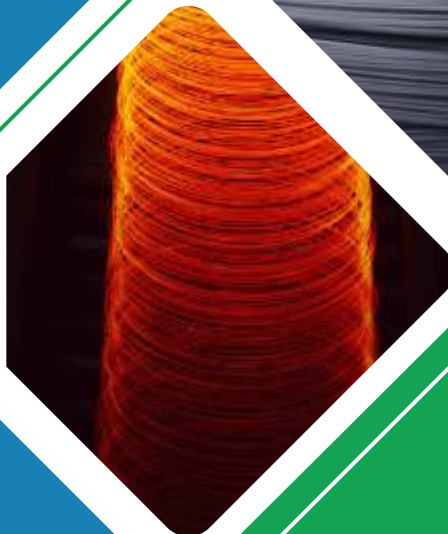

1. Adoption of Audited Financial Statements.

To receive, consider and adopt the Audited Financial Statements of the Company for the financial year ended 31st March, 2026 together with the Reports of Board of Directors' and the Auditors' thereon.

2. Appointment of a Director retiring by rotation.

To appoint a Director in place of Ms. Suchita Shah (DIN: 00427169), who retires by rotation and being eligible, offers her candidature for re-appointment.

SPECIAL BUSINESS:

3. To approve the re-appointment of Mr. Ashok Ramlubhaya Malhotra (DIN: 00120198) as Chairman & Managing Director of the Company and payment of managerial remuneration.

To consider and if thought fit, to pass, with or without modification(s), the following resolution as a **Special Resolution**:

"RESOLVED that pursuant to the provisions of Sections 196, 197, 203 and other applicable provisions of the Companies Act, 2013 read with Schedule V thereto and Companies (Appointment and Remuneration of Managerial Personnel) Rules, 2014, SEBI (Listing Obligations and Disclosure Requirements) Regulations, 2015, (including any statutory modification(s) or re-enactment(s) thereof, for the time being in force), Articles of Association of the Company and as recommended by the Nomination and Remuneration Committee and the Board of Directors of the Company, approval of the members be and is hereby accorded to the re-appointment of Mr. Ashok Ramlubhaya Malhotra (DIN: 00120198) aged 74 years, as Chairman & Managing Director of the Company on expiry of his present term of office, for a further period of 3 years i.e., commencing from 1st April, 2027 till 31st March, 2030, liable to retire by rotation, upon terms and conditions including remuneration as set out in the explanatory statement annexed to the Notice and also contained in the draft agreement, with a liberty and power to the Board of Directors of the Company (including its Committee constituted for the purpose) to alter and vary the terms and conditions of the said appointment as agreed by and between the Board of Directors and Mr. Ashok Ramlubhaya Malhotra.

1. The Statement pursuant to Section 102(1) of the Companies Act, 2013, as amended ('Act'), setting out the material facts concerning the business with respect to Item No(s). 3, 4 & 5 forms part of this Notice. Further, relevant information pursuant to Regulation 36 and other relevant provisions of the Securities and Exchange Board of India (Listing Obligations and Disclosure Requirements) Regulations, 2015 ('SEBI Listing Regulations') and disclosure requirements in terms of Secretarial Standard on General Meetings ('SS-2') issued by The Institute of Company Secretaries of India, in respect of Director retiring by rotation and seeking re-appointment at this Annual General Meeting ('Meeting' or 'AGM') is furnished as Annexure to this Notice.

2. The Ministry of Corporate Affairs ('MCA'), inter alia, vide its General Circular No(s). 14/2020 dated April 8, 2020, 17/2020 dated April 13, 2020, 20/2020 dated May 5, 2020, 02/2022 dated May 5, 2022 and subsequent circulars issued in this regard, the latest being General Circular No. 03/2025 dated September 22, 2025 (collectively referred to as 'MCA Circulars'), has permitted the holding of the AGM through Video Conferencing ('VC') or through Other Audio-Visual Means ('OAVM'), without the physical presence of the Members at a common venue.

Further, the Securities and Exchange Board of India ('SEBI'), vide Regulations 36(1), 44(4) and 58(1) of the SEBI Listing Regulations have provided relaxations from compliance with certain provisions of the SEBI Listing Regulations relating to the sending of Annual Report to security holders as well as appointing of proxy.

In compliance with the applicable provisions of the Act, SEBI Listing Regulations, SEBI Circulars and MCA Circulars, the 53rd AGM of the Company is being held through VC/OAVM on Friday, 25th September, 2026 at 11.00 a.m. (IST). The proceedings of the AGM will be deemed to be conducted at the Registered Office of the Company situated at GIDC Industrial Estate, Kalol-389 330, Dist. Panchmahals, Gujarat.

3. In compliance with the Circulars issued by MCA and SEBI, the Notice of the 53rd AGM along with the Annual Report is being sent through electronic mode to those Members whose email addresses are registered with the Company/ Depository Participants (DPs). Physical copy of the Notice of the 53rd AGM along with Annual Report for financial year 2025-26 shall be sent to those shareholders who request for the same. Members may note that the Notice and Annual Report will also be available on the Company's website www.panchmahalsteel.co.in, website of stock exchange i.e. BSE Limited at www.bseindia.com and on the website of Central Depository Services Limited at www.evotingindia.com respectively.

4. The Members attending AGM through VC / OAVM shall be counted for the purpose of reckoning the quorum under Section 103 of the Act.

5. **PURSUANT TO THE PROVISIONS OF THE ACT, A MEMBER ENTITLED TO ATTEND AND VOTE AT THE AGM IS ENTITLED TO APPOINT A PROXY TO ATTEND AND VOTE ON ITS BEHALF AND THE PROXY NEED NOT BE A MEMBER OF THE COMPANY.**

SINCE THIS AGM IS BEING HELD PURSUANT TO THE FRAMEWORK PROVIDED IN THE MCA CIRCULARS READ WITH THE COMPANIES ACT, 2013 AND THE SEBI LISTING REGULATIONS, THROUGH VC/OAVM, PHYSICAL ATTENDANCE OF MEMBERS HAS BEEN DISPENSED WITH. 10. **Book Closure:**
Pursuant to Section 91 of the Companies Act, 2013 and Regulation 42 of the SEBI Listing Regulations, the Register of Members and the Share Transfer Books of the Company will remain closed from **Friday, 18th September, 2026 to Friday, 25th September, 2026** (both days inclusive) for the purpose of 53rd AGM of the Company.
11. **Cut-off Date for remote e-voting:**
The Company has fixed **Friday, 18th September, 2026** as the Cut-off Date for remote e-voting. The remote e-voting / voting rights of the shareholders / beneficial owners shall be reckoned on the equity shares held by them as at close of business hours on the Cut-off Date i.e. 18th September, 2026 only. A person who is not a Member as on the Cut-off Date should treat this Notice for information purposes only.
12. Any person, who acquires shares of the Company and become Member of the Company after dispatch of the notice and holding shares as of the cut-off date i.e. 18th September, 2026, may obtain the login ID and password by sending a request at helpdesk.evoting@cdslindia.com or Registrar and Share Transfer Agent's Email Id at helpdesknum@mcsregistrars.com.
13. In case of joint holders attending the AGM, only such joint holder who is higher in the order of the names as per the Register of Members of the Company, as of the cut-off date, will be entitled to vote at the Meeting.

14. **Nomination facility:** As per the provisions of Section 72 of the Act, read with SEBI Master Circular dated February 6, 2026 issued to RTA the facility for making nomination is available to the Members in respect of the shares held by them. Members who have not yet registered their nominations are requested to register the same by submitting Form No. SH-13. If a member desires to opt-out or cancel the earlier nomination and record a fresh nomination, the Member may submit the requisite application in Form ISR-3 or Form SH-14, as the case may be.

Members are requested to submit the said form to their DPs in case their shares are held in electronic form and to the RTA at helpdeskmm@mcsregistrars.com in case the shares are held in physical form, quoting their folio no(s).

15. In accordance with Regulation 40 of the SEBI Listing Regulations, as amended, any new transfer, transmission or transposition requests for securities shall be processed in demat/electronic form only. Members holding shares of the Company in physical form are requested to kindly get their shares converted into demat/electronic form to get inherent benefits of dematerialisation.
16. Members may please note that listed companies are mandated to issue securities in demat form only while processing any service requests viz. issue of duplicate securities certificate, claim from Unclaimed Suspense Account, renewal/exchange of securities certificate, endorsement, sub-division/splitting of securities certificate, consolidation of securities certificates/folios, transmission and transposition. Accordingly, Members are requested to make service requests by submitting a duly filled and signed Form ISR-4/ISR-5 (for transmission), the format of which is available on the Company's website at <https://www.panchmahalsteel.co.in/investor-relations.php#other-disclosures>. It may be noted that any service request or complaint can be processed only after the folio is KYC compliant. 17. **Dispute Resolution:** SEBI has established a common Online Dispute Resolution Portal ('ODR Portal') for resolution of disputes arising in the Indian Securities Market. Post exhausting the option to resolve their grievance with the RTA/Company directly and/or through the SEBI SCORES platform, the investors can initiate dispute resolution through the ODR Portal (<https://smartodr.in/login>) and the same can also be accessed through the Company's website at <https://www.panchmahalsteel.co.in/investor-relations.php#other-disclosures>.
18. **Request for updation of PAN, KYC details and Choice of Nomination**

As per circulars issued by SEBI from time to time, it is mandatory for holders of physical securities to furnish PAN, KYC details (viz. Contact details, Mobile Number, Bank Account Details, Signature) and Nomination/Opt-out of Nomination, before getting any Investor Service Request (ISR) processed.

Security holders holding securities in physical form, whose folio(s) do not have PAN, KYC details or Choice of Nomination updated, shall be eligible for dividend in respect of such folios, only through electronic mode with effect from 1st April, 2024. Members may refer to the SEBI FAQs (FAQ Nos. 47 & 48) issued in this regard, available on its website at https://www.sebi.gov.in/sebi_data/faqfiles/jan-2026/1767611333081.pdf.

Keeping the above statutory requirements in view, members holding shares in physical form are requested to furnish valid PAN, KYC and Nomination details immediately to the RTA / Company in the required forms, to ensure that, their folios are not frozen. In accordance with SEBI Circulars, the Company has sent reminders to concerned shareholders requesting them to update the details. The required forms can be downloaded from the Company's website at link <https://www.panchmahalsteel.co.in/investor-relations.php#other-disclosures>.

19. Members are requested to note that dividends not encashed or remaining unclaimed for a period of 7 (seven) years from the date of transfer to the Company's Unpaid Dividend Account, shall be transferred to the Investor Education and Protection Fund ("IEPF") established by the Central Government. Further, pursuant to the provisions of Section 124 of the Act read with the Investor Education and Protection Fund Authority (Accounting, Audit, Transfer and Refund) Rules, 2016 ("IEPF Rules") as amended to date, all shares on which dividend has not been paid or claimed for seven consecutive years or more shall be transferred to IEPF Authority as notified by the Ministry of Corporate Affairs.

The dividend amount and shares transferred to the IEPF can be claimed by the members concerned from the IEPF Authority after complying with the procedure prescribed under the IEPF Rules. The details of the unclaimed dividend amount and shares transferred to IEPF Authority are available on the Company's website at www.panchmahalsteel.co.in and the said details have also been uploaded on the website of the IEPF Authority and the same can be accessed through the Link (www.iepf.gov.in).

No claim could be made in respect thereof with the Company. The voting rights on the shares transferred to IEPF Authority shall remain frozen till the rightful owner claims the shares. Those shareholders who have not claimed their dividends for the FY 2021-22 and FY 2024-25 are requested to claim the same. The members concerned are requested to verify the details of their unclaimed amount, if any, from the website of the Company and write to the Company's Registrar before the same becomes due for transfer to the IEPF. The last date for claiming the aforesaid unpaid dividend is 29th October 2029 and 27th October, 2032 respectively.

20. Securities of the listed companies can be transferred only in dematerialised form w.e.f. April 1, 2019. Further, SEBI vide its Master Circular No. HO/38/13/(4)2026-MIRSD-POD/I/4298/2026 dated February 6, 2026 mandated all listed companies to issue securities in dematerialised form only, while processing the service request of issue of duplicate securities certificate, claim from Unclaimed Suspense Account, renewal/exchange of securities certificate, endorsement, subdivision/splitting of securities certificate, consolidation of securities certificates/folios, transmission and transposition. Accordingly, Shareholders are requested to make service requests by submitting a duly filled and signed Form ISR-4. It may be noted that any service request can be processed only after the folio is KYC compliant.

Further, SEBI vide its Circular No. SEBI/HO/MIRSD/MIRSDPoD/P/CIR/2025/97, dated July 5, 2025, has mandated to open a special window only for re-lodgement of transfer deeds, which were lodged prior to the deadline of April 1, 2019 and rejected/returned/not attended to, due to deficiency in the documents/process/or otherwise, for a period of six months from July 7, 2025 till January 6, 2026. Further, SEBI vide its Circular No. HO/38/13/11(2)2026-MIRSD-POD/I/3750/2026, dated January 30, 2026, has prescribed to open another special window for transfer and dematerialisation of physical securities which were sold/purchased prior to April 1, 2019. This special window shall be open for a period of one year from February 5, 2026 to February 4, 2027. In adherence to the above SEBI Circulars, the Company/RTA had made necessary newspaper advertisements to publicise the opening of the special window and had submitted periodical reports to SEBI in a timely manner.

21. To support the 'Green Initiative', Members who have not yet registered their email addresses are requested to register the same with their respective Depository Participants in case the shares are held by them in electronic form and with our RTA, namely, M/s MCS Share Transfer Agent Limited in case the shares are held by them in physical form.

INFORMATION AND OTHER INSTRUCTIONS RELATING TO REMOTE E-VOTING AND E-VOTING DURING AGM

Pursuant to the provisions of Section 108 of the Companies Act, 2013 read with Rule 20 of the Companies (Management and Administration) Rules, 2014 (as amended) and Regulation 44 of SEBI Listing Regulations, and

applicable Circulars, the Company is providing facility of remote e-voting to its Members in respect of the business to be transacted at the AGM. For this purpose, the Company has entered into an agreement with Central Depository Services (India) Limited (CDSL) for facilitating voting through electronic means, as the authorized e-Voting agency. The facility of casting votes by a member using remote e-voting as well as the e-voting system on the date of the AGM will be provided by CDSL.

INFORMATION AND OTHER INTRUCTIONS TO SHAREHOLDERS FOR E-VOTING AND JOINING VIRTUAL MEETINGS ARE AS UNDER:

Step 1: Access through Depositories CDSL/NSDL e-Voting system in case of individual shareholders holding shares in demat mode.

Step 2: Access through CDSL e-Voting system in case of shareholders holding shares in physical mode and non-individual shareholders in demat mode.

- (i) The voting period begins on **Tuesday, the 22nd September, 2026 (9.00 a.m. IST) and ends on Thursday, the 24th September, 2026 (5.00 p.m. IST)**. During this period shareholders' of the Company, holding shares either in physical form or in dematerialized form, as on the cut-off date of 18th September, 2026 may cast their vote electronically. The e-voting module shall be disabled by CDSL for voting thereafter.
- (ii) Shareholders who have already voted prior to the meeting date would not be entitled to vote at the meeting venue.
- (iii) Pursuant to SEBI Circular No. **SEBI/HO/CFD/CMD/CIR/P/2020/242 dated December 9, 2020**, under Regulation 44 of Securities and Exchange Board of India (Listing Obligations and Disclosure Requirements) Regulations, 2015, listed entities are required to provide remote e-voting facility to its shareholders, in respect of all shareholders' resolutions. However, it has been observed that the participation by the public non-institutional shareholders/retail shareholders is at a negligible level.

EXPLANATORY STATEMENT

(Pursuant to Section 102 of the Companies Act, 2013)

As required by Section 102 of the Companies Act, 2013 (Act), the following explanatory statement sets out all material facts relating to the business mentioned under Item No. 3,4 &5 of the accompanying Notice:

Item No. 3 :

Mr. Ashok Ramlubhaya Malhotra was appointed as Chairman & Managing Director at the 50th AGM of the members of the Company held on 25th September, 2023 for a period of three years with effect from 1st April, 2024. Mr. Ashok Ramlubhaya Malhotra is a promoter director on the Board of the Company and his tenure of appointment will be expiring on 31st March 2027.

Based on the recommendation of the Nomination & Remuneration Committee and approval of the Board of Directors at their respective meetings held on 3rd August, 2026, it is proposed to re-appoint him for a further term of 3 years commencing from 1st April, 2027, subject to the approval of shareholders at the 53rd Annual General Meeting of the Company.

Further, in terms of the authority already granted by the Members at the 50th Annual General Meeting held on 25th September 2023, the Board, on the recommendation of the Nomination & Remuneration Committee have approved a revision in the remuneration of the Chairman & Managing Director with effect from 1st October, 2026. The revised remuneration shall continue unchanged during his re-appointment term commencing from 1st April, 2027.

He has attained the age of Seventy-one (74) Years and hence continuation of his employment as Chairman & Managing Director requires the approval of members by way of a special resolution. Section 196(3) of the Companies Act, 2013, inter alia, provides that no company shall continue the employment of a person who has attained the age of 70 years, as Managing Director, Whole time director or Manager unless it is approved by the members by passing a special resolution. Further, Part-1 of Schedule V to the Act also contains similar relaxation.

Under his leadership, management and guidance, the Company has witnessed exceptional growth. He has played a pivotal role in steering the Company towards sustained growth and innovation.

Keeping in view of his transformational role in establishing PSL among India's leading producers of speciality stainless-steel long products. His long association with the Company, rich and varied experience of five decades in the industry, his expertise and involvement in the operations of the Company over a long period of time and fitness, the Board of Directors felt that it is in the interest of the Company to continue to avail his services.

The details of Mr. Ashok Ramlubhaya Malhotra as required under the provisions of Regulation 36(3) of the SEBI (Listing Obligations and Disclosure Requirements) Regulations, 2015 and other applicable provisions are provided in Annexure A to this Notice.

Members may note that the Company has not committed any default in payment of dues to any bank or public financial institution or non-convertible debenture holders or any other secured creditor.

The main terms and conditions regarding the re-appointment and payment of remuneration and perquisites proposed to be paid to Mr. Ashok Ramlubhaya Malhotra from the date of his re-appointment are set out in the draft Agreement.

The said draft Agreement, inter alia, contains the following terms and conditions:

1. Period of Appointment: From 1st April, 2027 to 31st March, 2030, liable to retire by rotation.

2. Remuneration:

a. Salary: ₹ 12,00,000 /- (Rupees Twelve Lakhs only) p.mb. Perquisites:

- (i) In addition to the salary payable, the Chairman & Managing Director shall also be entitled to perquisites and allowances like accommodation (furnished or otherwise) or house rent allowance in lieu thereof, house maintenance allowance, together with reimbursement of expenses or allowances for utilities such as gas, electricity, water and furnishings and repairs, all of which may be hired or owned; medical reimbursement; club fees and leave travel concession for himself and family; medical insurance,
- (ii) personal accident insurance and such other perquisites and allowances in accordance with rules of the Company or as may be agreed to by the Board of Directors and the Managing Director. Such perquisites and allowances will be subject to maximum of ₹7,00,000/- per month.
- (iii) For the purpose of calculating the above ceiling, perquisite and allowances shall be evaluated as per Income Tax Rules, wherever applicable; in the absence of any such Rules, perquisites and allowances shall be evaluated at actual cost or hire charges.
- (iv) Provision for use of the Company's car for official duties and telephone and other communication facilities at residence shall not be included in computation of perquisites for the purpose of calculating the said ceiling.
- (v) Subject to statutory ceiling/s, the Managing Director may be given any other allowance/perquisites, benefits and facilities as the Board of Directors from time to time may decide.

As per Part IV of Schedule V of the Companies Act, 2013, the following perquisites shall not be included in the computation of the ceiling on remuneration as specified in Section II of the said Schedule:

- a) Contribution to Provident Fund will be made to the extent, this either singly or put together are not taxable under the Income-Tax Act, 2025.
- b) Encashment of leave at the end of the tenure.
- c) Minimum Remuneration: Notwithstanding anything contained herein, where in any financial year, during the currency of tenure of the Managing Director, the Company has no profit or its profits are inadequate, the Company may pay him the aforesaid remuneration by way of salary, perquisites and other allowances as minimum remuneration subject to the limits specified in item A of Section II of Part II of Schedule V to Companies Act, 2013, as applicable. The perquisites mentioned in para b (vi) of this statement shall not be included in the computation of the ceiling on minimum remuneration.

However, remuneration in excess of the limits prescribed in Schedule V to the Companies Act, 2013 as mentioned above may be paid, if the resolution passed by the shareholders is a special resolution. Therefore, approval of the Shareholders by special resolution is sought for payment of remuneration to Managing Directors w.e.f. 1st April, 2027 for a period of 3 years. The Information pursuant to clause (iv) of the second proviso to Section II, Part II of Schedule V to the Companies Act, 2013 is furnished hereunder.

- 3. The period of office of Mr. Ashok Ramlubhaya Malhotra shall be liable to determination by retirement of directors by rotation. If Mr. Ashok Ramlubhaya Malhotra is re-appointed as a director, immediately on retirement by rotation, he shall continue to hold office of Chairman & Managing Director and such re-appointment as director shall not be deemed to constitute break in his appointment as Chairman & Managing Director.

4. As long as Mr. Ashok Ramlubhaya Malhotra functions as Chairman & Managing Director, no sitting fee to be paid to him for attending the meetings of the Board of Directors or Committee(s) thereof.
5. The said appointment may be terminated by either party by giving the other three calendar months' notice in writing.
6. The Chairman & Managing Director shall look after overall operations of the Company subject to the superintendence, control and direction of the Board of Directors of the Company.

Other terms and conditions of the Agreement are such as are customarily contained in an agreement of similar nature. The terms and conditions of the said appointment and/or agreement may be altered and varied from time to time by the Board as it may, in its discretion, deem fit, including but not limited to the remuneration payable to Mr. Ashok Ramlubhaya Malhotra, Chairman & Managing Director in accordance with the provisions of the Companies Act, 2013, rules thereunder or any amendments made therein.

This Explanatory Statement may also be read and treated as disclosure in compliance with the requirements of Section 190 of the Companies Act, 2013.

(x) Share Transfer System

(xi) Unclaimed Dividend and Transfer of shares to IEPF

Members are requested to note that dividends not encashed or remaining unclaimed for a period of 7 (seven) years from the date of transfer to the Company's Unpaid Dividend Account, shall be transferred to the Investor Education and Protection Fund ("IEPF") established by the Central Government. Further, pursuant to the provisions of Section 124 of the Act read with the Investor Education and

Protection Fund Authority (Accounting, Audit, Transfer and Refund) Rules, 2016 ("IEPF Rules") as amended to date, all shares on which dividend has not been paid or claimed for seven consecutive years or more shall be transferred to IEPF Authority as notified by the Ministry of Corporate Affairs.

The dividend amount and shares transferred to the IEPF can be claimed by the members concerned from the IEPF Authority after complying with the procedure prescribed under the IEPF Rules. The details of the unclaimed dividend amount and shares transferred to IEPF Authority are available on the Company's website at <https://www.panchmahalsteel.co.in/investor-relations.php#other-disclosures> and the said details have also been uploaded on the website of the IEPF Authority and the same can be accessed through the Link (www.iepf.gov.in).

No claim could be made in respect thereof with the Company. The voting rights on the shares transferred to IEPF Authority shall remain frozen till the rightful owner claims the shares. Those shareholders who have not claimed their dividends for the FY 2021-22 and FY 2024-25 are requested to claim the same. The members concerned are requested to verify the details of their unclaimed amount, if any, from the website of the Company and write to the Company's Registrar before the same becomes due for transfer to the IEPF. The last date for claiming the aforesaid unpaid dividend is 29th October 2029 and 27th October, 2032 respectively.

100 Days campaign – 'Saksham Niveshak' by Investor Education and Protection Fund Authority

A "100 days campaign" was organised from 28th July 2025 to 6th November 2025 under the IEPF Saksham Niveshak Program, to facilitate updation of KYC and bank account details by shareholders and to assist them in claiming unpaid and unclaimed dividends relating to earlier financial years, with a view to preventing transfer of such amounts to the Investor Education and Protection Fund (IEPF). Subsequently, the Company has initiated a Second 100 days campaign from 1st April, 2026 to 9th July 2027. Shareholders are encouraged to avail this opportunity to update their KYC and bank account details and claim unpaid and unclaimed dividends within the stipulated timelines, thereby avoiding transfer of such amounts to the IEPF.

As a part of the above campaign, the Company has made necessary newspaper publications informing members about the process to claim unclaimed dividend and shares.

(xii) Investor Grievance and Share Transfer System

The Company has a Board-level Stakeholders' Relationship Committee to examine and redress investors' complaints. The status on complaints and share transfers are reported to the entire Board on quarterly basis.

During FY 2025-26, Share transfers (transmission/transposition) received by the share transfer agent/Company are registered within 15 days from the date of receipt, provided that documents are complete in all respects. During the year, there was no instance of physical share transfer. The Managing Director and/or the Company Secretary of the Company are empowered to approve such requests.

Securities of the listed companies can be transferred only in dematerialised form w.e.f. April 1, 2019. Further, SEBI vide its Master Circular No. HO/38/13/(4)2026-MIRSD-POD/I/4298/2026 dated February 6, 2026 mandated all listed companies to issue securities in dematerialised form only, while processing the service request of issue of duplicate securities certificate, claim from Unclaimed Suspense Account, renewal/exchange of securities certificate, endorsement, subdivision/splitting of securities

certificate, consolidation of securities certificates/folios, transmission and transposition. Accordingly, Shareholders are requested to make service requests by submitting a duly filled and signed Form ISR-4. It may be noted that any service request can be processed only after the folio is KYC compliant.

Further, SEBI vide its Circular No. SEBI/HO/MIRSD/MIRSDPoD/P/CIR/2025/97, dated July 5, 2025, has mandated to open a special window only for re-lodgement of transfer deeds, which were lodged prior to the deadline of April 1, 2019 and rejected/returned/not attended to, due to deficiency in the documents/process/or otherwise, for a period of six months from July 7, 2025 till January 6, 2026. Further, SEBI vide its Circular No. HO/38/13/11(2)2026-MIRSD-POD/I/3750/2026, dated January 30, 2026, has prescribed to open another special window for transfer and dematerialisation of physical securities which were sold/purchased prior to April 1, 2019. This special window shall be open for a period of one year from February 5, 2026 to February 4, 2027. In adherence to the above SEBI Circulars, the Company/RTA had made necessary newspaper advertisements to publicise the opening of the special window and had submitted periodical reports to SEBI in a timely manner.

Further, in order to eliminate all risks associated with physical shares and avail various benefits of dematerialisation, Members are advised to dematerialise the shares held by them in physical form. Members can contact the Company or RTA, for assistance in this regard.

Also, share transactions in electronic form can be effected in a much simpler and faster manner. After a confirmation of a sale/ purchase transaction from the broker, shareholders should approach the Depository Participant ('DP') with a request to debit or credit the account for the transaction. The DP will immediately arrange to complete the transaction by updating the account.

Shareholders should communicate with Company's RTA i.e. MCS Share Transfer Agent Limited, quoting their folio number or Depository Participant ID ('DP ID') and Client ID number, for any queries to their securities.

Shareholders are advised to refer the latest SEBI guidelines/ circular(s) issued for all the holder holding securities in listed companies in physical form from time to time and keep their KYC details updated at all times, to avoid freezing their folio as prescribed by SEBI.

Special window for re-lodgement of physical share transfer requests:

Pursuant to SEBI Circulars dated July 2, 2025 and January 6, 2026 read with SEBI Master Circular issued to RTAs dated February 6, 2026, Members who had submitted transfer deeds for physical shares before April 1, 2019, and whose requests were rejected, returned, or remained unprocessed due to deficiencies, have been provided a special re-lodgement window till February 4, 2027, to re-lodge the transfer requests. Transfers would be approved if all the requisite documents are in place. Transfer of shares under this window will be credited only in dematerialised form and will carry a one-year lock in period from the date of transfer registration. Members are requested to contact the Company or the RTA for assistance in this regard.

Simplification of Procedure for Issuance of Duplicate Share Certificates

SEBI Circular dated December 24, 2025 amended the framework for issuance of duplicate share certificates and has simplified the procedures. The value threshold for documentation has been increased from ₹5 lakh to ₹10 lakh and the documentation requirements have been standardized as under:

- › Up to ₹10,000: Undertaking on plain paper (no notarization required)
- › Above ₹10,000 and up to ₹10 lakh: Single Affidavit-cum-Indemnity Bond
- › Above ₹10 lakh: Affidavit-cum-Indemnity Bond along with FIR/Police Complaint and Newspaper Advertisement.

SEBI vide its Circular HO/38/13/(3)2026-MIRSDPOD/I/3763/2026 dated January 30, 2026, has dispensed with the requirement of issuance of Letter of Confirmation (LOC) and accordingly securities shall be credited directly to the shareholder's demat account by the Company/RTA, subject to due diligence. Requests shall be accompanied by a Client Master List not older than two months, duly attested by the Depository Participant. Any LOC issued prior to April 2, 2026 date may be submitted for dematerialisation within 120 days from its date of issuance.

Dispute Resolution Mechanism at Stock Exchange

To enable the Shareholders to raise any dispute against the Company or its RTA on delay or default in processing any investor services related request, SEBI has provided an option of 'Arbitration with Stock Exchanges (NSE and BSE)' as a Dispute Resolution Mechanism.

Online Dispute Resolution (ODR) Mechanism

SEBI vide Circular dated July 31, 2023 (updated as on December 20, 2023), read with Master Circular No. HO/38/13/(4)2026-MIRSD-POD/I/4298/2026 dated February 6, 2026, introduced the Online Dispute Resolution (ODR) Portal. As per SEBI Circulars issued from time to time, in case of any grievances, the Shareholders are advised to first approach the Company or its RTA. If the response is not received/not satisfactory, Shareholders can raise a complaint through the SEBI Complaint Redress System (SCORES) platform.

After exhausting all the above available options for resolution of the grievance, if the Shareholder is still not satisfied with the response, they can initiate dispute through the ODR Portal at <https://smartodr.in/login>. The Company's application for waiver of SOP fine was rejected by the Internal Regulatory Oversight and Review Group of BSE Limited and they have vide email dated 20th July, 2026 directed the Company to pay the aforesaid fine amount within 10 days from the date of intimation. The Company has paid the fine to BSE Limited on 21st July, 2026.

Management Discussion and Analysis Report

Overview

The objective of this report is to convey the Management's perspective on the stainless-steel industry. This Report should be read in conjunction with the Company's financial statements, the schedules and notes thereto and other information included elsewhere in the Annual Report and Annual Accounts 2025-26.

Industry Structure, Developments

The Company is primarily engaged in the manufacturing of stainless steel long products and has grown from a modest manufacturing unit into one of India's leading producers of specialty stainless-steel long products- built on a legacy of innovation, reliability and uncompromising quality. The Company has a single-site setup—from steel melting, hot rolling and cold finishing, and is serving a comprehensive range of Stainless-Steel grades, in wire rods, bars & wires to critical sectors.

These materials are engineered to deliver superior corrosion resistance, high tensile strength and durability, excellent machinability, heat resistance, cleanability & hygiene and aesthetic appeal, making it suitable for a wide range of applications in engineering, construction, infrastructure, automotive and railways, oil and gas, defense, energy, consumer durables, food processing and dairy industry, housing and pharmaceuticals etc..

Performance

FY 2025–26 was characterized by a challenging macroeconomic environment marked by subdued demand growth, geopolitical volatility, evolving market dynamics and persistent global uncertainties. Against this backdrop, your Company achieved a total income of Rs.387.22 crores during FY 2025-26 as compared to Rs.385.81 crores in the previous year. The Company posted a Loss of Rs.2.26 crores during the year. The loss is primarily attributable to Tax credit reversal of ₹ 2.79 crore.

Opportunities, Threats, Risk & Concerns

The Company is an established and recognized producer of stainless-steel long products with customers around the world. The Company's philosophy of focusing on value added products and expanding the customer base provides the necessary resilience to successfully overcome challenges through different parts of the business cycle. The Company is confident of high quality and sustainable growth and profitability and remained focused on strengthening its core business, enhancing operational performance by adding value-added products, disciplined cost management, and serving the evolving requirements of customers across its key end-use industries.

Risk is inherent in every business. The steel industry is deeply connected to the global economy. The business environment remains volatile as changing tariff rates and shifting announcements caused frontloading of trade in different phases. The geopolitical risks around trade policy uncertainty, and ongoing conflicts continued to weigh on global economic sentiment. Changes in the demand and supply scenario can cause disruptions in the global markets. Volatility in the raw materials prices can also be cause for concern. However, with ever changing market dynamics, Panchmahal Steel Limited is equipped to provide customized products and services for global markets, for volume as well as for specialty niche market requirements.

Outlook for the year 2026-27

The global business environment is changing, and every geo-political region is trying to protect its industries and economy by strengthening their safeguards and trade defense measures.

While the near-term outlook remains cautious, global steel demand is expected to stabilize and gradually improve, underpinned by structural demand growth in emerging economies and a tentative recovery in key developed markets, subject to an early resolution of the US-Iran conflict.

Amid geopolitical uncertainties, evolving trade dynamics, and shifting global supply chains, India's growth story continued to demonstrate remarkable resilience and momentum. As the nation moves towards the vision of Viksit Bharat 2047, manufacturing will play a defining role in shaping this transformation.

The long-term outlook for the Indian stainless-steel industry remains optimistic, with continued infrastructure development, industrial expansion, and supportive government policies driving its growth.

Despite challenging times, the Company is fully geared for stronger growth by producing high value niche products and concentrating more on actual user customers. India is also growing as a quality conscious market, which gives the Company an edge over competition.

NOTES FORMING PART OF THE FINANCIAL STATEMENT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31ST MARCH, 2026

COMPANY OVERVIEW AND MATERIAL ACCOUNTING POLICIES:

1. Corporate Information:

Panchmahal Steel Limited ("PSL" or the "Company") is a public Company domiciled in India and is incorporated under the provisions of the Companies Act applicable in India. Its shares are listed with Bombay Stock Exchange (BSE). The registered office of the Company is located at GIDC Industrial Estate, Kalol-389 330, Dist. Panchmahal, Gujarat. The Company is principally engaged in manufacturing of Stainless Steel Long Products viz., Bars, Rods and Wires.

The financial statements are approved by the Company's Board of Directors on 25th May, 2026.

2.1 Statement of compliance

The Company has prepared financial statements for the year ended March 31, 2026 in accordance with Indian Accounting Standards (Ind AS) notified under the Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Rules, 2015 (as amended) together with the comparative period data as at and for the year ended March 31, 2026.

2.2 Basis of preparation of financial statements:

The financial statements of the Company have been prepared in accordance with Indian Accounting Standards as prescribed under Section 133 of the Act to be read with Rule 3 of the Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Rules, 2015 and Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Amendment Rules, 2016. The financial statements for the year ended 31st March 2026 are prepared in accordance with Ind AS.

2.3 Composition of Financial Statements

The financial statements are drawn up in Indian Rupees, the functional currency of the Company, and in accordance with Ind AS presentation. The financial statements comprise:

- Balance Sheet
- Statement of Profit and Loss
- Statement of Changes in Equity
- Statement of Cash Flow
- Notes to Financial Statements

2.4 Material Accounting Policies

A. Key Accounting Estimates, Assumptions and Management Judgments:

In preparing the financial statements, management has made judgments, estimates and assumptions that affect the application of accounting policies and the reported amounts of assets, liabilities, income and expenses. Actual results may differ from these estimates. Any revision to such estimates is recognized in the period in which the same is determined.

Estimates and assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Any change in these estimates and assumptions will generally be reflected in the financial statements in current period or prospectively, unless they are required to be treated retrospectively under relevant accounting standard.

B. Historical cost convention:

The financial statements have been prepared on a historical cost basis, except the following:

- Certain financial assets and liabilities that are measured at fair value;
- Defined benefit plans- measured at fair value

C. Functional and presentation currency:

These financial statements are presented in Indian Rupees, which is the Company's functional currency.

D. Current and non-current classification:

The Company presents assets and liabilities in the balance sheet based on current/non-current classification.

An asset as current when it is:

- Expected to be realised or intended to sold or consumed in normal operating cycle
- Held primarily for the purpose of trading
- Expected to be realised within twelve months after the reporting period, or
- Cash or cash equivalent unless restricted from being exchanged or used to settle a liability for at least twelve months after the reporting period

All other assets are classified as non-current.

A liability is current when:

- It is expected to be settled in normal operating cycle
- It is held primarily for the purpose of trading
- It is due to be settled within twelve months after the reporting period, or
- There is no unconditional right to defer the settlement of the liability for at least twelve months after the reporting period.

All other liabilities are classified as non-current.

Deferred tax assets and liabilities are classified as non-current assets and liabilities.

E. Property, Plant and Equipment:**Recognition and measurement**

Property, plant and equipment are recorded at cost of acquisition/construction less accumulated depreciation and impairment losses, if any. Cost comprises of purchase price including non-refundable purchase taxes and any directly attributable cost of bringing the assets to its working condition and location for its intended use.

If significant parts of an item of property, plant and equipment have different useful lives, then they are accounted for, as separate items (major components) of property, plant and equipment. Any gains or losses on their disposal, determined by comparing sales proceeds with carrying amount, are recognized in the Statement of Profit or Loss.

Subsequent Expenditure

Subsequent expenditure on major maintenance or repairs includes the cost of the replacement of parts of assets and overhaul costs. Where an asset or part of an asset is replaced and it is probable that future economic benefits associated with the item will be available to the Company, the expenditure is capitalized and the carrying amount of the item replaced is derecognized. Similarly, overhaul cost associated with major maintenance are capitalized and depreciated over their useful lives where it is probable that future economic benefits will be available and any remaining carrying amount of the cost of previous overhauls are derecognized. All other costs are expensed as incurred.

Depreciation

Depreciation is recognized so as to write off the cost of the assets (other than freehold land and Capital work in progress) less their residual values over their useful lives, using the straight line method as per the useful life prescribed in Schedule II of the Companies Act, 2013. The Estimated useful lives, residual values and depreciation method are reviewed at the end of each reporting period, with the effect of any changes in the estimated accounted for on a prospective basis. The estimated useful lives are as mentioned below:

De-Recognition

An item of property, plant and equipment is derecognized upon disposal or when no future economic benefits are expected to arise from the continued use of that asset. Any gain or loss arising on the disposal or retirement of an item of property, plant and equipment is determined as the difference between the net disposal proceeds and the carrying amount of the asset and is recognized in the Statement of Profit and loss.

Capital Work-in-Progress

Project under commissioning and/or construction wherein assets are not ready for use in the manner intended by the management are carried at cost. At the point when an asset is operating at management's intended use, the cost of construction and/or commissioning is transferred to the appropriate category of property, plant and equipment.

F. Impairment of Assets:

The carrying values of assets / cash generating units at each balance sheet date are reviewed for impairment if any indication of impairment exists. If the carrying amount of the assets exceeds the estimated recoverable amount, impairment is recognised for such excess amount. The impairment loss is recognised as an expense in the Statement of Profit and Loss

G. Inventories:

Inventories are stated at the lower of cost and net realisable value. Cost is ascertained on a weighted average basis. Costs comprise direct materials and, where applicable, direct labour costs and those overheads that have been incurred in bringing the inventories to their present location and condition. Net realisable value is the price at which the inventories can be realised in the normal course of business after allowing for the cost of conversion from their existing state to a finished condition and for the cost of marketing, selling and distribution.

Provisions are made to cover slow-moving and obsolete items based on historical experience of utilisation on a product category basis, which involves individual businesses considering their product lines and market conditions.

H. Trade receivables:

Trade receivables that do not contain a significant financing component are measured at transaction price less any provisions for doubtful debts based on expected credit loss calculation. Provisions are made where

there is evidence of a risk of non-payment, taking into account ageing, previous experience and general economic conditions. When a trade receivable is determined to be uncollectable it is written off, firstly against any provision available and then to the Statement of Profit and Loss.

I. Financial instruments:

Financial instruments are recognized when the Company becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

i) Financial Assets:

Initial recognition and measurement

All financial assets except trade receivables that do not contain a significant financing component are recognized initially at fair value plus, in the case of financial assets not recorded at fair value through profit or loss, transaction costs that are attributable to the acquisition of the financial asset. Purchases or sales of financial assets that require delivery of assets within a time frame established by regulation or convention in the market place (regular way trades) are recognised on the trade date i.e, the date that the Company commits to purchase or sell the asset.

Subsequent measurement

For the purpose of subsequent measurement, financial assets are classified in three categories:

a) Amortized Cost:

A financial asset is subsequently measured at amortized cost if it is held within a business model with the objective of collecting the contractual cash flows and the contractual terms of the financial asset give rise on specified dates to cash flows that are solely payments of principal and interest on the principal outstanding.

Financial assets at amortized cost includes loans receivable, trade and other receivable and other financial assets that are held with the object of collecting contractual cash flows. After initial measurement at fair value, the financial assets are measured at amortized cost using the effective interest rate (EIR) method less impairment.

b) Fair Value through Other Comprehensive Income:

A financial asset is subsequently measured at fair value through other comprehensive income if it is held within the business model whose objective is achieved by both collecting contractual cash flows and selling financial assets and the contractual terms of the financial asset give rise on specified dates to cash flows that are solely payments of principal and interest on the principal amount outstanding.

Movements in the carrying amount are taken through other comprehensive income, except for recognition of impairment gains or losses, interest revenue and foreign exchange gains and losses which are recognized in the Statement of Profit and Loss.

c) Fair Value through Profit or Loss:

Financial assets, which are not classified in any of the above categories, are subsequently fair valued through profit or loss.

d) De-recognition

The Company derecognizes a financial asset when the contractual rights to the cash flows from the asset expire or when it transfers the financial asset and substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership of the asset to another party.

e) Impairment

The Company recognizes loss allowance using the expected credit loss (ECL) model for the financial

assets, which are not fair valued through profit or loss/OCI. Loss allowance for trade receivables with no significant financing component is measured at an amount equal to lifetime ECL. Trade receivables are of short duration, normally less than twelve months and hence the loss allowance measured as lifetime ECL does not differ from that measured as twelve months ECL. For all other financial assets, expected credit losses are measured at an amount equal to the twelve months ECL, unless there has been a significant increase in credit risk from initial recognition in which case those are measured at lifetime ECL.

ii) Financial Liabilities:

Initial recognition and measurement

The financial liabilities are classified at initial recognition as at fair value through profit or loss or as those measured at amortized cost. The Company's financial liabilities include trade and other payables, loans and borrowings including bank overdrafts and financial guarantee contracts.

Subsequent measurement

The subsequent measurement of financial liabilities depends on their classification as under:

a) Fair Value through Profit or Loss:

Financial liabilities at fair value through profit or loss include financial liabilities held for trading. The Company has not designated any financial liabilities upon initial recognition at fair value through profit or loss.

b) Amortized Cost:

After initial recognition, interest bearing loans and borrowings are subsequently measured at amortized cost using the effecting interest rate method.

c) De-recognition :

A financial liability is derecognized when the obligation under the liability is discharged or cancelled or expires. Gains and losses are recognized in Statement of Profit and Loss when the liabilities are derecognized as well as through the Effective Interest rate (EIR) amortization process.

J. Cash and Cash equivalents:

Cash and cash equivalents comprise cash at bank and in hand and short-term deposits with an original maturity of three months or less, which are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value.

Cash Flow Statement:

Cash flow are reported using indirect method, whereby net profit before tax is adjusted for the effects of transactions of a non-cash nature, any deferrals of accruals of past or future operating cash receipts or payments and item of income or expenses associated with investing or financing cash flows. The cash flows from operating, investing and finance activities of the Company are segregated.

K. Foreign Currencies:

Initial Recognition

The financial statements are presented in Indian Rupees which is the Company's functional and presentation currency.

Conversion

Transactions in foreign currencies are initially recorded at the exchange rate prevailing at the date of the transaction. Monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are retranslated into functional currency at the rates prevailing on the reporting date.

Foreign exchange gains and losses are presented in the Statement of Profit and Loss on a net basis within other gains/(losses).

L. Revenue Recognition:

Revenue is measured based on the identification of performance obligations in a contract and is recognised when or as those performance obligations are satisfied. Revenue towards satisfaction of performance obligation is measured at the amount of transaction price (net of variable consideration) allocated to that performance obligation. The transaction price of goods sold and services rendered if any are net off variable consideration on account of various discounts, schemes, rebates offered by the company as the part of the contract.

Revenue from contracts with customers is recognised when control of the goods or services are transferred to the customer.

Revenue is recognised when the amount can be measured reliably, it is probable that the economic benefits associated with the transaction will flow to the company, the costs incurred or to be incurred can be measured reliably.

Sale of Goods

With regard to sale of goods revenue is recognized when significant control connected with the ownership have been transferred to the Customers. This usually occurs upon dispatch after the price has been determined. The company does not provide any extended warranties or maintenance contract to its customers. Sales are stated net of returns, trade discounts, and other applicable taxes or duties collected on behalf of the government.

Income from operations includes revenue earned on account of job work income which is accounted as per the terms agreed with the customers.

M. Other Income:

Interest Income

Interest income from a financial asset is recognized when it is probable that the economic benefits will flow to the Company and the amount of income can be measured reliably. Interest income is accrued on time basis and is included in other income in the Statement of Profit and Loss.

Export Incentives

Export incentives available under prevalent schemes are recognized as income in the year of exports and when there is reasonable assurance that the Company will comply with the conditions and the incentives will be received.

The benefits accrued under the duty drawback scheme as per the Import and export Policy in respect of exports under the said scheme are recognized when there is a reasonable assurance that the benefit will be received and the company will comply with all attached conditions. The above benefit has been included under the head 'Export Incentives.'

N. Employee Benefits:

A liability is recognized in respect of short-term employee benefits accruing to employees in respect of wages and salaries in the period the related service is rendered at the undiscounted amount of the benefits expected to be paid in exchange for that service.

Contribution towards defined benefit contribution schemes

Company's contribution to Provident Fund, Superannuation Fund, Employee State Insurance and other funds are determined under the relevant schemes and/or statute and charged to revenue.

Defined Benefit Obligation Plans:

Gratuity

The Company operates a defined benefit gratuity plan which requires contributions to be made to a separately administered fund held with Life Insurance of India.

The cost of providing benefits under the defined benefit plan is determined using the projected unit credit method.

The service cost and the net interest cost are charged to the Statement of Profit and Loss. Actuarial gains and losses arise due to re-measurement as result of the actual experience and the assumed parameters and changes in the assumptions used for valuation are recognized in the Other Comprehensive Income (OCI).

Compensated absences

The Company has a policy to allow accumulation of leave by employees up to certain days. The excess leave will be encashed. Accordingly, the excess leave liability is discharged by the Company. Remaining accumulated leave liability as at the year end is provided.

O. Borrowing Costs:

Borrowings are initially recognised at fair value, net of transaction costs incurred. Borrowings are subsequently measured at amortised cost. Any difference between the proceeds (net of transaction costs) and the redemption amount is recognised in profit or loss over the period of the borrowings using the effective interest method.

Borrowing Costs directly attributable to acquisition or construction of qualifying fixed assets are capitalized as part of cost of such assets. A qualifying asset is one that necessarily takes substantial period of time to get ready for its intended use.

All other borrowing costs are charged to the Statement of Profit and Loss account in the year in which they are incurred.

P. Taxation:

Current Income Tax

Income tax expense comprises of current tax and deferred tax. Income tax expense is recognized in the Statement of Profit and Loss except to the extent that it relates to items recognized directly in equity/OCI, in which case it is recognized in Other Comprehensive Income. Tax on income for the current period is determined on the basis of taxable income and tax credits computed in accordance with the provisions of the Income Tax Act, 1961 using the tax rates and tax laws that have been enacted or substantively enacted on the reporting date. The Company offsets current tax assets and current tax liabilities, where it has a legally enforceable right to set off the recognized amounts and where it intends either to settle on a net basis, or to realize the asset and settle the liability simultaneously.

Deferred Tax

Deferred income tax assets and liabilities are recognized for all temporary differences arising between the tax bases of assets and liabilities and their carrying amounts in the financial statements. Deferred income tax is determined using tax rates and laws that have been enacted or substantially enacted by the end of the reporting period and are expected to apply when the related deferred income tax assets is realized or the deferred income tax liability is settled.

Deferred tax assets are recognized for all deductible temporary differences and unused tax losses only if it is probable that future taxable amounts will be available to utilize those temporary differences and losses. Deferred tax assets and liabilities are offset when there is a legally enforceable right to offset current tax assets and liabilities and when the deferred tax balances relate to the same taxation authority.

Q. Provisions, Contingent Liabilities and Contingent Assets:

Provisions:

Provisions are recognised when the Company has a present obligation (legal or constructive) as a result of a past event, it is probable that an outflow of resources embodying economic benefits will be required to settle the obligation and a reliable estimate can be made of the amount of the obligation. When the Company expects some or all of a provision to be reimbursed, for example, under an insurance contract, the reimbursement is recognised as a separate asset, but only when the reimbursement is virtually certain. The expense relating to a provision is presented in the Statement of Profit and Loss net of any reimbursement.

Contingent Liabilities:

Contingent liability is disclosed for (i) Possible obligations which will be confirmed only by the future events not wholly within the control of the company or (ii) Present obligations arising from past events where it is not probable that an outflow of resources will be required to settle the obligation or a reliable estimate of the amount of the obligation cannot be made.

Contingent Assets:

Contingent Assets are not recognised but are disclosed in the notes to the financial statements.

The Provisions, contingent liabilities and contingent assets are reviewed at each balance sheet date.

R. Earnings Per Share:

Basic earnings per share are calculated by dividing the net profit or loss for the period attributable to equity shareholders by the weighted average number of equity shares outstanding during the period.

For the purpose of calculating diluted earnings per share, the net profit or loss for the period attributable to equity shareholders and the weighted average number of shares outstanding during the period are adjusted for the effects of all dilutive potential equity shares.

2.5. Recent pronouncements

The Ministry of Corporate Affairs ("MCA") notifies new standards or amendments to existing standards under the Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Rules from time to time. MCA has notified amendments to Ind AS 1 – Presentation of Financial Statements (classification of liabilities as current or non current, including liabilities with covenants), Ind AS 12 – Income Taxes (International Tax Reform – Pillar Two Model Rules), Ind AS 21 – The Effects of Changes in Foreign Exchange Rates (Lack of Exchangeability), and Ind AS 7 – Statement of Cash Flows and Ind AS 107 – Financial Instruments: Disclosures (Supplier Finance Arrangements), effective from April 1, 2025. The Company has reviewed these amendments and based on its evaluation, has determined that they do not have any impact on the Company's financial statements. However, pursuant to the adoption of the amendments to Ind AS 7 and Ind AS 107, the Company has provided the required disclosures relating to liabilities under supplier finance arrangements in the notes to the financial statements.

New standards or amendments not yet adopted

Classification of Liabilities as Current or Non-current and Non-current Liabilities with Covenants – Amendments to Ind AS 1 - The amendments clarify that lender waivers obtained after the reporting date cannot be considered for the purpose of classifying liabilities as current or non current and require retrospective application in accordance with Ind AS 8. These amendments are effective for reporting periods beginning on or after April 1, 2026. The Company does not expect any material impact on its financial statements.

Salary Risk: The present value of the defined benefit plan liability is calculated by reference to the future salaries of members. As such, an increase in the salary of the members more than assumed level will increase the plan's liability.

Investment Risk: The present value of the defined benefit plan liability is calculated using a discount rate which is determined by reference to market yields at the end of the reporting period on government bonds. If the return on plan asset is below this rate, it will create a plan deficit. Currently, for the plan in India, it has a relatively balanced mix of investments in government securities, and other debt instruments.

Asset Liability Matching Risk: The plan faces the ALM risk as to the matching cash flow. Since the plan is invested in lines of Rule 101 of Income Tax Rules, 1962, this generally reduces ALM risk.

Mortality risk: Since the benefits under the plan is not payable for life time and payable till retirement age only, plan does not have any longevity risk.

Concentration Risk: Plan has a concentration risk as all the assets are invested with the insurance company and a default will wipe out all the assets. Although probability of this is very less as insurance companies have to follow regulatory guidelines.

Characteristics of defined benefit plans

During the year, there were no plan amendments, curtailments and settlements.

38 Financial Risk Management

The Company's Board of Directors has overall responsibility for the establishment and oversight of the Company's risk management framework.

The Company's risk management policies are established to identify and analyse the risks faced by the Company, to set appropriate risk limits and controls and to monitor risks. Risk management policies and systems are reviewed regularly to reflect changes in market conditions and the Company's activities.

(A) Credit risk

Credit risk is the risk of incurring a loss that may arise from a borrower or customer failing to make required payments. Credit risk arises mainly from outstanding receivables from free market dealers, cash and cash equivalents, employee advances and security deposits. The Company manages and analyses the credit risk for each of its new clients before standard payment and delivery terms and conditions are offered.

The Company's exposure to credit risk is influenced mainly by the individual characteristics of each customer. The demographics of the customer and including the default risk of the industry, also has an influence on credit risk assessment. Credit risk is managed through credit approvals, establishing credit limits and continuously monitoring the creditworthiness of customers to which the Company grants credit terms in the normal course of business.

The Company considers the probability of default upon initial recognition of asset and whether there has been a significant increase in credit risk on an ongoing basis through each reporting period. To assess whether there is a significant increase in credit risk the Company compares the risk of default occurring on asset as at the reporting date with the risk of default as at the date of initial recognition. It considers reasonable and supportive forwarding-looking information such as:

- i) Actual or expected significant adverse changes in business;
- ii) Actual or expected significant changes in the operating results of the counterparty;
- iii) Financial or economic conditions that are expected to cause a significant change to the counterparty's ability to meet its obligations;
- iv) Significant increase in credit risk on other financial instruments of the same counterparty;
- v) Significant changes in the value of the collateral supporting the obligation or in the quality of the third-party guarantees or credit enhancements.

Financial assets are written off when there is no reasonable expectations of recovery, such as a debtor failing to engage in a repayment plan with the Company. Where loans or receivables have been written off, the Company continues to engage in enforcement activity to attempt to recover the receivable due. Where recoveries are made, these are recognized as income in the statement of profit and loss.

(i) Trade Receivables

For trade receivables, the Company applies the simplified approach permitted by Ind AS 109 Financial Instrument, which requires expected lifetime losses to be recognized from initial recognition of the receivables. When determining whether the credit risk of a financial asset has increased significantly since initial recognition and when estimating expected credit Losses (ECL), the Company considers reasonable and relevant information that is available without undue cost or effort.
