Putin’s Kuril Visit Signals Russia’s Strategic Resolve in the Pacific

Russian President Vladimir Putin’s first visit to the disputed Kuril Islands since coming to power has reopened one of East Asia’s longest-running territorial disputes and underscored the growing military importance of Russia’s Far Eastern frontier.

Putin travelled to Iturup, one of the four southern Kuril Islands claimed by Japan, on Thursday, August 13, visiting the Yasny fish-processing complex and meeting local residents. The visit immediately triggered a strong protest from Tokyo, which regards Iturup, known in Japan as Etorofu, as part of its Northern Territories. Japanese Foreign Minister Toshimitsu Motegi formally protested the Russian president’s presence on territory which Tokyo continues to claim.

For Moscow, however, the visit carries significance well beyond the territorial dispute. The Kuril chain occupies a strategically important position between Japan’s Hokkaido and Russia’s Kamchatka Peninsula, separating the Sea of Okhotsk from the Pacific Ocean. Control of the southern Kurils gives Russia access to critical maritime approaches and strengthens its ability to monitor and defend its Far Eastern military bastion.

The timing is particularly significant. Putin’s visit followed major Russian naval exercises in the Far East and came amid heightened military activity involving North Korea, including a ballistic-missile launch. Taken together, these developments highlight the increasingly integrated security environment developing around Russia’s Pacific territories, Japan and the Korean Peninsula.

A Dispute Rooted in the Final Days of World War II

The territorial dispute dates to the final days of the Second World War. The Soviet Union declared war on Japan on August 8, 1945, and Soviet forces subsequently occupied the southern Kuril Islands. Japan maintains that the four islands of Iturup, Kunashir, Shikotan and the Habomai islets are inherently Japanese territory and refers to them collectively as the Northern Territories.

Russia administers the islands and has maintained a military presence there for decades. The dispute has prevented Moscow and Tokyo from concluding a formal post-war peace treaty, leaving the territorial question as a persistent obstacle to relations.

The islands are not merely symbols of national sovereignty. Their location gives them considerable military value. The Kuril chain stretches for roughly 1,150 kilometres from Hokkaido towards the Kamchatka Peninsula, creating a natural barrier around the Sea of Okhotsk. Russian defence planners have long regarded the region as an important area for protecting naval forces, securing maritime approaches and controlling access between the Pacific Ocean and the Sea of Okhotsk.

During the Cold War, Moscow developed military infrastructure on the islands, including air and naval facilities. Their strategic importance has increased rather than diminished as Russia has sought to reinforce its Pacific Fleet and strengthen its eastern military posture. **The Military Geography Matters**

From a defence perspective, Iturup and Kunashir are particularly important because of their proximity to Hokkaido and the northern approaches to Japan. Russian military deployments on the islands allow Moscow to extend surveillance and defensive capabilities across a strategically sensitive part of the North Pacific.

The geography also matters for maritime power. The Kuril straits provide access between the Pacific and the Sea of Okhotsk, an area closely associated with Russia’s strategic naval interests. Japanese and Russian forces therefore operate in a region where territorial sovereignty, naval access, air power and missile capabilities overlap.

For Japan, the issue is consequently not simply historical. Russian military activity on the islands is viewed in the broader context of Japan’s increasingly difficult security environment, which also includes China’s military expansion and North Korea’s missile and nuclear programmes.

Diplomacy That Never Delivered a Peace Treaty

Moscow and Tokyo have repeatedly attempted to resolve the dispute. When diplomatic relations were restored in 1956, the Soviet Union indicated that Shikotan and the Habomai islets could potentially be transferred to Japan after the conclusion of a peace treaty. Subsequent negotiations, however, failed to produce a final settlement.

The dispute survived the collapse of the Soviet Union in 1991 and continued through several rounds of Russian-Japanese diplomacy. Putin himself once pursued improved relations with Tokyo, but the strategic environment changed dramatically after Russia’s invasion of Ukraine in 2022. Japan joined Western sanctions against Moscow, while Russia moved closer to China and strengthened its relationship with North Korea.

The deterioration in Russian-Japanese relations has effectively frozen prospects for a territorial settlement.

A Message Beyond Japan

Putin’s decision to personally visit Iturup sends a powerful political message: Moscow considers its sovereignty over the southern Kurils settled and is prepared to demonstrate that position at the highest level.

The visit also comes at a time when Russia is attempting to reinforce its strategic position in the Indo-Pacific despite its continuing war in Ukraine. By combining military exercises, political signalling and presidential visits, Moscow is demonstrating that its Far Eastern military posture remains a priority.

For Tokyo, the episode is another reminder that Japan’s northern flank cannot be considered separately from the wider security architecture of the Indo-Pacific. The Kuril Islands sit at the intersection of Russian, Japanese and wider US-allied strategic interests.

The immediate dispute may be diplomatic, but its underlying importance is military. The Kurils are a chain of islands that can influence naval access, air surveillance, missile deployment and control of maritime approaches. Putin’s visit has therefore done more than revive an old territorial quarrel. It has highlighted the continuing strategic value of the Kuril chain—and Russia’s determination to retain it.

Kite fest turns sky into canvas of colours
