NOTES:

1. In accordance with the provisions of the Act, read with the Rules made thereunder and General Circular nos. 14/2020 dated 8th April, 2020, 17/2020 dated 13th April, 2020, 20/2020 dated 5th May, 2020, 02/2021 dated 13th January, 2021, 21/2021 dated 14th December, 2021, 2/2022 dated 5th May, 2022, 10/2022 dated 28th December, 2022, 09/2023 dated 25th September, 2023, 09/2024 dated 19th September, 2024 and 03/2025 dated 22nd September, 2025, issued by the Ministry of Corporate Affairs ("MCA") read with relevant circulars issued by the Securities and Exchange Board of India ("SEBI"), from time to time (hereinafter collectively referred to as "the Circulars"), companies are allowed to hold AGM through Video Conference ("VC") or Other Audio Visual Means ("OAVM") in accordance with the requirements prescribed under the said Circulars, until further orders. Accordingly, the AGM of the Company is being conducted through VC/OAVM, and the registered office of the Company shall be deemed to be the venue of the AGM.
2. The relevant details with respect to Item No. 2 pursuant to Regulation 36(3) of the SEBI (Listing Obligations and Disclosure Requirements) Regulations, 2015 ("SEBI Listing Regulations") and Secretarial Standard on General Meetings issued by the Institute of Company Secretaries of India are annexed.
3. Pursuant to the provisions of the Act, a member entitled to attend and vote at the AGM is entitled to appoint a proxy to attend and vote on his/her behalf and the proxy need not be a Member of the Company. Since this AGM is being held pursuant to the MCA Circulars through VC/OAVM, physical attendance of Members has been dispensed with. **Accordingly, the facility for appointment of proxies by the Members will not be available for the AGM and hence the Proxy Form, Attendance Slip and route map of AGM are not annexed to this Notice.** However, in pursuance of Section 113 of the Companies Act, 2013, representatives of Body corporate can attend the AGM through VC / OAVM and cast their votes through e-voting.
4. In accordance with the applicable MCA Circulars and SEBI Circulars, the Notice calling the AGM and Annual Report 2025-2026 is being sent only through electronic mode to those Members whose email addresses are registered with the Company or CDSL / NSDL ("Depositories"). Members may note that Notice and Annual Report 2025-26 will also be made available on the Company's website at www.iitlprojects.com, website of the Stock Exchange i.e. BSE Limited at www.bseindia.com, and the AGM Notice is also available on the website of CDSL (agency for providing the Remote e-Voting facility) i.e. www.evotingindia.com.

5. Members holding shares in demat mode, who have not registered their email addresses are requested to register their email addresses with their respective depository participants, and members holding shares in physical mode are requested to update their email addresses with the RTA by emailing to support@purvashare.com immediately to receive copies of Annual Report in electronic mode.
6. Members attending the AGM through VC / OAVM will be counted for the purpose of reckoning the quorum under Section 103 of the Act.
7. In compliance with applicable provisions of the Act read with the MCA and SEBI Circulars and the SEBI Listing Regulations, the AGM of the Company is being conducted through VC/OAVM. In accordance with the Secretarial Standard (Revised version effective from 1st April, 2024) on General Meetings ("SS-2") issued by the Institute of Company Secretaries of India ("ICSI") read with Clarification/Guidance on applicability of Secretarial Standards - 1 and 2 dated April 15, 2020 issued by the ICSI, the proceedings of the AGM shall be deemed to be conducted at the Registered Office of the Company which shall be the deemed venue of the AGM. Since the AGM will be held through VC/OAVM, the Route Map is not annexed to this Notice.
8. Pursuant to the provisions of Section 108 of the Companies Act, 2013 read with Rule 20 of the Companies (Management and Administration) Rules, 2014 (as amended) and Regulation 44 of SEBI (Listing Obligations & Disclosure Requirements) Regulations, 2015 (as amended), and the Circulars issued by the MCA and SEBI from time to time, the Company is providing facility of remote e-voting to its Members in respect of the business to be transacted at the AGM. For this purpose, the Company has made an arrangement with Central Depository Services (India) Limited (CDSL) for facilitating voting through electronic means, and independent agency for providing necessary platform for Video Conference/ OAVM and necessary technical support as may be required. Therefore, the facility of casting votes by a member using remote e-voting system as well as e-voting on the day of the AGM will be provided by CDSL.
9. The Members can join the AGM in the VC / OAVM mode 15 minutes before and after the scheduled time of the commencement of the Meeting by following the procedure mentioned in the Notice. The facility of participation at the AGM through VC / OAVM will be made available to atleast 1000 members on first come first served basis. This will not include large Shareholders (Shareholders holding 2% or more shareholding), Promoters, Institutional Investors, Directors, Key Managerial Personnel, the Chairpersons of the Audit Committee, Nomination and Remuneration Committee and Stakeholders Relationship Committee, Auditors, etc. who are allowed to attend the AGM without restriction on account of first come first served basis.
10. Members are requested to –
 - i. intimate to the DP, changes if any, in their names, registered addresses, email address, telephone/mobile numbers, and/or changes in their bank account details, if the shares are held in dematerialized form.
 - ii. intimate to the Company's RTA, changes if any, in their names, registered addresses, email address, telephone/mobile numbers, and/or changes in their bank account details, if the shares are held in physical form (share certificates).
 - iii. consolidate their holdings into one folio in case they hold Shares under multiple folios in the identical order of names.
 - iv. dematerialize their Physical Shares to Electronic Form (Demat) as, in terms of Regulation 40 of Securities and Exchange Board of India (Listing Obligations and Disclosure Requirements) Regulations, 2015, securities of listed companies can be transferred only in dematerialised form with effect from April 01, 2019, except in case of request received for transmission or transposition of securities. Dematerialisation of shares would help to eliminate risks associated with Physical Shares. Members can contact Registrar and Transfer Agents viz., Purva Sharegistry (India) Pvt. Ltd, Mumbai (Tel. No. 022 23012518/ 23018261) for assistance, if any, in this regard.
11. The Securities and Exchange Board of India (SEBI) has mandated the submission of Permanent Account Number (PAN) by every participant in the securities market. Members holding shares in electronic form are therefore requested to submit the PAN to their Depository Participants and members holding shares in physical form can submit their PAN details to the Company.
12. The Register of Members and Share Transfer Books of the Company will remain closed from Thursday, September 10, 2026 to Thursday, September 17, 2026 (both days inclusive).
13. Members may please note that SEBI vide its Circular No. SEBI/HO/MIRSD/MIRSD_RTAMB/P/CIR/2022/8 dated January 25, 2022 has mandated the listed companies to issue securities in dematerialized form only while processing service requests viz. Issue of duplicate securities certificate; claim from unclaimed suspense account; renewal/ exchange of securities certificate; endorsement; sub-division/splitting of securities certificate; consolidation of securities certificates/folios; transmission and transposition. Accordingly, Members are requested to make service requests by submitting a duly filled and signed Form ISR – 4, the format of which is available on the Company's website at www.iitlprojects.com and on the website of the Company's Registrar and Transfer Agents, Purva Sharegistry (India) Private Limited at support@purvashare.com. It may be noted that any service request can be processed only after the folio is KYC Compliant.

14. SEBI vide its notification dated January 24, 2022 has mandated that all requests for transfer of securities including transmission and transposition requests shall be processed only in dematerialized form. In view of the same and to eliminate all risks associated with physical shares and avail various benefits of dematerialisation, Members are advised to dematerialise the shares held by them in physical form. Members can contact the Company or Purva Sharegistry (India) Private Limited, for assistance in this regard.
15. Members holding shares in physical form, in identical order of names, in more than one folio are requested to send to the Company or Purva Sharegistry (India) Private Limited, the details of such folios together with the share certificates along with the requisite KYC Documents for consolidating their holdings in one folio. Requests for consolidation of share certificates shall be processed in dematerialized form.
16. As per the provisions of Section 72 of the Act and SEBI Circular, the facility for making nomination is available for the Members in respect of the shares held by them. Members who have not yet registered their nomination are requested to register the same by submitting Form No. SH-13. If a Member desires to opt out or cancel the earlier nomination and record a fresh nomination, he/ she may submit the same in Form ISR-3 or SH-14 as the case may be. The said forms can be downloaded from the Company's website www.iitlprojects.com → Information for Shareholders. Members are requested to submit the said details to their DP in case the shares are held by them in dematerialized form and to IITL Projects Limited in case the shares are held in physical form.
17. In case of joint holders, the Member whose name appears as the first holder in the order of names as per the Register of Members of the Company will be entitled to vote during the AGM.
18. In all the correspondences with the Company / Registrar and Share Transfer Agents, the members holding shares in physical form are requested to quote their account / folio numbers and in case their shares are held in dematerialised form, they must quote their Client ID Number and DP ID Number.
19. All the documents referred in the Notice are available for inspection electronically from the date of dispatch of Notice till the date of AGM i.e. Thursday, September 17, 2026. Members seeking to inspect such documents are requested to write to the Company at iitlprojects@iitlgroup.com
20. The Register of Directors and Key Managerial Personnel and their shareholding, and the Register of Contracts or Arrangements in which the directors are interested, maintained under the Companies Act, 2013 will be available for inspection by the Members electronically during the AGM. Members seeking to inspect such documents can send an email to iitlprojects@iitlgroup.com.
21. A person, whose name is recorded in the register of members or in the register of beneficial owners maintained by the depositories as on the cut-off date only shall be entitled to avail the facility of remote e-voting as well as e-voting during the General Meeting.
22. Ms. Chandanbala O. Mehta, Practising Company Secretary (Membership No. F6122) has been appointed as the Scrutinizer for providing facility to the members of the Company to scrutinize the voting at the AGM and remote e-voting process in a fair and transparent manner.
23. The Scrutinizer shall after the conclusion of voting during the general meeting, will first count the votes cast during the meeting and thereafter unblock the votes cast through remote e-voting in the presence of at least two witnesses not in the employment of the Company and shall make, not later than 48 hours of the conclusion of the AGM, a consolidated scrutinizer's report of the total votes cast in favour or against, if any, to the Chairman or a person authorized by him in writing, who shall countersign the same and declare the result of the voting forthwith.
24. The Results declared alongwith the report of the Scrutinizer shall be placed on the website of the Company www.iitlprojects.com and on the website of CDSL immediately after the declaration of result by the Chairman or a person authorized by him in writing. Simultaneously, the results shall also be forwarded to the BSE Limited, Mumbai.

The Resolutions shall be deemed to be passed on the date of the Meeting, i.e. Thursday, September 17, 2026, subject to receipt of the requisite number of votes in favour of the Resolutions.
25. **THE INTRUCTIONS OF SHAREHOLDERS FOR E-VOTING AND JOINING VIRTUAL MEETINGS ARE AS UNDER:**

Step 1 : Access through Depositories CDSL/NSDL e-Voting system in case of individual shareholders holding shares in demat mode.

Step 2 : Access through CDSL e-Voting system in case of shareholders holding shares in physical mode and non-individual shareholders in demat mode.

(i) The voting period begins on Monday, September 14, 2026 at 9:00 a.m. (IST) and ends on Wednesday, September 16, 2026 at 5:00 p.m. (IST). During this period, shareholders' of the Company, holding shares either in physical form or in dematerialized form, as on the cut-off date (record date) of Thursday, September 10, 2026 may cast their vote electronically. The e-voting module shall be disabled by CDSL for voting thereafter.

(ii) Shareholders who have already voted prior to the meeting date would not be entitled to vote at the meeting venue.

- (iii) Pursuant to SEBI Circular No. SEBI/HO/CFD/CMD/CIR/P/2020/242 dated 09.12.2020, under Regulation 44 of Securities and Exchange Board of India (Listing Obligations and Disclosure Requirements) Regulations, 2015, listed entities are required to provide remote e-voting facility to its shareholders, in respect of all shareholders' resolutions. However, it has been observed that the participation by the public non-institutional shareholders/retail shareholders is at a negligible level.

Currently, there are multiple e-voting service providers (ESPs) providing e-voting facility to listed entities in India. This necessitates registration on various ESPs and maintenance of multiple user IDs and passwords by the shareholders.

In order to increase the efficiency of the voting process, pursuant to a public consultation, it has been decided to enable e-voting to **all the demat account holders, by way of a single login credential, through their demat accounts/ websites of Depositories/ Depository Participants**. Demat account holders would be able to cast their vote without having to register again with the ESPs, thereby, not only facilitating seamless authentication but also enhancing ease and convenience of participating in e-voting process.

Step 1: Access through Depositories CDSL/NSDL e-Voting system in case of individual shareholders holding shares in demat mode.

- (iv) In terms of **SEBI circular no. SEBI/HO/CFD/CMD/CIR/P/2020/242 dated December 9, 2020** on e-Voting facility provided by Listed Companies, Individual shareholders holding securities in demat mode are allowed to vote through their demat account maintained with Depositories and Depository Participants. Shareholders are advised to update their mobile number and email Id in their demat accounts in order to access e-Voting facility.

Pursuant to abovesaid SEBI Circular, Login method for e-Voting and joining virtual meetings **for Individual shareholders holding securities in Demat mode CDSL/NSDL** is given below:

 - (b) For NSDL: 8 Character DP ID followed by 8 Digits Client ID,
 - (c) Shareholders holding shares in Physical Form should enter Folio Number registered with the Company.
4. Next enter the Image Verification as displayed and Click on Login.

- (x) On the voting page, you will see "RESOLUTION DESCRIPTION" and against the same the option "YES/NO" for voting. Select the option YES or NO as desired. The option YES implies that you assent to the Resolution and option NO implies that you dissent to the Resolution.

Results of operations and State of Company's affairs

The Company's revenue from operations for the financial year ended March 31, 2026 was NIL as compared to Rs. 20,71,340/- in the previous financial year. The total income of the Company for the financial year ended March 31, 2026 stood at Rs. 1,80,81,380/-, as against Rs. 2,35,00,230/- in the previous financial year. The decrease in total income is primarily attributable to the absence of operational revenue during the current financial year.

The Company has booked a net profit of Rs. 1,25,21,920/- during the year as against Rs. 31,47,11,590/- in the previous financial year. The profit for the previous financial year included an exceptional income of Rs. 35,06,85,110/- arising from the reduction in the fair value of Preference Shares.

Material changes and commitments that have occurred after the close of the financial year till date of this report which affects the financial position of the Company (Pursuant to Section 134(3)(l) of the Companies Act, 2013)

During the financial year 2025-2026, the Company had proposed to acquire an industrial property situated at Noida, Uttar Pradesh, as a strategic investment, with the intention of resale at an appropriate stage. In connection with the said purchase, the Company had paid an advance of Rs. 5 crores and entered into a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) for the proposed purchase of the said property.

Subsequently, considering the prevailing market conditions and after reviewing the commercial viability of the proposed transaction,

the Board of Directors decided not to proceed with the proposed purchase. The Company is taking steps for recovery of the advance amount paid under the MOU. Subsequent to the close of the financial year, the Company has received Rs. 1 crore towards the advance amount and is taking steps for recovery of the balance amount of Rs. 4 crores.

Except as stated above, there were no other material changes and commitments that have occurred after the close of the financial year till the date of this report which affects the financial position of the Company.

Business Overview

The Company is engaged in the real estate business.

During the Financial Year 2025-26, the Company evaluated and explored opportunities for growth and diversification in the real estate sector and other businesses allied thereto. The Company had entered into Channel Partner arrangements with few real estate entities for their residential projects pursuant to Memorandum of Understanding(s) executed with the respective parties. Under these arrangements, the Company had placed security deposits and was to undertake the booking and sale of residential units and earn brokerage/commission in accordance with the terms of the respective Memorandum of Understanding(s).

The Company is exploring business opportunities in brokerage services, construction consultancy and project management services, subject to obtaining the necessary statutory and regulatory approvals. The proposed initiatives are expected

to provide opportunities for diversification and development of additional business avenues for the Company.

The Company does not have any Subsidiary, Joint Venture or Associate Company as on March 31, 2026.

During the year under review, there was no transfer to reserves.

MANAGEMENT DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS REPORT**GLOBAL ECONOMY:**

The global economy continued to demonstrate resilience during 2025 despite persistent geopolitical tensions, evolving trade policies, financial market volatility and supply chain realignments. According to the International Monetary Fund (IMF), global growth is projected to remain stable over the medium term, supported by easing inflation and improving economic activity in several regions. Inflation moderated across most major economies, enabling several central banks to commence or continue monetary policy easing, although the pace remained cautious amid lingering inflationary pressures, trade-related uncertainties and evolving global economic conditions. While economic activity improved across several regions, growth remained uneven between advanced and emerging economies, reflecting varying domestic demand conditions, policy responses and external challenges.

Emerging market and developing economies benefited from strong domestic consumption, infrastructure investments and favourable demographic trends. Escalating geopolitical tensions in West Asia strengthened the US dollar due to increased safe-haven demand, resulting in tighter financial conditions for several emerging market economies. Growth across advanced economies remained moderate, while geopolitical developments, commodity price volatility, trade barriers and ongoing shifts in global supply chains posed downside risks to global economic activity. Nevertheless, easing inflation, steady services sector activity, gradual improvements in global demand and continued technological advancements are expected to support medium-term economic growth. However, geopolitical developments, trade-related uncertainties and financial market volatility are expected to continue influencing the pace of global economic recovery.

India remained one of the fastest-growing major economies, driven by strong domestic demand, sustained public capital expenditure, robust investment activity and a well-performing services sector. Policy reforms, infrastructure development, digitalisation initiatives and an expanding digital ecosystem strengthened the country's growth prospects, while the Reserve Bank of India maintained a balanced monetary policy approach to support economic stability. Despite external challenges, India's strong macroeconomic fundamentals, favourable demographics and ongoing structural reforms are expected to support sustainable long-term growth.

INDIAN ECONOMY:

The Indian economy maintained strong growth momentum during FY 2025-26, supported by robust domestic demand, sustained public capital expenditure and a strong services sector. Manufacturing activity remained steady, aided by infrastructure development, government initiatives to promote domestic production and increasing adoption of digital technologies. Despite external challenges arising from geopolitical developments, evolving global trade policies and fluctuations in commodity

prices, India's macroeconomic fundamentals remained strong, supported by a healthy financial system, continued structural reforms and stable investment activity.

The Government's continued focus on infrastructure development, urbanisation, manufacturing, digitalisation and ease of doing business strengthened the country's growth prospects. The Reserve Bank of India's balanced monetary policy approach and improving liquidity conditions also supported credit availability and investment activity across various sectors of the economy. Continued moderation in inflation further contributed to credit growth and a favourable investment environment. Increased public investment in infrastructure and connectivity, coupled with improving business confidence and financial inclusion, supported economic activity and reinforced India's position as an attractive investment destination.

Looking ahead, India's economic outlook remains favourable, supported by resilient domestic demand, ongoing policy reforms and continued investments in infrastructure and technology. While external uncertainties may persist, India's strong economic fundamentals, favourable demographics and continued focus on sustainable development are expected to support long-term economic growth.

OVERVIEW OF REAL ESTATE INDUSTRY IN INDIA:

The Indian real estate industry remained one of the key contributors to the country's economic growth and employment generation during FY 2025-26. The sector witnessed sustained momentum across residential, commercial, retail and industrial segments, supported by favourable demographics, rising urbanisation, improving infrastructure, regulatory reforms and a stable macroeconomic environment. Continued Government focus on infrastructure development, affordable housing, urban transformation and regulatory reforms such as the Real Estate (Regulation and Development) Act (RERA), along with improved connectivity across key markets, further reinforced the industry's long-term growth prospects.

However, the sector continued to face certain headwinds during the year. Inflationary pressures and elevated construction input costs, including steel, cement and labour, impacted project costs and margins. Additionally, global geopolitical uncertainties, evolving regulatory requirements and project approval timelines continued to influence investment decisions and project execution across the industry. Demand across the residential real estate market remained mixed during the year, with the affordable housing segment witnessing relatively slower momentum due to affordability concerns and elevated property prices, while the premium housing segment witnessed healthy demand.

The residential real estate segment remained the primary growth driver, supported by strong end-user demand, increasing preference for home ownership, rising disposable incomes and growing demand for premium housing. Government initiatives promoting affordable housing continued to support housing demand across various income segments. At the same time, improving connectivity through metro rail projects, expressways

and other infrastructure initiatives helped unlock the growth potential of peripheral locations and emerging urban centres. Tier II and Tier III cities also witnessed increasing real estate activity, driven by expanding employment opportunities, improving social infrastructure and rising purchasing power.

The commercial real estate segment maintained steady momentum, supported by healthy office leasing activity, expansion of Global Capability Centres (GCCs) and sustained demand from technology, financial services and other knowledge-based industries. The organised retail real estate segment continued to evolve with increasing emphasis on experiential retail, omnichannel strategies and technology-enabled customer engagement. Industrial and warehousing assets also benefited from growth in manufacturing, logistics and e-commerce, further diversifying the sector's growth drivers.

Institutional investment continued to demonstrate confidence in the Indian real estate market, supported by regulatory reforms, greater transparency and the increasing participation of domestic and global investors. Sustainability also remained a key area of focus, with developers increasingly adopting green building practices, energy-efficient technologies and environmentally responsible construction methods to meet evolving regulatory requirements and stakeholder expectations. However, investors remained selective, with capital deployment largely focused on high-quality projects developed by established and financially strong developers.

Looking ahead, the Indian real estate industry is expected to benefit from continued infrastructure investments, supportive Government policies, increasing urbanisation, favourable demographic trends and growing adoption of technology. While global economic uncertainties and evolving trade dynamics may pose short-term challenges, the sector's strong fundamentals, improving transparency and growing institutional participation are expected to support its long-term growth trajectory.

BUSINESS PERFORMANCE:

The Company is engaged in the real estate business.

During the Financial Year 2025-26, the Company evaluated and explored opportunities for growth and diversification in the real estate sector and other businesses allied thereto. The Company had entered into Channel Partner arrangements with few real estate entities for their residential projects pursuant to Memorandum of Understanding(s) executed with the respective parties. Under these arrangements, the Company had placed security deposits and was to undertake the booking and sale of residential units and earn brokerage/commission in accordance with the terms of the respective Memorandum of

Understanding(s).

The Company is exploring business opportunities in brokerage services, construction consultancy and project management services, subject to obtaining the necessary statutory and regulatory approvals. The proposed initiatives are expected to provide opportunities for diversification and development of additional business avenues for the Company.

RISKS AND CONCERNS:

The Company recognises that an effective risk management framework is essential for achieving its strategic objectives and safeguarding stakeholder value. The Company has adopted a Risk Management Policy to identify, assess, monitor and mitigate risks that may affect its business operations and overall performance.

Although the Company did not undertake any operational business activities during FY 2025-26, it continues to monitor developments in the real estate sector and the broader economic environment. The real estate industry remains exposed to various risks, including changes in economic conditions, interest rates, regulatory and policy developments, fluctuations in input costs, evolving customer preferences and competitive market dynamics, all of which may influence business opportunities and future growth. The Company also continues to monitor risks relating to project approvals, execution timelines, changes in development regulations and other statutory compliance requirements inherent to the real estate sector.

The Company also remains exposed to risks arising from changes in the regulatory framework, including laws and policies relating to the real estate sector. The Company will continue to strengthen its risk management framework to effectively identify, assess, monitor and mitigate emerging business and operational risks.

As the Company evaluates opportunities for diversification into new business activities, the associated regulatory, market, execution and commercial risks will also be assessed before undertaking any such activity.

RESULTS OF OPERATIONS AND STATE OF COMPANY'S AFFAIRS:

The total income of the Company for the financial year ended March 31, 2026 is Rs. 180.81 lakhs as compared to Rs. 235.00 lakhs in the previous year. The decrease in total income is primarily attributable to the absence of operational revenue during the current financial year.

Overall, the long-term outlook for the Indian real estate sector remains positive, supported by favourable economic fundamentals, policy support, infrastructure-led development and rising urbanisation.

NOTES FORMING PART OF THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Note 1 : Background

IITL Projects Limited (referred to as the “Company”) is engaged in real estate business, construction of residential complexes in the National Capital Region. The Company had promoted four Special Purpose Vehicle (SPV) viz. IITL Nimbus The Hyde Park holds 50% of capital, Capital Infraprojects Pvt. Ltd. holds 50% of Capital, IITL Nimbus The Express Park View holds 12.08% of capital and IITL Nimbus The Palm Village holds 46.81% of capital. Apart from constructing its own projects, the Company has undertaken development of Real Estate Projects through “Special Purpose Vehicle” (SPV). During FY 2023-24, the Company exited from three Joint Venture Partnership Firms viz. IITL Nimbus The Express Park View (EPV II), IITL Nimbus The Palm Village and IITL Nimbus The Hyde Park, and during the FY 2024-25, the Company has exited from the Joint Venture “Capital Infra Projects Limited”.

The Company has no business of its own and has no other cash flow at present. As at March 31, 2026, Industrial Investment Trust Limited (Parent Company) owned 71.74% of the company's equity share capital and has the ability to control its operating and financial policies.

The company shares are listed in BSE Limited. The company's registered office is in Mumbai.

Note 2 : Material Accounting Policies Information and Key Accounting Estimates and Judgements

2.1 Material Accounting Policies Information

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Indian Accounting Standards (Ind AS) notified under Section 133 of the Companies Act, 2013 (the Act), read with the Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Rules, 2015 and other relevant provisions of the Act.

The standalone financial statements are presented in Indian Rupees (Rs) which is the functional currency of the Company and all values are rounded to the nearest thousand, except where otherwise indicated.

Entity specific disclosure of material accounting policies where Ind AS permits options is disclosed hereunder.

The Company has assessed the materiality of the accounting policy information which involves exercising judgements and considering both qualitative and quantitative factors by taking into account not only the size and nature of the item or condition but also the characteristics of the transactions, events or conditions that could make the information more likely to impact the decisions of the users of the financial statements.

Entity's conclusion that an accounting policy is immaterial does not affect the disclosures requirements set out in the accounting standards.

The company adopted Ind AS from 1st April 2017. Accounting Policies have been consistently applied except where a newly-issued Accounting Standard is initially adopted or a revision to an existing Accounting Standard requires a change in the Accounting Policy hitherto adopted.

2.2 Basis of preparation and compliance

The financial statements are prepared in accordance with the historical cost convention except for certain items that are measured at fair values at the end of each reporting period, as explained in the Accounting Policies set out below. The financial statements are prepared on a 'going concern' basis using accrual concept except for the cash flow information.

Historical cost is generally based on fair value of the consideration given in exchange for goods and services.

Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date, regardless of whether that price is directly observable or estimated using another valuation technique. In estimating the fair value of an asset or a liability, the Company takes into account the characteristics of the asset or liability that the market participants would take into account when pricing the asset or liability at the measurement date, assuming the market participants act in their economic best interest. Fair value for measurement and/or disclosure purposes in these financial statements is determined on such a basis and measurements that have some similarities to fair value but are not fair value, such as net realisable value in Ind AS-2 – Inventories or Value in Use in Ind AS 36 – Impairment of Assets.

In addition, for financial reporting purposes, fair value measurements are categorised into Level 1, 2 or 3 based on the degree to which the inputs to the fair value measurements are observable and the significance of the inputs to the fair value measurement in its entirety, as described hereunder:

Level 1 - Quoted prices (unadjusted) in active markets for identical assets or liabilities that the entity can access at the measurement date.

Level 2 - Other than quoted prices included within Level 1, that are observable for the asset or liability, either directly or indirectly; and

Level 3 - Unobservable inputs for the asset or liability.

Transactions and balances with values below the rounding off norm adopted by the Company have been reflected as '--' in these financial statements.

2.3 Current / Non-Current classification

An asset or liability is classified as Current if it satisfies any of the following conditions:

- (i) the asset / liability is expected to be realised / settled in the Company's normal operating cycle;
- (ii) the asset is intended for sale or consumption
- (iii) the asset / liability is held primarily for the purpose of trading;
- (iv) the asset / liability is expected to be realised / settled within twelve months after the reporting period;
- (v) the asset is cash or cash equivalent, unless it is restricted from being exchanged or used to settle a liability for at least twelve months after the reporting period;
- (vi) in the case of a liability, the Company does not have an unconditional right to defer settlement of the liability for at least twelve months after the reporting period.

All other assets and liabilities are classified as Non-Current.

For the purpose of Current / Non-Current classification, the Company has reckoned its normal operating cycle as twelve months based on the nature of products and the time between the acquisition of assets or inventories for processing and their realisation in cash and cash equivalents.

Deferred Tax Assets and Liabilities are classified as Non-Current.

Advances given towards acquisition of fixed assets, outstanding at each Balance Sheet date, are disclosed as Other Non-Current Assets.

2.4 Revenue

(a) Revenue from Operation

The Firm has aligned its policy of revenue recognition with Ind AS 115 "Revenue from Contracts with customers" which is effective from April 1, 2018. Accordingly revenue in realty business is recognised on completion of performance obligation as against recognition based on percentage of completion method hitherto in accordance with the guidance note issued by ICAI which has since been withdrawn for entities preparing financials as per Indian Accounting Standards (Ind AS).

(b) Interest Income

Interest income from a financial asset is recognized when it is probable that the economic benefits will flow to the Company and the amount of income can be measured reliably. Interest income is accrued on a time basis, by reference to the principal outstanding and at the effective interest rate applicable, which is the rate that exactly discounts estimated future cash receipts through the expected life of the financial asset to that asset's net carrying amount on initial recognition.

(c) Other Income

Other income is recognised on an accrual basis only when there is certainty of collection.

2.5 Inventories

Stock of units in completed project and construction work-in-progress are valued at lower of cost and net realisable value. Cost is aggregate of land cost, premium for development rights, materials, contract works, direct expenses, provisions and apportioned borrowing costs and is net of material scrap receipts, and in case of construction work-in-progress is after ascertaining the cost of sales which is determined based on the total area sold as at the Balance Sheet date.

2.6 Property, Plant and Equipment

Items of property, plant and equipment stated at historical cost less accumulated depreciation. Historical cost includes expenditure that is directly attributable to the acquisition of the items.

Subsequent costs are included in the asset's carrying amount or recognised as a separate asset, as appropriate, only when it is probable that future economic benefits associated with the item will flow to the Company and the cost of the item can be measured reliably. The carrying amount of any component accounted for as a separate asset is derecognized when replaced. All other repairs and maintenance are charged to profit or loss during the reporting period in which they are incurred.

NOTES FORMING PART OF FINANCIAL STATEMENTS (Contd.)

Depreciation and Amortisation methods, estimated useful lives and residual value.

Depreciation on Property, Plant and Equipment has been provided on the written down value method at the rates determined based on the useful life prescribed in Schedule II to the 2013 Act.

Depreciation on additions to Property, Plant and Equipment is provided for the full year irrespective of the date of addition. No depreciation is provided in the year of deletions of Property, Plant and Equipment.

Intangible assets are amortised over their estimated useful life as follows:

Computer : 2-5 Years

The estimated useful life of the intangible assets and the amortisation period are reviewed at the end of each financial year and the amortisation method is revised to reflect the changed pattern.

2.7 Employment Benefits

(a) Short Term Employee Benefits

Liabilities for wages and salaries, including non-monetary benefits that are expected to be settled wholly within 12 months after the end of the period in which the employees render the related service are recognised at an undiscounted amount in respect of employees' service up to the end of the year and are measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liabilities are settled. The liabilities are presented as current employee benefit obligation in the balance sheet.

(b) Long Term Employee Benefits

1) Defined contribution plan

The eligible employees of the Company are entitled to receive post employment benefits in respect of provident and family pension fund, in which both employees and the Company makes monthly contributions at a specified percentage of the employees' eligible salary (currently 12% of employees' eligible salary). The contributions are made to Employees Provident Fund Organisation. Provident Fund and Family Pension Fund are classified as Defined Contribution Plans as the Company has no further obligation beyond making the contribution. The Company's contributions to Defined Contribution Plan are charged to Statement of Profit and Loss as incurred.

2) Defined benefit plans

i) Gratuity

The Company has an obligation towards gratuity, a defined benefit retirement plan covering eligible employees. The plan provides a lump sum payment to vested employees at retirement, death while in employment or on termination of employment of an amount equivalent to 15 days salary payable for each completed year of service. Vesting occurs upon completion of five years of service. The Company makes contribution to a fund managed by LIC of India based on management estimate made at the end of the year. Gains and losses are recognised in the Statement of Profit and Loss.

ii) Compensated absences

The Company provides for the encashment of leave or leave with pay subject to certain rules. The Employees are entitled to accumulate leave subject to certain limits for future encashment/availment. The Company makes provision for compensated absences based on management estimate made at the end of the year. Gains and losses are recognised in the Statement of Profit and Loss.

2.8 Taxation

Taxes on income comprise of Current Tax and Deferred Tax.

a. Current Tax

The tax currently payable is based on taxable profit for the year. Taxable profit differs from 'profit before tax' as reported in the Statement of Profit and Loss because of items of income or expense that are taxable or deductible in other years and items that are never taxable or deductible. The Company's current tax is calculated using tax rates that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the end of the reporting period in the countries where the Company, its branches and jointly controlled operations operate and generate taxable income. Management periodically evaluates positions taken in tax returns with respect to situations in which applicable tax regulations is subject to interpretations. It establishes provisions, where appropriate, on the basis of amounts expected to be paid to the tax authorities.

NOTES FORMING PART OF FINANCIAL STATEMENTS (Contd.)

b. Deferred Tax

Deferred tax is recognised on temporary differences between the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities in the financial statements and the corresponding tax bases used in the computation of taxable profit. Deferred tax liabilities are generally recognised for all taxable temporary differences. Deferred tax assets are generally recognised for all deductible temporary differences to the extent that it is probable that taxable profits will be available against which those deductible temporary differences can be utilised. Such deferred tax assets and liabilities are not recognised if the temporary difference arises from the initial recognition (other than in a business combination) of assets and liabilities in a transaction that affects neither the taxable profit nor the accounting profit.

Deferred tax liabilities are recognised for taxable temporary differences associated with interests in joint operations except where the Company is able to control the reversal of the temporary difference and it is probable that the temporary difference will not reverse in the foreseeable future. Deferred tax assets arising from deductible temporary differences associated with such interests are only recognised to the extent that it is probable that there will be sufficient taxable profits against which to utilise the benefits of the temporary differences and they are expected to reverse in the foreseeable future.

The carrying amount of deferred tax assets is reviewed at the end of each reporting period and reduced to the extent that it is no longer probable that sufficient taxable profits will be available to allow all or part of the asset to be recovered.

Deferred tax liabilities and assets are measured at the tax rates that are expected to apply in the period in which the liability is settled or the asset realised, based on tax rates (and tax laws) that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the end of the reporting period.

The measurement of deferred tax liabilities and assets reflects the tax consequences that would follow from the manner in which the Company expects, at the end of the reporting period, to recover or settle the carrying amount of its assets and liabilities.

Deferred tax liabilities are not recognised for temporary differences between the carrying amount and tax bases of investments in subsidiaries, associates and interest in joint arrangements where the Company is able to control the timing of the reversal of the temporary differences and it is probable that the differences will not reverse in the foreseeable future.

Deferred tax assets are not recognised for temporary differences between the carrying amount and tax bases of investments in subsidiaries, branches and associates and interest in joint arrangements where it is not probable that the differences will reverse in the foreseeable future and taxable profit will not be available against which the temporary differences can be utilised.

Deferred tax assets and liabilities are offset when there is legally enforceable right to offset current tax assets and liabilities and when the deferred tax balances relate to the same taxation authority. Current tax assets and liabilities are offset when entity has legally enforceable right to offset and intends either to settle on a net basis, or to realise the asset and settle the liability simultaneously.

Minimum Alternate Tax (MAT) paid in a year is charged to the statement of profit and loss as current tax. The Company recognises MAT credit available as an asset only to the extent that there is reasonable certainty that the Company will pay normal income tax during the specified period, i.e., the period for which MAT credit is allowed to be carried forward. The MAT credit to the extent there is reasonable certainty that the Company will utilise the credit is recognised in the statement of profit and loss and corresponding debit is done to the deferred tax asset as unused tax credit.

2.9 Segment Reporting

Operating segments are reported in a manner consistent with the internal reporting provided to the chief operating decision maker (CODM) as defined by Ind AS- 108, "Operating segment"

Company's income and expenses including interest are considered as part of un-allocable income and expenses which are not identifiable to any business segment. Company's asset and liabilities are considered as part of un-allocable assets and liabilities which are not identifiable to any business.

2.10 Fair Value Measurement

The Company measures financial instrument at fair value at each reporting date. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. The fair value measurement is based on the presumption that the transaction to sell the asset or transfer or transfer liability takes place either:

NOTES FORMING PART OF FINANCIAL STATEMENTS (Contd.)

(a) In the principal market for the asset or liability ,or

(b) In the absence of a principal market, in the most advantageous market for the asset or liability.

The Principal or the most advantageous market must be accessible to the Company. The fair value of an asset or a liability is measured using the assumptions that market participants would use when pricing the asset or liability, assuming that market participants act in their economic best interest. The company uses valuation techniques that are more appropriate in the circumstances and for which sufficient data are available to measure fair value, maximising the use of relevant observable input and minimizing the use of unobservable inputs.

Level 1 - Quoted (unadjusted) market prices in active markets for identical assets of liabilities

Level 2 - Valuation techniques for which the lowest level input that is significant to the fair value measurement is directly or indirectly observable

Level 3 - Valuation techniques for which the lowest level input that is significant to the fair value measurement is unobservable

For assets and liabilities that are recognised in the financial statements on a recurring basis, the Company determines whether transfers have occurred between levels in the hierarchy by re-assessing categorisation (based on the lowest level input that is significant to the fair value measurement as a whole) at the end of each reporting period.

For the purpose of fair value disclosures, the Company has determined classes of assets and liabilities on the basis of the nature, characteristic and risks of the asset or liability and the level of the fair value hierarchy as explained above.

2.11 Financial instruments

A financial instrument is any contract that gives rise to a financial asset of one entity and a financial liability or equity instrument of another entity.

Financial assets and liabilities are recognized when the Company becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

Financial assets

a) Classification

The Company classifies its financial assets in the following measurement categories:

- i) those to be measured subsequently at fair value (either through other comprehensive income, or through profit or loss), and
- ii) those measured at amortised cost.

The classification depends on the entity's business model for managing the financial assets and the contractual terms of the cash flows.

For assets measured at fair value, gains and losses will either be recorded in profit or loss or other comprehensive income.

b) Measurement

Initial recognition:

At initial recognition, the Company measures a financial asset at its fair value plus, in the case of a financial asset not at fair value through profit or loss, transaction costs that are directly attributable to the acquisition of the financial asset. Transaction costs of financial assets carried at fair value through profit or loss are expensed in profit or loss.

Subsequent measurement :

After initial recognition, financial assets are measured at:

- i) fair value (either through other comprehensive income or through profit or loss), or
- ii) amortized cost

NOTES FORMING PART OF FINANCIAL STATEMENTS (Contd.)

Debt instruments :

Debt instruments are subsequently measured at amortized cost, fair value through other comprehensive income ('FVOCI') or fair value through profit or loss ('FVTPL') till de-recognition on the basis of (i) the entity's business model for managing the financial assets and (ii) the contractual cash flow characteristics of the financial asset.

The company classifies its debt instruments into three measurement categories:

- i) **Amortized Cost:** Assets that are held for collection of contractual cash flows where those cash flows represent solely payments of principal and interest are measured at amortized cost. A gain or loss on a debt investment that is subsequently measured at amortized cost is recognized in the Statement of Profit and Loss when the asset is derecognized or impaired. Interest income from these financial assets is included in other income using the effective interest rate method.
- ii) **Fair Value through Other Comprehensive Income (FVOCI):** Assets that are held for collection of contractual cash flows and for selling the financial assets, where the assets' cash flows represent solely payments of principal and interest, are measured at FVOCI. Movements in the carrying amount are taken through OCI, except for the recognition of impairment gains or losses, interest revenue and foreign exchange gains and losses, which are recognized in the Statement of Profit and Loss. When the financial asset is derecognized, the cumulative gain or loss previously recognized in OCI is reclassified from equity to profit or loss and recognized in other gains/ (losses). Interest income from these financial assets is included in other income using the effective interest rate method.
- iii) **Fair Value through Profit or Loss (FVTPL):** Assets that do not meet the criteria for amortized cost or FVOCI are measured at FVTPL. A gain or loss on a debt investment that is subsequently measured at fair value through profit or loss is recognized in profit or loss in the period in which it arises. Interest income from these financial assets are recognized in the Statement of profit and loss.

c) Impairment

The Company assesses on a forward looking basis the expected credit losses associated with its assets carried at amortised cost. The impairment methodology applied depends on whether there has been a significant increase in credit risk.

For trade receivables only, the Company applies the simplified approach permitted by Ind AS 109 Financial Instruments, which requires expected lifetime losses to be recognised from initial recognition of the receivables.

d) De-recognition

A financial asset is derecognised only when:

- i) the rights to receive cash flows from the asset have expired, or
- ii) the Company has transferred its rights to receive cash flows from the asset or has assumed an obligation to pay the received cash flows to one or more recipient. or
- iii) retains the contractual rights to receive the cash flows of the financial asset, but assumes a contractual obligation to pay the cash flows to one or more recipients.

Where the entity has transferred an asset, the Company evaluates whether it has transferred substantially all risks and rewards of ownership of the financial asset. In such cases, the financial asset is derecognised. Where the entity has not transferred substantially all risks and rewards of ownership of the financial asset, the financial asset is not derecognised.

Where the entity has neither transferred a financial asset nor retains substantially all risks and rewards of ownership of the financial asset, the financial asset is derecognised if the Company has not retained control of the financial asset. Where the Company retains control of the financial asset, the asset is continued to be recognised to the extent of continuing involvement in the financial asset.

Financial liabilities

a) Measurement

Initial recognition:

Financial liabilities are initially measured at its fair value plus or minus, in the case of a financial liability not at fair value through profit or loss, transaction costs that are directly attributable to the issue/origination of the financial liability.

NOTES FORMING PART OF FINANCIAL STATEMENTS (Contd.)

Subsequent Measurement :

Financial liabilities are classified as measured at amortized cost or FVTPL. A financial liability is classified as at FVTPL if it is classified as held- for- trading, or it is a derivative or it is designated as such on initial recognition. Financial liabilities at FVTPL are measured at fair value and net gains and losses, including any interest expense, are recognized in statement of profit and loss. Other financial liabilities are subsequently measured at amortized cost using the effective interest method. Interest expense and foreign exchange gains and losses are recognized in statement of profit and loss. Any gain or loss on derecognition is also recognized in statement of profit and loss.

b) De-recognition

A financial liability is derecognized when the obligation specified in the contract is discharged, cancelled or expires.

2.12 Impairment of Assets

An asset is impaired when its carrying amount exceeds its recoverable amount. An entity should assess at the end of each reporting period whether there exists any indication, the entity should estimate the recoverable amount of the asset. If there is an indication that an asset may be impaired, then the remaining useful life, the amortisation method and the residual value needs to be reviewed and adjusted even if no impairment loss is recognized for the asset.

2.13 Financial Risk Management Objectives and Policies

The Company's principal financial liabilities comprise trade and other payables. The main purpose of these financial liabilities is to finance the Company's operations. The Company's principal financial assets comprise trade and other receivables, and cash that arrive directly from its operations.

The Company is exposed to commodity price risk, credit risk and liquidity risk.

The Company's senior management oversees the management of these risks.

The Management Committee reviews and agrees policies for managing each of these risks which are summarized below:

Commodity Price Risk:

The Company is affected by the volatility of certain commodities. Its operating activities require the ongoing purchase of stock and therefore require a continuous supply of the same.

Credit Risk:

The Company is exposed to credit risk from its operating activities (primarily for trade receivables) and from its financing activities, including deposits with banks and financial institutions.

• Trade Receivables

Customer credit risk is managed by the Company's established policy, procedures and control relating to customer credit risk management. Credit quality of the customer is assessed and individual limits are defined in accordance with this assessment. Outstanding customer receivables are regularly monitored.

• Cash Deposits

Risk from balances with banks are managed by maintaining the balances with highly reputed commercial banks only.

Liquidity Risk:

The Company monitors its risk to a shortage of funds on a regular basis through cash forecast.

B Key Accounting Estimates and Judgments

2.14 Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with Ind AS requires Management to make judgments, estimates and assumptions that affect the application of the accounting policies and the reported amounts of assets and liabilities, the disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements, and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the year. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

NOTES FORMING PART OF FINANCIAL STATEMENTS (Contd.)

2.15 Key sources of estimation uncertainty

The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimate is revised if the revision affects only that period, or in the period of the revision and future periods if the revision affects both current and future periods.

Key assumption concerning the future, and other key sources of estimation uncertainty at the end of the reporting period that may have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities within the next financial year is as given below.

a) Fair value measurement and valuation processes

Some of the Company's assets and liabilities are measured at fair value for financial reporting purposes. In estimating the fair value of an asset or a liability, the Company uses market-observable data to the extent it is available. Where Level 1 inputs are not available, the Company engages third party qualified valuers to perform the valuation. The Management works closely with the qualified external valuers to establish the appropriate valuation techniques and inputs to the model.

b) Useful life of Property, Plant and Equipments

The Company reviews the estimated useful lives of Property, Plant and Equipment at the end of each reporting period. During the current year, there has been no change in useful life considered for the assets.

c) Actuarial valuation

The determination of Company's liability towards defined benefit obligation to employees is made through independent actuarial valuation including determination of amounts to be recognised in the Statement of Profit and Loss and in Other Comprehensive Income. Such valuation depend upon assumptions determined after taking into account inflation, seniority, promotion and other relevant factors such as supply and demand factors in the employment market. Information about such valuation is provided in notes to the financial statements.

d) Claims, Provisions and Contingent Liabilities

The Company has ongoing litigations with various regulatory authorities and third parties. Where an outflow of funds is believed to be probable and a reliable estimate of the outcome of the dispute can be made based on Management's assessment of specific circumstances of each dispute and relevant external advice, Management provides for its best estimate of the liability. Such accruals are by nature complex and can take number of years to resolve and can involve estimation uncertainty. Information about such litigations is provided in notes to the financial statements.

e) Tax Expenses

Significant judgment and estimates are involved in estimating of the budgeted profit for the purpose of advance tax, determining the provision for income tax.

2.16 Recent Accounting Developments

The Ministry of Corporate Affairs ("MCA") has notified the Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Amendment Rules, 2025, amending certain Indian Accounting Standards (Ind AS), which are effective from 1 April 2025. The Company has evaluated these amendments and concluded that they do not have a material impact on its financial statements or material accounting policy information.

The amendments to Ind AS 1 – Presentation of Financial Statements clarify the principles for classifying liabilities as current or non-current, including the treatment of covenant breaches and related disclosure requirements. The Company has evaluated these amendments and determined that they do not have a significant impact on its financial statements.

The amendments to Ind AS 7 – Statement of Cash Flows and Ind AS 107 – Financial Instruments: Disclosures require enhanced disclosures relating to supplier finance arrangements, including their terms and conditions, outstanding balances, and associated liquidity risk considerations. As the Company does not have any material supplier finance arrangements, these amendments do not have any impact on its financial statements.

NOTES FORMING PART OF FINANCIAL STATEMENTS (Contd.)

The amendments to Ind AS 12 – Income Taxes relate to the OECD Pillar Two global minimum tax rules. The Company has assessed these amendments and concluded that they do not have any impact on its financial statements.

The amendments to Ind AS 21 – The Effects of Changes in Foreign Exchange Rates introduce a framework for situations involving non-exchangeable currencies, requiring entities to assess exchangeability and estimate spot exchange rates when exchangeability is lacking. Additional disclosures are also required for currencies subject to exchange restrictions. The Company has assessed these amendments and noted that they do not have any impact on its financial statements.

The amendments to Ind AS 101 – First-time Adoption of Indian Accounting Standards require additional disclosures for entities operating in hyperinflationary environments and provide transitional relief relating to lease classification under Ind AS 116. Since the Company is not a first-time adopter of Ind AS, these amendments are not applicable.

The amendments to Ind AS 115 – Revenue from Contracts with Customers involve technical updates to replace outdated references to superseded standards. These amendments do not have any impact on the Company's financial statements.

The amendments to Ind AS 116 – Leases provide transitional relief for lease arrangements involving land and building components, permitting classification based on facts and circumstances existing at the date of transition. These amendments are not applicable to the Company.

Standards Notified but Not Yet Effective

The Ministry of Corporate Affairs ("MCA") has notified certain amendments to Indian Accounting Standards that are not yet effective up to the date of issuance of the Company's financial statements. The Company will adopt these amendments when they become effective.

(i) **Amendments to Ind AS 1 – Presentation of Financial Statements: Classification of Liabilities as Current or Non-current and Non-current Liabilities with Covenants, and Ind AS 10 – Events after the Reporting Period**

Ind AS 10 has been amended to remove the previous requirement whereby a lender's waiver, granted after the reporting date but before the approval of the financial statements, in respect of a breach of a material covenant in a long-term loan arrangement occurring on or before the reporting date, was treated as an adjusting event. For annual reporting periods beginning on or after 1 April 2026, any breach of a covenant, whether material or immaterial, occurring on or before the reporting date will require the related liability to be classified as current in accordance with Ind AS 1, unless the lender has granted a waiver on or before the reporting date and agreed not to demand repayment for at least twelve months after the reporting date. Such a waiver will be treated as an adjusting event.

These amendments are effective for annual reporting periods beginning on or after 1 April 2026 and are to be applied retrospectively in accordance with Ind AS 8 – Accounting Policies, Changes in Accounting Estimates and Errors. The Company has evaluated the amendments and concluded that they will not have any impact on its financial statements.

The Company offers its employees defined-benefit plan in the form of a Gratuity Scheme. Benefits under the defined benefits plan are typically based on years of service and the employees compensation covering all regular employees. Commitments are actuarially determined at year-end. The benefits vests upon completion of five years of continuous service and once vested it is payable to employees on retirement or on termination of employment. The Company makes annual contribution to the group gratuity scheme administered by the Life Insurance Corporation of India.

These plans typically expose the Company to actuarial risks such as: investment risk, interest rate risk, longevity risk and salary risk.

Investment Risk

For funded plans that rely on insurers for managing the assets, the value of assets certified by the insurer may not be the fair value of instruments backing the liability. In such cases, the present value of the assets is independent of the future discount rate. This can result in wide fluctuations in the net liability or the funded status if there are significant changes in the discount rate during the inter-valuation period.

Market Risk (discount Risk)

Market risk is a collective term for risks that are related to the changes and fluctuations of the financial markets. The discount rate reflects the time value of money. An increase in discount rate leads to decrease in Defined Benefit Obligation of the plan benefits & vice versa. This assumption depends on the yields on the corporate/government bonds and hence the valuation of liability is exposed to fluctuations in the yields as at the valuation date.

Longevity Risk

The impact of longevity risk will depend on whether the benefits are paid before retirement age or after. Typically for the benefits paid on or before the retirement age, the longevity risk is not very material.

Actuarial risk

Note 34: Financial risk management

The Company's business activities expose it to a variety of financial risks, namely liquidity risk, market risks and credit risk. The Company's senior management has overall responsibility for the establishment and oversight of the Company's risk management framework. **The Company has constituted a Risk Management Committee, which is responsible for developing and monitoring the Company's risk management policies.** The key risks and mitigating actions are also placed before the Audit Committee of the Company. The Company's risk management policies are established to identify and analyse the risks faced by the Company, to set appropriate risk limits and controls and to monitor risks and adherence to limits. Risk management policies and systems are reviewed regularly to reflect changes in market conditions and the Company's activities.

Note 34: Financial risk management (Contd.)

The Risk Management Committee of the Company is supported by the Finance team and experts of respective business divisions that provides assurance that the Company's financial risk activities are governed by appropriate policies and procedures and that financial risks are identified, measured and managed in accordance with the Company's policies and risk objectives. The activities are designed to:

- protect the Company's financial results and position from financial risks
- maintain market risks within acceptable parameters, while optimizing returns; and
- protect the Company's financial investments, while maximizing returns.

The Treasury department is responsible to maximize the return on companies internally generated funds.

A. Management of Liquidity Risk:

Liquidity risk is the risk that the company will face in meeting its obligations associated with its financial liabilities. The company's approach to managing liquidity is to ensure that it will have sufficient funds to meet its liabilities when due without incurring unacceptable losses. In doing this, management considers both normal and stressed conditions. A material and sustained shortfall in our cash flow could undermine the company's credit rating and impair investor confidence.

B. Management of Market risks

Market risks comprises of:

- price risk; and
- interest rate risk

The company does not designate any fixed rate financial assets as fair value through profit and loss nor at fair value through OCI. Therefore company is not exposed to any interest rate risks. Similarly company does not have any financial instrument which is exposed to change in price.

C. Capital Management

The company considers the following components of its Balance Sheet to be managed capital:

Total equity as shown in the balance sheet includes retained profit and share capital.

The company aim to manages its capital efficiently so as to safeguard its ability to continue as a going concern and to optimise returns to our shareholders. The capital structure of the company is based on management's judgment of the appropriate balance of key elements in order to meet its strategic and day-to-day needs. We consider the amount of capital in proportion to risk and manage the capital structure in light of changes in economic conditions and the risk characteristics of the underlying assets. In order to maintain or adjust the capital structure, the company may adjust the amount of dividends paid to shareholders, return capital to shareholders or issue new shares.

The company's policy is to maintain a stable and strong capital structure with a focus on total equity so as to maintain investor, creditors and market confidence and to sustain future development and growth of its business. The company will take appropriate steps in order to maintain, or if necessary adjust, its capital structure. company is not subject to financial covenants in any of its significant financing agreements.

The management monitors the return on capital as well as the level of dividends to shareholders.

D. Management of Credit Risks

Credit risk is the risk of financial loss to the company if a customer or counter-party fails to meet its contractual obligations.

Trade receivables

Concentrations of credit risk with respect to trade receivables are limited, due to the company's customer base being large and diverse and also on account of member's deposits kept by the company as collateral which can be utilised in case of member default. All trade receivables are reviewed and assessed for default on a quarterly basis.

Our historical experience of collecting receivables, supported by the level of default, is that credit risk is low. Company is not exposed to any other credit risks.

Note 35 : Going Concern

As on 31.03.2026, the accumulated loss of Rs 523.76 lakhs, exceeds the paid up capital and net worth of the company stands fully eroded. The total liability of the company exceeds its total assets.

Thus, the company ceases to be a "Going Concern" and accordingly these financial statements have been prepared on the basis that the company does not continue to be a "Going Concern" and therefore all assets that have been valued at their realisation value where lower than cost and all known liabilities have been fully provided for and recorded in the financial statements on the basis of best estimate of the Management.

The revised terms shall be as under :-

a. The maximum period of redemption of the entire 70,00,000 Preference Shares shall be extended upto March 31, 2028.

b. Save as what is mentioned hereinabove, all the other terms and conditions of the said preference shares shall remain the same.

IITL Projects Limited, have accorded their shareholders consent on 8th January, 2026 through postal ballot and Industrial Investment Trust Limited holding company have accorded their shareholders consent on 8th January, 2026.

Note 37 : Impairment losses - Joint Ventures

The Board of Director in its meeting held on September 09, 2024 has approved for the sale of Preference Shares held by the Company in the Joint Venture Associate Company, Capital Infra Projects Private Limited ("CIPL") to Medanta Real Estate Private Limited.

IITL Projects Limited have accorded their share holder consent on 16th November, 2024 through postal ballot. The Company received sale consideration and shares have been transferred during December Quarter of this financial year.

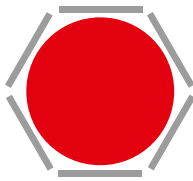
