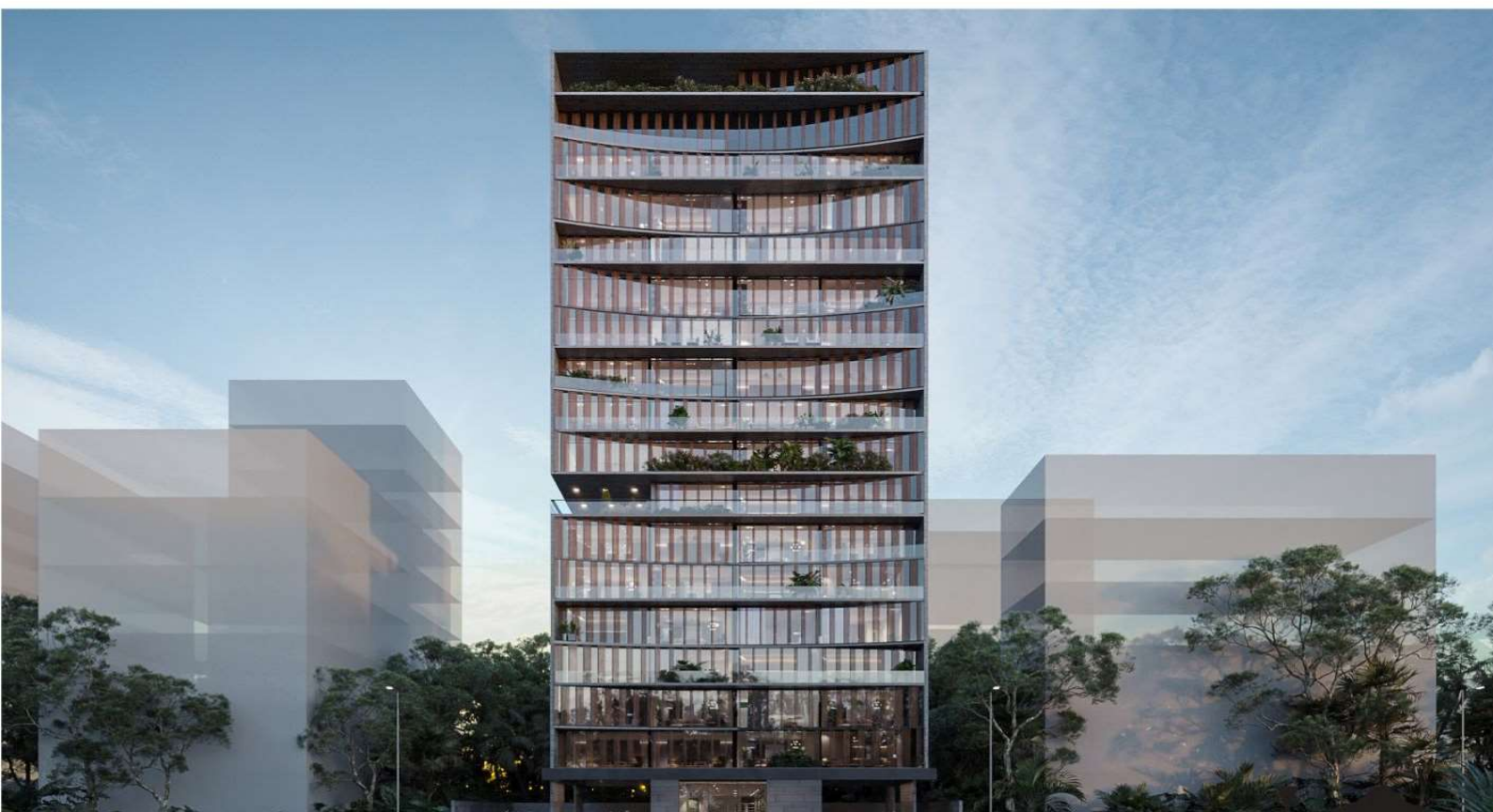

Operational Performance:

During the financial year 2025-26, total revenue for standalone and consolidated are ₹996.46 Lakhs and ₹1,721.07 Lakhs respectively, slightly increased as compared to ₹947.28.74 and ₹1,658.15 respectively in the previous year; Profit before Tax for the current year is standalone ₹189.52 Lakhs and consolidated ₹378.35 Lakhs as against standalone ₹40.20 Lakhs and consolidated ₹613.19 Lakhs in the previous year and the total comprehensive income for the current year stood at standalone ₹140.66 Lakhs and consolidated ₹448.94 Lakhs as against standalone ₹27.70 Lakhs and consolidated ₹448.39 Lakhs in the previous year.

Segment Performance:

The Company is engaged in the business of entertainment and films either through co-production and production of such films and subsequently exploiting and distributing such films in India through music release, theatrical distribution, television licensing and other new media distribution avenues.

2. Reserves:

During the year under review, no amount was transferred to Reserves.

3. Dividend:

Considering the prevailing economic conditions and the requirement of cash the Board of Directors does not recommended any dividend for the financial year ended 31st March, 2026.

4. Subsidiary, Associate and Joint Venture Companies:

Modern Production FZ LLC is 100% Subsidiary of the Company and the Company has 90% stake in M/s Pooja Leisure and Lifestyle. Kindly refer Form AOC-1 which is enclosed as **Annexure-I** and forms part of this report.

5. Preferential Warrants and its Conversion to Equity Shares

The Company had issued an aggregate of 2,89,50,000 Equity Convertible Warrants on a preferential basis, out of which 2,04,35,000 warrants had already been converted into Equity Shares in the FY 2024-25 upon receipt of 75% of the issue price.

During the year under review, the Company has converted the remaining 85,15,000 warrants into Equity Shares upon receipt of the outstanding 75% of the issue price, pursuant to the approval of the Board of Directors at its meeting held on 21st August, 2025.

Accordingly, all warrants issued on a preferential basis stand fully converted, and there are no outstanding warrants pending for conversion as on date.

6. Share Capital & Listing:

- a. *The Company is required to obtain special contingency insurance policy but the same was not taken and the Company is in search of required insurance product. No fine was levied for the same by any of the authorities.*
- b. *The Board takes note of the observation. The Company had submitted the Annual Secretarial Compliance Report ("ASCR") for FY 2024-25 in PDF format within the prescribed timeline on May 22, 2025. However, due to an inadvertent technical issue, the same could not be uploaded in XBRL format within the prescribed timeline. The management was under the bona fide belief that the submission had been duly completed within the stipulated timeline. The Company subsequently paid the fine levied by BSE Limited and has strengthened its internal compliance monitoring mechanism to avoid recurrence of such instances.*
- c. *The Board takes note of the observation. The Company was included in the list of the top 2,000 listed entities published by BSE Limited for the period from 1 July 2025 to December 31, 2025, thereby attracting the requirements of Regulation 17(1)(c) of the SEBI (LODR) Regulations, 2015. Accordingly, the Board appointed Mr. Ashish Radheyshyam Goyal as Non-Executive Additional Independent Director with effect from April 10, 2026, and his appointment as Non-Executive Independent Director was subsequently approved by the members at the Extra-Ordinary General Meeting held on June 30, 2026. The Company shall continue to monitor and ensure compliance with the applicable provisions of the SEBI (LODR) Regulations, 2015.*
- d. *The Board takes note of the observation. Economy Scenario:

The Company is engaged in Entertainment and Media industry since 2008. The Company is pleased to announce that the Company has collaborated with Pooja Leisure and Lifestyle for engaging in Real Estate Business as well.

-Media and Entertainment Industry:

The fiscal year 2025–26 has been a period of structural recalibration. While global geopolitical uncertainties and persistent inflationary pressures have influenced consumption patterns, the industry has demonstrated resilience through aggressive digital transformation. Operational Performance and Strategic Initiatives:

During the year, the Company aligned its business model with the following strategic imperatives:

- **Optimizing Revenue Models:** We have accelerated the adoption of hybrid monetization models—balancing subscription revenues with ad-supported tiers to accommodate price-sensitive consumers while maintaining high-value premium offerings.
- **Technology & Data Mastery:** Recognizing that technology access is no longer a unique differentiator, we have pivoted toward owning "audience intelligence." By leveraging first-party data and metadata, we have improved content discovery and personalization, directly contributing to higher engagement metrics.

- **Regulatory & Compliance:** As global regulatory standards for AI and digital content evolve, we remain committed to maintaining high standards of transparency, governance, and ethical compliance as stipulated by current statutory requirements.

Future Outlook

Looking toward FY 2026–27, we remain optimistic about our ability to sustain growth. Our path forward is cantered on:

1. **Orchestrating Experience:** Moving beyond mere content delivery to become a seamless orchestrator of the consumer experience.
2. **Operational Excellence:** Leveraging the "Blue Verse" and other agentic AI ecosystems to reimagine operations and achieve leaner, more efficient cost structures [20].
3. **Sustainable Growth:** Continuing our commitment to ESG and sustainability, ensuring that our growth is not just profitable, but responsible.

-Real Estate Industry:

Sectoral Overview

Despite the complexities of the global economic climate, the Indian real estate sector has solidified its position as a primary pillar of the nation's economic growth trajectory during FY 2025–26. The sector continues to witness robust interest from both domestic and international investors, catalyzed by structural reforms, accelerated urbanization, and evolving consumer aspirations. The narrative of the past year has been one of resilience and qualitative transformation, moving beyond mere volume growth to value-driven expansion across asset classes.

Residential Market Dynamics

The residential segment has undergone a significant recalibration. Building on the post-pandemic recovery, the sector has transitioned into a mature growth phase:

- **Transaction Profile:** We have observed a definitive shift in market structure. Primary market transactions (under-construction projects) continue to lead, while secondary market (resale) transactions have grown in share, reflecting increased buyer confidence and a more liquid market ecosystem.
- **Segment Performance:**
 - **Luxury Housing:** The premium and luxury segments (properties valued above INR 1 crore) have emerged as the vanguard of growth. This surge is underpinned by rising disposable incomes, lifestyle shifts toward gated community living, and targeted product offerings from developers.
 - **Affordable Housing:** While sales in the affordable segment have faced headwinds due to cost-of-living pressures, the significant reduction in unsold inventory indicates that structural demand remains intact. The market is currently seeing a "flight to quality," with developers strategically pivoting focus toward mid-to-high-end segments where demand velocity is higher.

We remain committed to inventory management and disciplined project delivery as core tenets of our operational philosophy.

In addition to its entertainment endeavors, the company has recently ventured into real estate projects. - **First-Party Data Monetization:** As the industry moves away from third-party cookies, our ability to cultivate and leverage proprietary first-party audience intelligence is a key strategic advantage. By deeply understanding behavioural patterns, we can drive hyper-personalization, thereby increasing user engagement and lifetime value (LTV).
- **Strategic Consolidation & Bundling:** Amidst market fragmentation, there is a clear consumer demand for simplicity. By positioning our platforms as "aggregators" or "hubs" for content—effectively managing the consumer's experience across different services—we can combat subscription fatigue and improve retention rates.

Threats

While growth prospects remain positive, the industry faces distinct external and operational challenges:

- **Escalating Content Acquisition Costs:** The capital intensity required to remain competitive against global hyperscalers and top-tier studios continues to rise. There is a persistent risk of margin compression if content investment growth outpaces our ability to scale monetization through subscription and advertising.
- **Evolving Regulatory & Data Privacy Frameworks:** With the rapid adoption of AI and increasing scrutiny over user data, the regulatory environment is becoming more complex. Rapid shifts in compliance requirements regarding data privacy, intellectual property rights, and AI ethics pose a risk to operational continuity and may necessitate significant investment in legal and technical governance.
- **Hyper-Competitive Talent & Market Landscape:** The sector is increasingly contested by tech-native organizations that possess significant data-center advantages and deeper pockets. The battle for top-tier creative and technical talent, coupled with the encroachment of non-traditional media players, requires constant investment in differentiation and organizational agility.
- **Cybersecurity and System Integrity:** As our operations become increasingly digital and interconnected, the surface area for cyber threats grows. Any disruption to our digital platforms—ranging from data breaches to service outages—could have material impacts on

our reputation, brand equity, and bottom line.

-In Real Estate Industry:

Opportunities

The Indian real estate sector continues to present significant growth avenues, supported by structural economic shifts and rising consumer aspirations:

- **Growth in Tier 2 and Tier 3 Markets:** Beyond the saturation of major metropolitan hubs, emerging Tier 2 and Tier 3 cities are witnessing rapid urbanization and infrastructure development. This provides a clear opportunity to capitalize on the increasing demand for organized, high-quality residential and commercial spaces in these underserved markets.
- **The "Flight to Quality" in Commercial Assets:** The continued expansion of Global Capability Centers (GCCs) and IT/ITeS services is driving a persistent demand for Grade-A office spaces. Properties that offer sustainability certifications, modern amenities, and flexible infrastructure are commanding premium rentals and high occupancy rates, allowing us to enhance asset yield.
- **Logistics and Industrial Integration:** The 'Make in India' initiative and the ongoing expansion of the e-commerce sector continue to create strong demand for modern warehousing and industrial parks. Strategic investment in logistics assets near high-growth transport corridors offers a robust, stable revenue stream.
- **Digitalization and PropTech Adoption:** The integration of PropTech—including virtual site tours, AI-driven customer relationship management, and streamlined digital booking processes—is significantly reducing transaction friction. Embracing these technologies provides a competitive edge in improving customer experience and operational transparency.

Threats

While the outlook is positive, the sector remains sensitive to external macroeconomic and operational headwinds:

- **Input Cost and Supply Chain Volatility:** The costs of construction materials—including steel, cement, and skilled labor—remain subject to inflationary pressures and supply chain disruptions. Uncontrolled escalations in these costs can compress profit margins if they cannot be fully passed on to the end consumer.
- **Interest Rate Sensitivity:** Residential real estate, particularly in the mid-market segment, remains highly sensitive to fluctuations in mortgage interest rates. A prolonged high-interest-rate environment may dampen sentiment among potential homebuyers, potentially slowing down the velocity of sales.
- **Regulatory and Compliance Risks:** The real estate sector operates within a complex web of evolving RERA (Real Estate Regulatory Authority) norms, land acquisition laws, and environmental compliance standards. Non-compliance or sudden shifts in regulatory frameworks could lead to project delays, legal liabilities, and reputational risk.
- **Market Oversupply and Inventory Risk:** While luxury and commercial segments are performing well, there is a risk of speculative oversupply in specific micro-markets. Maintaining an accurate demand-supply assessment is critical to avoiding inventory pile-up, which ties up capital and affects overall liquidity.

Outlook:

Media and Entertainment Industry: As we navigate FY 2025–26, the global Entertainment & Media (E&M) industry is entering a defining phase of structural transition. With the broader market trajectory set to reach \$3.5 trillion in revenue by 2029, our strategy for the coming year is aligned with the following macro-economic and sector-specific shifts:

1. Advertising as the Primary Revenue Engine

While consumer spending growth remains constrained in mature markets, advertising has firmly

established itself as the sector's high-velocity growth driver. Projections indicate that advertising spend will grow at a compound annual growth rate (CAGR) of 6.1%—significantly outperforming the broader consumer category (2%). In FY 2025–26, we are prioritizing the expansion of our ad-supported models to capitalize on this shift, moving away from an exclusive reliance on subscription-based revenues.

2. The Digital & AI Imperative

Digital formats, which already command over 70% of total ad revenue, are expected to continue their dominance, accelerating toward 80% market share by 2029. Our operational roadmap for the year includes:

- **AI-Driven Hyper-personalization:** Deploying advanced AI tools to refine audience targeting. This will be critical as the industry shifts toward hyper-personalized content delivery.
- **Connected TV (CTV) Acceleration:** Recognizing that CTV advertising has surged from 5.9% of traditional broadcast TV spend in 2020 to 22% in 2024, we are positioning our assets to capture the next wave of CTV growth. We anticipate this will be a major contributor to our revenue portfolio as digital engagement deepens.

3. Capitalizing on High-Growth Segments

To maintain competitive advantage, we are realigning our portfolio toward the fastest-growing metrics within the E&M ecosystem:

- **Retail Media & Search:** Investing in retail search advertising, a segment that has seen a structural increase from 32.7% (2020) to 45.5% (2029 forecast).
- **Interactive Entertainment:** Increasing our focus on video game advertising, where monetization growth is projected to rise steadily through 2029.

4. Strategic Balancing: Connectivity and Content

While connectivity remains the largest category in absolute dollar terms (with spending projected at \$1.3 trillion by 2029), we acknowledge the narrowing gulf between connectivity spend and advertising expenditure. Our strategy for FY 2025–26 is to ensure our platforms remain central to the consumer journey, balancing our role as a content provider with the necessity of being an agile advertising destination.

Conclusion

Despite the backdrop of economic uncertainty and fierce global competition, our outlook for FY 2025–26 remains one of disciplined growth. We are focused on leveraging AI and data-driven personalization to navigate the shift toward digital-first advertising, ensuring our business model is resilient against the slowing growth of traditional subscription-only products.

Real Estate Industry:

As the Indian real estate sector enters FY 2025–26, it stands on a resilient foundation, increasingly supported by structural drivers including rapid urbanization, infrastructure expansion, and digital transformation. Despite a complex global macroeconomic environment, the sector's trajectory remains positive, characterized by a fundamental shift toward institutionalization and sustainable development.

1. Residential Strategy: Geographic and Product Diversification

The residential market is entering a phase of deeper penetration. While traditional metros remain core, we anticipate significant momentum in suburban hubs and Tier-2 growth corridors, including Jaipur, Bhubaneswar, Nagpur, and Vishakhapatnam, driven by regional development initiatives.

- **Segment Focus:** Developers are strategically balancing volume-based affordable housing with high-demand premium projects to cater to a broader middle-class demographic.

- **Integrated Living:** The “live-work-play” township model is evolving from a luxury concept to a standard requirement for modern urban homebuyers, emphasizing community-integrated amenities.

2. Commercial Real Estate: Evolution to "Flex-Tech" Spaces

The commercial office segment remains robust, underpinned by the sustained expansion of Global Capability Centers (GCCs) and the technology sector. Office demand is not retreating; rather, it is evolving.

- **Quality & ESG:** Tenants are prioritizing Grade A office spaces that offer ESG compliance, collaborative environments, and flexible leasing structures.
- **Operational Priority:** Maintaining occupancy and rental growth now requires a higher degree of smart asset management and tenant-experience upgrades, moving beyond basic infrastructure to tech-enabled ecosystems.

3. The Rise of New Asset Classes

Data centers and logistics have emerged as strategic growth engines.

- **Digital Infrastructure:** India’s ascent as a global hub for data centers is attracting substantial domestic and foreign capital, driven by exponential growth in digital consumption.
- **Logistics Transformation:** The industrial and warehousing sector is shifting from unorganized setups to institutional-grade parks, bolstered by the National Logistics Policy, PLI schemes, and the continued acceleration of e-commerce retail.

- **Liquidity Innovations:** The evolution of SM REITs (Small and Medium REITs) is democratizing investor participation, while nascent innovations like real estate tokenization hold the potential to enhance liquidity in historically illiquid asset classes.

Technology and ESG are no longer ancillary considerations; they are core operational priorities.

- **Smart Infrastructure:** The integration of AI, IoT, and blockchain is transforming the lifecycle of real estate—from development and construction to leasing and customer engagement. Cybersecurity and data protection have become non-negotiable pillars of our digital framework.
- **Sustainability:** Adopting green building standards and moving toward net-zero buildings is a defining trend. With increasing regulatory and investor pressure, we are prioritizing energy-efficient materials and AI-driven energy conservation to future-proof our assets.

Pursuant to the notification dated February 16, 2015 issued by the Ministry of Corporate Affairs, the Company has adopted the Indian Accounting Standards (“Ind AS”) notified under the Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Rules, 2015 with effect from April 1, 2017.

Human Resource Development:

The Company comprises a small team of professionals, who are result oriented, committed and loyal. The number of permanent employees on the rolls of Company as on 31.03.2026 was 6. The Company

is in Media & Entertainment industry, Human Resource Management (HRM) plays a crucial role in ensuring smooth functioning of this industry. The Company provides regular training and development programs to its employees to ensure that they are equipped with the necessary skills and knowledge to perform their roles efficiently.

Opinion

We have audited the standalone financial statements of Vashu Bhagnani Industries Limited (the Company), which comprise the Balance Sheet as at 31st March, 2026, and the Statement of Profit and Loss (including other comprehensive income), Statement of Changes in Equity and Statement of Cash Flows for the year then ended, and notes to the standalone financial statements, including a summary of material accounting policies and other explanatory information (hereinafter referred to as "the standalone financial statements").

During the year, the Company recorded significant Other Income amounting to Rs.246.89 Lakhs through the writing back of sundry credit balances. This requires management to exercise judgment in determining that these liabilities are no longer payable and have legally or contractually expired. (Refer Note. 21 of Standalone Financial Statement)	<u>Principal Audit Procedures</u> Our audit procedures to address the risk of revenue recognition and the specific write-back of credit balances included, but were not limited to: - We evaluated the design and operating effectiveness of internal controls over the revenue cycle, including agreement entered, and invoicing. - We performed cut-off procedures by inspecting invoices and after the balance sheet date to ensure revenue was recorded in the correct period. - We performed trend analysis of revenue by product line and month, comparing results against historical data and industry benchmarks to identify unusual fluctuations.

NOTE - 1 CORPORATE INFORMATION

Vashu Bhagnani Industries Limited ("the Company" or "VBIL") is engaged in film production and other related activities. The company is a public limited company incorporated and domiciled in India and has its registered office at FLAT NO 1, COELHO HOUSE, NO 2 JUHU VASANT BAHA CHS LTD, JUHU TARA ROAD, JUHU, NEAR SEA PRINCES HOTEL, Juhu, Mumbai, Maharashtra, India, 400049

NOTE - 2 MATERIAL ACCOUNTING POLICIES**2.01 Basis of preparation of financial statements**

The financial statements have been prepared in compliance with Indian Accounting Standards (Ind AS) notified under Section 133 of the Companies Act, 2013 (the Act) [Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Rules, 2015] and other relevant provisions of the Act.

2.02 Foreign currency translation

(i) Functional and presentation currency

Items included in the financial statements of the Company are measured using the currency of the primary economic environment in which the entity operates ('the functional currency'). The standalone financial statements are presented in Indian rupee (INR), which is the company's functional and presentation currency.

(ii) Transactions and balances

Foreign currency transactions are translated into the functional currency using the exchange rates prevailing at the dates of the transactions. Foreign exchange gains and losses resulting from the settlement of such transactions and from the translation of monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies at year end exchange rates are generally recognised in profit and loss.

Non-monetary items that are measured at fair value in a foreign currency are translated using the exchange rates at the date when the fair value was determined. Translation differences on assets and liabilities carried at fair value are reported as part of the fair value gain or loss. The gain or loss arising on translation of non-monetary items measured at fair value is treated in line with the recognition of the gain or loss on the change in fair value of the item (i.e., translation differences on items whose fair value gain or loss is recognised in OCI or profit and loss are also recognised in OCI or profit and loss, respectively).

2.03 Use of estimates

The preparation of the financial statements in conformity with Indian GAAP requires the management to make estimates and assumptions considered in the reported amounts of assets and liabilities (including contingent liabilities) and the reported income and expenses during the year. The management believes that the estimates used in preparation of the financial statements are prudent and reasonable. Future results could differ due to these estimates and the differences between the actual results and the estimates are recognised in the periods in which the results are known / materialise. Significant estimates used by the management in the preparation of these financial statements include, classification of assets and liabilities into current and non-current, estimates of the economic useful lives of fixed assets. Any revision to accounting estimates is recognised prospectively.

2.04 Tangible Fixed Assets - Property Plant and Equipment

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation. Cost comprises of the purchase price and any attributable cost of bringing the asset to its working condition for its intended use.

2.05 Inventories

Inventory comprises of unamortised cost of films and cost incurred till date for under production films. The cost of films is amortised in the ratio of current revenue to expected total revenue. At the end of each accounting period, balance unamortised cost is compared with net expected revenue. If net expected revenue is less than unamortised cost, the same is written down to net expected revenue. Expenses of under production films incurred till the films are ready for release are inventoried.

2.06 Investments:

All long-term investments are valued at cost. Provision for diminution in the value of each long-term investment is made to recognise a decline other than a temporary nature. Current Investments are carried individually at lower of cost or fair value and the resultant decline is charged to the revenue.

2.07 Revenue Recognition

The Company has adopted Ind AS 115, Revenue from Contract with Customers with effect from 1st April 2018.

Film production and related income

Revenue is measured at the Transaction price of the consideration received or receivable. Revenue from production of movie is recognized on assignment/ sale of the rights in the concerned movie from the date of their availability for exploitation or on the date of release of the movie and in some other cases as per the terms of movie production agreements entered into with the customer, as applicable. Revenue from other rights in the movie such as satellite rights, overseas rights, music rights, video

rights, etc., is recognized on assignment/ sale of the rights in the concerned movie from the date of their availability for exploitation , as applicable.

Interest income

Interest income is recognised on a time proportion basis.

2.08 Depreciation:

Depreciation on Tangible fixed assets are provided for in accordance with schedule II of the Companies Act, 2013. Depreciation on addition/deduction during the year has been provided on Pro-rata basis.

2.09 Taxation

Current tax is the amount of tax payable on the taxable income for the year as determined in accordance with the provisions of the Income Tax Act, 1961. Provision for current income tax is made on current tax rate based on assessable income computed under Income Tax Act 1961 or Book profit is computed under section 115JB (MAT) whichever is higher. MAT credit is recognised subject to requirement of virtual certainty that sufficient future taxable income will be available for set off.

Deferred tax assets and liabilities are recognised for future tax consequences attributable to the timing differences between taxable income and accounting income that are capable of reversal in one or more subsequent periods and are measured using tax rates enacted or substantively enacted as at the Balance Sheet date. Deferred Tax assets are not recognized unless, in the management judgment, there is virtual certainty that sufficient future taxable income will be available against which such deferred tax assets can be realised. The carrying amount of deferred tax is reviewed at each balance sheet date.

2.10 Cash and cash equivalents

For the purpose of presentation in the statement of cash flows, cash and cash equivalents includes cash on hand, call deposits and other short-term, highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and which are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value.

2.11 Financial instruments

A financial instrument is any contract that gives rise to a financial asset of one entity and a financial liability or equity instrument of another entity. Financial instruments also include derivative contracts such as foreign currency foreign exchange forward contracts, interest rate swaps and currency options; and embedded derivatives in the host contract.

i) Financial assets

Classification

The Company shall classify financial assets as subsequently measured at amortised cost, fair value through other comprehensive income (FVOCI) or fair value through profit and loss (FVTPL) on the basis of its business model for managing the financial assets and the contractual cash flow characteristics of the financial asset.

Initial recognition and measurement

All financial assets are recognised initially at fair value plus, in the case of financial assets not recorded at fair value through profit or loss, transaction costs that are attributable to the acquisition of the financial asset. Purchases or sales of financial assets that require delivery of assets within a time frame established by regulation or convention in the market place (regular way trades) are recognised on the trade date, i.e., the date that the Company commits to purchase or sell the asset. However, trade Receivables that do not contain a significant financing component are measured at transaction price.

Debt instruments

A 'debt instrument' is measured at the amortised cost if both the following conditions are met:

a) The asset is held within a business model whose objective is to hold assets for collecting contractual cash flows, and

b) Contractual terms of the asset give rise on specified dates to cash flows that are solely payments of principal and interest (SPPI) on the principal amount outstanding.

- After initial measurement, such financial assets are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest rate (EIR) method. Amortised cost is calculated by taking into account any discount or premium and fees or costs that are an integral part of the EIR. The EIR amortisation is included in finance income in the profit and loss.

- Debt instruments included within the fair value through profit and loss (FVTPL) category are measured at fair value with all changes recognised in the statement of profit and loss.

Equity instruments

The Company subsequently measures all equity investments in companies other than equity investments in subsidiaries, at fair value. Where the Company's management has elected to present fair value gains and losses on equity investments in other comprehensive income, there is no subsequent reclassification of fair value gains and losses to profit or loss. Dividends from such investments are recognised in profit and loss as other income when the Company's right to receive payments is established.

De-recognition

- A financial asset (or, where applicable, a part of a financial asset or part of a Company of similar financial assets) is primarily derecognised (i.e. removed from the Company's balance sheet) when:
 - The rights to receive cash flows from the asset have expired, or
 - The Company has transferred its rights to receive cash flows from the asset or has assumed an obligation to pay the received cash flows in full without material delay to a third party under a 'pass-through' arrangement; and either (a) the Company has transferred substantially all the risks and rewards of the asset, or (b) the Company has neither transferred nor retained substantially all the risks and rewards of the asset, but has transferred control of the asset.
 - When the Company has transferred its rights to receive cash flows from an asset or has entered into a pass-through arrangement, it evaluates if and to what extent it has retained the risks and rewards of ownership. When it has neither transferred nor retained substantially all of the risks and rewards of the asset, nor transferred control of the asset, the Company continues to recognise the transferred asset to the extent of the Company's continuing involvement. In that case, the Company also recognises an associated liability. The transferred asset and the associated liability are measured on a basis that reflects the rights and obligations that the Company has retained.
 - Continuing involvement that takes the form of a guarantee over the transferred asset is measured at the lower of the original carrying amount of the asset and the maximum amount of consideration that the Company could be required to repay.

Impairment of financial assets

In accordance with Ind-AS 109, the Company applies expected credit loss (ECL) model for measurement and recognition of impairment loss on the following financial assets and credit risk exposure:

- a) Financial assets that are debt instruments, and are measured at amortised cost e.g., loans, debt securities, deposits, and bank balance
- b) Trade receivables - The application of simplified approach does not require the Company to track changes in credit risk. Rather, it recognises impairment loss allowance based on lifetime ECLs at each reporting date, right from its initial recognition.

ii) Financial liabilities**Classification**

The Company classifies all financial liabilities as subsequently measured at amortised cost, except for financial liabilities at fair value through profit and loss. Such liabilities, including derivatives that are liabilities, shall be subsequently measured at fair value.

Initial recognition and measurement

Financial liabilities are classified, at initial recognition, as financial liabilities at fair value through profit or loss, loans and borrowings, payables, or as derivatives designated as hedging instruments in an effective hedge, as appropriate.

All financial liabilities are recognised initially at fair value and, in the case of loans and borrowings and payables, net of directly attributable transaction costs.

The Company's financial liabilities include trade and other payables, loans and borrowings including bank overdrafts, and derivative financial instruments.

Financial liabilities at fair value through profit and loss

Financial liabilities at fair value through profit and loss include financial liabilities held for trading and financial liabilities designated upon initial recognition as at fair value through profit and loss. Financial liabilities are classified as held for trading if they are incurred for the purpose of repurchasing in the near term. This category also includes derivative financial instruments entered into by the Company that are not designated as hedging instruments in hedge relationships as defined by Ind-AS 109.

Gains or losses on liabilities held for trading are recognised in the profit and loss.

Financial liabilities designated upon initial recognition at fair value through profit and loss are designated at the initial date of recognition, and only if the criteria in Ind-AS 109 are satisfied. For liabilities designated as FVTPL, fair value gains/ losses attributable to changes in own credit risk are recognised in OCI. These gains/losses are not subsequently transferred to profit and loss. However, the Company may transfer the cumulative gain or loss within equity. All other changes in fair value of such liability are recognised in the statement of profit and loss. The Company has not designated any financial liability as at fair value through profit and loss.

Loans and borrowings

After initial recognition, interest-bearing loans and borrowings are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the EIR method. Gains and losses are recognised in profit and loss when the liabilities are derecognised.

Amortised cost is calculated by taking into account any discount or premium on acquisition and fees or costs that are an integral part of the EIR. The EIR amortisation is included as finance costs in the statement of profit and loss.

This category generally applies to interest-bearing loans and borrowings.

Derecognition

A financial liability is derecognised when the obligation under the liability is discharged or cancelled or expires. When an existing financial liability is replaced by another from the same lender on substantially different terms, or the terms of an existing liability are substantially modified, such an exchange or modification is treated as the derecognition of the original liability and the recognition of a new liability. The difference in the respective carrying amounts is recognised in the statement of profit and loss.

Offsetting of financial instruments

Financial assets and liabilities are offset and the net amount is reported in the balance sheet where there is a legally enforceable right to offset the recognised amounts and there is an intention to settle on a net basis or realise the asset and settle the liability simultaneously. The legally enforceable right must not be contingent on future events and must be enforceable in the normal course of business and in the event of default, insolvency or bankruptcy of the Company or the counterparty.

2.12 Earning Per Share:

Earning Per Share is calculated by dividing the net profit or loss for the period attributable to equity shareholders by the weighted average number of the equity shares outstanding during the period.

2.13 Current vs non-current classification

The Company presents assets and liabilities in the balance sheet based on current/ non-current classification.

An asset is treated as current when it is:

- Expected to be realised or intended to be sold or consumed in normal operating cycle
- Held primarily for the purpose of trading
- Expected to be realised within twelve months after the reporting period, or
- Cash or cash equivalent unless restricted from being exchanged or used to settle a liability for at least twelve months after the reporting period

All other assets are classified as non-current.

A liability is current when: A liability is classified as current when the Company does not have a substantive right at the reporting date to defer settlement of the liability for at least twelve months after the reporting period.

- It is expected to be settled in normal operating cycle
- It is held primarily for the purpose of trading
- It is due to be settled within twelve months after the reporting period, or
- There is no unconditional right to defer the settlement of the liability for at least twelve months after the reporting period

The classification of liabilities is determined based on rights and obligations existing at the reporting date, including compliance with covenant conditions where applicable.

The Company classifies all other liabilities as non-current

Deferred tax assets and liabilities are classified as non-current assets and liabilities.

The operating cycle is the time between the acquisition of assets for processing and their realisation in cash and cash equivalents. The Company has identified twelve months as its operating cycle.

2.14 Key estimates and assumptions

• Provisions and contingent liabilities

The Company exercises judgment in measuring and recognising provisions and the exposures to contingent liabilities related to pending litigation or other outstanding claims subject to negotiated settlement, mediation, arbitration or government regulation, as well as other contingent liabilities. Judgment is necessary in assessing the likelihood that a pending claim will succeed, or a liability will arise, and to quantify the possible range of the financial settlement. Because of the inherent uncertainty in this evaluation process, actual losses may be different from the originally estimated provision.

• Measurement of fair values

The Company's accounting policies and disclosures require the measurement of fair values, for both financial and non-financial assets and liabilities. The Company has an established control framework with respect to the measurement of fair values. The finance team has overall responsibility for overseeing all significant fair value measurements, including Level 3 fair values, and reports directly to the CFO.

They regularly review significant unobservable inputs and valuation adjustments. If third party information is used to measure fair values then the finance team assesses the evidence obtained from

the third parties to support the conclusion that such valuations meet the requirements of Ind AS, including the level in the fair value hierarchy in which such valuations should be classified.

When measuring the fair value of an asset or a liability, the Company uses observable market data as far as possible. Fair values are categorized into different levels in a fair value hierarchy based on the inputs used in the valuation techniques as follows:

- Level 1: quoted prices (unadjusted) in active markets for identical assets or liabilities.
- Level 2: inputs other than quoted prices included in Level 1 that are observable for the asset or liability, either directly (i.e. as prices) or indirectly (i.e. derived from prices).
- Level 3: inputs for the asset or liability that are not based on observable market data (unobservable inputs).

If the inputs used to measure the fair value of an asset or a liability fall into different levels of the fair value hierarchy, then the fair value measurement is categorized in its entirety in the same level of the fair value hierarchy as the lowest level input that is significant to the entire measurement.

2.15 Impairment of Tangible assets

Carrying amount of assets are reviewed at each Balance Sheet date to determine whether there is any indication of impairment. An asset is treated as impaired when the carrying amount of assets exceeds its recoverable value. An impairment loss is charged to the statement of profit & loss in the year in which an asset is identified as impaired. The impairment loss recognised in prior accounting period is reversed if there has been a change in the estimate of recoverable amount.

2.16 Provisions and contingencies

Provisions are recognised when:

- (a) the Company has a present legal or constructive obligation as a result of a past event
- (b) it is probable that an outflow of economic resources embodying economic benefits will be required to settle the obligation; and
- (c) a reliable estimate can be made of the amount of the obligation.

Provisions are measured at the present value of management's best estimate of the expenditure required to settle the obligation at the reporting date. Where the effect of the time value of money is material, provisions are discounted using a pre-tax discount rate reflecting current market assessments of the time value of money and risks specific to the liability. Contingent liabilities are disclosed unless the possibility of an outflow of economic resources is remote. Contingent assets are not recognised in the financial statements. However, contingent assets are disclosed where an inflow of economic benefits is probable.

2.17 Rounding of amounts

C. Financial risk management

Risk management policies and systems are reviewed regularly to reflect changes in market conditions and the Company's activities. The Company, through its training and management standards and procedures, aims to maintain a disciplined and constructive control environment in which all employees understand their roles and obligations.

The audit committee oversees how management monitors compliance with the company's risk management policies and procedures, and reviews the adequacy of the risk management framework in relation to the risks faced by the Company. The audit committee is assisted in its oversight role by internal audit. Internal audit undertakes both regular and adhoc reviews of risk management controls and procedures, the results of which are reported to the audit committee.

ii. Credit risk

Credit risk is the risk of financial loss to the Company if a customer or counterparty to a financial instrument fails to meet its contractual obligations, and arises principally from the Company's receivables from customers and investments in debt securities, cash and cash equivalents, mutual funds, bonds etc.

Financial instruments that are subject to credit risk consist of trade receivables, loans, investments, cash and cash equivalents, bank deposits and other financial assets. None of the other financial instruments of the Company result in material concentration of credit risk.

Opinion

We have audited the accompanying consolidated financial statements of Vashu Bhagnani Industries Limited (hereinafter referred to as "the Holding Company") and its subsidiaries (Holding Company and its subsidiaries together referred to as "the Group"), which comprise the consolidated balance sheet as at 31st March, 2026, and the consolidated statement of profit and loss (including other comprehensive income), the consolidated statement of changes in equity and the consolidated statement of cash flows for the year then ended, and notes to the consolidated financial statements, including a summary of material accounting policies and other explanatory information (hereinafter referred to as "the consolidated financial statements").

<u>1. Revenue Recognition</u> Revenue is a significant performance indicator for the Company. For the year ended March 31, 2026, the Company reported revenue of Rs..1721.07 Lakhs. We identified revenue recognition as a Key Audit Matter because: The application of Ind AS 115 involves significant judgment in identifying performance obligations and determining the timing of transfer of control. During the year, the Company recorded significant Other Income amounting to Rs..248.61 Lakhs through the writing back of sundry credit balances. This requires management to exercise judgment in determining that these liabilities are no longer payable and have legally or contractually expired. (Refer Note. 24 of Consolidated Financial Statement)	<u>Principal Audit Procedures</u> Our audit procedures to address the risk of revenue recognition and the specific write-back of credit balances included, but were not limited to: • We evaluated the design and operating effectiveness of internal controls over the revenue cycle, including agreement entered, and invoicing. • We performed cut-off procedures by inspecting invoices and after the balance sheet date to ensure revenue was recorded in the correct period. • We performed trend analysis of revenue by product line and month, comparing results against historical data and industry benchmarks to identify unusual fluctuations. Sundry Credit Balances Written Back Regarding the specific recognition of other income from the write-back of liabilities: • We tested a sample of credit balances written back to ensure there was valid supporting documentation or communication justifying that the liability no longer exists. • We reviewed the aging of these balances to confirm they had remained outstanding for a period exceeding the statutory limitation or contractual obligation. • We obtained formal representations from management and, where necessary, legal counsel, asserting that the Company has no further obligation to settle these amounts. • We checked for any subsequent claims or payments made against these specific accounts

	after the balance sheet date to ensure the write-back was appropriate and not premature.
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Information Other than the Financial Statements and Auditor's Report Thereon

The Holding Company's Board of Directors is responsible for the other information. The other information comprises the information included in the Report of the Board of Directors including Annexures thereto, Management Discussion and Analysis Report, but does not include the consolidated financial statements, and our auditor's report thereon.

If, based on the work we have performed, we conclude that there is a material misstatement of this other information; we are required to report that fact. We have nothing to report in this regard.

We believe that the audit evidence obtained by us is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion on the consolidated financial statements.

Materiality is the magnitude of misstatements in the consolidated financial statements that, individually or in aggregate, makes it probable that the economic decisions of a reasonably knowledgeable user of the consolidated financial statements may be influenced. We consider quantitative materiality and qualitative factors in (i) planning the scope of our audit work and in evaluating the results of our work; and (ii) to evaluate the effect of any identified misstatements in the consolidated financial statements.

We communicate with those charged with governance of the Holding Company and such other entities included in the consolidated financial statements of which we are the independent auditors regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit and significant audit findings, including any significant deficiencies in internal control that we identify during our audit.

We also provide those charged with governance with a statement that we have complied with relevant ethical requirements regarding independence, and to communicate with them all relationships and other matters that may reasonably be thought to bear on our independence, and where applicable, related safeguards.

From the matters communicated with those charged with governance, we determine those matters that were of most significance in the audit of the consolidated financial statements of the current period and are therefore the key audit matters. We describe these matters in our auditors' report unless law or regulation precludes public disclosure about the matter or when, in extremely rare circumstances, we determine that a matter should not be communicated in our report because the adverse consequences of doing so would reasonably be expected to outweigh the public interest benefits of such communication.

Other Matters

- (a) We did not audit the financial statements of the foreign subsidiaries; whose financial results include total assets of Rs. 13,325.04 lakhs, total revenue of Rs. 738.61 lakhs, total net profit after tax of Rs.146.97 lakhs, total comprehensive income of Rs. 309.84 lakhs and net cash inflow of Rs.1685.81 lakhs for the year ended on that date, as considered in the consolidated financial statements. These financial statements have been audited by the other auditor whose report has been furnished to us by the management and our opinion on the consolidated financial statements, in so far as it relates to the amounts and disclosures included in respect of these subsidiaries, and our report in terms of sub-sections (3) and (11) of Section 143 of the Act, in so far as it relates to the aforesaid subsidiaries, is based solely on the report of other auditor.

Our opinion on the consolidated financial statements, and our report on Other Legal and Regulatory Requirements below, is not modified in respect of the above matters with respect to our reliance on the work done and the report of the other auditors.

Report on Other Legal and Regulatory Requirements

- f) With respect to the adequacy of the internal financial controls with reference to financial statements of the Holding Company and its subsidiary company incorporated in India and the operating effectiveness of such controls, refer to our separate report in Annexure A.

Further the only Indian Subsidiary has not paid any remuneration to its directors during the current year.
- h) The modification relating to the maintenance of accounts and other matters connected therewith are as stated in the paragraph 1(A)(b) above on reporting under section 143(3)(b) of the Act and paragraph 1(B)(vi) below on reporting under Rule 11(g) of the Companies (Audit and Auditors) Rules, 2014.

 - (c) Based on the audit procedures that have been considered reasonable and appropriate in the circumstances performed by us on the Company whose financial statements have been audited under the Act, nothing has come to our notice that has caused us to believe that the representations under sub-clause (i) and (ii) of Rule 11(e), as provided under (a) and (b) above, contain any material misstatement.
 - v. The Company did not declare or paid dividend during the year, accordingly compliance with section 123 of the Act is not applicable.
 - vi. Based on our examination which included test check and as communicated by the respective auditor of subsidiary, the holding company and its subsidiary company incorporated in India has used accounting software for maintaining its Books of accounts which have a feature of recording audit trail (edit log) facility and the same has operated throughout the year for all the relevant transactions recorded in the respective softwares. Further for the period where audit trail (edit log) facility was enabled and operated for the respective accounting software, we did not come across any instance of audit trail features being tampered with.

Additionally, the audit trail, where enabled has been preserved by the company as per the statutory requirements for record retention

2. NOTE - 1 CORPORATE INFORMATION

Vashu Bhagnani Industries Limited ("the Company" or "VBIL") is engaged in film production and other related activities. The company is a public limited company incorporated and domiciled in India and has its registered office at FLAT NO 1, COELHO HOUSE, NO 2 JUHU VASANT BAHA CHS LTD, JUHU TARA ROAD, JUHU, NEAR SEA PRINCES HOTEL, Juhu, Mumbai, Maharashtra, India, 400049. These consolidated financial statements comprise the Company and its subsidiary (collectively the 'Group').

NOTE - 2 MATERIAL ACCOUNTING POLICIES**2.01 Basis of preparation of financial statements**

a) The consolidated financial statements have been prepared in compliance with Indian Accounting Standards (Ind AS) notified under Section 133 of the Companies Act, 2013 (the Act) [Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Rules, 2015] and other relevant provisions of the Act.

b) Basis of consolidation

Subsidiary is an entity over which the group has control. The group controls an entity when the group is exposed to, or has rights to, variable returns from its involvement with the entity and has the ability to affect those returns through its power to direct the relevant activities of the entity. Subsidiary is fully consolidated from the date on which control is transferred to the group. They are deconsolidated from the date that control ceases.

The group combines the financial statements of the parent and its subsidiary line by line adding together like items of assets, liabilities, equity, income and expenses. Intercompany transactions, balances and unrealised gains on transactions between group companies are eliminated. Unrealised losses are also eliminated unless the transaction provides evidence of an impairment of the transferred asset. Accounting policies of subsidiary have been changed where necessary to ensure consistency with the policies adopted by the group.

Non-controlling interests in the results and equity of subsidiary is shown separately in the consolidated statement of profit and loss, consolidated statement of changes in equity and balance sheet respectively.

Country of Incorporation - United Arab Emirates

Name of the Indian Subsidiary -Pooja Lesiure and Lifestyle LLP (52% subsidiary)

c) Foreign currency translation**Functional and presentation currency:**

Items included in the consolidated financial statements of the Group are measured using the currency of the primary economic environment in which the entity operates ('the functional currency'). The consolidated financial statements are presented in Indian rupees, which is the Group's functional and presentation currency.

Transactions and balances:

Foreign currency transactions are translated into the functional currency using the exchange rates prevailing at the dates of the transactions. Foreign exchange gains and losses resulting from the settlement of such transactions and from the translation of monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies at year end exchange rates are generally recognised in profit and loss.

Non-monetary items that are measured at fair value in a foreign currency are translated using the exchange rates at the date when the fair value was determined. Translation differences on assets and liabilities carried at fair value are reported as part of the fair value gain or loss. The gain or loss arising on translation of non-monetary items measured at fair value is treated in line with the recognition of the gain or loss on the change in fair value of the item (i.e., translation differences on items whose fair value gain or loss is recognised in OCI or profit and loss are also recognised in OCI or profit and loss, respectively).

2.02 Use of estimates

The preparation of the consolidated financial statements in conformity with Indian GAAP requires the management to make estimates and assumptions considered in the reported amounts of assets and liabilities (including contingent liabilities) and the reported income and expenses during the year. The management believes that the estimates used in preparation of the financial statements are prudent and reasonable. Future results could differ due to these estimates and the differences between the actual results and the estimates are recognised in the periods in which the results are known / materialise. Significant estimates used by the management in the preparation of these consolidated financial statements include, classification of assets and liabilities into current and non-current, estimates of the economic useful lives of fixed assets. Any revision to accounting estimates is recognised prospectively.

2.03 Tangible Fixed Assets - Property Plant and Equipment

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation. Cost comprises of the purchase price and any attributable cost of bringing the asset to its working condition for its intended use.

2.04 Inventories

Inventory comprises of unamortised cost of films and cost incurred till date for under production films. The cost of films is amortised in the ratio of current revenue to expected total revenue. At the end of each accounting period, balance unamortised cost is compared with net expected revenue. If net expected revenue is less than unamortised cost, the same is written down to net expected revenue. Expenses of under production films incurred till the films are ready for release are inventoried.

2.05 Investments:

All long-term investments are valued at cost. Provision for diminution in the value of each long-term investment is made to recognise a decline other than a temporary nature. Current Investments are carried individually at lower of cost or fair value and the resultant decline is charged to the revenue.

2.06 Revenue Recognition

The Group has adopted Ind AS 115, Revenue from Contract with Customers with effect from 1st April 2018.

Film production and related income

Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable. Revenue from production of movie is recognized on assignment/ sale of the rights in the concerned movie from the date of their availability for exploitation or on the date of release of the movie and in some other cases as per the terms of movie production agreements entered into with the customer, as applicable. Revenue from other rights in the movie such as satellite rights, overseas rights, music rights, video rights, etc., is recognized on assignment/ sale of the rights in the concerned movie from the date of their availability for exploitation, as applicable.

Interest income

Interest income is recognised on a time proportion basis.

2.07 Depreciation:

Depreciation on Tangible fixed assets are provided for in accordance with schedule II of the Companies Act, 2013. Depreciation on addition/deduction during the year has been provided on Pro-rata basis.

2.08 Taxation

Current tax is the amount of tax payable on the taxable income for the year as determined in accordance with the provisions of the Income Tax Act, 1961. Provision for current income tax is made on current tax rate based on assessable income computed under Income Tax Act 1961 or Book profit is computed under section 115JB (MAT) whichever is higher. MAT credit is recognised subject to requirement of virtual certainty that sufficient future taxable income will be available for set off.

Deferred tax assets and liabilities are recognised for future tax consequences attributable to the timing differences between taxable income and accounting income that are capable of reversal in one or more subsequent periods and are measured using tax rates enacted or substantively enacted as at the Balance Sheet date. Deferred Tax assets are not recognized unless, in the management judgment, there is virtual certainty that sufficient future taxable income will be available against which such deferred tax assets can be realised. The carrying amount of deferred tax is reviewed at each balance sheet date.

2.09 Cash and cash equivalents

For the purpose of presentation in the statement of cash flows, cash and cash equivalents includes cash on hand, call deposits and other short-term, highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and which are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value.

2.10 Financial instruments

A financial instrument is any contract that gives rise to a financial asset of one entity and a financial liability or equity instrument of another entity. Financial instruments also include derivative contracts such as foreign currency foreign exchange forward contracts, interest rate swaps and currency options; and embedded derivatives in the host contract.

i) Financial assets

Classification

The Company shall classify financial assets as subsequently measured at amortised cost, fair value through other comprehensive income (FVOCI) or fair value through profit and loss (FVTPL) on the basis of its business model for managing the financial assets and the contractual cash flow characteristics of the financial asset.

Initial recognition and measurement

All financial assets are recognised initially at fair value plus, in the case of financial assets not recorded at fair value through profit or loss, transaction costs that are attributable to the acquisition of the financial asset. Purchases or sales of financial assets that require delivery of assets within a time frame established by regulation or convention in the market place (regular way trades) are recognised on the trade date, i.e., the date that the Company commits to purchase or sell the asset. However trade Receivables that do not contain a significant financing component are measured at transaction price

Debt instruments

A 'debt instrument' is measured at the amortised cost if both the following conditions are met:

- a) The asset is held within a business model whose objective is to hold assets for collecting contractual cash flows, and
 - b) Contractual terms of the asset give rise on specified dates to cash flows that are solely payments of principal and interest (SPPI) on the principal amount outstanding.
- After initial measurement, such financial assets are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest rate (EIR) method. Amortised cost is calculated by considering any discount or premium and fees or costs that are an integral part of the EIR. The EIR amortisation is included in finance income in the profit and loss.
- Debt instruments included within the fair value through profit and loss (FVTPL) category are measured at fair value with all changes recognised in the statement of profit and loss.

Equity instruments

The Company subsequently measures all equity investments in companies other than equity investments in subsidiaries, at fair value. Where the Company's management has elected to present fair value gains and losses on equity investments in other comprehensive income, there is no subsequent reclassification of fair value gains and losses to profit or loss. Dividends from such investments are recognised in profit and loss as other income when the Company's right to receive payments is established.

De-recognition

- A financial asset (or, where applicable, a part of a financial asset or part of a Company of similar financial assets) is primarily derecognised (i.e. removed from the Company's balance sheet) when:
 - The rights to receive cash flows from the asset have expired, or
 - The Company has transferred its rights to receive cash flows from the asset or has assumed an obligation to pay the received cash flows in full without material delay to a third party under a 'pass-through' arrangement; and either (a) the Company has transferred substantially all the risks and rewards of the asset, or (b) the Company has neither transferred nor retained substantially all the risks and rewards of the asset, but has transferred control of the asset.
 - When the Company has transferred its rights to receive cash flows from an asset or has entered into a pass-through arrangement, it evaluates if and to what extent it has retained the risks and rewards of ownership. When it has neither transferred nor retained substantially all of the risks and rewards of the asset, nor transferred control of the asset, the Company continues to recognise the transferred asset to the extent of the Company's continuing involvement. In that case, the Company also recognises an associated liability. The transferred asset and the associated liability are measured on a basis that reflects the rights and obligations that the Company has retained.
 - Continuing involvement that takes the form of a guarantee over the transferred asset is measured at the lower of the original carrying amount of the asset and the maximum amount of consideration that the Company could be required to repay.

Impairment of financial assets

In accordance with Ind-AS 109, the Company applies expected credit loss (ECL) model for measurement and recognition of impairment loss on the following financial assets and credit risk exposure:

- a) Financial assets that are debt instruments, and are measured at amortised cost e.g., loans, debt securities, deposits, and bank balance
- b) Trade receivables - The application of simplified approach does not require the Company to track changes in credit risk. Rather, it recognises impairment loss allowance based on lifetime ECLs at each reporting date, right from its initial recognition.

ii) Financial liabilities

Classification

The Company classifies all financial liabilities as subsequently measured at amortised cost, except for financial liabilities at fair value through profit and loss. Such liabilities, including derivatives that are liabilities, shall be subsequently measured at fair value.

Initial recognition and measurement

Financial liabilities are classified, at initial recognition, as financial liabilities at fair value through profit or loss, loans and borrowings, payables, or as derivatives designated as hedging instruments in an effective hedge, as appropriate.

All financial liabilities are recognised initially at fair value and, in the case of loans and borrowings and payables, net of directly attributable transaction costs.

The Company's financial liabilities include trade and other payables, loans and borrowings including bank overdrafts, and derivative financial instruments.

Financial liabilities at fair value through profit and loss

Financial liabilities at fair value through profit and loss include financial liabilities held for trading and financial liabilities designated upon initial recognition as at fair value through profit and loss. Financial liabilities are classified as held for trading if they are incurred for the purpose of repurchasing in the near term. This category also includes derivative financial instruments entered into by the Company that are not designated as hedging instruments in hedge relationships as defined by Ind-AS 109.

Gains or losses on liabilities held for trading are recognised in the profit and loss.

Financial liabilities designated upon initial recognition at fair value through profit and loss are designated at the initial date of recognition, and only if the criteria in Ind-AS 109 are satisfied. For liabilities designated as FVTPL, fair value gains/ losses attributable to changes in own credit risk are recognised in OCI. These gains/losses are not subsequently transferred to profit and loss. However, the Company

may transfer the cumulative gain or loss within equity. All other changes in fair value of such liability are recognised in the statement of profit and loss. The Company has not designated any financial liability as at fair value through profit and loss.

Loans and borrowings

After initial recognition, interest-bearing loans and borrowings are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the EIR method. Gains and losses are recognised in profit and loss when the liabilities are derecognised.

Amortised cost is calculated by taking into account any discount or premium on acquisition and fees or costs that are an integral part of the EIR. The EIR amortisation is included as finance costs in the statement of profit and loss.

This category generally applies to interest-bearing loans and borrowings.

Derecognition

A financial liability is derecognised when the obligation under the liability is discharged or cancelled or expires. When an existing financial liability is replaced by another from the same lender on substantially different terms, or the terms of an existing liability are substantially modified, such an exchange or modification is treated as the derecognition of the original liability and the recognition of a new liability. The difference in the respective carrying amounts is recognised in the statement of profit and loss.

Offsetting of financial instruments

Financial assets and liabilities are offset and the net amount is reported in the balance sheet where there is a legally enforceable right to offset the recognised amounts and there is an intention to settle on a net basis or realise the asset and settle the liability simultaneously. The legally enforceable right must not be contingent on future events and must be enforceable in the normal course of business and in the event of default, insolvency or bankruptcy of the Company or the counterparty.

2.11 Earning Per Share:

Earning Per Share is calculated by dividing the net profit or loss for the period attributable to equity shareholders by the weighted average number of the equity shares outstanding during the period.

2.12 Current vs non-current classification

The Company presents assets and liabilities in the balance sheet based on current/ non-current classification.

An asset is treated as current when it is:

- Expected to be realised or intended to be sold or consumed in normal operating cycle
- Held primarily for the purpose of trading
- Expected to be realised within twelve months after the reporting period, or
- Cash or cash equivalent unless restricted from being exchanged or used to settle a liability for at least twelve months after the reporting period

All other assets are classified as non-current.

A liability is current when: A liability is classified as current when the Company does not have a substantive right at the reporting date to defer settlement of the liability for at least twelve months after the reporting period.

- It is expected to be settled in normal operating cycle
- It is held primarily for the purpose of trading
- It is due to be settled within twelve months after the reporting period, or
- There is no unconditional right to defer the settlement of the liability for at least twelve months after the reporting period

The classification of liabilities is determined based on rights and obligations existing at the reporting date, including compliance with covenant conditions where applicable.

The Company classifies all other liabilities as non-current

Deferred tax assets and liabilities are classified as non-current assets and liabilities.

The operating cycle is the time between the acquisition of assets for processing and their realisation in cash and cash equivalents. The Company has identified twelve months as its operating cycle.

2.13 Key estimates and assumptions

• Provisions and contingent liabilities

The Company exercises judgment in measuring and recognising provisions and the exposures to contingent liabilities related to pending litigation or other outstanding claims subject to negotiated settlement, mediation, arbitration or government regulation, as well as other contingent liabilities. Judgment is necessary in assessing the likelihood that a pending claim will succeed, or a liability will arise, and to quantify the possible range of the financial settlement. Because of the inherent uncertainty in this evaluation process, actual losses may be different from the originally estimated provision.

• Measurement of fair values

The Company's accounting policies and disclosures require the measurement of fair values, for both financial and non-financial assets and liabilities. The Company has an established control framework with respect to the measurement of fair values. The finance team has overall responsibility for overseeing all significant fair value measurements, including Level 3 fair values, and reports directly to the CFO.

They regularly review significant unobservable inputs and valuation adjustments. If third party information is used to measure fair values then the finance team assesses the evidence obtained from

the third parties to support the conclusion that such valuations meet the requirements of Ind AS, including the level in the fair value hierarchy in which such valuations should be classified.

When measuring the fair value of an asset or a liability, the Company uses observable market data as far as possible. Fair values are categorized into different levels in a fair value hierarchy based on the inputs used in the valuation techniques as follows:

- Level 1: quoted prices (unadjusted) in active markets for identical assets or liabilities.
- Level 2: inputs other than quoted prices included in Level 1 that are observable for the asset or liability, either directly (i.e. as prices) or indirectly (i.e. derived from prices).
- Level 3: inputs for the asset or liability that are not based on observable market data (unobservable inputs).

If the inputs used to measure the fair value of an asset or a liability fall into different levels of the fair value hierarchy, then the fair value measurement is categorized in its entirety in the same level of the fair value hierarchy as the lowest level input that is significant to the entire measurement.

2.14 Impairment of Tangible assets

Carrying amount of assets are reviewed at each Balance Sheet date to determine whether there is any indication of impairment. An asset is treated as impaired when the carrying amount of assets exceeds its recoverable value. An impairment loss is charged to the statement of profit & loss in the year in which an asset is identified as impaired. The impairment loss recognised in prior accounting period is reversed if there has been a change in the estimate of recoverable amount.

2.15 Provisions and contingencies

Provisions are recognised when:

- (a) the Group has a present legal or constructive obligation as a result of a past event
- (b) it is probable that an outflow of economic resources embodying economic benefits will be required to settle the obligation and
- (c) a reliable estimate can be made of the amount of the obligation.

Provisions are measured at the present value of management's best estimate of the expenditure required to settle the obligation at the reporting date. Where the effect of the time value of money is material, provisions are discounted using a pre-tax discount rate reflecting current market assessments of the time value of money and risks specific to the liability. Contingent liabilities are disclosed unless the possibility of an outflow of economic resources is remote. Contingent assets are not recognised in the financial statements. However, contingent assets are disclosed where an inflow of economic benefits is probable.

2.16 Rounding of amounts

All amounts disclosed in the consolidated financial statements and notes have been rounded off to the nearest Lakhs as per the requirement of Schedule III, unless otherwise stated.

2.17 Recent pronouncements

The Ministry of Corporate Affairs vide notification dated May 07, 2025 and August 13, 2025 notified the Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Amendment Rules, 2025 and Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Second Amendment Rules, 2025, respectively, which amended certain accounting standards (see below) and are effective for annual reporting periods beginning on or after April 01, 2025:

C. Financial risk management

i. Risk management framework

The Group's board of directors has overall responsibility for the establishment and oversight of the group's risk management framework. The board of directors are responsible for developing and monitoring the Group's risk management policies.

The Group's risk management policies are established to identify and analyse the risks faced by the Group, to set appropriate risk limits and controls and to monitor risks and adherence to limits. Risk management policies and systems are reviewed regularly to reflect changes in market conditions and the Group's activities. The Group, through its training and management standards and procedures, aims to maintain a disciplined and constructive control environment in which all employees understand their roles and obligations.

The audit committee oversees how management monitors compliance with the Group's risk management policies and procedures, and reviews the adequacy of the risk management framework in relation to the risks faced by the Group. The audit committee is assisted in its oversight role by internal audit. Internal audit undertakes both regular and adhoc reviews of risk management controls and procedures, the results of which are reported to the audit committee.

ii. Credit risk

Credit risk is the risk of financial loss to the Company if a customer or counterparty to a financial instrument fails to meet its contractual obligations, and arises principally from the Company's receivables from customers and investments in debt securities, cash and cash equivalents, mutual funds, bonds etc.
