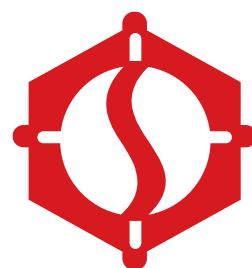

2. Participation of members through VC will be reckoned for the purpose of quorum for the AGM as per Section 103 of the Act.

4. The register of directors and key managerial personnel (KMP) and their shareholding, maintained under Section 170 of the Act, the register of contracts or arrangements in which the directors are interested maintained under Section 189 of the Act, will be available for electronic inspection without any fee from the date of circulation of this Notice up to the date of AGM, i.e. 10th August 2026. Members may write to the Company at cs@smruthiorganics.com in that regard, by mentioning "Request for Inspection" in the subject of the e-mail.
5. The Register of Members and share transfer books of the Company will remain closed from Saturday, 01st August, 2026 to Monday, 10th August 2026 (both days inclusive), for the purpose of AGM and Dividend. The Dividend, if declared, will be paid to those Shareholders whose names are registered as such in the Register of Members of the Company as on Friday, 31st July, 2026 ("record date") and to be beneficiary holders as per the beneficiary list as on Friday, 31st July, 2026 provided by the NSDL and CDSL. Dividend will be paid electronically through various online transfer modes to those members who have updated their bank account details. For members who have not updated their bank account details, dividend warrants / demand drafts/ cheques will be sent to their registered addresses. To avoid delay in receiving dividend, members are requested to update their KYC with their depositories (where shares are held in dematerialized mode) and with the Company's Registrar and Transfer Agent (RTA) (where shares are held in physical mode) to receive the dividend directly into their bank account on the payout date.
6. Pursuant to Finance Act, 2020, dividend income is taxable in the hands of Shareholders with effect from 1st April, 2020 and the Company is required to deduct tax at source (TDS) from dividend paid to the Shareholders at the prescribed rates.

For the prescribed rates for various categories, the Shareholders are requested to refer to the Finance Act, 2020 and amendments thereof.

The Shareholders are requested to update their PAN with the Company/RTA (in case of shares held in physical mode) and their respective Depository Participant(s) (in case of shares held in dematerialised form).

A resident individual Shareholder with PAN and who is not liable to pay income tax can submit a yearly declaration in Form No. 15G/15H, to avail the benefit of non-deduction of tax at source by e-mail to cs@smruthiorganics.com/rtaclientservice@adroitcorporate.com by 13th June, 2025. Shareholders are requested to note that in case their PAN is not registered, the tax will be deducted at a higher rate of 20%.

Members are requested to note that dividends that are not claimed within seven years from the date of transfer to the Company's Unpaid Dividend Account, will be transferred to the Investor Education and Protection Fund (IEPF). Shares on which dividend remains unclaimed for seven consecutive years shall be transferred to the IEPF as per Section 124 of the Act, read with applicable IEPF rules.
9. In compliance with Section 108 of the Act, read with the corresponding rules, Regulation 44 of the LODR Regulations and in terms of SEBI circular no. SEBI/HO/CFD/CMD/ CIR/P/2020/242 dated December 9, 2020, the Company has provided a facility to its members to exercise their votes electronically through the electronic voting (e-voting) facility provided by Central Depository Services (India) Limited (CDSL). Members who have cast their votes by remote e-voting prior to the AGM may participate in the AGM but shall not be entitled to cast their votes again. The manner of voting remotely by members holding shares in dematerialized mode, physical mode and for members who have not registered their email addresses is provided in the 'Instructions for e-voting' section which forms part of this Notice.
10. Members present in the AGM through VC and who have not cast their vote on the resolutions through remote e-voting and are otherwise not barred from doing so, shall be eligible to vote through the e-voting system during the AGM.
11. In compliance with the Circulars, the Integrated Annual Report 2025-26, the Notice of the 37th AGM, and instructions for e-voting are being sent through electronic mode to those members whose email addresses are registered with the Company / depository participant(s) (DP).
12. We urge members to support our commitment to environmental protection by choosing to receive the Company's communication through email. Members holding

The Scrutinizer will submit his report to the Chairman of the Company ("the Chairman") or to any other person authorized by the Chairman after the completion of the scrutiny of the e-voting (votes cast during the AGM and votes cast through remote e-voting), not later than 48 (forty eight) hours from the conclusion of the AGM. THE INSTRUCTIONS OF SHAREHOLDERS FOR E-VOTING AND JOINING VIRTUAL MEETING ARE AS UNDER:

Step 1 : Access through Depositories CDSL/NSDL e-Voting system in case of individual shareholders holding shares in demat mode.

Step 2 : Access through CDSL e-Voting system in case of shareholders holding shares in physical mode and non-individual shareholders in demat mode.

The voting period begins on Friday, 07th August, 2026 at 9.00 a.m (IST) and ends on Sunday, 09th August, 2026 at 05.00 p.m (IST). During this period shareholders' of the Company, holding shares either in physical form or in dematerialized form, as on the cut-off date (record date) of Friday, 31st July, 2026 may cast their vote electronically. The e-voting module shall be disabled by CDSL for voting thereafter. Shareholders who have already voted prior to the meeting date would not be entitled to vote at the meeting venue. Currently, there are multiple e-voting service providers (ESPs) providing e-voting facility to listed entities in India. This necessitates registration on various ESPs and maintenance of multiple user IDs and passwords by the shareholders. In order to increase the efficiency of the voting process, pursuant to a public consultation, it has been decided to enable e-voting to all the demat account holders, by way of a single login credential, through their demat accounts/ websites of Depositories/ Depository Participants. Demat account holders would be able to cast their vote without having to register again with the ESPs, thereby, not only facilitating seamless authentication but also enhancing ease and convenience of participating in e-voting process.

Step 1: Access through Depositories CDSL/NSDL e-Voting system in case of individual shareholders holding shares in demat mode.

- (1) In terms of SEBI circular no. SEBI/HO/CFD/CMD/ CIR/P/2020/242 dated December 9, 2020 on e-Voting facility provided by Listed Companies, Individual shareholders holding securities in demat mode are allowed to vote through their demat account maintained with Depositories and Depository Participants. A brief profile of Ms. Smruthi Eaga (DIN: 09268342) is as under:

Ms. Smruthi Eaga holds a Bachelor of Science from Solapur University, Maharashtra and Master of Science in Pharmacy from Long Island University - New York, United States of America in

2011. Upon completing her studies, she joined Smruthi Organics Limited as a Business Development Executive, serving from July 2011 to February 2013. During this period, she contributed to the Company's early international business development efforts, gaining firsthand exposure to the pharmaceutical industry and its operational and commercial dynamics.

Following her initial tenure with the Company, Ms. Smruthi Eaga relocated to the United States, where she built a career spanning approximately six years across diverse industries such as Blue Shield of California First Republic Bank, Wells Fargo and Perficient, Inc. During this period, she worked as a Business Analyst in the information technology sector, engaging with clients across a wide range of industries. While this experience is outside the pharmaceutical domain, it has equipped her with strong analytical capabilities, structured problem-solving skills, and an ability to navigate complex, multi-stakeholder environments competencies that translate effectively into a senior leadership role.

Since February 2022, Ms. Smruthi Eaga has been appointed on the Company's Board as a Non-Executive (retiring) Director. In 34th Annual general Meeting held on 05th August 2023, members approved her appointment for handling International Marketing activities of the Company particularly in Central and South American Markets which involved identification, interaction, development and monitoring of customers for company's existing products as also for future introductions as the company may think appropriate and also payment of remuneration of USD 70000 per annum (at present Rs 62.22 lakhs) to her for handling such responsibilities.

In regulatory affairs, she has actively guided the Company's filings and compliance initiatives, including Drug Master File (DMF) submissions with the European Directorate for the Quality of Medicines & HealthCare (EDQM) and ANVISA (Brazil), and has contributed to the Company's successful effort in obtaining EU GMP approval. In international business development, she has supported the Company's efforts to build relationships in Latin American markets, bringing to bear her understanding of international regulatory frameworks and global client expectations.

The Board is of the view that Ms. Smruthi Eaga's appointment as Executive Director would be in the best interest of the Company. Her pharmaceutical academic background, combined with her analytical and client-facing experience in the United States and her demonstrated contributions as a Non-Executive Director, position her well for an executive role with broader operational responsibility. Looking ahead, the Company is pursuing regulatory approvals and market opportunities in the United States, where her educational background and familiarity with the US regulatory environment are expected to add significant value. The Board is confident that her relocation back to India will strengthen the Company's leadership and accelerate its strategic objectives across international marketing, business development, regulatory affairs, and quality assurance in regulated and semi-regulated markets globally.

Tenure

The appointment of Ms. Smruthi Eaga as the Whole time Director shall be valid for a period of three years from 01st June 2026 to 31st May 2029.



Remuneration

Salary of Rs 7,00,000/- (Rupees Seven Lakhs) per month. i.e. Rs 84,00,000 lakhs (Rupees Eighty-Four Lakhs) per annum plus allowances, benefits and perquisites as mentioned under the heading "Perquisites / Allowances".

MANAGEMENT DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS

FY 2025–26 presented a challenging operating environment, marked by pricing pressure in domestic markets and demand softness in select product categories. Against this backdrop, the Company delivered a resilient performance — protecting margins, strengthening its regulatory standing, and laying the groundwork for meaningful revenue growth in the years ahead.

Industry Environment

The pharmaceutical API sector continued to face headwinds during the year, including elevated input costs driven by global commodity market volatility, competitive pricing in the domestic market due to surplus supply, and subdued demand in certain markets. Despite these conditions, export markets offered relatively better price realisation, and the Company oriented its business mix accordingly.

A notable trend that has intensified in recent years is the entry of non-traditional players into the API space. These entrants have, in several instances, pursued aggressive pricing strategies — at times pricing below manufacturing cost — with the objective of rapidly gaining market share. While many such participants do not sustain operations over the medium term, the pricing distortion they create in the interim affects the entire industry, including established manufacturers with sound fundamentals. The Company has chosen not to compete on this basis, prioritising margin integrity and long-term customer relationships over participation in unsustainable price competition.

Input costs, particularly for key raw materials, remained elevated through much of the year. The Company responded through a combination of alternative sourcing, supplier negotiations, and ongoing backward integration initiatives, which helped partially offset the impact on margins.

Financial Performance Overview

The following table provides a summary of key financial metrics for FY 2025–26. A detailed discussion of operational performance, revenue, margins, and cost efficiency is provided in the Operational Performance and State of Company's Affairs section of this report.

Despite lower revenues, EBITDA margin expanded by 316 basis points to 12.89%, reflecting the quality of the Company's operational decisions during the year. The marginal decline in PAT is attributable to a one-time exceptional provision related to the new Labour Codes and does not reflect underlying business performance.

Finished Dosage Formulations (FDF) Division

At the end of FY 2025–26, the Company took a considered management decision to discontinue its Finished Dosage Formulations (FDF) business unit. The FDF division had operated at a limited scale and, upon review, was determined to be non-core to the Company's strategic focus on Active Pharmaceutical Ingredient (API) manufacturing. Discontinuing the division allows the Company to concentrate its resources, management attention, and capital toward its core API business. The process of wind-down of FDF operations will be completed during the current year.

Regulatory Strategy and Global Expansion

The receipt of EDQM approval during the year marks a turning point in the Company's international growth trajectory. European markets and the many countries globally that align their pharmaceutical import standards with EDQM certification now become accessible to the Company. Management is actively building the commercial relationships needed to capitalise on this opening in not only European markets but other aligned markets as well.

The Company is expanding its Drug Master File (DMF) portfolio across multiple jurisdictions — Europe, Brazil, and Korea — progressively qualifying its products for entry into high-value regulated markets. Company is soon expecting regulatory inspection by ANVISA, Brazil. Management is confident in the Company's compliance readiness and views a favourable outcome of the inspection as an important milestone toward establishing a presence in one of the world's largest pharmaceutical markets in South America.

Outlook

The Company looks ahead to FY 2026–27 with a clear sense of direction and a broader range of growth opportunities than at any point in its recent history.

The EDQM approval has opened doors beyond the traditional API export business. The Company has begun onboarding customers in the Contract Research and Manufacturing Services (CRAMS) space — a segment characterised by better margins, faster turnaround cycles, and deeper customer relationships than standard API supply. The Company sees significant potential in this market and is actively expanding its presence. Several customer engagements are at advanced stages, and management expects CRAMS to become a meaningful contributor to revenue and profitability in the coming years.

In parallel, the Company is growing its business in the supply of intermediates to global API manufacturers. Historically, growth in this segment was constrained by the preference of large API manufacturers for suppliers whose materials are approvable across all of their global markets — a threshold the Company's products could not always meet. The EDQM and expected ANVISA approvals will materially change this dynamics. With certain late-stage

intermediates falling within regulatory purview, the Company's certified manufacturing standards are now a differentiator rather than a barrier. Acceptance of the Company's intermediates by large global API manufacturers has improved considerably, and this segment is now growing at a pace that reflects the pent-up demand from prior years.

Capital expenditure will remain moderate and routine unless significant new capacity requirements emerge, as the infrastructure investments of prior years have established a strong foundation.

The overarching objective for the year ahead is to grow revenues meaningfully aided by EDQM and ANVISA approvals , with a deliberate focus on products, segments, and markets that offer better

margin profiles. The Board and Management remain committed to translating these operational and strategic improvements into sustainable returns for shareholders.

Cautionary Statement

Directors' Report

Dear Members,

Your Directors are pleased to present the 37th Annual Report and the Audited Financial Statements for the financial year ended 31st March, 2026.

1. Financial Highlights:

A summary of the Company's financial results for the year ended 31st March, 2026 compared to the financial results for the previous year ended 31st March, 2025, is as under:

2. Operational Performance and State of Company's Affairs:

Revenue

Revenue from operations declined 19.08% to Rs. 10,196.71 lakhs, driven primarily by lower volumes in select domestic and export product categories. Demand softness in certain markets was a contributing factor. Additionally, in a year marked by pricing pressure, the Company consciously stepped back from price-sensitive business that would have diluted margins, choosing instead to prioritise export orders with better price realisation. This focus on value-driven pricing helped cushion the impact of volume softness and contributed directly to the improvement in margins seen during the year.

Profitability and Margin Performance

The standout story of FY26 is margin performance. Despite the 19.08% revenue decline, EBITDA grew 7.25% to Rs. 1,316 lakhs and EBITDA margin expanded sharply from 9.74% to 12.89% — a 316 basis point improvement. This was achieved through a better product mix, tighter process controls, and disciplined resource utilisation.

Finance costs fell 9.92% to Rs. 168.45 lakhs, reflecting improved working capital management. Profit Before Depreciation and Tax (PBDT) rose 10.33% to Rs. 1,147.56 lakhs. Depreciation increased 15.41% to Rs. 634.87 lakhs, reflecting infrastructure investments made in prior years to meet global regulatory standards. Profit Before Tax consequently stood at Rs. 466.43 lakhs versus Rs. 490.00 lakhs in the prior year.

PAT for the year was Rs. 342.57 lakhs versus Rs. 356.29 lakhs — a marginal decline of 3.85%, almost entirely attributable to a one-time exceptional provision of Rs. 46.26 lakhs on account of the statutory impact of the new Labour Codes. Adjusted for this item, the Company delivered improved underlying profitability.

Cost and Operational Efficiency

Raw material costs, which constitute the largest component of the Company's cost structure, declined in absolute terms in line with lower production volumes. The Company continued its efforts on alternate sourcing, vendor consolidation, and backward integration to reduce input cost dependence and improve procurement efficiency. Raw material consumption declined by 33.35% compared to the previous year.

Employee costs grew at an accelerated pace during the year, reflecting a deliberate strategic investment. The Company strengthened its quality, regulatory, and production teams in preparation for regulatory inspections and market entry in European and other regulated markets. While this has added to costs in the near term, management views this as essential to the Company's medium-term growth strategy.

The Company managed its working capital prudently without materially increasing debt, resulting in a 9.92% reduction in finance costs and a 6.63% reduction in other expenses compared to the previous year. The company was also able to reduce its long-term debt significantly ahead of schedule due to better cash accrual and working capital management.

A Landmark Regulatory Milestone: EDQM Approval

As a result of painstaking efforts taken during past few years for understanding regulatory environment and developing European and South American markets, the Company received during the year approval from the European Directorate for the Quality of Medicines & HealthCare (EDQM), one of the most rigorous regulatory standards globally. This is a significant milestone. EDQM certification qualifies the Company's APIs for supply to European Union markets and many countries worldwide that accept EDQM approvals as their benchmark covering a combined market of considerable scale and premium pricing potential. This approval validates the Company's manufacturing quality, documentation systems, and compliance infrastructure at the highest international level, and is expected to be a meaningful contributor to export revenue in the years ahead.

Similarly, Company is soon expecting regulatory inspection by ANVISA, Brazil. Management is confident in the Company's compliance readiness and views a favourable outcome of the inspection as an important milestone toward establishing a presence in one of the world's largest pharmaceutical markets in South America.

Finished Dosage Formulations (FDF) Division

At the end of FY 2025–26, the Company took a considered management decision to discontinue its Finished Dosage Formulations (FDF) business unit. The FDF division had operated at a limited scale and, upon review, was determined to be non-core to the Company's strategic focus on Active Pharmaceutical Ingredient (API) manufacturing. Discontinuing the division allows the Company to concentrate its resources, management attention, and capital toward its core API business, regulatory expansion, and export growth. The wind-down of FDF operations will be completed during the current year.

A detailed overview has been provided under the Management Discussion and Analysis Report.

3. Dividend:

The Board has recommended a Dividend of Rs 1.50/- per equity share (15 %) on equity share capital of 1,14,46,290 equity shares of Rs 10/- each for the year ended 31st March, 2026.

4. Transfer to Reserves:

During the financial year, the Company has not transferred any amount to general reserve.

5. Material changes and commitments, if any, affecting the financial position of the company, having occurred since the end of the Year and till the date of the Report:

During the period between the end of the financial year and the date of this Report, the Company decided to discontinue its Finished Dosage Formulations Division, which constituted a minor segment of the Company's operations since FY 2021-22. The said decision has been taken with a view to focus on strengthening the Company's core business segment and is not expected to have any material adverse impact on the financial position of the Company.

Except as stated above, there have been no other material changes and commitments affecting the financial position of the Company between the end of the financial year and the date of this Report.

6. Share Capital:

The paid up Equity Share Capital as at 31st March, 2026 stood at Rs 1144.629 lakhs. During the year under review, the Company did not issue any Equity Shares. Further, the Company has not issued any convertible securities or shares with differential voting rights nor has granted any stock options or sweat equity or warrants. There has been no change in the capital structure of the Company during the year.

7. Human Resource Development (HRD) & Industrial Relations

The Company continues to focus on the development of its human resources with a view to enhancing employee performance, skills and overall organisational effectiveness.

The Company has approximately 261 employees, whose valuable contribution has played an important role in strengthening the Company's position in the industry.

The Company has adopted a "Safety First" approach across all its plants. Visible controls and fool-proof systems are being implemented to prevent accidents. Regular communication, periodic review of safety practices and continuous training programmes are conducted to maintain high safety standards.

The relationship with the workmen and staff remained cordial and harmonious during the year. The management received full cooperation from employees across all units and locations.

The Members are requested to approve his re-appointment.

Based on the recommendation of the Nomination and Remuneration Committee, the Board has approved the appointment / change in designation of Ms. Smruthi Eaga (DIN: 09268342) from Non-Executive, Non-Independent Director to Whole-time Director, (Executive), liable to retire by rotation, for a period of 3 (three) years from 1st June, 2026 to 31st May, 2029, on the terms and conditions, including remuneration, as set out in the resolution, subject to approval of the Members and the Central Government.

Considering the same to be in the interest of the Company, the Members are requested to approve the said appointment / change in designation.

Ms. Smruthi Eaga has given her consent to act as Whole-time Director of the Company and has confirmed that she is not disqualified from being appointed as a Director under Section 164 of the Companies Act, 2013.

The Company has adopted a Code of Conduct for Directors and Senior Management Personnel. All Directors and Senior Management Personnel have confirmed compliance with the said Code.

None of the Directors of the Company is disqualified as on 31st March, 2026 from being appointed as a Director in terms of Section 164 of the Companies Act, 2013. As required under law, this position is also reflected in the Auditors' Report.

Details with respect to the composition of the Board, meetings of the Board held during the year and attendance of the Directors thereat have been provided separately in the Annual Report, as part of the Report on Corporate Governance.

In the opinion of the Board, all Independent Directors possess the requisite qualifications, experience, expertise and integrity for the purpose of Rule 8(5)(iii-a) of the Companies (Accounts) Rules, 2014 and fulfil the criteria of independence as provided under the Companies Act, 2013. The list of key skills, expertise and core competencies of the Board is provided in the Corporate Governance Report forming part of this Annual Report.

14. Declaration by Independent Directors

All Independent Directors have submitted requisite declarations confirming that they (i) continue to meet the criteria of independence as prescribed under Section 149(6) of the Act and Regulation 16(1)(b) of the SEBI Listing Regulations and are independent; and (ii) continue to comply with the Code of Conduct laid down under Schedule IV of the Act.

15. Key Managerial Personnel

In terms of Section 203 of the Act, the Company has the following Key Managerial Personnel : Mr. Purushotham Eaga, Chairman and Managing Director, Mr. Swapnil Eaga, Jt. Managing Director and Chief Financial Officer and Ms Urvashi Khanna, Company Secretary & Compliance Officer.

16. Board Evaluation

In terms of the applicable provisions of the Act, the SEBI Listing Regulations, Nomination and Remuneration Committee and the Board of Directors have approved a framework, which lays down a structured approach, guidelines and processes to be adopted for carrying out an evaluation of the performance of all the Directors, the Board as a whole and its Committees. The evaluation process has been separately explained in this Annual Report, as a part of the Report on Corporate Governance. For the year under review, the Board carried out the evaluation of its own performance and that of its Committees and the individual Directors and the evaluation results, as collated and presented, were noted by the Board.

17. Meetings of the Board

The Board met 4 (Four) times during the financial year. The meeting details are provided in the Report on Corporate Governance that forms part of this Annual Report.

The maximum interval between any two meetings did not exceed 120 days, as prescribed in the Act and the SEBI Listing Regulations.

18. Adequacy of Internal Financial Controls related to financial statements:

The Company has in place an adequate system of internal controls, policies and procedures for ensuring orderly and efficient conduct of the business, including adherence to the Company's policies, safeguarding of its assets, prevention and detection of frauds and errors, accuracy and completeness of the accounting records and timely preparation of reliable financial disclosures.

19. Auditors:

Pursuant to the provisions of Section 139 of the Companies Act, 2013 read with Companies (Audit and Auditors) Rules, 2014, in the 33rd Annual General Meeting M/s. Gokhale & Sathe, Chartered Accountants, Mumbai (Reg. No.: 103264W) were appointed as the Statutory Auditors of the Company for a term of five years commencing from Financial year 2022-2023 to 2026-2027.

The Auditors' Report on the Financial Statements of the Company for the year under review, is clean and there are no qualifications in the Report. Also, no frauds in terms of the provisions of Section 143(12) of the Act have been reported by the Statutory Auditors in their report for the year under review. The Notes to the Financial Statements are self explanatory and do not call for any further comments.

20. Secretarial Audit Report:

The Secretarial Audit Report submitted by the Secretarial Auditor Mr. H. R. Thakur, Practicing Company Secretary, Mumbai, in the prescribed Form MR-3 is attached as "Annexure – I" and forms part of this report.

The observation made in the Secretarial Audit Report is self-explanatory. The Report does not contain any qualification or adverse remark. Further the Company has also obtained from the Secretarial Auditor, the Annual Secretarial Compliance Report for the financial year ended 31st March, 2026, thereby confirming compliance of the applicable SEBI Regulations and circulars / guidelines issued thereunder, on behalf of the Company. The Company has complied with the applicable Secretarial Standards issued by the Institute of Company Secretaries of India.

21. Cost Audit:

Based on the recommendation of Audit Committee, the Board appointed M/s. Shrinivas Diddi and Associates, Cost Accountants, Solapur as the Cost Auditor to conduct the audit of the Company's cost records for the financial year ended 31st March, 2026. The Cost Auditor will submit his report for FY 2025-2026 by the due date.

The Cost Audit Report, for FY 2024-2025, was filed with the Central Government within the statutory timelines. The Company maintains the cost records in compliance with provisions of Section 148(1) of the Act.

Further, the Company has re-appointed M/s. Shrinivas Diddi and Associates., Cost Accountants, as the Cost Auditor for the financial year 2026-2027, to conduct an audit of its cost accounting records pertaining to the products of the Company as required by the law, at a remuneration of Rs 55,000 plus GST and reimbursement of out-of-pocket expenses.

The Company is seeking the approval of the Shareholders by means of ratification, for the remuneration to be paid to M/s. Shrinivas Diddi and Associates ., Cost Accountants, vide Item no. 4 of the Notice of 37th Annual General Meeting.

1. Conservation of Energy:

The company has implemented several measures towards energy conservation in FY 2025-2026. Key initiatives include:

Effluent Treatment & Water Management:

Multiple Effect Evaporator (MEE) plant optimization: The MEE plant has been enhanced to improve treatment of high-concentration wastewater. These upgrades have reduced water treatment costs by more than 5% and improved overall system performance.

Electrical Systems:

LED lighting retrofit: Approximately 148 LED lighting units have been installed across production and administrative areas, including 65 units in key production facilities. These upgrades have achieved 50% reduction in energy consumption in production areas, resulting in annual energy savings of 9,724 kWh and cost reduction of Rs. 1,21,545, while improving workplace illumination quality and safety.

Solar street lighting: Twelve solar-powered outdoor lighting units have been installed to provide energy-efficient illumination for facility grounds.

Variable Frequency Drives (VFDs): VFDs have been installed on multiple compressed air and HVAC systems across production and support facilities, enabling speed modulation to match production requirements. This optimization achieves up to 50% power consumption reduction compared to fixed-speed operation.

Cooling Systems:

Cooling tower optimization: Operational improvements to cooling systems have been implemented to reduce electrical load, resulting in monthly cost savings of Rs.1,62,000.

HVAC and Process Systems:

Enhanced HVAC controls: Improved direct cooling systems have been deployed in production areas to maintain precise temperature and humidity requirements while optimizing energy consumption.

Solvent recovery enhancement: Advanced condenser technology has been implemented to improve solvent recovery efficiency and product quality while reducing energy requirements.

The inventory is lying at factory locations and majorly constitutes Raw Material, Work in Progress and Finished Goods. The inventory is valued at the lower of cost and net realizable value. These inventories are counted by the Company on a cyclical basis.	- Understood management policy and process for verification and valuation of inventory on cyclical basis. - Attending inventory counts at factory locations during the reporting period, including performing testing of controls and evaluating the results of the counts performed by the management for assessing, obtaining an understanding of the design, implementation and operating effectiveness of management's key internal controls relating to physical verification of inventories and valuation of inventory. - Compared the cost of the finished goods with the estimated net realizable value and checked if the finished goods were recorded at lower of net realizable value and the cost as on the balance sheet date. - Sample testing of the methodology followed by the management in allocation of overheads to inventory based on factors / constant identified by the management's judgment and used as basis for allocation of overheads. - Assessed the adequacy of the relevant disclosure in the notes to the financial statements. - Our procedures did not identify any material exceptions.

- v. The final dividend proposed by the Board of directors for the year ended 31 March 2025 and paid during the current year by the Company is in compliance with section 123 of the Act.

As stated in Note 43 to the financial statements, the Board of Directors of the Company has proposed a final dividend for the year ended March 31, 2026, which is subject to the approval of the members at the ensuing Annual General Meeting. The amount of dividend proposed is in accordance with section 123 of the Act to the extent applicable.

- vi. Based on our examination, which included test checks, the company has used Tally Prime Edit Log version accounting software and EasyERP Business Operations Software to maintain its books of account for the year ended March 31, 2026. The audit trail (edit log) functionality was enabled in TallyPrime with effect from August 21, 2023 through migration to Edit Log version and has operated through-out the year for all relevant transactions recorded in the Tally software with no instances of tampering observed.

We observed from the Activities Affecting Edit Log that the company data was operated on the regular TallyPrime release version for a limited interval between 20:23 hours on November 10, 2025 and 06:09 hours on November 11, 2025, during which the edit-log configuration was capable of being altered by the user. Based on the audit procedures performed in respect of the said interval, no transaction was found to have been created, altered or deleted during the interval, and no instance of tampering with the audit trail was observed.

The audit trail logs that are required to be preserved by the company from April 01, 2023, in accordance with the statutory requirements

for record retention, are available from August 21, 2023.

The company has commissioned and has gone live with effect from April 1, 2023 on EasyERP Software that facilitates maintaining its business operations and processes through the software and financial transaction once authorized, cannot be edited or deleted. The audit trail (edit log) feature has been effective from the go live date.

The software vendor has certified the fact that audit trail (edit log) feature as enabled in the software cannot be disabled as effected at the application level of the software from date of its commissioning. However, in the absence of specific report being available to be extracted from the said software, we are unable to comment whether the audit trail (edit log) feature was operational throughout the year and not tampered with.

The audit trail logs in relation to EasyERP Software, that are required to be preserved by the company from April 01, 2023 in accordance with the statutory requirements for record retention, have been preserved.

Further, the audit trail (edit log) feature has not been enabled at database level of EasyERP Software.

3. With respect to the matter to be included in Auditors' Report under section 197(16) of the Act:
 - i. According to information and explanation given to us and based on our examination of the records of the Company, the Company has paid Managerial Remuneration in excess of eleven percent of the net profits of the company for current year in pursuance of the special resolution passed by the company in its 33rd and 34th Annual General Meetings and in accordance with the proviso to item (A) in Section II under Part II of Schedule V read with section 197 of Companies Act, 2013.
 - ii. The Ministry of Corporate Affairs has not prescribed other details under Section 197(16) of the Act which are required to be commented upon by us.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENT AS ON 31.03.2026

1. Corporate Information

Smruthi Organics Limited, incorporated in the year 1989, is a manufacturer of Active Pharmaceutical Ingredient (API) products in the Anti – Diabetic, Anti – Hypertension and Anti – Infectives Therapeutic categories catering to both the Indian domestic as well as rest of the world (ROW) markets, with clients spanning across the world. Its shares are listed on Bombay Stock Exchange and Metropolitan Stock Exchange of India Limited.

The company has 2 manufacturing facilities in Solapur, India. The API facility is spread across 22-acre land. The R&D Facility based in Hyderabad, India, works on developing novel synthetic routes for API and other product and process improvement.

Finished Dosage Form (FDF) Marketing

We are actively involved in the marketing of Finished Dosage Forms (FDFs) across the states of Maharashtra, Andhra Pradesh, and Telangana. Our portfolio includes a wide range of high-quality, affordable medicines across key therapeutic segments.

2. Basis of preparation

a. Statement of compliance

The financial statements of the Company have been prepared in accordance with and comply in all material respects with Indian Accounting Standards (Ind AS) as per the Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Rules, 2015 (amended from time to time) notified under Section 133 of Companies Act, 2013, (the 'Act') and other relevant provisions of the Act and presentation requirement of Div II to Schedule III of the Companies Act 2013.

Accordingly, the Company has prepared these Financial Statements which comprise the Balance Sheet as at 31 March, 2026, the Statement of Profit and Loss for the year ended 31 March 2026, the Statement of Cash Flows for the year ended 31 March 2026 and the Statement of Changes in Equity for the year ended as on that date, and accounting policies and other explanatory information (together hereinafter referred to as 'financial statements'). The application of Ind ASs, with additional disclosure when necessary, is presumed to result in financial statements that present a true and fair view.

Details of the Company's accounting policies are included in Note 3. The accounting policies set out below have been applied consistently to the years presented in these financial statements. The financial statements were authorised for issue by the Company's Board of Directors on Wednesday, 13th May, 2026.

b. Basis of measurement: The financial statements have been prepared on a historical cost basis, except for certain financial assets and liabilities as explained below:

- Financial instruments - measured at fair value.
- Plan assets under defined benefit plans – measured at fair value

The accounting policies are applied consistently to all the periods presented in the Financial Statements. All assets and liabilities have been classified as current or non-current as per the normal operating cycle of the Company and other criteria as set out in the Division II of Schedule III to the Companies Act, 2013. Based on the nature of products and the time between acquisition of assets for processing and their realization in cash and cash equivalents, the Company has ascertained its operating cycle as 12 months for the purpose of current or non-current classification of assets and liabilities

c. Functional and Presentation Currency

In addition, the financial statements are presented in INR which is also the Company's functional currency and all values are rounded to the nearest Lakh (INR 00,000), except when otherwise indicated. Wherever the amount represented '0' (zero) construes value less than Rupees five thousand.

3. Summary of Material Accounting Policies:

3.1 Use of Estimates, Judgements and Assumptions

The preparation of the financial statements in conformity with Ind AS requires the management to make estimates, judgments and assumptions. These estimates, judgments and assumptions affect the application of accounting policies and the reported amounts of assets and liabilities, the disclosures of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the period. Actual results could differ from those estimates according to the nature of the assumption and other circumstances.

This note provides an overview of the areas where there is a higher degree of judgment or complexity. Detailed information about each of these estimates and judgments is included in relevant notes together with information about the basis of calculation.

Estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the year in which the estimates are revised and future periods are affected.

The key assumptions concerning the future and other key sources of estimation uncertainty at the reporting date, that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities within the next financial year. The Company based its assumptions and estimates on parameters available when the financial statements were prepared. Existing circumstances and assumptions about future developments, however, may change due to market

changes or circumstances arising that are beyond the control of the Company. Such changes are reflected in the assumptions when they occur.

The following are areas involving critical estimates and judgments:

- Evaluation of recoverability of deferred tax assets, and estimation of income tax payable (Note No. 20)
- Provisions (Note No. 19 and 25)
- Contingencies (Note No. 40)

Estimates:

- Impairment (Note No. 3.9, and 3.19)
- Accounting for Defined benefit plans (Note No. 41)
- Useful lives of property, plant and equipment and intangible assets (Note No. 3.7 and 3.8)
- Financial Instruments (Note No. 47)
- Fair Value of Financial Instruments (Note No. 47)
- Valuation of Inventories (Note No. 9)

3.2 Current versus non-current classification

The company presents assets and liabilities in the Balance Sheet based on current / non-current classification.

An asset is treated as current when it is:

- Expected to be realized or intended to be sold or consumed in normal operating cycle.
- Held primarily for the purpose of trading.
- Expected to be realised within twelve months after the reporting period, or
- Cash or Cash equivalent unless restricted from being exchanged or used to settle a liability for at least twelve months after the reporting period.

A liability is current when:

- It is expected to be settled in normal operating cycle.
- It is held primarily for the purpose of trading.
- It is due to be settled within twelve months after the reporting period, or
- There is no unconditional right to defer the settlement of the liability for at least twelve months after the reporting Period.

All other assets and liabilities are classified as non-current assets and liabilities. Deferred tax assets and liabilities are classified as non-current assets and liabilities.

The operating cycle is the time between the acquisition of assets for processing and their realisation in cash and cash equivalents. The company has identified a period of twelve months as its operating cycle.

3.3 Fair value measurement

Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. The fair value measurement is based on the presumption that the transaction to sell the asset or transfer the liability takes place either:

- In the principal market for the asset or liability, or
- In the absence of a principal market, in the most advantageous market for the asset or liability

The principal or the most advantageous market must be accessible by the company. The fair value of an asset or a liability is measured using the assumptions that market participants would use when pricing the asset or liability, assuming that market participants act in their economic best interest.

A fair value measurement of a non-financial asset takes into account a market participant's ability to generate economic benefits by using the asset in its highest and best use or by selling it to another market participant that would use the asset in its highest and best use. The company uses valuation techniques that are appropriate in the circumstances and for which sufficient data are available to measure fair value, maximising the use of relevant observable inputs and minimising the use of unobservable inputs. All assets and liabilities for which fair value is measured or disclosed in the financial statements are categorised within the fair value hierarchy, described as follows, based on the lowest level input that is significant to the fair value measurement as a whole:

Level 1 - Quoted (unadjusted) market prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities.

Level 2- Valuation techniques for which the lowest level input that is significant to the fair value measurement is directly or indirectly observable.

Level 3 -Valuation techniques for which the lowest level input that is significant to the fair value measurement is unobservable.

Trade receivables that are more than 365 days overdue are presumed to have a significantly increased credit risk. As such expected credit loss is recognized for these receivables:

- These receivables are evaluated individually or as part of a specific risk segment based on customer type, days past due, past default history and probability of default.

- A provision rate of 2.5% to 7.5% is typically applied, unless there is objective evidence to support a different expected recovery in case of API Segment
- A provision rate of 25% to 75% is typically applied, unless there is objective evidence to support a different expected recovery in case of Formulation Segment

For other assets, the Company uses 12 month ECL to provide for impairment loss where there is no significant increase in credit risk. If there is significant increase in credit risk full lifetime ECL is used.

At each reporting date, the Management analyses the movements in the values of assets and liabilities which are required to be re-measured or re-assessed as per the company's accounting policies. For this analysis, the Management verifies the major inputs applied in the latest valuation by agreeing the information in the valuation computation to contracts and other relevant documents.

The Management also compares the change in the fair value of each asset and liability with relevant external sources to determine whether the change is reasonable. On an annual basis, the Management presents the valuation results to the Audit Committee and the Company's independent auditors. This includes a detailed discussion of the major assumptions used in the valuations.

For the purpose of fair value disclosures, the company has determined classes of assets and liabilities on the basis of the nature, characteristics and risks of the asset or liability and the level of the fair value hierarchy as explained above. This note summarises accounting policy for fair value. Other fair value related disclosures are given in the relevant notes.

3.4 Foreign currency translation

Items included in the Financial Statements of the Company are measured using the currency of the primary economic environment in which the Company operates (functional currency). The Financial Statements of the Company are presented in Indian currency INR, which is also the functional currency of the Company.

Transactions and balances

Foreign currency transactions are translated into the functional currency using the exchange rates at the dates of the transactions. Foreign exchange gain/(loss) resulting from the settlement of such transactions and from the translation of monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies at year end exchange rates are recognised in the Statement of Profit and Loss. Foreign exchange differences regarded as an adjustment to borrowing costs are presented in the Statement of Profit and Loss, within finance costs.

All other foreign exchange gain/(loss) presented in the Statement of Profit and Loss are on a net basis.

3.5 Revenue recognition

Revenue from contract with customer is recognised when control of the goods or services are transferred to the customer at an amount that reflects the consideration to which the Company expects to be entitled in exchange for those goods or services. Revenue is measured at the transaction price of the consideration received or receivable, taking into account contractually defined terms of payment and excluding taxes or duties collected on behalf of the government. The Company has generally concluded that it is the principal in its revenue arrangements because it typically controls the goods or services before transferring them to the customer.

a. Revenue from Sale of Goods:

Revenue from sale of goods is recognised at the point in time when control of the goods is transferred to the customer, generally on dispatch/delivery of the goods or terms as agreed with the customer. The normal credit term is 60 to 90 days from the date of dispatch. In determining the transaction price for the sale of goods, the company considers the effects of variable consideration, the existence of significant financing components, non-cash consideration, and consideration payable to the customer (if any).

b. Interest Income:

Interest income from a financial asset is recognized when it is probable that the economic benefits will flow to the Company and the amount of income can be measured reliably. Interest income is accrued on a time basis, by reference to the principle outstanding and at the effective interest rate applicable, which is the rate that exactly discounts estimated future cash receipts through the expected life of the financial asset to that asset's net carrying amount on initial recognition.

c. Export benefits:

Export incentives are recognized as income when the right to receive credit as per the terms of the scheme is established in respect of the exports made and where there is no significant uncertainty regarding the ultimate collection of the relevant export proceeds.

Contract assets

A contract asset is the right to consideration in exchange for goods transferred to the customer. If the Company performs its obligation by transferring goods to a customer before the

customer pays consideration or before payment is due, a contract asset is recognised for the earned consideration that is conditional.

a. Trade receivables

A receivable represents the Company's right to an amount of consideration that is unconditional (i.e., only the passage of time is required before payment of the consideration is due). Refer Note No. 3.19 to accounting policies of financial assets in (Financial instruments – initial recognition and subsequent measurement.) Refer to accounting policies of financial assets in Financial instruments – initial recognition and subsequent measurement.

Contract liabilities

A contract liability is the obligation to transfer goods or services to a customer for which the Company has received consideration (or an amount of consideration is due) from the customer. If a customer pays consideration before the Company transfers goods to the customer, a contract liability is recognised when the payment is made or the payment is due (whichever is earlier). Contract liabilities are recognised as revenue when the Company performs under the contract.

3.6 Income Taxes

The income tax expense or credit for the period is the tax payable on the current period's taxable income based on the applicable income tax rate for each jurisdiction adjusted by changes in deferred tax assets and liabilities attributable to temporary differences and to unused tax losses.

a. Current income tax

The tax currently payable is based on taxable profit for the year. Taxable profit differs from 'profit before tax' as reported in the Statement of Profit and Loss because of items of income or expense that are taxable or deductible in other years and items that are never taxable or deductible.

Current income tax assets and liabilities are measured at the amount expected to be recovered from or paid to the taxation authorities. The tax rates and tax laws used to compute the amount are those that are enacted or substantively enacted at the reporting date in the countries where the company operates and generates taxable income.

Current income tax relating to items recognised outside profit or loss is recognised outside profit or loss (either in other comprehensive income or in equity). Current tax items are recognised in correlation to the underlying transaction either in OCI or directly in equity. Management periodically evaluates positions taken in the tax returns with respect to situations in which applicable tax regulations are subject to interpretation and establishes provisions where appropriate.

b. Deferred tax

Deferred tax is provided using the liability method on temporary differences between the tax bases of assets and liabilities and their carrying amounts for financial reporting purposes at the reporting date. Deferred tax liabilities are recognised for all taxable temporary differences, except:

- When the deferred tax liability arises from the initial recognition of goodwill or an asset or liability in a transaction that is not a business combination and, at the time of the transaction, affects neither the accounting profit nor taxable profit or loss.

Deferred tax assets are recognised for all deductible temporary differences, the carry forward of unused tax credits and any unused tax losses. Deferred tax assets are recognised to the extent that it is probable that taxable profit will be available against which the deductible temporary differences, and the carry forward of unused tax credits and unused tax losses can be utilised, except:

- When the deferred tax asset relating to the deductible temporary difference arises from the initial recognition of an asset or liability in a transaction that is not a business combination and, at the time of the transaction affects neither the accounting profit nor taxable profit or loss.

The carrying amount of deferred tax assets is reviewed at each reporting date and reduced to the extent that it is no longer probable that sufficient taxable profit will be available to allow all or part of the deferred tax asset to be utilised. Unrecognised deferred tax assets are re-assessed at each reporting date and are recognised to the extent that it has become probable that future taxable profits will allow the deferred tax asset to be recovered.

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Deferred tax assets and liabilities are measured at the tax rates that are expected to apply in the year when the asset is realised or the liability is settled, based on tax rates (and tax laws) that have been enacted or substantively enacted at the reporting date.

Deferred tax relating to items recognised outside profit or loss is recognised outside profit or loss (either in other comprehensive income or in equity). Deferred tax items are recognised in correlation to the underlying transaction either in OCI or directly in equity.

Deferred tax assets and deferred tax liabilities are offset if a legally enforceable right exists to set off current tax assets against current tax liabilities and the deferred taxes relate to the same taxable entity and the same taxation authority.

c. Minimum alternate tax (MAT)

Minimum alternate tax (MAT) paid as per Indian Income Tax Act, 1961 is in the nature of unused tax credit which can be carried forward and utilised when the Company will pay normal income tax during the specified period. The same is not applicable to the company as it has exercised the option to pay tax under Section 115BAA of The Income Tax Act, 1961.

3.7 Property, Plant and Equipment (PPE)

Property, plant and equipment (PPE) and capital work in progress is stated at cost, net of accumulated depreciation and accumulated impairment losses, if any. The cost of acquired property, plant and equipment comprises its purchase price net of any trade discounts and rebates, any import duties and other taxes (other than those subsequently recoverable from the tax authorities), any directly attributable expenditure on making the asset ready for its intended use, including relevant borrowing costs for qualifying assets and any expected costs of decommissioning. When significant parts of plant and equipment are required to be replaced at intervals, the Company depreciates them separately based on their specific useful lives. All other repairs and maintenance are charged to profit or loss during the reporting period in which they are incurred.

The cost of a self-constructed asset comprises the cost of materials and direct labour, borrowing cost, any other costs directly attributable to bringing the item to working condition for its intended use, and estimated costs of dismantling and removing the item and restoring the site where it is located.

Property, plant and equipment that are not ready for intended use as on the date of Balance Sheet are disclosed as 'capital work-in-progress'. Items of stores and spares that meet the definition of Property, plant

and equipment are capitalized at cost and depreciated over their useful life. Otherwise, such items are classified as inventories.

Depreciation is calculated on written-down value basis over the estimated useful lives of the assets as prescribed under Part C of Schedule II of the Companies Act 2013 except for assets where management believes and based on independent technical evaluation, assets estimated useful lives are realistic and reflect fair approximation of the period over which the assets are likely to be used. Leasehold land is amortized over the lease period on a straight-line basis.

The residual values are not more than 5% of the original cost of the item of Property, Plant and Equipment. The residual values, useful lives and methods of depreciation of property, plant and equipment are reviewed at each financial year end and adjusted prospectively, if appropriate. The depreciation rates charged are over following estimated useful lives:

An item of property, plant and equipment and any significant part initially recognised is derecognised upon disposal or when no future economic benefits are expected from its use or disposal. Any gain or loss arising on derecognition of the asset (calculated as the difference between the net disposal proceeds and the carrying amount of the asset) is included in the income statement when the asset is derecognised.

Parts of an item of PPE having different useful lives and significant value and subsequent expenditure on Property, Plant and Equipment arising on account of capital improvement or other factors are accounted for as separate components only when it is probable that future economic benefits associated with the item

will flow to the Company and the cost of the item can be measured reliably.

3.8 Intangible Assets

Intangible assets acquired separately are measured on initial recognition at cost. Following initial recognition, intangible assets are carried at cost less any accumulated amortization and accumulated impairment losses, if any. Cost includes acquisition and other incidental cost related to acquiring the intangible asset. Administrative and other general overhead expenses that are specifically attributable to acquisition of intangible assets are allocated and capitalised as a part of the cost of the intangible assets.

The useful lives of intangible assets are assessed as either finite or indefinite. Intangible assets with finite lives are amortized over the useful economic life and assessed for impairment whenever there is an indication that the intangible asset may be impaired. The amortization period and the amortization method for an intangible asset with a finite useful life are reviewed at least at the end of each reporting period. A summary of the policies applied to the Company's intangible assets is as follows:

Changes in the expected useful life or the expected pattern of consumption of future economic benefits embodied in the asset are considered to modify the amortization period or method, as appropriate, and are treated as changes in accounting estimates.

The amortization expense on intangible assets with finite lives is recognised in the statement of profit and loss. Gains or losses arising from derecognition of an intangible asset are measured as the difference between the net disposal proceeds and the carrying amount of the asset and are recognised in the Statement of Profit and Loss when the asset is derecognized.

The Company has elected to continue with the carrying value for all of its intangible assets as recognised in the financial statements on transition to Ind AS, measured as per the previous GAAP and use that as its deemed cost as at the date of transition.

Research and Development Cost:

Research costs are expensed as incurred. Development expenditures on an individual project are recognised as an intangible asset when the Company can demonstrate:

- The technical feasibility of completing the intangible asset so that the asset will be available for use or sale,

- Its intention to complete and its ability and intention to use or sell the asset
- How the asset will generate future economic benefits
- The availability of resources to complete the asset
- The ability to measure reliably the expenditure during development

Following initial recognition of the development expenditure as an asset, the asset is carried at cost less any accumulated amortization and accumulated impairment losses. Amortisation of the asset begins when development is complete and the asset is available for use. It is amortised over the period of expected future benefit. Amortisation expense is recognised in the statement of profit and loss unless such expenditure forms part of carrying value of another asset. During the period of development, the asset is tested for impairment annually.

Intangible assets under development:

Expenditure incurred on acquisition/development of intangible assets which are not ready for their intended use at balance sheet date are disclosed under intangible assets under development.

3.9 Impairment of Assets

At the end of each reporting year, the Company reviews the carrying amounts of its property, plant and equipment and intangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have suffered an impairment loss. If any such indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset is estimated in order to determine the extent of the impairment loss (if any). Where it is not possible to estimate the recoverable amount of an individual asset, the Company estimates the recoverable amount of the cash-generating unit to which the asset belongs. Where a reasonable and consistent basis of allocation can be identified, corporate assets are also allocated to individual cash-generating units, or otherwise they are allocated to the smallest group of cash-generating units for which a reasonable and consistent allocation basis can be identified.

Intangible assets with indefinite useful lives and intangible assets not yet available for use are tested for impairment at least annually, and whenever there is an indication that the asset may be impaired.

Recoverable amount is the higher of fair value less costs to sell and value in use. In assessing value in use, the estimated future cash flows are discounted to their present value using a pre-tax discount rate that reflects current market assessments of the time value of money and the risks specific to the asset for which the estimates of future cash flows have not been adjusted.



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If the recoverable amount of an asset (or cash-generating unit) is estimated to be less than its carrying amount, the carrying amount of the asset (or cash-generating unit) is reduced to its recoverable amount. An impairment loss is recognised immediately in the Statement of Profit and Loss.

3.10 Inventories

Inventories comprise of raw materials, spares and stores, consumables, supplies and loose tools are valued at the lower of the cost or net realizable value after providing for obsolescence and other losses. Cost includes all the charges in bringing the goods to the present location and conditions. Net realizable value is determined based on estimated selling price in the ordinary course of business less the estimated cost of completion and the estimated cost of necessary to make the sale.

Cost of work-in-progress and finished goods comprises direct materials, direct labour and an appropriate proportion of variable and fixed overhead expenditure. Fixed overheads are allocated on the basis of normal operating capacity or more appropriate factor. Cost of inventories also include all other costs incurred in bringing the inventories to their present location and condition and non-refundable taxes paid. Costs of purchased inventory are determined after deducting rebates and discounts. Net realisable value is the estimated selling price in the ordinary course of business less the estimated costs of completion and the estimated costs necessary to make the sale. Costs of inventories are determined on First in First out (FIFO) basis.

3.11 Leases

The Company assesses whether a contract contains a lease, at the inception of the contract. A contract is, or contains, a lease if the contract conveys the right to control the use of an identified asset for a period of time in exchange for consideration. To assess whether a contract conveys the right to control the use of an identified asset, the Company assesses whether (i) the contract involves the use of identified asset; (ii) the Company has substantially all of the economic benefits from the use of the asset through the period of lease and (iii) the Company has right to direct the use of the asset

As a lessee:

- a. The company recognizes a right-of-use asset and a lease liability at the lease commencement date. The right-of-use asset is initially measured at cost, which comprises the initial amount of the lease liability adjusted for any lease payments made at or before the commencement date, plus any initial direct costs incurred and an estimate of costs to dismantle and remove the underlying asset or to restore the underlying

asset or the site on which it is located, less any lease incentives received.

- b. The right-of-use asset is measured by applying cost model i.e. right-of-use asset at cost less accumulated depreciation and cumulative impairment, if any
- c. The right-of-use asset is subsequently depreciated using the straight-line method from the commencement date to the earlier of the end of the useful life of the right-of-use asset or the end of the lease term. The estimated useful lives of right-of-use assets are determined on the same basis as those of property, plant and equipment. In addition, the right-of-use asset is periodically reduced by impairment losses, if any, and adjusted for certain remeasurements of the lease liability.
- d. The lease liability is initially measured at the present value of the lease payments that are not paid at the commencement date, discounted using the interest rate implicit in the lease or, if that rate cannot be readily determined, the company's incremental borrowing rate. Generally, the company uses its incremental borrowing rate as the discount rate
- e. Lease payments included in the measurement of the lease liability comprise fixed payments, including in-substance fixed payments, amounts expected to be payable under a residual value guarantee
- f. The nature of lessee's leasing activities is as follows:
 - i. Leasing of Immovable Property for Office Use
- g. Short-term leases and leases of low-value assets:
The company has elected not to recognise right-of-use assets and lease liabilities for short-term leases of real estate properties that have a lease term of 12 months. The company recognises the lease payments associated with these leases as an expense on a straight-line basis over the lease term

3.12 Provision

Provisions are recognised when the company has a present obligation (legal or constructive) as a result of a past event, it is probable that an outflow of resources embodying economic benefits will be required to settle the obligation and a reliable estimate can be made of the amount of the obligation.

Provisions are measured at the best estimate of the consideration required to settle the present obligation

at the end of the reporting period, taking into account the risks and uncertainties surrounding the obligation.

The expense relating to a provision is presented in the statement of profit and loss net of any reimbursement. Provisions are reviewed at each balance sheet date and adjusted to reflect the current best estimates.

3.13 Employee benefits:

Employee benefits include salaries, wages, contribution to provident fund, gratuity, leave encashment towards un-availed leave, post-retirement medical benefits and bonus.

Short-terms Employee Benefits:

Employee benefits such as salaries, wages, cost of bonus, ex-gratia and performance linked rewards falling due wholly within twelve months of rendering the service are classified as short-term employee benefits and are expensed in the period in which the employee renders the related service. The obligations are presented as current liability in the balance sheet if the entity does not have an unconditional right to defer the settlement for atleast 12 months after reporting date.

Post-employment benefits:

- **Defined contribution plan**

The Company's state governed provident fund scheme, employee state insurance scheme and employee pension scheme are defined contribution plans. The contribution paid/payable under the schemes is recognised during the period in which the employee renders the related service.

- **Defined benefit plan**

Defined benefit plans comprising of gratuity are recognized based on the present value of defined benefit obligations which is computed using the projected unit credit method, with actuarial valuations being carried out at the end of each annual reporting period. These are accounted either as current employee cost or, included in cost of assets as permitted in para 121 of Ind AS 19.

The Projected Unit Credit method (PUC) is used to assess the plan's present value of obligation (liabilities) and the related current service cost, and where applicable past service cost.

The obligation is measured at the present value of the estimated future cash flows using a discount rate based on the market yield on government securities of a maturity period equivalent to the weighted average maturity profile of the defined benefit obligations at the Balance Sheet date.

The net interest cost is calculated by applying the discount rate to the net balance of the defined benefit obligation and the fair value of plan assets. This cost is included in employee benefit expense in the statement of profit and loss. Re-measurement, comprising actuarial gains and losses, the return on plan assets (excluding amounts included in net interest on the net defined benefit liability or asset) and any change in the effect of asset ceiling (if applicable) is recognised in Other Comprehensive Income and is reflected in Retained earnings and the same is not eligible to be reclassified to Profit or Loss.

- **Other Employee benefit obligations**

Other Employee benefit comprises of leave encashment towards un-availed leave and compensated absences. These are accounted as current employee cost as these are payable by the company within subsequent 12 months.

Re-measurements of leave encashment towards un-availed leave are recognized in the Statement of profit or loss except those included in cost of assets as permitted in the period in which they occur. Accumulated leaves are not allowed to be carried forward beyond 12 months.

3.14 Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalent in the balance sheet comprise cash at banks and on hand and short-term deposits with an original maturity of three months or less, which are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value. For the purpose of the statement of cash flows, cash and cash equivalents consist of cash and short-term deposits, as defined above, net of outstanding bank overdrafts as they are considered an integral part of the company's cash management.

3.15 Segment information

Operating segments are those components of the business whose operating results are regularly reviewed by the chief operating decision making body in the Company to make decisions for performance assessment and resource allocation.

The reporting of segment information is the same as provided to the management for the purpose of the performance assessment and resource allocation to the segments. The Company prepares its segment information in conformity with the accounting policies adopted for preparing and presenting the financial statements of the Company as a whole. Common allocable costs, wherever allocated, are allocated to each segment on an appropriate basis.



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3.16 Earnings per Share

The Company presents basic and diluted earnings per share ("EPS") data for its ordinary shares.

Basic earnings per share

Basic earnings per share are calculated by dividing the net profit or loss for the period attributable to equity shareholders after tax by the weighted average number of equity shares outstanding during the period.

Diluted earnings per share

Diluted earnings per share is computed by dividing the profit after tax after considering the effect of interest and other financing costs or income (net of attributable taxes) associated with dilutive potential equity shares by the weighted average number of equity shares considered for deriving basic earnings per share and also the weighted average number of equity shares that could have been issued upon conversion of all dilutive potential equity shares including the treasury shares held by the Company to satisfy the exercise of the share options by the employees.

3.17 Events after the reporting period

Events after the reporting period are those events, favourable and unfavourable, that occur between the end of the reporting period and the date when the financial statements are approved by the Board of Directors in case of a company, and, by the corresponding approving authority in case of any other entity for issue.

Two types of events can be identified;

- those that provide evidence of conditions that existed at the end of the reporting period (adjusting events after the reporting period); and
- those that are indicative of conditions that arose after the reporting period (non-adjusting events after the reporting period)

3.18 Contingent Liabilities and Contingent assets

A contingent liability is;

- a possible obligation that arises from past events whose existence will be confirmed by the occurrence or non-occurrence of one or more uncertain future events beyond the control of the company or
- a present obligation that is not recognised because, it is not probable that an outflow of resources will be required to settle the obligation. A contingent liability also arises in extremely rare cases where there is a liability that cannot be recognised because it cannot be measured reliably. The Company does not

recognise a contingent liability but discloses its existence in the financial statements.

A contingent asset is not recognised unless it becomes virtually certain that an inflow of economic benefits will arise. When an inflow of economic benefits is probable, contingent assets are disclosed in the financial statements.

Contingent liabilities and contingent assets are reviewed at each balance sheet date.

3.19 Financial instruments

Initial recognition and measurement

Financial assets and financial liabilities are recognised when an entity becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument. Financial assets and financial liabilities are initially measured at fair value. Transaction costs that are directly attributable to the acquisition or issue of financial assets and financial liabilities (other than financial assets and financial liabilities at fair value through Statement of Profit and Loss (FVTPL)) are added to or deducted from the fair value of the financial assets or financial liabilities, as appropriate, on initial recognition. Transaction costs directly attributable to the acquisition of financial assets or financial liabilities at fair value through profit and loss are recognised immediately in Statement of Profit and Loss. However, trade receivables that do not contain a significant financing component are measured at transaction price.

I. Financial assets

On initial recognition, a financial asset is classified as measured at:

- amortised cost
- FVTOCI - Debt Investment
- FVTOCI – Equity Investment or
- FVTPL

Financial assets are not reclassified subsequent to their initial recognition unless the Company changes its business model for managing financial assets, in which case all affected financial assets are reclassified on the first day of the first reporting period following the change in the business model.

a. Subsequent Measurement

i. Financial asset measured at Amortised cost:

Financial assets are subsequently measured at amortised cost, using the EIR method less impairment, if any, if these financial assets are held within a business model

whose objective is to hold these assets in order to collect contractual cash flows and the contractual terms of the financial asset give rise on specified dates to cash flows that are solely payments of principal and interest on the principal amount outstanding. The amortization of EIR and loss arising from impairment, if any is recognised in the Statement of Profit and Loss

ii. Financial assets measured at Fair Value Through Other Comprehensive Income (FVTOCI)

Financial asset is, except trade receivables and contract assets that are measured at transaction price, measured at FVTOCI if it is held within a business model whose objective is achieved by both, selling financial assets and collecting contractual cash flows and the contractual terms of the financial asset give rise on specified dates to cash flows that represents solely payments of principal and interest on the principal amount outstanding.

Debt instruments included within the FVTOCI category are measured initially as well as at each reporting date at fair value. Fair value movements are recognised in the Other Comprehensive Income (OCI). However, the Company recognises interest income, impairment losses & reversals and foreign exchange gain or loss in the Statement of Profit and Loss. On derecognition of the asset, cumulative gain or loss previously recognised in OCI is reclassified from the equity to Statement of Profit and Loss. Interest earned whilst holding FVTOCI debt instrument is reported as interest income using the EIR method

iii. Financial assets measured at Fair Value Through Profit or Loss (FVTPL)

Financial asset which is not classified in any of the above categories are measured at FVTPL. Financial assets are reclassified

subsequent to their recognition, if the Company changes its business model for managing those financial assets. Changes in business model are made and applied prospectively from the reclassification date which is the first day of immediately next reporting period following the changes in business model in accordance with principles laid down under Ind AS 109 – Financial Instruments.

iv. Other Equity investment

All other equity investments are measured at fair value, with value changes recognised in Statement of Profit and Loss, except for those equity investments for which the Company has elected to present the value changes in 'Other Comprehensive Income'. However, dividend on such equity investments is recognised in Statement of Profit and loss when the Company's right to receive payment is established.

b. Derecognition

A financial asset (or, where applicable, a part of a financial asset or part of a Company of similar financial assets) is primarily derecognised (i.e. removed from the Company's balance sheet) when:

The rights to receive cash flows from the asset have expired, or

The Company has transferred its rights to receive cash flows from the asset or has assumed an obligation to pay the received cash flows in full without material lay to a third party under a 'pass-through' arrangement; and either (a) the Company has transferred substantially all the risks and rewards of the asset, or (b) the Company has neither transferred nor retained substantially all the risks and rewards of the asset, but has transferred control of the asset.

When the Company has transferred its rights to receive cash flows from an asset or has entered into a pass-through arrangement, it evaluates if and to what extent it has retained the risks and rewards of ownership. When it has neither transferred nor retained



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substantially all of the risks and rewards of the asset, nor transferred control of the asset, the Company continues to recognise the transferred asset to the extent of the Company's continuing involvement. In that case, the Company also recognises an associated liability. The transferred asset and the associated liability are measured on a basis that reflects the rights and obligations that the Company has retained.

c. Impairment of financial assets

In accordance with Ind AS 109, the Company uses 'Expected Credit Loss' (ECL) model, for evaluating impairment of Financial Assets other than those measured at Fair Value Through Profit and Loss (FVTPL).

Expected Credit Losses are measured through a loss allowance at an amount equal to:

- The 12-months expected credit losses (expected credit losses that result from those default events on the financial instrument that are possible within 12 months after the reporting date), if the credit risk on a financial instrument has not increased significantly; or
- Full lifetime expected credit losses (expected credit losses that result from all possible default events over the life of the financial instrument), if the credit risk on a financial instrument has increased significantly.

For trade receivables the Company applies 'simplified approach' which requires expected lifetime losses to be recognised from initial recognition of the receivables. The Company uses historical default rates to determine impairment loss on the portfolio of trade receivables. At every reporting date these historical default rates are reviewed and changes in the forward-looking estimates are analysed.

Trade receivables that are more than 365 days overdue are presumed to have a significantly increased credit risk. As such expected credit loss is recognized for these receivables:

- These receivables are evaluated individually or as part of a specific

risk segment based on customer type, days past due, past default history and probability of default.

- A provision rate of 2.5% to 7.5% is typically applied, unless there is objective evidence to support a different expected recovery in case of API Segment
- A provision rate of 25% to 75% is typically applied, unless there is objective evidence to support a different expected recovery in case of Formulation Segment

For other assets, the Company uses 12 month ECL to provide for impairment loss where there is no significant increase in credit risk. If there is significant increase in credit risk full lifetime ECL is used.

A financial asset is 'credit-impaired' when one or more events that have a detrimental impact on the estimated future cash flows of the financial asset have occurred. Evidence that a financial asset is credit-impaired includes the following observable data:

- significant financial difficulty of the borrower or issuer;
- a breach of contract such as a default or being past due for 90 days or more;
- the restructuring of a loan or advance by the Company on terms that the Company would not consider otherwise;
- it is probable that the borrower will enter bankruptcy or other financial reorganisation; or
- the disappearance of an active market for a security because of financial difficulties

When determining whether the credit risk of a financial asset has increased significantly since initial recognition and when estimating expected credit losses, the Company considers reasonable and supportable information that is relevant and available without undue cost or effort. This includes both quantitative and qualitative information and analysis, based on the Company's historical experience and informed credit assessment and including forward-looking information.

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The gross carrying amount of a financial asset is written off (either partially or in full) to the extent that there is no realistic prospect of recovery. This is generally the case when the Company determines that the debtor does not have assets or sources of income that could generate sufficient cash flows to repay the amounts subject to the write-off. However, financial assets that are written off could still be subject to enforcement activities in order to comply with the Company's procedures for recovery of amounts due.

Other Financial Assets

Other Financial Assets mainly consists of Advances to employees and Security Deposit. Following are the policy for specific financial assets:-

II. Financial liabilities

a. Subsequent Measurement

Financial liabilities are classified as measured at Amortised cost or 'FVTPL'.

Financial Liability - FVTPL

A Financial Liability is classified as at FVTPL if it is classified as held-for-trading, or it is a derivative (that does not meet hedge accounting requirements) or it is designated as such on initial recognition

A financial liability is classified as held for trading if:

- it has been incurred principally for the purpose of repurchasing it in the near term; or
- on initial recognition it is part of a portfolio of identified financial instruments that the Company manages together and has a recent actual pattern of short-term profit-taking; or

- it is a derivative that is not designated and effective as a hedging instrument.

A financial liability other than a financial liability held for trading may be designated as at FVTPL upon initial recognition if:

- such designation eliminates or significantly reduces a measurement or recognition inconsistency that would otherwise arise;
- the financial liability forms part of a group of financial assets or financial liabilities or both, which is managed, and its performance is evaluated on a fair value basis, in accordance with the Company's documented risk management or investment strategy, and information about the grouping is provided internally on that basis; or
- it forms part of a contract containing one or more embedded derivatives, and IND AS 109 permits the entire combined contract to be designated as at FVTPL in accordance with IND AS 109

Financial liabilities at FVTPL are stated at fair value, with any gains or losses arising on remeasurement recognised in Statement of Profit and Loss. The net gain or loss recognised in Statement of Profit and Loss incorporates any interest paid on the financial liability and is included item in the Statement of Profit and Loss. For liabilities designated as FVTPL, fair value gains/losses attributable to changes in own credit risk are recognised in OCI.

Other financial liabilities:

Other financial liabilities (including borrowings and trade and other payables) are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

b. Derecognition of financial liabilities:

The Company derecognises financial liabilities when, and only when, the Company's obligations are discharged, cancelled or have expired. An exchange with a lender of debt instruments with

substantially different terms is accounted for as an extinguishment of the original financial liability and the recognition of a new financial liability. Similarly, a substantial modification of the terms of an existing financial liability (whether or not attributable to the financial difficulty of the debtor) is accounted for as an extinguishment of the original financial liability and the recognition of a new financial liability. The difference between the carrying amount of the financial liability derecognized and the consideration paid and payable is recognised in profit or loss.

III. Offsetting financial instrument

Financial assets and liabilities are offset, and the net amount is reported in the balance sheet where there is a legally enforceable right to offset the recognised amounts and there is an intention to settle financial asset and liability on a net basis or realise the asset and settle the liability simultaneously. The legally enforceable right must not be contingent on future events and must be enforceable in the normal course of business and in the event of default, insolvency or bankruptcy of the Company or the counterparty.

3.20 Recent Accounting Pronouncement

Ministry of Corporate Affairs ("MCA") notifies new standards or amendments to the existing standards under Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Rules as issued from time to time. The impact of these amendments has been evaluated in Note No. 49 to the Financial Statements.

3.21 Accounting Policy for Capitalisation of Borrowing Cost

Borrowing costs, general or specific, that are directly attributable to the acquisition or construction of qualifying assets is capitalized as part of such assets. A qualifying asset is one that necessarily takes substantial period of time to get ready for intended use. All other borrowing costs are charged to the Statement of Profit and Loss.

The Company determines the amount of borrowing costs eligible for capitalisation as the actual borrowing costs incurred on that borrowing during the year less any interest income earned on temporary investment of specific borrowings pending their expenditure on qualifying assets, to the extent that an entity borrows funds specifically for the purpose of obtaining a qualifying asset. In case if the Company borrows generally and uses the funds for obtaining a qualifying asset, borrowing costs eligible for capitalisation are determined by applying a capitalisation rate to the expenditures on that asset.

- n. In respect of term loan from Axis Bank, interest due at end of August 2025 amounting to INR 5.70 lakh was paid on being charged by the bank on September 1, 2025 even though there was sufficient balance in CC account to recover such interest as at the end of August 2025. The company has not defaulted during the year in respect of any of the covenants in relation to loans borrowed by the company.

Financial risk management objectives and policies

The Company's principal financial liabilities, other than derivatives, comprise loans and borrowings, trade and other payables. The main purpose of these financial liabilities is to finance the Company's operations and to provide guarantees to support its operations. The Company's principal financial assets include loans, trade and other receivables, and cash and cash equivalents that derive directly from its operations. The Company also holds FVTOCI investments and has not entered into derivative transaction.

The Company is exposed to market risk, credit risk and liquidity risk. The Company's senior management oversees the management of these risks. Company's financial risk activities are governed by appropriate policies and procedures and that financial risks are identified, measured and managed in accordance with the Company's policies and risk objectives. The Board of Directors reviews and agrees policies for managing each of these risks, which are summarised below:

a. Financial risk management

The risk management policies are established to ensure timely identification and evaluation of risks, setting acceptable risk thresholds, identifying and mapping controls against these risks, monitor the risks and their limits, improve risk awareness and transparency. Risk management policies and systems are reviewed regularly to reflect changes in the market conditions and the Company's activities to provide reliable information to the Management and the Board to evaluate the adequacy of the risk management framework in relation to the risk faced by the Company.

The risk management policies aims to mitigate the following risks arising from the financial instruments:

- Market risk
- Credit risk; and
- Liquidity risk

b. Market risk

Market risk is the risk that the fair value of future cash flows of a financial instrument will fluctuate because of changes in the market prices. The Company is exposed in the ordinary course of its business to risks related to changes in

- foreign currency exchange rates,
- commodity prices and
- interest rates

c. Foreign currency risk management

The Company's functional currency is Indian Rupees (INR). The Company undertakes transactions denominated in foreign currencies; consequently, exposure to exchange rate fluctuations arise. Volatility in exchange rates affects the Company's revenue from export markets and the costs of imports, primarily in relation to raw materials. The Company is exposed to exchange rate risk under its trade portfolio.

Movements in the exchange rate between the Rupee and any relevant foreign currency result's in change in the Company's overall trade position in Rupee terms.

In order to hedge exchange rate risk, the Company has a policy to hedge cash flows up to a specific tenure with its cash inflows. All hedging activities are carried out in accordance with the Company's internal risk management policies, as approved by the Board of Directors, and in accordance with the applicable regulations where the Company operates. The company has not entered into any derivative contracts during the year under consideration.

d. Commodity price risk:

The Company's revenue is exposed to the market risk of price fluctuations related to the sale of its products. Market forces generally determine prices for the products sold by the Company. These prices may be influenced by factors such as supply and demand, production costs (including the costs of raw material inputs) and global and regional economic conditions and growth. Adverse changes in any of these factors may reduce the revenue that the Company earns from the sale of its products. The Company primarily purchases its raw materials in the open market from third parties. The Company is therefore subject to fluctuations in prices for the purchase of raw material inputs.

The Company aims to sell the products at prevailing market prices. Similarly, the Company procures key raw materials based on prevailing market rates as the selling prices and the prices of input raw materials move in the same direction. The company has not entered into any derivative contracts during the year under consideration

e. Interest rate risk

Interest rate risk is the risk that the fair value or future cash flows of a financial instrument will fluctuate because of changes in market interest rates. The Company is exposed to interest rate risk because funds are borrowed at both fixed and floating interest rates. The floating interest rates are based on bank rate and are indirectly governed by RBI's monetary policy. The borrowings of the Company are in Indian Rupees. The company has maintained a mix of fixed interest rate borrowings and floating rate borrowings.

Upfront fees paid for fixed rate borrowing availed during the periods have been capitalized to the cost of PPE being borrowing cost incurred during the year of inception of the loan. During the year, interest of INR 3.84 Lakh (PY INR 13.15 Lakhs) has been capitalized as borrowing cost added to the value of PPE and Capital WIP.

f. Credit risk management

Credit risk refers to the risk that a counterparty will default on its contractual obligations resulting in financial loss to the Company. Credit risk encompasses of both, the direct risk of default and the risk of deterioration of creditworthiness as well as concentration risks. The Company has adopted a policy of only dealing with creditworthy counterparties and obtaining sufficient collateral, where appropriate, as a means of mitigating the risk of financial loss from defaults

Company's credit risk arises principally from the trade receivables, loans, and investments in securities, cash & cash equivalents. Based on the historical data available with the management, the management has not encountered situations wherein the trade receivables have been considered as loss assets or credit has been impaired however, during the year some cases of defaults in payments and accordingly, the management after making an overall risk assessment has provided for expected credit loss provision.

Trade receivables

Customer credit risk is managed centrally by the Company and subject to established policy, procedures and control relating to customer credit risk management. Credit quality of a customer is assessed based on an extensive credit rating scorecard and individual credit limits defined in accordance with the assessment.

Credit risk on receivables is also mitigated by securing the same against letters of credit of reputed nationalised and private sector banks. Trade receivables consist of a large number of customers spread across diverse industries and geographical areas with no significant concentration of credit risk. Only 3 customers during the year (PY 2 customers) account for 10.0% or more of revenue effected during the year under consideration. The outstanding trade receivables are regularly monitored, and appropriate action is taken for collection of overdue receivables. The history of trade receivables shows no major allowance for bad and doubtful debts but the marginal provision for doubtful debts (Expected Credit Loss) created this year. Also refer Note no. 10

Cash and cash equivalents and Other Bank Balances

Credit risks from balances with banks and financial institutions are managed in accordance with the Company policy. Also refer Note no. 11 and 12.

g. Liquidity risk management

Liquidity risk refers to the risk of financial distress or extraordinary high financing costs arising due to shortage of liquid funds in a situation where business conditions unexpectedly deteriorate and requiring financing. The Company requires funds both for short term operational needs as well as for long term capital expenditure growth projects. The Company generates sufficient cash flow for operations, which together with the available cash and cash equivalents and short-term investments provide liquidity in the short-term and long-term.

The Company has established an appropriate liquidity risk management framework for the management of the Company's short, medium and long-term funding and liquidity management requirements. The Company manages liquidity risk by maintaining adequate reserves, banking facilities and reserve borrowing facilities, by continuously monitoring forecast and actual cash flows, and by matching the maturity profiles of financial assets and liabilities.

The following tables detail the Company's remaining contractual maturity for its financial liabilities with agreed repayment periods and its financial assets. Collateral

The Company has hypothecated part of its trade receivables, inventories, other bank balances and mortgaged its immovable properties in order to fulfil certain collateral requirements for the banking facilities extended to the Company. Capital management

The primary objective of the Company's capital management is to maximise the shareholder value. The Company manages its capital structure and makes adjustments in light of changes in economic conditions and the requirements of the financial covenants. To maintain or adjust the capital structure, the Company may adjust the dividend payment to shareholders, return capital to shareholders or issue new shares. The Company monitors capital using a gearing ratio, which is net debt divided by total equity. The Company includes within net debt, interest bearing loans and borrowings, less cash and cash equivalents

In order to achieve this overall objective, the Company's capital management, amongst other things, aims to ensure that it meets financial covenants attached to the interest-bearing loans and borrowings that define capital structure requirements. Breaches in meeting the financial covenants would permit the bank to immediately call loans and borrowings. There have been no breaches in

the financial covenants of any interest-bearing loans and borrowing in the current period. No changes were made in the objectives, policies or processes for managing capital during the years ended 31 March 2026 and 31 March 2025.

Fair value measurement of financial instruments

When the fair values of financial assets and financial liabilities recorded in the balance sheet cannot be measured based on quoted prices in active markets, their fair value is measured using valuation techniques including the DCF model. The inputs to these models are taken from observable markets where possible, but where this is not feasible, a degree of judgement is required in establishing fair values. Judgements include considerations of inputs such as liquidity risk, credit risk and volatility. Changes in assumptions about these factors could affect the reported fair value of financial instruments.

Note no. 48 Audit Trail

The company is using Tally Prime Edit Log accounting software and easyERP Business operations software for maintaining its books of accounts for the year ended March 31, 2025. The audit trail (edit log) functionality was enabled in TallyPrime with effect from August 21, 2023 through migration of data to Edit log version of Tallyprime. As per the official statement of Tally Solutions Private Limited on its website, the Edit log feature is enabled by default, without an option to disable it, in the "TallyPrime Edit Log" version.

Accordingly, post migration to TallyPrime Edit Log, the audit trail (edit log) functionality has operated through-out the year for all relevant transactions recorded in the Tally software and there is not any instance of the audit trail feature being tampered with except for the fact that during the year, the Company's data was inadvertently operated on the regular TallyPrime release for a brief interval between 20:23 hours on November 10, 2025 and 06:09 hours on November 11, 2025, following which it was restored to the Edit Log version. The Company has verified that no transaction was created, altered or deleted during the said interval and that the audit trail records are intact

The company has commissioned EasyERP software in February 2023 that facilities streamlining of business operations and processes that include procurement, inventory, logistics execution, product development, manufacturing and sales. The software has gone live on April 1, 2023. The EasyERP software does not allow edit or delete option at the financial transaction level and that the said audit trail (edit log) feature once enabled in the software cannot be disabled as effected at the application level of the software. ERP Database is not directly accessible to regular system users. The ERP has stringent access controls and security measures to restrict database access to vendor's authorized personnel who are responsible for maintaining the integrity and security of the data. The software product owners have confirmed that there is no audit trail enabled for database level changes. However, the authorized personnel of vendor undergo rigorous authentication processes and adhere to strict protocols to ensure that database records remain confidential and tamper- proof.

Note No. 49 Impact of Amendments in IND AS

Ministry of Corporate Affairs ("MCA") notifies new standards or amendments to the existing standards under Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Rules as issued from time to time.

In May 2025, MCA notified amendments to Ind AS 21 – The Effects of Changes in Foreign Exchange Rates, applicable w.e.f. April 1, 2025. The management has reviewed the amendment and based on its evaluation has determined that it does not have any significant impact in its financial statements.

In August 2025, MCA notified the following amendments to:

- a. Ind AS 1, Presentation of Financial Statements, applicable w.e.f April 1, 2025 - The amendment relates to classification of liabilities as current or non-current and non-current liabilities with covenants. In the context of classifying a liability as current, it removes the requirement of existence of a right to defer settlement for at least 12 months after the reporting date, and instead requires that the said right should exist on the reporting date and have substance. The amendment also introduces guidance on classification of liabilities with covenants. The company has no impact of these amendments in its classification criteria of current and non-current liabilities.
- b. Ind AS 7, Statement of Cash Flows and Ind AS 107, Financial Instruments - Disclosures, applicable w.e.f April 1, 2025 – The amendment in Ind AS 7 requires to inform users of financial statements of the existence of supplier finance arrangements and explain the nature of the arrangements, the carrying amount of liabilities and the range of payment due dates. Ind AS 107 has been amended to add supplier finance arrangements as a factor that may cause concentration of liquidity risk. The management has reviewed the amendment and based on its evaluation has determined that it does not have any significant impact in its financial statements.
- c. Ind AS 12, International Tax Reform – Pillar Two Model Rules applicable immediately - The amendments provide a temporary mandatory relief from deferred tax accounting for top-up tax and disclose that they have applied the relief. This relief is immediate and applies retrospectively. The management has reviewed the amendment and based on its evaluation has determined that it does not have any significant impact in its financial statements.

Note No. 50 Events after the reporting period

During the period between 31 March 2026 and the date of approval of these financial statements, the Board of Directors at its meeting held on 13 May 2026 approved the discontinuance, by way of a phased wind down, of the Company's Finished Dosage Formulations Division, which constitutes a reportable segment under Ind AS 108, Refer Note 45 - Segment Information. The decision has been taken with a view to focus on strengthening the Company's core business.

The decision was taken after the reporting date and is a non-adjusting event under Ind AS 10, Events after the Reporting Period. Accordingly, no adjustments have been made to the financial statements for the year ended 31 March 2026, and the results of the said segment continue to be presented as part of continuing operations. The segment will be presented as a discontinued operation in accordance with Ind AS 105 in the period in which its operations actually cease.

The property, plant and equipment hitherto deployed for the segment will continue to be used in the Company's other continuing segments. Trade receivables of the segment carry expected credit loss allowances and inventories are carried at the lower of cost and net realisable value as at 31 March 2026. Accordingly, while the precise costs of the wind down will be recognised in the financial year 2026-27 as the related obligations arise, the discontinuance is not expected to have a material adverse impact on the financial position of the Company.
