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From The Chairman's Desk

Dear Shareholders,

It gives me immense pride to present the Annual Report for FY 2025-26. As Vibrant Global steps into its thirty-second year and continues to advance through its fourth decade of operations, we remain resolute in our conviction that discipline, patience, and a clear-eyed reading of the cycle are what compound value over time. With the continued support of our stakeholders, we look back at a year that tested our judgement as much as our resilience, and we believe we have come through it stronger for it.

Our governance frameworks have been further reinforced during the year, with risk controls recalibrated through the strengthening of the Board, the management team, and the compliance function. The volatility experienced through FY 2025-26 has only sharpened our commitment to prudent capital allocation, rigorous risk management, and the building of a future-ready enterprise.

Challenges may shake the path, but they do not break the spirit, and with clearing skies comes clarity; uncertainty, too, has an expiry date. FY 2025-26 was a year that demanded exactly this kind of conviction. Sustained FII selling through much of the year, a record volume of promoter share sales across the market, and a persistent overhang of currency concern together created one of the more difficult environments we have navigated in recent years.

Reading the Cycle: Our Move to Gold

Keeping in mind the FII selling headwinds, the record-high promoter sales during the year, and the prevailing currency concern, your Company took a deliberate decision, more than a year ago, to move upwards of 65% of its portfolio into cash and to deploy that entire amount into gold. Gold has since delivered a return in excess of 70% over 16 months. We have now begun liquidating this position and intend to complete the exit in the near term.

We believe this marks the beginning of a new cycle, with fresh capital expected to return to India later this year. We remain bullish on that view, and once the gold position is fully unwound, we intend to deploy the proceeds into equities over the coming months.

Three Downturns, One Discipline

FY 2025-26 represented the third downturn — a period of no return or negative return — that your Company has navigated in the last decade. With the exception of the disruption caused by COVID-19, we have steered through both bear markets by converting our equity positions into cash ahead of the worst of the decline, a discipline that has served shareholders well on each occasion.

What We Learned, and How We Hedged

Our own experience of the falls of 2018-19 and the COVID-19 fall of 2020 taught us that there is little respite once markets begin to fall broadly, diversification within equities offers limited protection when the entire asset class is repriced. Acting on that lesson, the Company adopted a deliberate risk-mitigation approach during the year, acquiring protective downside cover against

the portfolio at a modest cost by way of long-dated exchange-traded options. This was a hedging measure and not a trading position. The cover was realised at the market lows occasioned by the conflict, materially cushioning the drawdown in portfolio value. This is reflected in our results for the March quarter: even as markets fell sharply on account of the conflict, your Company was fully insulated from that decline and, in fact, ended the quarter in profit.

Our Outlook

Our own assessment, and it remains just that, our view is that FIIs will return to India during FY 2026-27, and that the Nifty, after two years of negative returns, will move towards a fresh all-time high. We are positioning the Company's portfolio accordingly, and intend to redeploy capital into equities progressively as the gold position is unwound over the coming months.

Circle of Competence

Our investment approach continues to be guided by a simple discipline: we look to place bets where the odds are heavily in our favour, positions that approach what we would call no-brainer territory. The moment a situation becomes murky or genuinely debatable, it is an automatic pass for us.

There is no shortcut to understanding. Building a circle of competence takes years of experience, of making mistakes, and of actively seeking out better methods of practice and thought. We intend to continue operating within our circle of competence, doing what we know how to do, with blinders on and the noise cut out.

One of the essential requirements of a circle of competence is that it can never be taken for granted. It cannot be treated as a static thing that, once attained, is attained for life. The world is dynamic; knowledge gets updated, and so too must the boundaries of what we know.

We believe there are three practices essential to building and maintaining a circle of competence: curiosity and a genuine desire to learn, disciplined monitoring, and honest feedback. Some of this comes from our own experience; the rest we draw from the experience of others — through books, articles, and conversation. Learning everything on one's own is costly, and slow.

Industry Overview

FY 2025-26 was a year defined less by steady industry trends than by sharp swings in sentiment across India's capital markets. Foreign portfolio outflows were the defining feature of the year, even as record participation from domestic investors — through mutual funds, SIPs, and a fast-growing base of demat accounts — provided a meaningful, if not complete, offset. Promoter selling across the market reached record volumes, a signal we read as reflective of broader uncertainty rather than of any one company's prospects. Bond yields, after a period of relative calm, moved sharply higher through the second half of the year, adding a further layer of complexity for capital allocation.

- Foreign Portfolio Investors recorded significant net outflows through the year, even as Domestic Institutional Investor flows, led by mutual funds and SIPs, provided sustained support to the market.
- Promoter share sales across listed companies reached a record high during the year, a trend that added to the overall volatility in equity markets.
- Bond markets remained broadly stable for much of the year before yields moved sharply higher from November 2025 onward.

Positioning for Excellence

As an investment company, we remain focused on capital preservation during periods of uncertainty and on capital deployment when the odds are clearly in our favour. Having protected shareholder value through a decisive shift into gold and disciplined hedging through the year's most volatile stretch, we are now positioning your Company to participate meaningfully in the next leg of India's capital market cycle, guided by the same discipline that has served us through three downturns in the last decade.

Sharing financial performance for the financial year 2025-26:

On Standalone Business:

The standalone total income during FY 2025-26 is INR 3,234.49 Lakhs as compared to INR 2,165.10 Lakhs during FY 2024-25. The Company recorded Profit (after Tax) of INR 1,991.18 Lakhs during the current fiscal year as compared to INR 786.38 Lakhs during FY 2024-25, this is primarily attributable to gains realised on the sale of investments during the year.

On Consolidated Business:

The consolidated total income stood at INR 18,631.15 Lakhs during the current fiscal year as compared to INR 28,242.83 Lakhs during the previous FY 2024-25. The Company recorded Profit (after tax) of INR 1,748.18 Lakhs during the current fiscal as compared to a Loss (after Tax) of INR 46.99 Lakhs during the previous FY 2024-25, reflecting a meaningful turnaround in consolidated profitability.

As shared earlier, your Company's decisive move into gold — undertaken more than a year ago in response to FII selling pressure, record promoter sales, and currency concerns — has been a significant contributor to the financial performance reported above. With gold having delivered a return in excess of 70% over 16 months, we are now in the process of unwinding this position and expect to redeploy the proceeds into equities over the times to come.

On the Corporate Social Responsibility front, your Company spent INR 61.17 lakhs during FY 2025-26 on various socio-economic projects, including uplifting and empowering underprivileged communities in village areas, contributions towards homes for senior citizens and elderly communities, and public welfare and education initiatives. The Board continues to ensure that the Company's CSR activities are aligned with its values and directed towards creating a positive social impact.

Pioneering the Future

Looking ahead, we believe FY 2026-27 marks the start of a new cycle for Indian capital markets. As FIIs return and fresh capital begins to find its way back into India, your Company — having

preserved capital through the downturn and positioned itself patiently through gold — intends to deploy this capital into equities with the same discipline that has guided us through three downturns in the past decade. We remain committed to operating within our circle of competence, to sound risk management, and to the creation of sustainable, long-term value for our shareholders.

Acknowledgment

With profound gratitude and optimism, I look forward to a promising future. I wish to place on record my sincere appreciation to all our stakeholders, independent directors, regulators, employees, esteemed shareholders, and trusted partners for their enduring confidence and support. It is this unwavering belief that continues to strengthen our resolve to stay disciplined, patient, and true to what we know.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Ind AS in terms of the provisions of Section 133 of the Companies Act, 2013 read with the Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Rules, 2015, as amended from time to time.

STATE OF COMPANY'S AFFAIRS

Your company is a NBFC which has been in existence for almost 3 decades. Your Company is registered with the RBI as a NBFC without accepting public deposits under section 45 IA of the RBI Act, 1934. There has been no change in the business of the Company during the financial year ended March 31, 2026.

REVIEW OF OPERATIONS

Consolidated Income and Profit After Tax:

The consolidated total income stood at INR 18,631.15 Lakhs during current fiscal year as compared to INR 28,242.83 Lakhs during previous FY 2024-25. The Company recorded Profit (after tax) of INR 1,748.18 Lakhs during current fiscal as compared to Loss (after Tax) of INR 46.99 Lakhs during previous FY 2024-25.

Standalone Income and Profit After Tax:

The standalone total income during current fiscal year is INR 3,234.49 Lakhs, as compared to INR 2,165.10 Lakhs during FY 2024-25. The Company recorded Profit (after Tax) of INR 1,991.18 Lakhs during current fiscal year as compared to Profit (after Tax) of INR 786.38 Lakhs during FY 2024-25. The improvement in the Company's financial performance was primarily attributable to the gains realized on the sale of certain investments during the year, along with the overall performance of the Company's investment portfolio.

DIVIDEND

Your Board of Directors do not declare Dividend for FY 2025-26.

INTERIM DIVIDEND

The Board of Directors declared an Interim Dividend of INR 0.65 per equity share (6.5% of the face value of INR 10 each) during FY 2025-26. The said Interim Dividend was paid to the eligible shareholders within the statutory timelines prescribed under the Companies Act, 2013.

UNPAID DIVIDEND

The Company has declared Interim Dividend during the year under review and there are few instances of unclaimed/unpaid dividend, however, no amount is due to transfer to Investor Education and Protection Fund (IEPF) on 31st March 2026.

Detailed disclosure relating to unpaid/unclaimed dividend is provided in the Corporate Governance Report which forms a part of the Annual Report.

TRANSFER TO RESERVES

INR 398.24 Lakhs were transferred to the Statutory Reserves, as required under Section 45-IC of the Reserve Bank of India Act, 1934 during FY 2025-26.

Total income for the FY 2025-26 was INR 2,107.32 Lakhs as compared to INR 12,256.61 Lakhs during previous financial year. The Company recorded loss (after tax) of INR 193.98 Lakhs during current fiscal year as compared to Loss (after tax) of INR 462.07 Lakhs during previous financial year

Vibrant Global Salt Private Limited

Total income for the FY 2025-26 was INR 13,515.68 Lakhs as compared to INR 13,959.43 Lakhs during previous financial year. The Company recorded loss (after Tax) of INR 62.68 Lakhs during FY 2025-26 as compared to Loss (after Tax) of INR 378.13 Lakhs during previous financial year.

In accordance with Section 129(3) of the Companies Act, 2013 and as stipulated under Regulation 33 of SEBI (Listing Obligations and Disclosure Requirements) Regulations, 2015, the consolidated financial statements of the Companies and its Subsidiaries are prepared, which forms part of the Annual Report. Further, a statement containing the salient features of the financial statement of our Subsidiaries, prescribed format of AOC-1 is appended as Annexure 1 to the Board Report.

The Statement also provides details of performance, financial positions of each of Subsidiaries. These documents will also be available for inspection during business hours at our Registered Office of the Company.

SHARE CAPITAL

The outstanding, issued, subscribed and paid-up capital of the Company was INR 2,290.74 Lakhs as on March 31, 2026. The Authorised Share Capital of the Company was INR 2,725 Lakhs as on March 31, 2026.

DEPOSITS

The Company being non-Deposit accepting NBFC registered with the Reserve Bank of India under Section 45-IA of the Reserve Bank of India Act, 1934, has not accepted deposits from the public falling within the ambit of Section 73 of the Companies Act, 2013 and the Companies (Acceptance of Deposits) Rules, 2014.

RISK MANAGEMENT

The Board of Directors is responsible for monitoring and reviewing the Company's risk management plan and ensuring its effectiveness. The Company has in place a comprehensive Risk Management framework to identify, assess, monitor and mitigate the various risk elements that may affect its business and operations, including credit, market, liquidity, operational and regulatory risks. During FY 2025-26, marked by sustained FII selling pressure, elevated market volatility, and currency-related concerns, the Company's risk management practices included a strategic reallocation of a significant portion of its portfolio to safer asset classes and the use of hedging instruments to protect shareholder value during periods of heightened uncertainty.

On a periodic basis, all necessary steps towards mitigation of the identified risks are taken by the Management, and all such risks are managed through continuous review of business and market parameters. The Board of Directors is regularly updated on the risks and concerns facing the Company and provides oversight and guidance on the risk management approach adopted by the Management.

Discussion on risks and concerns is covered separately under the Management Discussion and Analysis Report, which forms an integral part of this Annual Report.

INTERNAL FINANCIAL CONTROLS

The Internal Financial Control systems of the Company are adequate with reference to the Financial Statements, size and operations of the Company. The Internal Auditor of the Company observes the effective functioning of internal financial controls, and the scope and functions of the Internal Auditor are defined and reviewed by the Audit Committee.

During the year under review, the Internal Financial Controls were tested and no reportable material weakness in the design or operation was observed. The Audit Committee reviews the internal audit reports received from the Internal Auditor and institutionalises new procedures, wherever required, to further strengthen the control environment of the Company.

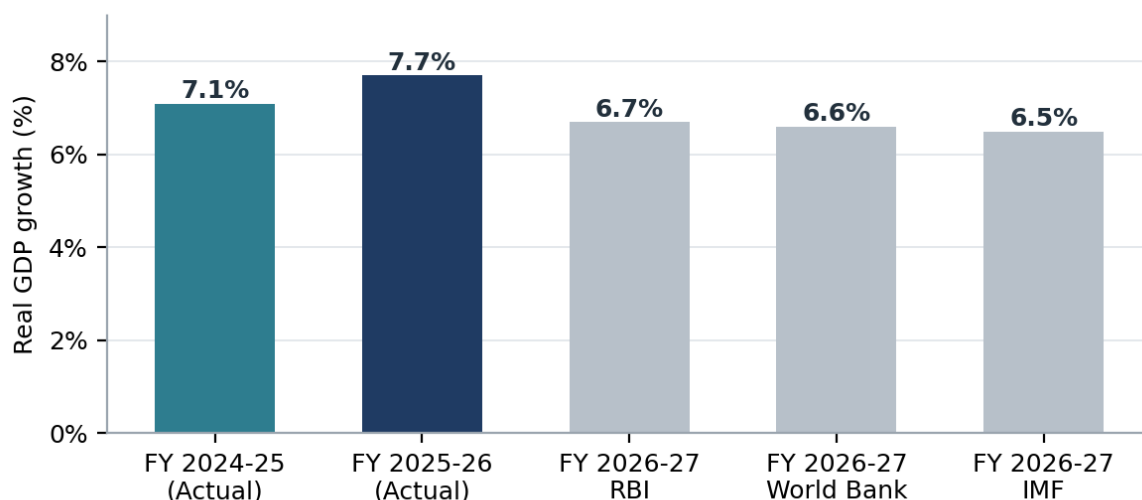
INDUSTRY STRUCTURE AND DEVELOPMENTS

Global Economic Environment

According to the IMF's July 2026 World Economic Outlook Update, the global economy is projected to grow at 3.0% in 2026 and 3.4% in 2027, as against an average of 3.5% recorded during 2024–25. The moderation principally reflects the economic effects of the war in the Middle East, partly offset by demand-driven momentum in the global technology cycle arising from advances in artificial intelligence and its wider adoption. Global headline inflation has been revised upward to 4.7% in 2026 from 4.1% in 2025, before easing to 3.9% in 2027, indicating that the disinflationary trend in place since early 2024 has stalled. World trade growth is projected to decelerate to 3.5% in 2026 from 5.0% in 2025. India is expected to remain among the fastest-growing major economies, with growth projected at 6.4% in calendar year 2026, supported by strong momentum in private consumption and services activity.

The Indian economy demonstrated considerable resilience during FY 2025-26, supported by robust domestic consumption, sustained public capital expenditure and strengthening investment activity. Strong domestic demand, improving private sector investment sentiment and continued infrastructure spending provided important support to economic growth amid a challenging global environment. As per the estimates released by the Ministry of Statistics and Programme Implementation on 5th June, 2026, the Gross Domestic Product (GDP) expanded by 7.7% during FY 2025-26 as against 7.1% in FY 2024-25, notwithstanding persistent global challenges, including the energy shock arising from the conflict in West Asia, geopolitical uncertainties, and volatility in commodity markets. Growth was broad-based, real Gross Value Added having risen by 7.9% and Gross Fixed Capital Formation, the proxy for investment activity, by 8.2%.

During FY 2025-26, Indian equity markets experienced heightened volatility, with benchmark indices reaching a peak in December 2025 before moderating amid escalating geopolitical tensions in the Middle East. The Nifty index closed the fiscal year lower by 5.1%. Foreign Portfolio Investment (FPI) recorded net outflows of INR 1.8 trillion during the year. These were more than offset by strong Domestic Institutional Investors inflows of INR 8.5 trillion. The surge in net investment by DIIs was predominantly led by mutual funds, contributing nearly 75% of total DII net inflows. Mutual funds contributed INR 6.4 trillion during 2025-26.

Bond markets remained largely stable through FY 2025-26, before witnessing a sharp upward movement in yields from November 2025. Since then, interest rates have increased by around 30 basis points to 6.95%.

As per ICRA, the retail assets under management of NBFCs (excluding housing finance companies) are estimated to have grown by 18-20% during FY 2025-26. Liquidity conditions in the financial system were generally adequate, with well-rated NBFCs maintaining access to diversified funding sources, including market borrowings, securitization, and bank credit lines. Bank credit to NBFCs grew by approximately 26% year-on-year during FY 2025-26, and credit flows from the banking sector accounted for about 45% of the incremental funding requirement of the retail NBFC segment, a marked improvement over the preceding two fiscals. Securitisation volumes originated by NBFCs and housing finance companies rose to INR 2.2 lakh crore in FY 2025-26 from INR 1.7 lakh crore in FY 2024-25.

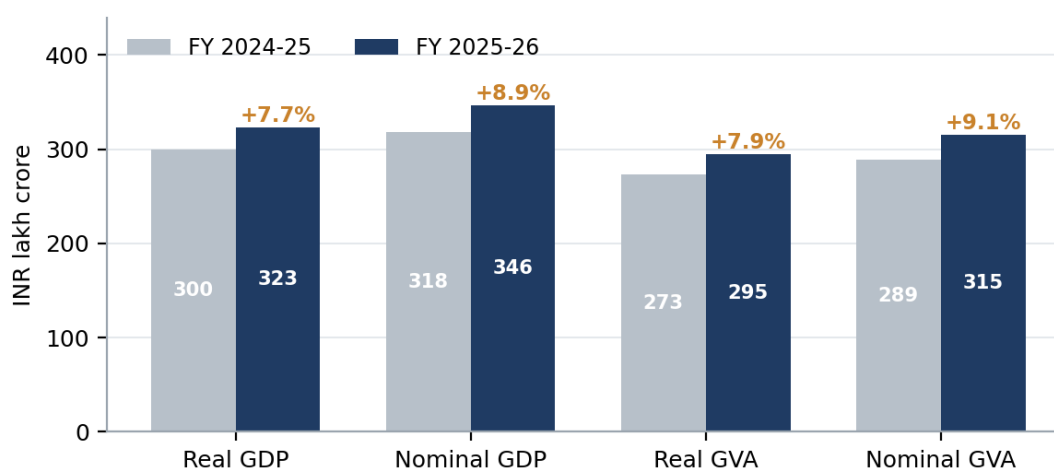
The Indian Economy

Key performance indicators for Indian Economy 2025-26:

- Real Gross Domestic Product (GDP) for FY 2025-26 is estimated to have expanded by 7.7%, reaching a level of INR 323.12 lakh crore compared to INR 299.89 lakh crore in FY 2024-25. This reflects a healthy momentum in economic activity, supported by strong domestic demand, steady investment flows, and continued policy support from both fiscal and monetary authorities.
- Nominal GDP has recorded a growth rate of 8.9%, increasing from INR 318.07 lakh crore in FY 2024-25 to INR 346.36 lakh crore in FY 2025-26. This growth has been aided not only by real output expansion but also by a notably subdued price environment, headline retail inflation having remained at historically low levels through much of the year.
- Real Gross Value Added (GVA) has risen by 7.9%, amounting to INR 294.91 lakh crore in FY 2025-26 against INR 273.36 lakh crore in the preceding year. This improvement in GVA underscores a broad-based strengthening across productive sectors, manufacturing having expanded by 10.7% and the contact-intensive trade, hotels, transport and communication segment by 11.0%.
- Nominal GVA witnessed an increase of 9.1%, moving from INR 288.54 lakh crore in FY 2024-25 to INR 314.87 lakh crore in FY 2025-26. Gross Fixed Capital Formation, which serves as the proxy for investment activity, grew by 8.2% as against 6.4% in the preceding year, indicating sustained capacity expansion and infrastructure creation. Real GDP growth in Q4 of FY 2025-26 stood at 7.8%.

Note: The Ministry of Statistics and Programme Implementation released the revised National Accounts series with base year 2022-23 on 27th February, 2026. Accordingly, the figures for FY 2024-25 set out above have been restated in terms of the revised series and are not directly comparable with the corresponding figures disclosed in the Management Discussion and Analysis Report for FY 2024-25, which were compiled on the erstwhile 2011-12 base.

India's Growth Outlook – Multilateral Assessments

According to the World Bank's Global Economic Prospects (June 2026), India is projected to sustain robust growth, moderating to 6.6% in FY 2026-27 before rebounding to 7.2% in FY 2027-28, and maintaining its position as the fastest-growing large economy globally.

The FY 2026-27 projection represents an upgrade of 0.1 percentage points, and the FY 2027-28 projection an upgrade of 0.6 percentage points, relative to the January 2026 edition, reflecting resilient domestic demand and improved export prospects following the reduction of additional United States tariffs on Indian goods from 50% to 10%.

Globally, however, growth is projected to slow from 2.9% in 2025 to 2.5% in 2026, the lowest rate since the COVID-19 pandemic, amid weaker prospects for economies dependent upon energy imports and those directly affected by hostilities. Activity is expected to firm during 2027-28 as energy supplies recover, monetary easing resumes, and trade strengthens.

While favorable fundamentals continue to support the outlook, the persistent global uncertainties warrant close attention to export trends, investment momentum, and policy responses

India GDP growth forecast:

According to the World Bank's Global Economic Prospects (June 2026), India is expected to maintain its position as the fastest-growing major economy, with real GDP projected to expand by 7.2% in FY 2026-27 as against an estimated 6.6% in FY 2025-26. The International Monetary Fund has separately raised its projection for India's FY 2026-27 growth to 6.5% from 6.4%, citing strong domestic momentum, improved trade prospects, and carryover from a stronger FY 2025-26.

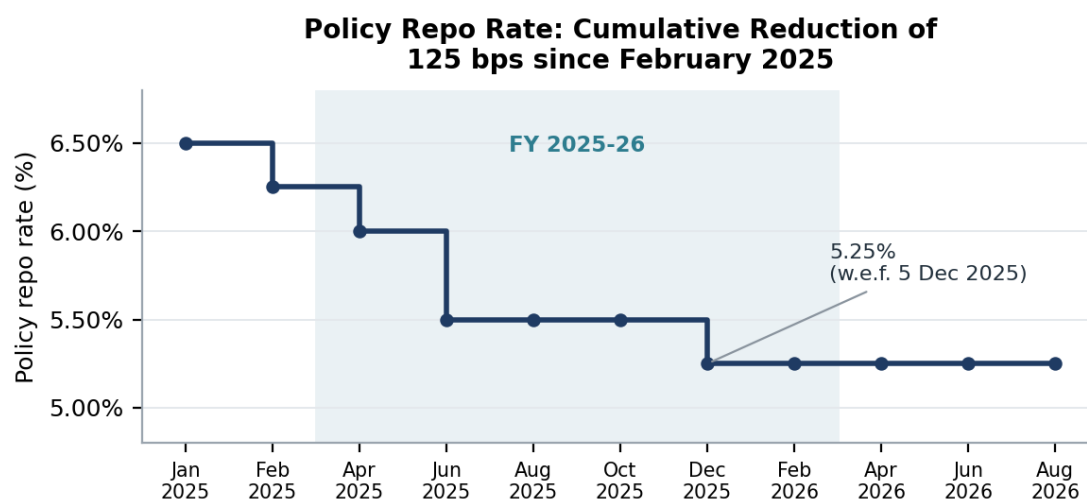
The World Bank notes that India's growth momentum continues to be underpinned by resilient domestic demand, robust services sector performance, and ongoing public sector capital expenditure. The rationalisation of Goods and Services Tax rates and the cuts in fuel taxes are expected to support consumer demand and cushion the impact of higher energy prices and input costs. However, elevated global energy costs, together with the reduced revenues arising from tax cuts, are anticipated to moderate the pace of overall economic expansion.

Despite these headwinds, India's macroeconomic fundamentals remain comparatively strong, enabling the economy to sustain a favourable growth trajectory even amidst a challenging global environment.

Interest Rates Eased During the Year and Now Remain on Hold

FY 2025-26 was the year the easing cycle largely played out. The Monetary Policy Committee cut the repo rate by a cumulative 125 basis points between February 2025 and December 2025, taking it to 5.25%, before holding it there through the remainder of the year on a neutral stance. The Standing Deposit Facility now stands at 5.00% and the MSF/Bank Rate at 5.50%. The move was underwritten by growth that stayed firm even as inflation fell away — Q2 FY26 real GDP came in at 8.2%, a six-quarter high. (Source: RBI, Monetary Policy Statement, 5 December 2025)

For an investment company, a falling-then-flat rate cycle cuts two ways. The cost of leverage eased through the first three quarters, but the subsequent hold means the tailwind is largely behind rather than ahead of us. Fixed-income carry and yield-sensitive equity segments should be read against that backdrop: further repo cuts look unlikely in the near term.

The Outlook: Growth Ahead of Projections, Inflation Normalising

The Monetary Policy Committee raised its FY 2025-26 growth projection to 7.3% at its December 2025 meeting (up from 6.8% in October 2025), and the provisional MoSPI estimate of 7.7% subsequently came in ahead of even that revised figure. *(Source: RBI, Monetary Policy Statement, 5 December 2025)* For an investment company holding equity and capital-market positions, the read is that valuations built on FY26's growth surprise now need to reconcile with a more moderate FY27 base case.

Growth Forecast for Emerging Market and Developing Economies

Global growth (IMF, July 2026 WEO Update) is projected at 3.0% for 2026 and 3.4% for 2027, broadly unchanged cumulatively from the April 2026 forecast, though the composition has shifted — this year's shortfall against the pre-conflict trajectory is being made up next year. *(Source: IMF WEO Update, July 2026)* The World Bank's own June 2026 assessment is more downbeat on the calendar-year numbers — global growth slowing to 2.5% in 2026 from 2.9% in 2025, before recovering to an average of 2.8% in 2027-28. *(Source: World Bank GEP, June 2026)*

Global Risks to the Outlook

- *Energy and geopolitical risk* — The World Bank's downside case has global growth falling to 1.3% in 2026 if energy disruption deepens alongside financial-market stress — worth stress-testing against any commodity- or energy-linked holdings. *(Source: World Bank GEP, June 2026)*
- *Trade and tariff risk* — US tariffs on Indian goods were cut from 50% to 10% during the year, a tailwind for export-linked names, though the position should be treated as reversible rather than structural.
- *Upside catalyst — AI-driven productivity* — The World Bank places the median estimate of the eventual total factor productivity gain from AI at approximately 0.6 percentage points over a 10–12-year horizon, with optimistic estimates extending to 1.0 percentage point. *(Source: World Bank GEP, June 2026)*

Regulatory and Government Initiatives Affecting NBFCs

Some of the major Government Initiatives are:

- **Exemption of TDS on Interest Payments to NBFCs:** The Union Budget 2025-26 provided for the exemption of Tax Deducted at Source (TDS) on interest payable to NBFCs, aiming to reduce their tax burden and improve liquidity.
- **Finalized Co-Lending Guidelines:** The Reserve Bank of India (RBI) issued final guidelines for co-lending arrangements between banks and NBFCs, which came into effect from 1st January, 2026. These guidelines include provisions for blended lending rates, escrow-based distribution of cash flows, and a requirement for each regulated entity to retain at least 10% of every individual loan on its books.
- **Lowered Qualifying Asset Criteria:** RBI has reduced the qualifying asset criteria for NBFC-MFIs from 75% to 60%, allowing these institutions greater flexibility to diversify their asset portfolios beyond microfinance lending.

NBFC Sector Outlook for FY 2026-27

The anticipated rebound in the second half of FY 2025-26 duly materialised, credit flows from the banking sector having improved substantially during that period. ICRA anticipates a gradual improvement in asset quality performance across most segments during FY 2026-27, although the West Asia crisis and the forecast of a below-normal monsoon temper the outlook for investment activity.

OPPORTUNITIES AND THREATS

Opportunities – Indian Capital Markets

FY 2025-26 was a year of continued deepening of India's capital markets, creating a materially larger and more liquid environment for a company holding equity, trading, and investment positions. Key developments during the year include:

- **Broadening of the Investor Base:** Total demat accounts crossed approximately 21.6 crore by December 2025, with CDSL alone adding a record 2.72 crore accounts during FY 2025-26 — the depository's highest-ever single-year expansion. A deeper, more geographically distributed investor base translates directly into greater secondary-market liquidity and a wider universe of counterparties for a company positioning in listed equities.
- **Mutual Fund and SIP Growth Sustaining Domestic Flows:** Average mutual fund AUM rose 12.2% to a record INR 73.73 lakh crore in FY 2025-26, with active SIP accounts reaching 10.45 crore and monthly SIP contributions climbing 25.8% year-on-year to INR 16,413 crore. This growing base of systematic domestic flows has provided a structural cushion for Indian equity markets against foreign portfolio outflows during periods of global risk-off sentiment — a dynamic directly relevant to the resilience of any equity-oriented investment book.

- **Record Primary Market Activity:** India led the world in the number of IPOs during FY 2025-26 and ranked third globally in funds raised, with mainboard IPO mobilisation touching an all-time high of INR 1,78,963 crore across 112 issues, a 10% increase over FY 2024-25. This scale of primary-market activity widens the pipeline of listed opportunities and price-discovery events available to an investment company with a capital markets mandate, even as overall public equity fundraising (including FPOs and QIPs) moderated to INR 3.05 lakh crore from INR 3.71 lakh crore, reflecting a more selective, quality-driven market rather than indiscriminate risk appetite.

As an investment company, we are positioned to participate in this deepening of India's capital markets — through our capital market segment, trading operations, and equity holdings — while remaining selective in the current environment of moderated overall public fundraising and continued global volatility.

Threats and Challenges

The principal threats facing the Company in FY 2026-27 are market risk on its equity and capital-market holdings, valuation risk in a market that has re-rated sharply on both sides, and liquidity risk should a downturn coincide with the Company's own need to exit positions.

- FPI selling was the defining feature of FY 2025-26: net foreign portfolio outflows from Indian equities touched approximately USD 18.4 billion (roughly INR 1.6 lakh crore) over the year, the highest on record and ahead of the previous peak of USD 16.5 billion in 2022. Episodes of FPI selling have historically coincided with 10-20% corrections in the Nifty and Sensex, and the Company's capital market segment carries direct exposure to that volatility. Domestic institutional flows — the same sustained SIP contributions and record mutual fund AUM cited in B.1 as an opportunity — have provided a partial offset, but the scale of FY26's foreign selling illustrates that this cushion is not absolute, particularly for individual holdings with less depth than the benchmark indices.
- Valuation risk compounds this: market commentary through the year repeatedly flagged elevated valuations in Indian equities as a driver of FPI caution, even as domestic flows kept indices near record levels — a combination that leaves less margin of safety in any equity position than headline index levels alone suggest. The Company's holdings are also exposed to the same geopolitical and macro triggers discussed in Section A — the West Asia conflict, tariff policy shifts, and the possibility of renewed global risk-off sentiment — each of which produced sharp, short-notice equity market moves during the year without advance warning.
- Regulatory risk on the capital-markets side also bears watching: SEBI's continuing tightening of derivatives and margin norms, together with its broader push for disciplined primary-market pricing evident in FY26's more selective approach to public fundraising, both signal a regulatory environment that increasingly favours governance and disclosure quality over aggressive positioning — a trend the Company's own compliance and portfolio discipline is aligned with, but which raises the bar for market participants generally.

RISKS AND CONCERNS

Sectoral Risk Landscape

The NBFC sector's principal risks in FY 2026-27 remain credit, market, operational, and regulatory in nature. The RBI has continued to press NBFCs to avoid imprudent growth, strengthen customer grievance mechanisms, and price loans reasonably — most concretely through its directions on pre-payment charges, effective for loans sanctioned or renewed on or after 1st January 2026, which standardised how such charges may be levied. *(Source: RBI, circular on pre-payment charges, effective 1 January 2026)*

Portfolio Risk Management

Given the Company's capital market and investment holdings, portfolio risk is managed through four disciplines rather than treated as a single generic control:

- Diversification across asset classes and issuers, so that no single position drives portfolio outcomes
- Asset allocation calibrated to the Company's own risk appetite and liquidity needs, not a fixed textbook mix
- Hedging, using exchange-traded derivatives were cost-effective, against identified downside exposure rather than as a blanket overlay
- Liquidity discipline, sizing any single holding against the Company's short-term obligations so that a market dislocation does not force a distressed sale

All four operate within the Company's internal governance framework and are reviewed against the regulatory compliance standards applicable to a listed NBFC.

Human Resources Risk

The Company manages human resources risk through structured recruitment, ongoing training, and performance management, with particular attention to retention and succession planning in roles critical to compliance and portfolio management continuity. Well-defined HR policies and the use of technology for monitoring reduce the operational and reputational exposure that arises from key-person dependency — a more material risk for a lean, investment-focused NBFC than for a large retail lender with a deep bench.

Operational Risk Management

Operational risk is monitored through a continuous framework built around key risk indicators (KRIs) — metrics tracked across transaction processing, technology systems, and compliance functions to provide early warning of rising exposure before it crystallises into loss. Given the Company's capital market activity, particular attention is paid to trade settlement and reconciliation risk, alongside the standard operational controls expected of a listed NBFC.

INTERNAL CONTROL SYSTEMS AND THEIR ADEQUACY

During FY 2025-26, the Company continued to maintain a sound and effective internal control framework appropriate to the size, scale and nature of its operations. The internal control mechanisms are aimed at ensuring prudent management of resources, proper authorisation and recording of transactions, safeguarding of assets, accuracy of financial information and compliance with applicable laws and regulatory requirements.

The adequacy and effectiveness of the internal control framework are reviewed at regular intervals by the management and the Audit Committee, with appropriate measures undertaken wherever considered necessary. The Company continues to enhance its control environment in line with the evolving nature of its operations and applicable regulatory requirements.

The Audit Committee, comprising Non-Executive and Independent Directors, provides oversight on financial reporting, accounting practices, internal controls and audit-related matters. A well-defined organisational structure, along with appropriate reporting and accountability mechanisms, supports the Company in maintaining effective governance and operational oversight.

DISCUSSION ON FINANCIAL PERFORMANCE WITH RESPECT TO OPERATIONAL PERFORMANCE

The capital market revenue stood at INR 5,097.37 Lakhs during the current fiscal year as compared to INR 14,900.22 Lakhs during the previous year. Trading revenue stood at INR 1,234.26 Lakhs during the current fiscal year as compared to INR 2,156.19 Lakhs during the previous year. The manufacturing revenue stood at INR 12,173.46 Lakhs during the current year as compared to INR 11,070.15 Lakhs for the previous year. The change in the segment-wise revenue mix reflects the varying business conditions and performance across the Company's diversified operations during the year. Detailed segment-wise revenue forms part of the notes to the consolidated financial statements.

Performance of the Group

The Company is a part of the "Vibrant Global Group", which has a diversified presence across various sectors. The operations of the Group, including its subsidiaries and associate companies, span across the manufacturing of iodised edible salt and the trading of steel products and polyester films.

MATERIAL DEVELOPMENTS IN HUMAN RESOURCES / INDUSTRIAL RELATIONS FRONT, INCLUDING NUMBER OF PEOPLE EMPLOYED

The Company recognizes human resources as a critical driver of its future growth. It undertakes planned initiatives to attract, develop, and retain talent while fostering continuous learning and professional development. Emphasis is placed on enhancing employees' capabilities through exposure and by entrusting them with higher responsibilities. The Company remains committed to providing ample growth opportunities to internal talent and maintaining a positive, collaborative work environment that encourages productivity, efficiency, and long-term engagement. For FY 2025-26, 2 (two) employees are there on the pay-rolls of the Company except Directors.

Experienced Management Team

The Company benefits from the experience and leadership of a proficient management team, led by Mr. Vinod Garg, Managing Director, and Mr. Vaibhav Garg, Whole-Time Director and Chief Financial Officer. Their extensive industry experience, strategic vision and strong understanding of the financial and business environment have contributed to strengthening the Company's operational capabilities and overall performance. The management team is guided by the Board of Directors, including the Company's Independent Directors, whose oversight and objective perspective reinforce sound governance, prudent decision-making and the Company's focus on sustainable growth.

Performance During the Year

On Standalone Business:

The standalone total income during the current fiscal year is INR 3,234.49 Lakhs, as compared to INR 2,165.10 Lakhs during FY 2024-25. The Company recorded Profit (after Tax) of INR 1,991.18 Lakhs during the current fiscal year as compared to Profit (after Tax) of INR 786.38 Lakhs during FY 2024-25. The improvement in the Company's financial performance was primarily attributable

to the gains realized on the sale of certain investments during the year, along with the overall performance of the Company's investment portfolio.

On Consolidated Business:

The consolidated total income stood at INR 18,631.16 Lakhs during the current fiscal year as compared to INR 28,242.83 Lakhs during the previous FY 2024-25. The Company recorded Profit (after tax) of INR 1,748.18 Lakhs during the current fiscal as compared to Loss (after Tax) of INR 46.99 Lakhs during the previous FY 2024-25. The improvement in consolidated profitability was primarily attributable to the profitable performance of the parent company, Vibrant Global Capital Limited, during the year, which contributed significantly to the overall consolidated results.

As on 31st March, 2026, total market value of quoted investment stood at INR 11,756.06 Lakhs whereas unquoted investments were recorded at INR 2,392.30 Lakhs.

This oversight has been particularly tested during periods of market volatility, where the Board's engagement with the Company's risk positioning and capital allocation decisions has gone well beyond the minimum expected of it.

Corporate Governance at your Company is treated as an ongoing discipline rather than a fixed set of requirements to be met once and revisited only when regulation changes. Through periodic review of Board and Committee practices, enhanced disclosures, and responsiveness to the evolving regulatory and market environment, the Company remains committed to strengthening its governance practices year on year.

The Company has complied with the applicable requirements of Corporate Governance and the Disclosures as contained in this Report are in accordance with Regulation 34(3) read with Para C of Schedule V of Listing Regulations.

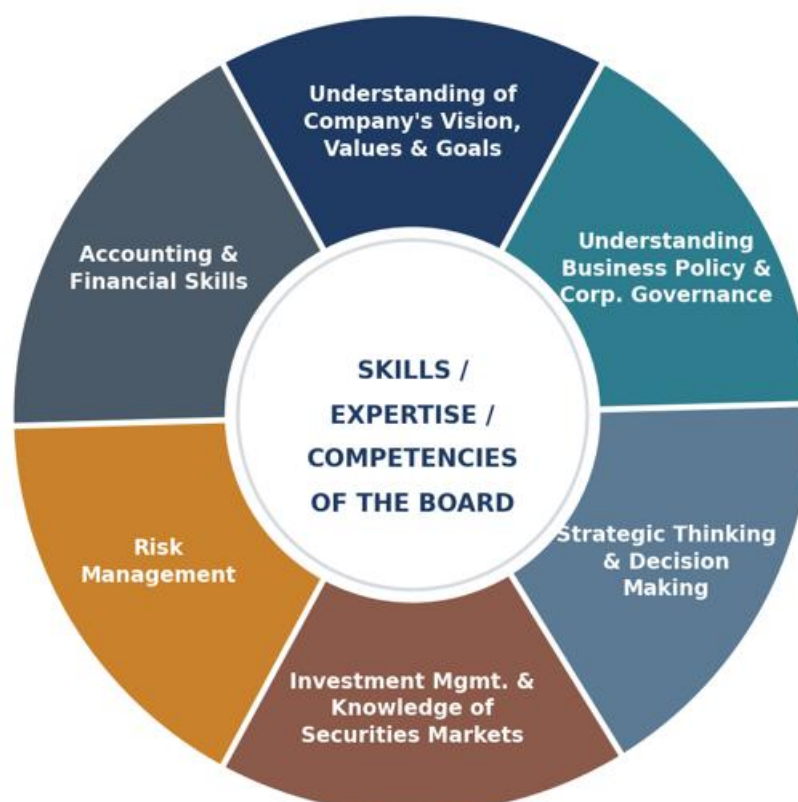
Relationship between Directors inter-se:

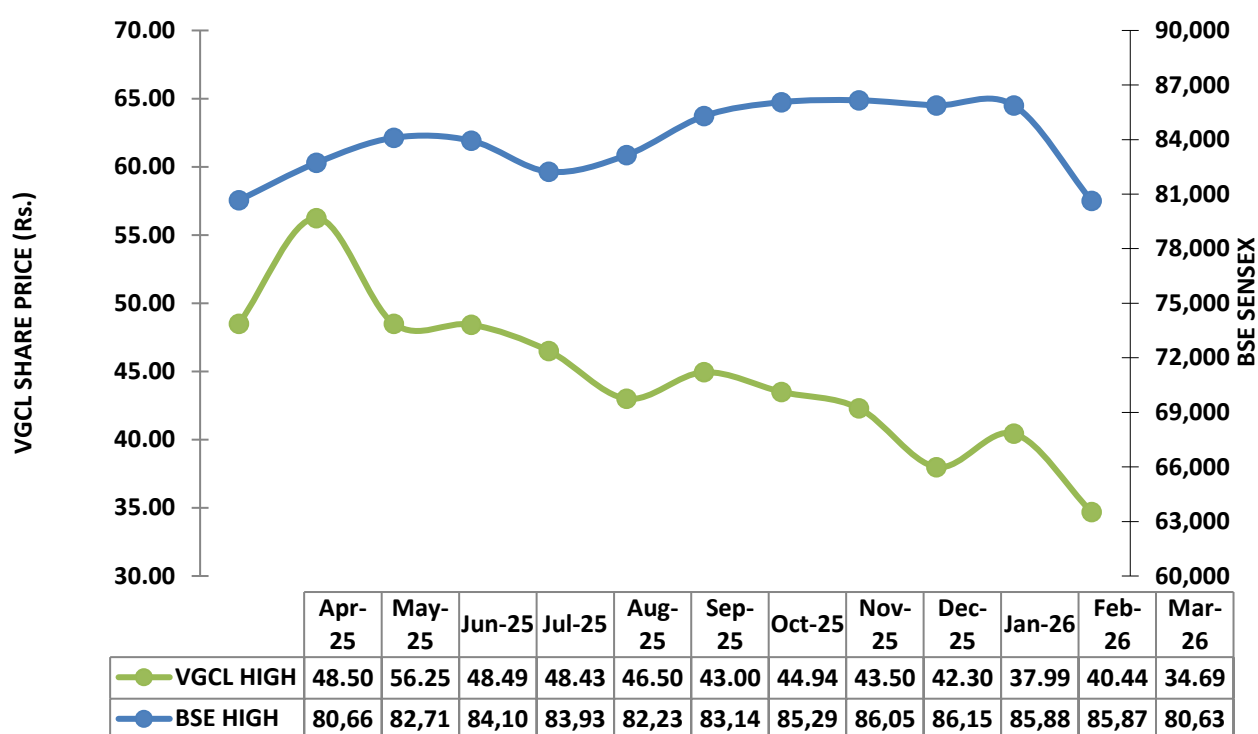

Further, during the course of our audit we did not come across any instance of the audit trail feature being tampered with.

Additionally, the audit trail has been preserved by the Company as per the statutory requirements for record retention.

Notes to Financial Statements for the year ended Mar 31,2026

Note 1: Corporate Information

Vibrant Global Capital Limited ('the Company') has been incorporated under the Companies Act 1956 and is registered as registered with the Reserve Bank of India ("RBI") as a non-deposit taking Non Systemically Important (NBFC-ND-NSI) Company. Its equity shares are listed on Bombay Stock Exchange Limited. The RBI, under Scale Based Regulations (SBR) had categorised the Company in Base Layer (NBFC-BL). The Company is principally engaged in lending and investing activities. The Company is registered with the Ministry of Corporate Affairs (MCA) and Reserve Bank of India (RBI) The registration details are as follows:

The standalone financial statements of the Company for the year ended March 31, 2026 were approved for issue in accordance with the resolution of the Board of Directors on May 18, 2026.

Note 2: Basis of Preparation

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Indian Accounting Standards (Ind AS) as per the Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Rules, 2015 as amended from time to time and notified under section 133 of the Companies Act, 2013 (the Act) along with other relevant provisions of the Act. The financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis. The Company uses accrual basis of accounting.

2.1 Presentation of financial statements

The Company presents its Balance Sheet in order of liquidity

The Company generally reports financial assets and financial liabilities on a gross basis in the Balance Sheet. They are offset and reported net only when Ind AS specifically permits the same or it has an unconditional legally enforceable right to offset the recognised amounts without being contingent on a future event. Similarly, the Company offsets incomes and expenses and reports the same on a net basis when permitted by Ind AS specifically unless they are material in nature.

Critical accounting estimates and judgments

The preparation of the Company's financial statements requires Management to make use of estimates and judgments. In view of the inherent uncertainties and a level of subjectivity involved in measurement of items, it is possible that the outcomes in the subsequent financial years could differ from those on which the Management's estimates are based. Accounting estimates and judgments are used in various line items in the financial statements for e.g.:

- >Business model assessment
- >Fair value of financial instruments
- >Effective Interest Rate (EIR)
- >Impairment on financial assets
- >Provisions and other contingent liabilities
- >Provision for tax expenses
- >Residual value and useful life of property, plant and equipment

Note 3: Summary of material accounting policies

This note provides a list of the significant accounting policies adopted in the preparation of these financial statements.

These policies have been consistently applied to all the years presented, unless otherwise stated.

3.1 Income

(i) Interest income

The Company recognises interest income using Effective Interest Rate (EIR) on all financial assets subsequently measured at amortised cost or fair value through other comprehensive income (FVOCI). EIR is calculated by considering all costs and incomes attributable to acquisition of a financial asset or assumption of a financial liability and it represents a rate that exactly discounts estimated future cash payments/receipts through the expected life of the financial asset/financial liability to the gross carrying amount of a financial asset or to the amortised cost of a financial liability.

The Company recognises interest income by applying the EIR to the gross carrying amount of financial assets other than credit-impaired assets. In case of credit-impaired financial assets, the Company recognises interest income on the amortised cost net of impairment loss of the financial asset at EIR. If the financial asset is no longer credit-impaired, the Company reverts to calculating interest income on a gross basis. Delayed payment interest (penal interest) levied on customers for delay in repayments/non payment of contractual cashflows is recognised on realisation. Interest on financial assets subsequently measured at fair value through profit or loss (FVTPL) is recognised at the contractual rate of interest.

(ii) Dividend income

Dividend income on equity shares is recognised when the Company's right to receive the payment is established, which is generally when shareholders approve the dividend.

(iii) Sale of Shares & Squaring off of Derivative Transactions

Revenue from share investment/trading & squaring off of derivative transactions is accounted on its sale and that of derivative transactions upon squaring off of the position.

(iv) Other revenue from operations

The Company recognises revenue from contracts with customers (other than financial assets to which Ind AS 109 'Financial Instruments' is applicable) based on a comprehensive assessment model as set out in Ind AS 115 Revenue from contracts with customers'. The Company identifies contract(s) with a customer and its performance obligations under the contract, determines the transaction price and its allocation to the performance obligations in the contract and recognises revenue only on satisfactory completion of performance obligations. Revenue is measured at fair value of the consideration received or receivable.

(a) Net gain on fair value changes

Financial assets are subsequently measured at fair value through profit or loss (FVTPL) or fair value through other comprehensive income (FVOCI), as applicable. The Company recognises gains/losses on fair value change of financial assets measured as FVTPL and realised gains/losses on derecognition of financial asset measured at FVTPL and FVOCI.

(b) Recoveries of financial assets written off

The Company recognises income on recoveries of financial assets written off on realisation or when the right to receive the same without any uncertainties of recovery is established.

3.2 Expenditure

(i) Finance costs

Borrowing costs on financial liabilities are recognised using the EIR

(ii) Fees and commission expenses

Fees and commission expenses which are not directly linked to the sourcing of financial assets, such as commission/incentive incurred on value added services and products distribution, recovery charges and fees payable for management of portfolio etc., are recognised in the Statement of Profit and Loss on an accrual basis.

3.3 Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand, other short term, highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and which are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value.

3.4 Financial instruments

A financial instrument is defined as any contract that gives rise to a financial asset of one entity and a financial liability or equity instrument of another entity. Trade receivables and payables, loan receivables, investments in securities and subsidiaries, debt securities and other borrowings, preferential and equity capital etc. are some examples of financial instruments.

(i) Financial assets

Business Model assessment and Solely payments of principal and interest (SPPI) test:

Classification and measurement of financial assets depends on the business model and results of SPPI test. The Company determines the business model at a level that reflects how groups of financial assets are managed together to achieve a particular business objective. This assessment includes judgement reflecting all relevant evidence including ;

- How the performance of the business model and the financial assets held within that business model are evaluated and reported to the entity's key management personnel
- The risks that affect the performance of the business model (and the financial assets held within that business model) and, in particular, the way those risks are managed
- How managers of the business are compensated (for example, whether the compensation is based on the fair value of the assets managed or on the contractual cash flows collected)
- The expected frequency, value and timing of sales are also important aspects of the Company's assessment

If cash flows after initial recognition are realised in a way that is different from the Company's original expectations, the Company does not change the classification of the remaining financial assets held in that business model, but incorporates such information when assessing newly originated or newly purchased financial assets going forward.

Initial measurement

All financial assets are initially recognised at fair value. Transaction costs that are directly attributable to the acquisition or issue of financial assets (other than financial assets at FVTPL, Investment in subsidiaries and associates which are recorded at cost as permissible under Ind AS 27 'Separate Financial Statements and Trade receivables that do not contain a significant financing component as defined in Ind AS 115 which are recorded at transaction price) are added to or deducted from the fair value of the financial asset, as appropriate, on initial recognition.

Financial assets include cash, or an equity instrument of another entity, or a contractual right to receive cash or another financial asset from another entity. Few examples of financial assets are loan receivables, investment in equity and debt instruments, trade receivables and cash and cash equivalents.

Subsequent measurement

For the purpose of subsequent measurement, financial assets are classified into four categories:

- (a) Financial assets at amortised cost
- (b) Financial assets at fair value through other comprehensive income (FVTOCI)
- (c) Financial assets at fair value through profit or loss (FVTPL)
- (d) Debt instruments at amortised cost or at FVTOCI

(a) Financial assets at amortised cost

Financial assets are measured at amortised cost using the effective interest rate (EIR) as per Ind AS 109 'Financial Instruments' if these financial assets are held within a business model whose objective is to hold these assets in order to collect contractual cash flows and the contractual terms of the financial asset give rise on specified dates to cash flows that are solely payments of principal and interest on the principal amount outstanding.

Trade Receivables are initially measured at their transaction price as defined in Ind AS 115.

(b) Financial assets at fair value through other comprehensive income (FVTOCI)

Financial assets are measured at fair value through other comprehensive income if these financial assets are held within a business model whose objective is achieved by both collecting contractual cash flows that give rise on specified dates to sole payments of principal and interest on the principal amount outstanding and by selling financial assets.

(c) Financial assets at fair value through profit or loss (FVTPL)

Financial assets are measured at fair value through profit or loss unless it is measured at amortised cost or at fair value through other comprehensive income on initial recognition. The transaction costs directly attributable to the acquisition of financial assets and liabilities at fair value through profit or loss are immediately recognised in profit or loss.

Investments in equity instruments, Mutual funds and Derivative instruments are classified as FVTPL, unless the related instruments are not held for trading and the Company irrevocably elects on initial recognition of financial asset on an asset-by-asset basis to present subsequent changes in fair value in other comprehensive income.

(d) Debt instruments at amortised cost or at FVTOCI

For an asset to be classified and measured at FVTOCI, the asset is held within a business model whose objective is achieved both by collecting contractual cash flows and selling financial assets; and the contractual terms of instrument give rise on specified dates to cash flows that are solely payments of principal and interest on the principal amount outstanding.

Debt instruments that are subsequently measured at amortised cost or at FVTOCI are subject to impairment.

Derecognition of financial assets:

The Company derecognises a financial asset (or, where applicable, a part of a financial asset) when:

- (i) The right to receive cash flows from the asset have expired; or
- (ii) The Company has transferred its right to receive cash flows from the asset or has assumed an obligation to pay the received cash flows in full without material delay to a third party under an assignment arrangement and the Company has transferred substantially all the risks and rewards of the asset. Once the asset is derecognised, the Company does not have any continuing involvement in the same.

On derecognition of a financial asset in its entirety, the difference between:

- (i) the carrying amount (measured at the date of derecognition) and
- (ii) the consideration received (including any new asset obtained less any new liability assumed) is recognised in profit or loss.

Impairment of financial assets:

The Company recognises lifetime expected credit losses (ECL) when there has been a significant increase in credit risk since initial recognition and when the financial instrument is credit impaired. If the credit risk on the financial instrument has not increased significantly since initial recognition, the Company measures the loss allowance for that financial instrument at an amount equal to 12 month ECL. The assessment of whether lifetime ECL should be recognised is based on significant increases in the likelihood or risk of a default occurring since initial recognition. 12 month ECL represents the portion of lifetime ECL that is expected to result from default events on a financial instrument that are possible within 12 months after the reporting date.

When determining whether credit risk of a financial asset has increased significantly since initial recognition and when estimating expected credit losses, the Company considers reasonable and supportable information that is relevant and available without undue cost or effort. This includes both quantitative and qualitative information and analysis, including on historical experience and forward-looking information.

The Company recognises lifetime ECL for trade and other receivables and lease receivables. The expected credit losses on these financial assets are estimated using a provision matrix based on the Company's historical credit loss experience, adjusted for factors that are specific to the debtors, general economic conditions and an assessment of both the current as well as the forecast direction of conditions at the reporting date, including time value of money where appropriate. Lifetime ECL represents the expected credit losses that will result from all possible default events over the expected life of a financial instrument.

Loss allowances for financial assets measured at amortised cost are deducted from the gross carrying amount of the assets. For debt securities at FVOCI, the loss allowance is recognised in OCI and carrying amount of the financial asset is not reduced in the balance sheet

Write offs:

The gross carrying amount of a financial asset is written off when there is no realistic prospect of further recovery. This is generally the case when the Company determines that the debtor/ borrower does not have assets or sources of income that could generate sufficient cash flows to repay the amounts subject to the write-off. However, financial assets that are written off could still be subject to enforcement activities under the Company's recovery procedures, taking into account legal advice where appropriate. Any recoveries made are recognised in Statement of profit and loss.

(ii) Financial liabilities

Financial liabilities include liabilities that represent a contractual obligation to deliver cash or another financial assets to another entity, or a contract that may or will be settled in the entities own equity instruments. Few examples of financial liabilities are trade payables, debt securities and other borrowings and subordinated debts.

Initial measurement

All financial liabilities are recognised initially at fair value and, in the case of borrowings and payables, net of directly attributable transaction costs. The Company's financial liabilities include trade payables, other payables, debt securities and other borrowings.

Subsequent measurement

The Company subsequently measures all financial liabilities at amortised cost using the EIR method, except for derivative contracts which are measured at FVTPL.

Derecognition

The Company derecognises a financial liability when the obligation under the liability is discharged, cancelled or expired.

(iii) Offsetting of financial instruments

Financial assets and financial liabilities are offset and the net amount is reported in the Balance Sheet only if there is an enforceable legal right to offset the recognised amounts with an intention to settle on a net basis or to realise the assets and settle the liabilities simultaneously.

3.5 Investment in subsidiaries and associates

Investment in subsidiaries and associates is recognised at cost and are not adjusted to fair value at the end of each reporting period. Cost of investment represents amount paid for acquisition of the said investment.

The Company assesses at the end of each reporting period, if there are any indications that the said investment may be impaired. If so, the Company estimates the recoverable value/amount of the investment and provides for impairment, if any i.e. the deficit in the recoverable value over cost.

3.6 Taxes

(i) Current tax

Current tax assets and liabilities are measured at the amount expected to be recovered from or paid to the taxation authorities, in accordance with the Income Tax Act, 1961 and the Income Computation and Disclosure Standards (ICDS) prescribed therein. The tax rates and tax laws used to compute the amount are those that are enacted or substantively enacted, at the reporting date.

Current tax relating to items recognised outside profit or loss is recognised in correlation to the underlying transaction either in OCI or directly in other equity. Management periodically evaluates positions taken in the tax returns with respect to situations in which applicable tax regulations are subject to interpretation and establishes provisions where appropriate.

(ii) Deferred tax

Deferred tax is provided using the Balance Sheet approach on temporary differences between the tax bases of assets and liabilities and their carrying amounts for financial reporting purposes at the reporting date.

Deferred tax liabilities are recognised for all taxable temporary differences and deferred tax assets are recognised for deductible temporary differences to the extent that it is probable that taxable profits will be available against which the deductible temporary differences can be utilised.

The carrying amount of deferred tax assets is reviewed at each reporting date and reduced to the extent that it is no longer probable that sufficient taxable profit will be available to allow all or part of the deferred tax asset to be utilised. Unrecognised deferred tax assets, if any, are reassessed at each reporting date and are recognised to the extent that it has become probable that future taxable profits will allow the deferred tax asset to be recovered. Deferred tax assets and liabilities are measured at the tax rates that are expected to apply in the year when the asset is realised or the liability is settled, based on tax rates (and tax laws) that have been enacted or substantively enacted at the reporting date.

Deferred tax relating to items recognised outside profit or loss is recognised either in OCI or in other equity.

Deferred tax assets and deferred tax liabilities are offset if a legally enforceable right exists to set off current tax assets against current tax liabilities and the deferred taxes relate to the same taxable entity and the same taxation authority.

3.7 Property, plant and equipment

Property, plant and equipment are carried at historical cost of acquisition less accumulated depreciation and impairment losses, consistent with the criteria specified in Ind AS 16 'Property, Plant and Equipment'.

Depreciation on property, plant and equipment

(a) Depreciation is provided on a pro-rata basis for all tangible assets on written down value method over the useful life of assets.

(b) Useful lives of assets are determined by the Management by an internal technical assessment except where such assessment suggests a life significantly different from those prescribed by Schedule II – Part C of the Companies Act, 2013 where the useful life is as assessed and certified by a technical expert.

(c) Depreciation on addition to assets and assets sold during the year is being provided for on a pro rata basis with reference to the month in which such asset is added or sold as the case may be.

(d) Assets having unit value up to Rs 5,000 is depreciated fully in the financial year of purchase of asset.

(e) An item of property, plant and equipment and any significant part initially recognised is derecognised upon disposal or when no future economic benefits are expected from its use or disposal. Any gain or loss arising on derecognition of the asset (calculated as the difference between the net disposal proceeds and the carrying amount of the asset) is included under other income in the Statement of Profit and Loss when the asset is derecognised.

(f) The residual values, useful lives and methods of depreciation of property, plant and equipment are reviewed at each financial year end and adjusted prospectively, if appropriate.

3.8 Intangible assets and amortisation thereof

Intangible assets, representing softwares are initially recognised at cost and subsequently carried at cost less accumulated amortisation and accumulated impairment. The intangible assets are amortised using the straight line method over a period of five years, which is the Management's estimate of its useful life. The useful lives of intangible assets are reviewed at each financial year end and adjusted prospectively, if appropriate.

3.9 Impairment of non-financial assets

An assessment is done at each Balance Sheet date to ascertain whether there is any indication that an asset may be impaired. If any such indication exists, an estimate of the recoverable amount of asset is determined. If the carrying value of relevant asset is higher than the recoverable amount, the carrying value is written down accordingly.

3.10 Provisions and contingent liabilities

The Company creates a provision when there is present obligation as a result of a past event that probably requires an outflow of resources and a reliable estimate can be made of the amount of the obligation.

A disclosure for a contingent liability is made when there is a possible obligation or a present obligation that may, but probably will not, require an outflow of resources. The Company also discloses present obligations for which a reliable estimate cannot be made. When there is a possible obligation or a present obligation in respect of which the likelihood of outflow of resources is remote, no provision or disclosure is made.

3.11 Retirement and other employee benefits

(i) Gratuity

The Company's liability towards gratuity scheme is determined by independent actuaries, using the projected unit credit method. The present value of the defined benefit obligation is determined by discounting the estimated future cash outflows by reference to market yields at the end of the reporting period on government bonds that have terms approximating to the terms of the related obligation. Past services are recognised at the earlier of the plan amendment / curtailment and recognition of related restructuring costs/ termination benefits.

The net interest cost is calculated by applying the discount rate to the net balance of the defined benefit obligation and the fair value of plan assets. This cost is included in employee benefit expense in the Statement of profit and loss.

Remeasurement gains/losses -

Remeasurement of defined benefit plans, comprising of actuarial gains / losses, return on plan assets excluding interest income are recognised immediately in the balance sheet with corresponding debit or credit to Other Comprehensive Income (OCI). Remeasurements are not reclassified to Statement of profit and loss in the subsequent period.

Remeasurement gains or losses on long-term compensated absences that are classified as other long-term benefits are recognised in Statement of profit and loss.

(ii) Provident fund/ ESIC

Company's contribution paid/payable during the year to provident fund and ESIC is recognised in the Statement of profit and loss account

(iii) Compensated absences

The Company provides for the encashment / availment of leave with pay subject to certain rules. The employees are entitled to accumulate leave subject to certain limits for future encashment / availment. The liability is provided based on the number of days of unutilized leave at each balance sheet date on the basis of an independent actuarial valuation.

3.12 Leases

The determination of whether an arrangement is, or contains, a lease is based on the substance of the arrangement at the inception of the lease. The arrangement is, or contains, a lease if fulfilment of the arrangement is dependent on the use of a specific asset or assets and the arrangement conveys a right to use the asset or assets, even if that right is not explicitly specified in an arrangement.

Company acting as a lessee

A lease is classified at the inception date as a finance lease or an operating lease. A lease that transfers substantially all the risks and rewards incidental to ownership to the Company is classified as a finance lease. All other leases are classified as operating leases. Basis the above principle, all leases entered into by the Company as a lessee have been classified as operating leases. Lease payments under an operating lease is recognised on an accrual basis in the Statement of Profit and Loss.

3.13 Fair value measurement

The Company measures its qualifying financial instruments at fair value on each Balance Sheet date.

Fair value is the price that would be received against sale of an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. The fair value measurement is based on the presumption that the transaction to sell the asset or transfer the liability takes place in the accessible principal market or the most advantageous accessible market as applicable.

All assets and liabilities for which fair value is measured or disclosed in the financial statements are categorised within the fair value hierarchy into Level I, Level II and Level III based on the lowest level input that is significant to the fair value measurement as a whole.

For assets and liabilities that are fair valued in the financial statements on a recurring basis, the Company determines whether transfers have occurred between levels in the hierarchy by re-assessing categorisation (based on the lowest level input that is significant to the fair value measurement as a whole) at the end of each reporting period.

For the purpose of fair value disclosures, the Company has determined classes of assets and liabilities on the basis of the nature, characteristics and risks of the asset or liability and the level of the fair value hierarchy.

3.14 Earnings Per Share

Basic earnings per share is calculated by dividing the net profit or loss for the period attributable to equity shareholders by the weighted average number of equity shares outstanding during the period. Earnings considered in ascertaining the Company's earnings per share is the net profit for the period after deducting preference dividends and any attributable tax thereto for the period. The weighted average number of equity shares outstanding during the period and for all periods presented is adjusted for events, such as bonus shares, sub-division of shares etc. that have changed the number of equity shares outstanding, without a corresponding change in resources.

For the purpose of calculating diluted earnings per share, the net profit or loss for the period attributable to equity shareholders is divided by the weighted average number of equity shares outstanding during the period, considered for deriving basic earnings per share and weighted average number of equity shares that could have been issued upon conversion of all dilutive potential equity shares.

3.15 Segment Reporting

In accordance with Para 4 of notified Indian Accounting Standard 108 (Ind-AS-108)" Operating Segments " the company has disclosed segment information only in consolidated financial statements which are presented together with the Standalone financials statements

3.16 Dividend paid

Final dividend on shares are recorded as a liability on the date of approval by the stakeholders and interim dividends are recorded as a liability on the date of declaration by the Company's Board of Directors

Note 4 : Recent Accounting Developments

The Ministry of Corporate Affairs ("MCA") notifies new standards or amendment to the existing standards under Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Rules as issued from time to time.

In May 2025, MCA notified amendments to :

Ind AS 21 - The Effects of Changes in Foreign Exchange Rates, applicable w.e.f. April 1, 2025. The Company has reviewed the amendment and based on its evaluation has determined that it does not have any significant impact in its financial statements.

In August 2025, MCA notified the following amendments to:

Ind AS 1, Presentation of Financial Statements, applicable w.e.f. April 1, 2025 – The amendment relates to classification of liabilities as current or noncurrent and non-current liabilities with covenants. In the context of classifying a liability as current, it removes the requirement of existence of a right to defer settlement for at least 12 months after the reporting date and instead requires that the said right should exist on the reporting date and have substance. The amendment also introduces guidance on classification of liabilities with covenants. The Company has no impact of these amendments in its classification criteria of current and non-current liabilities.

Ind AS 7, Statement of Cash Flows and Ind AS 107, Financial Instruments: Disclosures, applicable w.e.f. April 1, 2025 – The amendment in Ind AS 7 requires to inform users of financial statements of the existence of supplier finance arrangements and explain the nature of the arrangements, the carrying amount of liabilities and the range of payment due dates. Ind AS 107 has been amended to add supplier finance arrangements as a factor that may cause concentration of liquidity risk. The Company has reviewed the amendment and based on its evaluation has determined that it does not have any significant impact in its financial statements.

Ind AS 12, International Tax Reform – Pillar Two Model Rules applicable immediately - The amendments provide a temporary mandatory relief from deferred tax accounting for top-up tax and disclose that they have applied the relief. The Company has reviewed the amendment and based on its evaluation has determined that it does not have any impact in its financial statements.

Note 36: Segment Information

The Company has identified 'Investing and lending', as its only primary reportable segment. The Board of Directors of the Company have been identified as the Chief Operating Decision Maker (CODM) as defined under Ind AS 108. CODM reviews overall financial information of the Company together for performance evaluation and allocation of resources and does not review any discrete information to evaluate performance of any individual product of geography.

In accordance with paragraph 4 of Ind AS 108 "Operating Segments" the Company has presented segment, information only in the Consolidated financial statements.

Note 37: Fair values

Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction in the principal (or most advantageous) market at the measurement date under current market conditions (i.e., an exit price), regardless of whether that price is directly observable or estimated using a valuation technique. In order to show how fair values have been derived, financial instruments are classified based on a hierarchy of valuation techniques.

Valuation framework

The Company's valuation framework includes:

- (i) Benchmarking prices against observable market prices or other independent sources.
- (ii) Development and validation of fair valuation models using model logic, inputs, outputs and adjustments.

These valuation models are subject to a process of due diligence and validation before they become operational and are continuously calibrated. These models are subject to approvals by various functions including risk, treasury and finance functions. Finance function is responsible for establishing procedures, governing valuation and ensuring fair values are in compliance with accounting standards.

Valuation methodologies adopted

1. The Company has not disclosed the fair values of financial instruments such as cash and cash equivalents, bank balances, other than cash and cash equivalents, trade receivables, other financial assets, trade payables, Investment in equity instrument and Preference shares of subsidiary & associates and other financial liabilities because their carrying amounts are a reasonable approximation of fair value. Further, for financial assets, the Company has taken into consideration the allowances for expected credit losses and adjusted the carrying values where applicable.
2. The fair values of the quoted investments/ units of mutual fund schemes and traded derivatives financial instruments are based on market price/ net asset value at the reporting date.
3. The fair values for loans given are calculated based on discounted cash flows using current lending rates and individual credit worthiness of the counterparty. Based on this evaluation, allowances are taken to account for expected losses of these receivables. Accordingly, fair value of such instruments are not materially different from their carrying values. They are classified as level 3 fair values in the fair value hierarchy.
4. Fair values of the Company's interest-bearing borrowings are determined by using discounted cash flow method using the current borrowing rates. Fair value of such instruments are not materially different from their carrying values, accordingly non-current borrowings are classified as level 2 fair values in the fair value hierarchy. The own non-performance risk as at March 31, 2026 was assessed to be insignificant.

Fair value hierarchy

The Company determines fair values of its financial instruments according to the following hierarchy:

Level 1: This hierarchy uses quoted (unadjusted) prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities.

Level 2: The fair value of financial instruments that are not traded in an active market is determined using valuation techniques which maximize the use of observable market data and rely as little as possible on Company specific estimates.

Level 3: If one or more of the significant inputs is not based on observable market data, the instrument is included in Level 3.

Note 38: Financial Risk Management

Risk Management

The Company's principal financial liabilities comprise borrowings and trade and other payables. The main purpose of these financial liabilities is to finance and support the company's operations. The Company's principal financial assets include investments, cash and cash equivalents and other receivables that are derived directly from its operations. As an Non Banking Financial Company categorised as "Non- Systematically Important Non Deposit taking Company", the Company is exposed to various risks that are related to Investment business and operating environment. The principal objective in Company's risk management processes is to measure and monitor the various risks that Company is subject to and to follow policies and procedures to address such risks.

The Company is exposed to market risk and liquidity risk. The Company's senior management oversees the management of these risks. The Board of Directors reviews and agrees policies for managing each of these risks, which are summarised below.

a) Market Risk

Market Risk is the risk that the fair value or the future cash flows of a financial instrument will fluctuate because of changes in market factor. Such changes in the values of financial instruments may result from changes in the interest rate, stock prices, liquidity, and other market changes. Price risk

Report on the Consolidated Financial Statements

I. Opinion

We have audited the accompanying consolidated financial statements of **VIBRANT GLOBAL CAPITAL LIMITED** (hereinafter referred to as the 'Holding Company') and its subsidiaries (Holding Company and its subsidiaries together referred to as "the Group") which comprise the consolidated Balance Sheet as at March 31, 2026, and the consolidated statement of Profit and Loss (including Other Comprehensive Income), the Consolidated Statement of Changes in Equity and the consolidated Statement of cash flows for the year then ended, and a summary of material accounting policies and other explanatory information (hereinafter referred to as "the consolidated financial statements").

- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the consolidated financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks, and obtain audit evidence that is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion. Our conclusions are based on the audit evidence obtained up to the date of our auditor's report. However, future events or conditions may cause the Group and its associates to cease to continue as a going concern.

- Evaluate the overall presentation, structure and content of the consolidated financial statements, including the disclosures, and whether the consolidated financial statements represent the underlying transactions and events in a manner that achieves fair presentation.
- Obtain sufficient appropriate audit evidence regarding the financial information of the entities or business activities within the Group and its associates to express an opinion on the consolidated financial statements. We are responsible for the direction, supervision and performance of the audit of the financial statements of such entities included in the consolidated financial statements of which we are the independent auditors. For the other entities included in the consolidated financial statements, which have been audited by other auditors, such other auditors remain responsible for the direction, supervision and performance of the audits carried out by them. We remain solely responsible for our audit opinion.

We communicate with those charged with governance of the Holding Company and such other entities included in the consolidated financial statements of which we are the independent auditors regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit and significant audit findings, including any significant deficiencies in internal control that we identify during our audit.

We also provide those charged with governance with a statement that we have complied with relevant ethical requirements regarding independence, and to communicate with them all relationships and other matters that may reasonably be thought to bear on our independence, and where applicable, related safeguards.

From the matters communicated with those charged with governance, we determine those matters that were of most significance in the audit of the consolidated financial statements for the financial year ended 31 March 2026 of the current period and are therefore the key audit matters. We describe these matters in our auditor's report unless law or regulation precludes public disclosure about the matter or when, in extremely rare circumstances, we determine that a matter should not be communicated in our report because the adverse consequences of doing so would reasonably be expected to outweigh the public interest benefits of such communication.

VI. Other Matters

We did not audit the financial statements / financial information of 2 subsidiaries whose financial statements / financial information reflect total assets of Rs. 8,778.91 Lakhs as at 31st March, 2026, total revenues of Rs. 15468.63 Lakhs, net loss after tax of Rs. (252.03) lakhs and total comprehensive loss of Rs. (229.41) Lakhs for the year ended 31st March 2026 and cash flows inflow/ (outflow) of Rs. 9.28 lakhs for the year ended March 31, 2026, as considered in the consolidated financial statements. These financial statements /

financial information have been audited by other auditors whose reports have been furnished to us by the Management and our opinion on the consolidated financial statements, in so far as it relates to the amounts and disclosures included in respect of these subsidiaries and our report in terms of sub-sections (3) and (11) of Section 143 of the Act, in so far as it relates to the aforesaid subsidiaries, is based solely on the reports of the other auditors.

Our opinion on the consolidated financial statements, and our report on Other Legal and Regulatory Requirements below, is not modified in respect of the above matters with respect to our reliance on the work done and the reports of the other auditors and the financial statements / financial information certified by the Management.

VII. Report on Other Legal and Regulatory Requirements

1. With respect to the matters specified in paragraphs 3(xxi) and 4 of the Companies (Auditor's Report) Order, 2020 (the "Order"/ "CARO") issued by the Central Government in terms of Section 143(11) of the Act, to be included in the Auditor's report, according to the information and explanations given to us, and based on the CARO reports issued by us for the Company and its subsidiaries included in the consolidated financial statements of the Company, to which reporting under CARO is applicable, we report that there are no qualifications or adverse remarks in these CARO reports.
2. As required by Section 143(3) of the Act, we report, to the extent applicable, that:
 - (a) We have sought and obtained all the information and explanations which to the best of our knowledge and belief were necessary for the purposes of our audit of the aforesaid consolidated financial statements.
 - (b) In our opinion, proper books of account as required by law relating to preparation of the aforesaid consolidated financial statements have been kept so far as it appears from our examination of those books and the reports of the other auditors.
 - (c) The Consolidated Balance Sheet, the Consolidated Statement of Profit and Loss including Other Comprehensive Income, Consolidated Statement of Changes in Equity and the Consolidated Statement of Cash Flows dealt with by this Report are in agreement with the relevant books of account maintained for the purpose of preparation of the consolidated financial statements.
 - (d) In our opinion, the aforesaid Consolidated Financial Statements comply with the Ind AS specified under Section 133 of the Act.
 - (e) On the basis of the written representations received from the directors of the Holding Company as on 31st March, 2026 taken on record by the Board of Directors of the Holding Company and the reports of the statutory auditors of its subsidiary companies incorporated in India, none of the directors of the Group companies

incorporated in India is disqualified as on 31st March, 2026 from being appointed as a director in terms of Section 164 (2) of the Act.

- (f) With respect to the adequacy of internal financial controls over financial reporting of the Group and the operating effectiveness of such controls, refer to our separate report in “Annexure A”. Our report expresses an unmodified opinion of the adequacy and operating effectiveness of the Company’s internal financial controls over the financial reporting.
- (g) With respect to the other matters to be included in the Auditor’s Report in accordance with the requirements of section 197(16) of the Act, as amended, in our opinion and to the best of our information and according to the explanations given to us, the remuneration paid by the group to its directors during the year is in accordance with the provisions of section 197 read with Schedule V of the Act.
- (h) With respect to the other matters to be included in the Auditor’s Report in accordance with Rule 11 of the Companies (Audit and Auditor’s) Rules, 2014, in our opinion and to the best of our information and according to the explanations given to us:
 - i. The consolidated financial statements disclose the impact of pending litigations on the consolidated financial position of the Group.
 - ii. Provision has been made in the consolidated financial statements, as required under the applicable law or accounting standards, for material foreseeable losses, if any, on long-term contracts including derivative contracts.
 - iii. There were no amounts which were required to be transferred to the Investor Education and Protection Fund by the Holding Company, and its subsidiary companies, associate companies and jointly controlled companies incorporated in India.
 - iv. (a) The respective Managements of the Company and its subsidiaries which are companies incorporated in India, whose financial statements have been audited under the Act, have represented to us that, to the best of their knowledge and belief, no funds (which are material either individually or in the aggregate) have been advanced or loaned or invested (either from borrowed funds or share premium or any other sources or kind of funds) by the Company or any of such subsidiaries to or in any other person or entity, including foreign entity (“Intermediaries”), with the understanding, whether recorded in writing or otherwise, that the Intermediary shall, directly or indirectly lend or invest in other persons or entities identified in any manner whatsoever by or on behalf of the Company or any of such subsidiaries (“Ultimate Beneficiaries”) or provide any guarantee, security or the like on behalf of the Ultimate Beneficiaries.
 - (b) The respective Managements of the Company and its subsidiaries which are companies incorporated in India, whose financial statements have been audited under the Act, have represented to us that, to the best of their knowledge and belief, no funds (which are material either individually or in the aggregate) have

been received by the Company or any of such subsidiaries from any person or entity, including foreign entity ("Funding Parties"), with the understanding, whether recorded in writing or otherwise, that the Company or any of such subsidiaries shall, directly or indirectly, lend or invest in other persons or entities identified in any manner whatsoever by or on behalf of the Funding Party ("Ultimate Beneficiaries") or provide any guarantee, security or the like on behalf of the Ultimate Beneficiaries.

(c) Based on the audit procedures that have been considered reasonable and appropriate in the circumstances performed by us on the Company and its subsidiaries which are companies incorporated in India whose financial statements have been audited under the Act, nothing has come to our notice that has caused us to believe that the representations under sub-clause (i) and (ii) of Rule 11(e), as provided under (a) and (b) above, contain any material misstatement.

- v. The dividend declared/paid by the company during the year and until the date of this audit report is in compliance with Section 123 of the Act.
- vi. Based on our examination, which included test checks, the Company has used accounting software for maintaining its books of account for the financial year ended March 31, 2026 which has a feature of recording audit trail (edit log) facility and the same has been made operational throughout the year for all relevant transactions recorded in the software. Further, during the course of our audit we did not come across any instance of the audit trail feature being tampered with.

Additionally, the audit trail has been preserved by the Company as per the statutory requirements for record retention.

Note 1: Corporate Information

Vibrant Global Capital Limited ('the Company') has been incorporated under the Companies Act 1956 and is registered as registered with the Reserve Bank of India ("RBI") as a non-deposit taking Non Systemically Important (NBFC-ND-NSI) Company. Its equity shares are listed on Bombay Stock Exchange Limited. The RBI, under Scale Based Regulations (SBR) had categorised the group in Base Layer (NBFC-BL). The Group is principally engaged in lending and investing activities. The Group is registered with the Ministry of Corporate Affairs (MCA) and Reserve Bank of India (RBI) The registration details are as follows:

The consolidated financial statements of the Company for the year ended March 31, 2026 were approved for issue in accordance with the resolution of the Board of Directors on May 18, 2026.

Note 2: Basis of Preparation

The consolidated financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Indian Accounting Standards (Ind AS) as per the Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Rules, 2015 as amended from time to time and notified under section 133 of the Companies Act, 2013 (the Act) along with other relevant provisions of the Act. The financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis. The Group uses accrual basis of accounting except in case of significant uncertainties.

2.1 Presentation of financial statements

The Group presents its Balance Sheet in order of liquidity .

The Group generally reports financial assets and financial liabilities on a gross basis in the Balance Sheet. They are offset and reported net only when Ind AS specifically permits the same or it has an unconditional legally enforceable right to offset the recognised amounts without being contingent on a future event. Similarly, the Group offsets incomes and expenses and reports the same on a net basis when permitted by Ind AS specifically unless they are material in nature.

Critical accounting estimates and judgments

The preparation of the Group's financial statements requires Management to make use of estimates and judgments. In view of the inherent uncertainties and a level of subjectivity involved in measurement of items, it is possible that the outcomes in the subsequent financial years could differ from those on which the Management's estimates are based. Accounting estimates and judgments are used in various line items in the financial statements for e.g.:

- >Business model assessment
- >Fair value of financial instruments
- >Effective Interest Rate (EIR)
- >Impairment on financial assets
- >Provisions and other contingent liabilities
- >Provision for tax expenses
- >Residual value and useful life of property, plant and equipment

2.2 Principles of consolidation

(i) The consolidated financial statements incorporate the financial statements of the Parent Group and all its subsidiaries (from the date control is gained), being the entities that it controls. Control is evidenced where the investor is exposed, or has rights, to variable returns from its involvement with the investee and has the ability to affect those returns through its power over the investee. Power is demonstrated through existing rights that give the ability to direct relevant activities, which significantly affect the entity returns. The financial statements of subsidiaries are prepared for the same reporting year as the Parent Group. Where necessary, adjustments are made to the financial statements of subsidiaries to align the material accounting policies in line with material accounting policies of the Parent Group.

The Parent Group holds the entire shareholding in its subsidiaries and there are no contractual arrangements which rebut the control of the Parent Group over its subsidiaries.

The financial statements of subsidiaries acquired or disposed off during the year are included in the consolidated statement of profit and loss from the effective date of acquisition or up to the effective date of disposal, as appropriate. Intragroup balances and transactions, and any unrealised income and expenses arising from intragroup transactions, are eliminated in preparing the consolidated financial statements.

(ii) The Consolidated financial statements include results of the subsidiaries and associates of Parent Group, consolidated in accordance with Ind AS 110 'Consolidated Financial Statements'.

Note 3: Summary of significant material accounting policies

This note provides a list of the significant material accounting policies adopted in the preparation of these consolidated financial statements. These policies have been consistently applied to all the years presented, unless otherwise stated.

3.1 Income

(i) Interest income

The Group recognises interest income using Effective Interest Rate (EIR) on all financial assets subsequently measured at amortised cost or fair value through other comprehensive income (FVTOCI). EIR is calculated by considering all costs and incomes attributable to acquisition of a financial asset or assumption of a financial liability and it represents a rate that exactly discounts estimated future cash payments/receipts through the expected life of the financial asset/financial liability to the gross carrying amount of a financial asset or to the amortised cost of a financial liability.

The Group recognises interest income by applying the EIR to the gross carrying amount of financial assets other than credit-impaired assets. In case of credit-impaired financial assets, the Group recognises interest income on the amortised cost net of impairment loss of the financial asset at EIR. If the financial asset is no longer credit-impaired, the Group reverts to calculating interest income on a gross basis. Delayed payment interest (penal interest) levied on customers for delay in repayments/non payment of contractual cashflows is recognised on realisation. Interest on financial assets subsequently measured at fair value through profit or loss (FVTPL) is recognised at the contractual rate of interest.

(ii) Dividend income

Dividend income on equity shares is recognised when the Group's right to receive the payment is established, which is generally when shareholders approve the dividend.

(iii) Revenue from contracts with customers

Revenue from contracts with customers is recognised when control of the goods or services are transferred to the customer at an amount that reflects the consideration to which the Company expects to be entitled in exchange for those goods or services. The Company has generally concluded that it is the principal in its revenue arrangements, because it typically controls the goods or services before transferring them to the customer.

The disclosures of significant accounting judgements, estimates and assumptions relating to revenue from contracts with customers are provided in disclosures.

The specific recognition criteria described below must also be met before revenue is recognised.

i. Sale of products:

Revenue from sale of products is recognized at the point in time when control of the goods is transferred to the customer, generally on shipment or delivery. The normal credit term is 30-60 days from shipment or delivery as the case may be. The Company considers whether there are other promises in the contract that are separate performance obligations to which a portion of the transaction price needs to be allocated.

In determining the transaction price for the sale of good or rendering of service, the Company considers the effects of variable consideration and provisional pricing, taking into account contractually defined terms of payment and excluding taxes or duties collected on behalf of the government.

a. Variable consideration

If the consideration in a contract includes a variable amount, the Company estimates the amount of consideration to which it will be entitled in exchange for transferring the goods to the customer. The variable consideration is estimated at contract inception and constrained until it is highly probable that a significant revenue reversal in the amount of cumulative revenue recognised will not occur when the associated uncertainty with the variable consideration is subsequently resolved. The volume rebates give rise to variable consideration.

• Volume rebates and discounts

The products are often sold with volume discounts based on aggregate sales over a specific time period, normally 3–12 months. Revenue from these sales is recognized based on the price specified in the contract, net of the estimated volume discounts. Accumulated experience is used to estimate and provide for the discounts using either the expected value method or an assessment of the most likely amount. Revenue is only recognized to the extent that it is highly probable that a significant reversal will not occur. A contract liability is recognized for expected volume discounts payable to customers in relation to sales made until the end of the reporting period. The estimated volume discount is revised at each reporting date.

b. Significant financing component

In many cases, the Company receives short-term advances from its customers. Using the practical expedient in Ind AS 115, the Company does not adjust the promised amount of consideration for the effects of a significant financing component if it expects, at contract inception, that the period between the transfer of the promised good or service to the customer and when the customer pays for that good or service will be one year or less.

Hence, there is no financing component which needs to be separated.

Contract balances

Contract assets

A contract asset is the right to consideration in exchange for goods or services transferred to the customer. If the Company performs by transferring goods or services to a customer before the customer pays consideration or before payment is due, a contract asset is recognised for the earned consideration that is conditional.

Trade receivables

A receivable represents the Company's right to an amount of consideration that is unconditional. Refer to material accounting policies of financial assets- Financial instruments – initial recognition and subsequent measurement.

Contract liabilities

A contract liability is the obligation to transfer goods or services to a customer for which the Company has received consideration (or an amount of consideration is due) from the customer. If a customer pays consideration before the Company transfers goods or services to the customer, a contract liability is recognised when the payment is made or the payment is due (whichever is earlier). Contract liabilities are recognised as revenue when the Company performs under the contract.

(iv) Other revenue from operations

The Group recognises revenue from contracts with customers (other than financial assets to which Ind AS 109 'Financial Instruments' is applicable) based on a comprehensive assessment model as set out in Ind AS 115 Revenue from contracts with customers'. The Group identifies contract(s) with a customer and its performance obligations under the contract, determines the transaction price and its allocation to the performance obligations in the contract and recognises revenue only on satisfactory completion of performance obligations. Revenue is measured at fair value of the consideration received or receivable.

(a) Net gain on fair value changes

Financial assets are subsequently measured at fair value through profit or loss (FVTPL) or fair value through other comprehensive income (FVOCI), as applicable. The Group recognises gains/losses on fair value change of financial assets measured as FVTPL and realised gains/losses on derecognition of financial asset measured at FVTPL and FVOCI.

(b) Sale of services

The Group, on de-recognition of financial assets where a right to service the derecognised financial assets for a fee is retained, recognises the fair value of future service fee income over service obligations cost on net basis as service fee income in the statement of profit or loss and, correspondingly creates a service asset in Balance Sheet. Any subsequent increase in the fair value of service assets is recognised as service income and any decrease is recognised as an expense in the period in which it occurs. The embedded interest component in the service asset is recognised as interest income in line with Ind AS 109 'Financial instruments'.

(c) Recoveries of financial assets written off

The Group recognises income on recoveries of financial assets written off on realisation or when the right to receive the same without any uncertainties of recovery is established.

(d) Taxes

Incomes are recognised net of the Goods and Services Tax/Service Tax, wherever applicable.

3.2 Expenditure

(i) Finance costs

Borrowing costs on financial liabilities are recognised using the EIR

(ii) Fees and commission expenses

Fees and commission expenses which are not directly linked to the sourcing of financial assets, such as commission/incentive incurred on value added services and products distribution, recovery charges and fees payable for management of portfolio etc., are recognised in the Statement of Profit and Loss on an accrual basis.

3.3 Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand, other short term, highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and which are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value.

3.4 Financial instruments

A financial instrument is defined as any contract that gives rise to a financial asset of one entity and a financial liability or equity instrument of another entity. Trade receivables and payables, loan receivables, investments in securities and subsidiaries, debt securities and other borrowings, preferential and equity capital etc. are some examples of financial instruments.

(i) Financial assets

Business Model assessment and Solely payments of principal and interest (SPPI) test:

Classification and measurement of financial assets depends on the business model and results of SPPI test. The Company determines the business model at a level that reflects how groups of financial assets are managed together to achieve a particular business - How the performance of the business model and the financial assets held within that business model are evaluated and reported to the entity's key management personnel

- The risks that affect the performance of the business model (and the financial assets held within that business model) and, in particular, the way those risks are managed
- How managers of the business are compensated (for example, whether the compensation is based on the fair value of the assets managed or on the contractual cash flows collected)
- The expected frequency, value and timing of sales are also important aspects of the group's assessment

If cash flows after initial recognition are realised in a way that is different from the group's original expectations, the group does not change the classification of the remaining financial assets held in that business model, but incorporates such information when assessing newly originated or newly purchased financial assets going forward.

Initial measurement

All financial assets are initially recognised at fair value. Transaction costs that are directly attributable to the acquisition or issue of financial assets (other than financial assets at FVTPL, Investment in subsidiaries and associates which are recorded at cost as permissible under Ind AS 27 'Separate Financial Statements and Trade receivables that do not contain a significant financing component as defined in Ind AS 115 which are recorded at transaction price) are added to or deducted from the fair value of the financial asset, as appropriate, on initial recognition.

Financial assets include cash, or an equity instrument of another entity, or a contractual right to receive cash or another financial asset from another entity. Few examples of financial assets are loan receivables, investment in equity and debt instruments, trade receivables and cash and cash equivalents.

Subsequent measurement

For the purpose of subsequent measurement, financial assets are classified into four categories:

- (a) Financial assets at amortised cost
- (b) Financial assets at fair value through other comprehensive income (FVTOCI)
- (c) Financial assets at fair value through profit or loss (FVTPL)
- (d) Debt instruments at amortised cost or at FVTOCI

(a) Financial assets at amortised cost

Financial assets are measured at amortised cost using the effective interest rate (EIR) as per Ind AS 109 'Financial Instruments' if these financial assets are held within a business model whose objective is to hold these assets in order to collect contractual cash flows and the contractual terms of the financial asset give rise on specified dates to cash flows that are solely payments of principal and interest on the principal amount outstanding.

Trade Receivables are initially measured at their transaction price as defined in Ind AS 115.

(b) Financial assets at fair value through other comprehensive income (FVTOCI)

Financial assets are measured at fair value through other comprehensive income if these financial assets are held within a business model whose objective is achieved by both collecting contractual cash flows that give rise on specified dates to sole payments of principal and interest on the principal amount outstanding and by selling financial assets.

(c) Financial assets at fair value through profit or loss (FVTPL)

Financial assets are measured at fair value through profit or loss unless it is measured at amortised cost or at fair value through other comprehensive income on initial recognition. The transaction costs directly attributable to the acquisition of financial assets and liabilities at fair value through profit or loss are immediately recognised in profit or loss.

Investments in equity instruments, Mutual funds and Derivative instruments are classified as FVTPL, unless the related instruments are not held for trading and the group irrevocably elects on initial recognition of financial asset on an asset-by-asset basis to present subsequent changes in fair value in other comprehensive income.

(d) Debt instruments at amortised cost or at FVTOCI

For an asset to be classified and measured at FVTOCI, the asset is held within a business model whose objective is achieved both by collecting contractual cash flows and selling financial assets; and the contractual terms of instrument give rise on specified dates to cash flows that are solely payments of principal and interest on the principal amount outstanding.

Debt instruments that are subsequently measured at amortised cost or at FVTOCI are subject to impairment.

Derecognition of financial assets:

The group derecognises a financial asset (or, where applicable, a part of a financial asset) when:

- (i) The right to receive cash flows from the asset have expired; or
- (ii) The group has transferred its right to receive cash flows from the asset or has assumed an obligation to pay the received cash flows in full without material delay to a third party under an assignment arrangement and the group has transferred substantially all the risks and rewards of the asset. Once the asset is derecognised, the group does not have any continuing involvement in the same.

On derecognition of a financial asset in its entirety, the difference between:

- (i) the carrying amount (measured at the date of derecognition) and
- (ii) the consideration received (including any new asset obtained less any new liability assumed) is recognised in profit or loss.

Impairment of financial assets:

The group recognises lifetime expected credit losses (ECL) when there has been a significant increase in credit risk since initial recognition and when the financial instrument is credit impaired. If the credit risk on the financial instrument has not increased significantly since initial recognition, the group measures the loss allowance for that financial instrument at an amount equal to 12 month ECL. The assessment of whether lifetime ECL should be recognised is based on significant increases in the likelihood or risk of a default occurring since initial recognition. 12 month ECL represents the portion of lifetime ECL that is expected to result from default events on a financial instrument that are possible within 12 months after the reporting date.

When determining whether credit risk of a financial asset has increased significantly since initial recognition and when estimating expected credit losses, the group considers reasonable and supportable information that is relevant and available without undue cost or effort. This includes both quantitative and qualitative information and analysis, including on historical experience and forward-looking information.

The group recognises lifetime ECL for trade and other receivables and lease receivables. The expected credit losses on these financial assets are estimated using a provision matrix based on the group's historical credit loss experience, adjusted for factors that are specific to the debtors,

general economic conditions and an assessment of both the current as well as the forecast direction of conditions at the reporting date, including time value of money where appropriate. Lifetime ECL represents the expected credit losses that will result from all possible default events over the expected life of a financial instrument.

Loss allowances for financial assets measured at amortised cost are deducted from the gross carrying amount of the assets. For debt securities at FVOCI, the loss allowance is recognised in OCI and carrying amount of the financial asset is not reduced in the balance sheet

Write offs:

The gross carrying amount of a financial asset is written off when there is no realistic prospect of further recovery. This is generally the case when the Company determines that the debtor/borrower does not have assets or sources of income that could generate sufficient cash flows to repay the amounts subject to the write-off. However, financial assets that are written off could still be subject to enforcement activities under the Company's recovery procedures, taking into account legal advice where appropriate. Any recoveries made are recognised in Statement of profit and loss.

(ii) Financial liabilities

Financial liabilities include liabilities that represent a contractual obligation to deliver cash or another financial assets to another entity, or a contract that may or will be settled in the entities own equity instruments. Few examples of financial liabilities are trade payables, debt securities and other borrowings and subordinated debts.

Initial measurement

All financial liabilities are recognised initially at fair value and, in the case of borrowings and payables, net of directly attributable transaction costs. The Company's financial liabilities include trade payables, other payables, debt securities and other borrowings.

Subsequent measurement

The Company subsequently measures all financial liabilities at amortised cost using the EIR method, except for derivative contracts which are measured at FVTPL.

Derecognition

The Company derecognises a financial liability when the obligation under the liability is discharged, cancelled or expired.

(iii) Offsetting of financial instruments

Financial assets and financial liabilities are offset and the net amount is reported in the Balance Sheet only if there is an enforceable legal right to offset the recognised amounts with an intention to settle on a net basis or to realise the assets and settle the liabilities simultaneously.

3.5 Investment in associates

Investment in associates is recognised at cost and are not adjusted to fair value at the end of each reporting period. Cost of investment represents amount paid for acquisition of the said investment.

The Company assesses at the end of each reporting period, if there are any indications that the said investment may be impaired. If so, the Company estimates the recoverable value/amount of the investment and provides for impairment, if any i.e. the deficit in the recoverable value over cost.

3.6 Taxes

(i) Current tax

Current tax assets and liabilities are measured at the amount expected to be recovered from or paid to the taxation authorities, in accordance with the Income Tax Act, 1961 and the Income Computation and Disclosure Standards (ICDS) prescribed therein. The tax rates and tax laws used to compute the amount are those that are enacted or substantively enacted, at the reporting date.

Current tax relating to items recognised outside profit or loss is recognised in correlation to the underlying transaction either in OCI or directly in other equity. Management periodically evaluates positions taken in the tax returns with respect to situations in which applicable tax regulations are subject to interpretation and establishes provisions where appropriate.

(ii) Deferred tax

Deferred tax is provided using the Balance Sheet approach on temporary differences between the tax bases of assets and liabilities and their carrying amounts for financial reporting purposes at the reporting date.

Deferred tax liabilities are recognised for all taxable temporary differences and deferred tax assets are recognised for deductible temporary differences to the extent that it is probable that taxable profits will be available against which the deductible temporary differences can be utilised.

The carrying amount of deferred tax assets is reviewed at each reporting date and reduced to the extent that it is no longer probable that sufficient taxable profit will be available to allow all or part of the deferred tax asset to be utilised. Unrecognised deferred tax assets, if any, are reassessed at each reporting date and are recognised to the extent that it has become probable that future taxable profits will allow the deferred tax asset to be recovered. Deferred tax assets and liabilities are measured at the tax rates that are expected to apply in the year when the asset is realised or the liability is settled, based on tax rates (and tax laws) that have been enacted or substantively enacted at the reporting date.

Deferred tax relating to items recognised outside profit or loss is recognised either in OCI or in other equity.

Deferred tax assets and deferred tax liabilities are offset if a legally enforceable right exists to set off current tax assets against current tax liabilities and the deferred taxes relate to the same taxable entity and the same taxation authority.

3.7 Property, plant and equipment

Property, plant and equipment are carried at historical cost of acquisition less accumulated depreciation and impairment losses, consistent with the criteria specified in Ind AS 16 'Property, Plant and Equipment'.

Depreciation on property, plant and equipment

(a) Depreciation is provided on a pro-rata basis for all tangible assets on written down value method over the useful life of assets.

(b) Useful lives of assets are determined by the Management by an internal technical assessment except where such assessment suggests a life significantly different from those prescribed by Schedule II – Part C of the Companies Act, 2013 where the useful life is as assessed and certified by a technical expert.

(c) Depreciation on addition to assets and assets sold during the year is being provided for on a pro rata basis with reference to the month in which such asset is added or sold as the case may be.

(d) Tangible assets which are depreciated over a useful life that is different than those indicated in Schedule II are as under

(f) Assets having unit value up to Rs 5,000 is depreciated fully in the financial year of purchase of asset.

(g) An item of property, plant and equipment and any significant part initially recognised is derecognised upon disposal or when no future economic benefits are expected from its use or disposal. Any gain or loss arising on derecognition of the asset (calculated as the difference between the net disposal proceeds and the carrying amount of the asset) is included under other income in the Statement of Profit and Loss when the asset is derecognised.

(h) The residual values, useful lives and methods of depreciation of property, plant and equipment are reviewed at each financial year end and adjusted prospectively, if appropriate.

3.8 Intangible assets and amortisation thereof

Intangible assets, representing softwares are initially recognised at cost and subsequently carried at cost less accumulated amortisation and accumulated impairment. The intangible assets are amortised using the straight line method over a period of five years, which is the Management's estimate of its useful life. The useful lives of intangible assets are reviewed at each financial year end and adjusted prospectively, if appropriate.

3.9 Impairment of non-financial assets

An assessment is done at each Balance Sheet date to ascertain whether there is any indication that an asset may be impaired. If any such indication exists, an estimate of the recoverable amount of asset is determined. If the carrying value of relevant asset is higher than the recoverable amount, the carrying value is written down accordingly.

3.10 Provisions and contingent liabilities

The Group creates a provision when there is present obligation as a result of a past event that probably requires an outflow of resources and a reliable estimate can be made of the amount of the obligation.

A disclosure for a contingent liability is made when there is a possible obligation or a present obligation that may, but probably will not, require an outflow of resources. The Group also discloses present obligations for which a reliable estimate cannot be made. When there is a possible obligation or a present obligation in respect of which the likelihood of outflow of resources is remote, no provision or disclosure is made.

3.11 Retirement and other employee benefits

(i) Gratuity

The Company's liability towards gratuity scheme is determined by independent actuaries, using the projected unit credit method. The present value of the defined benefit obligation is determined by discounting the estimated future cash outflows by reference to market yields at the end of the reporting period on government bonds that have terms approximating to the terms of the related obligation. Past services are recognised at the earlier of the plan amendment / curtailment and recognition of related restructuring costs/ termination benefits.

The net interest cost is calculated by applying the discount rate to the net balance of the defined benefit obligation and the fair value of plan assets. This cost is included in employee benefit expense in the Statement of profit and loss.

Remeasurement gains/losses -

Remeasurement of defined benefit plans, comprising of actuarial gains / losses, return on plan assets excluding interest income are recognised immediately in the balance sheet with corresponding debit or credit to Other Comprehensive Income (OCI). Remeasurements are not reclassified to Statement of profit and loss in the subsequent period.

Remeasurement gains or losses on long-term compensated absences that are classified as other long-term benefits are recognised in Statement of profit and loss.

(ii) Provident fund

Company's contribution paid/payable during the year to provident fund and ESIC is recognised in the Statement of profit and loss

(iii) Compensated absences

The Company provides for the encashment / availment of leave with pay subject to certain rules. The employees are entitled to accumulate leave subject to certain limits for future encashment / availment. The liability is provided based on the number of days of unutilized leave at each balance sheet date on the basis of an independent actuarial valuation.

3.12 Fair value measurement

The Group measures its qualifying financial instruments at fair value on each Balance Sheet date.

Fair value is the price that would be received against sale of an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. The fair value measurement is based on the presumption that the transaction to sell the asset or transfer the liability takes place in the accessible principal market or the most advantageous accessible market as applicable.

All assets and liabilities for which fair value is measured or disclosed in the financial statements are categorised within the fair value hierarchy into Level I, Level II and Level III based on the lowest level input that is significant to the fair value measurement as a whole.

For assets and liabilities that are fair valued in the financial statements on a recurring basis, the Group determines whether transfers have occurred between levels in the hierarchy by re-assessing categorisation (based on the lowest level input that is significant to the fair value measurement as a whole) at the end of each reporting period.

For the purpose of fair value disclosures, the Group has determined classes of assets and liabilities on the basis of the nature, characteristics and risks of the asset or liability and the level of the fair value hierarchy.

3.13 Earnings Per Share

Basic earnings per share is calculated by dividing the net profit or loss for the period attributable to equity shareholders by the weighted average number of equity shares outstanding during the period. Earnings considered in ascertaining the Company's earnings per share is the net profit for the period after deducting preference dividends and any attributable tax thereto for the period. The weighted average number of equity shares outstanding during the period and for all periods presented is adjusted for events, such as bonus shares, sub-division of shares etc. that have changed the number of equity shares outstanding, without a corresponding change in resources.

For the purpose of calculating diluted earnings per share, the net profit or loss for the period attributable to equity shareholders is divided by the weighted average number of equity shares outstanding during the period, considered for deriving basic earnings per share and weighted average number of equity shares that could have been issued upon conversion of all dilutive potential equity shares.

3.14 Segment

(i) Identification of segment

Operating segments are reported in the manner consistent with the internal reporting provided to the Chief Operating Decision Maker (CODM) of the Group.

(ii) Segment accounting policies

The Board of Directors and Managing directors of the Holding Company have been identified as the Chief Operating Decision Maker (CODM) as defined under Ind AS 108. CODM reviews overall financial information of the Company together for performance evaluation and allocation of resources and does not review any discrete information to evaluate performance of any individual product or geography.

3.15 Leases

Measurement of Lease Liability

At the time of initial recognition, the Group measures lease liability as present value of all lease payments discounted using the Group's incremental cost of borrowing and directly attributable costs. Subsequently, the lease liability is–

- (i) increased by interest on lease liability;
- (ii) reduced by lease payments made; and
- (iii) remeasured to reflect any reassessment or lease modifications specified in Ind AS 116 'Leases', or to reflect revised fixed lease payments.

Measurement of Right-of-use assets

At the time of initial recognition, the Group measures 'Right-of-use assets' as present value of all lease payments discounted using the Group's incremental cost of borrowing w.r.t said lease contract. Subsequently, 'Right-of-use assets' is measured using cost model i.e. at cost less any accumulated depreciation and any accumulated impairment losses adjusted for any remeasurement of the lease liability specified in Ind AS 116 'Leases'. Depreciation on 'Right-of-use assets' is provided on straight line basis over the lease period.

The exception permitted in Ind AS 116 for low value assets and short term leases has been adopted by Group.

3.16 Goodwill

Goodwill is initially measured at cost, being the excess of the aggregate of the consideration transferred and the amount recognised for non-controlling interests, and any previous interest held, over the net identifiable assets acquired and liabilities assumed. If the fair value of the net assets acquired is in excess of the aggregate consideration transferred, the Group re-assesses whether it has correctly identified all of the assets acquired and all of the liabilities assumed and reviews the procedures used to measure the amounts to be recognised at the acquisition date. If the reassessment still results in an excess of the fair value of net assets acquired over the aggregate consideration transferred, then the gain is recognised in OCI and accumulated in equity as capital reserve. However, if there is no clear evidence of bargain purchase, the entity recognises the gain directly in equity as capital reserve, without routing the same through OCI.

After initial recognition, goodwill is measured at cost less any accumulated impairment losses. For the purpose of impairment testing, goodwill acquired in a business combination is, from the acquisition date, allocated to each of the Group's cash-generating units that are expected to benefit from the combination, irrespective of whether other assets or liabilities of the acquiree are assigned to those units.

A cash generating unit to which goodwill has been allocated is tested for impairment annually, or more frequently when there is an indication that the unit may be impaired. If the recoverable amount of the cash generating unit is less than its carrying amount, the impairment loss is allocated first to reduce the carrying amount of any goodwill allocated to the unit and then to the other assets of the unit pro rata based on the carrying amount of each asset in the unit. Any impairment loss for goodwill is recognised in profit or loss. An impairment loss recognised for goodwill is not reversed in subsequent periods. Where goodwill has been allocated to a cash-generating unit and part of the operation within that unit is disposed of, the goodwill associated with the disposed operation is included in the carrying amount of the operation when determining the gain or loss on disposal. Goodwill disposed in these circumstances is measured based on the relative values of the disposed operation and the portion of the cash-generating unit retained.

Valuation methodologies adopted

Fair value hierarchy

Level 1: This hierarchy uses quoted (unadjusted) prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities.

Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction in the principal (or most advantageous) market at the measurement date under current market conditions (i.e., an exit price), regardless of whether that price is directly observable or estimated using a valuation technique. In order to show how fair values have been derived, financial instruments are classified based on a hierarchy of valuation techniques.

Valuation framework

The Group's valuation framework includes:

- (i) Benchmarking prices against observable market prices or other independent sources.
- (ii) Development and validation of fair valuation models using model logic, inputs, outputs and adjustments.

The Group determines fair values of its financial instruments according to the following hierarchy:

These valuation models are subject to a process of due diligence and validation before they become operational and are continuously calibrated. These models are subject to approvals by various functions including risk, treasury and finance functions. Finance function is responsible for establishing procedures, governing valuation and ensuring fair values are in compliance with accounting standards.

1. The Group has not disclosed the fair values of financial instruments such as cash and cash equivalents, bank balances, other than cash and cash equivalents, trade receivables, other financial assets, trade payables and other financial liabilities because their carrying amounts are a reasonable approximation of fair value. Further, for financial assets, the Group has taken into consideration the allowances for expected credit losses and adjusted the carrying values where applicable.

2. The fair values of the quoted investments/ units of mutual fund schemes and traded derivatives are based on market price/ net asset value at the reporting date.

3. The fair values for loans given are calculated based on discounted cash flows using current lending rates and individual credit worthiness of the counterparty. Based on this evaluation, allowances are taken to account for expected losses of these receivables. Accordingly, fair value of such instruments are not materially different from their carrying values. They are classified as level 2 fair values in the fair value hierarchy.

4. Fair values of the Group's interest-bearing borrowings are determined by using discounted cash flow method using the current borrowing rates. Fair value of such instruments are not materially different from their carrying values, accordingly non-current borrowings are classified as level 2 fair values in the fair value hierarchy. The own non-performance risk as at March 31, 2026 was assessed to be insignificant.

Level 2: The fair value of financial instruments that are not traded in an active market is determined using valuation techniques which maximize the use of observable market data and rely as little as possible on Group specific estimates.

Level 3: If one or more of the significant inputs is not based on observable market data, the instrument is included in Level 3.

Risk Management

Market Risk is the risk that the fair value or the future cash flows of a financial instrument will fluctuate because of changes in market factor. Such changes in the values of financial instruments may result from changes in the interest rate, stock prices, liquidity, and other market changes. The objective of market risk management is to avoid excessive exposure of group's earnings and equity to loss and reduce its exposure to the volatility inherent in financial instruments. The group is exposed to Price risk under market risk as follows:

The group is exposed to market risk , credit risk and liquidity risk. The group's senior management oversees the management of these risks. The Board of Directors reviews and agrees policies for managing each of these risks, which are summarised below.

a) Market Risk

b)Credit risk

Credit risk arises from the possibility that the counter party may not be able to settle their obligation as agreed. To manage this, the group periodically assesses financial reliability of customers and other counter parties, taking into account the financial condition, current economic trends, and analysis of historical bad debts and ageing of financial assets. Individual risk limits are periodically reviewed on the basis of such information.

Financial assets are written off when there is no reasonable expectation of recovery, such as a debtor failing to engage in a repayment plan with the group. Where loans or receivables have been written off, the group continues to engage in enforcement activity to attempt to recover the receivable due. Where recoveries are made, these are recognised as income in the statement of profit and loss.

Loans: The group has given loans to certain unrelated parties. However there is no counter party risk. The company calculates impairment on financial instruments as per ECL approach prescribed under Ind AS 109 'Financial Instruments' .

Cash and cash equivalents: Balances with banks are subject to low credit risks due to good credit ratings assigned to the banks.

The group's principal financial liabilities comprise borrowings and trade and other payables. The main purpose of these financial liabilities is to finance and support the group's operations. The group's principal financial assets include investments, cash and cash equivalents and other receivables that are derived directly from its operations. As a Non Banking Financial group categorised as "Non- Systematically Important Non Deposit taking group", the group is exposed to various risks that are related to Investment business and operating environment. The principal objective in group 's risk management processes is to measure and monitor the various risks that group is subject to and to follow policies and procedures to address such risks.

c) Liquidity Risk

Liquidity risk is the risk that the entity may encounter in the form of difficulty in meeting the obligations associated with its financial liabilities that are settled by delivering cash or another financial asset. The entity's approach towards managing liquidity is to ensure, as far as possible, that it will have sufficient liquidity to meet its liabilities when they are due, under both normal and stressed conditions, without incurring unacceptable losses or risking damage to the entity's reputation.

Prudent liquidity risk management requires sufficient cash and marketable securities and availability of funds through adequate committed credit facilities to meet obligations when due and to close out market positions.

The group takes a view of maintaining liquidity with minimal risks while making investments. The group invests its surplus funds in short term liquid assets in the form of bank deposits and liquid mutual funds. The group monitors its cash and bank balances periodically with a view to meet its short term obligations associated with its financial liabilities.
