NOTES :-

- a) The Explanatory Statement pursuant to section 102 (1) of the Companies Act, 2013 in respect of the Special Business under item no 3 to 4 as stated above in annexed hereto.
- b) The Ministry of Corporate Affairs (“MCA”) vide its circular dated April 8, 2020, April 13, 2020, May 5, 2020, December 8, 2021, May 5, 2022, December 28, 2022 and September 25, 2023 (collectively referred to as “MCA Circulars”), and Securities & Exchange Board of India (SEBI) vide its Circular No. SEBI/HO/CFD/PoD-2/P/CIR/2023/4 dated January 5, 2023 read with Circular No. SEBI/HO/CFD/CMD2/CIR/P/2022/62 dated May 13, 2022, Circular No SEBI/HO/CFD/CMD1/CIR/F/2020/11 dated January 15, 2021 and Circular No. SEBI/HO/CFD/CMD1/CIR/F/2020/79 dated May 12, 2020 (collectively referred to as “SEBI Circulars”) permitted convening the Annual General Meeting (“AGM”) through Video Conferencing (“VC”) or Other Audio Visual Means (“OAVM”), without physical presence of the members at a common venue. In accordance with the MCA and SEBI Circulars, provisions of the Companies Act, 2013 (“the Act”) and the Securities and Exchange Board of India (Listing Obligations and Disclosure Requirements) Regulations, 2015 (“Listing Regulations”), this 42nd AGM is being held through VC/OAVM, which does not require physical presence of members at a common venue. The deemed venue for the 42nd AGM shall be the Registered Office of the Company.
- c) Since this General Meeting is held through VC/OAVM the physical attendance of members is dispensed with and no proxies would be accepted by the Company pursuant to the relevant MCA Circulars.
- d) No attendance slip/route map has been sent along with this Notice of the Meeting as the meeting is held through Audio Visual means.
- e) The attendance through VC/OAVM is restricted and hence members will be allowed on first come first serve basis. However, attendance of Members holding more than 2% of the shares of the Company, and Directors and Key Managerial Personnel, the Chairpersons of the Audit Committee, Nomination and Remuneration Committee, the Stakeholders Relationship Committee and Auditors will not be restricted on first come first serve basis.
- f) Members attending the Meeting through VC/OAVM will be counted for the purposes of reckoning of Quorum under Section 103 of the Companies Act, 2013.
- g) In line with the MCA Circulars and the SEBI Circular, the Notice calling the AGM has been uploaded on the website of the Company at www.bluegod.in. The Notice can also be accessed from the website of the Stock Exchange i.e. BSE Limited at www.bseindia.com.
- h) Members are requested to notify immediately changes, if any, in their registered addresses to the Company's Registrar and Share Transfer Agents Purva Sharegistry (India) Private Limited : 9, Shiv Shakti Industrial Estate, J.R. - i) Members are also requested to furnish their Bank details to the company's Share Transfer Agents immediately for printing the same on the dividend warrants/Cheques to prevent fraudulent encashment of the instruments.
- j) Members holding shares in physical form are requested to consider converting their holding to dematerialized form to eliminate all risks associated with physical shares and for ease of portfolio management. Members can contact the Company for assistance in this regard. Members who hold shares in dematerialized form are requested to bring their Client ID and DP ID numbers for easy identification of attendance at the meeting and number of shares held by them.
- k) Members holding shares in physical form in identical order of names in more than one folio are requested to send to the Company, the details of such folios together with the share certificates for consolidating their holdings in one folio. A consolidated share certificate will be returned to such Members after making requisite changes thereon.
- l) The Ministry of Corporate Affairs (“MCA”) has taken a “Green Initiative in the Corporate Governance” by allowing paperless compliances by Companies and has issued a circular on April 21, 2011 stating that the service of document by a Company can be made through electronic mode.
- m) In compliance with the provisions of Section 108 of the Companies Act, 2013 and the Rules framed there under and the SEBI (LODR) Regulation 2015, the Members are provided with the facility to cast their vote electronically, through the e-voting services provided by Central Depository Services (India) Limited (CDSL), on all the resolutions set forth in this Notice. Resolution(s) passed by Members through remote e-voting/ e-voting is deemed to have been passed as if they have been passed at the AGM.
- n) CS Vishakha Agrawal of Vishakha Agrawal & Associates., Practicing Company Secretaries (Membership No. 39298) has been appointed as the Scrutinizer to scrutinize the voting and remote evoting process (including the Ballot Form received from the Members who do not have access to the evoting process) in a fair and transparent manner.
- o) A member may participate in the general meeting even after exercising his right to vote through remote e-voting but shall not be allowed to vote again.
- p) The chairman shall, at the general meeting at the end of discussion on the resolution on which voting is to be held, allow voting with assistance of scrutinizer, by using an e-voting system for all the members who are present at the general meeting but have not cast their votes by availing the remote e-voting facilities.
- q) If a company opts to provide the same electronic system as used during the remote e-voting during the general meeting, the said facility shall be in operation till all the resolutions are considered and voted upon in the meeting and may be used for voting by the member attending the meeting and who have not exercised their vote through remote e- voting.

Members desirous to avail of this facility may send their nomination in the prescribed Form No. SH-13 duly filled into the office of Purva Sharegistry (India) Private Limited, Registrar and Share Transfer Agent of the Company. Members holding shares in electronic mode may contact their respective Depository Participants for availing this facility.

CDSL e-Voting System – For e-voting and Joining Virtual meetings.

1. As you are aware, in view of the situation arising due to COVID-19 global pandemic, the general meetings of the companies shall be conducted as per the guidelines issued by the Ministry of Corporate Affairs (MCA) vide Circular No. 14/2020 dated April 8, 2020, Circular No.17/2020 dated April 13, 2020 and Circular No. 20/2020 dated May 05, 2020. The forthcoming AGM/EGM will thus be held through video conferencing (VC) or other audio visual means (OAVM). Hence, Members can attend and participate in the ensuing AGM/EGM through VC/OAVM.
2. Pursuant to the provisions of Section 108 of the Companies Act, 2013 read with Rule 20 of the Companies (Management and Administration) Rules, 2014 (as amended) and Regulation 44 of SEBI (Listing Obligations & Disclosure Requirements) Regulations 2015 (as amended), and MCA Circulars dated April 08, 2020, April 13, 2020 and May 05, 2020 the Company is providing facility of remote e-voting to its Members in respect of the business to be transacted at the AGM/EGM. For this purpose, the Company has entered into an agreement with Central Depository Services (India) Limited (CDSL) for facilitating voting through electronic means, as the authorized e-Voting's agency. The facility of casting votes by a member using remote e-voting as well as the e-voting system on the date of the EGM/AGM will be provided by CDSL.
3. The Members can join the EGM/AGM in the VC/OAVM mode 15 minutes before and after the scheduled time of the commencement of the Meeting by following the procedure mentioned in the Notice. The facility of participation at the EGM/AGM through VC/OAVM will be made available to at least 1000 members on first come first served basis. This will not include large Shareholders (Shareholders holding 2% or more shareholding), Promoters, Institutional Investors, Directors, Key Managerial Personnel, the Chairpersons of the Audit Committee, Nomination and Remuneration Committee and Stakeholders Relationship Committee, Auditors etc. who are allowed to attend the EGM/AGM without restriction on account of first come first served basis.
4. The attendance of the Members attending the AGM/EGM through VC/OAVM will be counted for the purpose of ascertaining the quorum under Section 103 of the Companies Act, 2013.
5. Pursuant to MCA Circular No. 14/2020 dated April 08, 2020, the facility to appoint proxy to attend and cast vote for the members is not available for this AGM/EGM. However, in

pursuance of Section 112 and Section 113 of the Companies Act, 2013, representatives of the members such as the President of India or the Governor of a State or body corporate can attend the AGM/EGM through VC/OAVM and cast their votes through e-voting.

6. In line with the Ministry of Corporate Affairs (MCA) Circular No. 17/2020 dated April 13, 2020, the Notice calling the AGM/EGM has been uploaded on the website of the Company at www.bluegod.in. The Notice can also be accessed from the websites of the Stock Exchanges i.e. BSE Limited at www.bseindia.com. The AGM/EGM Notice is also disseminated on the website of CDSL (agency for providing the Remote e-Voting facility and e-voting system during the AGM/EGM) i.e. www.evotingindia.com.
7. The AGM/EGM has been convened through VC/OAVM in compliance with applicable provisions of the Companies Act, 2013 read with MCA Circular No. 14/2020 dated April 8, 2020 and MCA Circular No. 17/2020 dated April 13, 2020 and MCA Circular No. 20/2020 dated May 05, 2020.
8. In continuation to this Ministry's General Circular No. 20/2020 dated 05.05.2020, General Circular No. 02/2022 dated 05.05.2022, General Circular No. 10/2022 dated 28.12.2022 and General Circular No. 09/2023 dated 25.09.2023 after due examination, it has been decided to allow companies whose AGMs are due in the Year 2024 or 2025, to conduct their AGMs through VC or OAVM on or before 30th September, 2025 in accordance with the requirements laid down in Para 3 and Para 4 of the General Circular No. 20/2020 dated 05.05.2020.

THE INTRUCTIONS OF SHAREHOLDERS FOR E-VOTING AND JOINING VIRTUAL MEETINGS ARE AS UNDER:

Step 1: Access through Depositories CDSL/NSDL e-Voting system in case of individual shareholders holding shares in demat mode.

Step 2: Access through CDSL e-Voting system in case of shareholders holding shares in physical mode and non-individual shareholders in demat mode.

- (i) The voting period begins on Wednesday, 23rd September, 2026 (09:00 AM) and ends on Friday, 25th September, 2026 (05:00 PM), during this period shareholders of the Company, holding shares either in physical form or in dematerialized form, as on the Saturday, 19th September, 2026 (record date/Cut-off date) may cast their vote electronically. The e-voting module shall be disabled by CDSL for voting thereafter.
- (ii) Shareholders who have already voted prior to the meeting date would not be entitled to vote at the meeting venue.
- (iii) Pursuant to SEBI Circular No. **SEBI/HO/CFD/CMD/CIR/P/2020/242 dated 09.12.2020**, under Regulation 44 of Securities and Exchange Board of India (Listing Obligations and Disclosure Requirements) Regulations, 2015, listed entities are required to provide remote e-voting facility to its shareholders, in respect of all shareholders' resolutions. However, it has been observed that the participation by the public non-institutional shareholders/retail shareholders is at a negligible level.

Currently, there are multiple e-voting service providers (ESPs) providing e-voting facility to listed entities in India. This necessitates registration on various ESPs and maintenance of multiple user IDs and passwords by the shareholders.

In order to increase the efficiency of the voting process, pursuant to a public consultation, it has been decided to enable e-voting to **all the demat account holders, by way of a single login credential, through their demat accounts/ websites of Depositories/ Depository Participants**. Demat account holders would be able to cast their vote without having to register again with the ESPs, thereby, not only facilitating seamless authentication but also enhancing ease and convenience of participating in e-voting process.

Step 1: Access through Depositories CDSL/NSDL e-Voting system in case of individual shareholders holding shares in demat mode.

- (iv) In terms of **SEBI circular no. SEBI/HO/CFD/CMD/CIR/P/2020/242 dated December 9, 2020** on e-Voting facility provided by Listed Companies, Individual shareholders holding securities in demat mode are allowed to vote through their demat account maintained with Depositories and Depository Participants. Shareholders are advised to update their mobile number and email Id in their demat accounts in order to access e-Voting facility.

Pursuant to abovesaid SEBI Circular, Login method for e-Voting and joining virtual meetings **for Individual shareholders holding securities in Demat mode CDSL/NSDL** is given below:

The system will authenticate the user by sending OTP on registered Mobile & Email as recorded in the Demat Account. After successful authentication, user will be able to see the e-Voting option where the evoting is in progress and also able to directly access the system of all e-Voting Service Providers.

The said alteration was subsequently approved by the shareholders of the Company by passing of Special Resolution through Postal Ballot on May 29, 2026, in accordance with the applicable provisions of the Companies Act, 2013.

(iii) Change in Management of the Company

Mr. Raman Raheja (DIN: 01426148) was appointed as an Additional Non-Executive Non-Independent Director of the Company and Mrs. Ritu Tiwari (DIN: 11040362) was appointed as an Additional Non-Executive Independent Director of the Company w.e.f. 16th June, 2026 by Board of Directors at their meeting held on 16th June, 2026.

Ms. Sweety Purohit (Membership No.: 33763) has Resigned from the post of Company Secretary & Compliance Officer and Key Managerial Personnel of the company with effect from August 07, 2026.

Ms. Pratiksha Bhandari (M.No.: A36256) has been appointed by the Board as a Company Secretary, Compliance Officer and Key Managerial Personnel of the Company in their Board Meeting held on 17th August, 2026.

9. SIGNIFICANT AGREEMENTS / BUSINESS DEVELOPMENTS

During the financial year under review, the Company continued to undertake various initiatives and entered into significant arrangements and business developments in furtherance of its business objectives. The key developments during the year are as follows:

II. Bluegod Entertainment Limited, entered into agreement for production of featured film on 19th June 2025 with Rajpal Naurang Yadav Ventures Pvt. Ltd.a private limited company, Where Mrs. Afsana Kherani, is the authorized representative of Bluegod Entertainment Limited & Mr.Rajpal Naurang Yadav is the authorized representative of Rajpal Naurang Yadav Ventures Pvt. Ltd.

III. The Company has appointed Mr. Gaur Govind as the Vice President – Religious Content for a tenure of one (1) year, effective from August 01, 2025, for curating and enhancing the religious content portfolio of the Company and will play a key role in devising strategies to support the Company’s marketing initiatives and revenue growth.

VI. Bluegod Entertainment Limited has entered into an Assignment Agreement with Omega Interactive Technologies Limited, pursuant to which the Company has assigned/sold the theatrical and OTT exploitation rights of its film titled “Roti, Kapda Aur Internet” to Omega Interactive Technologies Limited for a total consideration of ₹12,00,00,000/- (Rupees Twelve Crore Only).

VII. Official Trailer Launch & Theatrical Release Schedule of Feature Film “Jeevan Bheema Yojana”

the Company made significant progress in its media and entertainment portfolio with the development and production of its upcoming theatrical feature film “Jeevan Bheema Yojana”, presented and produced by Starbeam Ventures Limited (formerly known as Bluegod Entertainment Limited). The company has made corporate announcement for the same on August 26, 2026 on BSE.

Directed by Abhishek Dogra, the film is a Dark Comedy / Crime / Suspense Thriller featuring Arshad Warsi, Sanjeeda Shaikh, Vijay Raaz, along with an ensemble cast. The official trailer of the film was launched during the year, representing an important milestone in the Company's media and entertainment business. The film is scheduled for worldwide theatrical release on September 4, 2026, and the Company has commenced the final phase of its nationwide and global marketing and promotional campaign.

i. Statutory Auditor and their Report

Pursuant to the provisions of Sections 139 and 141 of the Companies Act, 2013 (“Act”) and the Rules made thereunder, M/s. S D P M & Co., Chartered Accountants, Statutory Auditors of the Company, have confirmed that they are not disqualified from continuing as Statutory Auditors of the Company.

The Audit Report on the Financial Statements of the Company for the Financial Year 2025-26 forms part of the Annual Report. The Statutory Auditors have issued an Audit Report with a Qualified Opinion on the Financial Statements of the Company for the year ended March 31, 2026.

The Statutory Auditors, in their Audit Report, have made the following qualifications:

- I. The provisions of **Section 45-IA of the Reserve Bank of India Act, 1934** are applicable to the Company, as the Company's financial assets constitute more than 50% of its total assets and income from financial assets constitutes more than 50% of its gross income. However, the Company has not obtained registration under the provisions of Section 45-IA of the Reserve Bank of India Act, 1934.

Management Reply: The management is taking necessary steps to realign the Company's asset and income profile so that the provisions requiring NBFC registration cease to be applicable.

- II. The outstanding balances of **unsecured loans received, loans advanced and trade advances** are subject to confirmation and supporting documents.

Management Reply: The management is in the process of obtaining balance confirmations and compiling the requisite supporting documents from the respective parties, and the records will be updated upon receipt of the same.

- III. During the year under review, the Company has **accepted loans/liabilities from individuals which are in contravention of Section 73 of the Companies Act, 2013.**

Management Reply: The management submits that certain amounts received as business advances have been classified as deposits, resulting in the said observation. Necessary accounting and legal adjustments shall be carried out to appropriately reflect the true nature of these transactions and ensure compliance with the applicable provisions of the Companies Act, 2013.

- IV. The Company has outstanding **unsecured loans and advances** recorded in its books of account for which the management has not provided balance confirmations or other independent documentary evidence. In the absence of such confirmations, the Statutory Auditors were unable to obtain sufficient and appropriate audit evidence regarding the existence, accuracy and completeness of such unsecured loans and advances and, accordingly, were unable to determine the impact, if any, of this matter on the Financial Statements of the Company.

Management Reply: The management is in the process of obtaining confirmations from the respective parties and compiling the requisite supporting documents. Necessary reconciliations and record updates shall be carried out upon receipt of the same to ensure appropriate audit evidence is available.

- V. The Company has **trade receivables outstanding for more than six months** as on the date of signing of the Audit Report. The Statutory Auditors were unable to obtain sufficient appropriate audit evidence regarding the recoverability of such balances, and the management has not made adequate provision against such receivables.

Management Reply: The management is undertaking a detailed review of the recoverability of such receivables and is in the process of reconciling the balances with the respective parties. Based on the outcome of the review, appropriate adjustments and provision, wherever considered necessary, shall be made in the books of account in accordance with the applicable accounting standards.

The Company has also received the **Statement on Impact of Audit Qualifications** from the Statutory Auditors. In respect of the qualifications where the impact has not been quantified, the management has stated that the qualifications relating to statutory non-compliance and documentary evidence do not have an impact on the Financial Statements. Further, the management has represented that the outstanding amounts from trade receivables are recoverable. The Statutory Auditors have made **no comments** on the management's assessment.

Pursuant to Section 134 (3) (ca) during the year under review, the Statutory Auditor have not reported any instances of frauds committed in the Company by its Officers or Employees to the Audit Committee or the Board or Central Government under Section 143(12) of the Companies Act, 2013, details of which needs to be mentioned in this report.

ii. Cost Auditors and Maintenance of Cost Records

In pursuant to Section 148(1) of the Companies Act, 2013 and rules and regulation made there under read with the Companies (Accounts Rules) Amendment Rules, 2018, Cost audit is not applicable to the Company and therefore maintenance of cost records as specified under section 148(1) of the Act, is not required.

iii. Secretarial Auditors and Secretarial Audit Report

In terms of Section 204(1) of Companies Act, 2013, read with Companies (Appointment and Remuneration of Managerial Personnel) Rules, 2014, the Company has appointed M/s Vishakha Agrawal & Associates, Practising Company Secretaries, Indore as the Secretarial auditor of the Company for a term of five (5) consecutive years, commencing from FY 2025–26 to FY 2029–30 in the AGM of the Company held on 23rd September 2025 and have confirmed that they are not disqualified from continuing as Secretarial Auditors of the Company

The Secretarial Audit Report submitted by M/s Vishakha Agrawal & Associates, Practising Company Secretaries in prescribed format in **MR-3** to the shareholders of the Company is annexed to this Report.

The Secretarial Auditors, in their Audit Report, have made the following Comments:

1. As per Independent Auditor's Report, the provisions of Section 45-IA of the Reserve Bank of India Act, 1934 is applicable to the company, because the company's financial

assets constitute more than 50 percent of the total assets and income from financial assets constitute more than 50 percent of the gross income. However, company does not obtain registration under the provisions of Section 45-IA of the Reserve Bank of India Act, 1934.

Management Response: The management is taking necessary steps to realign the Company's asset and income profile so that the provisions requiring NBFC registration cease to be applicable.

2. As per Independent Auditor's Report, the company has accepted loans from individuals. However, as informed by the company and its management, the company has received advance for goods which were shown as loans in the balance sheet.

Management Response: The management submits that certain amounts received as business advances have been wrongly classified as deposits, resulting in the said observation. Necessary accounting and legal adjustments shall be carried out to appropriately reflect the true nature of these transactions and ensure compliance with the applicable provisions of the Companies Act, 2013.

3. The BSE has imposed fine of Rs. 1,71,100 for delay in submission of financial results for the quarter and financial year ended 31st March 2026 within the period prescribed under Regulation 33 of SEBI (LODR) Regulations, 2015.

Management Response: The management submits that the Non-compliance was due to failure to find a suitable and qualified candidate for the post of Compliance officer of Company. However, the Company has paid the fine imposed and later complied with the provisions.

Corporate Governance Report

The Board of Directors assessed the performance of the Board as whole and committees of the Company based on the parameters which amongst other included structure of the Board, including

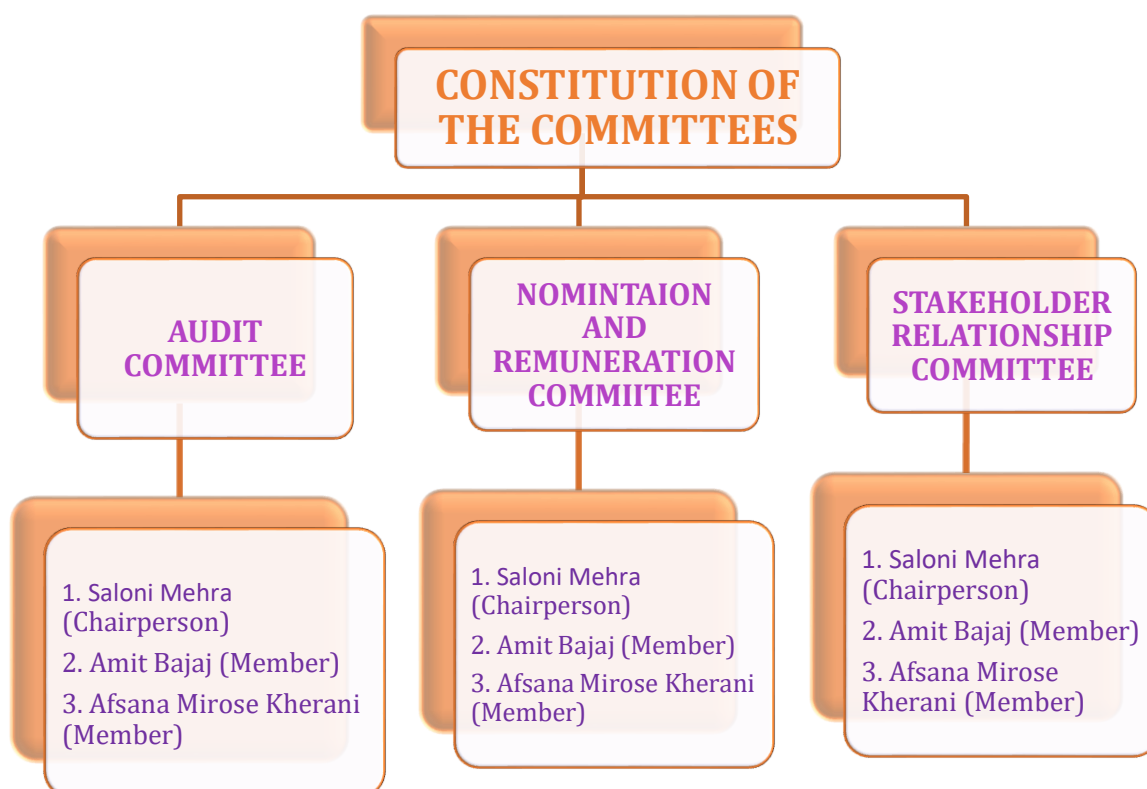

A. INDUSTRY STRUCTURE AND DEVELOPMENTS

Global Growth:

The global economy demonstrated resilience during FY 2025–26 despite persistent geopolitical tensions, trade policy uncertainties, elevated borrowing costs and disruptions in commodity markets. According to the World Bank, global economic growth was estimated at **2.9% in 2025** and is projected to moderate to **2.5% in 2026**.

Growth across economies remained uneven, with emerging market and developing economies continuing to record stronger growth than advanced economies. However, the outlook remains subject to significant external risks, including geopolitical developments, changing trade policies and volatility in energy and commodity prices.

The global economy continued to benefit from private-sector adaptability, technology-led investment and resilient domestic demand in several major economies. At the same time, changing trade patterns, supply-chain adjustments and policy uncertainty continued to influence international trade and investment flows.

South Asia remained one of the fastest-growing regions globally. The World Bank projects regional growth at **6.3% in 2026**, although this represents a moderation from the estimated 7.0% growth in 2025.

Inflation:

Global inflation remained a key area of concern during FY 2025–26. While inflationary pressures had moderated in several economies, renewed increases in energy and commodity prices during 2026 have contributed to a reversal in the disinflationary trend.

The World Bank estimates global inflation at approximately 3.3% in 2025 and expects it to rise to around 4.0% in 2026, primarily due to higher energy and commodity prices and disruptions in global supply chains.

Central banks across major economies continued to balance the objectives of maintaining price stability while supporting economic activity. The persistence of inflationary pressures is expected to influence monetary policy, borrowing costs and investment decisions globally.

Risks & Policy Backdrop:

The global economic outlook continues to be influenced by geopolitical conflicts, trade restrictions, energy-market disruptions, elevated commodity prices and financial-market volatility. These factors may affect global trade, investment flows, production costs and business confidence.

The outbreak and continuation of geopolitical tensions in the Middle East have increased uncertainty around energy supplies and commodity prices. The World Bank has highlighted that a prolonged disruption to energy supplies could further weaken global growth and intensify inflationary pressures.

Trade policy uncertainty and changing tariff structures continue to influence global supply chains and investment decisions. Businesses are increasingly focusing on supply-chain diversification, operational efficiency and greater resilience against external disruptions.

B. INDIAN ECONOMY OVERVIEW (FY 2025–26)

India continued to remain among the fastest-growing major economies in the world, supported by resilient domestic demand, strong investment activity and continued expansion across key sectors of the economy.

- i. Real GDP growth for FY 2025–26 was estimated at 7.8%, according to the latest estimates released by the Ministry of Statistics and Programme Implementation (MoSPI). The growth reflects the continued resilience of the Indian economy amid global economic and geopolitical uncertainties.
- ii. Economic activity remained broad-based, with services, manufacturing, construction and domestic consumption continuing to contribute significantly to overall economic growth. The Economic Survey 2025–26 highlighted India's strong growth momentum and continued expansion in productive capacity.
- iii. Manufacturing activity strengthened during FY 2025–26, with manufacturing GVA recording robust growth during the first and second quarters of the year. The improvement reflects stronger industrial activity, domestic demand and investment-led expansion.
- iv. The services sector continued to remain a key driver of economic activity, supported by information technology, financial services, professional services, trade, transport and other business services.
- v. India's exports of merchandise and services reached a record level of approximately US\$863.11 billion during FY 2025–26, compared with US\$825.26 billion in FY 2024–25, registering growth of approximately 4.59%. Merchandise exports were approximately US\$441.78 billion, while services exports were approximately US\$421.32 billion.
- vi. Domestic consumption remained an important pillar of growth, supported by improving household demand, rural activity, infrastructure development and continued government expenditure.
- vii. Inflation remained relatively contained for a significant part of FY 2025–26. The moderation in inflationary pressures supported household purchasing power and provided greater flexibility for monetary and economic policy. However, food prices, energy costs and global commodity-price movements continued to remain important factors requiring monitoring.
- viii. Government expenditure on infrastructure, connectivity, manufacturing capacity and other capital-intensive projects continued to support economic activity and create a favourable environment for private-sector investment.
- ix. India continued to strengthen its position in global trade through diversification of export markets, expansion of services exports and greater integration with international supply chains. The country's recent trade agreements and increasing market access also supported export opportunities.

- x. Despite the positive growth outlook, the Indian economy remained exposed to external risks including geopolitical tensions, global trade uncertainties, commodity-price volatility, changes in tariff structures and fluctuations in global financial conditions.
- xi. Going forward, India's growth prospects are expected to remain supported by strong domestic demand, infrastructure investment, manufacturing expansion, digitalisation, technological advancement and the continued growth of the services sector.

C. EXTERNAL ENVIRONMENT & RISKS (FY 2025–26)

- The global economic environment during FY 2025–26 remained challenging, with geopolitical tensions, trade-policy uncertainty, elevated energy prices and disruptions in global supply chains affecting international trade, investment and business sentiment.
- Despite these headwinds, the global economy demonstrated resilience. The IMF estimated global economic growth at 3.5% in 2025, supported by resilient domestic demand and strong technology-related investment. However, global growth is projected to moderate to 3.0% in 2026, reflecting the impact of geopolitical tensions and higher energy costs.
- India continued to remain one of the fastest-growing major economies, supported by strong domestic consumption, services activity, investment and improving economic fundamentals. The latest official Indian estimate places India's real GDP growth at approximately 7.8% for FY 2025–26.
- The external environment remained exposed to significant downside risks, including prolonged geopolitical conflicts, volatility in crude oil and other commodity prices, changing tariff and trade policies, supply-chain disruptions and tightening global financial conditions.
- Rising energy prices remained a particular risk for energy-importing economies. Higher crude oil prices can increase transportation and production costs, exert pressure on inflation and widen external-sector vulnerabilities.
- Global inflationary pressures also remained a concern. According to the IMF's July 2026 update, global headline inflation was estimated at 4.1% in 2025 and is projected to increase to 4.7% in 2026, reflecting higher energy and food prices.
- Global trade growth is expected to moderate as the effects of tariffs, trade restrictions and adjustments in global supply chains become more pronounced. At the same time, investment in artificial intelligence, digitalisation and technology continued to provide an important source of economic resilience.

D. CAUTIONARY STATEMENT

MEDIA AND ENTERTAINMENT INDUSTRY

The Indian Media and Entertainment (M&E) industry is a sunrise sector for the economy and is making significant strides. The increasing availability of fast and cheap internet, rising incomes, and increasing purchases of consumer durables have significantly aided the industry. India's media and entertainment industry are unique as compared to other markets. The industry is well known for its extremely high volumes and rising Average Revenue Per User (ARPU).

India is rapidly emerging as a global creative powerhouse, driven by its talent pool, cultural richness, and technological advancements. According to the EY report titled "A Studio Called India", the country's media infrastructure is expanding, with animation and VFX costs in India being 40% to 60% lower than in the West, supported by a workforce of around 2,60,000 skilled professionals.

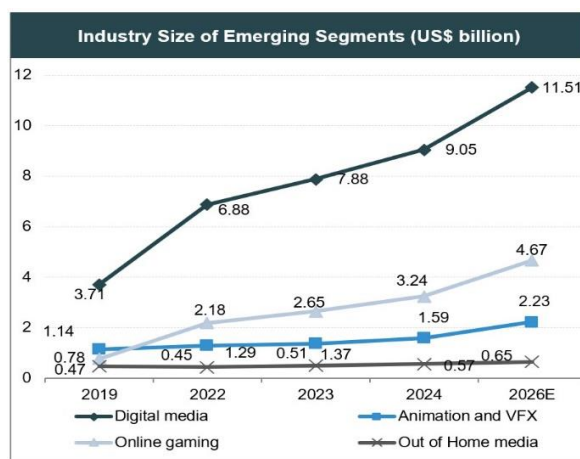
This significantly aided the country's industry and made India leading in terms of digital adoption and provided companies with uninterrupted rich data to understand their customers better. India has also experienced growing opportunities in the VFX sector as the focus shifted globally to India as a preferred content creator.

MARKET DYNAMICS

As of 2025, India has 2–2.5 million active digital creators influencing over Rs. 29,60,300 crore (US\$ 350 billion) in annual consumer spending, which is projected to exceed Rs. 84,58,000 crore (US\$ 1 trillion) by 2030.

In the Union budget of FY26-27 the Ministry of Information and broadcasting received Rs. 4,551.94 crore (US\$ 515.07 million).

The Indian entertainment sector could unlock an estimated Rs. 50,724 crore (US\$ 6 billion) in unrealised value by FY30, according to a recent industry report. This growth potential is attributed to international collaboration, technology adoption, and strategic changes in content creation..

According to a report published by Telecom Regulatory Authority of India (TRAI), India's broadband internet subscribers crossed 995.63 crore in September 2025.

Indian advertising revenues is projected to grow at a CAGR of 9.4% to reach Rs. 1,58,000 crore (US\$ 19.2 billion) in FY28, which is 1.4x the global average of 6.7%.

The online gaming and sports sector in India is growing at a CAGR of 19.2% and is projected to reach Rs. 39,583 crore (US\$ 4.8 billion) by FY28.

OTT platform revenues in India are projected to grow at a remarkable CAGR of 14.9%, the highest among the top 15 countries, to reach Rs. 35,061 crore (US\$ 4.25 billion) by FY28.

India's Animation and VFX sector contributed approximately Rs. 10,300 crore (US\$ 1.24 billion) in 2024 and is expected to scale to Rs. 14,700 crore (US\$ 1.75 billion) by 2027.

Media companies are projected to achieve an 8% revenue growth, reaching US\$ 7.14 billion (Rs. 60,000 crore) by FY27, driven by increasing contributions from the digital segment, according to a Crisil analysis of 20 companies that account for 55% of the media industry's revenue.

The Indian M&E sector grew to Rs. 2,78,500 crore (US\$ 30.08 billion) in 2025 (a 9.1 % increase YoY). It is projected to grow ~2.8% in 2026 to Rs. 2,86,500 crore (US\$ 30.91 billion), and at a ~5.8% CAGR to Rs. 3,30,000 crore (US\$ 35.65 billion) by 2028. According to Media Partners Asia's Asia Pacific Video & Broadband Industry 2024 report, India's video market, encompassing both TV and digital, is projected to grow from US\$ 13 billion in 2023 to US\$ 17 billion by 2028.

In 2025, Digital Media market in India reached US\$ 13.13 billion. It is expected to contribute ~38% to the overall advertising industry in India, on par with television.

OTT platform revenues in India are projected to grow at a remarkable CAGR of 14.9%, the highest among the top 15 countries, to reach Rs. 35,061 crore (US\$ 4.25 billion) by FY28. In FY26, JioStar plans to invest Rs. 33,000 crore (US\$ 3.85 billion) in new content, a move aimed at transforming India's media landscape with greater focus on Indian-language, localised entertainment and sports.

RECENT DEVELOPMENT/INVESTMENTS:

Recent Developments in the Media and Entertainment Industry are :

- As announced in the Union Budget FY27, AVGC Content Creator Labs (CCLs) are proposed to be set up in 15,000 secondary schools and 500 colleges across the country, with an allocated investment of Rs. 250 crore (US\$ 0.03 billion.)

- A major strategic move includes the Rs. 1,25,000 crore (US\$ 15 billion) partnership between Bharti Airtel and Google (2026–2030) to develop an AI hub and digital infrastructure, significantly bolstering content delivery and data processing capabilities.
- In January 2026, Universal Music Group acquired a stake in Excel Entertainment for Rs. 747 crore (US\$ 0.09 billion), strengthening its presence in India's film and music ecosystem.
- In FY26, JioStar plans to invest Rs. 33,000 crore (US\$ 3.85 billion) in new content, a move aimed at transforming India's media landscape with greater focus on Indian-language, localised entertainment and sports.
- FDI inflows in the information and broadcasting sector (including print media) stood at Rs. 82,201.29 crore (US\$ 12,455.88 billion) between April 2000-December 2025.
- Pocket FM, an audio series platform, has raised \$103 million in its Series D funding round, led by Lightspeed with participation from Stepstone Group.
- Disney-owned Star India secured the TV broadcasting rights for the Indian Premier League from 2023 to 2027 through an online bid. During the same period, Viacom 18 won the bid for the digital streaming rights of the Twenty20 League.
- Major tech and e-commerce firms, including Google, Meta, Amazon, and Flipkart, saw their collective ad revenues rise 9% to over Rs. 60,000 crore (US\$ 7.13 billion) in FY24.
- The Star-Viacom18 merger deal signed on February 28 will create an US\$ 8.5 billion media goliath with a dominating presence in both TV and digital segments.

GOVERNMENT INITIATIVES

The Telecom Regulatory Authority of India (TRAI) is set to approach the Ministry of Information and Broadcasting, Government of India, with a request to Fastrack the recommendations on broadcasting, in an attempt to boost reforms in the broadcasting sector. The Government of India has agreed to set up National Centre of Excellence for Animation, Gaming, Visual Effects and Comics industry in Mumbai. The Indian and Canadian Government have signed an audio-visual co-production deal to enable producers from both the countries exchange and explore their culture and creativity, respectively.

To ease filming in railways, the Film Facilitation Office (FFO) set up in the National Film Development Corporation (NFDC) collaborated with the Ministry of Railways to develop an integrated single window filming mechanism to streamline the permission process for filming across railway premises.

Digital audio-visual content including films and web shows on over-the-top (OTT) streaming platforms, as well as news and current affairs on online platforms, have been brought under the Ministry of Information and Broadcasting in November 2020.

ROAD AHEAD

The Indian M&E industry is on an impressive growth path. The industry is expected to grow at a much faster rate than the global average rate. This can be majorly credited to rising incomes, increasing internet penetration and a growing push toward digital adoption.

In the long run, growth in the M&E industry is expected on the back of several players entering the food and beverages segment, E-commerce gaining more popularity in the country, and domestic companies testing out the waters. India's rural regions are expected to be the next regions for growth. India has also gotten on board with 5G and is already planning for 6G well ahead of the future. This push towards digital adoption especially in the rural regions will provide advertisers and publishers with an immense opportunity to capture untapped markets and help grow India's media and entertainment industry forward.

Qualified Opinion

We have audited standalone financial statements of **Starbeam Ventures Limited (Formerly known as Bluegod Entertainment Limited)** ("the company"), which comprise the Balance Sheet as at 31st March 2026, the Statement of Profit and Loss (including other Comprehensive Income), the Statement in Changes in Equity and the Cash Flow Statement for the year then ended, and notes to the financial statement, including a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information (hereinafter referred to as "the standalone financial statement").

In our opinion and to the best of our information and according to the explanations given to us, the aforesaid financial statements give the information required by the Act in manner so required and give a true and fair view in conformity with the Indian Accounting Standards prescribed under section 133 of the Act read with the Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Rules, 2015, as amended, ("Ind AS") and other accounting principles generally accepted in india, of the state of affairs of the company as at 31st March, 2026 and profit and total comprehensive income, change in equity and its cash flows for the year ended on that date.

Basis for Qualified Opinion

- *In our opinion and according to the information and explanations provided to us, the provisions of Section 45-IA of the Reserve Bank of India Act, 1934 is applicable the company, because the company's financial assets constitute more than 50 percent of the total assets and income from financial assets constitute more than 50 percent of the gross income. However, company does not obtain registration under the provisions of Section 45-IA of the Reserve Bank of India Act, 1934.*
- *Outstanding balance of unsecured loans received, loans advanced and trade advances are subject to confirmation and supporting documents.*
- *During the period, the company has accepted loans liability from individuals which are in the contravention under Section 73 of the Companies Act, 2013*
- *Further, during the year, we noted that the Company has outstanding unsecured loans and advances recorded in its books of account. However, the management has not provided balance confirmations or other independent documentary evidences in respect of such loans & advances as at the reporting date. In the absence of such confirmations, we were unable to*

obtain sufficient and appropriate review evidence regarding the existence, accuracy and completeness of these unsecured loans and loans & advances. Accordingly, we are unable to determine the impact, if any, of this matter on the financials of the Company.

- ***During the year, the company has outstanding trade receivable for more than 6 months on the date of signing of this report. In our opinion, the sufficient appropriate audit evidence regarding recoverability of these balance could not be obtained and the management has not made adequate provision against such receivable.***

We conducted our audit in accordance with the Standards on Auditing (SAs) specified under section 143(10) of the Companies Act, 2013. Our responsibilities under those Standards are further described in the *Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements* section of our report. We are independent of the Company in accordance with the Code of Ethics issued by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of India together with the ethical requirements that are relevant to our audit of the financial statements under the provisions of the Companies Act, 2013 and the Rules thereunder, and we have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with these requirements and the Code of Ethics. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

Key Audit Matters

Key audit matters are those matters that, in our professional judgment, were of most significance in our audit of the standalone Ind AS financial statements of the current period. These matters were addressed in the context of our audit of the standalone Ind AS financial statements as a whole, and in forming our opinion thereon, and we do not provide a separate opinion on these matters.

Information Other than the Financial Statements and Auditor's Report Thereon

The Company's Board of Directors is responsible for the other information. The other information comprises the information included in the Management Discussion and Analysis, Board's Report including Annexures to Board's Report, Business Responsibility Report, Corporate Governance and Shareholder's Information, but does not include the standalone financial statements and our auditor's report thereon.

Our opinion on the standalone financial statements does not cover the other information and we do not express any form of assurance conclusion thereon. In connection with our audit of the standalone financial statements, our responsibility is to read the other information and, in doing so, consider whether the other information is materially inconsistent with the standalone financial statements or our knowledge obtained during the course of our audit or otherwise appears to be materially misstated.

If, based on the work we have performed, we conclude that there is a material misstatement of this other information; we are required to report that fact. We have nothing to report in this regard.

Management's Responsibility for the Standalone Financial Statements

The Company's Board of Directors is responsible for the matters stated in section 134(5) of the Companies Act, 2013 ("the Act") with respect to the preparation and presentation of these financial statements that give a true and fair view of the financial position, financial performance and cash flows of the Company in accordance with the accounting principles generally accepted in India, including the Accounting Standards specified under Section 133 of the Act, read with Rule 7 of the Companies (Accounts) Rules, 2014. NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED MARCH 31, 2026

A. Company Overview

Starbeam Ventures Limited (Formerly known as Bluegod Entertainment Limited) ("the Company") is public limited company and domiciled in India and is incorporated as per the provisions of the Companies Act with its registered office located at 301-G, Goyal Vihar, Gate No. 2, Khajrana Road, Indore, Madhya Pradesh - 452016. The Company is listed on the Bombay Stock Exchange (BSE). The company is providing services regarding creating, producing & distributing movie.

B. Significant Accounting Policies

B.1 Basis of Preparation and Presentation

B.1.1 Statement of Compliance

The financial statements comply in all material aspects with Indian Accounting Standards (Ind AS) notified under Section 133 of the Companies Act, 2013 read with Rule 3 of the Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Rules, 2015 and the Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Amendment Rules, 2016. The financial statements up to year ended March 31, 2026 were prepared in accordance with the accounting standards notified under Companies (Accounting Standard) Rules, 2006 (as amended) and other relevant provisions of the Act. Previous period figures in the financial statements have been restated in Ind AS.

B.1.2 Basis of Measurement

The standalone financial statements have been prepared on a historical cost basis, on the accrual basis of accounting except for certain financial assets and liabilities measured at fair value at the end of each reporting period, as explained in relevant schedule notes.

B.1.3 Functional and presentation currency

Indian rupee is the functional and presentation currency.

B.1.4 Use of estimates

The preparation of the financial statements in conformity with Ind AS requires management to make estimates, judgments and assumptions.

These estimates, judgments and assumptions affect the application of accounting policies and the reported amounts of assets and liabilities, the disclosures of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the period.

Accounting estimates could change from period to period. Actual results could differ from those estimates. Appropriate changes in estimates are made as management becomes aware of changes in circumstances surrounding the estimates. Changes in estimates are reflected in the financial statements in the period in which changes are made and, if material, their effects are disclosed in the notes to the financial statements.

Application of accounting policies that require critical accounting estimates involving complex and subjective judgments and the use of assumptions in these financial statements are:

- Useful lives of Property, plant and equipment
- Valuation of financial instruments
- Provisions and contingencies

- Income tax and deferred tax
- Measurement of defined employee benefit obligations
- Export Incentive

B.2 Revenue Recognition

Revenue is recognized to the extent that it is probable that the economic benefits will flow to the Company and the revenue can be reliably measured. Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable.

B.2.1 Sale of Services

Revenue from sale of services is recognized when the Company transfers all significant risks and rewards of ownership to the buyer, while the Company retains neither continuing managerial involvement nor effective control over the products sold.

Revenue is exclusive of excise duty and is reduced for estimated customer returns, commissions, rebates and discounts and other similar allowances.

B.2.2 Other Operating Revenue

Other Operating Revenue comprises of income from ancillary activities incidental to the operations of the company and is recognised when the right to receive the income is established as per the terms of contracts.

B.2.3 Dividend and Interest income

Dividend income is recognized when the right to receive payment has been established (provided that it is probable that the economic benefits will flow to the Company and the revenue can be measured reliably).

Interest income is accrued on a time basis, by reference to the principal outstanding and at the effective interest rate applicable (provided that it is probable that the economic benefits will flow to the Company and the revenue can be measured reliably).

B.3 Borrowing costs

Borrowing costs directly attributable to the acquisition, construction or production of qualifying assets, which are assets that necessarily take a substantial period of time to get ready for their intended use, are added to the cost of those assets, until such time as the assets are substantially ready for their intended use. All other borrowing costs are recognised in profit or loss in the period in which they are incurred.

B.4 Income Taxes

Income tax expense represents the sum of the tax currently payable and deferred tax. Current and deferred tax are recognised in profit or loss, except when they relate to items that are recognised in other comprehensive income or directly in equity, in which case, the current and deferred tax are also recognised in other comprehensive income or directly in equity respectively.

Current tax:

Current tax is determined on taxable profits for the year chargeable to tax in accordance with the applicable tax rates and the provisions of the Income Tax Act, 1961 including other applicable tax laws that have been enacted or substantively enacted.

Provisions for current income taxes are presented in the balance sheet after off-setting advance taxes paid and TDS/TCS receivables.

Minimum Alternate Tax (MAT) credit is recognized as an asset only when and to the extent there is convincing evidence that the Company will pay normal income tax during the specified period. In the year in which the MAT credit becomes eligible to be recognized as an asset in accordance with the recommendations contained in Guidance Note issued by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of India. MAT Credit Entitlement, is classified as unused tax credits under deferred tax by way of a credit to the statement of profit and loss.

Deferred tax:

Deferred tax is recognised on temporary differences between the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities in the financial statements and the corresponding tax bases used in the computation of taxable profit. Deferred tax liabilities are generally recognised for all taxable temporary differences. Deferred tax assets are generally recognised for all deductible temporary differences to the extent that it is probable that taxable profits will be available against which those deductible temporary differences can be utilised. Deferred tax asset is recognised for the carry forward of unused tax losses and unused tax credits to the extent that it is probable that future taxable profit will be available against which the unused tax losses and unused tax credits can be utilised.

The carrying amount of deferred tax assets is reviewed at the end of each reporting period and reduced to the extent that it is no longer probable that sufficient taxable profits will be available to allow all or part of the asset to be recovered.

Deferred tax liabilities and assets are measured at the tax rates that are expected to apply in the period in which the liability is settled or the asset realised, based on tax rates (and tax laws) that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the end of the reporting period.

The measurement of deferred tax liabilities and assets reflects the tax consequences that would follow from the manner in which the Company expects, at the end of the reporting period, to recover or settle the carrying amount of its assets and liabilities.

B.5 Provisions, Contingent Liabilities and Contingent Assets

Provisions are recognised when the Company has a present obligation (legal or constructive) as a result of a past event, it is probable that the Company will be required to settle the obligation, and a reliable estimate can be made of the amount of the obligation.

The amount recognised as a provision is the best estimate of the consideration required to settle the present obligation at the end of the reporting period, taking into account the risks and uncertainties surrounding the obligation.

When some or all of the economic benefits required to settle a provision are expected to be recovered from a third party, a receivable is recognised as an asset if it is virtually certain that reimbursements will be received and the amount of the receivable can be measured reliably.

Contingent liability is disclosed for possible obligations which will be confirmed only by future events not within the control of the Company or present obligations arising from past events where it is not probable that an outflow of resources will be required to settle the obligation or a reliable estimate of the amount of the obligation cannot be made.

Contingent Assets are not recognized since this may result in the recognition of income that may never be realized.

B.6 Financial instruments

Financial assets and financial liabilities are recognised when the Company becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instruments.

Financial assets and financial liabilities are initially measured at fair value. Transaction costs that are directly attributable to the acquisition or issue of financial assets and financial liabilities (other than financial assets and financial liabilities at fair value through profit or loss) are added to or deducted from the fair value of the financial assets or financial liabilities, as appropriate, on initial recognition. Transaction costs directly attributable to the acquisition of financial assets or financial liabilities at fair value through profit or loss are recognised immediately in profit or loss.

Financial assets:

All regular way purchases or sales of financial assets are recognised and derecognised on a trade date basis. Regular way purchases or sales are purchases or sales of financial assets that require delivery of assets within the time frame established by regulation or convention in the marketplace.

Classification of financial assets

The financial assets are initially measured at fair value. Transaction costs that are directly attributable to the acquisition of financial assets are added to the fair value of the financial assets on initial recognition.

After initial recognition:

(i) Financial assets (other than investments) are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

Effective interest method is a method of calculating the amortised cost of a debt instrument and of allocating interest income over the relevant period. The effective interest rate is the rate that exactly discounts estimated future cash receipts (including all fees and points paid or received that form an integral part of the effective interest rate, transaction costs and other premiums or discounts) through the expected life of the debt instrument, or, where appropriate, a shorter period, to the net carrying amount on initial recognition.

Investments in debt instruments that meet the following conditions are subsequently measured at amortised cost:

- The asset is held within a business model whose objective is to hold assets in order to collect contractual cash flows; and
- the contractual terms of the instrument give rise on specified dates to cash flows that are solely payments on principal and interest on the principal amount outstanding.

Income on such debt instruments is recognised in profit or loss and is included in the "Other Income".

The Company has not designated any debt instruments as fair value through other comprehensive income.

(ii) Financial assets (i.e. investments in instruments other than equity of subsidiaries) are subsequently measured at fair value.

Such financial assets are measured at fair value at the end of each reporting period, with any gains (e.g. any dividend or interest earned on the financial asset) or losses arising on re-measurement recognised in profit or loss and included in the "Other Income".

Investments in equity instruments of subsidiaries

The Company measures its investments in equity instruments of subsidiaries at cost in accordance with Ind AS 27. At transition date, the Company has elected to continue with the carrying value of such investments measured as per the previous GAAP and use such carrying value as its deemed cost.

Impairment of financial assets:

A financial asset is regarded as credit impaired when one or more events that may have a detrimental effect on estimated future cash flows of the asset have occurred. The Company applies the expected credit loss model for recognising impairment loss on financial assets (i.e. the shortfall between the contractual cash flows that are due and all the cash flows (discounted) that the Company expects to receive).

De-recognition of financial assets:

The Company de-recognises a financial asset when the contractual rights to the cash flows from the asset expire, or when it transfers the financial asset and substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership of the asset to another party. If the Company neither transfers nor retains substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership and continues to control the transferred asset, the Company recognises its retained interest in the asset and an associated liability for amounts it may have to pay. On de-recognition of a financial asset in its entirety, the difference between the asset's carrying amount and the sum of the consideration received and receivable is recognised in the Statement of profit and loss.

Financial liabilities and equity instruments

Equity instruments

Equity instruments issued by the Company are classified as equity in accordance with the substance and the definitions of an equity instrument. An equity instrument is any contract that evidences a residual interest in the assets of an entity after deducting all of its liabilities.

Financial liabilities

All financial liabilities are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method. The carrying amounts of financial liabilities that are subsequently measured at amortised cost are determined based on the effective interest method. Interest expense that is not capitalised as part of costs of an asset is included in the "Finance Costs".

The effective interest method is a method of calculating the amortised cost of a financial liability and of allocating interest expense over the relevant period. The effective interest rate is the rate that exactly discounts estimated future cash payments (including all fees and points paid or received that form an integral part of the effective interest rate, transaction costs and other premiums or discounts) through the expected life of the financial liability, or (where appropriate) a shorter period, to the net carrying amount on initial recognition.

De-recognition of financial liabilities

The Company de-recognises financial liabilities when, and only when, the Company's obligations are discharged, cancelled or have expired. An exchange between with a lender of debt instruments with substantially different terms is accounted for as an extinguishment of the original financial liability and the recognition of a new financial liability. Similarly, a substantial modification of the terms of an existing financial liability (whether or not attributable to the financial difficulty of the debtor) is accounted for as an extinguishment of the original financial liability and the recognition of a new financial liability. The difference between the carrying amount of the financial liability derecognised and the consideration paid and payable is recognised in profit or loss.

B.7 Earnings per share

Basic earnings per share is calculated by dividing the net profit or loss for the year attributable to equity shareholders by the weighted average number of equity shares outstanding during the year. For the purpose of calculating diluted earnings per share, the net profit or loss for the year attributable to equity

shareholders and the weighted average number of shares outstanding during the year are adjusted for the effects of all dilutive potential equity shares.

C. Critical Accounting judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with Ind AS requires the Company's Management to make judgments, estimates and assumptions about the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities recognised in the financial statements that are not readily apparent from other sources. The judgements, estimates and associated assumptions are based on historical experience and other factors including estimation of effects of uncertain future events that are considered to be relevant. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates (accounted on a prospective basis) and recognised in the period in which the estimate is revised if the revision affects only that period, or in the period of the revision and future periods of the revision affects both current and future periods.

The following are the key estimates that have been made by the Management in the process of applying the accounting policies:

Fair value measurement of financial instruments

When the fair values of financial assets and financial liabilities recorded in the balance sheet cannot be measured based on quoted prices in active markets, their fair value are measured using valuation techniques. The inputs to these models are taken from observable markets where possible, but where this is not feasible, a degree of judgement is required in establishing fair values. Judgements include considerations of inputs such as liquidity risk, credit risk and volatility. Changes in assumptions relating to these factors could affect the reported fair value of financial instruments.

Allowance for doubtful trade receivables

Trade receivables do not carry any interest and are stated at their nominal value as reduced by appropriate allowances for estimated irrecoverable amounts.

Estimated irrecoverable amounts are derived based on a provision matrix which takes into account various factors such as customer specific risks, geographical region, product type, currency fluctuation risk, repatriation policy of the country, country specific economic risks, customer rating, and type of customer, etc.

Individual trade receivables are written off when the management deems them not to be collectable.

Note 3.2 : Capital Management

For the purpose of the company's capital management, capital includes issued equity capital and all other equity reserves attributable to the equity holders of the Company. The primary objectives of the Company's capital management is to ensure that it maintains a strong credit rating and healthy capital ratios in order to support its business and maximise return to stakeholders through the optimisation of the debt and equity balance.

The Company determines the amount of capital required on the basis of annual planning and budgeting and corporate plan for working capital, capital outlay and longterm product and strategic involvements. The funding requirements are met through internal accruals and a combination of both long-term and short-term borrowings.

The Company monitors the capital structure on the basis of total debt (long term and short term) to equity and maturity profile of the overall debt portfolio of the Company.

Note 3.3 : Financial Risk Management

In course of its business, the Company is exposed to certain financial risks that could have significant influence on the Company's business and operational/ financial performance. These include market risk (including currency risk, interest rate risk and price risk), credit risk and liquidity risk.

The Board of Directors reviews and approves risk management framework and policies for managing these risks and monitors suitable mitigating actions taken by the management to minimise potential adverse effects and achieve greater predictability to earnings. In line with the overall risk management framework and policies, the management monitors and manages risk exposure through an analysis of degree and magnitude of risks.

(i) Market Risk

Market risk is the risk that changes in market prices, liquidity and other factors that could have an adverse effect on realizable fair values or future cash flows to the Company. The Company's activities expose it primarily to the financial risks of changes in foreign currency exchange rates and interest rates as future specific market changes cannot be normally predicted with reasonable accuracy.

(a) Foreign Currency Risk Management:

The Company undertakes transactions denominated in foreign currencies and thus it is exposed to exchange rate fluctuations. The Company actively manages its currency rate exposures, arising from transactions entered and denominated in foreign currencies, and uses derivative instruments such as foreign currency forward contracts to mitigate the risks from such exposures. The company does not use derivative instruments to hedge risk exposure.

(b) Interest Rate Risk Management:

The Company is exposed to interest rate risk pertaining to funds borrowed at both fixed and floating interest rates. The Company's risk management activities are subject to management, direction and control under the framework of risk management policy of interest rate risk. The management ensures risk governance framework for the company through appropriate policies and procedures and that financial risks are identified, measured and managed in accordance with the Company's policies and risk objectives.

For the company's total borrowings, the analysis is prepared assuming that amount of the liability outstanding at the end of the reporting period was outstanding for the whole year.

(ii) Credit Risk

Credit risk refers to the risk that a counterparty or customer will default on its obligation resulting in a loss to the company. Financial instruments that are subject to credit risk principally consist of Loans, Trade and Other Receivables, Cash and Cash Equivalents, Investments and Other Financial Assets.

Credit risk encompasses both, the direct risk of default and the risk of deterioration of creditworthiness as well as concentration of risk. The Company's exposure and the credit ratings of its counterparties are continuously monitored and the aggregate value of transactions concluded is spread amongst approved counterparties.

Trade receivables consist of a large number of customers, spread across diverse industries and geographical areas. The Company evaluates the concentration of risk with respect to trade receivables as low, as its customers are located in several jurisdictions and operate in independent markets. Ongoing credit evaluation is performed on the financial condition of accounts receivable and, where appropriate. The average credit period are generally in the range of 14 days to 90 days. Credit limits are established for all customers based on internal rating criteria.
