NOTICE is hereby given that the 40th Annual General Meeting ("AGM") of the Members of Utique Enterprises Limited will be held on Wednesday, September 23, 2026 at 2:30 p.m. through Video Conferencing ("VC")/Other Audio-Visual Means ("OAVM") to transact the following business:-

ORDINARY BUSINESS

1. *To consider and adopt the audited financial statements of the Company for the financial year ended March 31, 2026 and the reports of the Board of Directors and the Auditors thereon and, in this regard, to consider and if thought fit, to pass the following resolution as an Ordinary Resolution:-*

"RESOLVED THAT the audited financial statements of the Company for the financial year ended March 31, 2026 and the reports of the Board of Directors and Auditors thereon, as circulated to the Members, be and are hereby considered and adopted."

2. *To appoint Mr. Jayanty Rama Krishna Sarma, who retires by rotation as a Director and, in this regard, to consider and if thought fit, to pass the following resolution as an Ordinary Resolution:-*

"RESOLVED THAT in accordance with the provisions of Section 152 and other applicable provisions of the Companies Act, 2013, Mr. Jayanty Rama Krishna Sarma (DIN: 00088327), who retires by rotation at this Annual General Meeting, be and is hereby appointed as a Director of the Company."

SPECIAL BUSINESS

3. *To re-appoint Mr. Jayanty Rama Krishna Sarma as a Whole-Time Director of the Company and, in this regard, to consider and if thought fit, to pass the following resolution as a Special Resolution:-*

"RESOLVED THAT in accordance with the provisions of Sections 196, 197 and 203 read with Schedule V and other applicable provisions of the Companies Act, 2013 ("the Act") and the Companies (Appointment & Remuneration of Managerial Personnel) Rules, 2014, approval of the Members be and is hereby accorded to re-appoint Mr. Jayanty Rama Krishna Sarma (DIN: 00088327) as a Whole-Time Director of the Company, designated as an Executive Director, for a period of 5 (five) years, on expiry of his present term of office i.e. with effect from September 27, 2026, on the terms and conditions as set out in the Explanatory Statement annexed to the Notice convening this Meeting, with liberty to the Board of Directors (hereinafter referred to as "the Board" which term shall be deemed to include the Nomination & Remuneration Committee of the Board) to alter and vary the terms and conditions of the said re-appointment and/or remuneration as it may deem fit subject to the same not exceeding the limits specified under Section 197, read with Schedule V to the Act.

AND THAT the Board be and is hereby authorized to do all acts and take all such steps as may be necessary, proper or expedient to give effect to this resolution."

NOTES

1. The Ministry of Corporate Affairs ("MCA") vide its General Circular No.03/2025 dated September 22, 2025 in continuation of its earlier Circulars on the subject ("the MCA Circulars") has permitted companies to conduct AGM through VC/OAVM, subject to compliance of various conditions mentioned therein.

In compliance with the MCA Circulars, applicable provisions of the Companies Act, 2013 ("the Act") and rules made thereunder, and the SEBI (Listing Obligations & Disclosure Requirements) Regulations, 2015 ("Listing Regulations"), the 40th AGM of the Company is being convened and conducted through VC/OAVM.

The Registered Office of the Company shall be deemed to be the venue for the AGM.

The Company has engaged Bigshare Services Private Limited for facilitating voting through electronic means i.e. remote e-Voting and voting at the AGM.

2. In terms of Section 102 of the Act and the Secretarial Standard on General Meetings (SS-2), an Explanatory Statement setting out the material facts concerning business to be transacted at the AGM is annexed and forms part of this Notice.
3. Pursuant to the provisions of Section 105 of the Act, a Member entitled to attend and vote at the AGM is entitled to appoint a proxy to attend and vote on his/her behalf and the proxy need not be a Member of the Company. As this AGM is being held pursuant to the MCA Circulars through VC/OAVM, physical attendance of Members has been dispensed with. Accordingly, facility for appointment of proxies by Members will not be available for the AGM and, therefore, Proxy Form and Attendance Slip are not annexed to this Notice.
4. The Register of Members and the Share Transfer Books of the Company will remain closed from Thursday, September 17, 2026 to Wednesday, September 23, 2026 (both days inclusive).
5. Corporate Members intending to send their Authorized Representatives to attend the AGM through VC/OAVM on their behalf and to vote through remote e-Voting, are requested to send a certified copy of Board Resolution authorizing their representative to the email address of the Company i.e. info@utique.in
6. Members may also note that Notice of the AGM and the 40th Annual Report 2025-2026 will be available on the Company's website www.utique.in

 The SEBI has, vide its aforesaid Circular No. SEBI/HO/MIRSD/POD-1/P/CIR/2023/181 dated November 17, 2023 and Circular No. SEBI/HO/MIRSD/POD-1/P/CIR/2024/37 dated May 7, 2024, Circular No. SEBI/HO/MIRSD/MIRSD-PoD/P/CIR/2025/91 dated June 23, 2025, and Circular No. HO/38/13/(4)2026-MIRSD_PoD/I/4298/2026 dated February 6, 2026 mandated that the security holders (holding securities in physical form), whose Folio(s) are not updated with the KYC details (any of the details, viz. In accordance with the proviso to Regulation 40(1) of the Listing Regulations, as amended from time to time, and read with SEBI Circular No. SEBI/HO/MIRSD/MIRSD_RTAMB/P/CIR/2022/8 dated January 25, 2022, and Circular No. SEBI/HO/MIRSD/POD-1/P/CIR/2024/37 dated May 7, 2024, Circular No. SEBI/HO/MIRSD/MIRSD-PoD/P/CIR/2025/91 dated June 23, 2025, and Circular No. HO/38/13/(4)2026-MIRSD-POD/I/4298/2026 dated February 6, 2026 transfer of securities of the Company, including transmission and transposition requests, shall not be processed unless the securities are held in the dematerialized form with a Depository. Accordingly, shareholders holding equity shares in physical form are urged to have their shares dematerialized so as to be able to freely transfer them, eliminate all risks associated with physical holding and participate in corporate actions.
11. As per the SEBI Circular No. HO/38/13(3)2026 MIRSDPOD/I/3763/2026 dated January 30, 2026, the requirement of issuance of a Letter of Confirmation by the Company/ RTA has been dispensed with for the aforesaid investor service requests with effect from April 2, 2026. Accordingly, securities will be credited directly to the shareholder's Demat Account upon submission of latest Client Master List with duly filled Demat Conversion Request Form to the RTA. In view of the same and to eliminate the risks associated with physical shares and to avail of various benefits of dematerialisation, Members are advised to dematerialize the shares held by them in physical form. 13. The Members attending the AGM through VC/OAVM shall be counted for the purpose of reckoning the quorum under Section 103 of the Act.
14. Information pursuant to Regulations 36(3) of the Listing Regulations and the Secretarial Standard on General Meetings (SS-2) with respect to the Director seeking appointment/reappointment at the AGM are furnished in the Annexure to this Notice. The Director has furnished the requisite consents/declarations for his appointment/reappointment.

16. 17. As the AGM will be held through VC/OAVM, the route map is not annexed to this Notice.
18. Mr. Umesh P. Maskeri, Practicing Company Secretary (ICSI Membership No. FCS 4831, COP No.12704) has been appointed as the Scrutinizer to conduct the remote e-Voting process and voting at the AGM, in a fair and transparent manner.

19. In compliance with provisions of Section 108 of the Act read with Rule 20 of the Companies (Management & Administration) Rules, 2014 [including amendments thereto] and the Listing Regulations, the Company is pleased to provide Members facility to exercise their right to vote on resolutions proposed to be considered at the AGM by electronic means and the business may be transacted through e-Voting services.
- (i) The facility of casting the votes by Members using an electronic voting system from a place other than venue of the AGM ("remote e-Voting") will be provided by Bigshare Services Private Limited (Bigshare e-Voting System).
 - (ii) A person, whose name is recorded in the Register of Members or in the Register of Beneficial Owners maintained by the Depositories as on the cut-off date only shall be entitled to avail the facility of remote e-Voting or voting at the AGM.
 - (iii) In case of joint-holders attending the AGM, only such joint-holder who is higher in the order of names, will be entitled to vote.
 - (iv) The results declared along with the report of the Scrutinizer shall be placed on the website of the Company www.utique.in and on the website of Bigshare Services Private Limited www.ivote.bigshareonline.com immediately after the declaration of result by the Chairman or a person authorized by him in writing. The results shall also be immediately notified to BSE Limited.

The instructions to shareholders for e-Voting and joining AGM are as under:-

- (i) The e-Voting period begins on Sunday, September 20, 2026 at 9:00 a.m. and ends on Tuesday, September 22, 2026 at 5:00 p.m. During this period, shareholders of the Company, holding shares either in physical form or in dematerialized form, as on the cut-off date Wednesday, September 16, 2026, may cast their vote electronically. The e-Voting module shall be disabled by Bigshare for voting thereafter.
- (ii) Shareholders who have already voted prior to the AGM date would not be entitled to vote at the AGM.
- (iii) Pursuant to SEBI Circular No.SEBI/HO/CFD/CMD/CIR/P/2020/242 dated December 9, 2020, under Regulation 44 of the Listing Regulations, listed entities are required to provide remote e-Voting facility to its shareholders, in respect of all shareholders' resolutions. However, it has been observed that the participation by the public non-institutional shareholders/retail shareholders is at a negligible level.

Currently, there are multiple e-Voting Service Providers ("ESPs") providing e-Voting facility to listed entities in India. This necessitates registration on various ESPs and maintenance of multiple user IDs and Passwords by the shareholders.

In order to increase the efficiency of the voting process, pursuant to a public consultation, it has been decided to enable e-Voting to all the Demat Account Holders, by way of a single login credential, through their Demat Accounts/ websites of Depositories /Depository Participants. Demat account holders would be able to cast their vote without having to register again with the ESPs, thereby not only facilitating seamless authentication but also enhancing ease and convenience of participating in e-Voting process.

- (iv) In terms of the SEBI Circular No.SEBI/HO/CFD/CMD/CIR/P/2020/242 dated December 9, 2020 on e-Voting facility provided by listed entities, individual shareholders holding securities in demat mode are allowed to vote through their Demat Account maintained with Depositories and Depository Participants. The shareholders are advised to update their Mobile Number and email Id in their Demat Accounts in order to access e-Voting facility.

In view of the accumulated losses, your Directors regret their inability to declare dividend on equity shares.

THE YEAR IN RETROSPECT

Your Company continued to follow a focused-based approach in trading and focused on select precious metals like silver.

During the financial year 2025-2026, the Total Income of the Company stood at Rs.58.55 crore despite various market constraints explained in this Report.

The Company has invested in sound Mutual Funds, besides continuing the Commodity business. The Profit before Tax also recorded at Rs.279.42 lac as compared to Rs.302.55 lac in the previous financial year.

There is no segment-wise business or operations for the Company at present.

The Company continued its prudent policy on business operations, liquidity and profitability. While doing so, it has endeavored to achieve a proper balance in assets – both long-term as well as short-term. Similarly, a healthy Current Ratio has been maintained. The Company also strives to maintain a balance between risk and return on assets employed.

While physical delivery of metal and hedging for price are resorted to in all transactions, the Company continuously monitors the commodity market and developments therein with experts and market players.

There was no change in the nature of business of the Company during the year under review.

BUSINESS PLANS

Global commodity markets in 2025 experienced some of the highest volatility in half a century, heavily driven by geopolitical friction, fluctuating energy demands, and shifting supply chains.

The World Bank forecasts that with both oil and natural gas prices having soared due to supply shortfalls, average energy prices will increase by 24.00% in 2026. The supply shocks brought about by the US-Iran war and its consequences are widespread, affecting many commodities and industrial inputs. Input costs will also exert upward pressure on prices of food commodities and metals. Average base metals prices are projected to reach an all-time high, as are prices of precious metals, amid extraordinary volatility.

Your Company is entering into fixed forward contracts wherein the yields are fixed and, therefore, the price fluctuations may not affect the Company's business.

Your Company Management is optimistic of trading in precious metals also on account of improved regulatory framework, better integration of markets, developing market infrastructures and warehousing facilities.

The Company wishes to pursue trading business and, depending on risk-return analysis, may explore other metals in addition to gold and silver. The strategy to be implemented will focus on controlling inherent risks in order to ensure sustainable development of the Company and protect the interests of its stakeholders.

Profitability and cost consciousness will continue to be the two important factors for future growth.

ACCOUNTING METHOD

The financial statements of the Company for the financial year ended March 31, 2026 have been prepared in accordance with the Companies Act, 2013 ("the Act") including accounting principles generally accepted in India, Indian Accounting Standards ("Ind AS") specified under Section 133 of the Act read with the Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Rules, 2015 and Schedule III to the Act. The Company has a well defined delegation of authority with specified limits of approval of expenditure.

MANAGEMENT DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS

OVERVIEW

Global Economy

In 2025, the world economy experienced a broad-based slowdown, with global growth hovering around 2.80% to 3.00%. This period was marked by escalating trade protections, elevated US tariffs, and policy uncertainties that disrupted supply chains, while emerging markets continued to outpace advanced economies in growth rates.

As the Middle East conflict drives sharp energy price increases, global growth is projected to slow to 2.50% in 2026, with emerging markets and developing economies facing the weakest per capita income growth since the COVID-19 pandemic. Risks remain skewed to the downside and include escalating hostilities, further commodity market disruptions, and additional geopolitical strains, while broader AI adoption offers some upside. Global inflation is expected to fall, but the US inflation will return to target more gradually. Key downside risks are re-evaluation of technology expectations and escalation of geopolitical tensions.

Risks are tilted to the downside. Prolonged uncertainty, more protectionism, and labour supply shocks could reduce growth. Fiscal vulnerabilities, potential financial market corrections, and erosion of institutions could threaten stability.

Global headline inflation rose for a second consecutive month, from 3.70% in January to 4.10% in February and further to 4.30% in March 2026. Following a slight downward path through much of 2024 and 2025, global inflation has edged up in recent months, reflecting renewed price pressures. By the end of the first quarter, inflation began to accelerate due to increasing energy and fuel prices driven by heightened war in the Middle East.

In America, annual inflation increased from 3.80% in February to 4.50% in March. Since December 2025, when annual inflation stood at 3.30%, inflation has strengthened considerably. In Europe, the annual inflation rate increased from 2.90% to 3.40%, with more than 95.00% of the countries recording higher inflation in the latest monthly period. In Africa, the inflation rate increased by a similar magnitude.

The energy price spike is now raising inflation and generating a sharp squeeze on household purchasing power that could intensify if the Middle East conflict continues. The risk of a negative growth shock raising unemployment rates is thus high.

On the other hand, a surge in global goods demand is contributing to inflationary concerns. Global factory output accelerated to an annualized rate of 3.60% in the first quarter. In addition, supply bottlenecks in the tech sector as well as rising import and transportation costs, are putting upward pressure on core goods prices, which are forecast to increase by an annualized rate of 2.00% this year, compared with 0.90% during the financial year 2024–2025.

In 2025, the world trade in goods and commercial services, on a balance of payments basis, increased by 7.00% to US\$ 34.65 trillion, up from 4.00% growth in the previous year. The goods trade grew by 6.00%, while services expanded at a faster rate of 8.00%. The share of services in global trade reached 27.60%, its highest level since 2005, reflecting the continued resilience and expanding role of services in global trade.

The world trade is set to slow in 2026, following a stronger than expected rise last year. In the baseline scenario, merchandise trade volume growth would drop from 4.60% in 2025 to 1.90% in 2026, before picking up to 2.60% in 2027. The same scenario for services trade volume would see growth easing from 5.30% in 2025 to 4.80% in 2026, then rising to 5.10% in 2027.

The 2026 forecast for merchandise trade growth, while lower than the 2025 result, is still above the previous forecast of 0.50%. The revision was due to upgraded GDP growth projections, the expectation of continued strong growth in AI-related trade, and a smaller than anticipated impact of tariffs. Recent trade policy changes in 2026 mostly involved substitution of legal instruments rather than a substantive change in tariff barriers.

Indian Economy

India's real GDP grew by 7.70% for the year 2025-2026, up from 7.10% in financial year 2025, maintaining its position as one of the world's fastest growing major economies.

The recent economic expansion was broad-based, with secondary and services sectors acting as the primary engines of growth. Key sub-sectors like trade, hotels, and transportation registered double digit growth (12.50%), while financial and real estate services grew by 10.40%.

India's foreign exchange reserves remained robust, providing a cushion against global uncertainties and currency volatility. The reserves increased to 701.4 billion \$US, up from 668 billion \$US as of the end of March 2025. However, the Rupee has depreciated sharply against the \$US, with the Rupee-Dollar Exchange Rate rising from around Rs.85 per dollar in 2025 to beyond Rs.96 per dollar in 2026. The Indian Rupee is weakening due to global uncertainty, rising imports, capital outflows, and external sector pressures on the economy.

The Government reinforced a push towards infrastructure driven economic growth, setting a constructive backdrop for India's real estate sector. Its sharp focus on infrastructure, manufacturing, urban development and tourism is expected to create strong indirect momentum across residential, commercial, industrial and hospitality real estate segments.

Despite growth, inflation proved to be a significant concern. Reserve Bank of India revised its inflation forecast upward for financial year 2026-2027, reflecting the sharp uptick in food prices and retail inflation readings amid the ongoing West Asia crisis.

The World Bank forecasts India's GDP growth at 6.60% for the financial year 2026-2027, following an estimated 7.00% growth in the previous year. Despite a projected moderation due to higher global energy costs, India is expected to comfortably remain the world's fastest growing major economy.

Reserve Bank of India also projects India's real GDP growth for the financial year 2026-2027 at 6.60%. This is a downward revision from the previous projection of 6.90%, driven by concerns over elevated energy prices, ongoing geopolitical conflicts in West Asia, and weather-related uncertainties.

INDUSTRY STRUCTURE AND DEVELOPMENTS

Global mined silver supply increased by 3.00% y/y to 846.6Moz (26,331t). Combined with recycling and others, the total supply was 1,030.6 Moz against the demand of 1,130.3 Moz.

Demand, by contrast, fell by 2.00% to 1,130.6 Moz (35,166t), the lowest since 2021 as a contraction in PV demand and thrifting elsewhere outweighed gains linked to AI-related data centers, high-speed transmission hardware, EV penetration and charging infrastructure.

Despite fall in demand, the silver market is forecast to record another significant deficit (total supply less demand) for the sixth consecutive year in 2026. In keeping with previous years, silver industrial demand will remain the key driver of this favourable supply/demand backdrop, with volumes projected to hit a new record high this year.

Global silver prices gained close to 149.00% and this performance significantly outpaced gold, copper, and most base metals. The rally reflected silver's dual nature as both a precious metal and an industrial commodity. The surge in silver prices during 2025 was driven by multiple factors reinforcing each other, namely weakness in the \$US, elevated geopolitical tensions, tariff uncertainty and strong investment demand.

Gold prices posted continuous gains to kick off 2026, peaking in late January before cooling off in late March. Trade concerns, geopolitical crises and central bank buying and selling have contributed to gold's volatile spot price.

India's gold demand is likely to be anchored by investment interest, supported by price momentum, geopolitical risks, and subdued domestic financial markets. However, a rise in external risks and a potentially below-normal monsoon could weigh on growth and incomes, while inflationary pressures, partly driven by Middle East tensions, may dampen consumption, especially in price-sensitive segments. Amid these headwinds, investment demand is likely to remain firm, while jewellery demand may continue to face pressure, reinforcing the investment-led trend.

OPPORTUNITIES AND THREAT

Trading in commodities and derivatives are subject to inherent risks such as credit risk, margin risk, volatility in prices of commodities and currencies, political risk, leverage risk, operational risk such as high transaction costs, regulatory changes, interest rate risk, warehousing and storage cost, etc.

Your Company Management believes that in any market the biggest risk is not having complete understanding of the business. Therefore, your Company Management adopts focus-based approaches in trading in order to reduce the risk and create a substantial value creation for its stakeholders.

The underlying drivers that supported silver throughout much of 2025 have remained firmly in place so far this year.

These include tight physical supply in London, a volatile geopolitical backdrop, US policy uncertainty, and concerns over the Federal Reserve's independence. In addition, silver's underlying supply-demand fundamentals remain supportive.

The expansion of data centers, AI-related technologies, and the automotive sector are expected to support silver consumption across a range of industrial end-uses, partially offsetting the decline in PV-related demand.

Silver physical investment is forecast to rise by 20.00% to a three-year high of 227 Moz. After three consecutive years of decline, Western physical investment is expected to recover in 2026, as silver's exceptional price performance and ongoing macroeconomic uncertainty rekindle investor interest. Investment demand in India is also likely to build on last year's substantial gains amid positive investor sentiment.

The underlying drivers that supported gold in 2025 are Middle East tensions, hedging against price fluctuations and global uncertainties, high interest rates, etc.

The central banks are actively shifting from USD-denominated reserves to gold to ensure monetary sovereignty and hedge against potential geopolitical sanctions.

Large-scale investors have moved gold from a "speculative trade" category to a mandatory risk-management tool, treating it as an insurance policy against global instability.

The Government of India's import duty hike (from 6.00% to 15.00%) has structurally raised the "landed cost" of bullion, establishing a new, higher price floor for the domestic market.

As at present, your Company has silver, gold and copper segment/product-wise classification.

Your Company Management is optimistic on the outlook of trading in precious metals on account of improved regulatory framework, better integration of markets, developing market infrastructures and warehousing facilities.

The strategy to be implemented will focus on delivering value to its shareholders and at the same time, control inherent risks in order to ensure sustainable development of the Company and protect the interests of its stakeholders.

RISKS AND CONCERNS

The scope and coverage of audits include ensuring operating guidelines, and the reliability of financial and operational information and adherence to statutory compliances.

The Internal Auditors of the Company review all the control measures on a quarterly basis and recommend improvements, wherever deemed appropriate, and reports to the Company Management.

The Audit Committee regularly reviews the audit findings. Based on its recommendations, the Company has implemented a number of control measures in both operational and accounting related areas, apart from the usual security related measures. The internal controls are designed to ensure that the financial and other records are reliable for preparing financial statements and other data and for maintaining the accountability of the assets.

Internal Control and Audit is an important procedure and the Audit Committee of the Company has been empowered by the Board of Directors to review the adequacy of internal financial controls.

• Dematerialization of shares and liquidity

73.89% of the Company's equity share capital has been dematerialized up to March 31, 2026.

The process of conversion of shares from physical form to electronic form is known as dematerialization. Notes to the Financial Statements for the year ended March 31, 2026

1 Corporate Information

Utique Enterprises Limited ("the Company") is a listed entity incorporated in India, having its registered office at 603, Lodha Supremus, 453, Senapati Bapat Marg, Lower Parel, Mumbai 400013.

The Company is engaged in general trading of precious metal and trading in derivatives on recognized exchanges.

2 Material Accounting Policies

A Basis of Preparation and Presentation

The Financial Statements have been prepared on the historical cost basis except for following assets and liabilities which have been measured at fair value amount:

- (i) Certain financial assets and liabilities.
- (ii) Defined benefit plans - plan assets.

The Financial Statements of the Company have been prepared to comply with the Indian Accounting Standards ('Ind AS'), including the rules notified under the relevant provisions of the Companies Act, 2013, (as amended from time to time) and Presentation requirements of Division II of Schedule III to the Companies Act, 2013, (Ind AS Compliant Schedule III) as amended from time to time. The Company follows indirect method prescribed in Ind AS 7 - Statement of Cash Flows for presentation of its cash flows.

The Company's Financial Statements are presented in Indian Rupees (₹), which is its functional currency and all values are rounded to the nearest lakh (₹00,000) except when otherwise indicated.

B Summary Of Material Accounting Policies

(a) Current and Non-Current Classification

The Company presents assets and liabilities in the Balance Sheet based on Current/ Non-Current classification.

An asset is treated as Current when it is -

- Expected to be realised or intended to be sold or consumed in normal operating cycle;
- Held primarily for the purpose of trading;
- Expected to be realised within twelve months after the reporting period, or
- Cash or cash equivalent unless restricted from being exchanged or used to settle a liability for at least twelve months after the reporting period.

All other assets are classified as non-current. A liability is treated as current when -

- It is expected to be settled in normal operating cycle;
- It is held primarily for the purpose of trading;
- It is due to be settled within twelve months after the reporting period, or
- There is no unconditional right to defer the settlement of the liability for at least twelve months after the reporting period.

The Company classifies all other liabilities as non-current.

Deferred tax assets and liabilities are classified as non-current assets and liabilities.

(b) Property, Plant and Equipment

Property, Plant and Equipment are stated at cost, net of recoverable taxes, trade discount and rebates less accumulated depreciation and impairment losses, if any. Such cost includes purchase price, borrowing cost and any cost directly attributable to bringing the assets to its working condition for its intended use, net charges on foreign exchange contracts and adjustments arising from exchange rate variations attributable to the assets.

Subsequent costs are included in the asset's carrying amount or recognised as a separate asset, as appropriate, only when it is probable that future economic benefits associated with the item will flow to the entity and the cost can be measured reliably.

Property, Plant and Equipment which are significant to the total cost of that item of Property, Plant and Equipment and having different useful life are accounted separately.

Other Indirect Expenses incurred relating to project, net of income earned during the project development stage prior to its intended use, are considered as pre-operative expenses and disclosed under Capital Work-in-Progress.

Depreciation on Property, Plant and Equipment is provided using straight line method. Depreciation is provided based on useful life of the assets prescribed in Schedule II to the Companies Act, 2013.

The residual values, useful lives and methods of depreciation of Property, Plant and Equipment are reviewed at each financial year end and adjusted prospectively, if appropriate.

Gains or losses arising from derecognition of Property, Plant and Equipment are measured as the difference between the net disposal proceeds and the carrying amount of the asset and are recognised in the Statement of Profit and Loss when the asset is derecognised.

(c) Leases

The Company, as a lessee, recognizes a right-of-use asset and a lease liability for its leasing arrangements, if the contract conveys the right to control the use of an identified asset.

The contract conveys the right to control the use of an identified asset, if it involves the use of an identified asset and the Company has substantially all of the economic benefits from use of the asset and has right to direct the use of the identified asset. The cost of the right-of-use asset shall comprise of the amount of the initial measurement of the lease liability adjusted for any lease payments made at or before the commencement date plus any initial direct costs incurred. The right-of-use assets is subsequently measured at cost less any accumulated depreciation, accumulated impairment losses, if any and adjusted for any remeasurement of the lease liability. The right-of-use assets is depreciated using the straight-line method from the commencement date over the shorter of lease term or useful life of right-of-use asset.

The Company measures the lease liability at the present value of the lease payments that are not paid at the commencement date of the lease. The lease payments are discounted using the interest rate implicit in the lease, if that rate can be readily determined. If that rate cannot be readily determined, the Company uses incremental borrowing rate.

For short-term and low value leases, the Company recognizes the lease payments as an operating expense on a straight-line basis over the lease term.

(d) Intangible Assets

Intangible Assets are stated at cost of acquisition net of recoverable taxes, trade discount and rebates less accumulated amortisation/depletion and impairment loss, if any. Such cost includes purchase price, borrowing costs, and any cost directly attributable to bringing the asset to its working condition for the intended use, net charges on foreign exchange contracts and adjustments arising from exchange rate variations attributable to the Intangible Assets.

Subsequent costs are included in the asset's carrying amount or recognised as a separate asset, as appropriate, only when it is probable that future economic benefits associated with the item will flow to the entity and the cost can be measured reliably.

Other Indirect expenses incurred relating to project, net of income earned during the project development stage prior to its intended use, are considered as pre-operative expenses and disclosed under Intangible Assets Under Development.

Gains or losses arising from derecognition of an Intangible asset are measured as the difference between the net disposal proceeds and the carrying amount of the asset and are recognised in the Statement of Profit and Loss when the asset is derecognised.

Intangible Assets comprising of Software are amortised over the period of 5 years.

(e) Cash and Cash Equivalent

Cash and cash equivalents comprise of cash on hand, cash at banks, short-term deposits and short-term highly liquid investments that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and which are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value.

(f) Inventories

Items of Inventory are measured at lower of the cost and Net Realizable value. Cost of inventory comprises of cost of purchase and other cost incurred to acquire it. The cost formula used for this purpose is First In First Out (FIFO) method and includes direct cost incurred in bringing the items of inventory to their present location and condition.

(g) Impairment of Non-Financial Assets-Property Plant and Equipment and Intangible Assets

The Company assesses at each reporting date as to whether there is any indication that any Property, Plant and Equipment and Intangible Assets or group of assets, called Cash Generating Units (CGU) may be impaired. If any such indication exists the recoverable amount of an asset or CGU is estimated to determine the extent of impairment, if any. When it is not possible to estimate the recoverable amount of an individual asset, the Company estimates the recoverable amount of the CGU to which the asset belongs.

An impairment loss is recognised in the Statement of Profit and Loss to the extent, asset's carrying amount exceeds its recoverable amount. The recoverable amount is higher of an asset's fair value less cost of disposal and value in use. Value in use is based on the estimated future cash flows, discounted to their present value using pre-tax discount rate that reflects current market assessments of the time value of money and risk specific to the assets.

The impairment loss recognised in prior accounting period is reversed if there has been a change in the estimate of recoverable amount.

(h) Provisions

Provisions are recognised when the Company has a present obligation (legal or constructive) as a result of a past event, it is probable that an outflow of resources embodying economic benefits will be required to settle the obligation and a reliable estimate can be made of the amount of the obligation.

If the effect of the time value of money is material, provisions are discounted using a current pre-tax rate that reflects, when appropriate, the risks specific to the liability. When discounting is used, the increase in the provision due to the passage of time is recognised as a finance cost.

(i) Employee Benefits Expense

Short Term Employee Benefits

The undiscounted amount of short term employee benefits expected to be paid in exchange for the services rendered by employees are recognised as an expense during the period when the employees render the services.

Post-Employment Benefits

Defined Contribution Plans

The Company recognizes contribution payable to the provident fund scheme as an expense, when an employee renders the related service. If the contribution payable to the scheme for service received before the balance sheet date exceeds the contribution already paid, the deficit payable to the scheme is recognized as a liability after deducting the contribution already paid. If the contribution already paid exceeds the contribution due for services received before the balance sheet date, then excess is recognized as an asset to the extent that the pre-payment will lead to, for example, a reduction in future payment or a cash refund.

Defined Benefit Plans

The Company pays gratuity to the employees whoever has completed five years of service with the company at the time of resignation/superannuation. The gratuity is paid @15 days salary for every completed year of service as per the Payment of Gratuity Act, 1972.

The gratuity liability amount is contributed to the approved gratuity fund formed exclusively for gratuity payment to the employees. The gratuity fund has been approved by respective Income Tax authorities.

The liability in respect of gratuity and other post-employment benefits is calculated using the Projected Unit Credit Method and spread over the period during which the benefit is expected to be derived from employees' services.

Re-measurement of Defined Benefit Plans in respect of post-employment are charged to the Other Comprehensive Income.

(j) Tax Expenses

The tax expense for the period comprises of Current Tax and Deferred Income Tax. Tax is recognised in the Statement of Profit and loss, except to the extent that it relates to items recognised in the Other Comprehensive Income. In which case, the tax is also recognised in Other Comprehensive Income.

i) Current Tax

Current tax assets and liabilities are measured at the amount expected to be recovered from or paid to the Income Tax Authorities, based on tax rates and laws that are enacted at the Balance sheet date.

ii) Deferred Tax

Deferred tax is recognised on temporary differences between the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities in the Financial Statements and the corresponding tax bases used in the computation of taxable profit.

Deferred tax assets are recognised to the extent it is probable that the taxable profit will be available against which the deductible temporary differences and the carry forward of unused tax losses can be utilized.

Deferred tax liabilities and assets are measured at the tax rates that are expected to apply in the period in which the liability is settled or the asset realised, based on tax rates (and tax laws) that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the end of the reporting period.

The carrying amount of Deferred tax liabilities and assets are reviewed at the end of each reporting period.

(k) Foreign Currencies Transactions and Translation

Transactions in foreign currencies are recorded at the exchange rate prevailing on the date of transaction. Monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are translated at the functional currency closing rates of exchange at the reporting date. Exchange differences arising on settlement or translation of monetary items are recognised in Statement of Profit and Loss except to the extent of exchange differences which are regarded as an adjustment to interest costs on foreign currency borrowings that are directly attributable to the acquisition or construction

of qualifying assets which are capitalized as cost of assets.

Non-monetary items that are measured in terms of historical cost in a foreign currency are recorded using the exchange rates at the date of the transaction. Non-monetary items measured at fair value in a foreign currency are translated using the exchange rates at the date when the fair value was measured. The gain or loss arising on translation of nonmonetary items measured at fair value is treated in line with the recognition of the gain or loss on the change in fair value of the item (i.e. translation differences on items whose fair value gain or loss is recognised in Other Comprehensive Income or Statement of Profit and Loss are also recognised in Other Comprehensive Income or Statement of Profit and Loss, respectively).

In case of an asset, expense or income where a non-monetary advance is paid/received, the date of transaction is the date on which the advance was initially recognised. If there were multiple payments or receipts in advance, multiple dates of transactions are determined for each payment or receipt of advance consideration.

(I) Revenue Recognition

Revenue is recognized to the extent that it is probable that the economic benefits will flow to the Company and the revenue can be reliably measured, regardless of when the payment is being made. Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable, taking into account contractually defined terms of payment and excluding taxes or duties collected on behalf of the government.

- (1) Sale of goods: Revenue from the sale of goods is recognized when the significant risks and rewards of ownership of the goods have passed to the buyer, usually on delivery of the goods. Revenue from the sale of goods is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable, net of returns and allowances, trade discounts and volume rebates. Revenue is exclusive of tax which is collected on behalf of government.
- (2) Profit/ (Loss) on derivatives: Profit/ (Loss) on derivatives contracts on account of fair value changes are recognised as either income or expenses as the case may be in the profit and loss statement, except in case of derivative contract entered for Hedging Purpose.

Contract Balances

Trade Receivables

A receivable represents the Company's right to an amount of consideration that is unconditional.

Contract Liabilities

A contract liability is the obligation to transfer goods or services to a customer for which the Company has received consideration (or an amount of consideration is due) from the customer. If a customer pays consideration before the Company transfers goods or services to the customer, a contract liability is recognised when the payment is made or the payment is due (whichever is earlier). Contract liabilities are recognised as revenue when the Company performs under the contract.

Interest Income

Interest Income from a Financial Asset is recognised using effective interest rate method.

Dividend Income

Dividend Income is recognised when the Company's right to receive the amount has been established.

(m) Financial Instruments

(i) Financial Assets

A. Initial Recognition and Measurement

All Financial Assets are initially recognized at fair value except for Trade Receivables which are accounted at transaction cost. Transaction costs that are directly attributable to the acquisition or issue of financial assets, which are not at Fair Value Through Profit or Loss, are adjusted to the fair value on initial recognition. Purchase and sale of Financial Assets are recognised using trade date accounting.

B. Subsequent Measurement

a) Financial Assets measured at Amortised Cost (AC)

A Financial Asset is measured at Amortised Cost if it is held within a business model whose objective is to hold the asset in order to collect contractual cash flows and the contractual terms of the Financial Asset give rise on specified dates to cash flows that are solely payments of principal and interest on the principal amount outstanding.

b) Financial Assets measured at Fair Value Through Other Comprehensive Income (FVTOCI)

A Financial Asset is measured at FVTOCI if it is held within a business model whose objective is achieved by both collecting contractual cash flows and selling Financial Assets and the contractual terms of the Financial Asset give rise on specified dates to cash flows that are solely payments of principal and interest on the principal amount outstanding.

c) Financial Assets measured at Fair Value Through Profit or Loss (FVTPL)

A Financial Asset which is not classified in any of the above categories are measured at FVTPL.

Financial assets are reclassified subsequent to their recognition, if the Company changes its business model for managing those financial assets. Changes in business model are made and applied prospectively from the reclassification date which is the first day of immediately next reporting period following the changes in business model in accordance with principles laid down under Ind AS 109 – Financial Instruments.

C. Other Equity Investments

All other equity investments are measured at fair value, with value changes recognised in Statement of Profit and Loss, except for those equity investments for which the Company has elected to present the value changes in 'Other Comprehensive Income'. However dividend on such Equity Investment are recognised in the Statement of Profit and Loss when the Company has rights to received is established.

D. Impairment of Financial Assets

In accordance with Ind AS 109, the Company uses 'Expected Credit Loss' (ECL) model, for evaluating impairment of financial assets other than those measured at Fair Value Through Profit and Loss (FVTPL).

Expected credit losses are measured through a loss allowance at an amount equal to:

- (1) The 12 months expected credit losses (expected credit losses that result from those default events on the financial instrument that are possible within 12 months after the reporting date); or
- (2) Full lifetime expected credit losses (expected credit losses that result from all possible default events over the life of the financial instrument)

For Trade Receivables, the Company applies 'simplified approach' which requires expected lifetime losses to be recognised from initial recognition of the receivables. The company uses historical default rates to determine impairment loss on the portfolio of trade receivables. At every reporting date these historical default rates are reviewed and changes in the forward looking estimates are analysed.

For other assets, the Company uses 12 months ECL to provide for impairment loss where there is no significant increase in credit risk. If there is significant increase in credit risk full lifetime ECL is used.

E. Hedging Instrument

Hedge effectiveness is determined based on the principles laid down in the Guidance note on Derivatives issued by The Institute of Chartered Accountants of India. These derivatives are held for risk management purposes i.e. economic hedges but the Company has elected not to apply hedge accounting requirements At the inception of the hedge, the Company documents the relationship between the hedging instrument and the hedged item, the risk management objective, strategy for undertaking the hedge and the methods used to assess the hedge effectiveness. Hedge effectiveness is the degree to which changes in the fair value or cash flows of the hedged item that are attributable to a hedged risk are offset by changes in the fair value or cash flows of the hedging instrument. Hedge

effectiveness is ascertained at the time of inception of the hedge and periodically thereafter at Balance Sheet date. The portion of fair value gain/loss on the IRD that is determined to be an effective hedge is recognized directly in appropriate account i.e. 'Fair value change (gain/loss) on derivatives' in the Balance Sheet and the portion of fair value gain/loss that gets determined as ineffective hedge or ineffective portion of effective hedge, basis the hedge effectiveness assessment is recognized in the Statement of Profit and Loss. . Costs associated with derivative contracts are considered as at a point in time cost.

(ii) Financial liabilities

A. Initial Recognition and Measurement

All Financial Liabilities are recognized at fair value and in case of borrowings, net of directly attributable cost. Fees of recurring nature are directly recognised in the Statement of Profit and Loss as finance cost.

B. Subsequent Measurement

Financial liabilities are carried at amortized cost using the effective interest method. For trade and other payables maturing within one year from the balance sheet date, the carrying amounts approximate fair value due to the short maturity of these instruments.

(iii) Derecognition of Financial Instruments

The company derecognises a Financial Asset when the contractual rights to the cash flows from the Financial Asset expire or it transfers the Financial Asset and the transfer qualifies for derecognition under Ind AS 109. A Financial Liability (or a part of a financial liability) is derecognized from the company's Balance Sheet when the obligation specified in the contract is discharged or cancelled or expires.

(iv) Offsetting

Financial Assets and Financial Liabilities are offset and the net amount is presented in the balance sheet when, and only when, the Company has a legally enforceable right to set off the amount and it intends, either to settle them on a net basis or to realise the asset and settle the liability simultaneously.

(n) Earnings Per Share (EPS)

Basic earnings per share is calculated by dividing the net profit after tax by the weighted average number of equity shares outstanding during the year adjusted for bonus element in equity share. Diluted earnings per share adjusts the figures used in determination of basic earnings per share to take into account the conversion of all dilutive potential equity shares. Dilutive potential equity shares are deemed converted as at the beginning of the period unless issued at a later date.

3 Critical Accounting Judgments and Key Sources of Estimation Uncertainty

The preparation of the Company's Financial Statements requires management to make judgement, estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amount of revenue, expenses, assets and liabilities and the accompanying disclosures. Uncertainty about these assumptions and estimates could result in outcomes that require a material adjustment to the carrying amount of assets or liabilities affected in next financial years.

a) Depreciation / Amortisation and useful lives of Property, Plant and Equipment / Intangible Assets

Property, Plant and Equipment / Intangible Assets are depreciated / amortised over their estimated useful lives, after taking into account estimated residual value. Management reviews the estimated useful lives and residual values of the assets annually in order to determine the amount of depreciation / amortisation to be recorded during any reporting period. The useful lives and residual values are based on the Company's historical experience with similar assets and take into account anticipated technological changes. The depreciation / amortisation for future periods is revised if there are significant changes from previous estimates.

b) Recoverability of Trade Receivable

Judgements are required in assessing the recoverability of overdue trade receivables and determining whether a provision against those receivables is required. Factors considered include the credit rating of the counterparty, the amount and timing of anticipated future payments and any possible actions that can be taken to mitigate the risk of non-payment.

c) Provisions

Provisions and liabilities are recognized in the period when it becomes probable that there will be a future outflow of funds resulting from past operations or events and the amount of cash outflow can be reliably estimated. The timing of recognition and quantification of the liability require the application of judgement to existing facts and circumstances, which can be subject to change. The carrying amounts of provisions and liabilities are reviewed regularly and revised to take account of changing facts and circumstances.

d) Impairment of Financial and Non-Financial Assets

The impairment provisions for Financial Assets are based on assumptions about risk of default and expected cash loss rates. The company uses judgement in making these assumptions and selecting the inputs to the impairment calculation, based on company's past history, existing market conditions as well as forward-looking estimates at the end of each reporting period.

In case of non-financial assets the company estimates asset's recoverable amount, which is higher of an asset's or Cash Generating Units (CGU's) fair value less costs of disposal and its value in use.

In assessing value in use, the estimated future cash flows are discounted to their present value using pre-tax discount rate that reflects current market assessments of the time value of money and the risks specific to the asset. In determining fair value less costs of disposal, recent market transactions are taken into account, if no such transactions can be identified, an appropriate valuation model is used.

e) Recognition of Deferred Tax Assets and Liabilities

Deferred tax assets and liabilities are recognised for deductible temporary differences and unused tax losses for which there is probability of utilisation against the future taxable profit. The Company uses judgement to determine the amount of deferred tax that can be recognised, based upon the likely timing and the level of future taxable profits and business developments.

f) Fair Value Measurement

For estimates relating to fair value of financial instruments refer Note 32 of financial statements.

4 Recent Accounting Pronouncements

Ministry of Corporate Affairs ("MCA") notifies new standards or amendments to the existing standards under Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Rules as issued from time to time. In May 2025, MCA notified amendments to Ind AS 21 - The Effects of Changes in Foreign Exchange Rates, applicable w.e.f. April 1, 2025. The Company has reviewed the amendment and based on its evaluation has determined that it does not have any significant impact in its financial statements.

In August 2025, MCA notified the following amendments to:

- (a) Ind AS 1, Presentation of Financial Statements, applicable w.e.f. April 1, 2025 – The amendment relates to classification of liabilities as current or noncurrent and non-current liabilities with covenants. In the context of classifying a liability as current, it removes the requirement of existence of a right to defer settlement for at least 12 months after the reporting date and instead requires that the said right should exist on the reporting date and have substance. The amendment also introduces guidance on classification of liabilities with covenants. The Company has no impact of these amendments in its classification criteria of current and non-current liabilities.
- (b) Ind AS 7, Statement of Cash Flows and Ind AS 107, Financial Instruments: Disclosures, applicable w.e.f. April 1, 2025 – The amendment in Ind AS 7 requires to inform users of financial statements of the existence of supplier finance arrangements and explain the nature of the arrangements, the carrying amount of liabilities and the range of payment due dates. Ind AS 107 has been amended to add supplier finance arrangements as a factor that may cause concentration of liquidity risk. B. Fair value Measurement

The financial instruments are categorized into three levels based on the inputs used to arrive at fair value measurements as described below:

Level 1: Quoted prices (unadjusted) in active markets for identical assets or liabilities; and

Level 2: Inputs other than the quoted prices included within Level 1 that are observable for the asset or liability, either directly or indirectly.

Level 3: Inputs based on unobservable market data.

Valuation Methodology

All financial Instruments are initially recognised and subsequently re-measured at fair value as described below:

- The fair value of investments in quoted Equity Shares is measured at quoted price.
- Fair value of remaining financial assets and liabilities are carried at amortised cost.

C. Financial Risk Management

The Company's activities expose it to market risk, credit risk and liquidity risk. This note explains the sources of risks which the entity is exposed to and how it mitigates that risk.

Market Risk

Market risk is the risk that the fair value or future cash flows of a financial instrument will fluctuate because of changes in market prices. Market prices comprise three types of risk: currency rate risk, interest rate risk and other price risks, such as equity price risk and commodity risk.

Foreign Currency Risk

The Company is not exposed to any foreign exchange risk as at the respective reporting dates.

Interest Rate Risk

The Company is not exposed to interest rate risk as the Company has no borrowing or loan or has fixed rate of borrowings as at the respective reporting dates.

Commodity and Other Price Risk

The company enters into paired transactions wherein the contract of purchase of physical commodities are immediately hedged by entering into derivative contract to avoid any directional risk.

Credit Risk

Credit risk is the risk that a customer or counterparty to a financial instrument will fail to perform or pay amounts due causing financial loss to the company. It arises from cash and cash equivalents, derivative financial instruments, deposits from financial institutions and principally from credit exposures to customers relating to outstanding receivables. The Company deals with highly rated counterparties.

Cash and Cash Equivalents and Other Investments

The Company is exposed to counter party risk relating to medium term deposits with banks.

The Company considers factors such as track record, size of the institution, market reputation and service standards to select the banks with which balances and deposits are maintained. The Company does not maintain significant cash and deposit balances other than those required for its day to day operations.

Liquidity Risk

Liquidity risk is the risk that suitable sources of funding for the Company's business activities may not be available. Prudent liquidity risk management implies maintaining sufficient cash and marketable securities and the availability of funding through an adequate amount of committed credit facilities to meet obligations when due, so that the Company is not forced to obtain funds at higher rates. The Company monitors rolling forecasts of the Company's cash flow position and ensure that the Company is able to meet its financial obligation at all times including contingencies.
