inter-corporate loans and investments;
- 10) Valuation of undertakings or assets of the company, wherever it is necessary;

NOTE- 34 SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES AND NOTES FORMING PART OF FINANCIAL STATEMENTS**1. CORPORATE INFORMATION:**

Royale Manor Hotels and Industries Limited is a listed public limited company incorporated in 1991. Its shares are listed on Bombay, Madras and Calcutta Stock Exchanges. Company established first five-star hotel of Ahmedabad and is primarily engaged in the business of Hotel & Restaurant.

2. BASIS OF PREPARATION OF FINANCIAL STATEMENTS AND SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES**2.1 Statement of Compliance:**

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Ind AS as prescribed under section 133 of the Companies Act, 2013 read with Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Rules, 2015 and other provisions of the Companies Act, 2013 as amended from time to time.

2.2 Basis of preparation

These financial statements of the Company have been prepared in accordance with Indian Accounting Standards (Ind AS) notified under the Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Rules, 2015.

2.3 Accounting Estimates:

The preparation of these financial statements in conformity with the recognition and measurement principles of Ind AS requires management to make judgments, estimates and assumptions, that affect the reported balance of assets and liabilities, disclosure relating to contingent liabilities as at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of income and expenses for the years presented. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

2.4 Revenue Recognition:

Revenue is recognized to the extent that it is probable that the economic benefits will flow to the Company and the revenue can be reliably measured, regardless of when the payment is being made. Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable, taking into account contractually defined terms of payment and excluding taxes or duty. The Company assesses its revenue arrangements against specific criteria to determine if it is acting as principal or agent. The Company has concluded that it is acting as a principal in all of its revenue arrangements. The specific recognition criteria described below must also be met before revenue is recognized.

Value added tax (VAT)/Goods and Service Tax (GST) is not received by the Company on its own account. Rather, it is tax collected on value added to the commodity by the seller on behalf of the government. Accordingly, it is excluded from revenue.

Rooms, Restaurant, Banquets and Other Service

Income from guest accommodation is recognized on a day to day basis after the guest checks into the Hotels and are stated net of allowances. Incomes from other services are recognized as and when services are rendered. Sales are stated exclusive of Goods and Service Tax (GST) and Value Added Taxes (VAT). Difference of revenue over the billed as at the year-end is carried in financial statement as unbilled revenue separately.

Sale of goods

Revenue from the sale of goods is recognized when the significant risks and rewards of ownership of the goods have passed to the buyer, sale of food and beverage are recognized at the points of serving these items to the guests. Sales are stated exclusive of VAT/ Goods and Service Tax (GST).

Interest income

Interest Income is accrued on a time proportion basis using the effective interest rate.

2.5 Property, Plant & Equipments:

Property, Plant & Equipments has been recorded at actual cost inclusive of duties, taxes and other incidental expenses related to acquisition, improvement and installation. The Company depreciates property, plant & equipments over their estimated useful lives using the SLM method. The estimated useful lives of assets are as under:

2.6 Impairment of Assets:

Assets are reviewed for impairment losses whenever events or changes in circumstances indicate that the carrying amount may not be recoverable. An impairment loss is recognized for the amount by which the carrying amount of the assets exceeds its recoverable amount, which is the higher of an asset's net selling price and value in use.

2.7 Investments:

Investments are in equity shares of unlisted company being Non-Current in nature, are stated at cost.

2.8 Foreign Currency Transactions:

Earnings in foreign currencies are recorded at the exchange rate prevailing on the date of transactions. Payments in foreign currencies are recorded at the rates prevailing on the date of actual remittance.

2.9 Borrowing Cost:

Borrowing costs directly attributable to the acquisition or construction of an asset that necessarily takes a substantial period of time to get ready for its intended use are capitalized as part of the cost of the asset until such time that the assets are substantially ready for their intended use. Capitalization of borrowing costs is suspended and charged to profit and loss during the extended periods when the active development on the qualifying assets is interrupted. Qualifying fixed asset is an asset that necessarily takes a substantial period of time to get ready for their intended use or sale. All other borrowing costs are charged to Statement of Profit and Loss over the tenure of the borrowing.

2.10 Inventories:

Stock of food and beverages, stores and operating supplies are valued at lower of cost and net realizable Value. Cost includes cost of purchase and other costs incurred in bringing the inventories to their present location and condition, Cost is determined on a first in first out basis. Net realizable value is the estimated selling price in the ordinary course of business less estimated cost of completion and estimated costs necessary to make sale.

2.11 Employees' Benefits:

Company accounts for leave encashment benefits on the basis of actuarial valuation. Further, contribution to the Gratuity Fund linked with Life Insurance Corporation of India is charged to Statement of Profit & Loss.

2.12 Taxes on Income:

Taxes on Income are accounted in the same period to which the revenue and expenses relate.

Provision for current income tax is made on the basis of estimated taxable income, in accordance with the provisions of the Income Tax Act, 1961 and rules framed there under.

Deferred tax is the tax effect of timing differences. The timing differences are differences between the taxable income and accounting income for a period that originate in one period and are capable of reversal in one or more subsequent periods.

MAT credit is recognized as an asset only when and to the extent there is convincing evidence that the Company will pay normal income tax during the specified period.

2.13 Earnings Per Share (EPS):

Basic earnings per share are computed by dividing the profit/ (loss) after tax by the weighted average number of equity shares outstanding during the year. Diluted earnings per share is computed by dividing the profit/(loss) after tax by the weighted average number of equity shares considered for deriving basic earnings per share.

2.14 Contingencies and Provisions:

Provisions are recognized when the Company has a present obligation (legal or constructive) as a result of a past event, it is probable that an outflow of resources embodying economic benefits will be required to settle the obligation and a reliable estimate can be made of the amount of the obligation. The expense relating to a provision is presented in the statement of profit and loss net of any reimbursement.

Contingent liabilities are recognized only when there is a possible obligation arising from past events, due to occurrence or non-occurrence of one or more uncertain future events, not wholly within the control of the Company or where any present obligation cannot be measured in terms of future outflow of resources or where a reliable estimate of obligation cannot be made. Contingent assets are not recognized in the financial statements.

2.15 Statement of Cash Flow:

Cash flows are reported using the indirect method, whereby profit/ (loss) before exceptional items and tax is adjusted for the effects of transactions of non-cash nature and any deferrals or accruals of past or future cash receipts or payments. The cash flows from operating, investing and financing activities of the Company are segregated based on available information.

The amendment in Ind AS 7 requires to inform users of financial statements of the existence of supplier finance arrangements and explain the nature of the arrangements, the carrying amount of liabilities and the range of payment due dates. Ind AS 107 has been amended to add supplier finance arrangements as a factor that may cause concentration of liquidity risk.

The Company has reviewed the amendment and based on its evaluation has determined that it does not have any significant impact in its financial statements.

2.16 Financial Instruments:

Financial Assets and Financial Liabilities are recognized when the Company becomes party to the contractual provisions of the financial instrument. Financial Assets are derecognized when the rights to receive benefits have expired or been transferred, and the Company has transferred substantially all risks and rewards of ownership of such financial asset. Financial liabilities are derecognized when the liability is extinguished, that is when the contractual obligation is discharged, cancelled or expired. Purchase or sale of financial assets that require delivery of assets within a time frame established by regulation or convention in the market place are recognized on trade date i.e. the date when the Company commits to purchase or sale the asset.

3. NOTES TO ACCOUNTS:

- 3.1** Some of the Balances of sundry creditors, sundry debtors, loans & advances and other liabilities are subject to confirmation and reconciliation.
- 3.2** In the opinion of the Board of Directors, Current Assets, Loans & Advances are approximately of the value at which they are stated in the Balance Sheet, if realized in the ordinary course of business.
- 3.3** The Company operates in one segment i.e. Hotel business and within one geographical segment i.e. India.
- 3.4** The Company manages its capital to ensure that it will be able to continue as a going concern. The structure is managed to provide ongoing returns to shareholders and service debt obligations, whilst maintaining maximum operational flexibility.
- 3.5** The carrying amounts of trade payables, other financial liabilities, cash and cash equivalents, other bank balances, trade receivables and other financial assets are considered to be the same as their fair values due to their short-term nature.
- 3.6** The Company opines that no provision for expected credit loss is required.
