2. To appoint a Director in place of Mr. Sumer Gehani (DIN No.: 10842049), who retires by rotation and being eligible, offers himself for re-appointment.

3. **Re-appointment of Mr. Ajay Gehani as Chairman and Managing Director of the Company.**

General Instructions for accessing and participating in the 52nd Annual General Meeting (AGM) through VC / OAVM Facility and Voting through Electronic means including Remote E- Voting.

1. The Explanatory Statement pursuant to Section 102 of the Companies Act, 2013 in respect of item # 3 and 4 of the Notice is annexed.
2. Pursuant to the General Circulars 14/2020 dated 8th April, 2020, 17/2020 dated 13th April, 2020, 20/2020 dated 5th May, 2020 read with 3/2025 dated 22nd September, 2025, issued by the Ministry of Corporate Affairs (referred to as 'MCA Circulars') companies are allowed to hold AGM through VC, without the physical presence of members at a common venue. Hence, in compliance with the said circulars, the AGM of the Company is being held through VC.
3. **ONLY A MEMBER IS ENTITLED TO ATTEND AND VOTE AT THE AGM THROUGH VC / OAVM.** In terms of provisions of Section 105 of the Companies Act, 2013, a Member entitled to attend and vote at the meeting is entitled to appoint a proxy to attend and vote instead of himself / herself and such proxy need not be a Member of the Company. Since this AGM is being held pursuant to the MCA Circulars through VC / OAVM, physical attendance of Members has been dispensed with. Accordingly, the facility for appointment of proxies by the Members will not be available for the AGM and hence the Proxy Form and Attendance Slip are not annexed to this Notice. However, in pursuance of Section 112 and Section 113 of the Companies Act, 2013, representatives of the members such as the President of India or the Governor of a State or body corporate can attend the AGM/EGM through VC/OAVM and cast their votes through e-voting.
4. The Company has appointed M/s. Central Depository Services (India) Limited (CDSL) to provide video conferencing facility for the AGM and the attendant enablers for conducting of the AGM. The proceedings of the AGM will be web-casted live for all the members who hold shares as on cut-off date i.e. Thursday, 13th August, 2026. The members can visit <https://www.evotingindia.com> and login through user id and password to watch the live proceedings of the AGM on Thursday, 20th August, 2026 from



11.00 a.m. onwards. Further, the Company has also appointed CDSL as an authorized e-voting agency for facilitating members to vote on all the resolutions proposed in the Notice of AGM through electronic means. Members will have the option to cast their votes either 3 days prior to the date of AGM (Remote E-Voting) or during the AGM (E-Voting). The instructions to vote by remote e-voting and e-voting has been provided below.

5. The members can join the AGM 15 minutes before and after the scheduled time of the commencement of the AGM by following the procedure mentioned in this Notice. The facility to join the AGM will be made available for 1,000 members on first come first serve basis. This will not include Large Shareholders (holding 2% or more shareholding), Promoters, Institutional Investors, Directors, Key Managerial Personnel, the Chairpersons of the Audit Committee, Nomination and Remuneration Committee and Stakeholders' Relationship Committee, Auditors etc. who are allowed to attend the AGM without any restriction on account of first come first serve basis.
6. In case of joint holders attending the Meeting, only such joint holder who is higher in the order of names will be entitled to vote at the AGM.

The scanned copies of Register of Directors' and Key Managerial Personnel and their Shareholding maintained under Section 170 and Register of Contracts or Arrangements in which Directors are interested under Section 189 of the Companies Act, 2013 will be available electronically for inspection by the members during the AGM.

11. INSTRUCTIONS TO SHAREHOLDERS FOR REMOTE E-VOTING AND E-VOTING DURING AGM/EGM AND JOINING MEETING THROUGH VC/OAVM ARE AS UNDER:

Step 1 : Access through Depositories CDSL/NSDL e-Voting system in case of individual shareholders holding shares in demat mode.

Step 2 : Access through CDSL e-Voting system in case of shareholders holding shares in physical mode and non-individual shareholders in demat mode.

- i) The voting period begins on Monday, 17th August, 2026 and ends on Wednesday, 19th August, 2026. During this period shareholders' of the Company, holding shares either in physical form or in dematerialized form, as on the cut-off date (record date) of Thursday, 13th August, 2026 may cast their vote electronically. The e-voting module shall be disabled by CDSL for voting thereafter.
- ii) Shareholders who have already voted prior to the meeting date would not be entitled to vote at the meeting venue.
- iii) Pursuant to SEBI Circular No. **SEBI/HO/CFD/CMD/CIR/P/2020/242 dated 9th December, 2020**, under Regulation 44 of Securities and Exchange Board of India (Listing Obligations and Disclosure Requirements) Regulations, 2015, listed entities are required to provide remote e-voting facility to its shareholders, in respect of all shareholders' resolutions. However, it has been observed that the participation by the public non-institutional shareholders/retail shareholders is at a negligible level.

Currently, there are multiple e-voting service providers (ESPs) providing e-voting facility to listed entities in India. This necessitates registration on various ESPs and maintenance of multiple user IDs and passwords by the shareholders.

In order to increase the efficiency of the voting process, pursuant to a public consultation, it has been decided to enable e-voting to **all the demat account holders, by way of a single login credential, through their demat accounts/ websites of Depositories/ Depository Participants**. Demat account holders would be able to cast their vote without having to register again with the ESPs, thereby, not only facilitating seamless authentication but also enhancing ease and convenience of participating in e-voting process.

Step 1 : Access through Depositories CDSL/NSDL e-Voting system in case of individual shareholders holding shares in demat mode.

- iv) In terms of **SEBI circular no. SEBI/HO/CFD/CMD/CIR/P/2020/242 dated 9th December, 2020** on e-Voting facility provided by Listed Companies, Individual shareholders holding securities in demat mode are allowed to vote through their demat account maintained



with Depositories and Depository Participants. Shareholders are advised to update their mobile number and email address in their demat accounts in order to access e-Voting facility.

Pursuant to aforesaid SEBI Circular, Login method for e-Voting and joining virtual meetings, both, applicable **for Individual shareholders holding securities in Demat mode** is given below:

TO THE MEMBERS OF

SOVEREIGN DIAMONDS LIMITED

The Directors take pleasure in presenting the Fifty Second Annual Report together with the Audited Annual Financial Statements for the financial year ended 31st March, 2026. The Management Discussion and Analysis has also been incorporated into this report.

1. FINANCIAL RESULTS:

Key highlights of financial results for Sovereign Diamonds Limited for the financial year 2025 – 26 are tabulated below:

2. HIGHLIGHTS OF PERFORMANCE:

- Total turnover for the financial year 2025 – 26 was Rs. 1,408.27 Lakhs as compared to Rs. 1,997.21 Lakhs earned in the previous financial year 2024 – 25 i.e. decrease by 29.50%.
- Loss incurred in the financial year 2025 – 26 was Rs. (467.12) Lakhs as compared to profit of Rs. 1.26 Lakhs earned in the previous financial year 2024 – 25.
- The Company has reduced its bank borrowing from Rs. 886 Lakhs to **Nil** in 2025 – 26.

3. BUSINESS OPERATIONS:

- The jewellery manufacturing business model has been fundamentally disrupted by the sharp escalation in gold prices. Gold, which was priced at approximately ₹1.00 crore per kilogram in the prior year, rose to approximately ₹1.60 crore per kilogram



during FY 2025-26. As a result, the proportion of gold value component in an 18 K product has risen from 25-30% to approximately 60-65%, with no meaningful profitability on the gold component itself. This has severely compressed gross profit margins and rendered traditional manufacturing volumes economically unviable.

- ❖ Over the past two years, as business slowed, the Company faced sustained pressure from HDFC Bank to reduce its credit limits. Primary clients' receivables extended to 180-200 days, which caused HDFC Bank to exclude invoices outstanding beyond 90 days from the Company's Monthly Drawing Power calculations, significantly constraining working capital. The Company's statutory auditors similarly excluded overdue receivables from the balance sheet in FY 2024-25. New clients approached during this period demanded credit terms of four to six months, sought goods on consignment, and were unwilling to provide gold on an up-front basis. Under these conditions, the Company was left with no option but to reduce order volumes with its primary clients and place high-value orders on hold.
- ❖ The Company is actively realigning its business model towards products with lower raw material intensity and stronger margin profiles, including coloured and precious stones, lab-grown diamonds, lab-grown emeralds, lab-grown rubies and pearls, set in 14-carat or 9-carat gold, and in certain product lines, 4-carat or 5-carat gold. All new orders are being accepted on a cash-on-delivery or cash-in-advance basis to protect margins and eliminate credit risk. The business has been deliberately downscaled to a lean operating base as the management adopts a measured approach to the evolving global market environment. The future direction of the business is centered on reduced manpower dependency and lower-cost raw materials.
- ❖ The Company held legacy diamond inventory accumulated over many years, comprising odd sizes, odd shapes, broken stones and goods originally manufactured for Gulf and European markets, for which active demand no longer exists. The cutting and finishing standards of this inventory also pre-date the precision machine-cutting now prevalent in the trade. Having serviced finance costs on this inventory to its banking partners for many years, the management took a timely decision to liquidate this inventory through selective cash-on-delivery sales to established diamond trading offices with active overseas order flows. This decision proved prudent, as diamond prices have since declined further and a meaningful liquidity crisis has emerged across the diamond market amid ongoing global conflict and sanctions.
- ❖ The management took the above strategic decision to reduce the Company's credit facilities with HDFC Bank to zero, with the objective of eliminating finance costs entirely. The Company has successfully reduced its total bank borrowings from Rs. 8,86,01,985/- as on 31st March, 2025 to Nil as on 31st March, 2026. Additionally, comprehensive cost reduction measures have been implemented across all levels of operations, including reduction in employee headcount, salaries, general and administrative expenses, power costs, tools and consumables.
- ❖ The company is operating in a highly competitive industry segment which has been significantly disrupted due to geo-political effects, impact of lab-grown alternatives and high prices of gold amongst various other reasons. Further given the labour and overheads costs in city of Mumbai, the Company operates with a significant cost disadvantage. Given the above, in addition to other avenues to



improve the business performance, the Company also regularly evaluates various other strategies to improve its business outlook including diversification, non-core asset monetisation, strategic tie-ups amongst other initiatives.

There was no change in nature of business of your Company, during the year under review.

4. DIVIDEND:

Your Directors do not recommend any dividend for the year as the profits earned need to be ploughed back into the operations of your company and will be used for the requirements of your Company.

5. TRANSFER TO RESERVES:

The Board of Directors has not recommended to transfer any amount to reserves.

6. DISCLOSURES UNDER SECTION 134 (3) (I) OF THE COMPANIES ACT, 2013:

No material changes and commitments which could affect your Company's financial position have occurred between the end of the financial year of your Company i.e. 31st March, 2026 and date of this report i.e. 29th May, 2026.

7. SHARE CAPITAL:

The paid up equity share capital as on 31st March, 2026 was Rs. 578.80 lakhs. During the financial year under review, your Company has not issued shares with differential voting rights nor granted stock options nor sweat equity. There was no change in your Company's share capital during the year under review. The Promoter and Promoter Group are holding 37,62,744 equity shares equivalent to 65.01% of the total issued and paid-up share capital.

They shall hold the office of statutory auditors from the conclusion of 48th Annual General Meeting until the conclusion of the 53rd Annual General Meeting.

In view of the amendment to Section 139 of the Companies Act, 2013, the Company is not required to ratify the re-appointment of the Statutory Auditor at every Annual General Meeting. Hence, the item of ratification of re-appointment of Statutory Auditor is not considered in this Annual General Meeting. In view of the same, M/s J. D. Zatakia & Co., Chartered Accountants will continue to act as Statutory Auditors of the Company for the financial year 2026 – 27.

MANAGEMENT DISCUSSION & ANALYSIS REPORT

➤ **Industry Structure and Developments:**

❖ **India:**

India maintained its position as the fastest-growing major economy during FY 2025-26. According to the National Statistical Office (NSO), India's real GDP grew by an estimated 7.4% in FY 2025-26 (First Advance Estimate, January 2026), with the Second Advance Estimate revising this figure upward to 7.6%. While global growth hovered at approximately 3.3%, India's macroeconomic fundamentals remained resilient. However, the broader operating environment for the manufacturing sector was markedly challenging: persistent geopolitical tensions, a historic surge in gold commodity prices, elevated borrowing costs and a meaningful slowdown in consumer spending on discretionary items created severe headwinds for the gems and jewellery industry throughout the fiscal year.

❖ **Gold:**

India imports gold to meet the high demand from its jewellery industry and as a store of value. In FY 2025-26, gold import values remained elevated due to record-high international prices, even as volumes demanded by the jewellery manufacturing sector contracted sharply. The historic price surge rendered finished jewellery less affordable for end consumers and wholesale buyers alike, compressing fabrication margins for manufacturers and contributing to a significant reduction in order flows across the B2B supply chain.

According to the World Gold Council's Full Year 2025 Gold Demand Trends report, India's total gold demand in 2025 was 803.5 tonnes. However, this aggregate figure masks a stark divergence: jewellery demand in India declined by approximately 24% in volume terms compared to the prior year, the steepest volume contraction in recent memory, as record-high gold prices suppressed consumer and trade purchasing. International spot gold prices surpassed USD 3,000 per troy ounce during the fiscal year, with domestic prices on the Multi Commodity Exchange (MCX) reaching unprecedented highs. While investment demand in gold Exchange Traded Funds (ETFs) surged sharply, driven by safe-haven appetite and portfolio diversification, manufacturing activity bore the full brunt of the price shock. Jewellery demand constitutes approximately 70% of India's total gold demand, making the volume decline in this segment particularly damaging for manufacturers, fabricators and artisans across the value chain.

❖ **Domestic Jewellery Industry updates demand:**

Market Size:

The Indian gems and jewellery market is a vital contributor to the Indian economy, accounting for 6-7% of the country's GDP. India is recognised as a global hub for jewellery due to its cost-effective production and highly skilled workforce. As the 8th largest exporter, contributing approximately 3.2% of India's total exports, the industry, estimated at USD 100 billion in FY 2024 with a CAGR of 8.93%, holds significant strategic importance. However, FY 2025-26 proved to be a year of acute disruption for this structural growth story. A historic surge in gold prices severely curtailed demand volumes, gem and jewellery exports contracted, and manufacturers across the supply chain faced a pronounced squeeze between elevated input costs and weakening order books. The widely anticipated growth trajectory was materially interrupted, particularly for domestic manufacturing units that did not benefit from inventory appreciation in the manner that retailers did.



➤ **Outlook:**

The near-term outlook for Indian jewellery manufacturing remains challenging. The structural headwinds that defined FY 2025-26, historically elevated gold prices, suppressed volume demand, extended payment cycles, constrained export markets and acute working capital pressure, show limited signs of rapid reversal. Gold prices, having breached USD 4,000 per troy ounce internationally, are expected to remain elevated given continued geopolitical uncertainty and safe-haven demand, keeping consumer price sensitivity high. For manufacturers operating in the domestic B2B supply chain, recovery is contingent on a meaningful correction in input costs, a normalisation of trade credit cycles and an improvement in the broader export demand environment. The medium to long-term structural fundamentals of India's gems and jewellery sector, rooted in cultural affinity, rising incomes and a large wedding market, remain intact, but the path to recovery for manufacturing units is expected to be gradual and uneven.

Discussion on financial performance with respect to operational performance:

- Total turnover for the financial year 2025 – 26 was Rs. 1,408.27 Lakhs as compared to Rs. 1,997.21 Lakhs earned in the previous financial year 2024 – 25 i.e. decrease by 29.50%.
- Loss incurred in the financial year 2025 – 26 was Rs. (467.12) Lakhs as compared to profit of Rs. 1.26 Lakhs earned in the previous financial year 2024 – 25.
- The Company has reduced its bank borrowing from Rs. 886 Lakhs to Nil in 2025 – 26.

➤ **Opportunities and Threats & Risks and Concerns:**

❖ **Opportunities:**

India's macroeconomic resilience, with real GDP growth of 7.4% in FY 2025-26 (NSO), provides a foundational backdrop for medium-term recovery across domestic industries. Government initiatives focused on infrastructure development and manufacturing competitiveness continue to strengthen the broader productive economy. For the gems and jewellery sector, structural demand drivers remain: India's large and growing wedding market, deep cultural affinity for gold and diamond jewellery, and expanding urban consumer base represent enduring opportunities. Should gold prices moderate from their historic highs, demand volumes could recover meaningfully, given the pent-up demand across retail and wholesale channels. Rationalisation of import duties and targeted policy support for the manufacturing segment, particularly for small and mid-sized fabricators, could provide meaningful relief. Similarly, an improvement in the geopolitical environment and stabilisation of global demand could revive export momentum for Indian jewellery, which has historically benefited from its skilled craftsmanship and cost competitiveness. However, the realisation of these opportunities will require a normalisation of the operating conditions that were severely disrupted during FY 2025-26.

❖ **Threats & Risks and Concerns:**

FY 2025-26 was one of the most challenging years for Indian jewellery manufacturers in recent history. A confluence of macro-economic headwinds, escalating geopolitical tensions and structural supply chain dislocations created an exceptionally difficult operating environment. The ongoing Russia-Ukraine conflict continued to disrupt global commodity supply chains, while the escalation of the Israel-Iran conflict heightened risk aversion across international markets,



further dampening export demand. Rough diamond sourcing remained severely constrained, adding pressure on production costs. Jewellery exports contracted meaningfully as demand in key overseas markets remained subdued. Domestically, the dramatic rise in gold prices drove a sharp divergence between retailers and manufacturers: retailers benefited from inventory appreciation as existing gold stock rose in value, while manufacturers faced margin compression as the cost of raw material inputs surged without a commensurate increase in realisations from trade buyers. Across the domestic B2B supply chain, payment cycles that had historically operated at 90 or 180 days extended to 240 days or beyond, creating severe working capital strain and sharply increasing the cost of financing for manufacturing businesses. Elevated borrowing costs compounded these pressures, making it increasingly difficult to sustain normal levels of operational activity.

Some of the key challenges are:

- Gold price volatility.
- Rising costs of raw materials such as diamonds and platinum.
- Heavy reliance on imports, making the sector highly sensitive to global economic fluctuations and geopolitical developments, influencing consumer purchasing behaviour Government.
- Regulations and increasing import duties, impacting the competitiveness and profitability of industry players.
- Severe elongation of payment cycles in the domestic B2B supply chain, with settlement periods extending from the historical 90 to 180 days to 240 days or beyond, creating acute working capital stress for manufacturers.
- Elevated borrowing costs and reduced credit availability, making it increasingly expensive for manufacturing units to finance operations and inventory.
- Sharp divergence between the retail and manufacturing segments: while retailers benefited from gold inventory appreciation, manufacturers bore the full burden of rising input costs without commensurate improvement in margins.
- Decline in gems and jewellery export volumes due to weak overseas demand, geopolitical uncertainty and the adverse impact of high gold prices on international buyers.
- Lab Grown Diamonds.

➤ **Internal Control Systems and their adequacy:**

Your Company maintains an adequate and effective Internal Control System commensurate with its size and complexity. We believe that these internal control systems provide, amongst other things, a reasonable assurance that transactions are executed with Management authorization and that they are recorded in all material respects to permit preparation of financial statements in conformity with established accounting principles and that the assets of your Company are adequately safeguarded against significant misuse or loss.

➤ **Material developments in Human Resources / Industrial Relations front, including number of people employed:**

- ❖ In the context of significantly reduced operational activity during FY 2025-26, the Company managed its human resource obligations responsibly and in compliance



with applicable labour regulations. The Company acknowledges the contribution of its employees during an exceptionally difficult year and remains committed to fair and equitable treatment of its workforce. The Company upholds the principles of equal opportunity and maintains appropriate human resource policies consistent with its scale of operations.

**NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31st MARCH, 2026****A. Company information****Nature of Operations**

Sovereign Diamonds Limited (the 'Company') is a domestic public limited Company with registered office situated at 11-A, Mahal Industrial Estate, Mahakali Caves Road, Andheri (East), Mumbai - 400093 and is listed on the Bombay Stock Exchange Limited (BSE). The Company is engaged in manufacturing, selling of Gold Jewellery, Diamond Studded Jewellery and Silver item.

B. Basis for preparation**(i) Compliance with Ind AS**

The Financial statements of the Company comprises, the balance sheet, the statement of profit and loss (including other comprehensive income), statement of changes in equity and statement of cash flows for the year then ended, and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of the material accounting policies and other explanatory information (herein referred to as "Financial statements").

These financial statements of the Company have been prepared in accordance with the accounting principles generally accepted in India, including the Indian Accounting Standards ('Ind AS') specified under Section 133 of the Companies Act, 2013 ('the Act') and other relevant provisions of the Act. The Company has uniformly applied the accounting policies during the periods presented. In addition, the guidance notes/announcements issued by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of India (ICAI) are also applied except where compliance with other statutory promulgations require a different treatment.

The financial statements have been prepared on accrual and going concern basis under the historical cost basis except certain financial assets and liabilities which have been measured at fair value (refer note 37 for further details). The accounting policies are applied consistently to all the periods presented in the financial statements, All assets and liabilities have been classified as current or non-current as per the Company's normal operating cycle and other criteria as set out in the Division II of Schedule III to the Companies Act, 2013.

The financial statements of the Company are presented in Indian Rupees (₹), which is also its financial currency and all amounts disclosed in the financial statements and notes have been rounded off to the nearest rupees as per the requirements of schedule III to the Act

The financial statements of the Company for the year ended 31st March, 2026 were approved for issue in accordance with the resolution of the Board of Directors on 29th May, 2026.

C. Overall consideration

The financial statements have been prepared using the material accounting policies and measurement bases summarised below. These were used throughout all periods presented in the financial statements.

Key Accounting Estimates and Judgements

The preparation of financial statements requires management to make judgments, estimates and assumptions in the application of accounting policies that affect the reported amounts of assets, liabilities, income and expenses. Actual results may differ from these estimates. Continuous evaluation is done on the estimation and judgments based on historical experience and other factors, including expectations of future events



that are believed to be reasonable. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised prospectively as required.

Information about critical judgments in applying accounting policies, as well as estimates and assumptions that have the most significant effect to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities within the next financial year, are included in the following notes:

- (i) Measurement of defined benefit obligations - Note - 27
- (ii) Measurement and likelihood of occurrence of provisions and contingencies - Note - 31
- (iii) Recognition of deferred tax assets - Note - 5
- (iv) Impairment of tangibles - Note 1
- (v) Expected Credit Loss – Note 38

D. Material Accounting Policy Information

1. Current versus non-current classification and Operating cycle:

The Company presents assets and liabilities in the balance sheet based on current/ non-current classification.

An asset is classified as current when it is:

- Expected to be realised or intended to be sold or consumed in normal operating cycle,
- Held primarily for the purpose of trading,
- Expected to be realised within twelve months after the reporting period, or
- Cash or cash equivalent unless restricted from being exchanged or used to settle a liability for at least twelve months after the reporting period.

All other assets are classified as non-current

A liability is classified as current when:

- It is expected to be settled in normal operating cycle,
- It is held primarily for the purpose of trading,
- It is due to be settled within twelve months after the reporting period, or
- There is no unconditional right to defer the settlement of the liability for at least twelve months after the reporting period.

All other liabilities are classified as non-current. The operating cycle is the time between the acquisition of assets for processing and their realisation in cash and cash equivalents. The Company has ascertained its operating cycle as 12 months for the purpose of current or non-current classification of assets and liabilities.

Deferred tax assets and liabilities are classified as non-current assets and liabilities.

2. Property, plant and equipment

Freehold land is carried at historical cost. All other items of property, plant and equipment are stated at their cost of acquisition less accumulated depreciation and impairment losses, if any. The cost comprises purchase price, including import duties and non-refundable purchase taxes, after deducting trade discounts and rebates, borrowing cost if capitalisation criteria are met and directly attributable cost of bringing the asset to its working condition for the intended use and estimated costs of dismantling and removing the item and restoring the site on which it is located. Capital expenditure incurred on rented properties is classified as 'Leasehold improvements' under property, plant and equipment. The cost of a self-constructed item of property, plant and equipment



comprises the cost of materials and direct labour, any other costs directly attributable to bringing the item to working condition for its intended use, and estimated costs of dismantling and removing the item and restoring the site on which it is located.

Subsequent costs are included in the asset's carrying amount or recognised as a separate asset, as appropriate, only when it is probable that future economic benefits associated with the item will flow to the Company. All other repair and maintenance costs are recognised in statement of profit and loss as incurred.

If significant parts of an item of plant and equipment are required to be replaced at intervals, the Company depreciates them separately based on their specific useful lives. All other repair and maintenance costs are recognized in statement of profit and loss as incurred.

An item of property, plant and equipment and any significant part initially recognised is derecognised upon disposal or when no future economic benefits are expected from its use or disposal. Any gain or loss arising on de-recognition of the asset (calculated as the difference between the net disposal proceeds and the carrying amount of the asset) is included in the statement of profit and loss when the asset is derecognised.

The residual values, useful lives and methods of depreciation of property, plant and equipment are reviewed at each financial year end and adjusted prospectively, if appropriate. Changes in the expected useful life or the expected pattern of consumption of future economic benefits embodied in the asset is accounted for by changing the amortisation period or method, as appropriate, and are treated as changes in accounting estimates.

Depreciation on property, plant and equipment is provided on written-down value, computed on the basis of useful lives (as set out below) prescribed in Schedule II of the Act:

Capital work-in-progress represents expenditure incurred in respect of capital projects and are carried at cost. Cost comprises purchase cost, related acquisition expenses, development / construction costs, borrowing costs and other direct expenditure.

3. Investment property

Properties held to earn rentals or / and for capital appreciation or both but not for sale in the ordinary course of business, use in the production or supply of goods or services or for administrative purposes, are categorized as investment properties.

Property used in production or supply of goods or services and also held to earn rentals / capital appreciation is accounted separately as investment property only if portion of property held to earn rental / capital appreciation can be sold separately (or leased out separately under a finance lease). If the portions could not be sold separately, the property is investment property only if an insignificant portion is held for use in the production or supply of goods or services or for administrative purposes. Further property with provision of ancillary services to the occupants is treated as investment property if the services are insignificant to the arrangement as a whole.



These are measured initially at cost of acquisition, including transaction costs and other direct costs attributable to bringing asset to its working condition for intended use. Subsequent to initial recognition, investment properties are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation and accumulated impairment loss, if any. The cost shall also include borrowing cost if the recognition criteria are met. Subsequent expenditure is capitalised to the asset's carrying amount only when it is probable that future economic benefits associated with the item will flow to the Company and the cost of the item can be measured reliably. All other repairs and maintenance costs are expensed as and when incurred. When part of an investment property is replaced, the carrying amount of the replaced part is de-recognised. Said assets are depreciated on straight line basis based on expected life span of assets which is in accordance with Schedule II of the Act.

Though the Company measures investment property using cost based measurement, fair value of investments properties under each category are disclosed under to the financial statements. Fair values are determined based on the evaluation performed by an accredited external independent valuer applying a recognized and accepted valuation model or estimation based on available sources of information from market.

An investment property is derecognised on disposal or on permanent withdrawal from the use or when no future economic benefits are expected from its disposal. Any gain or loss arising on derecognition of the assets (calculated as the difference between the net disposal proceeds and the carrying amount of the assets) is included in the Statement of Profit and Loss when the asset is derecognised.

Transfers to or from the investment property is made only when there is a change in use. Transfer between investment property and owner occupied property do not change the carrying amount of the property transferred and they do not change the cost of that property for measurement or disclosure purpose.

4. Impairment of non-financial assets

At each reporting date, the Company assesses whether there is any indication based on internal/external factors, that an asset may be impaired. If any such indication exists, the Company estimates the recoverable amount of the asset to determine the extent of impairment loss. Recoverable amount is the higher of an asset's or cash-generating unit's (CGU) fair value less cost of disposal and its value in use. In assessing value in use, the estimated future cash-flow expected from the continuing use of the assets and from its disposal is discounted to their present value using a pre-tax discount rate that reflects the current market assessments of time value of money and the risk specific of the assets. If such recoverable amount of the asset or the recoverable amount of the cash generating unit to which the asset belongs is less than its carrying amount, the carrying amount is reduced to its recoverable amount and the reduction is treated as an impairment loss and is recognised in the statement of profit and loss. All assets are subsequently reassessed for indications that an impairment loss previously recognised may no longer exist. An impairment loss is reversed if the asset's or cash generating unit's recoverable amount exceeds its carrying amount.

5. Inventories

Raw Material: Lower of cost or net realisable value. Cost is determined on Weighted Average Cost basis.

Work in progress: At cost determined on Weighted Average Cost basis up-to estimated stage of completion. Cost of work in progress and manufactured finished goods comprises direct material, cost of conversion and other costs incurred in bringing these inventories to their present location and condition.



Finished goods: Lower of cost or net realisable value. Cost is determined on Weighted Average Cost basis, includes direct material and labour expenses and appropriate proportion of manufacturing overheads based on the normal capacity for manufactured goods.

Net realisable value is the estimated selling price in the ordinary course of business less estimated costs of completion and estimated costs necessary to make the sale.

6. Leases

The Company assess whether a contract contains a lease, at the inception of the contract. A contract is, or contains, a lease if the contract conveys the right to control the use of an identified asset for a period of time in exchange for consideration. To assess whether a contract conveys the right to control the use of an identified asset, the Company assesses whether

- (i) the contract involves the use of identified asset;
- (ii) the Company has substantially all of the economic benefits from the use of the asset through the period of lease and
- (iii) the Company has right to direct the use of the asset.

The Company evaluates if an arrangement qualifies to be a lease as per the requirements of Ind AS 116. The Company uses judgement in assessing the lease term (including anticipated renewals/termination options).

Short-term leases and leases of low-value assets

The company applies the short-term lease recognition exemption to its short-term lease of Property, Plant and Equipment (i.e. those leases that have a lease term of 12 months or less from the commencement date and do not contain purchase option). It also applies the lease of low-value assets recognition exemption to lease that are considered of low value and is not intended for sublease. Lease payments on short term lease and lease of low value assets are recognised as expenses on a straight line basis over the lease term or another systematic basis if that basis is more representative of the pattern of the lessee's benefit.

The Company as a lessor

Leases in which the Company does not transfer substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership of an asset are classified as operating leases. Rental income from operating lease is recognized on a straight- line basis or another systematic basis as per the terms of the relevant lease. Initial direct costs incurred in negotiating and arranging an operating lease are added to the carrying amount of the leased asset and recognized over the lease term on the same basis as rental income. Contingent rents are recognized as revenue in the period in which they are earned.

Leases are classified as finance leases when substantially all of the risks and rewards of ownership transfer from the Company to the lessee. Amounts due from lessees under finance leases are recorded as receivables at the Company's net investment in the leases. Finance lease income is allocated to accounting periods so as to reflect a constant periodic rate of return on the net investment outstanding in respect of the lease.

Company as a lessee

The company applies a single recognition and measurement approach for all leases except for short-term leases and leases of low value assets. The Company recognises lease liabilities to make lease payments and right-of-use assets representing the right to use the underlying assets.



7. Financial instruments

A financial instrument is any contract that gives rise to a financial asset of one entity and a financial liability or equity instrument of another entity.

1. Financial Assets

Initial recognition and measurement

Financial assets are recognised when the Company becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the financial instrument and are measured initially at fair value plus in the case of a financial asset not at fair value through profit or loss, transaction costs that are directly attributable to the acquisition or issue of the financial asset.

Subsequent measurement

For purpose of subsequent measurement, financial assets are classified into:

- i. Financial assets measured at amortised cost;
- ii. Financial assets measured at fair value through other comprehensive income (FVTOCI);
- iii. Financial assets measured at fair value through profit or loss (FVTPL).

The Company classifies its financial assets in the above mentioned categories based on:

- i. The Company's business model for managing the financial assets, and
- ii. The contractual cash flows characteristics of the financial asset.

Financial asset at amortised cost

The financial instrument is measured at the amortised cost if both the following conditions are met:

- i. The financial asset is held within a business model whose objective is to hold assets for collecting contractual cash flows, and
- ii. Contractual terms of the asset give rise on specified dates to cash flows that are solely payments of principal and interest (SPPI) on the principal amount outstanding.

After initial measurement, such financial assets are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest rate (EIR) method.

Financial asset at fair value through other comprehensive income (FVTOCI)

A financial asset is measured at fair value through other comprehensive income if both of the following conditions are met:

1. The financial asset is held within a business model whose objective is achieved by both collecting the contractual cash flows and selling financial assets; and
2. The asset's contractual cash flows represent SPPI.

Financial assets measured at fair value through profit or loss (FVTPL)

FVTPL is a residual category. Any financial asset, which does not meet the criteria for categorization as at amortized cost or as FVTOCI, is classified as at FVTPL. In addition, the Company may elect to designate a financial asset, which otherwise meets amortized cost or FVTOCI criteria, as at FVTPL. However, such election is allowed only if doing so reduces or eliminates a measurement or recognition inconsistency (referred to as 'accounting mismatch').

**De-recognition of financial assets**

A financial asset is primarily de-recognised when the right to receive cash flows from the asset have expired or the Company has transferred its right to receive cash flows from the asset.

Impairment of financial assets

In accordance with Ind AS 109, the Company applies expected credit loss (ECL) model for measurement and recognition of impairment loss for financial assets. ECL is the difference between all contractual cash flows that are due to the Company in accordance with the contract and all the cash flows that the Company expects to receive. When estimating the cash flows, the Company is required to consider –

- All contractual terms of the financial assets (including prepayment and extension) over the expected life of the assets.
- Cash flows from the sale of collateral held or other credit enhancements that are integral to the contractual terms.

At each reporting date, the Company assesses whether financial assets carried at amortised cost are credit-impaired. A financial asset is 'credit-impaired' when one or more events that have a detrimental impact on the estimated future cash flows of the financial asset have occurred. The Company measures loss allowances at an amount equal to lifetime expected credit losses.

Trade receivables

Loss allowances for trade receivables are always measured at an amount equal to lifetime expected credit losses. The Company follows 'simplified approach' for recognition of impairment loss allowance on trade receivables or contract revenue receivables. Under the simplified approach, the Company is not required to track changes in credit risk. Rather, it recognises impairment loss allowance based on lifetime ECLs together with appropriate management estimates for credit loss at each reporting date, right from its initial recognition.

The Company uses a provision matrix to determine impairment loss allowance on the group of trade receivables. The provision matrix is based on its historically observed default rates over the expected life of the trade receivable and is adjusted for forward looking estimates. At every reporting date, the historical observed default rates are updated and changes in the forward-looking estimates are analysed.

Measurement of expected credit losses

Expected credit losses are a probability-weighted estimate of credit losses. Credit losses are measured as the present value of all cash shortfalls (i.e. the difference between the cash flows due to the Company in accordance with the contract and the cash flows that the Company expects to receive). Loss allowances for financial assets measured at amortised cost are deducted from the gross carrying amount of the assets.

Other financial assets

For recognition of impairment loss on other financial assets and risk exposure, the Company determines whether there has been a significant increase in the credit risk since initial recognition and if credit risk has increased significantly, impairment loss is provided.

**Financial liabilities****Initial recognition and measurement**

All financial liabilities are recognised initially at fair value and transaction cost that is attributable to the acquisition of the financial liabilities is also adjusted. These liabilities are classified as amortised cost unless at initial recognition, they are classified as fair value through profit or loss.

Subsequent measurement

Subsequent to initial recognition, these liabilities are measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

Borrowings

After initial recognition, interest-bearing loans and borrowings will be subsequently measured at amortised cost using the Effective Interest Rate (EIR) method. Gains and losses are recognised in statement of profit and loss when the liabilities are derecognised as well as through the Effective interest rate amortisation process. The EIR amortisation is included as finance costs in the Statement of Profit and Loss.

Trade and other payables

These amounts represent liability for goods and services provided to the Company prior to the end of financial year which are unpaid. Trade and other payables are presented as current liabilities unless payment is not due within 12 months after the reporting period. They are recognized initially at fair value and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

De-recognition of financial liabilities

A financial liability is de-recognised when the obligation under the liability is discharged or cancelled or expires. When an existing financial liability is replaced by another from the same lender on substantially different terms, or the terms of an existing liability are substantially modified, such an exchange or modification is treated as the de-recognition of the original liability and the recognition of a new liability. The difference in the respective carrying amounts is recognised in the statement of profit and loss.

Compound financial instruments

Compound financial instruments are separated into liability and equity components based on the terms of the contract. On issuance of the said instrument, the liability component is arrived by discounting the gross sum at a market rate for an equivalent nonconvertible instrument. This amount is classified as a financial liability measured at amortised cost until it is extinguished on conversion or redemption. The remainder of the proceeds is recognised as equity component of compound financial instrument. This is recognised and included in shareholders' equity, net of income-tax effects, and not subsequently premeasured.

Offsetting of financial instruments

Financial assets and financial liabilities are offset and the net amount is reported in the balance sheet if there is a currently enforceable legal right to offset the recognised amounts and there is an intention to settle on a net basis, to realise the assets and settle the liabilities simultaneously.



8. Foreign currency translation

Functional and presentation currency

Items included in the financial statements are measured using the currency of the primary economic environment in which the Company operates ('the functional currency'). The financial statements are presented in Indian rupee (INR), which is the Company's functional and presentation currency.

Initial recognition

Transactions in foreign currencies are recorded on initial recognition in the functional currency at the exchange rates prevailing on the date of the transaction.

Measurement at the balance sheet date

Foreign currency monetary items of the Company, outstanding at the balance sheet date are restated at the year-end rates. Non-monetary items which are carried at historical cost denominated in a foreign currency are reported using the exchange rate at the date of the transaction. Non-monetary items measured at fair value in a foreign currency are translated using the exchange rates at the date when the fair value is determined.

Treatment of exchange difference

Exchange differences that arise on settlement of monetary items or on reporting at each balance sheet date of the Company's monetary items at the closing rate are recognised as income or expenses in the period in which they arise.

9. Revenue recognition

Sale of goods

Revenue from the contracts with customers is recognised when control of the goods is transferred to the customer at an amount that reflects the consideration to which the company expects to be entitled in exchange for those goods. Sales, as disclosed, are net of trade allowances, rebates, goods and service tax, and amounts collected on behalf of third parties.

The Company considers the terms of the contract and its customary business practices to determine the transaction price. The transaction price is the amount of consideration to which the Company expects to be entitled in exchange for transferring promised goods or services to a customer, excluding amounts collected on behalf of third parties (for example, indirect taxes). In respect of contracts with customers that contain a financing component i.e. when payment by a customer occurs significantly before performance and the fair value of goods provided to the customer at the end of the contract term exceeds the advance payments received, interest expense is recognized on recognition of a contract liability over the contract period and is presented under the head finance costs in statement of profit and loss and total transaction price including financing component is recognized when control of the goods is transferred to the customer.

The Company is primarily engaged in manufacturing of studded jewellery only; however, it may engage in the sale of raw materials that are primarily procured for production purposes. These sales are made on an exception only if the offer prices or market conditions are both favourable to the Company.

Satisfaction of performance obligations

The Company's revenue is derived from the single performance obligation to transfer primarily gold and diamond products under arrangements in which the transfer of control of the products and the fulfilment of the Company's performance obligation occur at



the same time. Revenue from the sale of goods is recognised when the company has transferred control of the goods to the buyer and the buyer obtains the benefits from the goods, the potential cash flows and the amount of revenue (the transaction price) can be measured reliably, and it is probable that the Company will collect the consideration to which it is entitled to in exchange for the goods.

When either party to a contract has performed, an entity shall present the contract in the balance sheet as a contract asset or a contract liability, depending on the relationship between the entity's performance and the customer's payment. In respect of sale of goods at prices that are yet to be fixed at the year end, adjustments to the provisional amount billed to the customers are recognised based on the year end closing gold rate.

Interest, Dividend and Other income

Interest income is recognised on an accrual basis using the effective interest method. Dividend are recognised at the time the right to receive the payment is established. Other income is recognised when no significant uncertainty as to its determination or realisation exists.

10. Taxes on income

The income tax expense or credit for the period is the tax payable on the current period's taxable income based on the applicable income tax rate adjusted by changes in deferred tax assets and liabilities attributable to temporary differences and to unused tax losses. Tax expense for the year comprises of current tax and deferred tax.

Current Income Tax

Current income tax assets and liabilities are measured at the amount expected to be recovered from or paid to the taxation authorities by using tax rates and the tax laws that are enacted at the reporting date.

Current tax assets and tax liabilities are offset where the Company has a legally enforceable right to offset and intends either to settle on a net basis, or to realise the asset and settle the liability simultaneously.

Deferred Taxes

Deferred tax is provided on temporary difference arising between the tax bases of the assets and liabilities and their carrying amounts for financial reporting purposes at the reporting date at the tax rates that are expected to apply in the year when the asset is realised or the liability is settled, based on tax rates (and tax laws) that have been enacted or substantively enacted at the reporting date.

Deferred tax assets are recognised for all deductible temporary differences and unused tax losses only if it is probable that future taxable profits will be available to utilise the same.

Deferred tax is not recognised for all taxable temporary differences between the carrying amount and tax bases of investments in subsidiaries, branches and associates and interest in joint arrangements where it is probable that the differences will not reverse in the foreseeable future.

Deferred tax assets and liabilities are offset when there is a legally enforceable right to offset the same and when the balances relate to the same taxation authority.

The carrying amount of deferred tax assets is reviewed at each reporting date and reduced to the extent that it is no longer probable that sufficient taxable profit will be available to utilize all or part of the deferred tax asset. Unrecognised deferred tax assets are re-assessed at each reporting date and are recognised to the extent that it has become probable that future taxable profits will be available to utilize the deferred tax asset.



Current and deferred tax is recognised in the Statement of Profit and Loss, except to the extent that it relates to items recognised in other comprehensive income or directly in equity, in which case, the tax is also recognised in other comprehensive income or directly in equity.

11. Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents comprise cash on hand, demand deposits with banks/corporations and short term highly liquid investments (original maturity less than three months) that are readily convertible into known amount of cash and are subject to an insignificant risk of change in value.

12. Cash flow statement

Cash flows are reported using the indirect method, whereby profit before tax is adjusted for the effects of transactions of non-cash nature and any deferrals or accruals of past or future cash receipts or payments. The cash flows from operating, investing and financing activities of the Company are segregated based on the available information.

13. Post-employment, long term and short term employee benefits.**Defined contribution plans**

Provident fund benefit is a defined contribution plan under which the Company pays fixed contributions into funds established under the Employees' Provident Funds and Miscellaneous Provisions Act, 1952. The Company has no legal or constructive obligations to pay further contributions after payment of the fixed contribution.

Defined benefit plans

Gratuity is a post-employment benefit defined under The Payment of Gratuity Act, 1972 and is in the nature of a defined benefit plan. The liability recognised in the financial statements in respect of gratuity is the present value of the defined benefit obligation at the reporting date, together with adjustments for unrecognised actuarial gains or losses and past service costs. The defined benefit/obligation is calculated at the end of each reporting period by an independent actuary using the projected unit credit method.

Actuarial gains and losses arising from past experience and changes in actuarial assumptions are credited or charged to the OCI in the year in which such gains or losses are determined.

Other long-term employee benefits

Liability in respect of compensated absences is estimated on the basis of an actuarial valuation performed by an independent actuary using the projected unit credit method. Actuarial gains and losses arising from past experience and changes in actuarial assumptions are charged to the statement of profit and loss in the year in which such gains or losses are determined.

Short-term employee benefits

Expense in respect of other short-term benefits is recognised on the basis of the amount paid or payable for the period during which services are rendered by the employee.

14. Operating expenses

Operating expenses are recognised in the statement of profit and loss upon utilisation of the service or as Incurred.

**15. Borrowing costs**

Borrowing costs are interest and other costs incurred in connection with the borrowing of funds. Borrowing costs directly attributable to the acquisitions, construction or production of a qualifying asset are capitalised during the period of time that is necessary to complete and prepare the asset for its intended use or sale. Other borrowing costs are expensed in the period in which they are incurred and reported in finance costs.

16. Fair value measurement

Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. The fair value measurement is based on the presumption that the transaction to sell the asset or transfer the liability takes place either:

- i. In the principal market for the asset or liability, or
- ii. In the absence of a principal market, in the most advantageous market for the asset or liability.

The principal or the most advantageous market must be accessible by the Company.

The fair value of an asset or a liability is measured using the assumptions that market participants would use when pricing the asset or liability, assuming that market participants act in their economic best interest.

The Company uses valuation techniques that are appropriate in the circumstances and for which sufficient data are available to measure fair value, maximising the use of relevant observable inputs and minimising the use of unobservable inputs.

All assets and liabilities for which fair value is measured or disclosed in the financial statements are categorised within the fair value hierarchy, described as follows, based on the lowest level input that is significant to the fair value measurement as a whole:

- i. Level 1 – Quoted (unadjusted) market prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities.
- ii. Level 2 – Valuation techniques for which the lowest level input that is significant to the fair value measurement is directly or indirectly observable.
- iii. Level 3 – Valuation techniques for which the lowest level input that is significant to the fair value measurement is unobservable.

For assets and liabilities that are recognised in the financial statements on a recurring basis, the Company determines whether transfers have occurred between levels in the hierarchy by re-assessing categorisation (based on the lowest level input that is significant to fair value measurement as a whole) at the end of each reporting period.

For the purpose of fair value disclosures, the Company has determined classes of assets and liabilities on the basis of the nature, characteristics and risks of the asset or liability and the level of the fair value hierarchy as explained above.

17. Provisions, contingent assets and contingent liabilities

Provisions are recognised only when there is a present obligation (legal or constructive), as a result of past events, and when a reliable estimate of the amount of obligation can be made at the reporting date. These estimates are reviewed at each reporting date and adjusted to reflect the current best estimates. Provisions are discounted to their present values, where the time value of money is material.

Contingent liability is disclosed for:

- Possible obligations which will be confirmed only by future events not wholly within the control of the Company; or



- Present obligations arising from past events where it is not probable that an outflow of resources will be required to settle the obligation or a reliable estimate of the amount of the obligation cannot be made.
Contingent assets are not recognised. However, when inflow of economic benefit is probable, related asset is disclosed.

18. Earnings per share

Basic earnings per share is calculated by dividing the net profit or loss for the period attributable to equity shareholders (after deducting attributable taxes) by the weighted average number of equity shares outstanding during the period. The weighted average number of equity shares outstanding during the period is adjusted for events including a bonus issue.

For the purpose of calculating diluted earnings per share, the net profit or loss for the period attributable to equity shareholders and the weighted average number of shares outstanding during the period are adjusted for the effects of all dilutive potential equity shares except for anti-dilutive potential equity shares.

19. Significant management judgement in applying accounting policies and estimation uncertainty

The preparation of the Company's financial statements requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of income, expenses, assets and liabilities, and the related disclosures.

Significant management judgements and estimates

The following are significant management judgements and estimates in applying the accounting policies of the Company that have the most significant effect on the financial statements:

Recognition of deferred tax assets – The extent to which deferred tax assets can be recognised is based on an assessment of the probability of the future taxable income against which the deferred tax assets can be utilised.

Evaluation of indicators for impairment of assets– The evaluation of applicability of indicators of impairment of assets requires assessment of several external and internal factors which could result in deterioration of recoverable amount of the assets.

Recoverability of advances/receivables – At each balance sheet date, based on historical default rates observed over expected life, the management assesses the expected credit loss on outstanding receivables and advances.

Defined benefit obligation (DBO) – Management's estimate of the DBO is based on a number of critical underlying assumptions such as standard rates of inflation, medical cost trends, mortality, discount rate and anticipation of future salary increases. Variation in these assumptions may significantly impact the DBO amount and the annual defined benefit expenses.

Fair value measurements – Management applies valuation techniques to determine the fair value of financial instruments (where active market quotes are not available). This involves developing estimates and assumptions consistent with how market participants would price the instrument. Management uses the best information available. Estimated fair values may vary from the actual prices that would be achieved in an arm's length transaction at the reporting date.



Useful lives of depreciable/amortizable assets – Management reviews its estimate of the useful lives of depreciable/amortizable assets at each reporting date, based on the expected utility of the assets. Uncertainties in these estimates relate to technical and economic obsolescence.

Expected Credit Loss (ECL) - The probability-weighted estimate of credit losses over the expected life of a financial asset, reflecting the present value of all cash shortfalls the management expects to incur.

20. Operating Segment

An operating segment is a component of the Company:

- i. That engages in business activities from which it may earn revenues and incur expenses,
- ii. Whose operating results are regularly reviewed by the Chief Operating Decision Maker (CODM) to make decisions about resources to be allocated and assess performance, and
- iii. For which discrete financial information is available.

Identification of segments:

Operating segments are identified based on the internal reports reviewed by the CODM for making strategic decisions. The CODM is the function responsible for allocating resources and assessing the performance of operating segments.

Measurement of segment results:

The Company measures segment performance based on profit or loss before tax and interest, consistent with internal financial reporting to the CODM.

Inter-segment transactions:

Transactions between operating segments are conducted on an arm's length basis and are eliminated on consolidation.

Reportable segments:

Segments meeting quantitative thresholds prescribed under IND AS 108, individually or in aggregate, are reported separately. If the total external revenue reported by operating segments constitutes less than 75% of the Company's revenue, additional segments are identified as reportable until at least 75% of external revenue is included.

21. Recent accounting developments

The Ministry of Corporate Affairs vide notification dated 9 September 2024 and 28 September 2024 notified the Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Second Amendment Rules, 2024 and Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Third Amendment Rules, 2024, respectively, which amended/ notified certain accounting standards as mentioned below, and are effective for annual reporting periods beginning on or after 1 April 2024:

- i. Lease Liability in Sale and Leaseback – Amendments to Ind AS 116; and
- ii. Insurance contracts - Ind AS 117

These amendments did not have any material impact on the amounts recognised in prior periods and are not expected to significantly affect the current or future periods.

The Board of Directors provide written principles for overall risk management, as well as policies covering specific areas, such as foreign exchange risk, interest rate risk, market risk, credit risk and investment of excess liquidity.

A) Credit Risk

Credit risk is the risk that a customer or counterparty to a financial instrument will fail to perform or pay amounts due to the Company causing financial loss. It arises from cash and cash equivalents, security deposits, loans given and principally from credit exposures to customers relating to outstanding receivables. The Company's maximum exposure to credit risk is limited to the carrying amount of financial assets recognised at reporting date.

The Company continuously monitors defaults of customers and other counterparties, identified either individually or by the Company, and incorporates this information into its credit risk controls. Where available at reasonable cost, external credit ratings and/or reports on customers and other counterparties are obtained and used. The Company's policy is to deal only with creditworthy counterparties.

In respect of trade and other receivables, the Company is not exposed to any significant credit risk exposure to any single counterparty or any company of counterparties having similar characteristics. Company provides for expected credit losses on financial assets by assessing individual financial instruments for expectation of any credit losses. Since the assets have very low credit risk, and are for varied natures and purpose, there is no trend that the company can draw to apply consistently to entire population. For such financial assets, the Company's policy is to provide for 12 month expected credit losses upon initial recognition and provides for lifetime expected credit losses upon significant increase in credit risk. For the year ended 31st March, 2026, the Company does not have any expected loss based impairment recognised on such assets considering their low credit risk nature, though incurred loss provisions are disclosed under each sub-category of such financial assets.

An impairment analysis is carried out on 31st March 2026, based on the conditions existing on that date, to identify any expected losses due to the time value of money and credit risk. The company reviews customer payment history and adjusts the estimates to account for any possible delays or risk of non-payment. To do this, receivables are grouped based on their type. Each group is then assessed for potential loss using the Expected Credit Loss (ECL) model as per Ind AS 109 – Financial Instruments. The calculation uses a provision matrix that is based on actual past data, adjusted for future expectations. C) Market risk

Market risk is the risk that the fair value of future cash flows of a financial instrument will fluctuate because of changes in market prices. Market risk comprises three types of risk: interest rate risk, currency risk and other price risk, such as equity price risk. Financial instruments affected by market risk include foreign currency receivables and payables, borrowings and trade payables.

i) Market risk - foreign currency

The Company is exposed to indirect foreign exchange risk primarily in relation to the purchase of diamonds used in the manufacturing of studded jewellery. Prices of diamonds are generally influenced by international market benchmarks and global pricing trends,



including those linked to the US market. Accordingly, fluctuations in foreign currency exchange rates, particularly the USD-INR exchange rate, may indirectly impact the purchase prices in the domestic market, even though the underlying transactions are settled in Indian Rupees and do not involve direct foreign currency denominated transactions. Foreign exchange risk, if any, generally arises from recognised assets and liabilities denominated in currencies other than the Company's functional currency. During the year, the Company did not have any material direct transactions or exposures denominated in foreign currencies. Accordingly, the Company was not exposed to significant direct foreign currency risk as at the reporting date. The Company continuously monitors market movements and evaluates appropriate risk management strategies to mitigate the impact of fluctuations in foreign exchange rates. The Company does not undertake derivative transactions for speculative purposes.

i) Liabilities

The Company's policy is to minimise exposure to interest rate cash flow risk through prudent and strategic financing decisions. The Company repaid all its borrowings before November 2025 and, accordingly, had no outstanding borrowings as at 31 March 2026. Consequently, the Company had no exposure to interest rate risk arising from borrowings as at the reporting date.

Sensitivity

The company does not have any borrowings payable as on 31st March, 2026 and no due certificate from the bank has been received. Further, as at 31st March, 2026 and 31st March, 2025, financial liabilities of Rs. Nil and Rs.886.02 Lakhs respectively, were subject to variable interest rates. Increase/decrease of 50 basis points in interest rates at the balance sheet date would result in decrease/increase in profit/(loss) before tax of Rs.Nil and Rs.4.43 Lakhs for the year ended March 31, 2026 and March 31, 2025 respectively.

ii) Assets

The Company's financial assets are carried at amortised cost and are at fixed rate only. They are, therefore, not subject to interest rate risk since neither the carrying amount nor the future cash flows will fluctuate because of a change in market interest rates.

iii) Market risk -Price risk

Sensitivity

The Company is exposed to market price risk arising primarily from fluctuations in the prices of gold, diamonds, and other raw materials used in its jewellery business. Variations in commodity prices may adversely impact procurement costs and operating margins. To mitigate such risks, the Company continuously monitors market conditions and implements appropriate risk management strategies, including prudent inventory management, procurement planning, and periodic review of product pricing, with the objective of minimizing exposure to price volatility while maintaining operational efficiency.

Exposure from trade payables:

The Company's exposure to price risk also arises from trade payables of the Company that are at unfixed prices, and, therefore, payment is sensitive to changes in gold prices. The option to fix gold prices are classified in the balance sheet as fair value through profit or loss. The option to fix gold prices are at unfixed prices to hedge against potential losses in value of inventory of gold held by the Company.

The Company applies fair value hedge for the gold purchased whose price is to be fixed in future. Therefore, there will no impact of the fluctuation in the price of the gold on the Company's profit for the period.

39 Capital Management

The Company's capital management objectives are:

- to ensure the Company's ability to continue as a going concern
- to provide an adequate return to shareholders

The Company monitors capital on the basis of the carrying amount of equity less cash and cash equivalents as presented on the face of balance sheet.



The Management assesses the Company's capital requirements in order to maintain an efficient overall financing structure while avoiding excessive leverage. This takes into account the subordination levels of the Company's various classes of debt. The Company manages the capital structure and makes adjustments to it in the light of changes in the economic conditions and the risk characteristics of the underlying assets. In order to maintain or adjust the capital structure, the Company may adjust the amount of dividends paid to shareholders, return capital to shareholders, issue new shares, or sell assets to reduce debt.

- 40** While verifying the physical stock on 5th July, 2019 the management realized shortage of Gold as compared to stock as per books. The management suspected an old employee of the Company who misappropriated certain quantity of stock. An old employee also confessed before management his misappropriation of Gold. The management lodged police complaint against old employee. The Police Department is inquiring and trying to recover as much as possible from said employee.

The loss arising on account of this misappropriation is at 900 gms of gold value about Rs.30 Lakhs has been charged to profit and loss account during the year 2019-20.
