20. The Board of Directors has appointed Mr. Devendra Deshpande, Practicing Company Secretary, Pune, as the Scrutinizer to scrutinize the e-voting during the AGM and remote e-voting process in a fair and transparent manner.
21. The Scrutinizer shall within a period of not exceeding 48 hours from the conclusion of e-voting period unblock the votes in the presence of at least two (2) witnesses not in employment of the Company and make a Scrutinizer's Report of the votes cast in favour or against, if any, forthwith to the Chairman of the Company. The Chairman or any other person authorized by the Chairman shall declare the result of the voting. 23. Dispute Resolution Mechanism at Stock Exchanges: SEBI, vide its master circular no. SEBI/HO/OIAE/OIAE_IAD-1/P/CIR/2023/145 dated August 11, 2023, provided an option for arbitration as a Dispute Resolution Mechanism for investors. As per this circular, investors can opt for arbitration with Stock Exchanges in case of any dispute against the Company or its Registrar and Share Transfer Agent on delay or default in processing any investor services related requests.

THE INTRUCTIONS OF SHAREHOLDERS FOR REMOTE E-VOTING ARE AS UNDER:

- i. The voting period begins on 15th September, 2026 at 09.00 A.M. and ends on 17th September, 2026 at 05.00 P.M. During this period shareholders' of the Company, holding shares either in physical form or in dematerialized form, as on the cut-off date (record date) of 10th September, 2026 may cast their vote electronically. The e-voting module shall be disabled by Bigshare for voting thereafter.
- ii. Shareholders who have already voted prior to the meeting date would not be entitled to vote at the meeting venue.
- iii. Pursuant to SEBI Circular No. SEBI/HO/CFD/CMD/CIR/P/2020/242 dated 09.12.2020, under Regulation 44 of Securities and Exchange Board of India (Listing Obligations and Disclosure Requirements) Regulations, 2015, listed entities are required to provide remote e-voting facility to its shareholders, in respect of all shareholders' resolutions. However, it has been observed that the participation by the public non-institutional shareholders/retail shareholders is at a negligible level.

Currently, there are multiple e-voting service providers (ESPs) providing e-voting facility to listed entities in India. This necessitates registration on various ESPs and maintenance of multiple user IDs and passwords by the shareholders.

In order to increase the efficiency of the voting process, pursuant to a public consultation, it has been decided to enable e-voting to all the demat account holders, by way of a single login credential, through their demat accounts/ websites of Depositories/ Depository Participants. Demat account holders would be able to cast their vote without having to register again with the ESPs, thereby, not only facilitating seamless authentication but also enhancing ease and convenience of participating in e-voting process.

- iv. In terms of SEBI circular no. SEBI/HO/CFD/CMD/CIR/P/2020/242 dated December 9, 2020 on e-Voting facility provided by Listed Companies, Individual shareholders holding securities in demat mode are allowed to vote through their demat account maintained with Depositories and Depository Participants. Shareholders are advised to update their mobile number and email Id in their demat accounts in order to access e-Voting facility.

Pursuant to above said SEBI Circular, Login method for e-Voting and joining virtual meetings **for Individual shareholders holding securities in Demat mode** is given below:

CHAIRMAN'S LETTER

Dear Shareholders,

FY26 was a year of focused execution, as we strengthened operational discipline and deployed capital efficiently to support long-term growth. While we continued to build on our established position in the saree wholesale segment, we also initiated steps towards diversification, remaining anchored to the core values that have defined us since 1966.

During the year, we took measured steps towards strengthening and expanding our business. While sarees remain at the core of our identity, we continued to build on our existing strengths while exploring adjacent opportunities to enhance long-term value. In this direction, we initiated a pilot entry into the men's ethnic wear segment during the festive season. This early-stage initiative is aimed at assessing customer response and building capabilities in a complementary category, with a disciplined and phased approach to scale.

Operational excellence remained a core focus area during the year. Our transition into a more structured corporate framework has started yielding tangible results. The Company's first exclusive retail outlet, a 15,000 sq. ft. flagship store launched in Kolhapur in June 2025, has provided valuable direct-to-consumer insights, which are now being leveraged to strengthen our B2B operations. This retail initiative, undertaken in furtherance of the Company's stated strategy of broadening its channels of distribution within its existing scope of business, continues to be scaled in a calibrated manner.

Our financial performance during the year reflected healthy demand and disciplined execution. We maintained a strong focus on operational efficiency, cost control and prudent capital allocation, supported by a robust balance sheet and our continued net debt-free position. We effectively deployed our IPO proceeds towards working capital and operational requirements, ensuring efficient utilization of capital. In line with our commitment to shareholder returns, the Board declared an interim dividend of ₹1.515 per share during the year.

The Indian ethnic wear market continues to offer long-term growth potential, supported by increasing demand from Tier II and Tier III cities, rising aspirations, and the ongoing shift towards organized players. At the same time, the sector remains sensitive to seasonal demand patterns and input cost fluctuations, requiring disciplined execution and agile inventory management.

As we look ahead, our focus remains on strengthening our core wholesale business and scaling new initiatives in a calibrated manner. We remain committed to disciplined growth, prudent capital allocation, and building a more resilient and diversified business over time.

During the year, with a view to diversify its business operations and unlock new avenues of long-term growth, we sought and obtained the approval of its shareholders, by way of a Special Resolution passed through postal ballot, to amend its Memorandum of Association to include real estate development as an additional object of the Company. The results were declared on January 3, 2026.

The resolution received overwhelming support from shareholders, with 99.95% of votes cast in favour and only 0.05% against, reflecting strong stakeholder confidence in the Board's strategic direction and long-term vision for the Company.

This amendment provides the flexibility to evaluate, and in due course participate in, opportunities within the real estate sector as and when suitable projects are identified, in a manner intended to complement rather than substitute our core textile trading business. FINANCIAL HIGHLIGHTS:

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Indian Accounting Standard (Ind AS). Adhering to Ind AS ensures compliance, transparency, and reliability in financial reporting, accurately presenting the Company's financial position, performance, and cash flows.

STATE OF COMPANY'S AFFAIRS AND FUTURE OUTLOOK:

During the year under review, the Company recorded a turnover of Rs. 6311.62 million as against Rs. 6035.90 million in the previous year, reflecting growth in its core operations. However, Profit After Tax stood at Rs. 234.06 million, compared to Rs. 305.76 million in the previous year, primarily by a normalization in inventory movement (the prior year benefited from inventory drawdown), coupled with continued investment in employee costs and depreciation associated with the Company's expansion. Notably, finance costs declined significantly, reflecting improved capital efficiency and reduced leverage.

The Indian ethnic wear market remains resilient, supported by cultural preferences, wedding and festival cycles, and increasing adoption of traditional attire across age groups. The Company is well-positioned to benefit from these trends, especially with the shift towards organized and technology-enabled distribution channels. The Company distinguishes itself through a strong supplier ecosystem, deep-rooted customer relationships, efficient supply chain practices, and an experienced leadership team. Our strategic presence in Kolhapur - a key trading hub - offers locational advantages and strong vendor access.

Your Company continues to source from over 900 weavers and offers more than 3,00,000 stock-keeping units (SKUs) to a base of approximately 13,000 active B2B customers. The product mix continues to be dominated by sarees, with supplementary offerings including kurtis, dress materials, lehengas, blouse pieces, and ethnic bottoms.

In parallel, the addition of real estate development as an object of the Company marks the beginning of a considered diversification strategy aimed at creating additional, longer-term avenues of value creation for shareholders. The Board remains focused on pursuing this opportunity prudently, ensuring that any future steps in this direction are backed by rigorous evaluation and are aligned with the Company's overall risk appetite and capital allocation priorities.

Taken together, the Board is confident that the Company's core operational strengths, sound financial position, and the strategic optionality created during the year leave it well placed to deliver sustainable growth and improved profitability in the years ahead.

TRANSFER TO RESERVES:

The Board of Directors of your company have decided not to transfer any amount to the reserves for the year under review.

DIVIDEND:

During the financial year 2025-26, your Company has paid out Rs. 60 million as Dividend to its shareholders, in the following manner:

The aforesaid Dividend was paid by the Company within prescribed timelines, through permissible modes via electronic transfer and warrants/ demand drafts for cases where bank account details were inadequate or electronic transmission had failed.

CHANGE IN NATURE OF BUSINESS, IF ANY:

During the year, with a view to diversify its business operations and unlock new avenues of growth, your Company sought and obtained shareholders' approval, by way of a Special Resolution passed through postal ballot (e-voting concluded on January 1, 2026), to amend its Memorandum of Association to include real

estate development as an additional object of the Company. The resolution received overwhelming support from shareholders, with over 99.95% of votes cast in favour, reflecting strong shareholder confidence in the Board's strategic direction.

This amendment provides your Company the flexibility to explore opportunities in the real estate sector as and when suitable projects are identified, complementing its core textile trading business rather than substituting it. Your Company's debt-free status and healthy cash reserves position it well to evaluate such opportunities in a disciplined and value-accretive manner, without placing strain on its existing operations.

The Board views this development as part of a broader strategy to diversify revenue streams over the medium to long term, alongside continued investment in the Company's core saree and ethnic-wear wholesale business, including recent expansion into retail and men's ethnic wear categories and enhanced procurement infrastructure.

SHARE CAPITAL OF THE COMPANY:

The Authorized Capital is Rs 41,00,00,000 (Rupees Forty One Crores Only) and the paid-up equity share capital as on March 31, 2026 is Rs. 39,59,98,000 (Rupees Thirty Nine crores Fifty Nine Lakhs Ninety Eight Thousand Only) divided into 3,95,99,800 (Three crores Ninety Five lakhs Ninety Nine Thousand Eight Hundred Only) equity shares of Rs 10 each.

PUBLIC DEPOSITS:

The Company has not accepted or renewed any amount falling within the purview of provisions of Section 73 of the Act read with the Companies (Acceptance of Deposit) Rules, 2014, during the year under review. The Company operates in a high-volume, fast-moving inventory environment with a wide range of stock-keeping units (SKUs), particularly in the textile and garment trading segment. During the year under review, detailed quantitative stock records were not maintained in an integrated system format due to legacy manual processes and transition-related challenges. However, the closing inventory has been physically verified and appropriately valued at the year-end in accordance with applicable accounting standards and established internal procedures.

Sanjay Vhanbatte & Company would be completing their term as the Statutory Auditors of the Company at this Annual General Meeting. Upon recommendation of the Audit Committee, the Board of Directors of the Company at their Meeting held on August 14, 2026, have recommended, the appointment of M/s. PPC & Co, Chartered Accountants, having Firm Registration Number: 136439W, as the Statutory Auditors of the Company. M/s. PPC & Co have confirmed their eligibility for appointment under Section 139 read with Section 141 of the Companies Act, 2013. The Directors present the company's Report on Corporate Governance for the year ended March 31, 2026. Its governance framework integrates disciplined oversight, effective internal controls, and a comprehensive risk management system, ensuring timely and accurate disclosures. The Company values Board independence and diversity, supported by clearly demarcated roles for management and oversight, and is committed to continual benchmarking against industry-leading practices—reflecting peer standards under Clause 49 and evolving governance norms. Through this approach, Saraswati fosters stakeholder confidence, reinforces trust, and drives sustainable business growth.

The Company has adopted the Code of Conduct ('CoC') for its employees, including the Whole-time Directors ('WTDs'), Non-Executive Directors (NED) which encompasses an appropriate mechanism to report any concern pertaining to non-adherence to the said Code. Pursuant to Regulation 26(5) of the SEBI Listing Regulations, all members of the Senior Management have confirmed that there are no material, financial and commercial transactions wherein they have a personal interest that may have a potential conflict with the interest of the Company at large. Pursuant to Regulation 26(3) of the SEBI Listing Regulations, all the Board Members and Senior Management of the Company as on March 31, 2026 have affirmed compliance with their respective Codes of Conduct. A Declaration to this effect, duly signed by the Managing Director & Chief Executive Officer ('MD & CEO') is reproduced at the end of this Report.

Mr. Maniklal Karmakar (DIN: 10131711), Mr. Yatiraj Marda (DIN: 10174363) and Mr. Amar Thorat (DIN: 02223782), Independent Directors, completed their first term on June 19, 2026, June 19, 2026 and August 1, 2026 respectively. Further, Mr. Yatiraj Marda and Mr. Amar Thorat have been re-appointed as Independent Directors subject to approval of the shareholders at this Annual General Meeting.

MANAGEMENT DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS REPORT

2. GLOBAL ECONOMIC OVERVIEW

The global economy in FY26 has transitioned into what may be best described as an "era of resilient normalization." Following a prolonged phase of monetary tightening across major economies between 2023 and 2025, global growth has demonstrated notable stability, defying earlier expectations of a sharp slowdown. Policymakers across developed markets have largely succeeded in engineering a soft landing, balancing inflation control with economic continuity.

Global GDP growth is estimated at approximately 3.3% in 2026, reflecting a modest but stable expansion. This resilience has been achieved despite ongoing geopolitical tensions, fragmented trade dynamics and periodic commodity price volatility. A defining feature of the current global environment is the divergence in regional growth trajectories. While the United States continues to exhibit strength supported by robust labor markets and innovation-led productivity, the Eurozone remains relatively subdued, constrained by energy uncertainties and weaker industrial output.

Emerging markets, particularly in Asia, continue to anchor global growth. Structural shifts in global supply chains—most notably the "China Plus One" strategy—have accelerated, evolving from a tactical

diversification approach into a long-term realignment of manufacturing capabilities. Countries such as India, Vietnam and Bangladesh are increasingly benefiting from this transition, positioning themselves as key global production hubs.

For the textile and apparel sector, these developments carry significant implications. The reconfiguration of global sourcing patterns has enhanced India's relevance within the global value chain, supported by its integrated manufacturing ecosystem and favorable demographic profile. At the same time, input cost volatility—particularly in synthetic fibers such as polyester and viscose—continues to pose challenges, driven largely by fluctuations in crude oil prices and geopolitical developments.

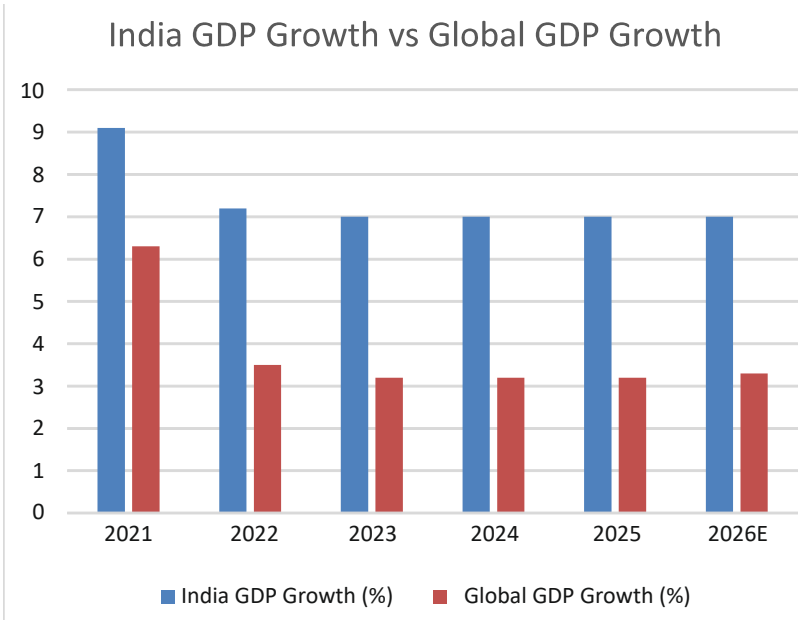
Additionally, sustainability considerations are increasingly shaping global production and consumption trends. Regulatory pressures and consumer preferences are accelerating the adoption of environmentally responsible sourcing, recycled materials and circular manufacturing practices.

3. INDIAN ECONOMIC OVERVIEW

India continues to reinforce its position as the fastest-growing major economy globally, with GDP growth estimated at approximately 7.0% in FY26. This growth reflects not merely cyclical recovery but a deeper structural strengthening of the economy.



The growth momentum is underpinned by three key drivers. First, sustained government capital expenditure in infrastructure and manufacturing has enhanced productivity and improved logistics efficiency. Second, the rapid expansion of digital infrastructure—through platforms such as UPI, Aadhaar and e-commerce ecosystems—has deepened financial inclusion and broadened consumption access. Third, resilient domestic consumption, supported by improving income levels, continues to act as a stable growth engine.

A notable development during the year has been the revival of rural demand. Favorable monsoon conditions, improved

agricultural output and supportive policy measures such as higher Minimum Support Prices have contributed to increased rural incomes. This has translated into stronger discretionary spending, particularly in categories linked to social and cultural consumption such as apparel, weddings and festive purchases.

The consumption pattern, which previously reflected a “K-shaped recovery,” is now showing signs of normalization, with broader participation across income segments. Inflation has remained within the Reserve Bank of India's target range of 2%–6%, supporting purchasing power and consumption stability.

For the saree industry, which is intrinsically linked to cultural occasions and discretionary spending cycles, these macroeconomic trends provide a strong demand foundation. The resurgence in weddings, festivals and traditional events has positively influenced consumption patterns, reinforcing growth prospects for the sector.

4. INDUSTRY STRUCTURE AND DEVELOPMENT

A. Textile and Apparel Market

The Indian textile and apparel market continues to demonstrate robust long-term growth potential, with its size estimated at USD 248.70 billion in 2025 and projected to reach USD 656.31 billion by 2034, registering a strong CAGR of 11.38% over 2026–2034. This growth trajectory is underpinned by a combination of structural drivers including rising domestic consumption, increasing export competitiveness and policy support through initiatives such as PLI schemes and textile parks. The sector remains a vital pillar of India's economy, contributing significantly to GDP, exports and employment, while also acting as a bridge between traditional craftsmanship and modern industrial capabilities.

From a raw material perspective, natural fibres continue to dominate the industry, accounting for approximately 56% of the market in 2025. This dominance is largely attributed to India's strong cotton production base, well-established ginning and spinning infrastructure and a long-standing legacy of handloom and textile traditions. The availability of diverse natural fibres such as cotton, silk, wool and jute supports a wide spectrum of textile applications, enabling India to cater to both mass-market and premium segments across domestic and global markets.

In terms of application, clothing textiles remain the largest demand driver, contributing around 40% of the total market share in 2025. This is supported by India's large and growing population, rising disposable incomes, increasing urbanisation and heightened fashion awareness, particularly among younger consumers. Additionally, the rapid expansion of organised retail, e-commerce platforms and fast-fashion brands has further accelerated apparel consumption, positioning clothing textiles as the primary growth engine for the sector.

At the product level, fabric accounts for the largest share at approximately 38% in 2025, highlighting the importance of the intermediate value chain where yarn is converted into usable textile material. Regionally, Maharashtra leads the textile landscape with a 20% market share, driven by strong industrial clusters in Mumbai and Pune, established textile manufacturing infrastructure and strategic access to ports that facilitate efficient trade. This regional concentration reinforces Maharashtra's role as a key hub for both domestic distribution and export-oriented textile production.

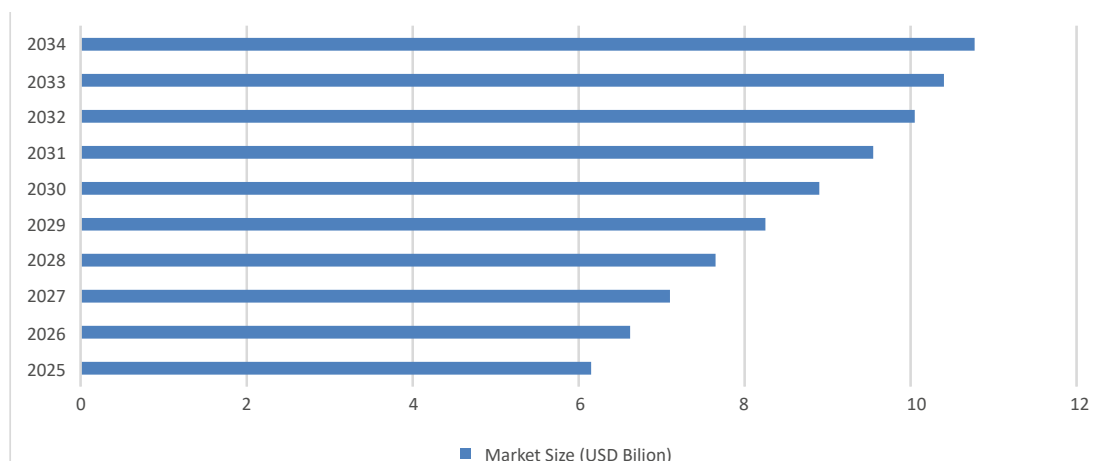

B. India Saree Market – Structural Insights

The saree continues to be the largest category within women's ethnic wear in India, retaining its cultural significance while adapting to contemporary fashion trends. The market is witnessing steady growth, supported by increasing formalization and a gradual shift toward organized retail structures.

The market size is estimated to grow from USD 6.15 billion in 2025 to USD 6.62 billion in 2026, with a long-term projection of USD 10.77 billion by 2034. A key growth driver is the emergence of the “affordable premium” segment, typically priced between ₹800 and ₹3,000. This segment reflects a convergence of aspiration and value, with consumers seeking improved fabric quality, contemporary designs and competitive pricing.

This evolving consumer preference is reshaping product offerings and driving innovation across the value chain, creating opportunities for scalable and organized players.

C. Digital Transformation and Changing Consumption Patterns

The saree industry is undergoing a meaningful transformation driven by digital adoption and evolving consumer behavior. Social commerce platforms such as WhatsApp and Instagram have become integral to B2B transactions, enabling seamless product discovery and order placement. Simultaneously, the expansion of e-commerce into Tier-2 and Tier-3 markets has significantly widened the addressable market.

Consumer preferences are also shifting toward convenience and customization. The demand for ready-to-wear and pre-stitched sarees is growing rapidly, particularly among younger consumers, with this segment witnessing strong double-digit growth. These trends are redefining traditional distribution models and enabling more agile, technology-driven business approaches.

5. COMPANY OVERVIEW

Saraswati Saree Depot Ltd. (SSDL) is a key player in sarees wholesale (B2B) segment and its origin into the sarees business dates back to the year 1966. It is also engaged in the wholesale business of other women's apparel wear such as Kurtis, dress materials, blouse pieces, lehengas, bottoms, etc. Its product catalogue consists of more than 3,00,000 different SKUs.

The Company expanded their product range to include ready-made garments in 2017 with the beginning of Kurti sales. Since then, the ready-mades portfolio has grown to include several other offerings such as bottoms, pyjamas, one-piece clothing and dresses. The Kurti business of the partnership firm has grown significantly and has been recognized with awards such as "Star of the Industry" and "Iconic Brand" at the annual Kurti Expo events.

The sarees are sourced from different manufacturers across India. Over the years, Company has developed relationships with manufacturers in hubs like Surat, Varanasi, Mau, Madurai, Dharmavaram, Kolkata, and Bengaluru. It regularly sources sarees and other women's apparels from more than 9000 weavers/suppliers across different states in India.

6. OPPORTUNITIES, RISKS AND CONCERNS

The saree market in India continues to evolve with changing consumer dynamics and increasing workforce participation among women, driving the emergence of "professional ethnic wear". This shift is transforming sarees from occasion-based attire to everyday workwear, resulting in more stable and non-seasonal demand.

The industry is largely driven by the economy segment, which holds ~55% market share, reflecting strong demand from price-conscious consumers. Additionally, cotton sarees dominate with ~23% market share, supported by their affordability, comfort and suitability for India's climate.

Digital transformation is further accelerating growth, with increasing adoption of B2B e-commerce platforms, AI-based recommendations and virtual draping technologies, enabling better inventory management and deeper penetration into Tier 2 and Tier 3 markets.

The market is also witnessing a trend of premiumization and fusion wear, including ready-to-wear and Indo-Western sarees, which are gaining traction among younger consumers and expanding the overall addressable market.

Threats

The industry faces **raw material price volatility**, particularly in cotton and synthetic yarns, which can significantly impact margins in a low-margin wholesale environment. It also remains highly fragmented, with a large presence of unorganized players competing aggressively on pricing, thereby limiting pricing power and customer stickiness for organized businesses.

Further, a **shift toward Western and casual wear**, especially among younger consumers, may reduce the frequency of saree usage in urban markets, restricting demand primarily to occasions. Additionally, **supply chain disruptions and global uncertainties** can increase logistics costs, delay procurement and impact overall operational efficiency, particularly for businesses dependent on large-scale distribution networks.

8. Internal Control Systems and Adequacy

The scope and coverage of the internal audit is guided by a risk-based internal audit plan, which is reviewed annually and approved by the Audit Committee.

Reports of the Internal Auditor are placed before the Audit Committee for its review. Based on such reports, corrective actions are undertaken by the respective process owners, under the supervision and follow-up of the Audit Committee, to strengthen the control environment. Disciplinary action is initiated by the management, wherever warranted, for non-compliance with corporate policies and controls.

Owing to the inherent limitations of any internal control system, including the possibility of collusion or override of controls by management or employees, there can be no absolute assurance that all events of error or fraud will be detected. However, the internal control systems are periodically reviewed by management and the Internal Auditor to identify weaknesses and are strengthened accordingly, with the objective of ensuring optimal utilization of resources, improving financial management, and facilitating appropriate information flow for effective monitoring.

9. HUMAN RESOURCES

The Company's workforce is central to its operational success. With a team of over 500 employees, the focus remains on continuous skill development, performance-driven incentives and employee engagement. The Company has maintained a stable workforce with low attrition levels, reflecting a positive organizational culture and alignment between employee and business objectives.

10. OUTLOOK

The outlook for FY27 remains positive, supported by favorable macroeconomic conditions, improving rural demand and structural growth within the textile sector. The continued formalization of the saree market, expansion of the affordable premium segment and increasing digitalization of distribution channels are expected to drive sustainable growth.

With a clear strategic focus on scale, efficiency and customer-centricity, Saraswati Saree Depot Limited is well-positioned to capitalize on emerging opportunities and deliver long-term value creation.

In our opinion, except for the effects/possible effects of the material weaknesses described above on the achievement of the objectives of the control criteria, the Company has maintained, in all material respects, adequate internal financial controls over financial reporting and such internal financial controls over financial reporting were operating effectively as of March 31, 2026.

We have considered the material weaknesses identified and reported above in determining the nature,

timing, and extent of audit tests applied in our audit of the March 31, 2026 financial statements of the Company, and these material weaknesses do not affect our opinion on the financial statements of the Company except for inventory.

- d. Depreciation is charged in accordance with the company's accounting policy and applicable accounting standards. The Company uses a utility-based system for computation of depreciation. On Sample basis, the calculations are found arithmetically accurate and consistent with applicable rates and useful life.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS
FOR THE YEAR ENDED MARCH 31, 2026

A. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

1.1 Basis for preparation of accounts

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with IND AS and Disclosures thereon comply with requirements of IND AS, stipulations contained in Schedule- III-Division II (revised) as applicable under Section 133 of the Companies Act, 2013 read with Rule 7 of the Companies (Accounts) Rules 2014, Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Rules, 2015 as amended from time to time, other pronouncements of ICAI, provisions of the Companies Act. Assets and liabilities have been classified as current or non-current as per the Company's normal operating cycle and other criteria set out in revised Schedule - III to the Companies Act, 2013.

1.2 Use of Estimates

IND AS enjoins management to make estimates and assumptions related to financial statements that affect reported amount of assets, liabilities, revenue, expenses and contingent liabilities pertaining to the year. Actual result may differ from such estimates. Any revision in accounting estimates is recognized prospectively in the period of change and material revision, including its impact on financial statements, is reported in the notes to accounts in the year of incorporation of revision.

1.3 Recognition of Income and Expenses

- i. Revenue from sale contracts with customers is recognized when control of the goods or services are transferred to the customer at an amount that reflects the consideration entitled in exchange for those goods or services. The Company typically controls the goods or services before transferring them to the customer. Generally, control is transferred upon shipment of goods to the customer or when the goods are made available to the customer, provided transfer of title to the customer occurs and the Company has not retained any significant risks of ownership or future obligations with respect to the goods transported.
- ii. Interest Income is recognized on time proportion basis taking into account the amount outstanding and the rate applicable.
- iii. Other incomes have been recognized on accrual basis in financial statements.

1.4 Property, Plants and Equipment

The tangible assets are held for use in supply of goods or services or for administrative purposes. These are recognized and carried under cost model i.e. cost less accumulated depreciation and impairment loss, if any which is akin to recognition criteria under erstwhile GAAP.

- i. Cost includes freight, duties, taxes and other expenses directly incidental to acquisition, bringing the asset to the location and installation including site restoration up to the time when the asset is ready for intended use. Such Costs also include Borrowing Cost if the recognition criteria are met.

- ii. When a major inspection/repair occurs, its cost is recognized in the carrying amount of the plant and equipment as a replacement if the recognition criteria are satisfied. Any remaining carrying amount of the cost of previous inspection/repair is derecognized.
- iii. Depreciation has been provided on written down value method in terms of expected life span of assets as referred to in Schedule II of the Companies Act, 2013.
- iv. Components relevant to fixed assets, where significant are separately depreciated on written down value basis in terms of their life span assessed by technical evaluation in specific context.
- v. On sales of fixed assets any profit earned/loss sustained towards excess/shortfall of sale value Vis-a- vis carrying cost of assets is accounted for in statement of profit and loss.

1.5 Impairment of Non-Financial Assets

- i. The Company assesses at each reporting date as to whether there is any indication that any Property Plant and Equipment and Intangible Assets or group of Assets, called Cash Generating Units (CGU) may be impaired. If any such indication exists, the recoverable amount of an asset or CGU is estimated to determine the extent of impairment, if any. When it is not possible to estimate the recoverable amount of an individual asset, the Company estimates the recoverable amount of the CGU to which the asset belongs.
- ii. An impairment loss is recognised in the Statement of Profit and Loss to the extent, asset's carrying amount exceeds its recoverable amount. The recoverable amount is higher of an asset's fair value less cost of disposal and value in use. Value in use is based on the estimated future cash flows, discounted to their present value using pre-tax discount rate that reflects current market assessments of the time value of money and risk specific to the assets.
- iii. The impairment loss recognised in prior accounting period is reversed if there has been a change in the estimate of recoverable amount.

1.6 Financial Instruments

i. Financial Assets

Initial Recognition and Measurement

All financial assets are recognized initially at fair value plus, in the case of financial assets not recorded at fair value through profit or loss, transaction costs that are attributable to the acquisition of the financial asset.

Subsequent Measurement

For purpose of subsequent measurement, financial assets are classified in two broad categories:

- Financial Assets at fair value
- Financial Assets at amortized cost

Where assets are measured at fair value, gains and losses are either recognized entirely in the statement of profit and loss, or recognized in other comprehensive income.

A financial asset that meets the following two conditions is measured at amortized cost.

- Business Model Test: The objective of company's business model is to hold the financial asset to collect the contractual cash flows.
- Cash Flow Characteristics Test: The contractual terms of the financial asset give rise on specified dates to cash flows that are solely payment of principal and interest on the principal amount outstanding.

A financial asset that meets the following two conditions is measured at fair value through OCI: -

- Business Model Test: The financial asset is held within a business model whose objective is achieved by both collecting contractual cash flows and selling financial assets.
- Cash Flow Characteristics Test: The contractual terms of the financial asset give rise on specified dates to cash flows that are solely payment of principal and interest on the principal amount outstanding.

All other financial assets are measured at fair value through profit and loss.

All equity investments are measured at fair value in the balance sheet, with value changes recognized in the statement of profit and loss, except for those equity investments for which the entity has elected irrevocable option to present value changes in OCI.

Impairment of Financial Assets

The company assesses impairment based on expected credit losses (ECL) model at an amount equal to:

- 12 months expected credit losses, or
- Lifetime expected credit losses

Depending upon whether there has been a significant increase in credit risk since initial recognition.

However, for trade receivables, the company does not track the changes in credit risk. Rather, it recognizes impairment loss allowances based on lifetime ECLs at each reporting date, right from its initial recognition.

ii. Financial Liabilities

All financial liabilities are initially recognized at fair value and, in the case of loans and borrowings and payables, net of directly attributable transaction costs.

Financial liabilities are classified as measured at amortized cost or Fair Value Through Profit and Loss (FVTPL). A financial liability is classified as FVTPL if it is classified as held for trading, or it is a derivative or is designated as such on initial recognition. Financial Liabilities at FVTPL are measured at fair value and net gains or losses, including any interest expense, are recognized in statement of profit and loss. Other financial liabilities are subsequently measured at amortized cost using the effective interest method. Interest expense and foreign exchange gains and losses are recognized in statement of profit and loss. Any gain or loss on de-recognition is also recognized in statement of profit and loss.

1.7 Fair Value Measurement

The company measures financial instruments at fair value at each balance sheet date.

Fair Value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. The fair value measurement is based on the presumption that the transaction to sell the asset or transfer the liability takes place either:

- In the principal market for the asset or liability, or
- In the absence of a principal market, in the most advantageous market for the asset or liability.

The principal or the most advantageous market must be accessible by the company.

The fair value of an asset or a liability is measured using the assumptions that market participants would use when pricing the asset or liability, assuming that market participants act in their economic best interest.

A fair value measurement of a non-financial asset takes into account a market participant's ability to generate economic benefits by using the asset in its highest and best use or by selling it to another market participant that would use the asset in its highest and best use.

The Company uses valuation techniques that are appropriate in the circumstances and for which sufficient data are available to measure fair value, maximizing the use of relevant observable inputs and minimizing the use of unobservable inputs.

All assets and liabilities for which fair value is measured or disclosed in the financial statements are categorized within the fair value hierarchy, described as follows, based on the lowest level input that is significant to the fair value measurement as a whole:

- Level 1 - Quoted (unadjusted) market prices in active markets for identified assets or liabilities
- Level 2 - Valuation techniques for which the lowest level of input that is significant to the fair value measurement is directly or indirectly observable
- Level 3 - Valuation techniques for which the lowest level input that is significant to the fair value measurement is unobservable

For the purpose of fair value disclosure, the Company has determined classes of assets and liabilities on the basis of the nature, characteristics and risks of the asset or liability and the level of the fair value hierarchy as explained above.

1.8 Inventories

Inventories are valued at the lower of cost or net realizable value. Cost includes purchase price, duties, transport & handing costs and other costs directly attributable to the acquisition and bringing the inventories to their present location and condition.

The cost in respect of trading goods and packing material is determined under the First in First Out method.

1.9 Employee Benefits

i. Short term employee benefits

Liabilities for wages and salaries, including non-monetary benefits that are expected to be settled wholly within 12 months after the end of the period are recognized in respect of employees' services up to the end of the reporting period and are measured at the amounts expected to be incurred when the liabilities are settled. The liabilities are presented as current employee benefit obligations in the balance sheet.

ii. Long term/Post Separation employee benefit plan

➤ Defined Contribution Plan:

The company's contributions to recognized Provident Fund and Labour Welfare Fund are charged to profit and loss account on accrual basis.

➤ Defined Benefit Plan:

The Company has made necessary provisions in the accounts in line with the requirement of AS-15.

1.10 Income Tax and Deferred Tax

The liability of company on account of Income Tax is computed considering the provisions of the Income Tax Act, 1961.

Deferred tax is provided using balance sheet approach on temporary differences at the reporting date as difference between the tax base and the carrying amount of assets and liabilities. Deferred tax is recognized subject to the probability that taxable profit will be available against which the temporary differences can be reversed.

Deferred tax assets and liabilities are measured at the tax rates that are expected to apply in the year when the asset is realized or the liability is settled, based on tax rates (and tax laws) that have been enacted or substantively enacted at the reporting date. Deferred tax relating to items recognized outside profit or loss is recognized outside profit or loss (either in other comprehensive income or in equity).

Deferred tax assets and deferred tax liabilities are offset if a legally enforceable right exists to set off current tax assets against current tax liabilities and the deferred taxes relate to the same taxable entity and the same taxation authority.

1.11 Provisions, Contingent Liability and Contingent Assets

Disputed liabilities and claims against the company including claims raised by fiscal authorities (e.g. Sales Tax, Income Tax, Excise etc.) pending in appeal or court for which no reliable estimate can be made and or involves uncertainty of the outcome of the amount of the obligation or which are remotely poised for crystallization are not provided for in accounts but disclosed in notes to accounts.

However, present obligation as a result of past event with possibility of outflow of resources, when reliable estimation can be made of the amount of obligation, if any, is recognized in accounts in terms of discounted value, if the time value of money is material using a current pre-tax rate that reflects the risk specific to the liability. No contingent asset is recognized by the company.

1.12 Foreign Currency Translation

The company's financial statements are presented in INR, which is also the company's functional currency.

- i. Transactions in foreign currencies, if any, are recognized at rate of overseas currency ruling on the date of transactions. Gain/Loss arising on account of rise or fall in overseas currencies vis-à-vis functional currency between the date and that of payment is charged to Statement of Profit and Loss.
- ii. Monetary Assets in foreign currencies, if any, are translated into functional currency at the exchange rate ruling at the Reporting Date and the resultant gain or loss is accounted for in the Statement of Profit and Loss.
- iii. Non-Monetary items which are carried at historical cost denominated in a foreign currency, if any, are reported using the exchange rate at the date of transaction.
- iv. Impact of exchange fluctuation, if any, is separately disclosed in the notes to accounts.

1.13 Earnings Per Share

Basic Earnings per share is calculated by dividing:

- the net profit for the period attributable to equity shareholders
- by the weighted average number of equity shares outstanding during the period.

For the purpose of calculating diluted earnings per share:

- the net profit for the period attributed to equity shareholders
- and the weighted average number of shares outstanding during the period
- is adjusted for the effects of all dilutive potential equity shares.

1.14 Borrowing Costs

Borrowing cost, if any, that are directly attributable to the acquisition, construction, or production of a *qualifying asset are capitalized as a part of the cost of such asset till such time the asset is ready for its intended use or sale.

Borrowing cost consists of interest and other costs that an entity incurs in connection with the

borrowing of funds. Borrowing costs also includes exchange differences, if any, to the extent regarded as an adjustment to the borrowing costs. All other borrowing costs are recognized as expense in the period in which they are incurred.

* A qualifying asset is an asset that necessarily requires a substantial period of time to get ready for its intended use or sale.

1.15 Cash and Cash Equivalents

For the purpose of presentation in the statement of cash flows, cash and cash equivalents includes cash on hand, deposits held at call with financial institutions, other short- term, highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and which are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value.

Credit Risk:

Credit risk is the risk of financial loss to the Company if a customer or counterparty to a financial instrument fails to meet its contractual obligations, and arises principally from the Company's receivables from customers. Credit risk is managed through credit approvals, establishing credit limits and continuously monitoring the creditworthiness of customers to which the Company grants credit terms in the normal course of business. The Company establishes an allowance for doubtful debts and impairment that represents its estimate of expected losses in respect of trade receivables.

Liquidity Risk:

Liquidity risk is the risk that the Company will not be able to meet its financial obligations as they become due. The Company manages its liquidity risk by ensuring, as far as possible, that it will always have sufficient liquidity to meet its liabilities when due, under both normal and stressed conditions, without incurring unacceptable losses or risk to the Company's reputation.
