Message From Chairman



Dear Shareholders,

I write to you at the close of a year that tested our discipline rather more than our ambition. Revenue from operations for the financial year 2025-26 stood at Rs. 84.56 Crores against Rs. 101.29 Crores in the previous year, and profit after tax at Rs. 10.01 Crores against Rs. 15.00 Crores. Earnings per share were Rs. 3.48 as compared to Rs. 5.21. This is not the outcome we set out to deliver, and I would rather begin by saying so plainly than by explaining it away.

The causes were largely external, though that is an explanation and not an excuse. Selling prices across the nonwoven segment remained under pressure through the year, polypropylene input costs moved unpredictably, and in the closing quarter the geopolitical disruption arising from the United States-Iran conflict interrupted shipping schedules and raw material movement at precisely the point in the year when we could least absorb it. The fourth quarter consequently closed in a loss.

What did hold, and what I would ask you to look at alongside the headline numbers, is the quality of the business underneath. EBITDA for the year was Rs. 18.82 Crores at a margin of 21.85 per cent, against 21.81 per cent last year. In a year when revenue fell by roughly sixteen per cent, your Company held its operating margin flat. That did not happen on its own. Other expenses were reduced by close to thirty-four per cent, freight costs were nearly halved, and receivables were brought down from Rs. 16.67 Crores to Rs. 6.65 Crores through sustained collection effort. Operations generated Rs. 17.28 Crores of cash. Net worth rose to Rs. 186.36 Crores. Your Company ended the year with a stronger balance sheet than it began it with, even though the profit and loss account was weaker.

On the question of growth, your Board took a decision during the year that I believe deserves to be stated openly. We had earlier proposed an investment of approximately Rs. 165

Crores in the nonwoven flushable products segment. On reassessing market conditions and the likely returns, we set that plan aside and instead approved a project of approximately Rs. 60 Crores for the manufacture of non-woven felted products For Geo-Textile segment. It is a materially smaller commitment for what we judge to be the better return, and it sits squarely where our customers are heading on sustainability. Not proceeding with a large announced project is an uncomfortable decision to take publicly. It was, in our view, the correct one. It is also the principal reason your Board has again deemed it prudent not to recommend a dividend for the year, choosing instead to fund this expansion substantially from internal accruals.

There were several changes in your Company’s leadership during and immediately after the year. Mrs. Reena Gupta joined the Board as a Non-Executive Director, and Mr. Sorabh Gupta has been recommended for a second term as an Independent Director. Mrs. Soniya P. Sheth stepped down from the Board, and Mr. Chidamber Rege completed his second term as an Independent Director; I record the Board’s appreciation for the counsel both provided over many years. Mr. Mukesh Pandya relinquished charge as Chief Financial Officer after long and valued service, and Mr. Milind Ghelani has since taken up that responsibility. I welcome him warmly.

Against a statutory obligation of Rs. 15.85 Lakhs, your Company spent Rs. 31.00 Lakhs on corporate social responsibility during the year, in education, healthcare and community welfare. It is a modest sum in absolute terms and a deliberate one in intent.

Fiberweb completes forty-one years this year. This business was not built in the good years alone, and it has been through considerably harder ones than 2025-26. What has carried it through each time is a preference for a sound balance sheet over a flattering one, and for customers who stay rather than customers who buy once. That preference has not changed. I thank our 114 colleagues at Daman and Mumbai, our customers, our bankers, and each of you for the confidence you continue to place on your Company.

Message From Director



Dear Shareholders,

I spend most of my working year close to the markets your Company sells into, and the view from that side of the business in 2025-26 was of a market that did not so much contract as hesitate. Enquiries kept coming. Orders took longer to close, and closed at thinner prices. That distinction matters, because it points to where the recovery has to come from.

The end uses that our spunbond and melt-blown fabrics serve — hygiene, medical disposables, wipes, filtration, agricultural crop and soil cover — are not discretionary categories. Demand for them did not disappear during the year. What moved against us was price, freight and, in the final quarter, the reliability of shipping lanes. Those are cyclical pressures, and your Company managed them without losing customers, which is the measure I watch most closely.

One episode during the year is worth recounting because of what it tells us. Following a reduction in United States tariffs on Indian goods in February 2026, your Company secured export orders of over Rs. 8 Crores within a matter of weeks. As a hundred per cent Export Oriented Unit shipping to the United States, Europe, Australia, New Zealand, South Africa and the Gulf, we are unusually exposed to trade policy — and, as that month demonstrated, unusually quick to benefit when the friction eases. The capability and the customer relationships are in place. Some of what constrained us in 2025-26 was simply the cost of getting goods to the buyer.

This is also the context in which the Board revisited the

expansion plan. The earlier proposal of approximately Rs. 165 Crores in nonwoven flushable products has been replaced by a project of approximately Rs. 60 Crores to manufacture non-woven felted products for Geo-Textile segment. I supported that change for two reasons. The first is capital efficiency: a smaller, faster project that we can fund largely ourselves, in a business of our size, is worth a good deal more than a larger one that stretches the balance sheet. The second is that biodegradable content is no longer a marketing preference among the brand owners we supply in Europe and North America — it is increasingly written into their sourcing requirements. Building that capability now is a commercial decision before it is an environmental one, although it is both.

Looking to the year ahead, there are three things I will be pressing for. We need to keep shifting the product mix towards specialised and value-added grades, where price competition is less punishing than at the commodity end. We need to convert our sustainability position from a claim into documented, auditable credentials that a procurement team can act on. And we need to keep the balance sheet conservative enough to absorb another difficult quarter without flinching, because the last one showed how quickly conditions can turn.

I would like to thank our customers for their patience through a disrupted year, our team at Daman for holding quality and delivery through it, and you, our shareholders, for the long view you continue to take of your Company.

Management Discussion and Analysis

Economic and Industry Overview

Global manufacturing activity remained uneven through 2025-26. Demand across most industrial end-markets was steady in volume but persistently competitive on price, while geopolitical developments — most notably the conflict involving the United States and Iran in the closing months of the year — disrupted shipping routes, lengthened lead times and added volatility to crude-linked raw material costs. Shifting tariff positions between major trading blocs were an additional variable for export-oriented manufacturers through the year.

Nonwovens remain one of the faster-growing segments within technical textiles. Their functional and cost advantages over conventional fabrics continue to widen their application across hygiene, medical and surgical disposables, wipes, filtration, agriculture, automotive interiors, geotextiles and packaging. Industry estimates place the Indian nonwoven fabric market on a mid-single-digit compound growth path over the coming decade, supported by rising hygiene consumption, healthcare expenditure, infrastructure and agricultural mechanisation. Regulatory and consumer pressure towards recycled and biodegradable materials is now a defining feature of the segment and is increasingly reflected in customer sourcing specifications rather than merely in customer preference.

Company Overview and Product-wise Performance

Fiberweb (India) Limited is engaged in polymer processing, manufacturing spunbond and melt-blown nonwoven fabrics from polypropylene at its facility at Nani Daman, which operates as a hundred per cent Export Oriented Unit. The Company’s products are supplied to the hygiene, medical, agricultural, industrial and packaging sectors, and are exported to the United States, the United Kingdom, Europe, Australia, New Zealand, South Africa and the Gulf, alongside supplies to multinational customers within India. The manufacturing system is certified to ISO 9001:2015, ISO 14001:2015 and ISO 45001:2018.

The Company’s business constitutes a single reportable segment — polymer processing — and accordingly segment reporting under Ind AS 108 is not applicable. Within that single segment, spunbond fabric continues to account for the substantial majority of volumes, with melt-blown fabric addressing higher-specification filtration, medical and wipe applications. Fabric is customised across GSM, thickness, width, colour and performance characteristics, which allows the Company to serve a diversified customer base without significant reconfiguration of its lines.

Total transactions at the Company’s United States branch amounted to Rs. 169.62 Lakhs during the year, representing 2.00 per cent of turnover, against Rs. 209.15 Lakhs or 2.06 per cent in the previous year.

Management Discussion and Analysis

Revenue from operations declined by 16.52 per cent, principally on account of subdued realisations, competitive pricing pressure and volume disruption in the fourth quarter arising from interrupted logistics and raw material supply. Notwithstanding the revenue decline, the EBITDA margin was held at 21.85 per cent against 21.81 per cent in the previous year, reflecting active cost management. Other expenses reduced by 33.90 per cent to Rs. 1,504.91 Lakhs, within which freight expenses fell by 45.91 per cent to Rs. 538.63 Lakhs and power and fuel costs by 22.34 per cent to Rs. 248.50 Lakhs. Employee benefit expenses were broadly stable at Rs. 419.78 Lakhs.

Profit before tax at Rs. 1,346.73 Lakhs and profit after tax at Rs. 1,001.49 Lakhs were lower by 20.49 per cent and 33.26 per cent respectively. Finance cost increased to Rs. 105.28 Lakhs from Rs. 71.45 Lakhs, reflecting higher working capital and project-related borrowing during the year. A net gain on foreign currency transactions of Rs. 150.90 Lakhs was recorded, broadly in line with the previous year.

The balance sheet strengthened over the year. Net worth increased by 5.68 per cent to Rs. 18,636.41 Lakhs and total assets to Rs. 20,507.31 Lakhs. Property, plant and equipment rose to Rs. 14,527.47 Lakhs from Rs. 12,794.12 Lakhs, following capital expenditure of approximately Rs. 2,080 Lakhs during the year. Trade receivables reduced sharply to Rs. 664.77 Lakhs from Rs. 1,666.65 Lakhs on sustained collection effort, and inventories to Rs. 2,272.74 Lakhs from Rs. 2,419.20 Lakhs. Net cash generated from operating activities was Rs. 1,727.80 Lakhs. Total borrowings stood at Rs. 1,201.99 Lakhs against Rs. 843.34 Lakhs, and leverage remains low relative to net worth.

Outlook and Growth Strategy

The Company had earlier proposed an investment of approximately Rs. 165 Crores in the nonwoven flushable products segment. Following a reassessment of market conditions and business dynamics, the Board has instead approved a project involving an investment of approximately Rs. 50 Crores for the manufacture of nonwoven felted products using recycled materials. On the basis of present estimates, the project is expected to generate annual revenue of approximately Rs. 175 Crores at a projected profitability of approximately Rs. 30 Crores once it reaches steady-state operation. The revised approach requires materially lower capital, can be funded substantially from internal accruals, and positions the Company in a segment where recycled content is increasingly a customer requirement.

Management Discussion and Analysis

Alongside this, the Company will continue to pursue a shift in product mix towards specialised and value-added grades where competition is less concentrated on price, to develop biodegradable and environmentally sustainable material options, and to broaden its geographic and customer footprint across the technical textile value chain. Operational excellence, cost optimisation and prudent financial discipline remain the operating priorities.

Opportunities

- Widening application of nonwovens across hygiene, medical, filtration, agriculture, geotextile, automotive and packaging end-uses.
- Regulatory and customer-led demand for recycled, biodegradable and energy-efficient materials, which the proposed felted nonwoven project directly addresses.
- Government investment in infrastructure and healthcare, supporting demand for geotextiles and medical textiles.
- Responsiveness of the export order book to easing trade friction, as demonstrated by orders of over Rs. 8 Crores secured following the reduction in United States tariffs in February 2026.
- An established, certified manufacturing base with the flexibility to customise across GSM, width and performance characteristics.

Risks and Concerns

- Raw material price risk: polypropylene prices are linked to crude oil and remain volatile; sustained increases may not be immediately recoverable through selling prices.
- Geopolitical and logistics risk: as experienced in the fourth quarter of the year under review, conflict-related disruption to shipping and supply chains can affect both cost and delivery schedules.
- Trade policy and tariff risk: as a hundred per cent Export Oriented Unit, the Company is exposed to changes in tariffs, anti-dumping actions and trade barriers in its principal markets.
- Foreign exchange risk: revenues and a portion of costs are denominated in United States dollars; the Company benefits from a natural hedge, but residual exposure remains.
- Competition and pricing pressure: capacity additions, domestically and regionally, continue to compress realisations at the commodity end of the product range.
- Project execution risk: the proposed expansion is subject to timely commissioning, equipment delivery, regulatory approvals and market conditions at the time of commercialisation.

The Company mitigates these risks through diversified sourcing, active cost management, disciplined credit control, a low-leverage balance sheet and a Board-approved risk management framework that is periodically reviewed.

Internal Control Systems and their Adequacy

The Company maintains internal financial controls commensurate with the size, scale and nature of its operations, designed to ensure the orderly and efficient conduct of business, safeguarding of assets, prevention and detection of fraud and error, accuracy and completeness of accounting records, and timely preparation of reliable financial information. Internal audit is carried out by M/s A. V. Jobanputra & Co., Chartered Accountants, whose observations and recommendations are reviewed by the Audit Committee, which also monitors their implementation. Based on the framework of internal financial controls, the work of the internal and statutory auditors and the reviews performed by management and the Audit Committee, the Board is of the opinion that the internal financial controls with reference to the financial statements were adequate and operating effectively during the financial year 2025-26.

Management Discussion and Analysis

Human Resources and Industrial Relations

The Company employed 114 permanent employees as on 31st March, 2026. Industrial relations remained cordial throughout the year, and there has been no union at the Company since its incorporation. The Company continues to invest in skill development, workplace safety and statutory welfare, and maintains full compliance with the Sexual Harassment of Women at Workplace (Prevention, Prohibition and Redressal) Act, 2013 and the Maternity Benefit Act, 1961. No complaints under the POSH Act were received during the year. Against a statutory corporate social responsibility obligation of Rs. 15.85 Lakhs, the Company spent Rs. 31.00 Lakhs during the year on education, healthcare and community welfare initiatives.

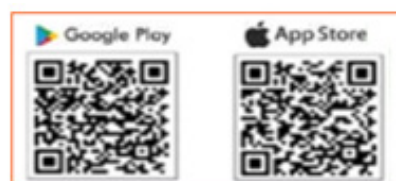

EXPLANATORY STATEMENT IN RESPECT OF THE SPECIAL BUSINESS PURSUANT TO SECTION 102 OF THE COMPANIES ACT, 2013

As required by Section 102 of the Companies Act, 2013 (the Act), the following Explanatory Statement sets out all material facts relating to the business mentioned under Item Nos. 3 to 5 of the accompanying Notice dated August 14, 2026.

Item No 3

The Members of the Company had approved the appointment of Mr. Sorabh Gupta (DIN: 05124195) as an Independent Director of the Company for a term of five (5) consecutive years commencing from 28th May, 2021 to 27th May, 2026, in accordance with the provisions of the Companies Act, 2013 and the SEBI (Listing Obligations and Disclosure Requirements) Regulations, 2015 (“SEBI Listing Regulations”).

Based on the recommendation of the Nomination and Remuneration Committee and considering his skills, experience, expertise, integrity, knowledge, professional standing and valuable guidance provided by him during his tenure as an Independent Director and after taking into account his performance evaluation, the Board of Directors, at its meeting held on 14th May, 2026, has approved and recommended the re-appointment of Mr. Sorabh Gupta as an Independent Director of the Company, not liable to retire by rotation, for a second term of five (5) consecutive years commencing from 28th May, 2026 to 27th May, 2031, subject to the approval of the Members by way of a Special Resolution.

Mr. Sorabh Gupta has given his consent to act as an Independent Director of the Company and has confirmed that he is not disqualified from being appointed as a Director in terms of Section 164 of the Companies Act, 2013. He has also furnished declarations confirming that he meets the criteria of independence as prescribed under Section 149(6) of the Companies Act, 2013 and Regulation 16(1)(b) of the SEBI Listing Regulations and that he has complied with the provisions relating to registration in the databank of Independent Directors, wherever applicable.

In the opinion of the Board, Mr. Sorabh Gupta fulfils the conditions specified under the Companies Act, 2013, the rules made thereunder and the SEBI Listing Regulations for re-appointment as an Independent Director and is independent of the management of the Company. The Board is of the view that his continued association with the Company will be beneficial to the Company and its stakeholders in view of his rich experience, expertise and significant contribution to the deliberations of the Board and its Committees.

A brief profile of Mr. Sorabh Gupta, including his qualifications, experience, expertise, directorships, committee memberships, shareholding in the Company and other details as required under the Companies Act, 2013, the Secretarial Standard on General Meetings (SS-2) and the SEBI Listing Regulations, forms part of the Annexure to the Notice.

Except Mr. Sorabh Gupta and his relatives, to the extent of their interest, if any, none of the Directors, Key Managerial Personnel of the Company or their relatives is, in any way, concerned or interested, financially or otherwise, in the proposed Special Resolution.

Item No 4

FINANCIAL PERFORMANCE AND THE STATE OF THE COMPANY'S AFFAIRS:

The Company continues to operate in the manufacturing of non-woven fabrics, spunbond fabrics and plastic products, catering to diverse industrial applications. During the financial year under review, the Company recorded a profit after tax of ₹1,001.49 Lakhs as compared to ₹1,500.46 Lakhs in the previous financial year. The decline in profitability was primarily attributable to prevailing market conditions, fluctuations in raw material prices, competitive pricing pressures and other operational challenges faced by the industry. Also, US-Iran war added fuel to fire creating worldwide problems.

Looking ahead, the Company remains focused on sustainable and long-term growth. It is planning to expand its manufacturing capabilities by venturing into the Needle Punch non-woven segment, which is expected to diversify the product portfolio and enhance its ability to cater to the growing demand from infrastructure, automotive, construction, filtration, furniture, geotextiles, agriculture, and packing industries.

The manufacturing process is relatively energy-efficient and allows for high production volumes with consistent quality. The product range can be customized in terms of GSM (grams per square meter), thickness, width, colour, and performance characteristics to meet diverse customer requirements. This flexibility enables manufacturers to cater to multiple industry segments and maintain a diversified customer base.

In line with evolving customer preferences and increasing environmental awareness, the Company is also concentrating on the development and promotion of biodegradable and environmentally sustainable materials. This strategic focus is expected to strengthen the Company’s competitive position, support innovation and create new business opportunities in domestic as well as international markets.

The Company will continue to emphasize operational excellence, cost optimisation, product innovation and customer-centric solutions while maintaining prudent financial discipline. With its established manufacturing infrastructure, experienced management and strategic growth initiatives, the Board is confident that the Company is well-positioned to achieve sustainable growth and create long-term value for its stakeholders.

The Board remains confident of the Company’s long-term growth prospects and believes that its strategic initiatives, coupled with prudent financial management, will enable the Company to achieve sustainable growth in the coming years.

The Annual Audited Standalone Financial Statements of the Company are complied with Section 129 of the Companies Act, 2013 (“the Act”) and are prepared in accordance with the Indian Accounting Standards (“Ind AS”) as notified under Section 133 of the Act read with the Companies (Accounts) Rules, 2014 and other applicable provisions of the Act and the Securities and Exchange Board of India (Listing Obligations and Disclosure Requirements) Regulations, 2015 (“the SEBI Listing Regulations”). 1. Corporate information

Fiberweb (India) Limited (“Company”) is a public limited company incorporated and domiciled in India. Its shares are listed on Bombay Stock Exchanges. The Registered office of Company is located at Airport Road, Kadaiya, Nani Daman, Daman (U.T) 396210. The Company is primarily engaged in the business of manufacturing of Spunbond and Melt-blown Nonwoven Fabrics from polypropylene.

2. Basis of preparation of financial statements

2.1. Statement of Compliance

These standalone financial statements of the Company have been prepared in all material aspects in accordance with the recognition and measurement principles laid down in Indian Accounting Standards (hereinafter referred to as the ‘Ind AS’) as notified under section 133 of the Companies Act, 2013 (‘The Act’) read with Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Rules, 2015 as amended and other relevant provisions of the Act and accounting principles generally accepted in India.

The financial statements have been prepared on accrual and going concern basis. The accounting policies are applied consistently to all the periods presented in the financial statements. All assets and liabilities have been classified as current or non-current as per the Company’s normal operating cycle and other criteria as set out in the Division II of Schedule III to the Companies Act, 2013.

2.2. Basis of measurement

These standalone financial statements are prepared under the historical cost convention unless otherwise indicated.

2.3. Use of estimate and judgments

The preparation of standalone financial statements in conformity with Generally Accepted Accounting Principles (GAAP) requires management to make judgments, estimates and assumptions that affect the application of accounting policies and the reported amounts of assets, liabilities, income and expenses and the disclosure of contingent liabilities on the date of the financial statements. Actual results could differ from those estimates. Estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Any revision to accounting estimates is recognized prospectively in current and future periods. Assumptions and estimation uncertainties that have a significant risk of resulting in a material adjustment in the year ended 31 March 2024 are as follows

2.3.1. Property, plant and equipment

Determination of the estimated useful life of property, plant and equipment and the assessment as to which components of the cost may be capitalized. Useful lives of tangible assets are based on the life prescribed in Schedule II of the Act. In cases, where the useful lives are different from that prescribed in Schedule II, they are based on technical advice, taking into account the nature of the asset, the estimated usage of the asset, the operating conditions of the asset, past history of replacement, anticipated technological changes, manufacturers’ warranties and maintenance support.

2.3.2. Allowance for uncollected accounts receivable and advances

Trade receivables do not carry any interest and are stated at their normal value as reduced by appropriate allowances for estimated irrecoverable amounts, Individual trade receivables are written off when management seems them not collectible. Impairment is made on the expected credit loss model. The impairment provisions for financial assets are based on assumption about risk of default and expected loss rates. Judgment in making these assumptions and selecting the inputs to the impairment calculation are based on past history, existing market condition as well as forward looking estimates at the end of each reporting period.

2.3.3. Allowances for inventories

Management reviews the inventory age listing on periodic basis. The review involves comparison of the carrying value of the aged inventory items with the respective net realizable value. The purpose is to ascertain whether an allowance is required to be made in the standalone financial statement for any obsolete and slow-moving items.

2.3.4.Recognition of deferred tax assets and income tax

Deferred tax asset is recognized for all the deductible temporary differences to the extent that it is probable that taxable profit will be available against which the deductible temporary difference can be utilized. The management assumes that taxable profits will be available while recognizing deferred tax asset/liability. Management judgment is required for the calculation of provision for income taxes and deferred tax assets and liabilities. The Company reviews at each balance sheet date the carrying amount of deferred tax asset/liability. The factors used in estimates may differ from actual outcome which could lead to significant adjustment to the amounts reported in the standalone financial statements.

2.3.5.Recognition and measurement of other provisions

The recognition and measurement of other provisions are based on the assessment of the probability of an outflow of resources and on past experience and circumstances known at the balance sheet date. The actual outflow of resources at a future date may, therefore, vary from the figures included in other provisions.

2.3.6.Contingencies

Management judgment is required for estimating the possible outflow of resources, if any, in respect of contingencies/ claim/litigations against the Company as it is not possible to predict the outcome of pending matters with accuracy.

3. Functional and Presentation Currency

The financial statements are presented in Indian Rupees which is the functional currency for the Company.

4. Current / non-current classification

The Company classifies any asset as current when-

- (a) It expects to realize the asset, or intends to sell or consume it, in its normal operating cycle;
- (b) It holds the asset primarily for the purpose of trading;
- (c) It expects to realize the asset within twelve months after the reporting period; or
- (d) The asset is cash or a cash equivalent unless the asset is restricted from being exchanged or used to settle a liability for at least twelve months after the reporting period

Otherwise as non-current.

The Company classifies any liability as current when-

- (a) It expects to settle the liability in its normal operating cycle;
- (b) It holds the liability primarily for the purpose of trading;
- (c) The liability is due to be settled within twelve months after the reporting period; or
- (d) It does not have an unconditional right to defer settlement of the liability for at least twelvemonths after the reporting period. Terms of a liability that could, at the option of the counterparty, result in its settlement by the issue of equity instruments do not affect its classification.

Otherwise as non-current.

Deferred tax assets and liabilities are classified as non-current assets and liabilities.

5. Operating Cycle

An operating cycle is the time between the acquisition of assets for processing and their realization in cash or cash equivalents.

Based on the nature of products / activities of the Company and the normal time between acquisition of assets and their realization in cash or cash equivalents, the Company has determined its operating cycle as twelve months for the purpose of classification of its assets and liabilities as current and non-current.

6. Significant Accounting Policies

6.1. Property, Plant and Equipment

Freehold land is carried at historical cost. All other items of property, plant and equipment are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation and impairment loss, if any.

Cost includes purchase price, borrowing costs if capitalization criteria are met and directly attributable cost of bringing the asset to its working condition for the intended use.

Such cost includes the cost of replacing part of the plant and equipment and borrowing costs for long-term construction projects if the recognition criteria are met. When significant parts of plant and equipment are required to be replaced at intervals, the Company depreciates these components separately based on their specific useful lives. Likewise, when a major inspection is performed, its cost is recognized in the carrying amount of the plant and equipment as a replacement if the recognition criteria are satisfied.

All other repair and maintenance costs are recognized in the statement of profit or loss as incurred.

Capital work-in-progress in respect of assets which are not ready for their intended use are carried at cost, comprising of direct costs, related incidental expenses and attributable interest, if any.

Property, plant and equipment are derecognized either on disposal or when the asset retires from active use. Losses arising in the case of the retirement of property, plant and equipment and gains or losses arising from disposal of property, plant and equipment are recognized in the statement of profit and loss in the year of occurrence.

Depreciable amount for assets is the cost of an asset, or other amount substituted for cost, less its estimated residual value. Depreciation on the property, plant and equipment is provided on straight line method, over the useful life of the assets, as specified in Schedule II to the Companies Act, 2013. Property, plant and equipment which are added / disposed of during the year, depreciation is provided on pro-rata basis.

The assets' residual values, useful lives and methods of depreciation are reviewed at each financial year end and adjusted prospectively, if appropriate.

6.2. Financial Instruments

A financial instrument is any contract that gives rise to a financial asset of one entity and a financial liability or equity instrument of another entity.

Financial Assets

Classification:

The Company classifies financial assets as subsequently measured at amortized cost, fair value through other comprehensive income or fair value through profit or loss, on the basis of its business model for managing the financial assets and the contractual cash flow characteristics of the financial asset.

Initial recognition and measurement:

All financial assets (not measured subsequently at fair value through profit or loss) are recognized initially at fair value plus transaction costs that are attributable to the acquisition of the financial asset.

Subsequent measurement:

For the purpose of subsequent measurement, financial assets are classified in two broad categories:

- Financial assets at fair value (FVTPL /FVTOCI)
- Financial assets at amortized cost

When assets are measured at fair value, gains and losses are either recognized in the statement of profit and loss (i.e. fair value through profit or loss (FVTPL)), or recognized in other comprehensive income (i.e. fair value through other comprehensive income (FVTOCI)).

Financial Assets measured at amortized cost (net of write down for impairment, if any):

Financial assets are measured at amortized cost when asset is held within a business model, whose objective is to hold assets for collecting contractual cash flows and contractual terms of the asset give rise on specified dates to cash flows that are solely payments of principal and interest. Such financial assets are subsequently measured at amortized cost using the effective interest rate (EIR) method less impairment, if any. The losses arising from impairment are recognized in the Statement of profit and loss.

Financial Assets measured at Fair Value through Other Comprehensive Income (“FVTOCI”):

Financial assets under this category are measured initially as well as at each reporting date at fair value, when asset is held within a business model, whose objective is to hold assets for both collecting contractual cash flows and selling financial assets. Fair value movements are recognized in the other comprehensive income.

Financial Assets measured at Fair Value through Profit or Loss (“FVTPL”):

Financial assets under this category are measured initially as well as at each reporting date at fair value with all changes recognized in profit or loss.

Investment in Subsidiary:

Investment in equity instruments of Subsidiaries are measured at cost. In the financial statements, investment in subsidiaries is carried at cost. The carrying amount is reduced to recognize any impairment in the value of investment.

Derecognition of Financial Assets:

A financial asset is primarily derecognized when the rights to receive cash flows from the asset have expired or the Company has transferred its rights to receive cash flows from the asset.

Impairment of Financial Assets:

In accordance with Ind AS 109, the Company applies expected credit loss (ECL) model for measurement and recognition of impairment loss on the financial assets that are debt instruments and trade receivables.

Financial Liabilities:

Classification:

The Company classifies all financial liabilities as subsequently measured at amortized cost or FVTPL.

Initial recognition and measurement:

All financial liabilities are recognized initially at fair value and, in the case of loans, borrowings and payables, net of directly attributable transaction costs.

Financial liabilities include trade and other payables, loans and borrowings including bank overdrafts and derivative financial instruments.

Subsequent measurement:

Financial liabilities at fair value through profit or loss include financial liabilities held for trading and financial liabilities designated upon initial recognition as at fair value through profit or loss. Interest-bearing loans and borrowings are subsequently measured at amortized cost using the Effective Interest Rate (EIR) method. Gains and losses are recognized in profit or loss when the liabilities are derecognized as well as through EIR amortization process. Amortized cost is calculated by taking into account any discount or premium on acquisition and fees or costs that are an integral part of the EIR. The EIR amortization is included as finance costs in the Statement of Profit and Loss.

Derecognition of Financial Liabilities:

A financial liability is derecognized when the obligation under the liability is discharged or cancelled or expires. When an existing financial liability is replaced by another from the same lender on substantially different terms, or the terms of an existing liability are substantially modified, such an exchange or modification is treated as the derecognition of the original liability and the recognition of a new liability. The difference in the respective carrying amounts is recognized in the Statement of Profit and Loss.

6.3. Inventories

Raw materials and packing materials are valued at lower of cost and the net realizable value, cost of which includes duties and taxes (net of Goods and Service Tax wherever applicable). Cost of imported raw materials and packing materials lying in warehouse includes the amount of customs duty. Finished products and work- in-progress are valued at lower of cost and net realizable value. Cost is arrived on moving weighted average basis.

The cost of Inventories have been computed to include all cost of purchases, cost of conversion, appropriate share of fixed production overheads based on normal operating capacity and other related cost incurred in bringing the inventories to their present location and condition.

Net realizable value is the estimated selling price in the ordinary course of business, less the estimated costs of completion and selling expenses necessary to make the sale.

6.4. Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and Cash Equivalents comprise of cash on hand and cash at bank including fixed deposit/highly liquid investments with original maturity period of three months or less that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and which are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value.

For the purpose of the statement of cash flows, cash and cash equivalents consist of cash and short-term deposits, as defined above, net of outstanding bank overdrafts as they are considered an integral part of the Company's cash management.

6.5. Cash Flow Statement

Cash flows are reported using the indirect method, whereby net profit before tax is adjusted for the effects of transactions of a non-cash nature, any deferrals or accruals of past or future operating cash receipts or payments and item of income or expenses associated with investing or financing cash flows. The cash flow from operating, investing and financing activities of the Company is segregated.

6.6. Foreign Currency Transactions

Transactions in foreign currencies are translated into the Company's functional currency at the exchange rates at the dates of the transactions.

Monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are translated into the functional currency at the exchange rate at the reporting date. Non-monetary assets and liabilities that are measured at fair value in a foreign currency are translated into the functional currency at the exchange rate when the fair value was determined. Non-monetary assets and liabilities that are measured based on historical cost in a foreign currency are not translated. Foreign currency exchange differences are generally recognized in the statement of profit and loss.

Exchange differences arising on the settlement of monetary items or on translating monetary items at rates different from those at which they were translated on initial recognition during the period or in previous Financial Statements are recognized in the Standalone Statement of Profit and Loss in the period in which they arise.

6.7. Revenue Recognition

Under Ind AS 115, the Company recognized revenue when (or as) a performance obligation was satisfied, i.e. when 'control' of the goods underlying the particular performance obligation were transferred to the customer.

Sale of Goods

The Company applied Ind AS 115 using the modified retrospective approach. Revenue is measured based on the transaction price adjusted for discounts and rebates, which is specified in a contract with customer. Revenues are net of estimated returns and taxes collected from customers.

Revenue from sale of goods is recognized at point in time when control is transferred to the customer and it is probable that consideration will be collected. Control of goods is transferred upon the shipment of the goods to the customer or when goods are made available to the customer.

The transaction price is documented on the sales invoice and payment is generally due as per agreed credit terms with customers.

The consideration can be fixed or variable. Variable consideration is only recognized when it is highly probable that a significant reversal will not occur.

Sales return is variable consideration that is recognized and recorded based on historical experience, market conditions and provided for in the year of sale as reduction from revenue. The methodology and assumptions used to estimate returns are monitored and adjusted regularly in line with trade practices, historical trends, past experience and projected market conditions.

Interest income

Interest income is recognizes with reference to the Effective Interest Rate method.

Income from Export Benefits and Other Incentives

Export benefit available under prevalent schemes are accrued as revenue in the year in which the goods are exported and/ or services are rendered only when there is reasonable assurance that the condition attached to them will be complied with and the amounts will be received.

6.8. Employee Benefit

Short term employee benefits are recognized as an expense at the undiscounted amount in the statement of profit and loss for the year in which the related service is rendered;

Post-Employment Benefits

Defined contribution plans: Company’s contribution to State governed Provident Fund Scheme is recognized during the year in which the related service is rendered;

The company has not ascertained liability towards payment of gratuity and hence no provision has been made in accounts. It is accounted for on the basis of payment.

All employee benefits payable wholly within twelve months rendering service are classified as short term employee benefits. Benefits such as salaries, wages, short-term compensated absences, performance incentives etc., and the expected cost of bonus, ex- gratia are recognized during the period in which the employee renders related service. Retirement benefits are accounted as and when the same become due for payment.

6.9. Borrowing Costs

Borrowing costs directly attributable to the acquisition, construction or production of an asset that necessarily takes a substantial period of time to get ready for its intended use or sale are capitalized as part of the cost of the asset. All other borrowing costs are expensed in the period in which they occur. Borrowing costs consist of interest and other costs that an entity incurs in connection with the borrowing of funds. Borrowing cost also includes exchange differences to the extent regarded as an adjustment to the borrowing costs.

6.10. Lease

Leases in which a significant portion of the risks and rewards of ownership are retained by the lessor are classified as operating leases. Payments made under operating leases are charged to the Statement of profit and loss on a straight line basis over the period of the lease in a manner which is representative of the time pattern in which benefit derived from the use of the leased asset is diminished.

6.11.Earing Per Share

Basic earnings per equity share are computed by dividing the net profit attributable to the equity holders of the Company by the weighted average number of equity shares outstanding during the period.

Diluted earnings per equity share is computed by dividing the net profit attributable to the equity holders of the Company by the weighted average number of equity shares considered for deriving basic earnings per equity share and also the weighted average number of equity shares that could have been issued upon conversion of all dilutive potential equity shares. The dilutive potential equity shares are adjusted for the proceeds receivable had the equity shares been actually issued at fair value. Dilutive potential equity shares are deemed converted as of the beginning of the period, unless issued at a later date. Dilutive potential equity shares are determined independently for each period presented.

6.12.Income Taxes

Income tax expense comprises current and deferred income tax. Income tax expense is recognized in net profit in the statement of profit and loss except to the extent that it relates to items recognized directly in equity, in which case it is recognized in other comprehensive income. Current income tax for current and prior periods is recognized at the amount expected to be paid to or recovered from the tax authorities, using the tax rates and tax laws that have been enacted by the balance sheet date. Deferred income tax assets and liabilities are recognized for all temporary differences arising between the tax bases of assets and liabilities and their carrying amounts in the financial statements.

Deferred tax assets are reviewed at each reporting date and are reduced to the extent that it is no longer probable that the related tax benefit will be realized.

Deferred income tax assets and liabilities are measured using tax rates and tax laws that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the balance sheet date and are expected to apply to taxable income in the years in which those temporary differences are expected to be recovered or settled.

The effect of changes in tax rates on deferred income tax assets and liabilities is recognized as income or expense in the period that includes the enactment or the substantive enactment date. A deferred income tax asset is recognized to the extent that it is probable that future taxable profit will be available against which the deductible temporary differences and tax losses can be utilized. The Company offsets current tax assets and current tax liabilities, where it has a legally enforceable right to set off the recognized amounts and where it intends either to settle on a net basis, or to realize the asset and settle the liability simultaneously.

Minimum Alternate Tax (‘MAT’) credit is recognized as deferred tax asset only when and to the extent there is convincing evidence that the Company will pay normal income tax during the period for which the MAT credit can be carried forward for set-off against the normal tax liability. MAT credit recognized as an asset is reviewed at each Balance Sheet date and written down to the extent the aforesaid convincing evidence no longer exists.

6.13.Dividends to Shareholders

Annual dividend distribution to the shareholders is recognized as a liability for the previous year for which the dividends are approved by the shareholders. Any interim dividend paid is recognized on approval by Board of Directors. Dividend payable and corresponding tax on dividend distribution is recognized directly in equity.

6.14. Provisions, Contingent Liabilities, Contingent Assets and Commitments

General

Provisions (legal and constructive) are recognized when the Company has a present obligation (legal or constructive) as a result of a past event and it is probable that an outflow of resources will be required to settle the obligation, in respect of which a reliable estimate can be made.

Provisions are not discounted to its present value and are determined based on best estimate required to settle the obligation at the balance sheet date. These are reviewed at each balance sheet date and adjusted to reflect the current best estimates.

If there is any expectation that some or all of the provision will be reimbursed, the reimbursement is recognized as a separate asset but only when the reimbursement is virtually certain. The expense relating to a provision is presented in the statement of profit and loss net of any virtually certain reimbursement.

If the effect of the time value of money is material, provisions are discounted using a current pre-tax rate that reflects, when appropriate, the risk specific to the liability. When discounting is used, the increase in the provision due to the passage of time is recognized as a finance cost.

Contingent liability is disclosed in the case of:

- a present obligation arising from past events, when it is not probable that an outflow of resources will be required to settle the obligation;

- a present obligation arising from past events, when no reliable estimates is possible;

a possible obligation arising from past events, unless the probability of outflow of resources is remote

Contingent liabilities are not recognized but disclosed in the standalone financial statements. Contingent assets are neither recognized nor disclosed in the financial statements.

Commitments include the amount of purchase order (net of advances) issued to parties for completion of assets and Non-cancellable operating lease.

Provisions, contingent liabilities, contingent assets and commitments are reviewed at each balance sheet date.
7. Estimation of uncertainties relating to the global health pandemic from COVID-19:
- The COVID-19 pandemic is an evolving human tragedy declared a global pandemic by the World Health Organization with adverse impact on economy and business. Supply Chain disruptions in India as a result of the outbreak started with restrictions on movement of goods, closure of borders etc., in several states followed by a nationwide lockdown from the 25th of March 2020 announced by the Indian Government, to stem the spread of COVID-19. Due to this, the operations in Company’s manufacturing activities got temporarily disrupted.

In light of these circumstances, the Company has considered the possible effects that may result from COVID-19 on the carrying amounts of financials assets, inventory, receivables, advances, property plant and equipment etc. as well as liabilities accrued. In developing the assumptions relating to the possible future uncertainties in the economic conditions because of this pandemic, the Company has used internal and external information such as our current contract terms, financial strength of partners, investment profile, future volume estimates from the business etc. Having reviewed the underlying data and based on current estimates the Company expects the carrying amount of these assets will be recovered and there is no significant impact on liabilities accrued. The impact of COVID-19 on the Company’s financial statements may differ from that estimated as at the date of approval of these financial statements and the Company will continue to closely monitor any material changes to future economic conditions.

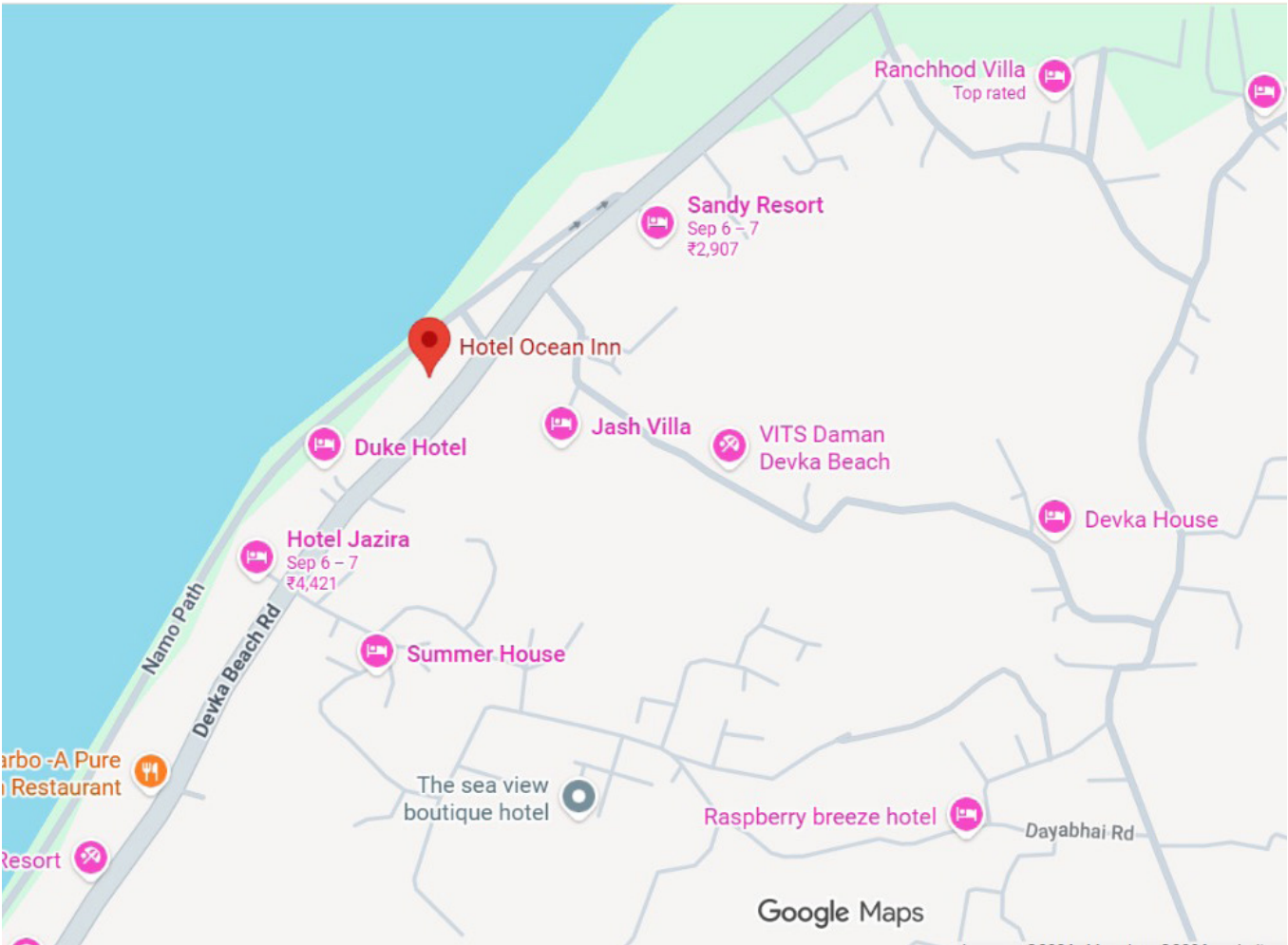
