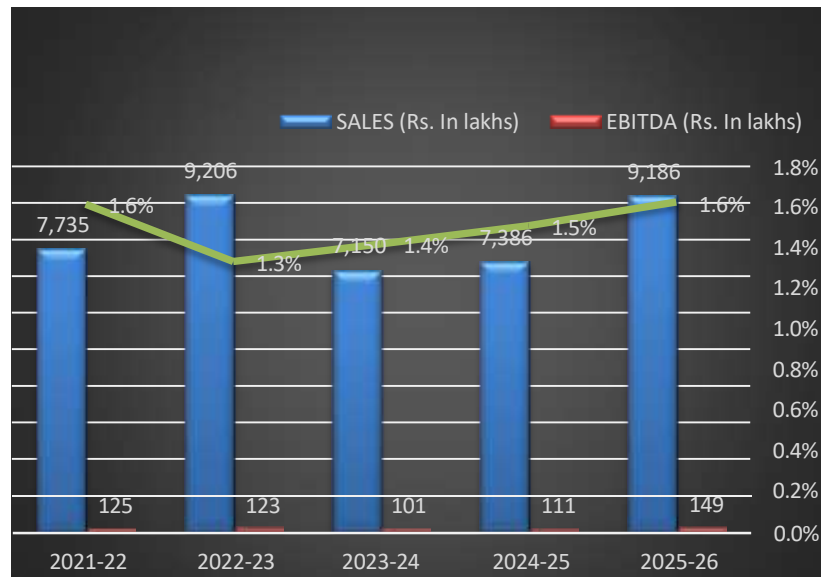

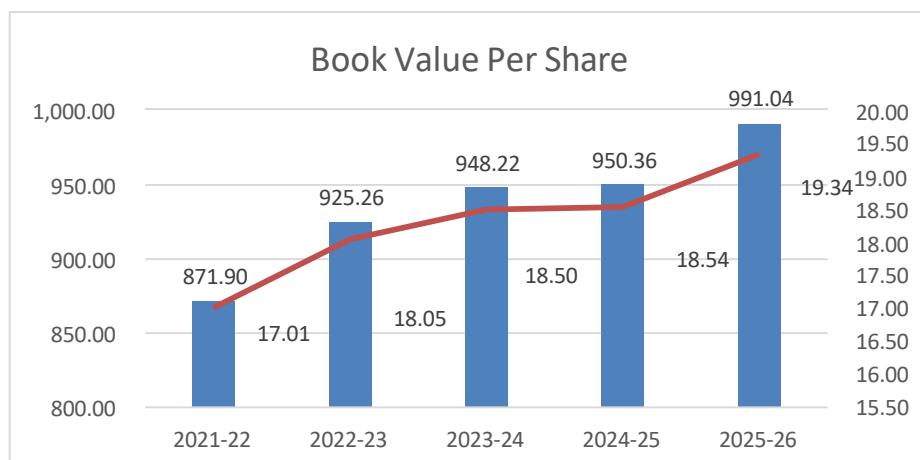

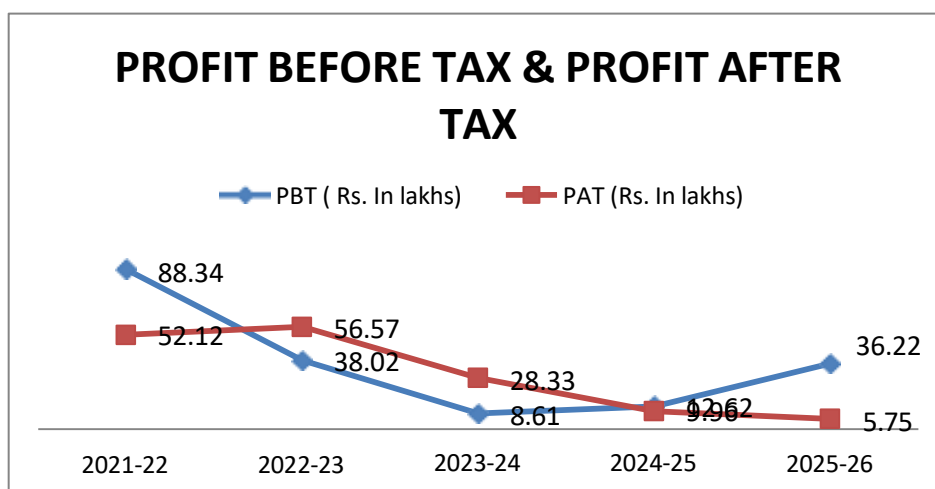

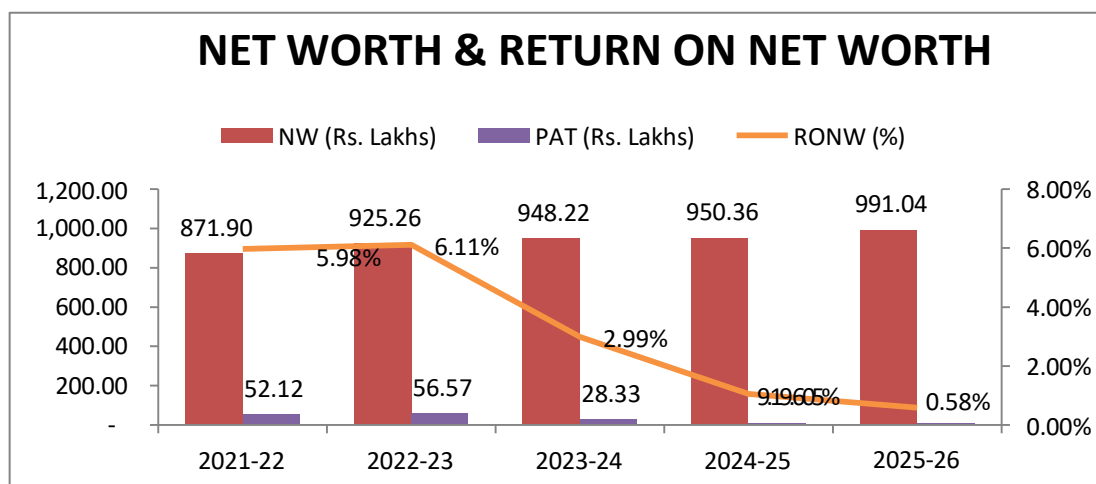

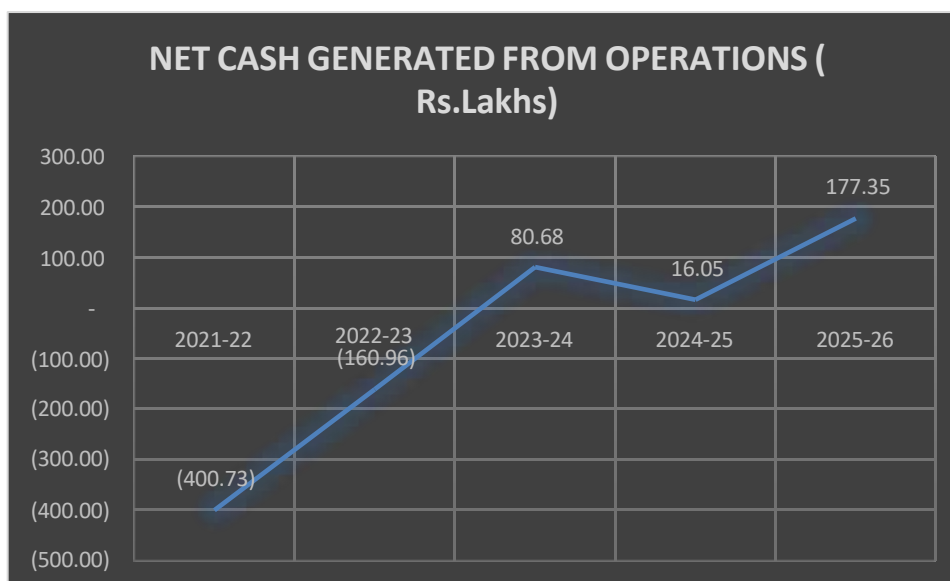

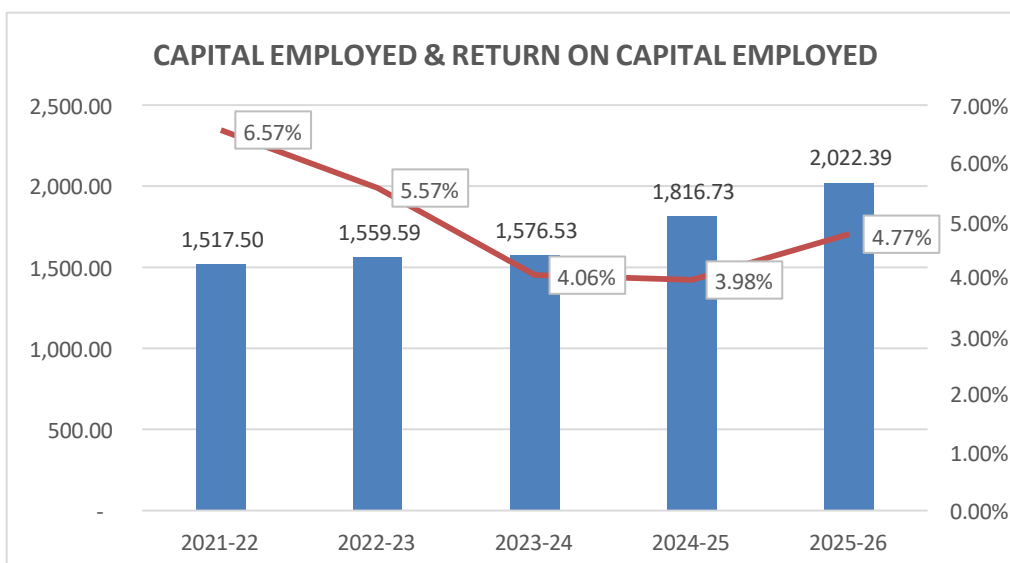

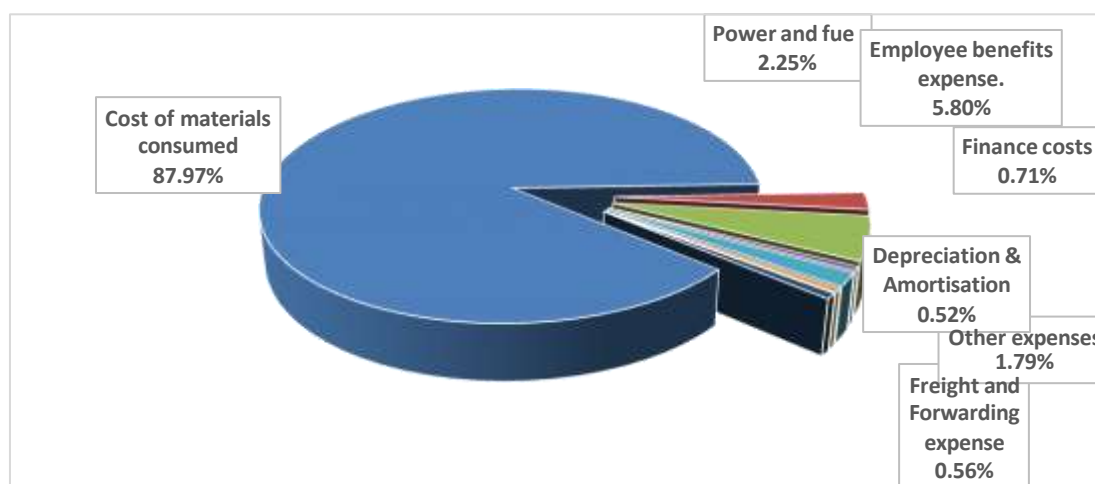

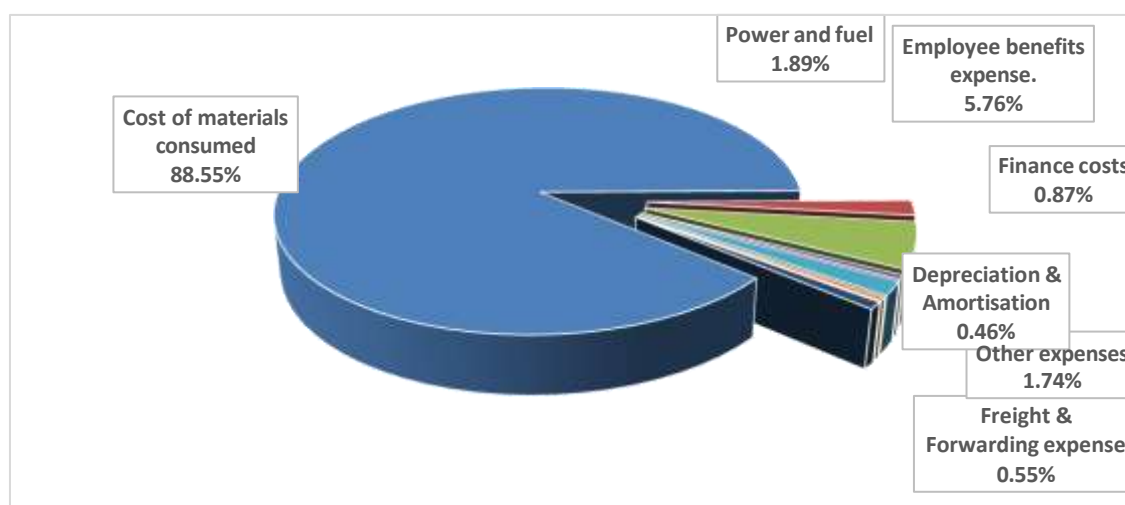

terms and conditions; fees and tenure as may be approved by the Trustees and as permitted under applicable laws.

Item No. 8: Approval for Opening and Operation Suspense Escrow Account in Stock holding corporation of India

To ensure compliance with these evolving regulatory mandates, your Company proposes to open and maintain a dedicated depository account with Stock Holding Corporation of India Limited (SHCIL),

designated under the strict regulatory nomenclature: 'Tamil Nadu Steel Tubes Limited - Suspense Escrow Demat Account'.

The board accordingly recommends creation of 'Tamil Nadu Steel Tubes Limited - Suspense Escrow Demat Account' for the purpose of funding and managing the Company's gratuity liability of the Company as set out in Item No. 8 by way of Ordinary Resolution.

borrowing limit of Rs. 25 Crores approved by the Members at the AGM held for the year 2020-21. The enhanced facility will be availed on such terms and conditions, including interest, security, margin, repayment and other conditions, as may be agreed with City Union Bank Ltd,

The Board of Directors, at its meeting held on August 14, 2026, considered and approved the proposal and recommends the Special Resolution set out at Item No. 9 for approval by the Members.

None of the Directors or Key Managerial Personnel or their relatives is concerned or interested in this resolution.

Item No. 10: Transfer of leasehold right of 6.5 acres of Company's Land situated at plots B-10 and C-13 Industrial Complex, M.M. Nagar- 603209, Chengalpattu District, Tamil Nadu from Mrs. Durga Devi Goyal to her legal Heir Mr. Rakesh Goyal

The Company is the owner of 6.75 acres of land situated at M.M. Nagar - plots B-10 and C-13 Industrial Complex, M.M. Nagar- 603209, Chengalpattu District, Tamil Nadu.

Mrs. Durga Devi Goyal, owing to her old age, has proposed to transfer the leasehold rights in respect of the said property in favour of her son, Mr. Rakesh Goyal.

Mr. Rakesh Goyal is an existing shareholder of the Company and holds 353,750 equity shares, representing 6.90% of the paid-up equity share capital of the Company.

The Company has a security deposit of ₹13.20 crores in connection with the said lease arrangement. The proposed transfer of the leasehold rights is intended to ensure continuity of the existing lease arrangement and shall be subject to the terms and conditions of the existing lease agreement, including the rights and obligations relating to the said security deposit.

The proposed initiative is expected to provide the following benefits to the Company:

1. Reduction in dependence on conventional sources of electricity;
2. Potential reduction and optimization of long-term energy costs;
3. Availability of an alternative and renewable source of energy for the factory operations;
4. Improvement in energy efficiency and sustainability of the Company's operations;
5. Contribution towards the Company's environmental and renewable energy objectives.

The Company may incur such capital expenditure and/or operating expenditure as may be necessary for installation, operation and maintenance of the solar power system with private solar power manufacturers, subject to applicable approvals and the terms approved by the Board.

The exact financial commitment in respect of the proposed initiative will depend upon the capacity of the solar power system, prevailing price of equipment, power tariffs, and the terms negotiated with the selected manufacturer/developer/supplier. The Board will ensure that the arrangements are commercially reasonable and in the best interests of the Company.

Considering the cost savings and promoting the use of renewable sources from the installation of Solar Panel Power, the board has recommended the Special Resolution set out at Item No. 12 for approval by the Members.

- f. that proper systems have been devised to ensure compliance with the provisions of all applicable laws and that such systems were adequate and operating effectively.

D.P.V. & Associates**, Chartered Accountants, [Firm's Registration No.011688S] Sri Ranga, No.51 Mambalam High Road, T.Nagar, Chennai-600 017, as the Statutory Auditors of the Company, (after obtaining their consent letter & valid peer review certificate issued by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of India) to hold office for a term of 5 (five) years from the conclusion of the 43rd Annual General Meeting (AGM) of the Company held for the financial year 2022-23 until the conclusion of the 48th AGM of the company for the financial year 2026-27 on such remuneration as may be mutually agreed upon between the said Auditors and Board of Directors of the Company.

M/s. Latha Venkatesh & Associates has confirmed that they are free from disqualification specified under Section 141(3) and proviso to Section 148 (3) read with Section 141(4) of the Companies Act 2013 and that their appointment meets the requirements of Section 141(3)(g) of the Companies Act, 2013. They have further confirmed their independent status and an arm's length relationship with the Company.

The remuneration payable to the Cost Auditor is required to be placed before the Members at the ensuing AGM for their confirmation and approval. Based on the report of IA, process owners undertake corrective action in their respective areas and thereby strengthen the controls. Cost of Materials consumed

Cost of materials consumed was Rs. 8,053.86 Lakhs in 2025-26 as against Rs. 6,774.87 Lakhs during the year 2024-25.

The Company's Sustainable Development programme continues to be comprehensive and robust.

Power and Fuel

The Power & Fuel spent in 2025-26 was Rs. 207.20 Lakhs, as compared to Rs.140.15 Lakhs spent in 2024-25. The Company continues to focus on reducing the overall cost of fuel as well as shifting its dependence on linkage by optimizing the fuel mix to enhance the use of alternative fuels.

Freight and Forwarding expenses

Freight and forwarding expenses during the year is Rs. 51.63 Lakhs as compared to Rs. 40.78 Lakhs in 2024-25.

Employee costs

Overall employee costs increased by 25.12 % in 2025-26.

Other Expenditure

Other expenditure increased to Rs.165.13 Lakhs for 2025-26 of total expenditure of the

company, as compared to Rs.128.88 Lakhs in the previous year 2024-25.

Sustainable Development

CO2 Emissions:

Your Company is committed to cut its carbon footprint in line with the Low Carbon Technology Roadmap for the Pipe Industry.

Green Energy:

Controlling Emissions: The installation of dust monitors as per the statutory requirement of TNPCB was completed at our plant.

Water Performance:

Performance and to achieve a water positive status, the company has focused its efforts on two approaches:

- Reduction of freshwater intake by lowering water demand in process and non-process areas and wastewater recycling after treatment. Water metering and monitoring systems were installed.
- Conservation of water by harvesting rainwater in plants, and sustained

Water harvesting measures undertaken over the years has helped our Plant become self-reliant without being dependent on natural water sources like rivers and borewells. These two approaches have helped your Company reduce its specific water consumption.

Bio-Diversity

Your Company is committed to the conservation of bio-diversity. Efforts on biodiversity conservation are focused on following areas:

- To study and assess the biodiversity operated by the Company.
- On-ground implementation of activities which conserve biodiversity:
- Afforestation activities in and around our plant premises with native species of trees at our Plant.

Health & Safety (H & S Policy–Initiatives)

H & S Business processes and information systems across the Company were further strengthened with the proposed launch of an online H&S application called Click2Safety. This application helps streamline reporting in a manner that gives access to all employees, is standardized, is faster and

enriches the H&S Database.

Logistics Safety

Logistics safety is one of the major focus areas for your Company. Ongoing initiatives undertaken in this regard included provisions of various plant and parking level protocols, creation of certain hygiene factors for truck drivers and their crew such as amenities at truck parking yards, improving tarpaulin tying practices, improving Personal Protective Equipment usage, renewal of logistics contracts to include safety parameters and issue of passports, for drivers as well as vehicles which are informal internal databases that provide details of individual identity, registration, roadworthiness and safety preparedness.

Human Resources

The company adopted a functional organization structure which is intended to enable the organization to be more collaborative, agile and streamlined in implementing strategy, harnessing internal functional expertise to the fullest and in enhancing stakeholder value.

Employee Relations

The HR policy is intended as a part of the Company's continuous efforts to offer one of the Best Places to Work in the Pipe Industry. This policy was designed to attract new talent and motivate existing employees to contribute to their peak performance levels. The Company's HR function is recognized in the sector for its engagement and leadership development processes in nurturing talent necessary to keep the Organization's talent pool future ready. The Company continued with efforts to ensure that its pool of human resources is —future readyl through its robust processes of learning & development, capability building and its development programme for shop floor associates. Efforts continued to be taken to develop leadership lines as well as to enhance technical and functional capabilities with special focus on nurturing young talent, in order to meet future challenges.

India Manufacturing Transformation (IMT)

The IMT Programme aims to make the work-culture in the core areas of production and maintenance in the Steel Pipe Plant more contemporary. This envisages a lean manufacturing organization design with multitasking,

standardization and simplification of manufacturing processes, improved productivity standards, introduction of a centralized maintenance design with better planning and benchmarking with the best-in-class. These initiatives will enable the Steel Pipe Plant to operate more efficiently in a competitive environment and render them compatible with National manufacturing standards.

Industrial Relations

Employee Relations at all the Units remained cordial. This has helped to build a healthy relationship and resolve issues through mutual dialogue.

Prevention of Sexual Harassment of Women at Workplace

The company has policy on prevention of sexual harassment at workplace in line with the requirement of the Sexual Harassment of Women at the Workplace (Prevention, Prohibition & Redressal) Act, 2013. An Internal Complaints Committee (ICC) to redress complaints received regarding sexual harassment has been constituted in compliance with the requirements of the said Act. The policy extends to all employees (permanent, contractual, temporary and trainees). Employees at all levels are being sensitized about the new Policy and the remedies available thereunder.

During the year, the Company has not received any complaint on sexual harassment and there are no complaints pending.

Awareness programme was conducted across the Company to sensitize the employees to uphold the dignity of their colleagues at workplace, particularly with respect to prevention of sexual harassment.

Business Risks and Opportunities

The Business Risk Management Committee, chaired by an Independent Director, is functioning as required under SEBI Regulations. The committee discussed the physical risk and marketing risk. Details of this Committee, its terms of reference and functioning are set out in the Corporate Governance Report.

The Company has implemented a Business Risk Management Policy which lays down the framework to identify business risks at both corporate level and at Business Segment level.

The Company's approach to addressing business risks is comprehensive and enables timely anticipation of risks and identification of opportunities enabling appropriate responses, thereby enhancing the Company's competitive advantage. Separate approaches are defined for each of the main business segments of Steel

Pipes and forms an integral part of the company's Mid Term Planning cycle.

The company is faced with various risks at an operational level which very often have the potential to offer business opportunities. Some of the main risks are discussed herein:

Proactive Safety Culture

Your company has identified Health & Safety of employees and workmen as one of its key focus areas. These include possibilities in the areas of the availability and sourcing of Raw Materials, Energy, Efficiency and Conservation, Logistics and production development and market segmentation based on research, imbibing best practices in manufacturing and other areas leading productivity improvement.

Safety on National roads is largely dependent on various factors such as the overall condition and maintenance of roads, vehicle roadworthiness and general observance of road traffic laws. As part of its Logistics Safety function and Indian Road Safety Programme, the Company has taken several initiatives including regular simulator-based driver training, vehicle inspection for roadworthiness and the use of Global Positioning Systems (GPS) to monitor outbound movement of Steel Pipes to the end user.

Opportunities

Your Company also regularly examines potential opportunities created from situations involving business risks.

Policy for Selection of Directors, KMP'S and Determining Directors' Independence

Introduction:

Tamil Nādu Steel Tubes Ltd (TNT) believes that an enlightened Board consciously creates a culture of leadership to provide a long-term vision and policy approach to improve the quality of governance. Towards this, TNT ensures constitution of a Board of Directors with an appropriate composition, size, diversified expertise and experience and commitment to discharge their responsibilities and duties effectively.

TNT recognizes the importance of Independent Directors in achieving the effectiveness of the Board. TNT aims to have an optimum combination of Executive, Non-Executive and Independent Directors.

Scope and Exclusion:

This Policy sets out the guiding principles for the Human Resources, Nomination and Remuneration Committee for identifying persons who are qualified to become Directors and to determine the independence of Directors, in case of their appointment as independent directors of the Company.

Terms and references:

'Director' means a director appointed to the Board of a company.

'Nomination and Remuneration Committee' means the committee constituted by TNT's Board in accordance with the provisions of Section 178 of the Companies Act, 2013 and Regulation 19 of the Securities and Exchange Board of India (Listing Obligations and Disclosure Requirements) Regulations, 2015 (Listing Regulations).

'Independent Director' means a director referred to in sub-section (6) of Section 149 of the Companies Act, 2013 and Regulation 16(1)(b) of Listing Regulations.

Policy:

Qualifications and criteria

- The Business Responsibility, Nomination and Remuneration (BRNR) Committee, and the Board, shall review on an annual basis, appropriate skills, knowledge and experience required of the Board as a whole and its individual members. The objective is to have a Board with diverse background and experience that are relevant for the Company's global operations.
- In evaluating the suitability of individual Board members, the HRNR Committee may take into account factors, such as:
- General understanding of the Company's business dynamics, global business and social perspective;
- Educational and professional background;
- Standing in the profession;
- Personal and professional ethics, integrity and values;

- Willingness to devote sufficient time and energy to carrying out their duties and responsibilities effectively.
- The proposed appointee shall also fulfill the following requirements:
- Shall possess a Director Identification Number;
- Shall not be disqualified under the Companies Act, 2013;
- Shall give his written consent to act as a Director;
- Shall endeavor to attend all Board Meetings and wherever he is appointed as a Committee Member, the Committee Meetings;
- Shall abide by the Code of Conduct established by the Company for Directors and Senior Management Personnel;
- Shall disclose his concern or interest in any company or company or bodies corporate, firms, or other association of individuals including his shareholding at the first meeting of the Board in every financial year and thereafter whenever there is a change in the disclosures already made;
- Such other requirements may be prescribed, from time to time, under the Companies Act, 2013, Listing Regulations and other relevant laws.
- The NRC Committee shall evaluate each individual with the objective of having a group that best enables the success of the Company's business.

Criteria of Independence

The NRC Committee shall assess the independence of Directors at the time of appointment/re-appointment, and the Board shall assess the same annually. The Board shall re-assess determinations of independence when any new interests or relationships are disclosed by Director.

The criteria of independence, as laid down in Companies Act, 2013 and Listing Regulations, is as below: An independent director in relation to a company, means a non-executive director, other than a managing director or a whole-time director or a nominee director—

- a. Who, in the opinion of the Board, is a person of integrity and possesses relevant expertise and experience;
- b. (i) Who is or was not a promoter of the company or its holding, subsidiary or associate company;
(ii) Who is not related to promoters or directors in the company, its holding, subsidiary or associate company
- c. who has or had no pecuniary relationship with the company, its holding, subsidiary or associate company, or their promoters, or directors, during the two immediately preceding financial years or during the current financial year;
- d. none of whose relatives has or had pecuniary relationship or transaction with the company, its holding, subsidiary or associate company, or their promoters, or directors, amounting to two per cent or more of its gross turnover or total income or 50 lakh rupees or such higher amount as may be prescribed, whichever is lower, during the two immediately preceding financial years or during the current financial year;

- e. who, neither himself nor any of his relatives—
- i) holds or has held the position of a key managerial personnel or is or has been an employee of the company or its holding, subsidiary or associate company in any of the three financial years immediately preceding the financial year in which he is proposed to be appointed;
 - ii) is or has been an employee or proprietor or a partner, in any of the three financial years immediately preceding the financial year in which he is proposed to be appointed, of-
 - iii) A firm of auditors or company secretaries in practice or cost auditors of the company or its holding, subsidiary or associate company; or any legal or a consulting firm that has or had any transaction with the company, its holding, subsidiary or associate company amounting to 10 per cent or more of the gross turnover of such firm;
 - iv) Holds together with his relative's two percent or more of the total voting power of the company; or
 - v) is a Chief Executive or director, by whatever name called, of any non-profit organization that receives twenty-five percent or more of its receipts or corpus from the company, any of its promoters, directors or its holding, subsidiary or associate company or that holds two percent or more of the total voting power of the company; or
 - vi) is a material supplier, service provider or customer or a lessor or lessee or the company
- f. shall possess appropriate skills, experience and knowledge in one or more fields of finance, law, management, sales, marketing, administration, research, corporate governance, technical operations, corporate social responsibility or other disciplines related to the company's business.
- g. shall possess such other qualifications as may be prescribed, from time to time, under the Companies Act, 2013.
- h. Who is not less than 21 years of age

The Independent Directors shall abide by the —Code for Independent Directors‡ as specified in Schedule IV to the Companies Act, 2013.

Other Directorships / Committee Memberships

The Board members are expected to have adequate time and expertise and experience to contribute to effective Board performance. Accordingly, members should voluntarily limit their directorships in other listed public limited companies in such a way that it does not interfere with their role as directors of the Company. The NRC Committee shall take into account the nature of, and the time involved in a Director's service on other Boards, in evaluating the suitability of the individual Director and making its recommendations to the Board. A Director shall not serve as Director in more than 20 companies out of which not more than 10 shall be Public Limited Companies.

A Director shall not serve as an Independent Director in more than 7 Listed Companies and not more than Three Listed Companies in case he is serving as a Whole-time Director in any Listed Company.

A Director shall not be a member in more than 10 Committees or act as Chairman of more than 5 Committees across all companies in which he holds directorships.

For the purpose of considering the limit of the Committees, Audit Committee and Stakeholders Relationship Committee of all Public Limited Companies, whether listed or not, shall be included and all other companies including Private Limited Companies, Foreign Companies and Companies under Section 8 of the Companies Act, 2013 shall be excluded.

Individual remuneration shall be determined within the appropriate grade and shall be based on various factors such as job profile, skill sets, seniority, experience and prevailing remuneration levels for equivalent jobs.

The objective of this report is to convey the Management's perspective on the external environment and steel industry, as well as strategy, operating and financial performance, material developments in human resources and industrial relations, risks and opportunities and internal control systems and their adequacy in the Company during the Financial Year 2025-26 (FY 2025-26). External Environment**Global Economy**

The global economy in the current year 2025 and into current year 2026 moved beyond the phase of uneven post-pandemic recovery and entered a more complex environment characterized by geopolitical tensions, changing trade dynamics and volatility in energy markets. Global GDP growth for CY 2026 is projected at approximately 3.1%, while inflationary trends and commodity-related pressures continued to influence trade activity, investment decisions and monetary policy across major economies. Although inflation moderates compared to previous years, geopolitical developments and supply-side disruptions continued to create uncertainty across energy markets and global trade flows, contributing to cautious monetary policy stances and elevated market volatility.

These developments further accelerated structural changes across global manufacturing and supply chains. Businesses increasingly adopted diversification strategies, including regionalization of manufacturing operations, 'China Plus One' sourcing approaches and supplier network restructuring, aimed at enhancing resilience and operational flexibility. In this environment, emerging economies with established manufacturing capabilities and strong domestic demand continued to gain strategic relevance. India further strengthened its position as the world's fastest-growing major economy, with real GDP growth estimated at 7.4%-7.8% in FY 2025-26. Economic growth remained supported by resilient domestic consumption, sustained public capital expenditure and manufacturing-focused policy measures. Initiatives such as the Production Linked Incentive (PLI) schemes and Atmanirbhar Bharat continued to support the development of domestic industrial ecosystems, while ongoing investments in infrastructure, logistics and industrial capacity enhanced India's attractiveness as a long-term manufacturing and supply-chain destination.

Indian Economy

India continued to reinforce its position as the world's fastest-growing major economy, with real GDP growth estimated between 7.4% and 7.8% in FY 2025-26, supported by Gross Value Added (GVA) growth of 7.3%. Economic activity remained driven by resilient domestic consumption, sustained investments and the continued strength of the services sector. Looking ahead, India's real GDP growth, as at the date of this report, is projected to remain robust at 6.8%-7.2% in FY 2026-27, underpinned by favorable demographics, expanding economic

activity and ongoing structural reforms. Growth was supported by the twin engines of consumption and investment. Private consumption increased to approximately 61.5% of GDP, its highest level in over a decade, aided by a benign inflation environment and improved household purchasing power. Private Final Consumption Expenditure (PFCE) expanded by 7.5% during the first half of FY 2025-26, while public capital expenditure remained a key growth driver at 3.4% of GDP. The Union Budget 2026-27 further strengthened the investment cycle with public capital expenditure of ₹12.2 Lakh Crores. Strong Gross Fixed Capital Formation (GFCF) and approximately USD 50 Billion in greenfield investments during the first three quarters of CY 2025 reflected continued confidence in India's long-term growth prospects. The Government continued to balance fiscal discipline with growth-oriented policy measures, targeting a fiscal deficit of 4.3% of GDP in FY 2026-27. Manufacturing-focused initiatives, including the Production Linked Incentive (PLI) schemes, continued to strengthen domestic industrial capabilities and support investment-led growth. India's outlook remains supported by strong domestic demand, infrastructure development and manufacturing expansion, although geopolitical tensions, energy price volatility and evolving global trade dynamics may create near-term uncertainties. Industry Structure and Developments

Against the backdrop of a stabilizing global economy and India's infrastructure-led growth momentum, the steel and pipe manufacturing industry continues to remain structurally linked to capital expenditure cycles across energy, water, oil & gas transport, and industrial sectors.

Global Steel and Tubes Industry

Global steel demand in CY 2025 is stabilizing at 1.75 Billion tons, marking the trough of the current cycle, with recovery expected from CY 2026 onwards. While infrastructure spending and energy transition investments provide underlying support, demand remains constrained by China's structural slowdown and persistent global overcapacity.

Regional divergence is becoming more pronounced, with growth led by India, ASEAN, and the Middle East, while Europe remains structurally challenged.

The global steel tubes market (USD 80-85 Billion) is entering a multi-year upcycle, driven by a global energy infrastructure investment cycle, particularly in the Middle East, where 150 pipeline projects are underway. This is accelerating the shift towards high-value, specialized products such as seamless pipes and large-diameter line pipes. Structurally, the industry is transitioning from commoditized steel towards value-added, application-specific products, supported by energy transition, decarbonization, and industrial policy trends.

Indian Steel and Pipes Industry

India continues to consolidate its position as a key growth engine for global steel demand, with apparent consumption of 140-150 Million tons in CY 2025 and an estimated market size of USD 150 Billion-180 Billion. Within this, the domestic steels and steel pipes and tubes segment represents a ~ Rs. 55,000-65,000 Crores (~USD 6.5-8 Billion) market, with volumes of ~12-14 Million

tons, supported by strong demand from energy, infrastructure, and water transmission sectors.

Key Trends and Growth Drivers

Supply Chain Realignment The global „China-plus-one” strategy continues to benefit Indian manufacturers capable of meeting stringent global certifications, redirecting export inquiries towards the Indian subcontinent.

Shift to High-Alloy Complexity The industry is moving away from commodities structural steel towards value-added specialty materials engineered for hyper-corrosive and high temperature environments.

Water Infrastructure Expansion Rapid urbanization and state-level water distribution schemes continue to support consistent volume demand for carbon steel coated pipes.

The dual mandate of securing legacy hydrocarbon supplies while transitioning to clean energy is driving massive capex. This creates simultaneous demand for standard carbon steel line pipes (for oil & gas) and high-specification stainless steel tubes (for hydrogen-ready pipelines and LNG terminals). India plans 34,233 km of gas pipeline network expansion CGD (City Gas Distribution) coverage expanding to ~70%+ of the population

Government Initiatives

Production-linked Incentive (PLI) Scheme 1.2 The Government's massive push to localize specialty steel production resulted in MOUs for 85 projects committing ₹11,887 Crores in FY 2025-26. 1. COMPANY'S PHILOSOPHY ON CORPORATE GOVERNANCE

3. COMMITTEES OF BOARD:

Having regard to the significant contribution that Committees make in assisting the Board of Directors in discharging its duties and responsibilities and with a view to focus on various areas of the business, the Board has constituted the following Committees viz. Audit Committee, Stakeholders' Relationship Committee, Nomination & Remuneration Committee, Risk Management Committee, Health Safety, Environment & Women Protection Committee Meeting and Corporate Social Responsibility (CSR) Committee.

The Board, in consultation with the Nomination and Remuneration Committee, is responsible for assigning and fixing terms of service for Committee members. It delegates these powers to the Nomination and Remuneration Committee.

The Chairman of the Board, in consultation with the Company Secretary and the Committee Chairperson, determines the frequency and duration of the Committee meetings.

The constitution, terms of reference and the functioning of the existing Committees of the Board is explained herein. Each of these Committees have the requisite expertise to handle issues relevant to their field. These Committees spend considerable time and give focused attention to the various issues placed before it and the guidance provided by these Committees lends immense value and enhances the decision-making process of the Board.

Normally, all the Committees meet four times a year. The recommendations of the Committees are submitted to the Board for approval. During the year, all recommendations of the Committees were approved by the Board. The quorum for meetings is the higher of two members or one-third of the total number of members of the committee. The Board reviews the functioning of these Committees from time to time. The terms of reference and role of the Audit Committee are as per guidelines set out in the Listing Regulations and Section 177 of Companies Act, 2013. The Committee meets periodically and inter alia reviews:

Financial Reporting and Related Processes:

- Oversight of the Company's financial reporting process and financial information submitted to the Stock Exchanges, regulatory authorities or the public.
- Review with the Management, the quarterly unaudited financial statements and the Auditors' Limited Review Report thereon, audited annual financial statements and Auditors' Report thereon before submission to the Board for approval. This would, inter alia, include reviewing changes in the accounting policies, if any, and reasons for the same. Major accounting estimates based on exercise of judgment by the Management, significant adjustments made in the financial statements and/or recommendation, if any, made by the Statutory Auditors in this regard.
- Review of the Management Discussion & Analysis of financial and operational performance.

The terms of reference of the Committee inter-alia, include the following:

- Succession planning of the Board of Directors and Management Executive Committee;
- Identifying and selection of candidates for appointment as Directors / Independent Directors based on certain laid down criteria;
- Identifying potential individuals for appointments as Key Managerial Personnel and all Ex-Co Members;
- Formulate and review from time to time the policy for selection and appointment of Directors, Key Managerial Personnel and Members of the Executive Committee and their remuneration;
- Review the performance of the Board of Directors, Key Managerial Personnel and Members of the Executive Committee based on certain criteria as approved by the Board. In reviewing the overall remuneration of the Board of Directors, Key Managerial Personnel and Executive Committee Members, the Committee ensures that the remuneration is reasonable and sufficient to attract, retain and motivate the best managerial talent, the relationship of remuneration to performance is clear and meets appropriate performance benchmarks and that the remuneration involves a balance between fixed and incentive pay reflecting short-term and long-term objectives of the Company.

Performance Evaluation of the Board and Individual Directors:

One of the key functions of the Board is to monitor and review the Board evaluation framework. The Board works with the nomination and remuneration committee to lay down the evaluation criteria for the performance of the Chairman, the Board, Board committees, and executive / non-executive / independent directors through peer evaluation, excluding the director being evaluated.

Independent directors have three key roles - governance, control and guidance. Some of the performance indicators, based on which the independent directors are evaluated, include:

- The ability to contribute to and monitor our corporate governance practices
- The ability to contribute by introducing best international practices to address business challenges and risks
- Active participation in long-term strategic planning
- Commitment to the fulfilment of a director's obligations and fiduciary responsibilities; these include participation in Board and committee meetings.

6. INDEPENDENT DIRECTORS

The Companies Act, 2013 and the Listing Regulations define an „independent director“ as a person who is not a promoter or employee or one of the key managerial personnel of the company or its subsidiaries. Further, the person should not have a material pecuniary relationship or transactions with the company or its subsidiaries, during the two immediately preceding financial years or during the current financial year, apart from receiving remuneration as an independent director. We abide by these definitions of independent director. Based on the disclosures received from all the independent directors and in the opinion of the Board, the independent directors fulfil the conditions specified in the Companies Act 2013, the Listing Regulations and are independent of the Management.

Independent Directors plays an important role in the governance processes of the Board. With different points of views flowing from their expertise and experience they enrich the decision-making process at the Board and prevent conflicts of interest in the decision-making process.

The appointment of the Independent Directors is carried out in a structured manner. The Nomination & Remuneration Committee identifies potential candidates based on certain laid down criteria and takes into consideration the diversity of the Board.

None of the Independent Directors serve as ‘Independent Directors’ in more than seven listed companies.

Meeting of Independent Directors:

Schedule IV of the Companies Act, 2013 and the Rules there under mandate that the independent directors of the Company shall hold at least one meeting in a year, without the attendance of non-independent directors and members of the Management. At such

meetings, the independent directors discuss, among other matters, the performance of the Company and risks faced by it, the flow of information to the Board, competition, strategy, leadership strengths and weaknesses, governance, compliance, Board movements, human resource matters and performance of the executive members of the Board, including the Chairman. During the year under review, the Independent Directors met once on 14.02.2026. The Independent Directors discussed and reviewed the matters specified in Regulation 25 (4) of the Listing Regulations and as per provisions of the Companies Act, 2013.

All the Independent Directors were present throughout the Meeting. They expressed satisfaction at the robustness of the evaluation process, the Board's freedom to express views on the business transacted at the Meetings and the openness with which the Management discussed various subject matters on the agenda of meetings. Their suggestions were discussed at the Board Meeting and are being implemented to ensure a more robust interaction at a Board level / Management level.

INDUCTION PROGRAMME FOR NEW DIRECTORS AND ON-GOING FAMILIARIZATION PROGRAMME FOR EXISTING INDEPENDENT & NON-INDEPENDENT DIRECTOR.

All new non-executive directors inducted to the Board are introduced to our Company culture through orientation sessions. Executive directors and senior management provide an overview of operations and familiarize the new non-executive directors on matters related to our values and commitments. They are also introduced to the organization structure, services, Group structure and subsidiaries, constitution, Board procedures, matters reserved for the Board, major risks and risk management strategy. The details of the familiarization program are also available on the Company's website, at <https://www.tntpipes.com>

An appropriate induction programme for new Directors and an ongoing familiarization with respect to the business/working of the Company for all Directors is a major contributor for meaningful Board level deliberations and sound business decisions.

At the time of appointing a director, a formal letter of appointment is given to the Director, and, inter alia, explains his / her role, function, duties and responsibilities and the Board's expectations from him / her as a Director of the Company. The Director also explained in detail the compliances required from him / her under the Act, SEBI (LODR) Regulations, 2015 and other relevant regulations and his/her affirmation taken with respect to the same.

By way of an introduction to the Company, the Director is presented with a book on the Company which traces its history over 45 years so fits existence, relevant Annual Reports, Sustainable Development Report, and brochure on the CSR activities pursued by the Company.

A presentation is also shared with the newly appointed Director giving an overarching perspective of the steel pipe Industry, organizational set-up of the Company, the functioning of various divisions/departments, the Company's market share and the markets in which it operates governance and internal control processes and other relevant information pertaining to the Company's business.

Further, as an ongoing process, the Board of Directors is updated on a quarterly basis through presentations and discussions on the overall economic trends, the performance of the Steel

Industry and that of the Company, analysis of the circumstances which helped or adversely impacted the Company's performance, comparison of the Company's performance, with its peers in the Industry based on the information available in public domain, and the initiatives taken / proposed to be taken to bring about an overall improvement in the performance of the Company, marketing strategy, business risks and mitigation plans etc.

The Act facilitates the participation of a Director in Board / Committee Meetings through video conference or other audio-visual mode. Accordingly, the option to participate in the Meeting through video conference was made available for the Directors except in respect of such items which are not permitted to be transacted through video conference. Due to Covid-19 Pandemic, MCA permitted to transact all the businesses through Video Conferences.

7. DUTIES AND FUNCTIONS OF THE BOARD

The Board of Directors provides strategic guidance, monitors operational performance and ensures that robust policies and procedures are in place and through its various Committees guarantees the quality of the Company's risk management, internal controls and ensures compliance with all relevant laws. In particular, the Board periodically reviews the items required to be placed before it and reviews and approves quarterly unaudited financial statements and the audited annual financial statements, corporate strategies, business plans, annual budgets.

The primary role of the Board is that of trusteeship - to protect and enhance shareholder value through strategic direction to the Company.

- As trustees, the Board has a fiduciary responsibility to ensure that the Company has clear goals aligned to shareholder value and its growth.
- It also directs and exercises appropriate control to ensure that the Company is managed in a manner that fulfils stakeholders' aspirations and societal expectations.
- It monitors the effectiveness of the Company's governance practices and makes changes as needed.
- It provides strategic guidance to the Company, ensures effective monitoring of the Management and is accountable to the Company and the shareholders.
- It exercises independent judgment on corporate affairs.
- It assigns sufficient number of non-executive members of the Board of Directors capable of exercising independent judgment in tasks where there is a potential for conflict of interest.
- It reviews and guides corporate strategy, major plans of action, risk policy, annual budgets and business plans, setting performance objectives, monitoring implementation and corporate performance, and overseeing major capital expenditures, acquisitions and divestments.

8. DISCLOSURES:

a) Indian Accounting Standards (Ind-AS)

The Company has been adopted 'Ind-AS' with effect from April 2017. The implementation of 'Ind-AS' is a major change process for which the Company has established a project team and has dedicated considerable resources.

b) Related Party Transactions

The Company has formulated a policy on Materiality of and dealing with Related Party Transactions. There have been no materially significant related party transactions, monetary transactions or relationships between the Company and its directors, the Management, subsidiaries or relatives during the year, except for those disclosed in the Board's report.

c) Compliance / Strictures and Penalties

There was no non-compliance by the Company, and no penalties or strictures were imposed on the Company by the Stock Exchanges or Securities and Exchange Board of India (SEBI), or any statutory authority on any matter related to the capital markets during the last three years.

d) Whistle Blower Policy

Pursuant to Section 177(9) and (10) of the Companies Act, 2013 and the provisions of SEBI (Listing Obligation and Disclosure Requirements) Regulations, 2015, the Company has a Whistle Blower Policy for establishing a vigil mechanism for Directors and employees to report genuine concerns regarding unethical behavior, actual or suspected fraud or violation of the Company's Code of Conduct. The said mechanism also provides for adequate safeguards against victimization of people who use such mechanism and makes provision for direct access to the Chairperson of the Audit Committee in appropriate or exceptional cases. We affirm that no employee of the Company was denied access to the Audit Committee.

e) Code of Business Conduct

The Board of Directors has approved a Code of Business Conduct which is applicable to the Members of the Board and to all employees. The Company follows a policy of 'Zero Tolerance' to bribery and corruption in any form and the Board has laid down the 'Anti Bribery & Corruption Directive' which forms an Appendix to the Code.

The code lays down the standard of conduct which is expected to be followed by the Directors and by the employees in their business dealings and in particular on matters relating to integrity in the workplace, in business practices and in dealing with stakeholders. The code gives guidance through examples on the expected behavior from an employee in a given situation and the reporting structure.

All the Board Members and the Senior Management personnel have confirmed compliance with the Code. All Management Staff were required to complete an e-learning module, in addition to face-to-face training given by the Company from time to time.

Details of Compliance with Mandatory requirements and Adoption of the Non-Mandatory requirements under the Listing Regulations

During the year, the Company has complied with the mandatory requirements as stipulated in Listing Regulations. With respect to the compliance with the non-mandatory requirements pursuant to Regulation 27(1) of the SEBI Listing Regulations, the Company has adopted the following non-mandatory requirements:

- i) The Chairman being Non-Executive Director, an office is made available for his use during his visits to the Company and is reimbursed the expenses incurred towards the performance of his duties.
- ii) During the year under review, there is no audit qualification on the Company's financial statements. Your Company continues to adopt best practices to ensure a regime of unmodified audit opinion.
- iii) The position of Chairperson, Board and the Managing Director are separate.
- iv) The Internal Auditor of the Company reports to the Chief Financial Officer and has direct access to the Audit Committee.

f) Subsidiary and Associates

During the year ended March 31, 2026, the Company does not have any listed / unlisted subsidiary and Associate companies as defined in Regulation 16 of the Listing Regulations.

g) Prevention of Insider Trading

In January 2015, SEBI notified the SEBI (Prohibition of Insider Trading) Regulations, 2015 which came into effect from May 15, 2015. Pursuant thereto, the Company has formulated and adopted a new code for Prevention of Insider Trading. The code 'Code of Internal Procedures and Conduct for Regulating, Monitoring and Reporting of Trading by Insiders' and the 'Code of Practices and Procedures for Fair Disclosure of Unpublished Price Sensitive Information' allows the formulation of a trading plan subject to certain conditions and requires pre-clearance for dealing in the Company's shares. It also prohibits the purchase or sale of company shares by the Directors, designated employees and connected people, while in possession of unpublished price sensitive information (UPSI) in relation to the Company and during the period when the Trading Window is closed. The company Secretary & Head Compliance is responsible for implementation of the code and the company has also installed the SDD Software as mandated by the SEBI to curb and prevent the insider's trading. All Board of Directors, designated employees and connected persons have affirmed compliance with the Code.

9. CEO /CFO Certification:

The Managing Director and Chief Financial Officer (CFO) have issued certificate pursuant to the provisions of Regulation 17(8) of the Listing Regulations certifying that the financial statements do not contain any materially untrue statement and these statements represent a true and Fairview of the Company's affairs. The certificate is attached to this report.

10. MEANS OF COMMUNICATION:

The company follows a robust process of communicating with its stakeholders/shareholders and investors through multiple channels of communication such as dissemination of information on the online portal of the Stock Exchanges, press releases, the Annual Reports and uploading relevant information on its website.

The unaudited quarterly results are announced within forty-five days of the close of the quarter. The audited annual results are reannounced within two months from the close of the financial year as required under SEBI (Listing Obligation and Disclosure Requirements) Regulations, 2015. The aforesaid financial results are announced to the Stock Exchanges immediately after the approval of the Board. The results are generally published in Trinity Mirror (English). The Tamil translation of the same is published in Makkal Kural, which are regional daily newspapers.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENT**As at and for the year ended 31st March 2026****NOTE: 1 CORPORATE INFORMATION**

TAMIL NADU STEEL TUBES LIMITED (the Company) is a Public Limited Company domiciled in India and incorporated under the provisions of the Companies Act, 1956 with **CIN: L27110TN1979PLC007887**. Its shares are listed on Stock Exchange in India. The Company is engaged in manufacturing and selling a reputed brand of Black Pipe (ERW Pipe) & G.I.Pipe. The Company caters to only domestic market.

BASIS OF PREPARATION, MEASUREMENT AND SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES**1.1) Basis of Preparation of Financial Statements:**

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Indian Accounting Standards (**hereinafter referred to as in „Ind AS“**) as notified by Ministry of Corporate Affairs pursuant to section 133 of the Companies Act, 2013 read with Rule 3 of the Companies (Indian Accounting standard Rules, 2015 and Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Amendment Rules, 2016

These financial statements are prepared under Ind AS. For all periods up to and including the year ended 31st March, 2017, the company prepared its financial statements under historical cost convention in accordance with the generally accepted Accounting Principles in India and the provision of the Companies Act, 2013 read with Section 133 of the Companies Act 2013, read with Rule 7 of the Companies(Accounts) rules 2014, till the standards of accounting or any addendum thereto are prescribed by Central Government in consultation with recommendation of the National Financial Reporting Authority, the existing Accounting Standards notified under Companies Act, 1956 shall continue to apply in all the material aspects with the accounting standards notified under Section 211(3C) (Companies (Accounting Standards) Rules, 2016, as amended) and other relevant provisions of the Companies Act, 2013 immediately before adopting Ind AS . The financial statements for the year ending 31st March, 2017 and the opening Balance Sheet as at 1st April, 2016 have been restated in accordance with Ind AS for comparative information.

The financial statements have been prepared on an accrual and going concern basis. The accounting policies are applied consistently to all the periods presented in the financial statements, including the preparation of the opening Ind AS Balance Sheet as at 1st April 2016 being the „date of transition to Ind AS. All assets and liabilities have been classified as Current or non-current as per the Company’s normal operating cycle and other criteria as set out in Division II of Schedule III to the Companies Act, 2013. Based on the nature of products and the time between acquisition of assets for processing and their realization in Cash and cash equivalents, the company has ascertained its operating cycle as 12 months for the purpose of the current or non-current classification of assets and liabilities. These financial statements are prepared under the historical cost convention unless otherwise indicated.

1.2) Use of Estimates:

The preparation of financial statements requires the management to make judgments, estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of revenues, expenses, assets and liabilities and the disclosure of contingent liabilities, at the end of

the reported period. Although these estimates are based on the management's best knowledge of current events and actions, uncertainty about these assumptions and estimates could result in the outcomes requiring a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets or liabilities in future periods.

SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES:

1.3) Inventories (Ind AS 2):

Raw materials are valued at FIFO method. Components, store and spares are **valued at lower of cost and net realizable value**. However, materials and other items held for use in the production of inventories are not written down below cost if the finished products in which they will be incorporated are expected to be sold at or above cost. The cost of raw materials, components and stores and spares is determined on a weighted average basis.

Net realizable value is estimated at selling price in the ordinary course of business less the estimated costs of completion and estimated costs necessary to make the sale.

1.4) Cash flow Statement (Ind AS 7)

Cash flows are presented using indirect Method, whereby profit / (loss) before tax is adjusted for the effects of transactions of non-cash nature and any deferrals or accruals of past or future cash receipts or payments.

Bank borrowings are generally considered to be financing activities. However, where bank overdrafts which are repayable on demand form an integral part of an entity's cash management, bank overdrafts are included as a component of cash and cash equivalents for the purpose of Cash flow statement.

1.5) Accounting Policies, Changes in Accounting Estimates and Errors (Ind AS 8)

Accounting Policies, Changes in Accounting Estimates and Errors

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Indian Accounting Standards (Ind AS) notified under the companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Rules, 2015, as amended from time to time.

The company selects and applies its accounting policies consistently for similar transactions, events, and conditions, unless Ind AS specifically requires or permits categorization and application of different policies for different transactions.

Changes in accounting policies are made only if:

- Required by an Ind AS; or
- Such a change results in the financial statement providing more reliable and relevant information.

When a change in accounting policy is applied:

- It is accounted for retrospectively unless otherwise stated.
- The comparative figures for prior periods are restated, and
- The cumulative effect, if any, is adjusted in the opening balance of retained earnings.

Changes in accounting estimates (e.g., useful lives, bad debt provisions) are recognized prospectively:

- In the period of the changes, if the change affects only that period; or
- In the period of the change and future periods, if the change affects both.

Prior Period Errors

Material prior period errors are corrected retrospectively in the first set of financial statements Approved after their discovery by:

- Restating the comparative amounts for the prior period(s) presented; or
- If the error occurred before the earliest prior period presented, restating the opening balances of assets, liabilities, and equity for the earliest period presented.

The nature of the error and the amount of the correction are disclosed in the notes to accounts.

1.6) Provision for Current Tax and Deferred Tax (Ind AS 12) Current

Income Tax

Current income tax assets and liabilities are measured at the amount expected to be recovered from or paid to the taxation authorities. The tax rates and tax laws used to compute the amount are those that are enacted or substantively enacted at the reporting date in the countries where the company operates and generates taxable income.

Current income tax relating to items recognized outside profit or loss is recognized outside profit or loss (either in other comprehensive income or in equity). Current tax items are recognized in correlation to the underlying transaction either in OCI or directly in equity. Management periodically evaluates positions taken in the tax returns with respect to situations in which applicable tax regulations are subject to interpretation and establishes provisions where appropriate.

Deferred Tax

Deferred Tax is provided using the liability method on temporary differences between the tax bases of assets and liabilities and their carrying amounts for financial reporting purposes at the reporting date. Deferred tax liabilities are recognized for all taxes temporary differences.

Deferred Tax assets are recognized to the extent that is probable that taxable profit will be available against which then deductible temporary differences, and the carry forward of unused tax credits and unused tax losses can be utilized. Where there is deferred arising from carry forward of unused tax losses and unused tax created, they are recognized to the extent of deferred tax liability.

The carrying amount of deferred tax assets is reviewed at each reporting date and reduced to the extent that it is no longer probable that sufficient taxable profit will be available to allow all or part of the deferred tax assets to be utilized. Unrecognized deferred tax assets are re-assessed at each reporting date and are recognized to the extent that it has become probable that future taxable profits will allow the deferred tax asset to be recovered.

Deferred tax assets and liabilities are measured at the tax rates that are expected to apply in the year when the asset is realized or the liability is settled, based on tax rates (and tax laws) that have been enacted or substantively enacted at the reporting date.

Deferred tax relating to items recognized outside profit or loss is recognized outside profit or loss (either in other comprehensive income or in equity). Deferred tax items are recognized in correlation to the underlying transaction either in OCI or directly in equity.

Deferred tax assets and deferred tax liabilities are offset if a legally enforceable right exists to set off current tax assets against current tax liabilities and the deferred taxes relate to the same taxable entity and the same taxation authority.

1.7) Property, Plant and Equipment (Ind AS16):

Property, plant and equipment are stated at acquisition cost net of accumulated depreciation and accumulated impairment losses, if any. Subsequent costs are included in the asset's carrying amount or recognized as a separate asset, as appropriate, only when it is probable that future economic benefits associated with the item will flow to the Company and the cost of the item can be measured reliably. All other repairs and maintenance are charged to the Statement of Profit and Loss during the period in which they are incurred.

Gains or losses arising on retirement or disposal of property, plant and equipment are recognized in the Statement of Profit and Loss. Property, plant and equipment which are not ready for intended use as on the date of Balance Sheet are disclosed as 'Capital work-in-progress'.

Depreciation is provided on a pro-rata basis on the straight-line method based on estimated useful life prescribed under Schedule II to the Companies Act, 2013. Free hold land is not depreciable; hence no depreciation charged to statement of profit and loss.

The residual values, useful lives and methods of depreciation of property, plant and equipment are reviewed at each financial year end and adjusted prospectively, if appropriate.

1.8) Employee Benefits: (Ind AS 19) Short-term Employee Benefits

A liability is recognized for short-term employee benefit in the period the related service is rendered at the undiscounted amount of the benefits expected to be paid in exchange for that service.

Defined contribution plans

Retirement benefit in the form of a provident fund is a defined contribution scheme. The company has no obligation, other than the contribution payable to the provident fund and superannuation fund. The company recognizes the contribution payable to the provident fund scheme as an expense when an employee renders the related services. If the contribution payable to the scheme for service received before the balance sheet date exceeds the contribution already paid, the deficit payable to the scheme is recognized as a liability after deducting the contribution already paid. If the contribution already exceeds the contribution due to services received before the balance sheet date, then excess is recognized as an asset to the extent that the pre-payment will lead to, for example, a reduction in future payment or a cash refund.

Defined benefit plans

The Company operates a defined benefit gratuity plan in India, which requires contributions to be made to a separately administered fund. The cost of providing benefits under the defined benefit plan is determined by using the projected unit credit method.

Other long term employee benefits

Liabilities recognized in respect of other long-term employee benefits are measured at the present value of the estimated future cash outflows expected to be made by the company in respect of services provided by the employees up to the reporting date. Liability for un-availed leave, considered to be long-term, is carried out based on an actuarial valuation carried out at the end of each financial year.

1.9) Foreign Currency Transaction (Ind AS 21)

(a) Transactions in foreign currencies are initially recorded by the Company at the functional currency spot rates at the date at which the transaction first qualifies for recognition. However, for practical reasons, the Company uses an average rate, if the average approximates the actual rate at the date of the transaction.

b) Monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are translated at the functional currency spot rates of exchange at the reporting date. Exchange differences arising on settlement or translation of monetary items are recognized in profit or loss.

c) Non-monetary items that are measured in terms of historical cost in a foreign currency are translated using the exchange rates at the dates of the initial transactions. Non-monetary items measured at fair value in a foreign currency are translated using the exchange rates at the date when the fair value is determined. The gain or loss arising on translation of non-monetary items measured at fair value is treated in line with the recognition of the gain or loss on the change in fair value of the item (i.e., translation differences on items whose fair value gain or loss is recognized in OCI or profit or loss are also recognized in OCI or profit or loss, respectively).

1.10) Impairment of Assets: (Ind AS 36)

Assessment for impairment is done at each Balance Sheet date as to whether there is any indication that a non-financial asset may be impaired. Indefinite life intangibles are

subject to a review for impairment annually or more frequently if events or circumstances indicate that it is necessary.

If any indication of impairment exists, an estimate of the recoverable amount of the individual asset / cash generating unit is made. Asset / cash generating unit, whose carrying value exceeds their recoverable amount are written down to the recoverable amount by recognizing the impairment loss as an expense in the statement of Profit or Loss.

1.11) Provisions and Contingent Liabilities: (Ind AS 37):

Provisions are recognized when the Company has a present obligation (legal or constructive) as a result of a past event, it is probable that an outflow of resources embodying economic benefits will be required to settle the obligation and a reliable estimate can be made of the amount of the obligation. Provisions are measured at the best estimate of the expenditure required to settle the present obligation at the Balance Sheet date.

If the effect of the time value of money is material, provisions are discounted to reflect its present value using a current pre-tax rate that reflects the current market assessments of the time value of money and the risks specific to the obligation. When discounting is used, the increase in the provision due to the passage of time is recognized as a finance cost.

Contingent liabilities are disclosed when there is a possible obligation arising from past events, the existence of which will be confirmed only by the occurrence or non-occurrence of one or more uncertain future events not wholly within the control of the Company or a present obligation that arises from past events where it is either not probable that an outflow of resources will be required to settle the obligation or a reliable estimate of the amount cannot be made.

1.12) Segment Reporting (Ind AS 108):

The accounting policies adopted for the segment reporting are in line with the accounting policies stipulated. The Company primarily operates in single business segment which is Steel Tubes (Black, GI Pipes & Stainless-Steel Pipes), and accordingly there is no primary segments to be reported as per Indian Accounting Standard 108 'Segment Reporting'.

1.13) Revenue Recognition (Ind AS 115):

Revenue from the sale of goods is recognized when all the significant risks and rewards of ownership in the goods are transferred to the buyer as per the terms of the contract, there is no continuing managerial involvement with the goods, and the amount of revenue can be measured reliably. The Company retains no effective control of the goods transferred to a degree usually associated with ownership and no significant uncertainty exists regarding the amount of consideration that will be derived from the sale of goods. Revenue is measured at fair value of the consideration received or receivable, after deduction of any trade discounts, volume rebates and any taxes or duties collected on behalf of the government which are levied on sales such as Goods and service tax etc.

Revenue from sale of products manufactured, sale of products traded and sale or supply of services is recognized when practically all obligations connected with the transaction risks and rights to the buyer have been fulfilled. Revenue is measured at fair value of the consideration received or receivable, after deduction of any trade discounts, volume rebates and any taxes or duties collected on behalf of the government which are levied on sales such as GST etc.

Interest income is recognized using the effective interest rate (EIR) method.

Dividend income on investments is recognized when the right to receive dividend is established.

1.14) Leases (Ind AS 116):

Leases in which a substantial portion of the risks and rewards of ownership are retained by the lessor are classified as operating leases. Payments and receipts under such leases are recognized to the Statement of Profit and Loss on a straight-line basis over the term of the lease unless the lease payments to the lessor are structured to increase in line with expected general inflation to compensate for the lessor's expected inflationary cost increases, in which case the same are recognized as an expense in line with the contractual term. In accordance with the standard, the company has recognized Right-of-Use (ROU) assets and corresponding lease liabilities for all applicable lease arrangements, except for short-term leases of less than 12 months and leases of low-value assets which have been accounted for on a straight-line basis over the lease term. The lease liabilities have been measured at the present value of future lease payments, discounted using the company's incremental borrowing rate. The ROU assets have been measured at cost, comprising the amount of the initial lease liability, lease payments made at or before the commencement date, and any initial direct costs, adjusted for lease incentives received. The ROU asset is depreciated on a straight-line basis over the lease term, while the lease liability is reduced over time using the effective interest method. The company has also appropriately accounted for refundable security deposits by discounting them to present value and recognizing the difference as a component of the ROU asset. The accounting treatment and disclosures are in accordance with the principles and requirements of Ind AS 116.

1.15) Financial Instrument: (Ind AS 109):

Financial Assets:

Financial assets are recognized when the Company becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument. On initial recognition, a financial asset is recognized at fair value, in case of financial assets which are recognized at fair value through profit and loss (FVTPL), their transaction costs are recognized in the statement of profit and loss. In other cases, the transaction costs are attributed to the acquisition value of the financial asset.

Financial assets are subsequently classified as measured at

- Amortized cost
- Fair value through profit and loss (FVTPL)
- Fair value through other comprehensive income (FVOCI).

Financial assets are not reclassified subsequent to their recognition, except if and in the period the Company changes its business model for managing financial assets.

Trade Receivables and Loans:

Trade receivables are initially recognized at fair value. Subsequently, these assets are held at amortized cost, using the effective interest rate (EIR) method net of any expected credit losses. The EIR is the rate that discounts estimated future cash income through the expected life of financial instrument.

Equity Instruments:

All investments in *equity* instruments classified under financial assets are initially measured at fair value; the Company may, on initial recognition, irrevocably elect to measure the same either at FVOCI or FVTPL. The Company makes such election on an instrument-by-instrument basis. A fair value change on an equity instrument is recognized as other income in the Statement of Profit and Loss unless the Company has elected to measure such instrument at FVOCI. Fair value changes excluding dividends, on an equity instrument measured at FVOCI are recognized in OCI.

Amounts recognized in OCI are not subsequently reclassified to the Statement of Profit and Loss. Dividend income on investments in equity instruments are recognized as 'other income' in the Statement of Profit and Loss. The Company does not have any investment in equity instruments as on balance sheet date.

Derecognition:

The Company derecognizes a financial asset when the contractual rights to the cash flows from the financial asset expire, or it transfers the contractual rights to receive the cash flows from the asset.

Impairment of Financial Asset:

Expected credit losses are recognized for all financial assets subsequent to initial recognition other than financial assets in FVTPL category. For financial assets other than trade receivables, as per Ind AS 109, the Company recognizes 12 months' expected credit losses for all originated or acquired financial assets if at the reporting date the credit risk of the financial asset has not increased significantly since its initial recognition. The expected credit losses are measured as lifetime expected credit losses if the credit risk on financial asset increases significantly since its initial recognition. The Company's trade receivables do not contain significant financing components and loss allowance on trade receivables is measured at an amount equal to life time expected losses i.e., expected cash shortfall. The impairment losses and reversals are recognized in Statement of Profit and Loss.

Financial Liabilities:**Initial recognition and measurement**

Financial liabilities are recognized when the Company becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument. Financial liabilities are initially measured at the amortized cost unless at initial recognition, they are classified as fair value through profit and loss. In case of trade payables, they are initially recognized at fair value and subsequently, these liabilities are held at amortized cost, using the effective interest method.

Subsequent measurement

Financial liabilities are subsequently measured at amortized cost using the EIR method. Financial liabilities carried at fair value through profit or loss is measured at fair value with all changes in fair value recognized in the Statement of Profit and Loss.

Derecognition:
