Since there are no items of Special Business proposed to be transacted at this Annual General Meeting, the provisions of Section 102 of the Companies Act, 2013, Regulation 36(5) of the Securities and Exchange Board of India (Listing Obligations and Disclosure Requirements) Regulations, 2015 (including any statutory modification(s) or re-enactment thereof for the time being in force), and Secretarial Standard-2 on General Meetings issued by the Institute of Company Secretaries of India (ICSI) relating to the annexure of an Explanatory Statement are not applicable. Accordingly, no Explanatory Statement forms part of this Notice.
2. A member entitled to attend and vote at the Annual General Meeting (the "Meeting") is entitled to appoint a proxy to attend and vote instead of himself and the proxy need not be a member of the Company. The instrument appointing the proxy should, however, be deposited at the registered office of the Company not less than forty-eight hours before the commencement of the Meeting. A person can act as a proxy on behalf of members not exceeding fifty and holding in the aggregate not more than ten percent of the total share capital of the Company carrying voting rights. A member holding more than ten percent of the total share capital of the Company carrying voting rights may appoint a single person as proxy and such person shall not act as a proxy for any other person or shareholder.
3. Corporate members intended to send their authorized representatives to attend the meeting are requested to send to the Company a certified copy of Board resolution authorizing their representative to attend and vote on their behalf at the Meeting.
4. Members/Proxy holders are requested to bring their copy of Attendance slip sent herewith duly filled in for attending the Annual General Meeting.
5. The Register of Members and the Share Transfer Books of the Company will remain closed from Wednesday 23rd September 2026 to Tuesday 29th September 2026 (both days inclusive).
6. Pursuant to the provisions of Section 108 of the Companies Act, 2013 read with Rule 20 of the Companies (Management and Administration) Rules, 2014 (as amended) and Regulation 44 of SEBI (Listing Obligations & Disclosure Requirements) Regulations 2015 (as amended), and the Circulars issued by the Ministry of Corporate Affairs dated April 08, 2020, April 13, 2020 and May 05, 2020 the Company is providing facility of remote e-Voting to its Members in respect of the business to be transacted at the AGM. For this purpose, the Company has entered into an agreement with National Securities Depository Limited (NSDL) for facilitating voting through electronic means, as the authorized agency. The facility of casting votes by a member using remote e-Voting system as well as venue voting on the date of the AGM will be provided by NSDL.
7. In line with the Ministry of Corporate Affairs (MCA) Circular No. 17/2020 dated April 13, 2020, the Notice calling the AGM has been uploaded on the website of the Company at www.kenrikindustries.net. The Notice can also be accessed from the websites of the Stock Exchanges i.e. BSE Limited www.bseindia.com and the AGM Notice is also available on the website of NSDL (agency for providing the Remote e-Voting facility) i.e. www.evoting.nsdl.com.
8. The Shareholders are requested to notify their change of address immediately to the Registrars & Transfer Agent M/s. Skyline Financial Services Private Limited. The Company or its registrar will not act on any request received directly from the shareholder holding shares in electronic form for any change of bank particulars or bank mandate. Such changes are to be advised only to the Depository Participant by the Shareholders.

9. The Securities and Exchange Board of India (SEBI) has mandated the submission of Permanent Account Number (PAN) by every participant in the securities market. Members holding shares in electronic form are, therefore, requested to submit their PAN to the Depository Participants with whom they maintain their demat accounts. Members holding shares in physical form should submit their PAN to the Company.
10. Members intending to seek explanation /clarification about the Accounts at the Annual General Meeting are requested to inform the Company at least a week in advance of their intention to do so, so that relevant information may be made available, if the Chairman permits such information to be furnished.
11. To promote green initiative, members are requested to register their e-mail addresses through their Depository Participants for sending the future communications by e-mail.
12. The procedure and instructions for remote e-voting are, as follows:

Instructions for Casting Votes by Remote E-Voting

The remote e-voting period begins on Saturday, September 26, 2026 and will end on 5:00 P.M. on Monday, September 28, 2026. The remote e-voting module shall be disabled by NSDL for voting thereafter. The Members, whose names appear in the Register of Members / Beneficial Owners as on the record date (cut-off date) i.e. Tuesday, September 22, 2026, may cast their vote electronically. The voting right of shareholders shall be in proportion to their share in the paid-up equity share capital of the Company as on the cut-off date, being i.e. Tuesday, September 22, 2026.

How do I vote electronically using NSDL e-Voting system?

The way to vote electronically on NSDL e-Voting system consists of "Two Steps" which are mentioned below:

Step 1: Access to NSDL e-Voting system:

A) Login method for e-Voting for Individual shareholders holding securities in demat mode:

2. Select "EVEN" of company for which you wish to cast your vote during the remote e-Voting period and casting your vote during the General Meeting. For joining virtual meeting, you need to click on "VC/OAVM" link placed under "Join Meeting".
3. Now you are ready for e-Voting as the Voting page opens.
4. Cast your vote by selecting appropriate options i.e. assent or dissent, verify/modify the number of shares for which you wish to cast your vote and click on "Submit" and also "Confirm" when prompted.



5. Upon confirmation, the message "Vote cast successfully" will be displayed.
6. You can also take the printout of the votes cast by you by clicking on the print option on the confirmation page.
7. Once you confirm your vote on the resolution, you will not be allowed to modify your vote.

General Guidelines for shareholders:

1. Institutional shareholders (i.e. other than individuals, HUF, NRI etc.) are required to send scanned copy (PDF/JPG Format) of the relevant Board Resolution/ Authority letter etc. with attested specimen signature of the duly authorized signatory(ies) who are authorized to vote, to the Scrutinizer by email to csdhartipatel@gmail.com with a copy marked to evoting@nsdl.com. 2. It is strongly recommended not to share your password with any other person and take utmost care to keep your password confidential. The Scrutinizer shall, after the conclusion of voting at the AGM, unblock the votes cast through remote e-Voting and count the same, and count the votes cast during the AGM, and shall make, not later than 48 hours from the conclusion of the AGM, a consolidated Scrutinizer's Report of the total votes cast in favour or against, if any, to the Chairman or a person authorised by him in writing, who shall countersign the same and declare the result of the voting forthwith. The Scrutinizer's decision on the validity of the votes shall be final.

14. The results declared along with the report of Scrutinizer shall be placed on the website of the Company immediately after the declaration of results by the Chairman or any other Key Managerial

Personnel. The results shall also be forwarded to the Stock Exchange within 48 hours of the conclusion of Annual General Meeting.

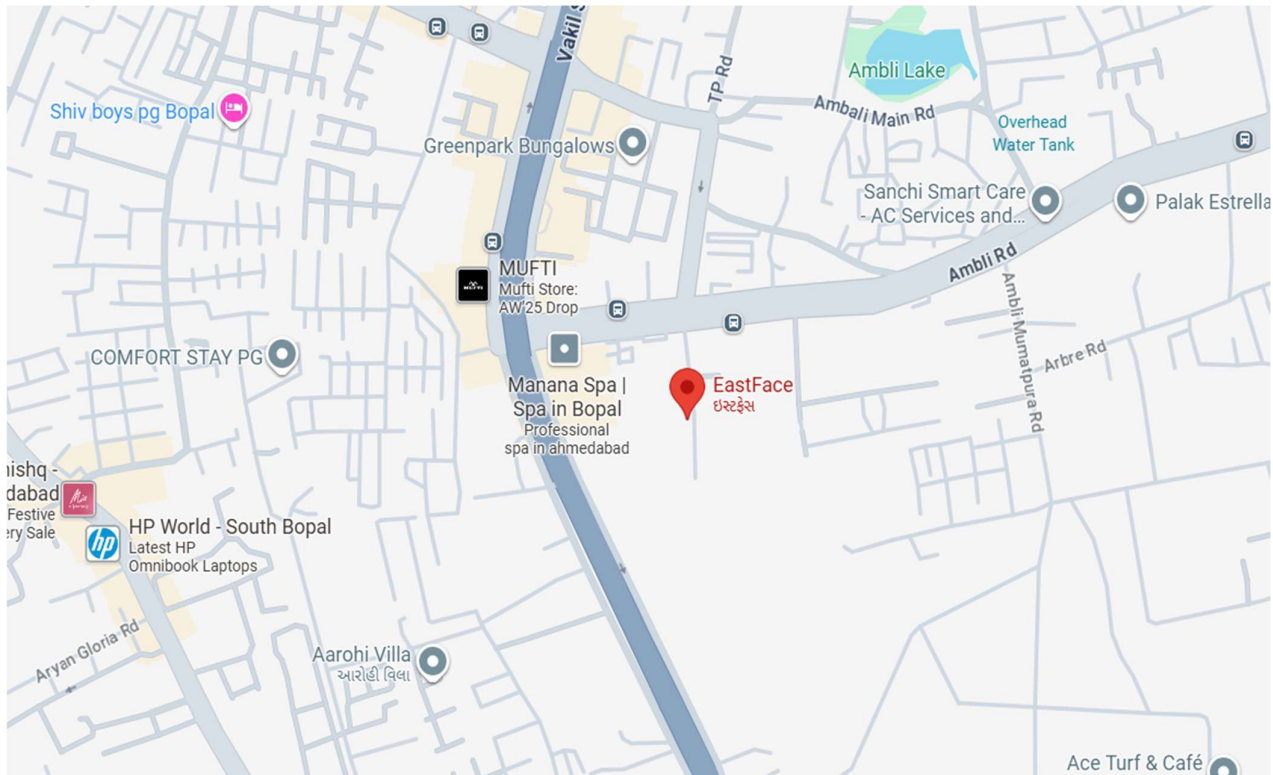

MANAGEMENT DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS REPORT

The management discussion and analysis report provide an over view of the financial activities for the fiscal year ended on 31st March 2026, gives an overall sight of the spinning industry, opportunities and threats in the business and Company's strategy to deal with that. This report is designed to focus on current years' activities, resulting changes and other known facts in conjunction to the financial and strategic position of the Company.

GEMS & JEWELLERY INDUSTRY STRUCTURE AND DEVELOPMENTS

The Indian jewellery industry remains a cornerstone of the nation's retail sector, with gold and diamond jewellery continuing to be in high demand across urban and rural markets. In FY 2025–26, despite inflationary pressures and global economic uncertainty, the industry-maintained resilience, supported by cultural affinity towards gold, rising disposable income, and increased digital penetration. Organized jewellery retail continued gaining ground, driven by consumer preference for trust, certification, and transparent pricing.

KEY INDUSTRY TRENDS:

- **Gold Price Dynamics and Their Impact on Demand:** Gold prices experienced a historic rally in FY 2025-26, with international prices gaining approximately 50%+ year-to-date and domestic prices rising approximately 73%, aided by a 5.6% depreciation in the INR. Domestic gold prices reached INR 1,69,403 per 10 grams as of January 2026 — the highest annual price increase for gold globally since 1979.
- **Sustainability and Ethical Sourcing:** Consumer consciousness around environmental and social impact is a growing influence on purchase behaviour, particularly among younger, urban demographics. Demand for responsibly sourced materials, transparent supply chains, recycled gold, conflict-free diamonds, and eco-friendly packaging is rising. Lab-grown diamonds are increasingly positioned as the sustainable alternative — a narrative that resonates strongly with Gen Z and millennial buyers.
- **Digital Transformation and Omnichannel Growth:** Digital adoption in jewellery retail has accelerated well beyond the initial post-pandemic phase. E-commerce platforms now influence over 60% of purchase decisions in metro cities. Several jewellery companies reported annual e-commerce revenue growth exceeding 100% during the festive season of FY 2025-26. Augmented reality virtual try-on technology has reduced product return rates by over 25%, improving operational efficiency.
- **Competitive Landscape:** The competitive landscape in India's organised jewellery retail continues to evolve rapidly. National brands are competing aggressively on store expansion, digital capabilities, product innovation, and customer relationship management. Regional and digitalfirst jewellers are carving niches through design differentiation, customisation, and omnichannel excellence. Consolidation is expected to accelerate as larger players acquire or partner with smaller, niche brands.

GOVERNMENT INITIATIVES AND BUDGETARY SUPPORT

The Indian government has introduced several measures to support and promote the gems and jewellery industry:

- **Customs Duty Reduction:** In Union Budget 2025–26, the tariff rate on articles of jewellery and parts thereof under heading 7113 and goldsmiths'/silversmiths' wares under heading 7114 was reduced from **25% to 20%**, effective May 1, 2025.
- **Taxation Reforms:** Government export-promotion initiatives seek to assist Indian jewellery

businesses in entering new international markets and reducing dependence on traditional export destinations.

- **Hallmarking Regulations:** The mandatory hallmarking framework continues to promote purity, transparency and consumer confidence in gold jewellery. The HUID system enables consumers to verify the authenticity and purity of hallmarked jewellery.
- **Export Promotion Mission:** The Government announced the Export Promotion Mission with an outlay of ₹25,060 crore for FY 2025–26 to FY 2030–31 to strengthen export competitiveness, market access and trade finance.
- **Support for MSMEs and Artisans:** The government has introduced schemes like PM Vishwakarma, PM SVANidhi, and Stand-Up India to support artisans and MSMEs in the gem and jewellery sector. Additionally, the introduction of the Parichay Card facilitates access to social security benefits for workers.

OPPORTUNITIES AND THREATS FOR INDUSTRY

OPPORTUNITIES:

- **Growing Preference for Branded Jewellery:** The shift towards organized retail and branded jewellery is gaining momentum, driven by consumer trust and transparency.
- **Expansion Potential in Tier-II and Tier-III Cities:** There is significant growth potential in smaller cities and towns, where organized retail penetration is still low.
- **Rising Demand for Lightweight and Contemporary Designs:** Changing consumer preferences towards lightweight and daily wear jewellery present new avenues for growth.

THREATS:

- **Fluctuations in Gold Prices:** Volatility in gold prices can impact consumer purchasing behaviour and profit margins.
- **Regulatory Changes:** Changes in taxation and import duties can affect cost structures and profitability.
- **Competition from Unorganized Sector:** The unorganized sector continues to pose a challenge, especially in price-sensitive markets.

Despite these risks, the gems and jewellery industry is a resilient industry, and it is expected to continue to grow in the coming years. In India this industry is one of the largest contributors to the global jewellery & diamond market and occupies a very significant position in the Indian economy.

Investment in sustainable jewellery has surged as consumers prioritize ethical and environmentally conscious choices.

GEMS AND JEWELLERY MARKET SIZE

India's jewellery retail sector continued to witness healthy growth during Fiscal 2025–26, supported by rising disposable incomes, increasing consumer preference for branded and organised jewellery retailers, changing jewellery consumption patterns and growing demand for contemporary designs and diamond-studded products. The continued expansion of organised retail, mandatory hallmarking and improved consumer buying experience have further contributed to the formalisation of the jewellery retail market.

The Indian gems and jewellery market was estimated at approximately US\$85 billion (₹7.31 lakh crore) in 2025–26 and is expected to reach approximately US\$130 billion by 2030, driven by increasing urbanisation, higher consumer spending, premiumisation, greater trust in organised retailers and the continued cultural significance of gold jewellery in India. The sector is also expected to benefit from increasing adoption of digital channels, wider retail networks and evolving consumer preferences towards branded and certified jewellery.

EXPORT

As per Ministry of Commerce and Trade:

During FY 2025-26, India's total exports of merchandise and services were estimated at US\$ 860.09 billion, reflecting the continued strength and resilience of India's external trade.

During FY 2025-26, non-petroleum and non-gems & jewellery exports remained a significant component of India's export basket, while gems and jewellery exports continued to contribute substantially to the country's merchandise exports, supported by sustained demand from key international markets.

FUTURE OUTLOOK

The Indian gems and jewellery industry is expected to witness sustained growth during FY 2025-26, driven by rising disposable incomes, urbanisation, changing consumer preferences and increasing demand for branded, certified and organised jewellery. The sector is expected to benefit from continued formalisation, mandatory hallmarking, premiumisation, expansion of organised retail, adoption of digital and omnichannel platforms and growing preference for contemporary and lightweight jewellery. Government initiatives supporting exports, quality standards, financing and ease of doing business are also expected to strengthen the industry's competitiveness and provide opportunities for organised jewellery retailers and manufacturers.

1. Company Information:

The financial statements are presented in Indian Rupees (INR) which is also the functional currency of the Company.

The financial statements for the year ended 31 March 2026 were authorized and approved for issue by the Board of Directors on 30 May 2026. The revision to the financial statements is permitted by the Board of Directors after obtaining necessary approvals or at the instance of regulatory authorities as per provisions of the Act.

3. Basis of Preparation

a) Statement of Compliances

The financial statements of the Company have been prepared in accordance with Indian Accounting Standards (Ind AS) notified under section 133 of the Companies Act, 2013 read with the Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Rules, 2015, as amended from time to time and other accounting principles generally accepted in India.

These financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention with the exception of certain assets and liabilities that are required to be carried at fair value by Ind AS. The financial statements are presented in INR except when otherwise stated.

b) Significant accounting judgements, accounting estimates and assumptions

The preparation of financial statements requires management to make certain judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of revenues, expenses, assets and liabilities (including contingent liabilities) and the accompanying disclosures. Estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis.

Key sources of estimation uncertainty

The key assumptions concerning the future and other key sources of estimation uncertainty at the reporting date, that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities within the next financial years, are described below. Existing circumstances and assumptions about future developments may change due to market changes or circumstances arising that are beyond the control of the Company. Such changes are reflected in the assumptions when they occur.

4. Application of new or amended standards

As per Ind AS-1, the concept of 'Significant Accounting Policies' has given way to 'Material Accounting Policies', the latter enjoins disclosure of only accounting policies in company specific context out of multiple options granted under Ind AS for such treatments. Pursuant to this the accounting policies have been divided into two parts: -

Material Accounting Policies

Other Accounting Policies

5A. Material Accounting Policies

The financial statements have been prepared using the material and other accounting policies and measurement bases summarized below:

a) Revenue Recognition

Revenue from contract with customer is recognised upon transfer of control of promised products or services to customers on complete satisfaction of performance obligations for an amount that reflects the consideration which the Company expects to receive in exchange for those products or services. Revenue is measured based on the transaction price which is the consideration, adjusted for discounts and other incentives, if any, as per contracts with the customers. Revenue also excludes taxes or amounts collected from customers in its capacity as agent. The specific recognition criteria from various stream of revenue is described below:

- **Sale of Goods**

Revenue from sale of goods is recognised when the Company transfers control of the goods, generally on delivery, or when the goods have been dispatched to the customer's specified location as per the terms of contract, provided the company has not retained any significant risk of ownership or future obligation with respect to the goods dispatched.

- **Interest Income:**

Interest income is accrued on a time basis, by reference to the principal outstanding and at the effective interest rate applicable, which is the rate that exactly discounts estimated future cash receipts through the expected life of the financial asset to that asset's net carrying amount on initial recognition.

- Other incomes have been recognized on accrual basis in the financial statements, except when there is uncertainty of collection.

b) Impairment of Financial Assets:

In accordance with Ind AS 109 'Financial Instruments', the Company applies Expected Credit Loss ('ECL') model for measurement and recognition of impairment loss for financial assets. ECL is the weighted-average of difference between all contractual cash flows that are due to the Company in accordance with the contract and all the cash flows that the Company expects to receive, discounted at the original effective interest rate, with the respective risks of default occurring as the weights. When estimating the cash flows, the Company is required to consider:

All contractual terms of the financial assets (including prepayment and extension) over the expected life of the assets;

Cash flows from the sale of collateral held or other credit enhancements that are integral to the contractual terms.

Trade Receivables: In respect of trade receivables, the Company applies the simplified approach of Ind AS 109 'Financial Instruments', which requires measurement of loss allowance at an amount equal to lifetime expected credit losses. Lifetime expected credit losses are the expected credit losses that result from all possible default events over the expected life of a financial instrument.

Other Financial Assets: In respect of its other financial assets, the Company assesses if the credit risk on those financial assets has increased significantly since initial recognition. If the credit risk has not increased significantly since initial recognition, the Company measures the loss allowance at an amount equal to 12-month expected credit losses, else at an amount equal to the lifetime expected credit losses.

When making this assessment, the Company uses the change in the risk of a default occurring over the expected life of the financial asset. To make that assessment, the Company compares the risk of a default occurring on the financial asset as at the balance sheet date with the risk of a default occurring on the financial asset as at the date of initial recognition and considers reasonable and supportable information, that is available without undue cost or effort, that is indicative of significant increases in credit risk since initial recognition. The Company assumes that the credit risk on a financial asset has not increased significantly since initial recognition if the financial asset is determined to have a low credit risk at the balance sheet date.

c) Taxation:

Income tax expense comprises current tax expense and the net change in the deferred tax asset or liability during the year. Current and deferred taxes are recognised in Statement of Profit and Loss, except when they relate to items that are recognised in other comprehensive income or directly in equity, in which case, the current and deferred tax are also recognised in other comprehensive income or directly in equity, respectively.

1. Current Tax

Current income tax assets and liabilities are measured at the amount expected to be recovered from or paid to the taxation authorities. Current income tax(including Minimum Alternate Tax (MAT)) is measured at the amount expected to be paid to the tax authorities in accordance with the Income-Tax Act, 1961 enacted in India. The tax rates and tax laws used to compute the amount are those that are enacted or substantially enacted, at the reporting date.

Current income tax relating to items recognised outside the statement of profit and loss is recognised outside the statement of profit and loss (either in other comprehensive income (OCI) or in equity). Management periodically evaluates positions taken in the tax returns with respect to situations in which applicable tax regulations are subject to interpretation and establishes provisions where appropriate.

2. Deferred Tax

Deferred tax assets and liabilities are recognised for deductible and taxable temporary differences arising between the tax base of assets and liabilities and their carrying amount, except when the deferred tax arises from the initial recognition of an asset or liability in a transaction that is not a business combination and affects neither accounting nor taxable profit or loss at the time of the transaction.

Deferred tax assets are recognised to the extent that it is probable that taxable profit will be available against which the deductible temporary differences, and the carry forward of unused tax credits and unused tax losses can be utilised.

Deferred tax assets and liabilities are measured at the tax rates that are expected to apply in the year when the asset is realised or the liability is settled, based on tax rates (and tax laws) that have been enacted or substantively enacted at the reporting date.

Deferred tax includes MAT tax credit. The Company recognises tax credits in the nature of MAT credit as an asset only to the extent that there is convincing evidence that the Company will pay normal income tax during the specified period, i.e., the period for which tax credit is allowed to be carried forward. In the year in which the Company recognises tax credits as an asset, the said asset is created by way of tax credit to the statement of profit and loss. The Company reviews such tax credit asset at each reporting date to assess its recoverability.

5B Other Accounting Policies

The financial statements have been prepared using the material and other accounting policies and measurement bases summarized below:

a. Current / Non-current Classification:

All assets and liabilities have been classified as current or non-current as per the Company's normal operating cycle and other criteria set-out in the Act. Deferred tax assets and liabilities are classified as non-current assets and non-current liabilities, as the case may be. The operating cycle is the time between the acquisition of assets for processing and their realisation in cash and cash equivalents.

Any asset or liability is classified as current if it satisfies any of the following conditions:

- i) The asset/liability is expected to be realized/ settled in the Company's normal operating cycle;
- ii) The asset is intended for sale or consumption;
- iii) The asset/liability is held primarily for the purpose of trading;
- iv) The asset/liability is expected to be realized/ settled within twelve months after the reporting period;
- v) The asset is cash or cash equivalent unless it is restricted from being exchanged or used to settle a liability for at least twelve months after the reporting date;
- vi) In the case of a liability, the Company does not have an unconditional right to defer settlement of the liability for at least twelve months after the reporting date.

All other assets and liabilities are classified as non-current. Deferred tax assets and liabilities are classified as non-current assets and liabilities respectively.

For the purpose of current/non-current classification of assets and liabilities, the Company has ascertained its normal operating cycle as twelve months. This is based on the nature of services and the time between the acquisition of assets or inventories for processing and their realization in cash and cash equivalents.

b. Financial Instruments:

Initial recognition and measurement

Financial assets and financial liabilities are recognized when the Company becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the financial instrument and are measured initially at fair value adjusted for transaction costs, except for those carried at fair value through profit or loss which are measured initially at fair value. Subsequent measurement of financial assets and financial liabilities is described below:

Non-derivative Financial Assets

Subsequent measurement

◀ Financial Assets carried at Amortized Cost

A financial asset is measured at the amortized cost, if both the following conditions are met:

- a. The asset is held within a business model whose objective is to hold assets for collecting contractual cash flows; and
- b. Contractual terms of the asset give rise on specified dates to cash flows that are solely payments of principal and interest ('SPPI') on the principal amount outstanding.

After initial measurement, such financial assets are subsequently measured at amortized cost using the effective interest rate ('EIR') method.

◀ Investments in Equity Instruments of Subsidiaries and Joint Ventures

Investments in equity instruments of subsidiaries and joint ventures are accounted for at cost in accordance with Ind AS 27 'Separate Financial Statements'.

◀ Investments in Other Equity Instruments

Investments in equity instruments which are held for trading are classified as at fair value through profit or loss ('FVTPL'). For all other equity instruments, the Company makes an irrevocable choice upon initial recognition, on an instrument by instrument basis, to classify the same either as at fair value through other comprehensive income ('FVTOCI') or FVTPL. Amounts presented in other comprehensive income are not subsequently transferred to profit or loss. However, the Company transfers the cumulative gain or loss within equity. Dividends on such investments are recognized in profit or loss unless the dividend clearly represents a recovery of part of the cost of the investment.

◀ Debt Instruments

Debt instruments are initially measured at amortized cost, FVTOCI or FVTPL till de-recognition on the basis of:

- i. the entity's business model for managing the financial assets; and
- ii. the contractual cash flow characteristics of the financial asset.

a. Measured at Amortized Cost

Financial assets that are held within a business model whose objective is to hold financial assets in order to collect contractual cash flows that are solely payments of principal and interest, are subsequently measured at amortized cost using the EIR method less impairment, if any. The amortization of EIR and loss arising from impairment, if any, is recognized in the Standalone Statement of Profit and Loss.

b. Measured at Fair Value through other Comprehensive Income

Financial assets that are held within a business model whose objective is achieved by both, selling financial assets and collecting contractual cash flows that are solely payments of principal and interest, are subsequently measured at FVTOCI. Fair value movements are recognized in the other comprehensive income ('OCI'). Interest income measured using the EIR method and impairment losses, if any are recognized in the Standalone Statement of Profit and Loss. On de-recognition, cumulative gain or loss previously recognized in OCI is reclassified from the equity to 'other income' in the Standalone Statement of Profit and Loss.

c. Measured at Fair Value through Profit or Loss

A financial asset not classified as either amortized cost or FVTOCI, is classified as FVTPL. Such financial assets are measured at fair value with all changes in fair value, including interest income and dividend income, if any, recognized as 'other income' in the Standalone Statement of Profit and Loss.

Investments in Mutual Funds

Investments in mutual funds are measured at FVTPL.

De-recognition of financial assets

A financial asset is primarily de-recognized when the contractual rights to receive cash flows from the asset have expired or the Company has transferred its rights to receive cash flows from the asset.

Non-derivative Financial Liabilities

Subsequent measurement

Subsequent to initial recognition, all non-derivative financial liabilities are measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

De-recognition of financial liabilities

A financial liability is de-recognized when the obligation under the liability is discharged or cancelled or expired. When an existing financial liability is replaced by another from the same lender on substantially different terms or the terms of an existing liability are substantially modified, such an exchange or modification is treated as the de-recognition of the original liability and the recognition of a new liability. The difference in the respective carrying amounts is recognized in the Standalone Statement of Profit and Loss.

Derivative Financial Instruments

The Company holds derivative financial instruments in the form of future contracts to mitigate the risk of changes in exchange rates on foreign currency exposure. The counterparty for these contracts are scheduled commercial banks / regulated brokerage firms. Although these derivatives constitute hedges from an economic perspective, they do not qualify for hedge accounting under Ind AS 109 'Financial Instruments' and consequently are categorized as financial assets or financial liabilities at FVTPL. The resulting exchange gain or loss is included in other income / expenses and attributable transaction costs are recognized in the Standalone Statement of Profit and Loss when incurred.

Financial Guarantee Contracts

Financial guarantee contracts are those contracts that require a payment to be made to reimburse the holder for a loss it incurs because the specified party fails to make a payment when due in accordance with the terms of a debt instrument. Financial guarantee contracts are recognized as a financial liability at the time the guarantee is issued at fair value, adjusted for transaction costs that are directly attributable to the issuance of the guarantee. Subsequently, the liability is measured at the higher of the amount of expected loss allowance determined as per impairment requirements of Ind AS 109 'Financial Instruments' and the amount recognized less cumulative amortization.

Offsetting of Financial Instruments

Financial assets and financial liabilities are offset and the net amount is reported in the Standalone Balance Sheet if there is a currently enforceable legal right to offset the recognized amounts and there is an intention to settle on a net basis, to realize the assets and settle the liabilities simultaneously.

c. Fair Value Measurement:

The Company measures financial instruments, such as, derivatives at fair value at each Standalone Balance Sheet date.

Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. The fair value measurement is based on the presumption that the transaction to sell the asset or transfer the liability takes place either:

- In the principal market for the asset or liability; or
- In the absence of a principal market, in the most advantageous market for the asset or liability.

The principal or the most advantageous market must be accessible by the Company.

The fair value of an asset or a liability is measured using the assumptions that market participants would use when pricing the asset or liability, assuming that market participants act in their economic best interest.

A fair value measurement of a non-financial asset takes into account a market participant's ability to generate economic benefits by using the asset in its highest and best use or by selling it to another market participant that would use the asset in its highest and best use.

The Company uses valuation techniques that are appropriate in the circumstances and for which sufficient data is available to measure fair value, maximizing the use of relevant observable inputs and minimizing the use of unobservable inputs.

All assets and liabilities for which fair value is measured or disclosed in the financial statements are categorized within the fair value hierarchy, described as follows, based on the lowest level input that is significant to the fair value measurement as a whole:

Level 1 — Quoted (unadjusted) market prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities.

Level 2 — Valuation techniques for which the lowest level input that is significant to the fair value measurement is directly or indirectly observable.

Level 3 — Valuation techniques for which the lowest level input that is significant to the fair value measurement is unobservable.

For assets and liabilities that are recognized in the financial statements on a recurring basis, the Company determines whether transfers have occurred between levels in the hierarchy by reassessing categorization (based on the lowest level input that is significant to the fair value measurement as a whole) at the end of each reporting period.

The Company's management determines the policies and procedures for both recurring fair value measurement, such as derivative instruments and unquoted financial assets measured at fair value, and for non-recurring measurement, such as assets held for distribution in discontinued operations.

d. Inventories:

Inventories are valued at the lower of cost or net realizable value. Cost includes purchase price, duties, transport, handling costs and other costs directly attributable to the acquisition and bringing the inventories to their present location and condition. Net realisable value is the estimated selling price in

the ordinary course of business less the estimated costs of completion and the estimated costs necessary to make the sale.

e. Employee Benefits:

Short Term Employee Benefits Employee benefits payable wholly within twelve months of rendering the services are classified as short-term employee benefits and recognized in the period in which the employee renders the related service. These are re-recognized at the undiscounted amount of the benefits expected to be paid in exchange for that service.

i. Provisions, Contingent Liability and Contingent Assets:

- Provisions are recognized only when there is a present obligation, as a result of past events and when a reliable estimate of the amount of obligation can be made at the reporting date. These estimates are reviewed at each reporting date and adjusted to reflect the current best estimates. Provisions are discounted to their present values, where the time value of money is material.
- Contingent liability is disclosed for: a. Possible obligations which will be confirmed only by future events not wholly within the control of the Company; or b. Present obligations arising from past events where it is not probable that an outflow of resources will be required to settle the obligation or a reliable estimate of the amount of the obligation cannot be made.
- Contingent assets are neither recognized nor disclosed except when realization of income is virtually certain, related asset is recognized.

j. Operating Segments:

Operating segments are reported in a manner consistent with the internal reporting provided to the Chief Operating Decision Maker ('CODM') of the Company. The CODM is responsible for allocating resources and assessing performance of the operating segments of the Company.

k. Earnings per Share:

Basic earnings per share are calculated by dividing the net profit for the period attributable to equity shareholders by the weighted average number of equity shares outstanding during the period.

For the purpose of calculating diluted earnings per share, the net profit for the period attributed to equity shareholders and the weighted average number of shares outstanding during the period is adjusted for the effects of all potentially dilutive equity shares.

l. Cash and Cash Equivalents:

For the purpose of the Standalone Statement of Cash Flows, cash and cash equivalents consist of cash and cheques in hand, bank balances, demand deposits with banks where the original maturity is three months or less and other short-term highly liquid investments net of outstanding bank

overdrafts and cash credit facilities as they are considered an integral part of the Company's cash management.

m. Functional and presentation currency:

Items included in the standalone financial statements of the Company are measured using the currency of the primary economic environment in which the Company operates (i.e. the "functional currency"). The standalone financial statements are presented in Indian Rupee, the national currency of India, which is the functional currency of the Company.

n. Related Party Disclosure:

List of related parties where control exists and also related parties with whom transactions have taken place and relationships, has been disclosed in **Note No. 23** to the Notes to Accounts.

q. Expenditure:

Expenses are net of taxes recoverable, where applicable.

r. Other Note:

1. As per the Ministry of Corporate Affairs (MCA) notification, proviso to Rule 3(1) of the Companies (Accounts) Rules, 2014, for the financial year commencing April 1, 2023, every company which uses accounting software for maintaining its books of account, shall use only such accounting software which has a feature of recording audit trail of each and every transaction, creating an edit log of each change made in the books of account along with the date when such changes were made and ensuring that the audit trail cannot be disabled. The interpretation and guidance on what level edit log and audit trail needs to be maintained evolved during the year and continues to evolve.

In the company, the accounting software has a feature of audit trail, but it was disable at an application level for maintenance of books of accounts and relevant transactions. However, the global standard ERP used by the Company has not been enabled with the feature of audit trail log at the

database layer to log direct transactional changes, due to present design of ERP. This is being taken up with the vendor. In the meanwhile, the Company continues to ensure that direct write access to the database is granted only via an approved change management process.

2.Compliance with SEBI (Prohibition of Insider Trading) Regulations, 2015

The Company has adopted a Code of Conduct and established internal controls in accordance with the SEBI (Prohibition of Insider Trading) Regulations, 2015, as amended from time to time, to regulate, monitor and report trading activities of Designated Persons and their Immediate Relatives.

The Company has implemented adequate procedures for identification, handling, communication and protection of Unpublished Price Sensitive Information (UPSI). Access to UPSI is restricted on a need-to-know basis to ensure its confidentiality and integrity.

The Company also maintains a Structured Digital Database and other necessary records as prescribed under the applicable regulations and has put in place appropriate mechanisms to prevent insider trading and unauthorized disclosure of UPSI. The Company has complied with the applicable provisions of the SEBI (Prohibition of Insider Trading) Regulations, 2015 during the year.

S. Equity Share Capital:

As on 9th May 2025, Company is listed on BSE SME stock exchange. Company has issued fresh new equity shares through initial public offer.

5C. Significant management judgement in applying material and other accounting policies and estimation uncertainty:

The preparation of the Company's financial statements requires the management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of revenues, expenses, assets and liabilities, and the accompanying disclosures, and the disclosure of contingent liabilities:

- **Recoverability of advances / receivables**

At each balance sheet date, based on historical default rates observed over expected life, the management assesses the expected credit losses on outstanding receivables and advances.

- **Provisions**

At each balance sheet date basis the management judgment, changes in facts and legal aspects, the Company assesses the requirement of provisions against the outstanding contingent liabilities. However, the actual future outcome may be different from this judgement.

- **Contingencies**

Contingent liabilities may arise from the ordinary course of business in relation to claims against the Company. By their nature, contingencies will be resolved only when one or more uncertain future events occur or fail to occur. The assessment of the existence, and potential quantum, of contingencies inherently involves the exercise of significant judgments by management and the use of estimates regarding the outcome of future events

- **Fair value measurements**

Management applies valuation techniques to determine the fair value of financial instruments (where active market quotes are not available) and share based payments. This involves developing estimates and assumptions consistent with how market participants would price the instrument. The Company engages third party valuers, where required, to perform the valuation. Information about the valuation techniques and inputs used in determining the fair value of various assets, liabilities and share based payments are disclosed in the notes to standalone financial statements.

- **Inventories**

The Company estimates the net realizable values of inventories, taking into account the most reliable evidence available at each reporting date. The future realization of these inventories may be affected by future demand or other market-driven changes that may reduce future selling prices.

- **Income taxes**

The Company's tax jurisdiction is India. Significant judgements are involved in estimating budgeted profits for the purpose of paying advance tax, determining the provision for income taxes, including amount expected to be paid / recovered for uncertain tax positions. The extent to which deferred tax

assets/minimum alternate tax credit can be recognized is based on management's assessment of the probability of the future taxable income against which the deferred tax assets/minimum alternate tax credit can be utilized.

5D. Amended standard adopted by the Company

Ministry of Corporate Affairs ("MCA") notifies new standards or amendments to the existing standards under Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Rules as issued from time to time. During the year ended

March 31, 2026, MCA has notified the Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Amendment Rules, 2025 applicable to the company w.e.f. April 1, 2025.

(i) Amendments to Ind AS 1 – Classification of Liabilities as Current or Non-Current and Non Current Liabilities with Covenants:

In August 2025, the MCA notified amendments to Ind AS 1 to specify the requirements for classifying liabilities as current or non-current.

The amendments clarify:

- What is meant by a right to defer settlement
- That a right to defer must exist at the end of the reporting period
- That classification is unaffected by the likelihood that an entity will exercise its deferral right
- That only if an embedded derivative in a convertible liability is itself an equity instrument would the terms of a liability not impact its classification.

In addition, a requirement has been introduced to require disclosure when a liability arising from a loan agreement is classified as non-current and the entity's right to defer settlement is contingent on compliance with future covenants within twelve months. If there is a breach of a material covenant of a long term loan arrangement on or before the end of the reporting period, resulting in the liability becoming payable on demand as at the reporting date, and the lender agrees—after the reporting period but before the financial statements are approved for issue— not to demand repayment for at least 12 months as a consequence of the breach, this shall be treated as an adjusting event. Accordingly, the entity is not required to classify the liability as current. The amendments are effective for annual reporting periods beginning on or after April 1, 2025 retrospectively in accordance with Ind AS 8.

The amendments do not have a material impact on the Company's financial statements.

(ii) Amendments to Ind AS 7 and Ind AS 107 – Supplier Finance Arrangements:

In August 2025, the MCA notified amendments to Ind AS 7 Statement of Cash Flows and Ind AS 107 Financial Instruments: Disclosures to clarify the characteristics of supplier finance arrangements and require additional disclosure of such arrangements. The disclosure requirements in the amendments are intended to assist users of financial statements in

understanding the effects of supplier finance arrangements on an entity's liabilities, cash flows and exposure to liquidity risk.
