Unbeaten French GM Firouzja emerges champ

Chennai, July 23: French Grand Master Alireza Firouzja emerged champion of the fourth edition of the Quantbox Chennai Grand Masters 2026 after holding India’s Arjun Erigaisi to a draw in the seventh and final round at The Westin Chennai Velachery Hotel on Wednesday.

Firouzja’s unbeaten run, built on two victories and five draws, underlined his consistency and composure under pressure as he lifted one of the most coveted titles on the Indian chess calendar.

The prestigious tournament, regarded as India’s premier classical chess event, concluded with Firouzja finishing unbeaten to clinch the title and the winner’s prize of Rs. 25,00,000. Organised by MGD1, the event featured eight elite Grand Masters competing in a double round-robin format for valuable FIDE Circuit points and a total prize purse of Rs. 75,00,000.

Firouzja laid the foundation for his triumph by winning his opening two games before adopting a steady approach over the remaining rounds. Entering the final day with a half-point lead over Arjun Erigaisi and Uzbekistan’s Nodirbek Abdusattorov, the French star knew that a draw would be enough to secure the championship, provided his closest challengers failed to overtake him.

The title race effectively swung in Firouzja’s favour when Abdusattorov, who needed a victory with the black pieces to keep his hopes alive, suffered a defeat against Russia’s Dmitry Andreikin in just 37 moves. The result ended the Uzbek Grand Master’s challenge and left Firouzja needing only a draw against Erigaisi.

The French Grand Master produced another composed display,



neutralising Erigaisi’s attempts to create winning chances. The game entered a balanced rook-and-pawn endgame, where Firouzja comfortably held his ground before the players agreed to a draw after 41 moves, sealing the title.

Andreikin’s victory over Abdusattorov enabled the Russian to finish with four points, level with Erigaisi in second place. Andreikin also ended the tournament unbeaten, matching Firouzja’s achievement of not losing a single game.

Abdusattorov shared fourth place on 3.5 points alongside Indian Grand Masters Nihal Sarin and M. Pranesh, both of whom produced several impressive performances during the week-long competition.

The tournament proved disappointing for reigning World Champion D. Gukesh, who endured a difficult campaign. The Indian star lost three of his seven games and finished at the bottom of the standings with just two points.

Kuldeep to play for Yorkshire in UK league

London, July 23: Yorkshire have signed India international spin bowler Kuldeep Yadav for part of this year’s One-Day Cup and County Championship.

The 31-year-old will join the White Rose for five One-Day Cup fixtures and will then return for three of the last four County Championship fixtures in September.

He will now go straight into the squad for Friday’s one-day fixture against Glamorgan in south Wales, according to BBC Sport.

“I’m really pleased to be joining Yorkshire and grateful for this opportunity. It will be a real privilege to represent a club with Yorkshire’s proud history,” he said.

“I’ve always enjoyed the challenge of playing in English conditions and after speaking with the management, I became really excited to join up with the team and I’m looking forward to making a positive contribution during my time at Headingley.” The left-arm spinner has taken 79 wickets with best figures of 5-40 in 18 Test matches and previously played against England in 2024, taking 19 wickets across the five-match series.

In one-day international cricket Kuldeep, who has missed all three of India’s ODIs against England this summer, has taken a total of 194 wickets with his best return 6-25.

“Kuldeep is an accomplished, international quality player who will add incredible strength to our line-up for these blocks of fixtures,” Yorkshire general manager of cricket Gavin Hamilton said.

“Given the dry summer we’ve experienced, we expect spin to play an important role during the closing stages of the season. Kuldeep gives us another dimension with his left-arm wrist spin and brings a wealth of experience at the highest level. We’re delighted to welcome him to Yorkshire.

Action at the Senior World Fencing Championships continues on Thursday, with two key qualification events featuring Indian athletes on the strip: Men’s Individual Epee (Qualification):India’s campaign will be spearheaded by Sherjin Rajendran Shanthimol, Joseph Bennet, Siva Magesh Sathasivan Nirmala, and Shaurya Ashwini.

Women’s Individual Sabre (Qualification):Representing India will be Shreya Gupta, Jefarlin Jani Rexlin Simla, Shruti Joshi and Aakhri.

Ayush stuns World No. 11 in China Open

Changzhou, July 23: Fresh from ending her title drought by winning the Japan Open on Saturday, P.V. Sindhu continued her impressive run of form with a hard-fought first-round win at the China Open, while Ayush Shetty pulled off one of the biggest upsets of the day by defeating Indonesia’s World No. 11 Alwi Farhan to reach the men’s singles pre-quarterfinals in Changzhou on Wednesday.

The two-time Olympic medallist defeated fellow Indian Unnati Hooda 21-14, 9-21, 21-10 in a 56-minute contest. The victory also gave Sindhu a measure of revenge after Hooda had knocked her out of the China Open last year.Although the Hyderabad shuttler lost the second game, she bounced back strongly in the decider to seal her place in the second round.

Sindhu will next face a tough challenge against fourth seed and former Olympic champion Chen Yufei of China. The Indian will head into the match with confidence after beating Chen during her title-winning run at the Japan Open.

Ayush Shetty also enjoyed a memorable day, defeating former World Junior champion Alwi

Farhan 21-17, 5-21, 21-17 to book his place in the last 16.The win was particularly satisfying for Shetty, who had lost to Farhan in the semifinals of the 2023 World Junior Championships. After taking the opening game, the Indian struggled in the second as Farhan fought back strongly. However, Shetty regained control in the decider and held his nerve to register one of the biggest wins of his senior career.

Lakshya Sen dug deep to secure a hard-fought 22-20, 14-21, 21-15 victory over Japan’s Yushi Tanaka in a thrilling first-round encounter. India’s doubles campaign, however, ended in disappointment.

In mixed doubles, Rohan Kapoor and Ruthvika Shivani Gadde lost in straight games to top seeds Yan Zhe Feng and Dong Ping Huang. Dhruv Kapila and Tanisha Crasto also bowed out after suffering a defeat against China’s Xin Wa Guo and Fang Hui Chen.

In men’s doubles, M.R. Arjun and Hariharan Amsakarunan were beaten by fourth seeds Wei Keng Liang and Chang Wang, ending India’s challenge in the discipline.

Taniksha, Prachi script history at World Fencing

Hong Kong, July 23: Indian fencing achieved a monumental milestone on the opening day of the Senior World Fencing Championships 2026, held at the AsiaWorld-Expo in Hong Kong.

The flagship nine-day global tournament, featuring over 1,000 elite athletes from more than 100 nations, kicked off its Day 1 schedule.

India’s 24-member national contingent-comprising 12 men and 12 women across all three fencing disciplines-made an immediate statement as epee fencers Taniksha Khatri and Prachi Lohan created history by becoming the first-ever Indian women’s epee fencers to qualify for the Main Table of 64 (Direct Elimination Round) at the Senior World Championships.

Navigating past fierce competition in round-robin pool play and grueling preliminary elimination rounds against the world’s top-ranked blade artists, both Taniksha and Prachi earned their spots in the elite main draw, marking an unprecedented leap forward for the sport in India.

Expressing his delight over this historic feat, Rajeev Mehta, Secretary General of the Fencing Confederation of Asia and the Fencing Association of India, praised the athletes’ perseverance and growing stature on the international stage: “I am immensely proud and delighted to witness this historic achievement by Taniksha Khatri and Prachi Lohan. Their qualification for the Main Table of 64 at the Senior World Fencing Championships is a landmark moment for Indian fencing and reflects their exceptional talent, dedication, and perseverance. This remarkable feat is a testament to the growing standard of Indian fencing and will inspire many young athletes to excel on the international stage. I congratulate both fencers, their coaches, and the entire support team on this memorable success.”

In the Men’s Individual Foil event held during Day 1, India’s four-member squad gained valuable top-tier exposure against international opposition. Sachin led the Indian contingent with a 107th place finish, followed by Aditya at 137th,

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Refusing to Remove Your Cataract..!

Have we all gone blind?
Or is it only our young people whose eyes are still open?

As students pour onto the streets in protest, we should begin asking what they are seeing that we have chosen to ignore.

Since 2014, India has witnessed more than 150 examination paper leaks. Behind every leaked paper is not merely an administrative failure but a young life shaken to its core. Imagine burning the midnight oil for months, sacrificing sleep, entertainment and friendships, only to discover that somebody else bought tomorrow’s question paper yesterday.

What does that tell us?

It tells us that corruption is no longer hiding in dark corners. It is standing in the middle of the street, waving cheerfully while we pretend not to notice.

But the examination hall is only one room in a much larger building called corruption.

Imagine voters standing in the blazing sun for hours, travelling long distances to cast their vote, only to find out later that the representative they elected was persuaded through pressure,

inducement or political bargaining to join the ruling side.

Imagine honest journalists returning from weeks of investigation getting to know that their reports will never see the light of day because their editor or publisher fears the consequences of jail.

Imagine the poor and hungry knowing fully well, that their suffering will never be reflected honestly in reports, statistics or official claims.

Are we blind to this rampant corruption, or do we have cataracts in our eyes?

The frightening thing about cataracts is that they do not arrive overnight. Vision fades gradually. At first everything appears only slightly blurred. Then the blur becomes normal. Eventually we convince ourselves that what we are seeing is perfectly clear.

Perhaps that is what has happened to many of us.

We have become distracted by endless talks over religion, temples, slogans, personalities and political theatre, while this terrible corruption has quietly grown stronger behind the curtain.

The students protesting today

have been the first to recognise what many adults have accepted as inevitable.

History has shown repeatedly that every great movement begins with a handful of people refusing to accept what everyone else has normalised.

We have normalised corruption!

These protests are not the end of the story. They are the first crack in the wall.

Time to remove your blindfolds of prejudice, personality worship and endless distraction, or one day future generations will ask why you remained silent when the warning signs were so obvious.

The tragedy is not that corruption exists.

The greater tragedy is when decent people like you and me get accustomed to it.

So, before you accuse our young of rebellion, perhaps we should thank them for reminding us to open our eyes.

Otherwise, history may simply record that we the older generation did not just lose our eyesight. We refused to remove our cataract...!

Gill, Kohli close in on top ODI ranking

Dubai, July 23:

A trio of in-form stars from India Shubman Gill, Virat Kohli and Rohit Sharma have closed in on the premier position at the top of the ICC Men’s ODI Batter Rankings.

New Zealander Daryl Mitchell holds on to a narrow lead as the No.1 ranked batter in 50-over cricket, but Gill (second), Kohli (third) and Rohit (fourth) have all made ground following some big efforts for India during their recent ODI series against England.

Gill managed 188 runs across the three matches to close within one rating point of Mitchell (802 Rating Points) at the top, while Kohli (767 Points) and Rohit (758 Points) are also within striking distance following some decent efforts across the recent three-game series that England won 2-1.

It was veteran Joe Root that proved the difference between the two sides with 249 runs without being dismissed and the right-hander was rewarded as he rose four places to move to eighth on the same rankings list for ODI batters.

England teammates Ben Duckett (up 11 spots to equal 19th) and Jacob Bethell (up five rungs to 64th) also made ground on the list for ODI batters, while New Zealand duo Michael Bracewell (up six slots to 54th) and Mark Chapman (up 10 places to 62nd) were other major beneficiaries on this rankings category following some good efforts with the bat against the West Indies.

Afghanistan spinner

Rashid Khan remains at the top of the rankings for ODI bowlers, with England pace spearhead Jofra Archer among the big movers this week as he gains one place to move to third and right on the heels of second-placed Abrar Ahmed following his five wickets across the series against India.

West Indies spinner Gudakesh Motie (up seven places to equal ninth) is another big mover inside the top 10, while teammate Alzarri Joseph (up 10 slots to 26th), Bracewell (up 14 spots to 29th) and India spinner Axar Patel (up 10 rungs to equal 32nd) are among the other players to make ground.

Bracewell also makes eye-catching progress on the latest rankings for ODI all-rounders, with the experienced 35-year-old improving two places to a new career-high rating in third place behind Afghanistan’s Azmatullah Omarzai and Bangladesh’s Mehidy Hazan Miraz.

There is also some change on the updated T20I rankings following the completion of the three-game series between Zimbabwe and Bangladesh, with players from both sides making inroads in the shortest format.Zimbabwe right-hander Brian Bennett achieves a new career-high rating by gaining two places to move to ninth for T20I batters, while Bangladesh duo Tanzid Hasan (up seven slots to 20th) and Saif Hassan (up nine spots to

27th) also make ground.

There was more joy for Bangladesh following their series triumph as Mahedi Hasan (up four rungs to 19th) and Rishad Hossain (up eight slots

to equal 25th) improved up the rankings for T20I bowlers, while Zimbabwe will be buoyed by the gains made by Richard Ngarava (up 37 places to 32nd).
