1. After successful login at Step 1, you will be able to see all the companies "EVEN" in which you are holding shares and whose voting cycle and General Meeting is in active status.
2. Select "EVEN" of company for which you wish to cast your vote during the remote e-Voting period and casting your vote during the Annual General Meeting. For joining virtual meeting, you need to click on "VC/OAVM" link placed under "Join Meeting".
3. Now you are ready for e-Voting as the Voting page opens.
4. Cast your vote by selecting appropriate options i.e. assent or dissent, verify/modify the number of shares for which you wish to cast your vote and click on "Submit" and also "Confirm" when prompted.
5. Upon confirmation, the message "Vote cast successfully" will be displayed.
6. You can also take the printout of the votes cast by you by clicking on the print option on the confirmation page.
7. Once you confirm your vote on the resolution, you will not be allowed to modify your vote.

General Guidelines for shareholders

1. 2. REVIEW OF OPERATIONS

The total income on standalone basis during the year was Rs. 199.98 lakhs (Previous Year - Rs. 126.93 lakhs). The Company's turnover has increased by about 57.55% due to favourable business conditions this Financial Year. The Net Profit after Tax was Rs. 63.66 lakhs (Previous Year - net loss of Rs.54.17 lakhs) due to increase in operations.

3. OUTLOOK & PROSPECTS

As per the Provisional Estimates (PE) of Gross Domestic Product (GDP) released by the National Statistical Office (NSO), Real GDP (at constant 2022-23 prices) is estimated to attain a level of ₹323.12 lakh crore during FY 2025-26 as compared to the First Revised Estimates of ₹299.89 lakh crore in FY 2024-25, registering a robust growth of 7.7%. Nominal GDP (at current prices) is estimated at ₹346.36 lakh crore against ₹318.07 lakh crore in the previous year, reflecting a growth of 8.9%.

Thus, despite the global turmoil, the Indian economy remained resilient in the year 2025-26. Even as the net external demand remained soft, private consumption and fixed investment contributed significantly to overall growth. The Real GVA is estimated at ₹294.91 lakh crore in the year 2025-26, against ₹273.36 lakh crore in FY 2024-25, registering a growth rate of 7.9% as compared to 7.3% growth rate in 2024-25.

However, the global economy is facing many threats and challenges. According to the Economic Survey 2026, there has been a shift from rules-based globalisation to geopolitical fragmentation, marked by strategic trade, supply-chain weaponisation, volatile capital flows and rising resource nationalism, making access to critical minerals, energy, technology and finance increasingly uncertain.

The outbreak of the conflict in West Asia has led to severe disruption of global supply chains. This poses an unprecedented challenge for the global economy due to expectation of higher prices and lower global growth. In an intricately linked globalised world, Indian economy may also have to bear the burnt and the Reserve Bank of India (RBI) may have tough time trying to balance the twin objectives of the monetary policy, i.e., the need to keep inflation under control while at the same time, minimising the impact of the incidental tightening measures on growth. The hardening of the sovereign bond yields due to inflation fears and recent corrections in equity valuations have also indicated deepening of the turmoil in global financial markets. Besides, strengthening of the US dollar has exerted pressure on currencies of the major economies. Further, intensification of the conflict, its prolongation and widening geographical spread remain the key downside risks to the global outlook.

Yet, the Reserve Bank of India, in its monetary policy statement has observed that sustained momentum in services sector, persisting impact of GST rationalisation, rising capacity utilisation in manufacturing, and healthy balance sheets of financial institutions and corporates may continue to support domestic demand and the real GDP may grow at 6.9 per cent in the current financial year 2026-27 even as further escalation of the conflict, its continuation over a wider geographical spread and uncertainty regarding the damage to the energy infrastructure pose downside risks to the domestic growth outlook. However, Indian economy may continue to be resilient as the CPI inflation for the financial year 2025-26 is projected to be at 4.6 per cent which is well within the comfort zone from the monetary policy perspective.

An update to the World Economic Outlook (April 2026) released by the International Monetary Fund (IMF), has revised India's growth rate for the year 2025 to 7.6 percent which is higher by 1.0 percentage point relative to its October 2025 projections, indicating improved outlook for the economy. For the year 2026, the growth rate has been revised upward moderately by 0.3 percentage point to 6.5 percent, led by positive contributions from the carryover of the strong 2025 outturn and the decline in additional US tariffs on Indian goods from 50 to 10 percent, which outweigh the adverse impact of the Middle East conflict. The Company anticipates a favourable economic environment in the current financial year.

4. SHARE CAPITAL

During the year under review, there was no change in the authorised and paid-up share capital of the Company. The Company has not issued shares with differential voting rights nor granted stock options nor sweat equity.

5. DIVIDEND

Your Directors do not recommend any dividend for the financial year 2025-26.

6. TRANSFER TO RESERVES

The Company has transferred profit of Rs. 63.66 lakhs to the Profit & Loss Account under Reserves & Surplus.

7. DEPOSITS

Your Company has not accepted any deposits within the meaning of Section 73 of the Companies Act, 2013 and the Companies (Acceptance of Deposits) Rules, 2014.

8. MAINTENANCE OF COST RECORDS

The Maintenance of Cost Records pursuant to Section 148(1) of the Companies Act, 2013 is not required by the Company and accordingly such accounts and records are not made and maintained by the Company.

Annexure III MANAGEMENT DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS REPORT

Libord Finance Limited is a limited company domiciled and incorporated in India and its shares are publicly traded on the Bombay Stock Exchange Ltd. (BSE). The Company is presently classified as a Non-Banking Financial Company duly registered with the Reserve Bank of India. The Company is engaged into the business of financial services, working capital loans, project finance, syndication of loans, corporate advisory services, financial consultancy etc.

This Report contains forward-looking statements which are based on certain assumptions, risks, uncertainties and expectations of future events. The actual results, performance or achievements can differ materially from those projected in any such statements depending on various factors including: the demand supply conditions, change in government regulations, tax regimes, economic development within the country and abroad and such other incidental factors over which, the Company does not have any direct control. The Company assumes no responsibility to publicly amend, modify or revise any forward-looking statements, on basis of any subsequent developments, information or events.

This Management Discussion and Analysis Report is framed in compliance with the Securities and Exchange Board of India (Listing Obligations and Disclosure Requirements) Regulations, 2015 ("LODR Regulations").

INDUSTRY STRUCTURE AND DEVELOPMENTS

Non-Banking Financial Companies play a vital role in the financial sector of our economy along with other financial institutions. They largely extend support to the micro, small and medium enterprises (MSMEs) which get benefitted due to their strategic operational techniques coupled with lower costs of delivery, lower restrictions on customers etc. Over the years, NBFCs have emerged as an alternate choice and at times the first choice for several customers, who need short term/ medium term financing. The NBFCs work under strict regulations of the RBI and reach out to even those sectors which the Banks cannot reach.

Non-banking finance companies (NBFCs) are an integral part of the Indian financial ecosystem. NBFCs reach out to millions of individuals and Micro, Small and Medium Enterprises across the country having no or limited access to secured and unsecured credit lines by commercial banks and other development financial institutions. NBFCs integrate such people and firms with the financial mainstream of our economy. NBFCs are able to develop a ground-level understanding of their customers' profile and their credit needs and provide innovative and customised products to satisfy their clients' needs and so they are a preferred source of credit line compared to traditional banks. They have a niche particularly in the low income/asset segment of individuals and corporates and also among the first time seekers of credit who have not borrowed from any financial institution in the past. NBFCs thrive well in those areas too where banking and institutional credit financial services have limited ground presence.

OPPORTUNITIES

According to the Economic Survey 2026, While the year-on-year growth trend in credit for industry and services has demonstrated a moderate increase in financial year 2025-26 compared to the previous year, yet the bank credit to the MSME sector has continued to show momentum and remains robust. In November 2025, bank credit to this sector increased by 21.8 per cent compared to a 13 per cent increase in November 2024. Within the MSME sector, the credit extended to the micro and small enterprises has registered an increase of 24.6 per cent (YoY) in November 2025, up from 10.2 per cent in November 2024. The expansion has been driven by sustained retail demand, MSME lending, renewed credit flows to NBFCs and a gradual pickup in corporate borrowing.

The financial year 2025-26 ended with robust year-on-year (y-o-y) non-food credit growth of 15.9%, compared to 10.9% in the corresponding period in 2025. The aggregate credit outstanding in March 2026 reached Rs.212.9 lakh crore, Rs.29.2 lakh crore higher than the previous year.

Amidst a low-interest rate environment, Government aided Capex cycle supported by timely structural reforms, private investments are crowding-in and boosting domestic credit demand, indicative of growing confidence among corporate as well as individual borrowers on Indian economy.

Credit growth in FY 2025-26 has been broad-based led by services sector, followed by personal loan segment, agriculture and allied activities, and industry. The Services sector credit, that contributes 28% to the overall credit, recorded a robust expansion of 19.0% y-o-y. The surge was primarily driven by high demand from segments like Non-Banking Financial Companies, trade, and commercial real estate. The personal loan segment with 33% share in overall credit, expanded by 16.2% in FY 2025-26, which is 455 bps higher than credit growth (11.7%) registered a year ago. Growth remained steady in the housing segment, while vehicle loans and loans against gold jewellery continued to show strong momentum.

Credit growth in Agriculture and Allied Activities sector accelerated to 15.7% in the year 2025-26 compared to 10.4% growth registered previous year, reflecting sustained rural demand and formalization of rural credit. Credit deployment to the industrial sector expanded at almost double rate to 15.0%, vis-à-vis 8.2% growth registered last year driven largely by Infrastructure, Basic Metal and Metal Products, Chemicals and Chemical Products, Petroleum, Coal Products, and Nuclear Fuels sectors. Micro and Small industries registered a 33.1% y-o-y growth in the year 2025-26 which was 3.7 times higher than previous year. Similar positive trends are witnessed for medium-scale industries where credit expanded by 21.7% y-o-y.

Robust credit growth demonstrates the resilient domestic economic environment and envisages enhanced appetite for credit across sectors of the Indian economy. Strong credit growth results in corporates and individuals availing credit facilities for business expansion and acquiring durable goods, further accelerating industrial activity by additional capacity building through investment in fixed assets, generating more employment opportunities.

The Reserve Bank of India's Financial Inclusion Index (FI-Index) for the year ending March 2025 stands at 67.0, up from 64.2 in March 2024 reflecting increased access and usage of financial services.

Public Sector Banks (PSBs) continued to register strong financial performance during FY 2025–26, reflecting sustained business growth, improved asset quality, record profitability and strong capital position. The improved performance demonstrates the resilience, stability and enhanced institutional capacity of PSBs in supporting the credit needs of a fast-growing Indian economy. Asset quality of PSBs improved significantly during FY 2025–26, with Gross NPA ratio (Non-Performing Assets) declining to 1.93% and Net NPA ratio to 0.39% as on 31.03.2026, reflecting historically low levels of stressed assets.

The aggregate business of PSBs increased to Rs.283.3 lakh crore as on 31.03.2026, registering growth of 12.8% over the previous year. Aggregate deposits rose by 10.6% y-o-y to Rs.156.3 lakh crore, reflecting continued depositor confidence and strong resource mobilisation by PSBs. Gross advances registered growth of 15.7% y-o-y and reached Rs.127 lakh crore, indicating sustained credit demand across sectors of the economy.

Improved asset quality, healthy credit expansion and higher income contributed to improved profitability of PSBs during FY 2025–26. Aggregate operating profit reached ₹3.21 lakh crore, while aggregate net profit increased by 11.1% y-o-y to a historic high of ₹1.98 lakh crore, marking the fourth consecutive year of aggregate profitability for PSBs.

Against the challenging global backdrop surrounded by geo-economic fragmentation and geo-political pressures, the Indian economy has shown remarkable resilience and has been one of the fastest growing major economies in the world. Indian banking sector, the primary engine of economic growth is at best of its health with a well-capitalized balance sheet, historically low impaired assets and sustained profitability, augments the growth potentials of the economy. The persistent government effort in democratising and formalising credit has been resulting in broad based credit growth in the economy.

As per the Provisional Estimates (PE) of Gross Domestic Product (GDP) released by the National Statistical Office (NSO), the real GDP (at constant 2022-23 prices) is estimated to attain a level of ₹323.12 lakh crore during FY 2025-26 as compared to the First Revised Estimates of ₹299.89 lakh crore in FY 2024-25, registering a robust growth of 7.7%. Nominal GDP (at current prices) is estimated at ₹346.36 lakh crore against ₹318.07 lakh crore in the previous year, reflecting a growth of 8.9%.

Despite the global turmoil, thus, the Indian economy remained resilient in the year 2025-26. Even as the net external demand remained soft, private consumption and fixed investment contributed significantly to overall growth. On the supply side, estimated real GVA growth of 7.9 per cent was driven by buoyant services sector and robust manufacturing activity.

The Reserve Bank of India, in its monetary policy statement has observed that sustained momentum in services sector, persisting impact of GST rationalisation, rising capacity utilisation in manufacturing, and healthy balance sheets of financial institutions and corporates may continue to support domestic demand and the real GDP grow at 6.9 per cent in the current financial year 2026-27 even as further escalation of the conflict, its continuation over a wider geographical spread and uncertainty regarding the damage to the energy infrastructure pose downside risks to the domestic growth outlook. However, Indian economy may continue to be resilient as the CPI inflation for the financial year 2025-26 is projected to be at 4.6 per cent which is well within the comfort zone from the monetary policy perspective.

An update to the World Economic Outlook (April 2026) released by the International Monetary Fund (IMF), has revised India's growth for the year 2025 to 7.6 percent which is higher by 1.0 percentage point relative to its previous WEO (October, 2025). For the year 2026, the growth rate has been revised upward moderately by 0.3 percentage point to 6.5 percent, led by positive contributions from the carryover of the strong 2025 outturn and the decline in additional US tariffs on Indian goods from 50 to 10 percent, which outweigh the adverse impact of the Middle East conflict.

THREATS

In a world already weakened by rising rivalries, unstable supply chains and prolonged conflicts at risk of regional spill over the global economy is confronting systemic, deliberate and far-reaching global consequences, making the economic environment uncertain and fragile. According to the Global Risks Report, 2026 published by the World Economic Forum, the centrality of Geo-economic confrontation in the global risks landscape is the top risk featured and it is likely to be so over the two-year time horizon till the year 2028.

As global risks continue to spiral in scale, interconnectivity and velocity, the current year 2026 marks an age of competition. As cooperative mechanisms crumble, with governments retreating from multilateral frameworks, stability appears to be under siege. A contested multipolar landscape is emerging where confrontation is replacing collaboration, and trust, which is fundamental to any degree of cooperation, seems to be losing its value. The multilateral system is under pressure. Declining trust, diminishing transparency and respect for the rule of law, along with heightened protectionism, are threatening longstanding international relations, trade and investment and increasing the propensity for conflict.

Thus, the global economy is facing many threats and challenges. According to the Economic Survey 2026, there has been a shift from rules-based globalisation to geopolitical fragmentation, marked by strategic trade, supply-chain weaponisation, volatile capital flows, and rising resource nationalism, making access to critical minerals, energy, technology, and finance increasingly uncertain. The outbreak of the conflict in West Asia has led to severe disruption of global supply chains. This poses an unprecedented challenge for the global economy due to expectation of higher prices and lower global growth. Given such a scenario in the global economy, the Reserve Bank of India (RBI) may have tough time trying to balance the twin objectives of the monetary policy, i.e., the need to keep inflation under control while at the same time, minimising the impact of the incidental tightening measures on growth.

The hardening of the sovereign bond yields due to inflation fears and recent corrections in equity valuations have also indicated deepening of the turmoil in global financial markets. Besides, strengthening of the US dollar has exerted pressure on currencies of major economies. Further intensification of the conflict, its prolongation and widening geographical spread remain the key downside risks to the global outlook. Further escalation of the conflict, its continuation over a wider geographical spread and uncertainty regarding the damage to the energy infrastructure pose severe risks to the domestic growth outlook as well.

SEGMENT-WISE OR PRODUCT-WISE PERFORMANCE

The Company operates in single business segment i.e. NBFC. As the Company is only in one line of business, product wise disclosure of performance is not required to be made.

OUTLOOK

The Management of the Company is looking for a steady growth of the Company and aims at maximising the shareholders' wealth by way of earning maximum profits at low investment costs. The Company is cautiously optimistic in its outlook for the year 2026-27. The outlook for the business of the Company is also discussed in the Directors' Report.

RISKS AND CONCERNS

The Company is providing financial, corporate and management consultancy and undertakes wide spectrum of activities and therefore has a well-diversified portfolio of services provided. Currently there are no risks faced by the Company.

INTERNAL CONTROL SYSTEMS AND THEIR ADEQUACY

The Company has an Internal Control System commensurate with the size and nature of its operations. During the year, controls were tested and no material weakness in design and operation were observed. These have been designed to ensure the orderly and efficient conduct of its business, including adherence to the Company's policies, the safeguarding of its assets from unauthorised use, the prevention and detection of frauds and errors, ensuring accuracy and completeness of the accounting records, timely preparation of financial information and compliance with applicable statutes.

Inherent Limitations of Internal Financial Controls Over Financial Reporting

Because of the inherent limitations of internal financial controls over financial reporting, including the possibility of collusion or improper management override of controls, material misstatements due to error or fraud may occur and not be detected. Also, projections of any evaluation of the internal financial controls over financial reporting to future periods are subject to the risk that the internal financial control over financial reporting may become inadequate because of changes in conditions, or that the degree of compliance with the policies or procedures may deteriorate.

NOTES FORMING PART OF THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

1 Corporate Information

Libord Finance Limited ("the Company") is a limited company domiciled and incorporated in India and its shares are publicly traded on the Bombay Stock Exchange (BSE) in India since 1994. The registered office of the Company is situated at 104, M.K. Bhawan, 300, Shahid Bhagat Singh Road, Fort, Mumbai- 400001.

The Company is presently classified as Non-Deposit taking Non-Systemically Important NBFC duly registered with Reserve Bank of India. The Company is engaged in the business of Financial Services, Working Capital Loans, Project Finance, Syndication of Loans, Corporate Advisory Services, Financial Consultancy etc.

The Standalone Financial Statements for the year ended March 31, 2026 were authorised for issuance in accordance with resolution of the Board of Directors in their meeting held on May 22, 2026.

2 Basis of Preparation and Presentation

2.1 Basis of Preparation

The financial statements of the Company have been prepared in accordance with Indian Accounting Standards (Ind AS) notified under the Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Rules, 2015 (as amended from time to time) as applicable read with Section 133 of the Companies Act, 2013 (the "Act") and guidelines issued by the Reserve Bank of India.

The Balance Sheet, the Statement of Profit and Loss and the Statement of Changes in Equity are prepared and presented in the format prescribed in Division III of Schedule III to the Act. The Statement of Cash Flows has been prepared and presented as per the requirements of Ind AS 7 "Statement of Cash Flows".

Amounts in the financial statements are presented in Indian Rupees in hundreds rounded off to two decimal places as permitted by Schedule III to the Act which is the Company's functional and presentation currency. Per share data are presented in Indian Rupee rounded off to two decimal places.

2.2 Basis of Measurement

The financial statements have been prepared on going concern basis and on an accrual method of accounting using historical cost convention except for certain financial assets and liabilities which are measured at fair value at the end of each reporting period as explained in accounting policies below.

2.3 Significant Accounting Judgements, Estimates and Assumptions

The preparation of the financial statements in conformity with Ind AS requires the Management to make estimates and assumptions considered in the reported amounts of assets and liabilities (including contingent liabilities) and the reported income and expenses during the year.

Accounting estimates could change from period to period. The estimates and judgements used are continuously evaluated by the Company and are based on historical experience and various other assumptions and factors (including expectations of future events) that the Company believes to be reasonable under the existing circumstances. Revision to accounting estimates are recognised prospectively. The management believes that the estimates used in the preparation of financial statements are prudent and reasonable.

Key sources of estimation of uncertainty at the date of the financial statements which may cause a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities within the next financial year is in respect of fair valuation of unquoted equity investments, impairment of financial instruments, impairment of property, plant & equipment, useful lives of property, plant & equipment, provisions and contingent liabilities.

2.4 Significant Accounting Policies

1. Property, Plant and Equipment

Property, plant and equipment are carried at cost less accumulated depreciation and accumulated impairment losses, if any. Cost includes purchase price and any cost directly attributable to bringing the asset to its working condition for its intended use. Depreciation on the property, plant and equipment is provided using straight line method over the useful life of assets as specified in Schedule II to the Companies Act, 2013. Depreciation on property, plant and equipment which are added / disposed of during the year, is provided on pro-rata basis with reference to the date of addition / deletion. The assets' residual values, useful lives and method of depreciation are reviewed at each financial year end and are adjusted prospectively, if appropriate.

The estimated useful lives of Property, Plant and Equipment are as stated below:

An item of property, plant and equipment is derecognised upon disposal or when no future economic benefits are expected to arise from the continued use of the asset. Any gain or loss arising on the disposal or retirement of an item of property, plant and equipment is determined as the difference between the sales proceeds and the carrying amount of the asset and is recognised in profit or loss.

2. Intangible Assets

Intangible assets are stated at acquisition cost, net of accumulated amortisation and accumulated impairment losses, if any. The estimated useful lives of Intangible Assets are as stated below:

Intangible Assets	Useful Life
Computer Software	3 years

Gains or losses arising from the retirement or disposal of an intangible asset are determined as the difference between the disposal proceeds and the carrying amount of the asset and are recognised as income or expense in the Statement of Profit and Loss.

An intangible asset is derecognised on disposal, or when no future economic benefits are expected from use or disposal. Gains or losses arising from de-recognition of an intangible asset, measured as the difference between the net disposal proceeds and the carrying amount of the asset, are recognised in the Statement of Profit and Loss when the asset is derecognised.

3. Impairment of Non – Financial Assets

The Company assesses at each Balance Sheet date whether there is any indication that an asset may be impaired. For the purposes of assessing impairment, the smallest identifiable group of assets that generates cash inflows from continuing use that are largely independent of the cash inflows from other assets or groups of assets, is considered as a cash generating unit. If any such indication exists, the Company estimates the recoverable amount of the asset. If such recoverable amount of the asset or the recoverable amount of the cash generating unit to which the asset belongs is less than its carrying amount, the carrying amount is reduced to its recoverable amount. The reduction is treated as an impairment loss and is recognised in the Statement of Profit and Loss. If at the Balance Sheet date there is an indication that previously assessed impairment loss no longer exists or may have decreased, the recoverable amount is reassessed and the asset is reflected at the recoverable amount.

4. Financial Instruments Classification

A Financial instrument is any contract that gives rise to a financial asset of one entity and financial liability or equity instruments of another entity.

Financial assets, other than equity, are classified into, financial assets at Fair Value through Other Comprehensive Income (FVOCI) or Fair Value through Profit and Loss Account (FVTPL) or at amortised cost. Financial assets that are equity instruments are classified as FVTPL or FVOCI. Financial liabilities are classified as amortised cost category and FVTPL.

Business Model Test / Assessment

An assessment of business model for managing financial assets is fundamental to the classification of a financial asset. The Company determines the business model at a level that reflects how financial assets are managed together to achieve a particular business objective.

The Company's business model does not depend on management's intentions for an individual instrument; therefore, the business model assessment is performed at a higher level of aggregation rather than on an instrument-by-instrument basis.

The Company considers all relevant information and evidence available when making the business model assessment such as the distribution of the financial assets held within the business model is evaluated in relation to the risks associated to its performance and its management. The performance of the financial assets held within that business model are evaluated and reported to the Company's key management personnel.

At initial recognition of a financial asset, the Company determines whether newly recognised financial assets are part of an existing business model or whether they reflect a new business model. The Company reassesses its business model at each reporting period to determine whether the business model has changed since the preceding period.

Initial Recognition

Financial Assets and Financial Liabilities are recognised when the Company becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instruments. Financial Assets and Financial Liabilities are initially measured at fair value. Transaction costs that are directly attributable to the acquisition or issue of financial assets and financial liabilities (other than financial assets and financial liabilities at fair value through profit or loss) are added to or deducted from the fair value of the financial assets or financial liabilities, as appropriate, on initial recognition. Transaction costs directly attributable to the acquisition of financial assets or financial liabilities at fair value through profit or loss are recognised immediately in profit or loss.

Subsequent Measurement**Financial Assets at Amortised Cost**

Financial assets having contractual terms that give rise on specified dates to cash flows that are solely payments of principal and interest on the principal outstanding and that are held within a business model whose objective is to hold such assets in order to collect such contractual cash flows are classified in this category. Subsequently these are measured at amortised cost using effective interest method less any impairment losses.

Fair Value through Profit and Loss Account

Financial assets are measured at FVTPL unless it is measured at amortised cost or at FVOCI on initial recognition. The transaction costs directly attributable to the acquisition of financial assets at fair value through profit or loss are immediately recognised in profit or loss.

Fair Value through Other Comprehensive Income (FVOCI)

These include financial assets that are equity instruments as defined in Ind AS 32 "Financial Instruments: Presentation" and are not held for trading and where they are irrevocably designated as equity instruments at FVOCI upon initial recognition. Subsequently, these are measured at fair value and changes therein are recognised directly in other comprehensive income (OCI), net of applicable income taxes.

Gains and losses on these equity instruments are never recycled to profit or loss.

Dividends from these equity investments are recognised in the Statement of Profit and Loss when the right to receive the payment has been established.

Investments in Group Companies

Investments in group companies are carried at cost less accumulated impairment losses, if any, as per Ind AS 27. Where an indication of impairment exists, the carrying amount of the investment is assessed and written down immediately to its recoverable amount. On disposal of investments in group companies, the difference between net disposal proceeds and the carrying amounts are recognised in the Statement of Profit and Loss.

Debt Instruments at FVOCI

Debt instruments that are measured at FVOCI have contractual terms that give rise on specified dates to cash flows that are solely payments of principal and interest on principal outstanding and that are held within a business model whose objective is achieved by both collecting contractual cash flows and selling financial assets. These instruments largely comprise long-term investments made by the Company. FVOCI debt instruments are subsequently measured at fair value with gains and losses arising due to changes in fair value recognised in OCI. Interest income and gains and losses are recognised in profit or loss in the same manner as for financial assets measured at amortised cost. On derecognition, cumulative gains or losses previously recognised in OCI are reclassified from OCI to profit or loss.

NOTES FORMING PART OF THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Financial Liabilities and Equity Instruments

Financial liabilities and equity instruments issued by the Company are classified according to the substance of the contractual arrangements entered into and the definitions of a financial liability and an equity instrument.

Equity Instruments

An equity instrument is any contract that evidences a residual interest in the assets of the Company after deducting all of its liabilities. Equity instruments are recorded at the proceeds received, net of direct issue costs.

Other Financial Liabilities

These are measured at amortised cost using effective interest rate.

Derecognition of Financial Assets and Financial Liabilities

The Company derecognises a financial asset only when the contractual rights to the cash flows from the asset expires or it transfers the financial asset and substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership of the asset to another entity.

A financial liability is derecognised when the obligation under the liability is discharged, cancelled or it expires.

Impairment of Financial Assets

The Company recognises a loss allowance for expected credit losses on a financial asset that is at amortised cost or fair value through OCI. Loss allowance in respect of financial assets is measured based on historical trend, industry practices and the business environment in which the entity operates or any other appropriate basis. The impairment methodology applied depends on whether there has been a significant increase in credit risk.

Reclassification of Financial Assets

The Company does not re-classify its financial assets subsequent to their initial recognition, apart from the exceptional circumstances when the Company changes its business model for managing such financial assets. The Company does not re-classify its financial liabilities.

5. Determination of Fair Value

The Company maintains procedures to value financial assets or financial liabilities using the best and most relevant data available. The fair values of the financial assets and liabilities are included at the amount that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date.

The following methods and assumptions were used to estimate the fair values:

- i) Fair value of trade receivable, cash and cash equivalents, other bank balances, trade payables, loans, borrowings, deposits and other financial assets and liabilities are approximate at their carrying amounts largely due to the short-term maturities of these instruments.
- ii) The Company uses valuation techniques that are appropriate in the circumstances and for which sufficient data are available to measure fair value, maximising the use of relevant observable inputs and minimising the use of unobservable inputs.
- iii) Fair values of quoted financial instruments are derived from quoted market prices in active markets.

6. Fair Value Hierarchy

All assets and liabilities for which fair value is measured or disclosed in the financial statements are categorised within the fair value hierarchy, described as follows, based on the lowest level input that is significant to the fair value measurement as a whole:

- Level 1: Quoted market prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities.
- Level 2: Valuation techniques for which the lowest level input that is significant to the fair value measurement is directly or indirectly observable.
- Level 3: Valuation techniques for which the lowest level input that is significant to the fair value measurement is unobservable.

For assets and liabilities that are recognised in the financial statements on a recurring basis, the Company determines whether transfers have occurred between levels in the hierarchy by re-assessing categorisation (based on the lowest level input that is significant to the fair value measurement as a whole) at the end of each reporting period.

7. Employee Benefits

Defined Benefit Plans: The present value of the obligation under such plan is determined based on an actuarial valuation using the Projected Unit Credit Method. Actuarial gains and losses arising on such valuation are recognised immediately in the other comprehensive income. In case of funded defined benefit plans, the fair value of the plan assets is reduced from the gross obligation under the defined benefit plans, to recognise the obligation on net basis.

8. Provisions and Contingent Liabilities

Provisions are recognised when there is a present obligation (legal or constructive) as a result of a past event, it is probable that an outflow of resources embodying economic benefits will be required to settle the obligation and there is a reliable estimate of the amount of the obligation. When a provision is measured using the cash flows estimated to settle the present obligation, its carrying amount is the present value of those cash flows (when the effect of the time value of money is material). The discount rate used to determine the present value is a pre-tax rate that reflects current market assessments of the time value of money and the risks specific to the liability. The increase in the provision due to the passage of time is recognised as interest expense.

Contingent liabilities are disclosed when there is a possible obligation arising from past events, the existence of which will be confirmed only by the occurrence or non-occurrence of one or more uncertain future events not wholly within the control of the Company or a present obligation that arises from past events where it is either not probable that an outflow of resources will be required to settle the obligation or a reliable estimate of the amount cannot be made.

9. Revenue Recognition

Interest Income

The Company normally gives working capital loans. The rate of interest for the borrower is decided by the Chief Operating Decision Maker on the basis of risk appetite and internal rating.

Investment Income

Dividend income from investments is recognised when the Company's right to receive payment has been established (provided that it is probable that the economic benefits will flow to the Company and the amount of dividend income can be measured reliably).

Income from interest on deposits and interest-bearing securities is recognised on the time proportionate method taking into account the amount outstanding and the rate applicable.

Income from derivatives / equity trading are accounted on accrual basis.

Consultancy Income

The Company raises bills on case-to-case basis. There is no contractual agreement for the respective parties. The bill is raised as and when services are rendered.

10. Exceptional Items

When items of income and expense within profit or loss from ordinary activities are of such size, nature or incidence that their disclosure is relevant to explain the performance of the enterprise for the period, the nature and amount of such items is disclosed separately as Exceptional items.

11. Leases

The Company evaluates if an arrangement qualifies to be a lease as per the requirements of Ind AS 116 with effective date of April 1, 2019. Identification of a lease requires significant judgment. The Company uses significant judgement in assessing the lease term (including anticipated renewals) and the applicable discount rate. The Company determines the lease term as the non-cancellable period of a lease, together with both periods covered by an option to extend the lease if the Company is reasonably certain to exercise that option; and periods covered by an option to terminate the lease if the Company is reasonably certain not to exercise that option. In assessing whether the Company is reasonably certain to exercise an option to extend a lease, or not to exercise an option to terminate a lease, it considers all relevant facts and circumstances that create an economic incentive for the Company to exercise the option to extend the lease, or not to exercise the option to terminate the lease. The Company revises the lease term if there is a change in the non-cancellable period of a lease. The discount rate is generally based on the incremental borrowing rate specific to the lease being evaluated or for portfolio of leases with similar characteristics.

12. Taxes on Income**Current Tax**

Current tax assets and liabilities for the current and prior years are measured at the amount expected to be recovered from, or paid to, the taxation authorities. The tax rates and tax laws used to compute the amount are those that are enacted, or substantively enacted, by the reporting date in the countries where the Company operates and generates taxable income.

Current tax assets and liabilities are offset only if, the Company:

- has a legally enforceable right to set off the recognised amounts; and
- intends either to settle on a net basis, or to realise the asset and settle the liability simultaneously.

Current income tax relating to items recognised outside profit or loss is recognised outside profit or loss (either in other comprehensive income or in equity). Current tax items are recognised in correlation to the underlying transaction either in OCI or directly in equity. Management periodically evaluates positions taken in the tax returns with respect to situations in which applicable tax regulations are subject to interpretation and establishes provisions where appropriate.

Deferred Tax

Deferred tax is recognised for the future tax consequences of deductible temporary differences between the carrying values of assets and liabilities and their respective tax bases at the reporting date, using the tax rates and laws that are enacted or substantively enacted as on the reporting date.

Deferred tax assets are recognised to the extent that it is probable that future taxable income will be available against which the deductible temporary differences, unused tax losses and credits can be utilised.

Deferred tax assets and liabilities are offset only if:

- Entity has a legally enforceable right to set off current tax assets against current tax liabilities; and
- Deferred tax assets and the deferred tax liabilities relate to the income taxes levied by the same taxation authority.

Deferred tax relating to items recognised outside profit or loss is recognised outside profit or loss (either in other comprehensive income or in equity). Deferred tax items are recognised in correlation to the underlying transaction either in OCI or directly in equity.

13. Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalent in the Balance Sheet comprise cash at banks, cash on hand and short-term deposits with an original maturity of three months or less, which are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value. For the purpose of the Statement of Cash Flows, cash and cash equivalents consist of cash and short-term deposits, as defined above.

14. Segment Reporting

The Company engaged primarily in the business of financial services and accordingly there are no separate reportable segments dealing with Segment Reporting. The Company's business is not subject to seasonal variation.

15. Earnings Per Share

Basic earnings per share are calculated by dividing the net profit or loss for the period attributable to equity shareholders (after deducting attributable taxes) by the weighted average number of equity shares outstanding during the period.

For the purpose of calculating diluted earnings per share, the net profit or loss for the period attributable to equity shareholders and the weighted average number of shares outstanding during the period are adjusted for the effects of all dilutive potential equity shares.
