Industry Overview and Structural Strength

Gold loans represent one of the most structurally robust and culturally aligned credit products in India's financial ecosystem. The country's households are estimated to hold more than 25,000 tonnes of gold, much of which remains idle in the form of jewellery. This vast stock of underutilized assets provides a natural and highly liquid collateral base for lending institutions. Unlike other forms of secured lending, gold loans benefit from deep emotional trust, universal acceptance, and ease of valuation, making them particularly suitable for rural and semi-urban markets. The product has historically served as a reliable source of liquidity during periods of financial stress, agricultural cycles, or business cash flow mismatches, thereby embedding itself as an essential financial tool across income segments.

Growth Momentum and Market Expansion

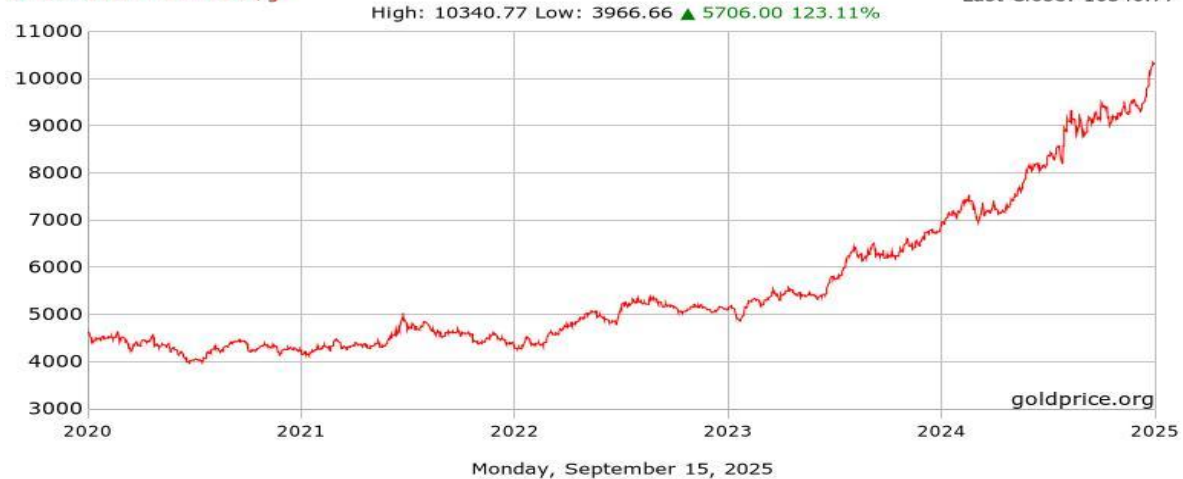
The gold loan market in India has witnessed strong and sustained growth over the past few years, emerging as one of the fastest-growing segments within retail credit. This expansion has been driven by a combination of macroeconomic and structural factors, including rising gold prices, increased demand for secured lending products, and tightening credit conditions in unsecured segments. As illustrated above, the industry has nearly doubled in size over a short period, reflecting both increased borrower acceptance and lender focus. Importantly, gold loans have gained prominence not only in rural markets but also among urban borrowers seeking short-term liquidity without undergoing extensive credit evaluation processes. This growth trajectory underscores a broader shift within the financial sector toward collateral-backed lending, which offers greater stability and lower credit risk.

Impact of Gold Prices on Lending Dynamics

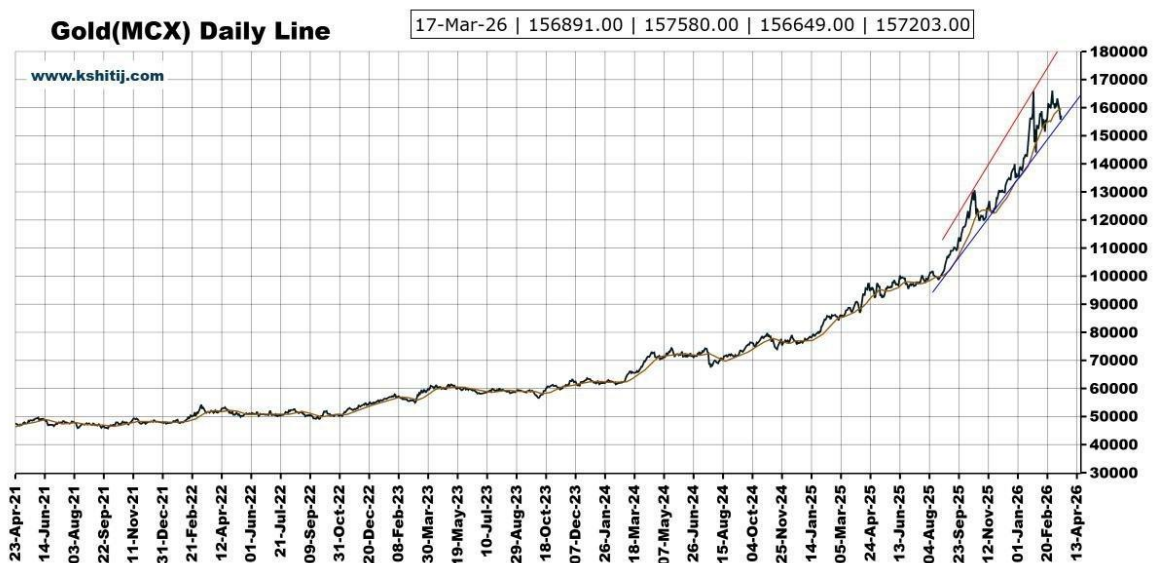
The upward movement in gold prices has played a pivotal role in strengthening the gold loan ecosystem. As gold prices increase, the value of collateral rises proportionately, enabling borrowers to access higher loan amounts against the same quantity of gold. This dynamic not only enhances borrower capacity but also supports portfolio growth for lenders. Additionally, gold's status as a safe-haven asset during periods of economic uncertainty further reinforces its attractiveness as collateral. Consequently, the gold loan segment tends to exhibit counter-cyclical resilience, often expanding during times when other credit segments experience stress. This inherent stability makes gold loans a strategically important asset class for lenders seeking to balance risk and growth.

Operational Model and Efficiency of Gold Loans

The operational framework of gold loans is inherently simple and efficient, contributing significantly to their scalability. The process begins with the borrower pledging gold ornaments, followed by purity assessment and valuation, which determines the eligible loan amount based on prescribed loan-to-value norms. Once sanctioned, disbursement is typically immediate, reflecting minimal documentation requirements and the secured nature of the product. Repayment structures are flexible, allowing for bullet payments, interest servicing, or EMIs, depending on borrower preference. In the event of default, lenders are permitted to auction the pledged gold through a transparent process, ensuring recovery while safeguarding borrower rights. This streamlined lifecycle enables faster turnaround times, lower operating costs, and reduced credit risk, making gold loans operationally superior to many other retail lending products.

The gold loan industry is undergoing a significant transformation driven by technology and fintech integration. Traditionally reliant on branch-led operations, the segment is increasingly adopting digital tools to enhance efficiency and customer experience. Digital onboarding through Aadhaar-based e-KYC, mobile applications for loan servicing, and integrated payment systems for collections are becoming standard practices. Furthermore, emerging innovations such as AI-assisted valuation, data-driven credit monitoring, and digital locker concepts are redefining operational models. Fintech partnerships are enabling lenders to expand their reach without proportionate increases in physical infrastructure, thereby improving scalability and cost efficiency. This convergence of traditional collateral-based lending with modern technology is creating a hybrid model that combines trust with convenience.

Capital Trust Limited's entry into the gold loan segment represents a well-calibrated strategic initiative aimed at strengthening its secured lending portfolio while deepening customer engagement across its core geographies. Building on its strong presence in rural and semi-urban India, the Company has introduced Capital Trust Gold Loan as a digitally enabled, branch-led offering designed to provide immediate liquidity to customers while maintaining high standards of transparency, security, and service. Launched in October 2025, this product leverages the Company's extensive physical network and established borrower relationships to deliver a seamless and reliable gold financing solution.

The rationale for entering the gold loan segment is anchored in the Company's broader objective of achieving a balanced portfolio mix between secured and unsecured lending.



Gold loans, being fully collateralized, offer lower credit risk and enhanced recovery visibility compared to traditional unsecured MSME loans. This strategic shift is expected to improve asset quality, reduce credit costs, and create a more stable and predictable earnings profile. At the same time, the product aligns closely with the financial needs of the Company's existing customer base, many of whom possess gold assets but require timely access to funds for business expansion, consumption needs, or unforeseen emergencies.

Capital Trust Gold Loan has been positioned as a trusted, fast, and customer-centric financing solution, emphasizing both value and convenience. The offering is designed to deliver the highest possible value against pledged gold, supported by competitive interest rates and a transparent pricing structure with no hidden charges. The Company has deliberately simplified the borrowing process by minimizing documentation requirements and ensuring quick turnaround times, thereby making the product accessible even to customers with limited formal credit histories. This ease of access is particularly relevant in underserved markets, where speed and simplicity are critical determinants of customer choice.

A key differentiator of the Company's gold loan proposition lies in its operational transparency and customer trust framework. The valuation of gold is conducted through standardized and transparent processes, ensuring that customers receive fair and accurate assessments. The Company has also placed significant emphasis on the security of pledged assets, with gold stored in highly secure facilities backed by comprehensive insurance coverage. This dual assurance of safety and transparency is expected to strengthen customer confidence and foster long-term relationships.

In addition to its branch-led strengths, Capital Trust Limited is integrating digital capabilities into the gold loan lifecycle to enhance efficiency and customer experience. The product incorporates digitally enabled onboarding processes, streamlined documentation, and technology-driven servicing, enabling faster disbursement and improved operational control. MESSAGE FROM CHAIRMAN AND MANAGING DIRECTOR
A Year of Transition, Resilience, and Strategic Renewal

Dear Shareholders,

It is my privilege to address you as we present the 40th Annual Report of Capital Trust Limited. This milestone year represents not only the longevity of our institution but also its enduring ability to adapt, evolve, and remain resilient through changing economic and business cycles. Over the past four decades, your Company has built a strong foundation serving underserved and underbanked communities across India. This year, however, stands out as one of the most defining periods in our journey—requiring decisive action, strategic clarity, and a forward-looking vision.

Challenging Macroeconomic and Sectoral Environment

The financial year 2025–26 was characterized by a complex and evolving macroeconomic environment, marked by both resilience at the headline level and stress within specific segments, particularly rural MSMEs and the microfinance sector. While India continued to remain one of the fastest-growing major economies globally, with GDP growth estimated in the range of 7.0%–7.6%, the benefits of this growth were unevenly distributed, with rural and informal sectors experiencing persistent vulnerabilities.

From a macroeconomic standpoint, inflationary trends showed a significant moderation during the year. Retail inflation declined sharply from 4.6% in FY 2024–25 to approximately 1.7% during April–December 2025, supported by easing food prices and improved supply conditions. However, this headline improvement masked underlying disparities, as rural inflation remained relatively higher than urban levels in certain periods, continuing to exert pressure on household consumption and savings. Additionally, global uncertainties—including geopolitical tensions and supply chain disruptions—created an environment of cautious optimism, requiring continued vigilance from policymakers and financial institutions.

The rural economy, which forms the backbone of the MSME and microfinance borrower base, faced mixed conditions during the year. While agricultural output benefited from favorable conditions in some regions, concerns around uneven monsoons and climatic variability posed risks to farm incomes. Reports indicate that weak or erratic rainfall could adversely impact agricultural productivity, leading to reduced rural consumption and increased financial stress. This variability translated into volatility in cash flows for rural households, many of whom are dependent on agriculture or allied activities for their livelihoods.

The microfinance sector witnessed a notable increase in stress levels during FY 2025–26. The industry, estimated at approximately ₹3.31 lakh crore, faced rising risks due to weakening borrower cash flows, overleveraging, and localized socio-economic disruptions. Industry reports also indicate a contraction in microfinance portfolios, with some estimates suggesting a decline of nearly 20%–22% in certain segments as lenders adopted a more cautious stance amid rising delinquencies. Furthermore, delinquency levels increased across multiple geographies, driven by borrower indebtedness, election-related disruptions, and localized repayment resistance in certain regions.



Similarly, the MSME sector—often referred to as the backbone of the Indian economy, contributing nearly 30–35% to GDP and employing over 110 million people—faced structural and cyclical challenges. Rising input costs, fluctuating demand, and limited access to formal credit markets impacted the viability of small enterprises, particularly in rural and semi-urban areas. Lenders across the ecosystem reported increasing stress in MSME and small-ticket loan portfolios, necessitating tighter credit underwriting and enhanced monitoring mechanisms.

Another notable trend during the year was the increasing indebtedness of retail and rural borrowers. Easy access to credit in previous years, combined with stagnant income growth in certain segments, resulted in a build-up of leverage at the household level. This led to a rise in repayment challenges and a gradual weakening of credit discipline across segments. Financial institutions, including banks and NBFCs, reported higher default rates in unsecured and small-ticket lending portfolios, particularly in rural and semi-urban geographies.

Despite these sectoral challenges, the broader financial system remained stable, supported by adequate liquidity and continued policy support. Credit growth remained robust, and financial inclusion continued to deepen, with a large proportion of the adult population having access to formal banking channels. However, the divergence between macroeconomic stability and micro-level stress became more pronounced during the year.

In summary, FY 2025–26 underscored a dichotomy in the economic landscape—strong macroeconomic fundamentals coexisting with stress in the rural and informal credit ecosystem. The year highlighted the need for calibrated growth strategies, a shift towards secured lending, stronger risk management frameworks, and a renewed focus on borrower quality and sustainability. For lenders operating in rural MSME and microfinance segments, the environment necessitated a cautious, adaptive, and resilience-driven approach to business operations.

Impact on Rural MSME and Microfinance Portfolios

As a Company with a deep-rooted presence in rural and semi-urban India, we experienced the full impact of these macroeconomic and sectoral headwinds during the financial year under review. Our exposure to the underserved and “missing middle” segment, while central to our business philosophy, also meant that our portfolio remained particularly sensitive to fluctuations in rural income cycles and credit behavior.

Our unsecured MSME lending portfolio, which had historically been a key growth driver for the Company, came under significant pressure during the year. Declining cash flows at the borrower level—driven by inflationary pressures, inconsistent demand, and income volatility—translated into reduced repayment capacity. As a result, collection efficiencies witnessed a noticeable decline, particularly in certain geographies that were more acutely impacted by localized disruptions. Industry trends indicate that collection efficiency in rural unsecured portfolios declined by 300–600 basis points during the year, a pattern that was reflected in our own operations.

Consequently, delinquency levels increased across segments, with early-stage delinquencies (1–30 days past due) showing a steady build-up and eventually flowing into



higher bucket stress. This trend necessitated a more cautious recognition of stress and resulted in elevated provisioning requirements. The rise in credit costs was further accentuated by the need to accelerate write-offs in certain legacy accounts, in line with our objective of maintaining a clean and transparent balance sheet.

The broader microfinance environment also faced considerable stress during the year, which had a spillover impact on borrower behavior across the ecosystem. Increased borrower indebtedness, multiple lending relationships, and localized socio-economic disruptions in certain regions led to weakening repayment discipline. In some microfinance-intensive geographies, repayment cycles were disrupted due to external factors, including borrower agitations and temporary resistance to collections. These developments not only impacted microfinance institutions but also had second-order effects on MSME borrowers who often overlap with the same customer segments.

Despite the committed and sustained efforts of our field teams, including enhanced customer engagement, increased on-ground presence, and adoption of digital collection mechanisms, the overall operating environment remained challenging. The Company undertook multiple tactical interventions—such as tightening credit filters, reducing exposure in high-risk geographies, and recalibrating product structures—to mitigate risks. However, the systemic nature of the stress meant that improvements in portfolio performance were gradual and uneven.

These challenges collectively resulted in an increase in gross non-performing assets (GNPA) and credit costs, thereby impacting the Company's financial performance for the year. At the same time, the experience reinforced the importance of prudent risk management, portfolio diversification, and a calibrated shift towards more secured lending products.

In summary, the year underscored the inherent volatility associated with unsecured rural lending and highlighted the need for resilience-driven strategies. The lessons learned during this period have been instrumental in shaping the Company's forward-looking approach, with a renewed emphasis on asset quality, sustainable growth, and long-term value creation.

A Conscious Decision to Reset and Rebuild

In response to these realities, your Company took a prudent and forward-looking decision to recalibrate its strategy. Rather than continuing with a stressed business model, we chose to recognize the challenges upfront, absorb the impact, and initiate a structured reset. This approach, though difficult in the short term, positions us to rebuild on a stronger and more sustainable foundation. We believe that acknowledging challenges transparently and acting decisively is essential for long-term value creation.

Strategic Shift Towards Secured Gold Loan Business

One of the most significant outcomes of this strategic reset is our shift from predominantly unsecured MSME lending to a secured lending model, with a strong focus on gold loans. The gold loan business offers inherent advantages, including lower credit risk, better asset quality, and stronger liquidity characteristics. Given the cultural affinity for gold in India



and its role as a reliable store of value, this segment presents a stable and scalable opportunity for growth. Our entry into this business marks a new chapter in the Company's evolution.

Initial Progress in Gold Loan Operations

We have already taken meaningful steps to establish our presence in the gold loan segment. The Company has operationalized six branches dedicated to gold loans and has put in place the necessary infrastructure, processes, and risk management systems. Early indicators have been encouraging, and we are confident that this business will scale steadily over the coming years. In addition, we have entered into partnership arrangements to strengthen our product offering and expand reach efficiently.

Adopting a Partnership-Driven Growth Model

Another key pillar of our renewed strategy is the adoption of a partnership-led approach through Business Correspondence and Lending-as-a-Service models. Under this framework, we aim to leverage our extensive branch network, on-ground expertise, and customer relationships to originate and service loans on behalf of partner institutions. This asset-light model allows us to grow without significantly expanding our balance sheet risk, thereby improving capital efficiency and reducing volatility in earnings.

Collaborations with NBFCs and Small Finance Banks

We are pleased to share that the Company has already established tie-ups with multiple NBFCs and Small Finance Banks (SFBs). These partnerships are structured in a manner where either the credit cost is borne by the partner institution or is significantly limited for the Company. This ensures that we can continue to serve our customer base while maintaining prudent risk management. Such collaborations also enable us to diversify revenue streams and build a more resilient business model.

Strengthening Risk Management and Operational Discipline

The experiences of the past year have reinforced the importance of robust risk management and operational discipline. We have undertaken a comprehensive review of our credit processes, underwriting standards, and collection mechanisms. Enhanced monitoring systems, data-driven decision-making, and stricter controls are being implemented across the organization. These measures will ensure that we are better prepared to navigate future uncertainties and maintain asset quality.

Focus on Sustainable and Profitable Growth

Going forward, our emphasis will be on building a sustainable and profitable business rather than pursuing aggressive growth at the cost of asset quality. The shift towards secured lending and partnership-driven models aligns with this philosophy. We are committed to creating a balanced portfolio that delivers steady returns while safeguarding stakeholder interests. Our approach will remain cautious, disciplined, and aligned with long-term value creation.

Empowering Our People and Strengthening Governance

Our employees have been at the forefront of navigating this challenging period. Their dedication, resilience, and commitment have enabled the Company to manage through adversity and embark on a path of renewal. We will continue to invest in training,





capability building, and organizational development to support our evolving business model. At the same time, we remain committed to the highest standards of corporate governance, transparency, and accountability.

Outlook for the Future

While the near-term environment may continue to present challenges, we are optimistic about the future. The structural demand for credit in underserved segments remains strong, and our repositioned strategy places us in a better position to capture these opportunities. The gold loan business, combined with our partnership-led approach, provides a solid platform for stable and scalable growth. As we rebuild, we do so with greater clarity, stronger risk frameworks, and renewed confidence.

I would like to express my sincere gratitude to our shareholders for their continued trust and support during this period of transition. I also extend my appreciation to our Board of Directors, employees, partners, and customers for their unwavering commitment to the Company. Your confidence inspires us to move forward with determination and purpose.

With minimal documentation, quick turnaround times, and competitive loan-to-value offerings, Capital Trust aims to deliver a seamless and trustworthy borrowing experience while maintaining strong collateral-backed security.

At a broader level, Capital Trust remains committed to its core vision of bridging the substantial credit gap faced by India's approximately 48 million MSMEs. Positioned as a "Rural Doorstep Fintech," the Company integrates the reliability and reach of a physical branch network with the efficiency and scalability of technology-driven processes. By leveraging data analytics, digital collections, and process automation, Capital Trust continues to enhance customer experience, improve operational efficiency, and strengthen risk controls. As it embarks on this next phase of growth, Capital Trust Limited remains focused on building a balanced, resilient, and future-ready financial services platform—one that continues to empower small businesses and households while delivering long-term value to all stakeholders.

About the Products – Capital Digital Loan & Capital Gold Loan

Capital Trust Limited has developed a focused and evolving product suite designed to address the credit needs of underserved segments, particularly in rural and semi-urban India. The Company's offerings are built on three core pillars—accessibility, speed, and responsible lending—while maintaining a balanced approach between unsecured and secured products. The two flagship offerings, Capital Digital Loan and Capital Gold Loan, reflect this strategy and cater to distinct yet complementary customer requirements.



Capital Digital Loan

Capital Digital Loan is an unsecured lending product aimed at empowering micro and small entrepreneurs who require timely access to formal credit but often remain excluded from traditional banking systems. The product is specifically designed for shopkeepers, traders, service providers, and self-employed individuals who need funds for working capital, business expansion, inventory purchase, and other income-generating activities.

The product is driven by a robust, technology-enabled credit engine that leverages historical customer data, industry-specific insights, and risk analytics to assess borrower eligibility. This allows for faster credit decisions while maintaining prudent underwriting standards. The Company's proprietary systems, built on extensive experience of lending across multiple geographies and industries, help in evaluating borrower cash flows and repayment capacity with greater accuracy.

Loan ticket sizes are typically in the range of ₹50,000 to ₹2,00,000, with flexible repayment tenures extending up to 24–36 months. The repayment structure is designed to align with the borrower's cash flow cycles, thereby improving affordability and reducing repayment stress. The entire process—from application to approval—is digitally supported, significantly reducing turnaround time and enhancing customer convenience.

Despite being a digital product, Capital Digital Loan is supported by the Company's strong branch network and field presence, ensuring last-mile connectivity, customer verification, and relationship management. This “phygital” model—combining physical reach with digital efficiency—enables Capital Trust to deliver both speed and trust, particularly in markets where digital-only models may face limitations.

In addition, the Company has integrated digital collection mechanisms, including QR-based payment systems and mobile-enabled receipts, to improve collection efficiency and transparency. This product continues to play a key role in advancing financial inclusion by bringing first-time borrowers into the formal credit ecosystem.

Capital Gold Loan

Capital Gold Loan represents the Company's strategic pivot towards secured lending, offering a stable, low-risk, and scalable business line. This product enables customers to unlock the value of their idle gold assets and convert them into immediate liquidity without selling them, thereby preserving long-term wealth while meeting short-term financial needs.

The product is targeted at a wide customer base, including small business owners, traders, farmers, and households, who may require funds for business purposes, seasonal cash flow mismatches, medical emergencies, education, or home improvement. Given the cultural affinity towards gold in India, the product is highly relevant and widely accepted across both rural and urban markets.

Capital Gold Loan is designed to offer a seamless and transparent borrowing experience. Customers can walk into any branch with their gold ornaments, which are then evaluated



by trained personnel using standardized valuation techniques to determine purity and weight. Based on this assessment, a competitive loan amount is sanctioned in line with regulatory loan-to-value (LTV) norms.

One of the key strengths of this product is its speed and simplicity. With minimal documentation requirements—primarily identity and address proof—customers can avail loans quickly, often with same-day disbursal directly into their bank accounts. The product typically carries shorter tenures, making it suitable for immediate and short-term liquidity requirements.

From a risk management perspective, the secured nature of the gold loan significantly reduces credit risk and enhances portfolio quality. The Company ensures safe custody and secure storage of pledged gold, adhering to strict internal controls and regulatory guidelines. This not only protects customer assets but also builds trust and confidence in the product.

The gold loan business is also supported by digital systems for loan processing, tracking, and servicing, enabling operational efficiency and scalability. Management Discussion & Analysis Report (MD&A) – FY 2025-26

Capital Trust Limited

A. Executive Summary

The fiscal year 2025–2026 reflects Capital Trust Limited (CTL)’s continued resilience and strategic adaptability amid a dynamic and evolving macroeconomic landscape. The global economy has experienced moderated inflation trends compared to the previous year, though geopolitical uncertainties and uneven growth across regions continue to influence capital flows and credit demand in emerging markets such as India.

Domestically, the financial services sector has remained robust, supported by sustained GDP growth, improving consumption patterns, and strong regulatory oversight by the Reserve Bank of India. However, challenges persist in the form of liquidity tightening cycles, evolving compliance requirements, and increasing competition within the NBFC ecosystem.

Against this backdrop, CTL has demonstrated strong operational performance driven by:

- **Prudent risk management frameworks**, with enhanced early warning systems and portfolio stress testing
- **Advanced data-driven underwriting models**, leveraging AI/ML-based credit scoring
- **Continued focus on portfolio diversification**, reducing concentration risk across geographies and borrower segments

The fiscal year 2025–26 proved to be particularly challenging for the financial services sector, especially within the unsecured lending and microfinance (MFI) segments. Industry-wide stress emerged due to a combination of factors including borrower overleveraging, tightening regulatory norms, elevated interest rates, and localized repayment disruptions. These developments resulted in increased delinquencies and cautious credit expansion across the sector.

Within this environment, Capital Trust Limited (CTL) adopted a calibrated and prudent approach by tightening underwriting standards, enhancing collection mechanisms, and rebalancing its portfolio mix to mitigate risk.

Recognizing the need for **secured and lower-risk lending avenues**, the Company strategically entered the **gold loan segment** during the year. Gold loans, being asset-backed and highly liquid in nature, offer:

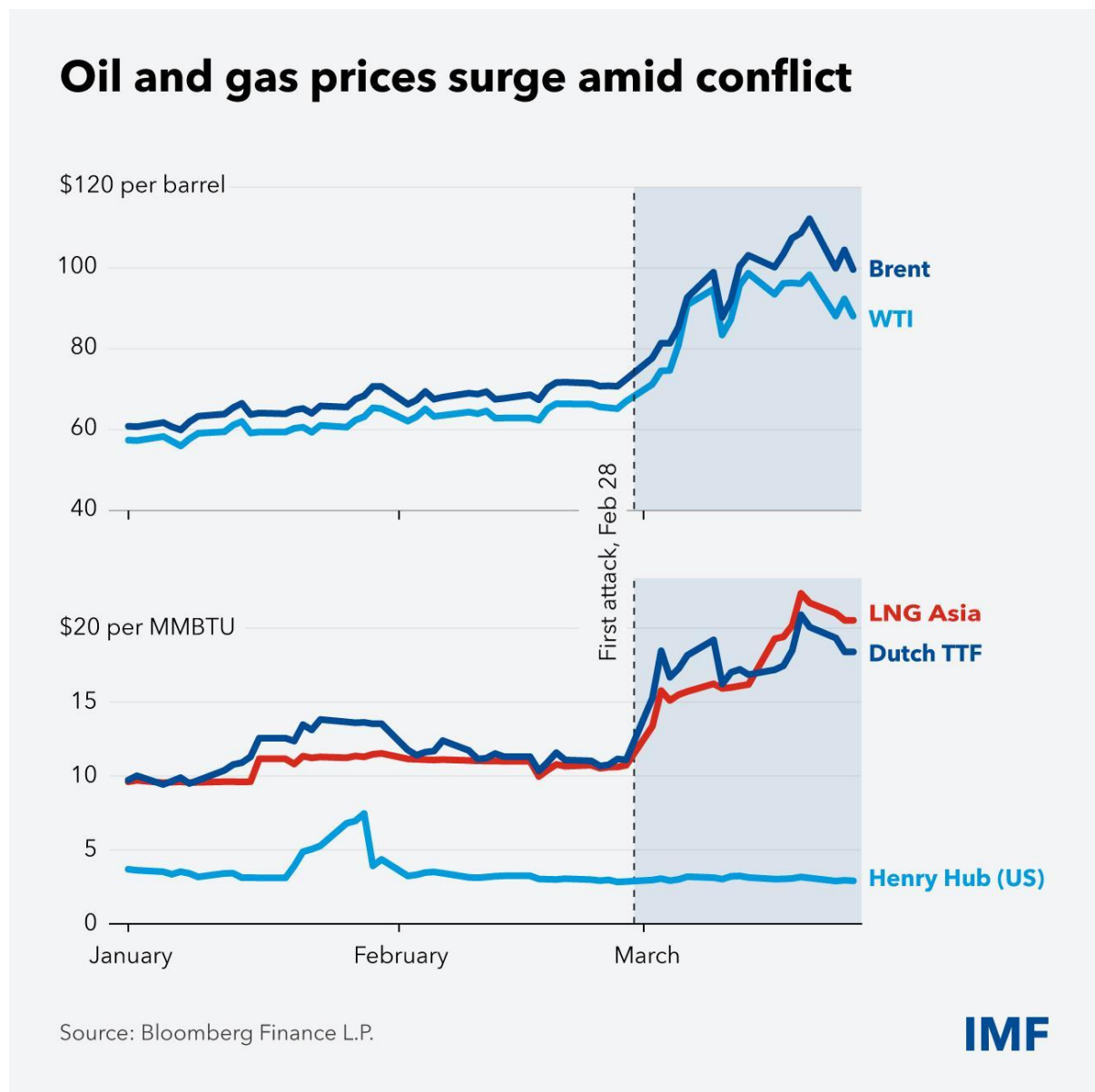
- Lower credit risk compared to unsecured lending
- Faster loan processing and higher recovery efficiency
- Stability during periods of economic uncertainty



B. World Economy Overview (2024-2025)

The global economy in FY 2025–26 is navigating a complex landscape marked by **moderating inflation, uneven growth, and heightened geopolitical tensions**. While inflationary pressures have eased following monetary tightening by major central banks such as the Federal Reserve and the European Central Bank, global growth continues to face structural and external challenges.

According to the International Monetary Fund, global GDP growth is expected to remain stable at approximately **3.0%–3.2%**, supported by resilience in emerging markets, particularly India.



Ongoing geopolitical conflicts, including the Russia-Ukraine War and the Israel-Hamas Conflict, have had a significant impact on the global economic environment:

- **Energy Price Volatility**
Disruptions in oil and gas supplies have led to fluctuations in global energy prices, increasing input costs for businesses and contributing to inflationary pressures.
- **Supply Chain Disruptions**
Key global trade routes have experienced instability, leading to higher logistics costs and delays in the movement of goods.
- **Commodity Price Shocks**
Prices of critical commodities such as crude oil, natural gas, and food grains have remained volatile, affecting both developed and emerging economies.
- **Investor Sentiment and Capital Flows**
Heightened uncertainty has resulted in risk-averse investor behavior, impacting capital flows into emerging markets and increasing currency volatility.
- **Defense Spending and Fiscal Pressures**
Increased military spending by several nations has strained fiscal balances, limiting public investment in growth-oriented sectors.

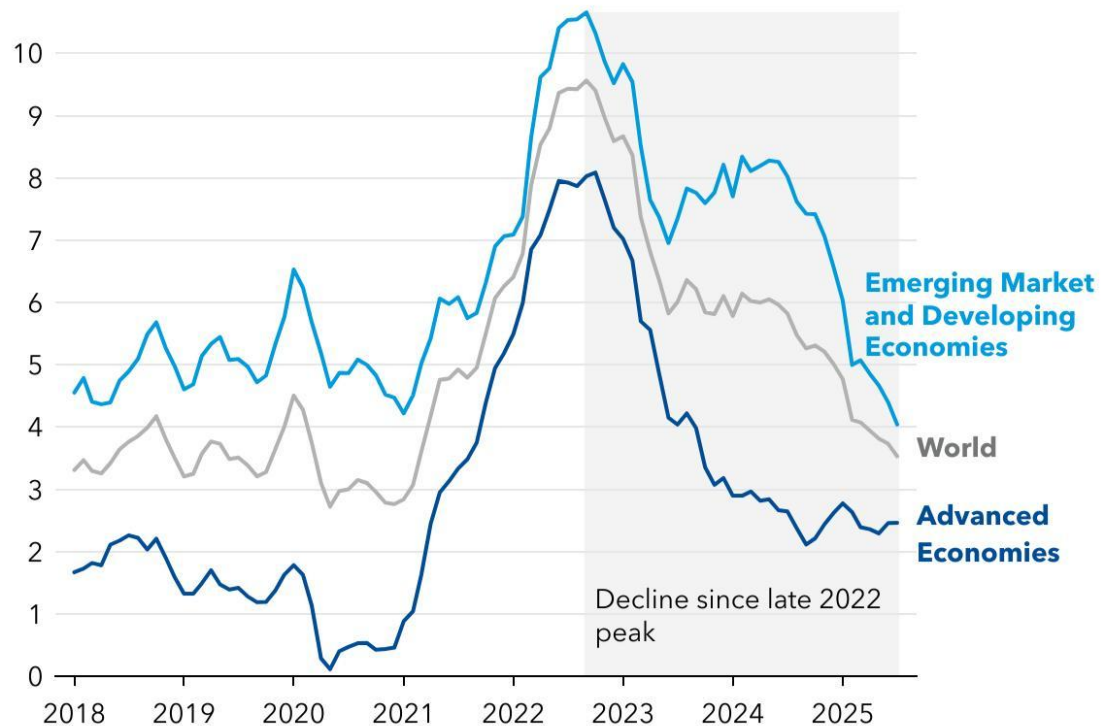

Implications for Financial Services Sector

For institutions such as Capital Trust Limited, these global developments translate into:

- Increased **cost of funds due to global liquidity tightening**
- Heightened focus on **risk management and portfolio quality**
- Opportunities in **domestic-focused growth markets**
- Need for **diversification into resilient and secured lending segments**

C. Structural Challenges in the Global Economy

1. Debt Overhang and Fiscal Constraints

The global economy continues to operate under the weight of elevated sovereign and corporate debt levels. As per estimates from the Institute of International Finance, global debt is expected to remain above \$310 trillion in FY 2025–26, sustaining levels close to 330%–335% of global GDP.



This debt accumulation remains particularly pronounced in emerging markets, where a significant portion of corporate borrowing is dollar-denominated, increasing vulnerability to:

- Currency depreciation risks
- Rising global interest rates
- Capital outflow pressures

Simultaneously, the U.S. Department of the Treasury bond market has continued to experience volatility, with 10-year yields remaining elevated in the 4.0%–4.5% range during FY 2025–26. This has resulted in:

- Tightening global financial conditions
- Increased borrowing costs across economies
- Reduced liquidity in riskier asset classes

2. Trade Fragmentation and Supply Chain Reconfiguration

The fragmentation of global trade continues to accelerate in FY 2025–26, driven by geopolitical realignments and national security considerations. The trend of “friend-shoring” and “near-shoring” has significantly altered global investment flows.

Policy initiatives such as the CHIPS and Science Act in the United States and the Critical Raw Materials Act have catalyzed investments in:

- Semiconductor manufacturing
- Clean energy technologies
- Strategic mineral supply chains

At the same time, China continues to strengthen its dual circulation strategy, focusing on domestic consumption and supply chain resilience.

According to estimates by McKinsey & Company, this restructuring has resulted in:

- 3%–5% increase in global manufacturing input costs
- Reduced efficiency from loss of global scale advantages
- Long-term shifts in trade corridors and capital allocation

3. Climate Transition Risks

Climate-related risks have become a central consideration for global financial systems in FY 2025–26. Both **physical risks** (extreme weather events) and **transition risks** (policy and regulatory changes) are now materially impacting financial institutions.

Frameworks developed by the Network for Greening the Financial System are increasingly being incorporated into **stress testing and risk assessment models**, leading to:



- Higher capital requirements for **carbon-intensive exposures**
- Repricing of risk across sectors sensitive to climate policies
- Increased scrutiny on ESG compliance

Data from Swiss Re indicates that:

- Insurance premiums for climate-exposed assets have risen by **40%–60% in high-risk regions**
- Climate-related losses are contributing to **volatility in underwriting cycles**

D. Indian Economy – Performance and Prospects

FY 2025–26 Macroeconomic Performance

The Indian economy has continued to demonstrate strong resilience and growth momentum during FY 2025–26, positioning itself as one of the fastest-growing major economies globally. Supported by robust domestic demand, sustained government capital expenditure, and a stable financial system under the guidance of the Reserve Bank of India, India remains a key driver of global economic expansion.

According to estimates by the International Monetary Fund and the World Bank, India's GDP growth for FY 2025–26 is projected in the range of **6.5%–7.0%**, reflecting:

- Strong private consumption
- Continued public infrastructure investment
- Expansion in services and manufacturing sectors

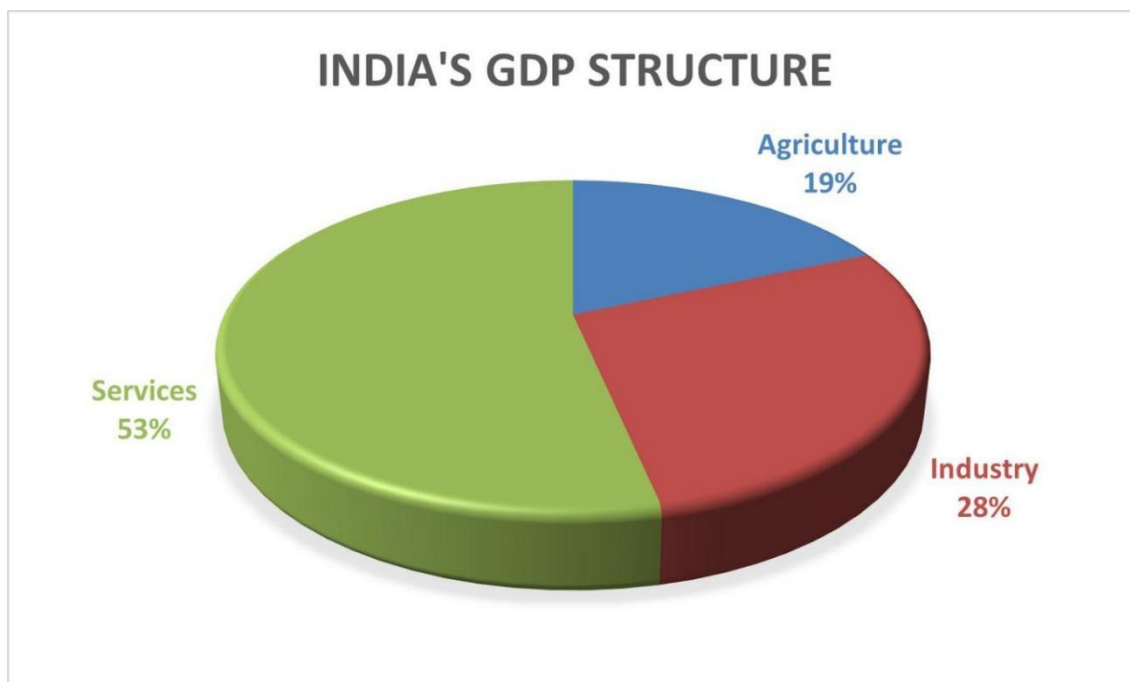
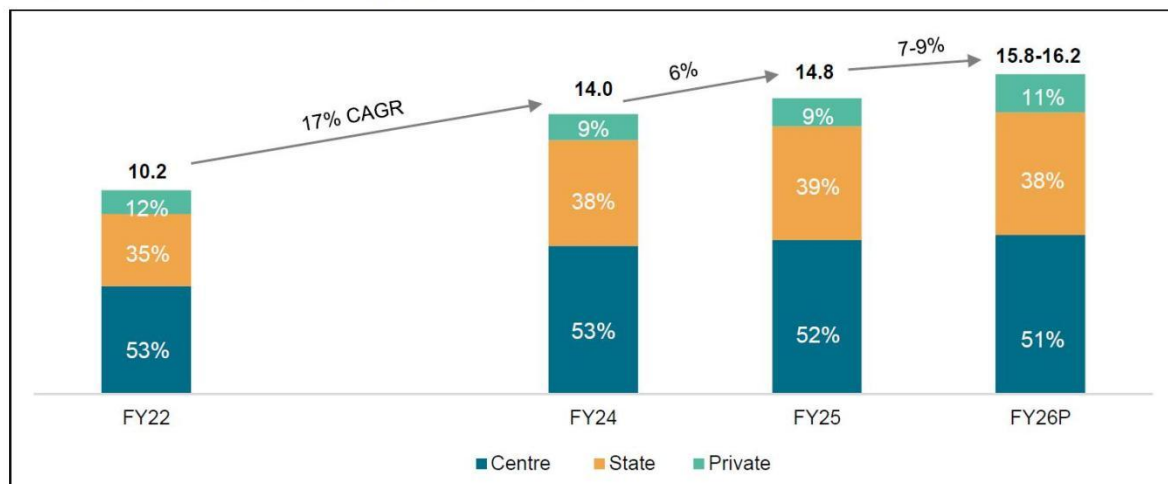
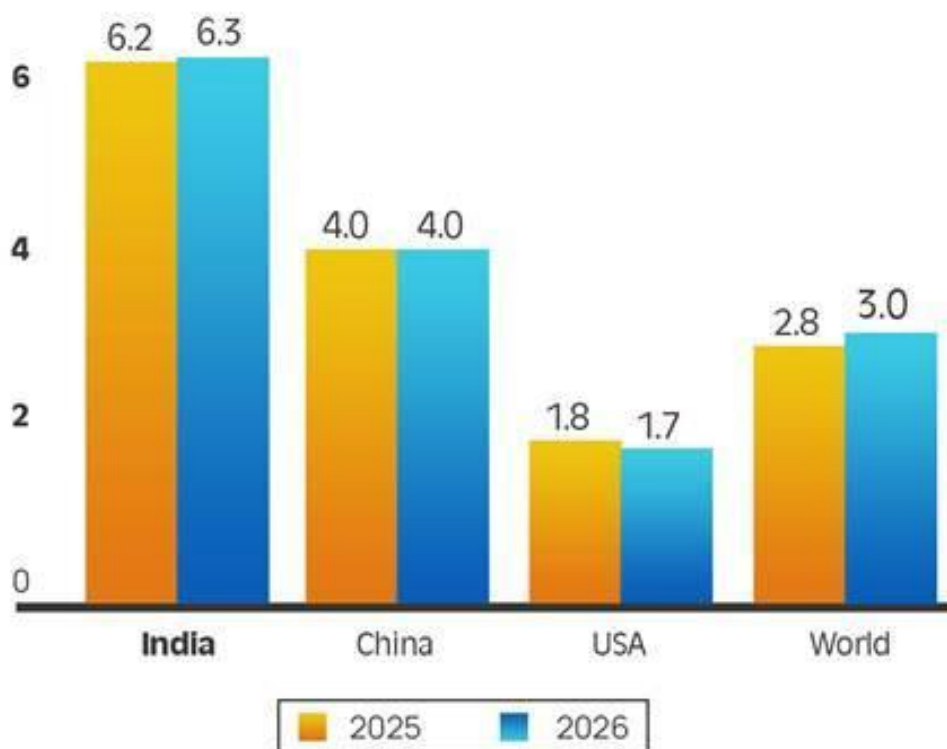


Chart 2: Domestic infrastructure capex (Rs lakh crore)

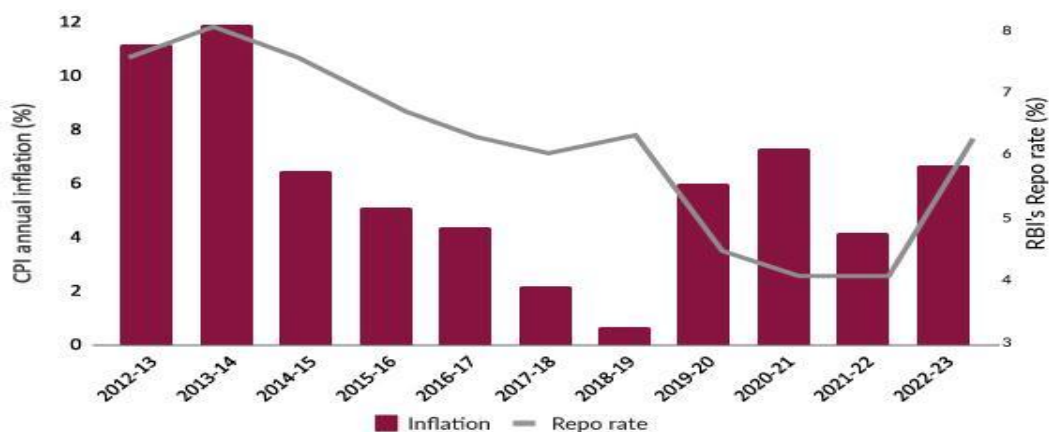
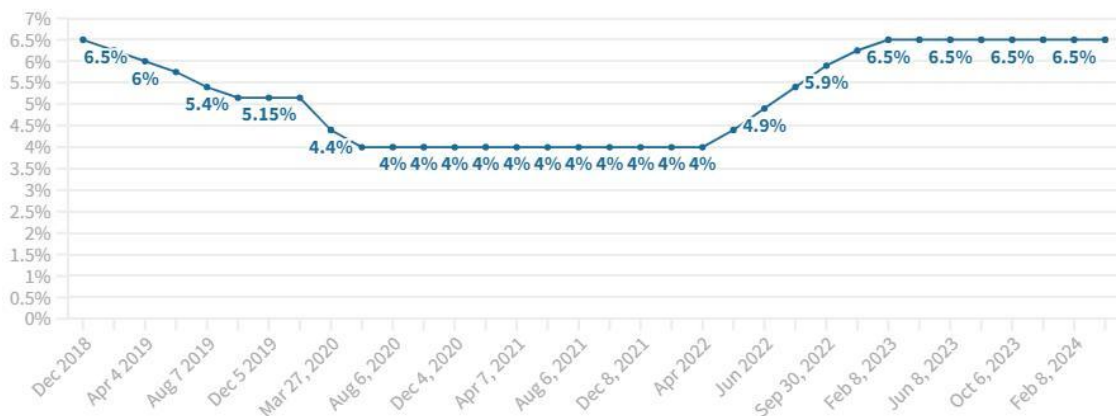

RBI repo rate

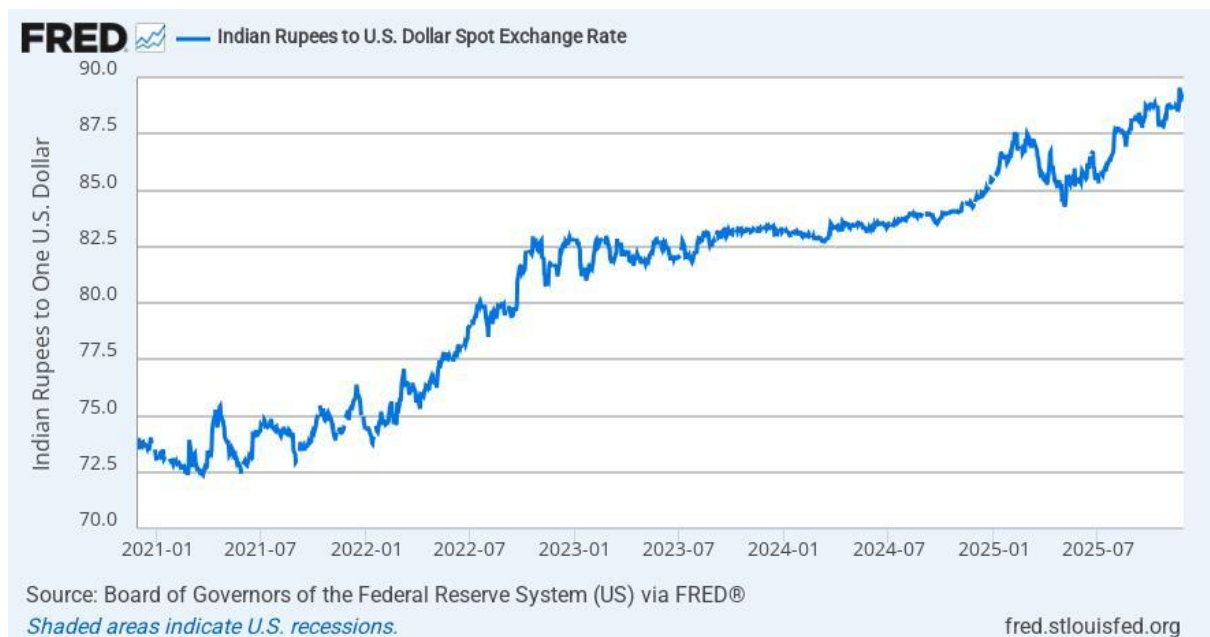
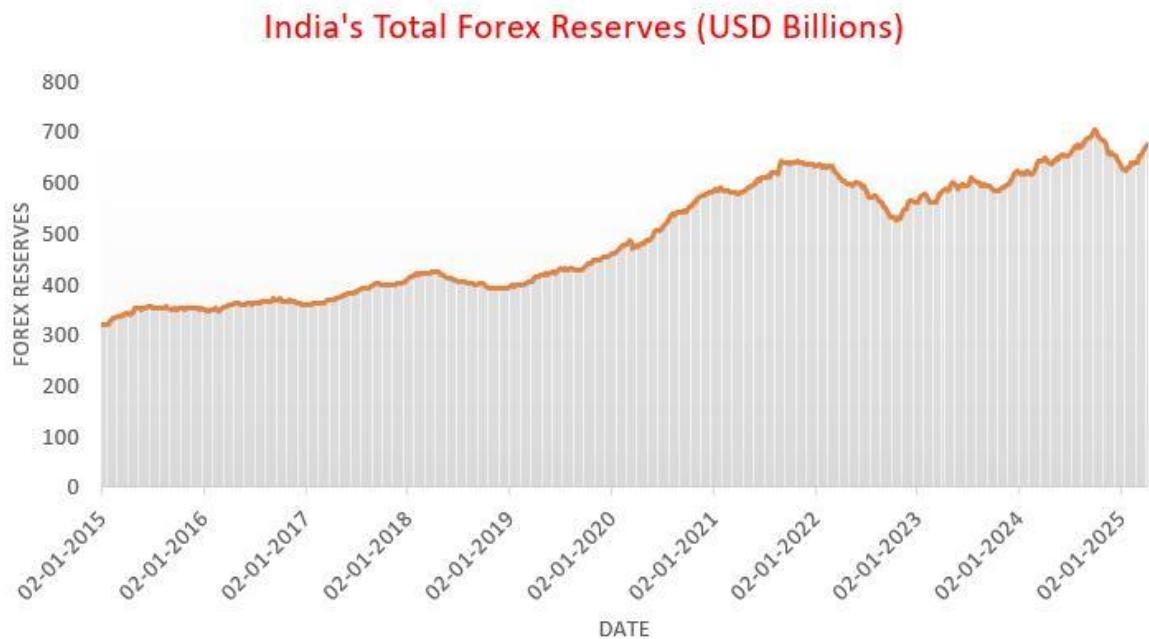

1. Credit Growth and Sectoral Trends

India's credit growth has remained strong in FY 2025–26, sustaining the momentum witnessed in the previous year. Overall credit expansion continues to be in the range of **15–17% year-on-year**, supported by robust demand across retail, MSME, and infrastructure segments. Non-Banking Financial Companies (NBFCs) have continued to outpace traditional banks, registering growth of approximately **18–20%**, driven by their agility, faster turnaround times, and deeper penetration in underserved segments.

Retail lending remains a key driver of credit expansion, although growth has moderated compared to the previous year. Personal loans, including credit cards and consumer durable financing, have grown at a relatively stable pace following earlier regulatory interventions. This moderation reflects a more prudent lending environment and improved risk assessment practices across the sector.

MSME lending continues to show resilience, supported by government initiatives and increasing adoption of digital lending platforms. Credit flow to this segment remains strong, aided by improved credit access, formalization of businesses, and continued policy support, thereby contributing meaningfully to overall economic activity.

1.2 Deposit Growth Lag and Liquidity Pressures

Despite sustained credit demand, deposit growth in FY 2025–26 has remained relatively moderate, estimated at around **11–13% year-on-year**, resulting in continued liquidity pressures within the banking system. This divergence between credit and deposit growth has led to a gradual tightening of systemic liquidity conditions.

The **Credit-Deposit (CD) ratio** has remained elevated at approximately **77%–79%**, reflecting increased utilization of available deposits for lending purposes. This has prompted financial institutions to compete more aggressively for deposits, leading to a rise in deposit rates and overall cost of funds.

The Reserve Bank of India has continued to actively manage liquidity conditions through calibrated measures, including periodic liquidity injections via variable rate repo (VRR) operations and other market instruments. These actions have helped address short-term liquidity mismatches while maintaining overall financial stability.



2. Regulatory Tightening: RBI's Measures to Curb Risks

The regulatory environment in FY 2025–26 remains focused on ensuring financial stability and mitigating systemic risks, particularly in the unsecured lending segment. Building on measures introduced earlier, the Reserve Bank of India has maintained a cautious stance aimed at moderating excessive credit growth and strengthening risk management practices across financial institutions.

2.1 Higher Risk Weights on Unsecured Lending

Following the increase in risk weights on unsecured lending announced in November 2023, the effects have continued to be visible through FY 2025–26. Risk weights on unsecured loans were raised to **125% for banks and 100% for NBFCs**, leading to a recalibration of lending strategies across the sector.

As a result, growth in personal loans has moderated compared to earlier highs, reflecting a more balanced and risk-aware approach to credit expansion. Similarly, the pace of growth in credit card outstanding has stabilized, indicating improved credit discipline among lenders.

For NBFCs, the higher risk weights have translated into an increase in the **cost of funds**, as banks have become more selective in extending credit to them due to higher capital requirements. This has prompted NBFCs to diversify their funding sources, optimize capital allocation, and increasingly shift focus toward secured lending segments to maintain portfolio quality and profitability.

3. Regulatory Developments and Policy Environment (FY 2025–26)

The regulatory landscape during FY 2025–26 has remained dynamic, with continued emphasis by the Reserve Bank of India on strengthening financial stability, improving credit discipline, and addressing emerging risks in the financial system. Building upon measures introduced in the previous year, the RBI and other regulatory bodies have focused on moderating risks in unsecured lending, enhancing transparency in digital lending, and promoting responsible growth across NBFCs.

In the unsecured lending segment, the impact of earlier regulatory tightening—particularly the increase in risk weights—has continued into FY 2025–26. Financial institutions have responded by recalibrating their credit strategies, tightening underwriting standards, and adopting a more cautious approach toward high-risk borrower segments. This has resulted in a moderation in growth in personal loans and credit card receivables, contributing to improved portfolio quality across the system.



4. Gold Loan Guidelines and Regulatory Oversight

During FY 2025–26, increased regulatory attention has also been directed toward the gold loan segment, given its rapid expansion among NBFCs. The Reserve Bank of India has reiterated and strengthened existing prudential norms to ensure transparency and risk mitigation in gold-backed lending.

Key regulatory expectations include:

- Strict adherence to **Loan-to-Value (LTV) ratios**, generally capped at **75% of the value of pledged gold**
- Enhanced due diligence and **standardized gold valuation practices**
- Strengthening of **auction and recovery procedures** in case of defaults
- Increased focus on **customer protection, transparency in pricing, and disclosure norms**

These measures are aimed at ensuring that the growth in gold loans remains **prudential, transparent, and sustainable**, while protecting borrower interests. The regulatory clarity has also encouraged NBFCs to expand in this segment as a relatively **secured and lower-risk lending avenue**, particularly in the current environment of stress in unsecured credit.

5. Co-Lending Framework and Guidelines

The co-lending model has continued to evolve as a key mechanism for credit delivery and risk-sharing between banks and NBFCs. During FY 2025–26, the Reserve Bank of India has further emphasized the need for robust governance and operational clarity within co-lending arrangements.

Key aspects of the co-lending framework include:

- Clearly defined **risk-sharing arrangements** between banks and NBFCs
- Greater alignment in **underwriting standards and credit policies**
- Enhanced **transparency in loan servicing, customer interface, and grievance redressal**
- Strengthening of **data sharing and reporting mechanisms** between partner institutions

The framework continues to support increased credit flow to priority sectors such as MSMEs and underserved segments, while enabling NBFCs to optimize capital usage and scale operations efficiently.



E. NBFC Sector – Global and Indian Perspectives

1. Global NBFC Trends

The global non-bank financial intermediation (NBFI) sector has grown to \$230 trillion in assets (FSB data), representing 48% of total global financial assets. Key trends include:

- **Digital lending disruption:** Fintech lenders now account for 28% of U.S. personal loan originations (TransUnion data), leveraging AI/ML models that reduce approval times to under 24 hours
- **Regulatory recalibration:** The EU's CRR III implementation has increased capital requirements for non-banks, triggering portfolio rebalancing toward higher-yielding assets
- **Private credit expansion:** Global private debt AUM surpassed \$2.1 trillion (Preqin data), filling financing gaps left by retreating banks

2. Indian NBFC Sector Evolution

India's NBFC sector has crossed ₹150 lakh crore in AUM, growing at 18% CAGR over FY20-25. Structural shifts include:

- **Asset class specialization:** Gold loan NBFCs (20% AUM growth), vehicle financiers (17%), and microfinance (22%) have outperformed generic lenders
- **Co-lending proliferation:** 35% of NBFCs now have active co-lending arrangements, improving leverage ratios while maintaining asset ownership
- **Resolution mechanism innovation:** The adoption of Insolvency and Bankruptcy Code (IBC) processes for financial firms has improved recovery rates to 45% (from 32% in FY20)

3. Deep Dive: Global NBFC Sector Transformation

The global non-banking financial sector has undergone a fundamental transformation in FY2024-25, reshaping competitive dynamics across all major markets. Three powerful forces have converged to drive this evolution: digital disruption reaching maturity, comprehensive regulatory reforms, and macroeconomic rebalancing in a higher interest rate environment. These structural shifts have created both significant challenges and substantial opportunities for agile financial intermediaries like Capital Trust Limited.

Digital lending platforms have achieved critical mass in advanced economies, fundamentally altering credit distribution channels. In the United States, digitally native lenders now command nearly one-third of the personal loan market, leveraging sophisticated algorithms that incorporate alternative data sources beyond traditional credit scores. These platforms have achieved remarkable efficiencies, reducing loan approval times from days to hours while maintaining robust underwriting standards. The European market has seen parallel developments, with open banking frameworks enabling seamless data sharing between



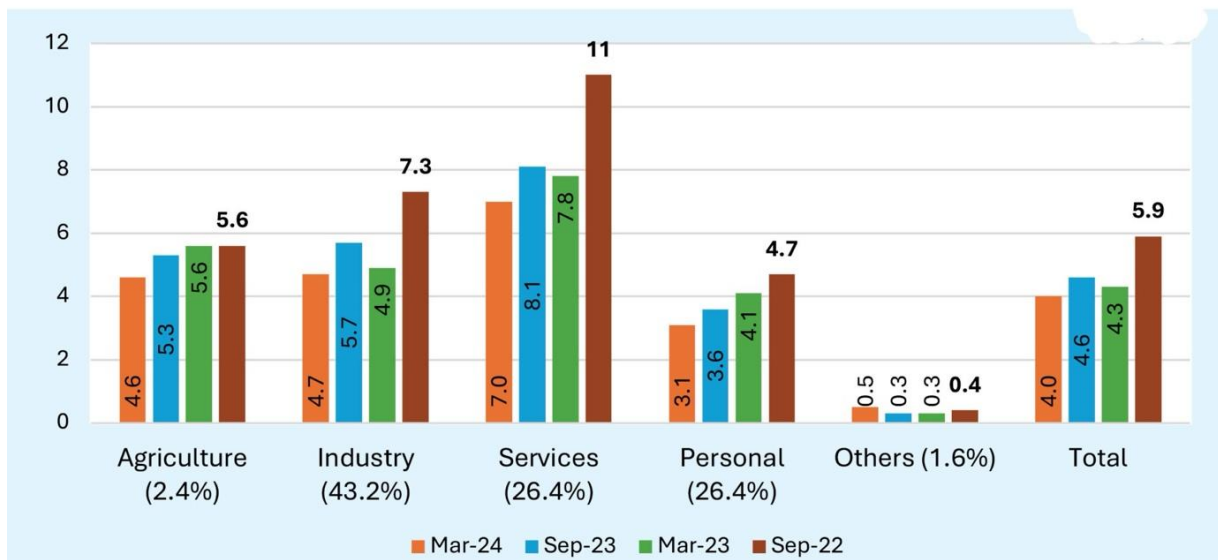
traditional financial institutions and fintech lenders. This convergence has been particularly impactful in the SME lending segment, where real-time access to business banking data has improved credit assessment accuracy.

Regulatory changes have compelled a strategic reorientation across the sector. The implementation of Basel IV standards has significantly increased capital requirements for non-bank lenders globally, prompting portfolio rebalancing toward higher-yielding secured assets. In the European Union, the revised Capital Requirements Directive (CRD VI) now subjects systemic non-banks to the same minimum capital standards as traditional banks. This regulatory tightening has accelerated industry consolidation, with smaller players either merging with larger institutions or exiting capital-intensive business lines. The resulting landscape favours well-capitalized NBFCs with diversified funding sources and sophisticated risk management capabilities.

4. Indian NBFC Sector: Structural Evolution

The Indian non-banking financial sector has demonstrated remarkable adaptability in FY2024-25, evolving through several structural transformations that have redefined competitive dynamics. The most significant development has been the rapid specialization across asset classes, marking the end of the era of generic, undifferentiated NBFCs. Gold loan providers have emerged as clear leaders, benefiting from both rising gold prices and innovative loan-to-value optimization strategies. Microfinance institutions have achieved impressive growth through joint liability group model innovations, while digital inspection tools have revolutionized the used vehicle financing segment.

On the liability side, Indian NBFCs have displayed impressive innovation in funding strategies. Direct assignment structures have gained substantial traction, now accounting for over a quarter of sector-wide funding. Co-lending partnerships with banks have proliferated,



creating a symbiotic relationship that combines NBFCs' distribution strength with banks' balance sheet capacity. The retail bond market has witnessed unprecedented activity, with NBFC issuances crossing ₹1.2 lakh crore as investors seek higher yields in a rising rate environment. This diversified funding approach has enhanced sector resilience against liquidity shocks.

Digital transformation has moved from aspiration to implementation across the Indian NBFC landscape. The Reserve Bank of India's Digital Lending Guidelines have provided a clear regulatory framework for technology adoption, resulting in near-universal implementation of e-KYC for customer onboarding. API-based credit decisioning has become mainstream, enabling real-time risk assessment and faster disbursals. Perhaps most significantly, the account aggregator framework has gained critical mass, with two-thirds of NBFCs now participating in this data-sharing ecosystem that promises to reduce information asymmetry in credit markets.

F. Capital Trust Limited: Strategic Positioning

Capital Trust Limited has successfully navigated the evolving financial landscape through a combination of strategic foresight and operational excellence. Our competitive positioning rests on five key pillars that differentiate us in the marketplace. The foundation of our success lies in our diversified funding architecture, which carefully balances multiple liability sources to ensure stability across market cycles. Term loans, comprising 35% of our funding, are meticulously tenor-matched to our asset profile, while our retail bond program has established CTL as a recognized name in the fixed income market.

Our digital lending ecosystem represents a significant competitive advantage in today's technology-driven financial environment. The CTL Digital Platform integrates advanced artificial intelligence capabilities with seamless user experiences, creating a virtuous cycle of efficiency and customer satisfaction. The platform's AI-powered credit scoring system, built on the sophisticated FICO 8.5 model, delivers superior risk assessment while reducing turnaround times. Automated document processing handles 85% of cases without manual intervention, and our real-time fraud detection system achieves 98% accuracy in identifying suspicious applications.

The expansion of our co-lending network has been a strategic priority, resulting in partnerships with six public sector banks, three private banks, and two small finance banks. This network processes an impressive 28,000 loans monthly through standardized APIs, combining the strengths of multiple financial institutions to serve customers better. Our asset quality metrics testify to the effectiveness of our underwriting approach, with vintage analysis showing exceptionally low delinquency rates and collection efficiency exceeding 98%. These results reflect both our credit discipline and our investments in data analytics capabilities.

G. Capital Trust– Unsecured & Secured Loans (Updated for FY 2025–26)



Capital Trust Limited (CTL) has traditionally focused on providing MSME financing solutions to India's informal and underserved micro-enterprises, combining fintech-enabled processes with a branch-led lending model. Its Capital Business Loans (CBL) portfolio comprises unsecured loans ranging from ₹50,000 to ₹1,50,000 and secured loans ranging from ₹2,00,000 to ₹15,00,000, classified under Priority Sector Lending (PSL) by the RBI. These products are designed to address the financing needs of micro-enterprises that are often underserved by mainstream financial institutions due to limited formal documentation and access to organised credit.

During FY 2025–26, CTL has strategically evolved its business model while continuing its focus on MSME financing. The Company entered into a Business Correspondent (BC) arrangement with a Small Finance Bank for MSME lending, under which CTL operates as a sourcing and servicing partner without assuming any credit risk or First Loss Default Guarantee (FLDG) obligation. This arrangement enables the Company to generate fee-based income through a capital-light model while leveraging its established MSME lending capabilities, branch network and field infrastructure.

Alongside its established MSME lending business, CTL has strategically pivoted towards secured lending, with a particular focus on the gold loan segment. The Company has already commenced operations in the gold loan business and has opened six dedicated branches, marking an important step in the diversification of its business model. Gold loans are fully secured against gold collateral and provide a relatively low-credit-risk lending proposition, supported by strong collateral coverage and shorter loan tenures. The Company intends to leverage its technology-enabled processes, branch network and operational experience to scale this business further.

This strategic shift towards gold loans, while continuing the MSME lending franchise through partner-led BC model, is aimed at creating a more diversified, secured and capital-efficient business model, strengthening portfolio quality and enhancing the Company's long-term sustainability and profitability.

Key Features:

Hybrid Model: Combines digital efficiency (leveraging historical data of ₹4,000+ Crore disbursed to over 12 lakh clients) with physical cash-flow assessment and on-ground collection mechanisms (NACH/physical).

Asset-Light Expansion (BC Model): Partnership with a Small Finance Bank enables MSME loan sourcing and servicing without credit exposure or FLDG obligations, ensuring scalable and low-risk growth.



Secured Portfolio Strength (Gold Loans): Entry into gold loans provides a highly secured, liquid, and low-risk asset class, improving overall portfolio quality.

Target Clientele: Focus on households with annual incomes of ₹3–5 lakhs, effectively bridging the gap between microfinance and formal MSME lending.

Rural Penetration: Strong presence in Tier 3–6 cities across North and East India, addressing the credit needs of small shopkeepers and informal businesses.

Strengths:

Regulatory Alignment: Entire portfolio qualifies under RBI's PSL norms, supporting financial inclusion and enabling access to institutional funding.

Diversified Business Model: Combination of on-book lending, BC partnerships (off-book, no risk), and gold loans enhances resilience and reduces balance sheet risk.

Proven Operating Model: Established branch-level profitability with a long operating history and a scalable lending framework.

Security Flexibility: Mix of unsecured, secured MSME loans, and gold-backed lending caters to varied borrower needs while balancing risk.

Tech-Touch Approach: Integration of fintech capabilities with field-level engagement ensures efficient underwriting, monitoring, and collections.

G. SWOT Analysis of CTL

Strengths (Internal Positive Factors)

Robust IT System – Enables efficient operations, real-time monitoring, automated underwriting, and strong risk management capabilities.

Foot-on-Street Model – Direct customer engagement through field staff enhances trust, improves collections, and ensures better borrower understanding.

Established Legacy – A long-standing presence as a listed NBFC builds credibility, transparency, and stakeholder confidence.

Extensive Branch Network – Deep physical reach across rural and semi-urban geographies ensures last-mile delivery and strong customer connect.



Diversified Revenue Streams – Balanced mix of on-book lending, BC income (no credit risk), and gold loan business strengthens financial stability.

Experienced Workforce – Skilled and trained employees drive customer acquisition, credit assessment, and portfolio quality.

Financial Inclusion Focus – Dedicated to serving underserved micro-entrepreneurs, shopkeepers, and traders in non-metro regions.

100% MSME (PSL) Portfolio – Full alignment with PSL norms attracts funding support and reinforces regulatory positioning.

High Employee Satisfaction – Recognized as a “Great Place to Work,” leading to strong retention, productivity, and service quality.

CTL’s evolving model—combining traditional lending, fintech efficiency, BC partnerships, and secured gold lending—positions it as a low-risk, scalable, and diversified MSME-focused financial institution, well aligned with India’s financial inclusion agenda.

Weaknesses (Internal Negative Factors)

1. BB Credit Rating – Higher funding costs due to sub-investment-grade rating.

The company's current credit rating of BB, which significantly affects its borrowing terms. This directly impacts profitability and restricts access to large-scale, low-cost funding, especially from conservative institutional investors.

2. Wholesale Funding Dependency – Heavy reliance on institutional borrowings (banks/NCDs) exposes liquidity risks.

The company predominantly depends on bulk funding sources like bank loans, Non-Convertible Debentures (NCDs), and term loans from financial institutions. This wholesale funding model creates exposure to liquidity mismatches, especially during periods of market stress when institutional lenders may reduce exposure to NBFCs, potentially impacting business continuity.

3. Rising Cost of Borrowing – Increased interest rates post-MFI sector downturn (last 3 years) squeeze margins.



Following industry-wide distress in the Microfinance Institution (MFI) and Rural MSME sector, lenders have become risk-averse, demanding higher interest spreads. Consequently, the company has experienced rising borrowing costs over the past three years, which compresses its interest margins and limits its ability to competitively price loans.

4. Limited Bank Borrowing Access – Post-MFI crises, banks tightened lending to NBFCs, restricting CTL’s funding flexibility.

Due to systemic concerns arising from defaults in the MFI and NBFC sectors, many banks have imposed stricter due diligence and curtailed lending limits to smaller NBFCs like Capital Trust Limited (CTL). This reduction in credit lines limits CTL’s ability to quickly scale or manage liquidity during growth or stress cycles.

5. Regulatory Compliance Burden – Stricter RBI norms (e.g., liquidity coverage, NPA recognition) increase operational costs.

Recent Reserve Bank of India (RBI) guidelines mandating enhanced liquidity buffers, accelerated recognition of non-performing assets (NPAs), and stricter governance norms have increased the cost and complexity of compliance. These regulatory changes require investments in systems, reporting tools, and staff training, placing additional pressure on operating budgets.

Opportunities (External Positive Factors)

1. Scalable Growth through BC Model (Zero Credit Risk)

The Business Correspondent (BC) partnership with a Small Finance Bank enables CTL to significantly scale its MSME lending operations without deploying capital or assuming credit risk. This asset-light model allows rapid geographic and portfolio expansion while earning stable fee-based income, improving return ratios without balance sheet stress.

2. Enhanced Profitability via Fee-Based Income

With no exposure to First Loss Default Guarantee (FLDG) or credit risk, the BC model ensures predictable and low-risk revenue streams. This shift toward fee income reduces earnings volatility and strengthens overall financial stability.

3. Deeper Market Penetration in Underserved Segments

Leveraging its strong rural and semi-urban presence, CTL can expand outreach to underserved MSMEs by acting as a sourcing and servicing partner for the bank. This creates an opportunity to capture a larger share of the “missing middle” segment without incremental risk.

4. Cross-Selling Opportunities Across Product Lines

The expanded product suite—including unsecured loans, secured MSME loans, BC-



originated loans, and gold loans—enables CTL to cross-sell effectively within its existing customer base, improving customer lifetime value and retention.

5. Low-Risk Expansion through Gold Loan Business

The entry into gold loans provides a highly secured lending avenue with strong collateral backing and lower default risk. This segment offers quick portfolio build-up, high liquidity, and resilience during economic uncertainty, strengthening the overall asset quality.

6. Portfolio Diversification and Risk Mitigation

The combination of on-book MSME lending, off-book BC portfolio (no credit exposure), and gold-backed loans creates a well-diversified business model. This reduces dependency on any single asset class and enhances the company's ability to withstand sectoral stress.

7. Improved Return Ratios and Capital Efficiency

The BC model (off-balance sheet) and gold loans (secured, low risk-weight) optimize capital utilization. This leads to improved Return on Assets (ROA) and Return on Equity (ROE), making the business more attractive to investors and lenders.

8. Strengthened Banking Partnerships

Successful execution of the BC model can open doors for additional partnerships with banks and financial institutions, enabling CTL to further scale its distribution platform and diversify income streams.

9. Digital and Operational Leverage

CTL's existing technology infrastructure and field network can be leveraged across BC and gold loan operations, leading to operational efficiencies, faster turnaround times, and reduced marginal cost of expansion.

10. Favorable Regulatory Environment for PSL Lending

Both MSME lending under BC arrangements and gold loans qualify under Priority Sector Lending (PSL), ensuring continued demand from banks seeking PSL assets and creating sustained business opportunities for CTL.

Threats (External Negative Factors)

1. Regulatory Policy Changes – Shifts in lending/co-lending norms may impact operations:

Changes in RBI regulations—such as risk weights, co-lending rules, or capital norms—can affect NBFC business models, operational flexibility, and growth plans, requiring constant compliance and strategy adjustments.



2. Risk Parameter Adjustments – Tighter underwriting standards could reduce loan approvals:

To manage asset quality, tightening credit norms may limit borrower eligibility, slow disbursements, and reduce customer acquisition, especially in high-risk segments like unsecured retail or first-time borrowers.

3. Economic Volatility – Macro factors affecting borrower repayment capacity:

Rising inflation, rural distress, or weak demand may hurt borrower cash flows and repayment ability, increasing delinquencies and necessitating more robust risk management and provisioning.

1. Overview

For the year ended March 31, 2026, the Company witnessed a significant decline in operating performance, marked by contraction in income and a substantial deterioration in profitability.



The year was characterized by balance sheet recalibration, elevated credit costs, and reduced lending activity, which collectively impacted financial outcomes.

2. Income Performance

Total income for FY 2025–26 stood at ₹4,235.68 Lakhs as against ₹9,600.03 Lakhs in the previous year, reflecting a sharp decline of 55.9%.

This decline was primarily driven by a significant reduction in interest income, which decreased to ₹2,206.77 Lakhs from ₹6,095.14 Lakhs in FY 2024–25. The contraction in interest income indicates a substantial reduction in the lending portfolio reflecting a more cautious approach to disbursements and portfolio management during the year.

Revenue from operations also declined materially to ₹4,155.33 Lakhs , underscoring the overall slowdown in core business activity.

3. Expenditure Profile

Total expenses for the year stood at ₹7,879.20 Lakhs , compared to ₹9,437.95 Lakhs in the previous year, representing a reduction of 16.5%.

While the Company undertook measures to rationalize costs, the reduction in expenses was not commensurate with the steep fall in income, leading to significant margin compression.

Key cost drivers include:

- Finance Costs declined to ₹1,192.95 Lakhs from ₹1,917.31 Lakhs, reflecting deleveraging and/or reduced cost of funds.
- Impairment and Write-offs of Financial Instruments increased sharply to ₹1,233.28 Lakhs (from ₹205.08 Lakhs), representing a substantial rise in credit costs. This was the single largest factor impacting profitability and reflects stress in asset quality and prudent provisioning.
- Employee Benefits Expense reduced to ₹2,664.73 Lakhs from ₹4,096.47 Lakhs , indicating cost optimization and operational resizing.
- Other Expenses declined to ₹2,605.03 Lakhs from ₹3,058.96 Lakhs , reflecting ongoing efforts to control discretionary and administrative expenditure.

4. Profitability

The Company reported a loss before tax of ₹3,643.52 Lakhs for FY 2025–26 as against a profit before tax of ₹162.08 Lakhs in the previous year.



After accounting for tax expenses of ₹1,038.95 Lakhs , the Company recorded a net loss of ₹4,682.47 Lakhs , compared to a net profit of ₹111.09 Lakhs in FY 2024–25.

The deterioration in profitability is attributable to:

- Significant decline in income
- Elevated impairment provisions and write-offs
- Fixed cost structure adjusting slower than revenue contraction

5. Key Financial Insights

- **Income Compression:** Reflects strategic moderation in lending and/or portfolio run-down
- **Elevated Credit Costs:** Indicates asset quality stress and conservative provisioning stance
- **Cost Rationalization:** Visible across employee and operating expenses, though insufficient to offset revenue decline
- **Shift in Risk Posture:** Financials suggest a transition toward balance sheet strengthening over growth

Risk management

The company has a robust risk management framework in place to identify, which measures, monitors and manages the critical risks. While risk is inherent to every institution, it assumes greater significance in the context of Micro Credit due to the very nature of the business with its absence of collaterals quality and the vulnerable, financially excluded customer segment it serves.

Risks may be avoided through pre-emptive action and hence the need to identify the risks and put in place various mitigation mechanisms.

Capital Trust has identified the following potential risks that could have an adverse impact on the company:

1. Credit Risk
2. Operational Risk
3. Liquidity Risk
4. Portfolio Concentration Risk
5. Compliance Risk
6. Reputation Risk
7. Strategic Risk
8. Contagion Risk

Credit Risk

Credit Risk for Capital Trust Limited is the risk of loss of interest income and the Company's inability to recover of the principal amount of the loan disbursed to its customers.



This risk can result from:

- Information asymmetry and excessive reliance on Credit Bureau check, not backed by soft information or market intelligence on a territory or group of borrowers, leading to adverse selection of borrowers.
- A volatile political presence in a region of exposure
- Exposure to activities with a high probability of variation in earnings
- Default due to over-indebtedness or business failure

Credit Risk also includes Credit Concentration Risk, arising out of concentrated exposure to a particular geographical location/territory or to an activity in which a large group of borrowers are engaged in, vulnerable to external events.

Mitigation

1.1. Location Selection

Before establishing any branch, a detailed survey is conducted which takes into account the factors like credit culture, economic activity and political stability of the area. This mitigates the risk of operating in negative areas.

1.2. Credit Bureau Check

A credit check is done for every customer through an automated system-to-system integration with the Credit Bureau. As part of this check, the parameters like default history, multiple borrowings, Indebtedness and income check are looked at to verify a customer's credit-worthiness and also ensure that they are not overburdened. This mitigates the risk of customer defaults.

1.3. Multi-Step Customer Verification

Capital Trust has established separate customer relationship (acquisition and maintenance) and customer evaluation (credit) personnel in order to ensure the quality of customers acquired as well as eliminate coerced borrowing practices which may lead to genuine customers becoming delinquent. This mitigates the risk of ghost borrowing and ring-leader scenario. Risk along with internal audit will be monitoring that customer verification process is followed properly else action to be recommended which should be accepted by business.

Operational Risk

Operational Risk is the risk of possible losses, resulting from inadequate or failed internal processes, people and systems or from external events, which includes legal risks but excludes strategic and reputation risk. The risk can emanate from:

- Procedural lapses arising due to higher volumes of small-ticket transactions.
- Lapses in compliance with established norms; regulatory as well as internal guidelines
- Misplaced/lost documents, collusion and fraud
- Breakdown or non-availability of core business applications.



Internal Audit team checks the various aspects of operational risk by auditing the various SOPs/ Processes.

Skill gap and sudden attrition of key personnel in the organization, is also an operational risk, which needs to be countered and addressed by the application of appropriate HR strategies.

Mitigation

Process Compliance

Capital Trust has an independent Internal Audit department which carries out surprise checks on field branches and rates them on pre-defined compliance parameters, identifies gaps in process compliance and rolls out initiatives to correct loopholes. This is done primarily to

- Ensure that the designed processes are being followed on the field – including interaction with the customers during various stages of the relationship lifecycle.
- Ensure all branch activities are carried out as per norms/procedures as mentioned in the operational manual.
- Identify any process lapses/deviations and provide guidance to branches/employees to ensure compliance.

This ensures that risks arising out of process lapses are mitigated. Risk should ensure that above mentioned guidelines is being followed up.

Employee Rotation Policy:

Capital Trust Limited has a policy to ensure that no field employee is posted in the same location for over two years as an effort to mitigate any chances of collusion or fraud. All field employees are either transferred to another branch or rotated to another role in a programmed manner so as to mitigate the chances of collusion with other employees or customers. The policy ensures that the employees have the predictability of their movements without putting them into undue hardships.

Document Storage and Retrieval:

Capital Trust recognizes the need for proper storage of documents as also their retrieval for audit and statutory requirements. We have put in place Physical Storage and Scanned Copies.

Portfolio Concentration Risk

Portfolio Concentration Risk is the risk to the company due to a very high credit exposure to a particular business segment, industry, geography, location, etc though in the context of micro finance, it pertains predominantly to geographical concentration.

Mitigation

Capital Trust intends to maintain a diversified exposure in advances across various states to mitigate the risks that could arise due to political or other factors within a particular state. With this in mind, Capital Trust has steadily diversified its presence from 3-4 states to 10 states.



Compliance Risk

Capital Trust is present in an industry where the Company has to ensure compliance with regulatory and statutory requirements. Non-Compliance can result in stringent actions and penalties from the Regulator and/or Statutory Authorities and which also poses a risk to Capital Trust's reputation.

Mitigation

The company has implemented a Compliance Management through its Compliance Committee with in-built work-flows to track, update and monitor compliances. The company has strong compliance team who monitors statutory compliances.

Reputation Risk

Reputation risk is the risk to earnings and capital arising from adverse perception of the image or the company, on the part of customers, counter parties shareholders, investors and regulators. It refers to the potential adverse effects, which can arise from the company's reputation getting tarnished due to factors such as unethical practices, regulatory actions, customer dissatisfaction and complaints leading to negative publicity. Presence in a regulated and socially sensitive industry can result in significant impact on Capital Trust's reputation and brand equity as perceived by multiple entities like the RBI, Central/State/Local authorities, banking industry and last but not least, Capital Trust's customers.

Mitigation

Considering the vulnerability of our customer segment and the potential for negative political activism to affect the reputation of the company, we have in place Strict Adherence to Fair Practices Code, Grievance, Redressal Mechanism, Customer Connect and Delinquency Management. The Company does not resort to any coercive recovery practices and has an approved delinquency management policy including restructuring of loans where necessary.

Strategic Risk

It is the risk to earnings and capital arising from lack of responsiveness to changes in the business environment and/or adverse business decisions, besides adoption of wrong strategies and choices.

Mitigation

This is being addressed and the risk mitigated to a great extent, by referring matters of strategic importance to the Management, consisting of members with diversified experience in the respective fields, for intense deliberations, so as to derive the benefit of collective wisdom.

Contagion Risk

Contagion risk as an enlarged version of systemic risk, refers to the probability of credit default among a large group of borrowers in a particular geographical Territory or State, arising out of external factors or political overtones, spreading to culturally-aligned



neighboring Territory or State, resulting in moral hazard, thereby escalating the risk of possible default. Further in the context of micro credit, it could result mostly from ghost-borrowing and ring-leader scenarios.

Mitigation

This is being addressed by customer connect program wherein we pro-actively reach out to each individual customer as well as customers in each center to validate that the customers have genuinely applied for the loan and there has been no incidence of commission, following a relationship based mode of engagement so the customer feels a sense of loyalty to the company and is therefore less likely to be part of a mass default by others and implementing an analytics solution to study the credit bureau data and look for warning signs of increased defaults – upto the pin-code level.

Cybersecurity Risk

Cybersecurity risk refers to the potential harm or damage that can occur due to vulnerabilities, threats, or attacks targeting an organization's digital assets, systems, and networks. These risks arise from various sources, including malicious actors such as hackers, cybercriminals, and state-sponsored entities.

Mitigation:

We regularly assess potential cybersecurity threats and vulnerabilities through thorough risk assessments, enabling us to identify and prioritize areas for improvement. Through continuous security awareness training, we ensure that our employees are well-informed about evolving cyber threats and adhere to best practices in cybersecurity.

At Capital Trust Ltd., we take proactive measures to mitigate cybersecurity risks and ensure the protection of our clients' data. As part of our security protocols, we have implemented a policy of regularly changing passwords for our systems and accounts.

Every 15 days, we enforce a password rotation policy, requiring employees to update their passwords. This practice reduces the likelihood of unauthorized access due to compromised credentials and enhances the overall security posture of our organization.

By regularly refreshing passwords, we minimize the risk of data breaches and cyber threats, as it limits the window of opportunity for potential attackers to exploit weak or compromised passwords. This proactive approach aligns with our commitment to maintaining the confidentiality, integrity, and availability of our clients' sensitive information.

Artificial Intelligence Risk

AI risk, also known as artificial intelligence risk, refers to the potential negative consequences or adverse impacts associated with the development, deployment, or use of artificial intelligence (AI) technologies. These risks can arise from various factors, including



technical limitations, ethical concerns, societal implications, and unintended consequences. Some key categories of AI risk include:

Technical Risks:

- Algorithmic Bias: AI systems may perpetuate or amplify biases present in data, leading to discriminatory outcomes or unfair treatment of certain individuals or groups.
- Robustness and Reliability: AI systems may exhibit unexpected behaviors, vulnerabilities, or errors, particularly in complex or unanticipated situations, posing risks to reliability, safety, and security.
- Data Quality and Integrity: AI performance heavily depends on the quality, relevance, and integrity of data. Poor data quality or biased datasets can lead to inaccurate or unreliable AI predictions and decisions.

- By fostering a culture of ethical awareness, accountability, and responsible innovation among employees, stakeholders, and partners involved in AI initiatives.
- By empowering employees with the necessary training, expertise, and tools to interpret, validate, and challenge AI recommendations or decisions when necessary.
- Integrate AI risk assessment and management practices into existing risk management frameworks, governance structures, and compliance programs.
- Conduct comprehensive risk assessments to identify, prioritize, and mitigate AI-related risks, including technical, ethical, legal, and regulatory concerns.

Gold Loan Specific Risks

Gold loans introduce a secured lending dimension but carry distinct risks linked to collateral valuation, price volatility, and operational handling of pledged gold.

Key Risks:



1. **Gold Price Risk:** Decline in gold prices may reduce collateral cover, increasing Loan-to-Value (LTV) risk.
2. **Collateral Quality Risk:** Risk of accepting impure, fake, or low-quality gold ornaments.
3. **Auction Risk:** Inability to recover dues through auction due to price fluctuations or regulatory constraints.
4. **Operational Handling Risk:** Risk of theft, misplacement, or damage to pledged gold.
5. **Customer Behaviour Risk:** Strategic defaults in case of falling gold prices or emotional sensitivity attached to pledged ornaments.

Mitigation:

- Conservative LTV ratios in line with RBI guidelines
- Use of trained appraisers and standardized gold purity testing processes
- Periodic revaluation and monitoring of gold prices
- Strong vault management systems with dual control, insurance, and CCTV surveillance
- Well-defined auction policies and empanelled auctioneers
- Customer engagement and reminder mechanisms to reduce delinquency

Technology Infrastructure & Digital Transformation

The company has leveraged technology to effectively reach out to micro-borrowers to fulfil their requirements for income generating loans in a transparent manner. With Aadhaar card as the starting point, our software validates identity and credit history instantly. Zxing, an open-source, multi-format barcode image processing library, scans QRs codes on the Aadhaar Card which instantly sends information to the credit bureau for checking the client's credit history, determining whether the person is eligible for a loan. Through the mobile application, a soft approval for a loan can be given to a client within seconds.

The company uses the Technology to its maximum and helped the company in attaining:

- One of the first NBFCs to start cashless disbursement of all loans since 2015.
- Started process of cashless repayment for all loans (except Microfinance) in 2019.
- Automated closing of company and all branch books at 6PM daily through collation of issued Digital Receipts (SMSs sent to client on collection of any repayment).
- Client application with access to all details regarding the loan to promote transparency and authenticity.
- Staff and client-facing smartphone applications with access to all details regarding the loan to promote transparency and authenticity



- All staff have access to Capital Sales, the company application, that provides real-time information in even the most remote locations.
- All new staff onboarding through paperless, digitalized processes with joining formalities done within hours
- All warehousing of information on cloud.
- Smart credit enabling client on-boarding and in-principle approval from scanning of client's Aadhar card at his doorstep.
- 100% paperless processes. From onboarding to disbursement all processes are digitalized and through the application with no scope of any manual input into system
- No manual entry allowed for any clients

The issuance of digital receipts for the repayments made by the clients, has helped the company is transparency and authenticity in transaction with the clients and reduction of frauds.

The Company has well documented internal financial controls with risk control matrix for all the critical areas of business and processes. Internal Financial Controls ensure that business is conducted on the set principles efficiently and the company adhere to policies, safeguarding its assets, prevention of errors, accuracy and completeness of the accounting records and the timely preparation of reliable financial information. The internal financial controls of the company are adequate and commensurate with the size of the business.

The Internal Auditors monitor the efficiency and efficacy of the internal control systems in the company, compliance with operating systems/accounting procedures and policies framed by the company. The department is also responsible to review and monitor the risk framework within the company. The department also undertakes audit of its branches covering all aspects of branch operations and credit audit. The department also provides independent assurance on the effectiveness of implementation of risk management framework, including the overall adequacy of the internal control system and the risk control function and compliance with internal policies and procedures.

The Company has adequate systems and procedures to provide assurance of recording transactions in all material respects. During the year, the Internal Auditors reviewed the operating effectiveness of the internal financial controls by undertaking an effectiveness testing of controls covered under the Risk Control Matrices for major processes.



The Internal Audit Department of Capital Trust upholds its departmental Vision of fostering a control environment of the organization, adding value to the organization by continuously improving operational efficiency and safeguarding the interests of the organization. The function will do so by recruiting and retaining the best talent from both internal and external sources in order to raise the profile of the Internal Audit Department within the organization.

The Mission of the Internal Audit Department of Capital Trust is to enable the organization in:

- Focusing on key business activities through motivated, skilled and experienced staff who are responsive to the customers' needs;
- Engaging with different entities to facilitate positive changes to existing processes, practices and systems;
- Adopting continuous improvement initiatives and implementing best practices in developing its plan, policies and methods;
- Creating a dynamic working environment which encourages innovation and maximizes the use of new technology;
- Ensuring that its performance is monitored, measured and reported in satisfying the expectations of the different stakeholders.

The internal audit adopts a risk based audit approach and conducts regular audits of all the branches/offices of the Company and evaluates on a continuous basis, the adequacy and effectiveness of the internal control mechanism, adherence to the policies and procedures of the Company as well as the regulatory and legal requirements. The company has well drafted policies and procedure in the form of manuals.

These policies and procedures are well established and followed meticulously. The company adheres to audit process which encompasses risk identification, risk assessment, risk address and reviewing & reporting risk. The Company has established risk management and audit framework to identify, assess, monitor and manage credit, market, liquidity and operational risks. This is extremely important as many of our borrowers do not have any assets and also do not have adequate literacy skills. The company has three levels of the audit which include surprise branch audit, Pre disbursement audit for client identification and checking of credit worthiness of the clients and post disbursal audit. Under the post disbursal audit, the loan



utilization is checked. The internal audit department also tracks the attendance of client in the centre meeting.

The audit recommendations are actively followed up and implemented. As part of the effort to evaluate the effectiveness of the internal control systems, our Company's internal audit department reviews all the control measures on a periodic basis and recommends improvements, wherever appropriate. In addition to in-house internal audit department, the company has engaged independent internal auditor who submits its report to the audit committee.

The company has only one segment of business i.e “financing” so there is no segment wise or product wise performance available.

The company aims to be the first choice of customers, employees and shareholders.

The company has hired some senior people from reputed companies who are expert in their area of activity. With professionals at the top and fully motivated team at the field, the company is bound to grow in the future.

Your Directors take pleasure in presenting the 40th Annual Report on the business and operations of your Company, along with the standalone audited financial statements for the year ended March 31, 2026.

The Company's financial performance for the year ended 31st March, 2026 is summarized below:

1. FINANCIAL PERFORMANCE

In FY 2025–26, the Company witnessed a significant decline in operational performance, with total income reducing to ₹4,235.68 lakhs from ₹9,600.03 lakhs in FY 2024–25. Revenue from operations stood at ₹4,155.33 lakhs as against ₹9,474.60 lakhs in the previous year, reflecting a substantial contraction in business activity.

The decline in performance was primarily attributable to a reduction in disbursements, particularly in the unsecured lending segment in rural India, driven by collection challenges and asset quality concerns. As a result, the Company adopted a cautious approach towards incremental lending, which impacted overall income levels.

Despite the moderation in business volumes, finance costs remained significant at ₹1,192.95 lakhs. Total expenses for the year stood at ₹7,879.54 lakhs. Employee benefit expenses were ₹2,664.74 lakhs, while impairment/write-offs of financial instruments increased to ₹1,240.28 lakhs, reflecting stress in the unsecured portfolio. Depreciation remained relatively stable at ₹34.54 lakhs.

Consequently, the Company reported a Loss Before Tax of ₹3,643.86 lakhs, as against a Profit Before Tax of ₹162.08 lakhs in FY 2024–25. After accounting for tax expenses of



₹1,103.95 lakhs, the Company reported a Loss After Tax of ₹4,682.47 lakhs, compared to a Profit After Tax of ₹111.09 lakhs in the previous year.

In view of the losses incurred during the year, no amount was available for appropriation, and accordingly, no transfer was made to the Reserve Fund under Section 45IC of the RBI Act, as compared to ₹22.01 lakhs transferred in FY 2024–25.

In response to the evolving operating environment, the Company has initiated a strategic shift in its business model. It has entered into a partnership arrangement with a Small Finance Bank (SFB), wherein the Company will undertake sourcing and collection of unsecured loans on behalf of the SFB, thereby leveraging its distribution and field expertise while mitigating balance sheet risk.

Simultaneously, the Company is realigning its own lending focus towards secured products, with an emphasis on reducing credit risk. As part of this strategy, the Company has also commenced gold loan operations, which are expected to provide a stable and collateral-backed revenue stream going forward.

Capital Trust continues to maintain a positive reputation among stakeholders, supported by its track record of timely repayments. The Company's credit rating stands at BB+ (SO) by Care Ratings as of 31st March, 2026.

Going forward, the Company remains focused on strengthening asset quality, improving collections, and building a more resilient and diversified lending portfolio through a balanced mix of partnership-led and secured lending models.

2. FUND RAISING

In total, the company has raised Rs.2129 Lakhs during the year in the form of Term loans, PTCs, and Direct Assignments from Banks and NBFCs. Further, the company has disbursed Rs.16075 Lakhs during the year both under own funding and partnership model.

3. SHARE CAPITAL

During the year, the Company strengthened its capital base through a Rights Issue of 170,099,202 equity shares at an issue price of ₹14 per share. Total Capital Raised: ₹2,381.39 lakhs (approx.)

4. DIVIDEND

Your directors have not recommended any dividend. Your Company has formulated a dividend Policy in accordance with the Securities and Exchange Board of India (Listing Obligations and Disclosure Requirements) Regulations, 2015 ('SEBI LODR Regulations') to bring transparency



in the matter of the declaration of dividends and to protect the interest of investors. The Dividend Distribution Policy forms part of this Report.

Rs. 2,76,101.00 out of unclaimed dividend account was to be transferred to Investor Protection and Education Fund pertaining to year 2017-18. there is Rs.2.43 lying in unpaid paid dividend account of the company pertaining to year 2018-19.

(i) Statutory Auditor's report

There are no disqualifications, reservations, adverse remarks or disclaimers in the auditor's report.

However, the auditors have observed that:

- (iv) In our opinion, the company has generally been regular in depositing undisputed statutory dues, including Goods and Service Tax, Provident Fund, Employees State Insurance, Income-tax, Sales tax, Service tax, Value Added tax, Cess and other statutory dues, to the extent applicable, with the appropriate authorities.
However, certain undisputed dues outstanding for a period of more than six months from the date they became payable as at the year end include Provident Fund amounting to Rs. 4.16 Lakhs, Employees' State Insurance amounting to Rs. 1.10 Lakhs, Professional Tax amounting to Rs. 1.52 Lakhs and Goods & Services Tax amounting to Rs. 3.99 Lakhs.

In response, it is submitted that there are certain employees in whose cases there is a mismatch between the names recorded in their Aadhaar and PAN. Due to this discrepancy, their UAN has either not been generated or remains unlinked. Consequently, the corresponding amounts cannot be deposited at present. The Company has separately parked



these amounts and shall deposit the same once the discrepancies are resolved by the concerned employees.

Further, the GST amount referred to pertains to the liability arising pursuant to the assessment order. The Company acknowledges this liability and the same shall be discharged during the current financial year.

B. According to the information and explanations given to us and based on the records of the Company examined by us, there are certain dues relating to Income Tax and Goods and Services Tax (“GST”) which have not been deposited on account of disputes pending before appropriate authorities. The Company has already filed appeals before the appropriate appellate authorities. The Company has strong and sustainable grounds in each of these matters and is confident of obtaining favourable orders. Accordingly, no material adverse impact is anticipated on account of these matters.

C. Based upon the audit procedures performed and considering the principles of materiality outlined in the Standards on Auditing, for the purpose of reporting the true and fair view of the financial statements and according to the information and explanations provided to us, the management has informed us of instances of employee fraud involving embezzlement of cash aggregating to Rs. 1.29 Lakhs during the year. Out of the said amount, Rs. 0.02 Lakhs has



been recovered by the Company and the balance amount of Rs. 1.27 Lakhs has been appropriately provided for as doubtful in the Statement of Profit and Loss. Other than the aforesaid instances, no fraud by the Company or on the Company has been noticed or reported during the course of our audit.

In response, it is submitted that the nature of the business involves some clients repaying their loan installments in cash at the branch office. In a few instances, employees did not deposit this cash in the bank and absconded with the money. The company has already recovered a portion of the lost funds and has initiated action against those employees.

(ii) Secretarial Auditor's Report

The Secretarial Audit Report does not contain any qualification, reservation or adverse remark made by Secretarial Auditor.

(iii) Internal Auditors' Report

The Internal Audit Reports does not contain any qualification, reservation or adverse remark made by Internal Auditor.

Based upon the audit procedures performed and considering the principles of materiality outlined in Standards on Auditing, for the purpose of reporting the true and fair view of the financial statements and according to the information and explanations given to us, we have neither come across any instance of fraud by the Company or on the Company noticed or reported during the year nor have we been informed of any such case by the management during the course of audit except frauds discovered by the Company aggregating Rs. 1.29 Lakhs committed by employees by embezzlement of cash against which the full amount has been provided for doubtful in the statement of profit and loss.

In response to that it is submitted that the nature of the business is such that cash is collected from customers and same is to be deposited in the bank account. In some cases the employees take away the cash. The company has zero tolerance towards the frauds and legal action is taken against the fraudulent employees .

In accordance with the Securities and Exchange Board of India (Listing Obligations and Disclosure Requirements) Regulations, 2015 (“SEBI LODR Regulations”), we hereby present the Corporate Governance Report as part of the Directors’ Report for the Financial Year 2025-26.

I. Our Corporate Governance Philosophy

At Capital Trust Limited, effective corporate governance forms the bedrock of long-term business sustainability and value creation. It serves as the foundational framework upon which resilient, ethical, and successful enterprises are built. The Company’s governance philosophy is deeply embedded in its business strategy and day-to-day operations, ensuring fiscal prudence, ethical conduct, and fairness to all its stakeholders — including regulators, employees, customers, vendors, investors, and the broader community.

Over the years, Capital Trust has cultivated a strong legacy of transparent, fair, and responsible governance practices. Our leadership remains committed to upholding the highest standards of integrity and accountability, which continue to guide our corporate decisions and stakeholder engagements. Robust corporate governance is not merely a compliance obligation but a core value that reinforces stakeholder trust and organizational efficiency.

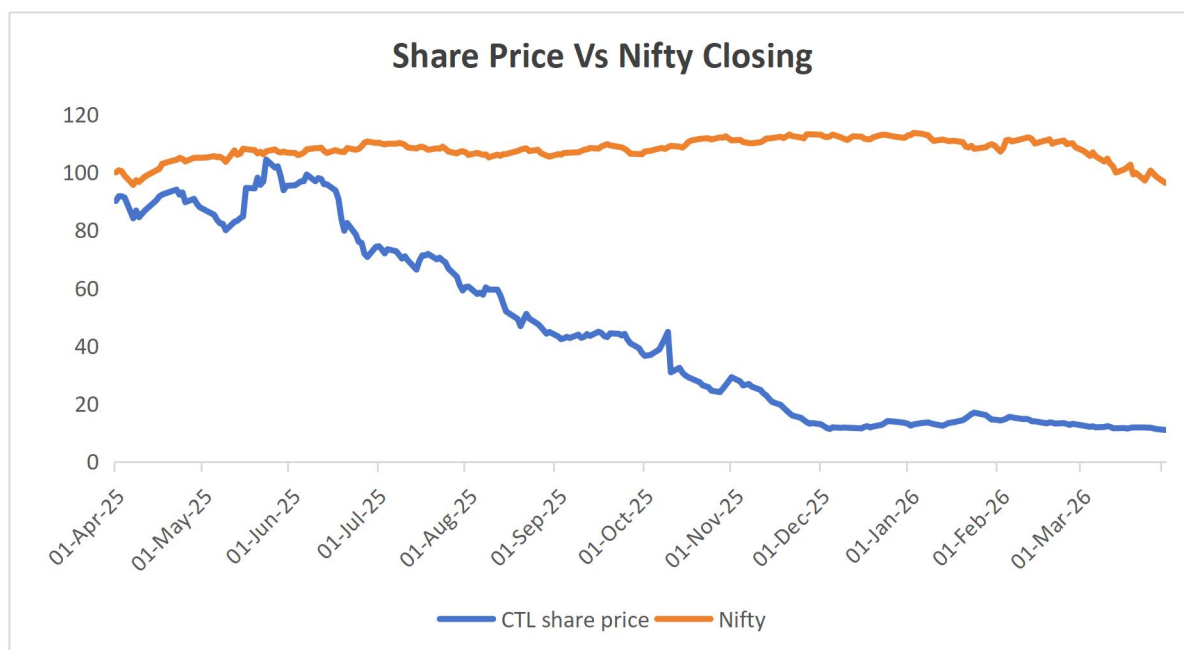

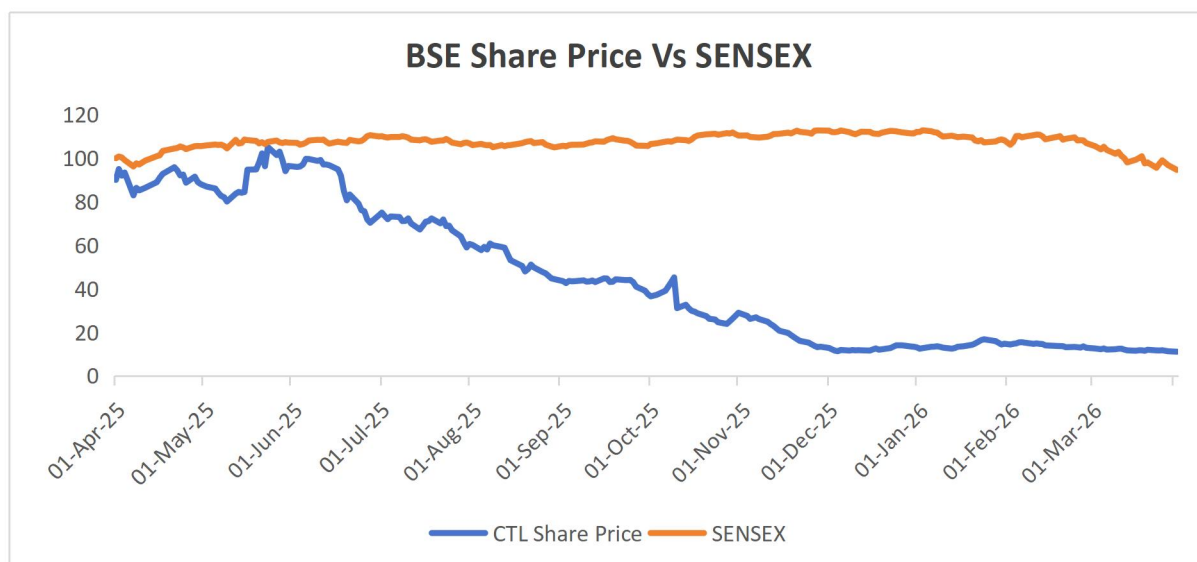
Capital Trust Share performance vis -a - viz NSE Nifty

In compliance with the provisions of the Companies Act, 2013 ('the Act'), SEBI (Listing Obligations and Disclosure Requirements) Regulations, 2015, as amended ('the Listing Regulations'), MCA Circulars and SEBI Circulars, the AGM of the Company is being held through VC/OAVM which does not require physical presence of members at a common venue. The proceedings of the AGM will be deemed to be conducted at the Registered Office of the Company which shall be the deemed Venue of the AGM.
2. A statement giving relevant details of the directors seeking appointment/ reappointment under Item No. 2 of the accompanying notice, as required under SEBI (Listing Obligations & Disclosure Requirements) Regulations, 2015 is annexed herewith as Annexure-I.
3. Pursuant to the provisions of the Act, a Member entitled to attend and vote at the AGM is entitled to appoint a proxy to attend and vote on his/her behalf and the proxy need not be a Member of the Company. In terms of MCA Circulars, since physical attendance of Members has been dispensed with, there is no requirement of appointment of proxies. Accordingly, the facility for appointment of proxies by the Members under Section 105 of the Act, will not be available for the AGM and, hence, the Proxy Form and Attendance Slip are not annexed to this Notice. Due to collection crisis in the rural MSME sector, the Company had to write off a significant portion of the loan book and had to take a hit on the Profit and Loss Account. The Company has yet to earn profits which will be sufficient for the managerial remuneration.



The losses resulted in inadequate profits to meet the managerial remuneration limits. The Nomination and Remuneration Committee and the Board of Directors have recommended fixing the maximum managerial remuneration payable in accordance with Schedule V of the Companies Act, 2013. Schedule V provides for shareholders' approval in case remuneration is required to be paid in excess of the limits provided therein.

Therefore, the resolution is placed before the members to approve the maximum managerial remuneration payable in case of inadequate profits/no profits, in accordance with the applicable provisions of Schedule V of the Companies Act, 2013. The Managing Director and Joint Managing Director are interested in this resolution.

Opinion

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of Capital Trust Limited (“the Company”), which comprise the Balance sheet as at March 31 2026, the Statement of Profit and Loss including Other Comprehensive Income, the Statement of Changes in Equity and the Statement of Cash Flows for the year then ended, and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of material accounting policies and other explanatory information (hereinafter referred to as “the financial statements”).

1. Company Overview

Capital Trust Limited is a public Company incorporated in India under the provisions of the erstwhile Companies Act, 1956. The Company is a Non Deposit taking Systemically Important (ND-SI) registered with the Reserve Bank of India ('RBI') and engaged in the business of providing loan to Small and Micro Enterprises. Equity Shares of the Company are listed on BSE Limited (BSE), India and National stock exchange of India limited.

2. Basis of Preparation

(i) Statement of compliance with Indian Accounting Standards (Ind AS)

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Indian Accounting Standards (Ind AS) as per the Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Rules, 2015 notified under Section 133 of the Companies Act, 2013, (the 'Act') and other relevant provisions of the Act, as amended from time to time and other accounting principles generally accepted in India along with other relevant provisions of the Act and the Master Direction – Non-Banking Financial Company– Systemically Important Non-Deposit taking Company and Deposit taking Company (Reserve Bank) Directions, 2016 ('the NBFC Master Directions') issued by RBI.

These financial statements were authorised for issue by the Board of Directors on their meeting held on May 27, 2026.

The Company presents its balance sheet in order of liquidity. An analysis regarding recovery or settlement within 12 months after the reporting date and more than 12 months after the reporting date is presented in Note 41.

(ii) Basis of Measurement

These financial statements have been prepared on a historical cost basis except for following assets and liabilities which have been measured at fair value

- i) financial instruments - fair value through profit and loss (FVTPL);
- ii) defined benefit liabilities/(assets): present value of defined benefit obligation less fair value of plan assets.

Fair value is the price that would be received to sell of an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date, regardless of whether that price is directly observable or estimated using another valuation technique. In estimating the fair value of an asset or a liability, the Company take into account the characteristics of the asset or liability if market participants would take those characteristics into account when pricing the asset or liability at the measurement date. Fair value for measurement and/or disclosure purposes in the financial statements is determined on such a basis, except measurements that have some similarities to fair value but are not fair value, such as value in use in Impairment of Assets.

In addition, for financial reporting purposes, fair value measurements are categorised into Level 1, 2 or 3 based on the degree to which the inputs to the fair value measurements are observable and the significance of the inputs to the fair value measurement in its entirety, which are described as follows:

- Level 1 inputs are quoted prices /net asset value (unadjusted) in active markets for identical assets or liabilities that the company can access at the measurement date;
- Level 2 inputs other than quoted prices included within Level 1, that are observable for the asset or liability, either directly or indirectly; and
- Level 3 inputs are unobservable inputs for the asset or liability.

(iii) Significant accounting Judgements and Estimates

In preparing these financial statements, management has made judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the application of the Company's accounting policies and the reported amounts of assets, liabilities, income and expenses. Management believes that the estimates used in the preparation of the financial statements are prudent and reasonable. Actual results may differ from these estimates. Estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to estimates are recognised prospectively.

Judgements

Information about the judgements made in applying accounting policies that have the most significant effects on the amounts recognised in the financial statements have been given below:

- assessing the lease term (including anticipated renewals) and the applicable discount rate.
- Classification of financial assets: assessment of business model within which the assets are held and assessment of whether the contractual terms of the financial assets are solely payments of principal and interest on the principal amount outstanding.

Assumptions and estimation uncertainties

Information about assumptions and estimation uncertainties that have a significant risk of resulting in a material adjustment in the financial statements for every period ended is included below:

- Measurement of defined benefit obligations: key actuarial assumptions;
- Recognition of deferred tax assets: availability of future taxable profit against which carry-forward tax losses can be used;
- Impairment test: key assumptions underlying recoverable amounts.
- Useful life and residual value of property, plant and equipment, other intangible assets and Right of Use assets;
- Recognition and measurement of provisions and contingencies: key assumptions about the likelihood and magnitude of an outflow of resources
- Impairment of financial assets: key assumptions used in estimating recoverable cash flows
- Measurement of expected credit losses.
- Uncertainty relating to the global health pandemic

(iv) Functional and presentation currency

Indian Rupee (₹) is the Company's functional currency and the currency of the primary economic environment in which the Company operates. Accordingly, the management has determined that financial statements are presented in Indian Rupees (₹). All amounts have been rounded-off to the nearest lakhs upto two decimal places, unless otherwise indicated.

3. Material Accounting Policies

a Property, plant and equipment

Recognition and measurement

Property, plant and equipment ('PPE') are stated at acquisition or construction cost less accumulated depreciation and impairment loss. Cost comprises the purchase price and any attributable cost of bringing the asset to its location and working condition for its intended use, including relevant borrowing costs.

If significant parts of an item of PPE have different useful lives, then they are accounted for as separate items (major components) of PPE.

The cost of an item of PPE is recognised as an asset if, and only if, it is probable that the economic benefits associated with the item will flow to the Company in future periods and the cost of the item can be measured reliably.

Expenditure incurred after the PPE have been put into operations, such as repair and maintenance expenses are charged to the Statement of Profit and Loss during the period in which they are incurred.

Capital work in progress includes cost of assets at sites, construction expenditure and interest on the funds deployed less any impairment loss, if any.

The estimated useful lives and residual values of the PPE are reviewed at the end of each financial year.

PPE, individually costing less than Rupees five thousand, are fully depreciated in the year of purchase.

Gains or losses arising from the retirement or disposal of PPE are determined as the difference between the net disposal proceeds and the carrying amount of the asset and recognised as income or expense in the Statement of Profit and Loss.

Subsequent Measurement

Subsequent expenditure is capitalised only if it is probable that the future economic benefits associated with the expenditure will flow to the Company.

Depreciation

Depreciation on property, plant and equipment is provided on Straight Line Method using the rates arrived at based on the useful lives as specified in the Schedule II of the Companies Act, 2013. Depreciation on the Property Plant and Equipment added/disposed off/discarded during the year is provided from/upto the date when added/disposed off/discarded.

b Other Intangible Assets

Recognition and measurement

Intangible assets, representing softwares are initially recognised at cost and subsequently carried at cost less accumulated amortisation and accumulated impairment. The cost of assets comprises of purchase price and directly attributable cost of bringing the assets to working condition for its intended use.

Subsequent Measurement

Subsequent expenditure is capitalised only if it is probable that the future economic benefits associated with the expenditure will flow to the company.

Amortisation

The intangible assets are amortised using the straight line method over a period of three years [which is the management's estimate of its useful life] from the date when the asset is available for use or license period which ever is lower. Amortisation on the intangible asset disposed off during the year is provided on pro-rata basis with reference to the date of disposal. The useful lives of intangible assets are reviewed at each financial year end and adjusted prospectively, if appropriate.

c Impairment of non-financial assets

At the end of each reporting period, the Company reviews the carrying amounts of non-financial assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have suffered an impairment loss. If any such indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset is estimated in order to determine the extent of the impairment loss (if any). When it is not possible to estimate the recoverable amount of an individual asset, the Company estimates the recoverable amount of the cash generating unit to which the asset belongs.

d Revenue recognition

Revenue is recognised to the extent that it is probable that the economic benefit will flow to the Company and the revenue can be reliably measured.

Interest and allied Income

Interest income on a financial asset at amortised cost is recognised on a time proportion basis taking into account the amount outstanding and the effective interest rate ('EIR'). The EIR is the rate that exactly discounts estimated future cash flows of the financial asset through the expected life of the financial asset or, where appropriate, a shorter period, to the net carrying amount of the financial instrument. The internal rate of return on financial asset after netting off the fees received and cost incurred approximates the effective interest rate of return for the financial asset. The future cash flows are estimated taking into account all the contractual terms of the instrument.

The interest income is calculated by applying the EIR to the gross carrying amount of non-credit impaired financial assets (i.e. at the amortised cost of the financial asset before adjusting for any expected credit loss allowance). For credit-impaired financial assets the interest income is calculated by applying the EIR to the amortised cost of the credit-impaired financial assets (i.e. the gross carrying amount less the allowance for ECLs).

Late payment charges, prepayment charges etc. are recognised on a point-in-time basis, and are recorded when realised since the probability of collecting is uncertain and these receipts are reported under "Fees and commission income".

Net Gain/ Loss on Fair Value Changes

Any differences between the fair values of the investment in debt oriented mutual funds classified as fair value through the profit or loss, held by the Company on the balance sheet date is recognised as an unrealised gain/loss in the statement of profit and loss. In cases there is a net gain in aggregate, the same is recognised in "Net gains or fair value changes" under revenue from operations and if there is a net loss the same is disclosed "Expenses", in the statement of profit and loss.

Assignor's Yield on Direct Assignments

Gains arising out of direct assignment transactions comprise the difference between the interest on the loan portfolio and the applicable rate at which the direct assignment is entered into with the assignee, also known as the right of excess interest spread (EIS). The future EIS basis the scheduled cash flows on execution of the transaction, discounted at the applicable rate entered into with the assignee is recorded upfront in the statement of profit and loss. EIS evaluated and adjusted for ECL and expected prepayment.

Business Correspondent Operations

Income from business correspondent services is recognized as and when the services are rendered as per agreed terms and conditions of the contract.

e Financial Instruments

A Financial Instrument is any contract that gives rise to a financial asset of an entity and a financial liability or equity instrument of another entity.

(i) Initial recognition and measurement

All financial assets and financial liabilities are initially recognised when the Company becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

A financial asset or financial liability which is not recognised at Fair Value Through Profit and Loss, is initially measured at fair value plus transaction costs that are directly attributable to its acquisition or issue.

(ii) Subsequent recognition

(A) Financial Assets

On initial recognition, a financial asset is classified and measured at

- Amortised Cost;
- Fair Value Through Other Comprehensive Income (FVOCI); or
- Fair Value Through Profit and Loss (FVTPL)

Financial assets are not reclassified subsequent to their initial recognition, except if and in the period the Company changes its business model for managing financial assets.

A financial asset is measured at amortised cost if it meets both of the following conditions and is not recognised as at FVTPL:

- the asset is held within a business model whose objective is to hold assets to collect contractual cash flows; and
- the contractual terms of the financial asset give rise on specified dates to cash flows that are solely payments of principal and interest on the principal amount outstanding.

On initial recognition of an equity investment that is not held for trading, the Company may irrevocably elect to present subsequent changes in the investment's fair value in Other Comprehensive Income (OCI) (designated as FVOCI – equity investment). This election is made on an investment-by-investment basis.

All financial assets not classified and measured at amortised cost or FVOCI as described above are measured at FVTPL. On initial recognition, the Company may irrevocably designate a financial asset that otherwise meets the requirements to be measured at amortised cost or at FVOCI or at FVTPL, if doing so eliminates or significantly reduces an accounting mismatch that would otherwise arise.

Assessment whether contractual cash flows are solely payments of principal and interest (SPPI)

For the purposes of this assessment, 'principal' is defined as the fair value of the financial asset on initial recognition. 'Interest' is defined as consideration for the time value of money and for the credit risk associated with the principal amount outstanding during a particular period of time and for other basic lending risks and costs (e.g. liquidity risk and administrative costs), as well as a profit margin.

In assessing whether the contractual cash flows are solely payments of principal and interest, the Company considers the contractual terms of the instrument. This includes assessing whether the financial asset contains a contractual term that could change the timing or amount of contractual cash flows such that it would not meet this condition. In making this assessment, the Company considers:

- contingent events that would change the amount or timing of cash flows;
- terms that may adjust the contractual coupon rate, including variable interest rate features;
- prepayment and extension features; and
- terms that limit the Company's claim to cash flows from specified assets.

Business model assessment

The Company determines its business model at the level that best reflects how it manages groups of financial assets to achieve its business objective. The Company's business model is not assessed on an instrument by instrument basis, but at a higher level of aggregated portfolios. If cash flows after initial recognition are realised in a way that is different from the Company's original expectations, the Company does not change the classification of the remaining financial assets held in that business model, but incorporates such information when assessing newly originated financial assets going forward.

Financial assets: Subsequent measurement and gains and losses

Financial assets measured at FVTPL	These assets are subsequently measured at fair value. Net gains and losses, including any interest or dividend income, are recognised in the Statement of Profit and Loss.
Financial assets measured at FVOCI	These assets are subsequently measured at fair value. Dividends are recognised as income in the Statement of Profit and Loss unless the dividend clearly represents a recovery of part of the cost of the investment. Other net gains and losses are recognised in OCI and are not reclassified to profit or loss.
Financial assets measured at Amortised Cost	These assets are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest rate method. The amortised cost is reduced by impairment losses. Interest income, foreign exchange gains and losses and impairment are recognised in the Statement of Profit and Loss. Any gain or loss on derecognition is recognised in the Statement of Profit and Loss.
Investment in subsidiaries (Others)	These assets are recognised at cost and are not adjusted to fair value at the end of each reporting period. Cost of investment represents amount paid for acquisition of the said investment. The Company assesses at the end of each reporting period, if there are any indications that the said investment may be impaired. If so, the Company estimates the recoverable value/amount of the investment and provides for impairment, if any i.e. the deficit in the recoverable value over cost.

(B) Financial liabilities: Classification, subsequent measurement and gains and losses

Financial liabilities are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method. Interest expense and foreign exchange gains and losses are recognised in the Statement of Profit and Loss. Any gain or loss on derecognition is also recognised as profit or loss respectively.

(iii) Derecognition

Financial Assets

The Company derecognises a financial asset when the contractual rights to the cash flows from the financial asset expire, or it transfers the rights to receive the contractual cash flows in a transaction in which substantially all of the risks and rewards of ownership of the financial asset are transferred or in which the Company neither transfers nor retains substantially all of the risks and rewards of ownership and does not retain control of the financial asset.

If the Company enters into transactions whereby it transfers assets recognised on its balance sheet, but retains either all or substantially all of the risks and rewards of the transferred assets, the transferred assets are not derecognised.

Financial Liabilities

The Company derecognises a financial liability when its contractual obligations are discharged or cancelled, or expire.

(iv) Impairment of Financial Assets

The Company assesses at each date of Balance Sheet whether a Financial asset or a group of Financial assets is impaired. Ind AS – 109 requires expected credit losses to be measured through a loss allowance.

The Company follows a ‘three-stage’ model for impairment based on changes in credit quality since initial recognition as summarised below:

Stage 1 (1-30 Days)	includes loan assets that have not had a significant increase in credit risk since initial recognition or that have low credit risk at the reporting date.
Stage 2 (31-90 Days)	includes loan assets that have had a significant increase in credit risk since initial recognition but that do not have objective evidence of impairment.
Stage 3 (More than 90 Days)	includes loan assets that have objective evidence of impairment at the reporting date.

The Expected Credit Loss (ECL) is measured at 12-month ECL for Stage 1 loan assets and at lifetime ECL for Stage 2 and Stage 3 loan assets. ECL is the product of the Probability of Default, Exposure at Default and Loss Given Default, defined as follows:

Probability of Default (PD): The PD represents the likelihood of a borrower defaulting on its financial obligation, either over the next 12 months (12 months PD), or over the remaining lifetime (Lifetime PD) of the obligation.

Loss Given Default (LGD): LGD represents the Company's expectation of the extent of loss on a defaulted exposure. LGD varies by type of counterparty, type and preference of claim and availability of collateral or other credit support.

Exposure at Default (EAD): EAD is based on the amounts the Company expects to be owed at the time of default.

Forward-looking economic information (including management overlay) is included in determining the 12-month and lifetime PD, EAD and LGD. The assumptions underlying the expected credit loss are monitored and reviewed on an ongoing basis.

(v) Offsetting Financial instruments

Financial assets and liabilities are offset and the net amount is reported in the balance sheet where there is a legally enforceable right to offset the recognised amounts and there is an intention to settle on a net basis or realise the asset and settle the liability simultaneously. The legally enforceable right must not be contingent on future events and must be enforceable in the normal course of business and in the event of default, insolvency or bankruptcy of the group or the counterparty.

f Borrowing costs

Borrowing cost attributable to acquisition and construction of qualifying assets are capitalised as a part of the cost of such assets up to the date when such assets are ready for its intended use. Ancillary costs incurred in connection with the arrangement of borrowings are adjusted with the proceeds of the borrowings and recognised using the Effective Interest Rate (EIR) method. Other borrowing costs are charged to the Statement of Profit and Loss in the period in which they are incurred.

g Employee benefits

(i) Short term employee benefits

Short-term employee benefits are expensed in the year in which the related services are provided. A liability is recognised for the amount expected to be paid if the Company has a present legal or constructive obligation to pay this amount as a result of past service provided by the employee and the obligation can be estimated reliably.

(ii) Define Contribution Plan

Employee benefits in the form of Provident Fund are defined as contribution plan and charged as expenses during the period in which the employees perform the services.

(iii) Define Benefit Plan

For defined benefit retirement, the cost of providing benefits is determined using the projected unit credit method, with actuarial valuations being carried out at the end of each annual reporting period. The present value of the defined benefit obligation is determined by discounting the estimated future cash outflows using market yields available on government bonds.

The effect of the remeasurement changes (comprising actuarial gains and losses) to the asset ceiling (if applicable) and the return on plan assets (excluding interest), is reflected in the balance sheet with a charge or credit recognised in other comprehensive income in the period in which they occur. Remeasurement recognised in other comprehensive income is reflected immediately in other equity and will not be reclassified to the Statement of Profit & Loss. Past service cost is recognised in the Statement of Profit & Loss in the period of a plan amendment. Net interest is calculated by applying the discount rate at the beginning of the period to the net defined benefit liability or asset. Defined benefit costs are categorised as follows:

- service cost (including current service cost, past service cost, as well as gains and losses on curtailments and settlements);
- net interest expense or income; and
- remeasurement

The Company presents the first two components of defined benefit costs in the Statement of Profit & Loss in the line item employee benefits expense.

The retirement benefit obligation recognised in the balance sheet represents the actual deficit or surplus in the Company's defined benefit plans. Any surplus resulting from this calculation is limited to the present value of any economic benefits available in the form of refunds from the plans or reductions in future contributions to the plans.

(iv) Other employee benefits

The Company has other employment benefit plans i.e. accumulated leave. As per Company's policy, unutilised leaves lapse at each year end.

h Provisions, contingent liabilities and contingent assets

Provisions are recognised when the Company has a present obligation (legal or constructive) as a result of a past event, it is probable that the Company will be required to settle the obligation, and a reliable estimate can be made of the amount of the obligation. If the effect of the time value of money is material, provisions are determined by discounting the expected future cash flows to net present value using an appropriate pre-tax discount rate that reflects current market assessments of the time value of money and, where appropriate, the risks specific to the liability.

A present obligation that arises from past events, where it is either not probable that an outflow of resources will be required to settle or a reliable estimate of the amount cannot be made, is disclosed as a contingent liability. Contingent liabilities are also disclosed when there is a possible obligation arising from past events, the existence of which will be confirmed only by the occurrence or non-occurrence of one or more uncertain future events not wholly within the control of the Company. Claims against the Company, where the possibility of any outflow of resources in settlement is remote, are not disclosed as contingent liabilities.

Contingent assets are not recognised in the financial statements since this may result in the recognition of income that may never be realised. However, when the realisation of income is virtually certain, then the related asset is not a contingent asset and is recognised.

i Income Tax

Income tax expense comprises current and deferred tax. It is recognised in profit or loss except to the extent that it relates to items recognised directly in Other Comprehensive Income.

i. Current tax

Current tax comprises the expected tax payable or receivable on the taxable income or loss for the year and any adjustment to the tax payable or receivable in respect of previous years. It is measured using tax rates enacted or substantively enacted at the reporting date. Current tax assets and liabilities are offset only if, the Company:

- a) has a legally enforceable right to set off the recognised amounts; and
- b) intends either to settle on a net basis, or to realise the asset and settle the liability simultaneously.

ii. Deferred tax

Deferred tax is provided using the liability method on temporary differences arising between the tax base of assets and liabilities and their carrying amounts in the financial statements. Deferred tax is determined using tax rates that have been enacted or substantially enacted by the end of the reporting period and are expected to apply when the related deferred tax asset is realised or the deferred tax liability is settled. Deferred tax assets are recognised for all deductible temporary differences and unused tax losses only if it is probable that future taxable amounts will be available to utilise those temporary differences.

The carrying amount of deferred tax assets is reviewed at each reporting date and reduced to the extent that it is no longer probable that sufficient taxable profit will be available to allow all or part of the deferred tax asset to be utilised. Unrecognised deferred tax assets are reassessed at each reporting date and are recognised to the extent that it has become probable that future taxable profits will allow the deferred tax asset to be recovered.

Deferred tax assets and deferred tax liabilities are offset if a legally enforceable right exists to set off current tax assets against current tax liabilities and the deferred taxes relate to the same taxable entity and the same taxation authority.

j Cash and cash equivalent

Cash and cash equivalents comprise cash on hand, cash at bank and short-term deposits with an original maturity of three months or less that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and which are subject to an insignificant risk of change in value.

k Leases

A contract is, or contains, a lease if the contract conveys the right to control the use of an identified asset for a period of time in exchange for consideration.

Company as a lessee

The Company assesses if a contract is or contains a lease at inception of the contract. A contract is, or contains, a lease if the contract conveys the right to control the use of an identified asset for a period time in exchange for consideration.

The Company recognizes a right-of-use asset and a lease liability at the commencement date, except for short-term leases of twelve months or less and leases for which the underlying asset is of low value, which are expensed in the statement of operations on a straight-line basis over the lease term.

The lease liability is initially measured at the present value of the lease payments that are not paid at the commencement date, discounted using the interest rate implicit in the lease, or, if not readily determinable, the incremental borrowing rate specific to the country, term and currency of the contract.

Lease payments can include fixed payments, variable payments that depend on an index or rate known at the commencement date, as well as any extension or purchase options, if the Company is reasonably certain to exercise these options. The lease liability is subsequently measured at amortized cost using the effective interest method and remeasured with a corresponding adjustment to the related right-of-use asset when there is a change in future lease payments in case of renegotiation, changes of an index or rate or in case of reassessments of options.

The right-of-use asset comprises, at inception, the initial lease liability, any initial direct costs and, when applicable, the obligations to refurbish the asset, less any incentives granted by the lessors. The right-of-use asset is subsequently depreciated, on a straight-line basis, over the lease term, if the lease transfers the ownership of the underlying asset to the Company at the end of the lease term or, if the cost of the right-of-use asset reflects that the lessee will exercise a purchase option, over the estimated useful life of the underlying asset. Right-of-use assets are also subject to testing for impairment if there is an indicator for impairment. Variable lease payments not included in the measurement of the lease liabilities are expensed to the statement of operations in the period in which the events or conditions which trigger those payments occur. In the statement of financial position right-of-use assets and lease liabilities are classified on the face of the Balance Sheet.

l Segment Reporting

According to Ind AS 108, identification of operating segments is based on Chief Operating Decision Maker (CODM) approach for making decisions about allocating resources to the segment and assessing its performance. The business activity of the company falls within one business segment viz. "Financing Activities".

m Earning per equity share

The basic EPS is computed by dividing the profit after tax for the year attributable to the equity shareholders by the weighted average number of equity shares outstanding during the year.

For the purpose of calculating diluted EPS, profit after tax for the year attributable to the equity shareholders and the weighted average number of equity shares outstanding during the year are adjusted for the effects of all dilutive potential equity shares. Dilutive potential equity shares are deemed converted as of the beginning of the period, unless they have been issued at a later date. In computing the dilutive earnings per share, only potential equity shares that are dilutive and that either reduces the earnings per share or increases loss per share are included.

n Upfront servicers fees booked on direct assignment

Servicer fees payable for servicing loan contracts under direct assignment are discounted at the applicable rate entered into with the assignee and recognised upfront in the balance sheet and amortised on a straight line basis over the remaining contractual maturity of the underlying loans.

- o** The Company grants share-based benefits to eligible employees via an Employee Welfare Trust, in compliance with the SEBI (Share Based Employee Benefits and Sweat Equity) Regulations, 2021. The Company follows the fair value method to account for the stock options. The excess of the market value of the shares on the grant date over the exercise price is recognized as deferred employee compensation cost and is charged to the Statement of Profit and Loss on a graded vesting basis over the vesting period. Shares held by the Trust for the purpose of the scheme are treated as treasury shares and reduced from share capital and reserves. The dilutive effect of the outstanding options is factored into the computation of diluted earnings per share.

- p Ministry of Corporate Affairs (“MCA”) notifies new standard or amendments to the existing standards under Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Rules as issued from time to time. During the year ended March 31, 2026, MCA has notified some new standards or amendments to the existing standards applicable to the Company.

a) New and amended standards adopted by the Company

The Ministry of Corporate Affairs (“MCA”) notifies new standards or amendments to the existing standards under Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Rules as issued from time to time. In May 2025 and August 2025, MCA has notified amendments to various Ind AS which are, applicable w.e.f. April 1, 2025, are given below. The Company has reviewed the amendment and based on its evaluation has determined that it does not have any impact in its financial statements.

1. Ind AS 7, Statement of Cash Flows and Ind AS 107, Financial Instruments: Disclosures, applicable w.e.f. April 1, 2025 – The amendment in Ind AS 7 requires to inform users of financial statements of the existence of supplier finance arrangements and explain the nature of the arrangements, the carrying amount of liabilities and the range of payment due dates. Ind AS 107 has been amended to add supplier finance arrangements as a factor that may cause concentration of liquidity risk.

2. Ind AS 12, International Tax Reform – Pillar Two Model Rules applicable immediately - The amendments provide a temporary mandatory relief from deferred tax accounting for top-up tax and disclose that they have applied the relief. This relief is immediate and applies retrospectively .

b) New and amended standards issued but not effective

Ministry of Corporate Affairs (“MCA”) notifies new standard or amendments to the existing standards under Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Rules as issued from time to time. During the year ended March 31, 2026, A new Standard on Accounting, Ind AS 118 (equivalent to IFRS 18) - Presentation and Disclosure in Financial Statements has been introduced which will be applicable from April 1, 2027 and will replace Ind AS 1 once notified by the Ministry of Corporate Affairs (MCA). Ind AS 118 sets out general and specific requirements for the presentation of financial statements and for disclosures in the notes. Additional clarifications issued in August 2025 relating to liability classification have been considered by the Company. These do not have a material impact on the financial statements.

(d) **Terms, rights and restrictions attached to equity shares:**

The Company has only one class of equity shares having a par value of ₹ 10 per share (previous year ₹ 10 per share). All issued shares rank pari-passu and have same voting rights per share. The dividend proposed by the Board of Directors is subject to the approval of the shareholders in the general meeting. In the event of liquidation of the Company, the holders of the equity shares will be entitled to receive remaining assets of the Company, after distribution of preferential amounts. The distribution will be in proportion to the number of equity shares held by the shareholders.

The Company had opened a Rights Issue of 1,70,09,702 Equity Shares of face value ₹10 each for subscription on October 20, 2025, which closed on November 11, 2025. The issue was successfully subscribed at an issue price of ₹14 per Equity Share, including a premium of ₹4 per Equity Share, aggregating to ₹2,381 lakhs.

The Equity Shares issued pursuant to the Rights Issue were listed and admitted to trading on November 14, 2025. The Rights Issue was undertaken in accordance with the provisions of Chapter VI of the SEBI (Issue of Capital and Disclosure Requirements Regulations, 2018, and Sections 42 and 62 of the Companies Act, 2013, along with the rules made thereunder.

As certified by the Monitoring Agency vide certificate no. BWR/2025-26/IPM/CTL/01 dated February 13, 2026, Company proposes to utilize the Net Proceeds from the Issue towards funding towards Augmenting capital base to meet future business requirements of our Company. As on date there is no unutilised proceeds from the said Rights Issue.

(e) **Trust Shares**

The Company has created a Employee Benefit Trust ("EBT"). EBT holds equity shares of the Company for the benefit of the employees of the Company. Considering conservative interpretation of Ind AS 32, number of equity shares held by the EBT are reduced from total number of issued equity shares. Equity shares that are held by the trust is deducted from Equity / Other Equity. No gain or loss is recognised in statement of profit and loss on the sale or cancellation of the Company's own equity instruments.

39 Financial Risk Management

The Company's primary focus is to foresee the unpredictability of financial markets and seek to minimize potential adverse effects on its financial performance. The financial risks are managed in accordance with the Company's risk management policy. The Company's Board of Directors has overall responsibility for managing the risk profile of the Company. The purpose of risk management is to identify potential problems before they occur, so that risk-handling activities may be planned and invoked as needed to manage adverse impacts on achieving objectives.

The Audit Committee of the Company reviews the development and implementation of the risk management policy of the Company on periodic basis. The Audit Committee provides guidance on the risk management activities, review the results of the risk management process and reports to the Board of Directors on the status of the risk management initiatives. The Company has exposure to the following risks arising from Financial Instruments:

In order to avoid excessive concentration of risk, the Company's policies and procedures include specific guidelines to focus on maintaining a diversified portfolio. Identified concentrations of credit risks are controlled and managed accordingly.

a Credit Risk

Credit risk is the risk that the Company will incur a loss because its customers or counterparties fail to discharge their contractual obligations. The Company's exposure to credit risk is influenced mainly by cash and cash equivalents, other bank balances, investments, loan assets and other financial assets. The Company continuously monitors defaults of customers and other counterparties and incorporates this information into its credit risk controls.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

The Company holds cash and cash equivalents and other bank balances as per note 4 and 5. The credit worthiness of such bank is evaluated by the management on an ongoing basis and is considered to be high.

Loans

The Company's exposure to credit risk is influenced mainly by the individual characteristics of each client. However, management also considers the factors that may influence the credit risk of its client base, including the default risk of the industry and locations in which clients operate. The Company Management has established a credit policy under which each new client is analysed individually for creditworthiness through internal systems and appraisal process to assess the credit risk. The Company's review includes client's income and indebtedness levels including economic activity which ensures regular and assured income. The Company establishes an allowance for impairment that represents its expected credit losses in respect of trade and other receivables. The management uses a three stage model approach for the purpose of computation of expected credit loss for Loan portfolio.

Forward-looking economic information (including management overlay) is included in determining the 12-month and lifetime expected credit loss (ECL). The assumptions underlying the ECL are monitored and reviewed on an ongoing basis. Gross carrying value and associated allowances for ECL stage wise for loan portfolio is as follows :

Loans secured against collateral

b Liquidity Risk

Liquidity risk is defined as the risk that the Company will encounter difficulty in meeting obligations associated with financial liabilities that are settled by delivering cash or another financial asset. Liquidity risk arises because of the possibility that the Company might be unable to meet its payment obligations when they fall due as a result of mismatches in the timing of the cash flows under both normal and stress circumstances. Such scenarios could occur when funding needed for illiquid asset positions is not available to the Company on acceptable terms. To limit this risk, management has adopted a policy of managing assets with liquidity in mind and monitoring future cash flows and liquidity on a regular basis. The Company has developed internal control processes for managing liquidity risk.

The Company maintains a portfolio of highly marketable and diverse assets that are assumed to be easily liquidated in the event of an unforeseen interruption in cash flow. The Company assesses the liquidity position under a variety of scenarios, giving due consideration to stress factors relating to both the market in general and specifically to the Company.
