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CHAIRMAN'S MESSAGE



Dear Shareholders,

It gives me great pleasure and immense pride in placing before you the **33rd Annual Report of your Company for the financial year 2025-26**, marking yet another important chapter in our journey of growth, transformation and value creation.

The year under review was characterised by a rapidly evolving global economic environment. Geopolitical tensions, changing trade policies, commodity price volatility, elevated global debt and uncertainty in international financial markets continued to influence economic activity across regions. Despite these challenges, the global economy demonstrated resilience, supported by domestic demand, improving financial conditions and continued investment in technology and innovation.

Amidst this global environment, **India continued to demonstrate remarkable economic resilience**. The Indian economy maintained strong growth momentum during FY 2025-26, supported by domestic consumption, investment activity, manufacturing and services. According to the Provisional Estimates released by the National Statistical Office, India's real GDP grew by **7.7% in FY 2025-26**, compared with 7.1% in FY 2024-25.

The financial services sector continued to be an important contributor to India's economic development. Increasing formalisation of the economy, financial inclusion, digitalisation and growing demand for organised credit have created significant opportunities for NBFCs. At the same time, the industry continues to face challenges relating to asset quality, competition, funding conditions, interest-rate movements and an evolving regulatory environment.

A YEAR OF STRONG PERFORMANCE

I am pleased to share that **FY 2025-26 was a year of significant progress and strong financial performance for U. Y. Fincorp Limited**.

During the year under review, the Company achieved **Revenue from Operations of ₹16,164.13 Lakhs**, as against ₹11,104.61 Lakhs in the previous year. Profit Before Tax increased substantially to **₹6,664.38 Lakhs**, compared with ₹1,693.88 Lakhs in FY 2024-25.

Our lending portfolio also expanded meaningfully during the year, reaching **₹35,652.97 Lakhs as at March 31, 2026**, compared with ₹27,457.34 Lakhs as at March 31, 2025. This growth reflects the increasing acceptance of our products and our continued efforts to expand our lending activities across identified customer segments.

The significant improvement in our financial performance gives us confidence in the strength of our business model and provides a solid foundation for the next phase of our growth journey.

STRENGTHENING OUR LENDING PLATFORM

U. Y. Fincorp Limited has built its business around the objective of providing responsible and accessible financial solutions to businesses, entrepreneurs and individuals.

Our lending portfolio comprises **Corporate Loans, Micro-Enterprise Loans, Personal Loans and Loans Against Property**, allowing us to address varied financing requirements across customer segments.

During FY 2025-26, we further diversified our product portfolio by introducing **Equipment Financing under the "GrowU.money" brand**. The initiative is aimed at providing financing support to eligible businesses and entrepreneurs for acquisition of equipment and other productive assets. We believe that this product will complement our existing offerings and enable us to participate in the financing needs of growing businesses.

The Company has established a pan-India presence and continues to expand its lending operations through a combination of its branch network and business partnerships. The Company has a significant operational presence in **West Bengal, Uttar Pradesh and Maharashtra**, supported by its branch network, Business Correspondents, sourcing partners and sales team. We have also continued to strengthen our reach through our collaboration with **Fintech Cloud Private Limited (FCPL)** under the **"Fundobaba"** brand.

Our strategy is to build a diversified and scalable lending platform while remaining focused on customer needs, prudent underwriting and sustainable returns.

GROWTH WITH PRUDENCE

As we expand, we remain firmly conscious that **growth without quality is not sustainable**.

Our philosophy of **"Quality and Profitability"** continues to guide our business decisions. We have maintained a strong focus on credit appraisal, borrower assessment, portfolio monitoring and risk management. Our credit evaluation process considers the business, financial position, industry, management capability and repayment capacity of borrowers before credit decisions are taken.

The Company's risk-management framework covers credit, liquidity, interest-rate, operational, market, strategic and reputational risks. Liquidity and interest-rate risks are monitored through regular assessment of asset and liability maturity profiles, while KYC and AML measures remain integral to our operating framework.

Importantly, the Statutory Auditors, in their report for FY 2025-26, have stated that the Company's internal financial controls over financial reporting were adequate and operating effectively as at March 31, 2026. This gives us further confidence that our growth is being supported by an appropriate control and governance framework.

TECHNOLOGY AND CUSTOMER SERVICE

Technology is increasingly becoming an important enabler for the financial services industry. Digital onboarding, data-driven credit assessment and technology-enabled servicing can improve efficiency, customer experience and the speed of financial delivery.

2. OPERATIONS & BUSINESS ACTIVITIES

The key highlights of your Company's performance during the year under review are:

- Revenue from operation is ₹ 16,164.13 Lakhs as against ₹ 11,104.61 Lakhs in the last year. This represents an increase of ₹ 5,059.52 lakhs, or 45.56% for the said period. The company experienced increase in the revenue from operations because of its increase in the interest income in comparison with the previous year.
- Profit before taxation is ₹ 6,664.38 Lakhs as against ₹ 1,693.88 Lakhs in the last year. i.e., profit before tax increased by ₹ 4,970.50 Lakhs (293.44% for the said period). The company's Profit before Tax has increased due to increase in the company's Total Income.

The Company agrees to invest in expansion of its business into the field on small ticket size Personal and Business Loan under its new brand name "**FUNDOBABA**" under its own NBFC license and the same will be managed by FCPL.

With **over 32 years of experience in the financial services sector**, the Company has established a pan-India presence and continues to expand its lending operations through a combination of its branch network and business partnerships. The Company has a significant operational presence in **West Bengal, Uttar Pradesh and Maharashtra**, where it directly operates through its branch network under the “**GrowU**” brand. The Company has also expanded its outreach through its collaboration with **Fintech Cloud Private Limited (FCPL)** under the “**Fundobaba**” brand.

The Company's financing portfolio primarily comprises **Corporate Loans, Micro-Enterprise Loans (Business Loans), Personal Loans and Loans Against Property (LAP)**. These products enable the Company to cater to the varied financing requirements of corporates, entrepreneurs, micro-enterprises and individual borrowers across different customer segments.

The Company has **disbursed loans to more than 18,000 customers across India**. Its operations are supported by its **Registered Office, Corporate Office, two branches and seven Business Correspondents**, providing an established distribution network for customer acquisition, servicing and credit delivery. In addition to our sales team, with an adequate number of sourcing correspondents, including commission based DSAs.

During **FY 2025-26**, the Company further diversified its product portfolio by introducing **Equipment Financing** under the “**GrowU.money**” brand. The product is designed to provide financing support to eligible businesses and entrepreneurs for the acquisition of equipment and other productive assets, subject to the Company's applicable credit appraisal, risk management and underwriting policies. The introduction of Equipment Financing further strengthens the Company's business financing portfolio and enables it to address the evolving funding requirements of its customers.

For investors, the Company represents a promising opportunity. The company's consistent growth, innovative approach, and robust financial health make it an attractive proposition. As the fintech & NBFC industry continues to evolve, the Company is well-positioned to leverage its strengths and deliver sustained value to its shareholders.

Under the guidance of Mr. Udai Kothari, being the Managing Director of the Company, we are planning for an Automate tech platform for Mobile based loan for instant credit and entered into the new segments of financing like corporate tie-up and Instant Credit.

Over the past few years, the Reserve Bank of India (the RBI) has been steadily implementing technology to deepen and broaden financial services in India. Considering the same, your Company intends to expand into financial market segment and capitalize the set up for the same along with increasing capacity as required by the business. The outlook of the business is very exciting and we take it as an opportunity to do something unique and exceptional.

Since the term of their appointment is going to expire in the forthcoming 33rd AGM of the Company, therefore, your Directors requested to appoint M/s Praveen K Srivastava & Co, Chartered Accountants (Firm Registration No. 013251C) as the Statutory Auditors of the Company to hold office for a term of 5 (Five) years from the conclusion of forthcoming 33rd Annual General Meeting until the conclusion of the 38th Annual General Meeting of the Company, at a remuneration to be determined by the Board of Directors of the Company and reimbursement of out of pocket expenses as may be incurred by them during the course of the Audit.

Management Discussion And Analysis Report

INDUSTRY STRUCTURE AND DEVELOPMENTS

Global Economy

During FY 2025-26, the global economy remained resilient despite a complex and evolving macroeconomic environment. Economic activity was uneven across major economies, with growth influenced by geopolitical tensions, changing trade policies, elevated debt levels, volatile commodity prices and varying inflationary trends. Global trade and investment flows were impacted by evolving tariff policies, export restrictions and the ongoing realignment of global supply chains. Despite these challenges, businesses demonstrated adaptability by diversifying sourcing arrangements, restructuring supply chains and adjusting trade flows, while policy support helped mitigate some of the adverse effects.

Inflation remained an important macroeconomic concern, particularly amid fluctuations in energy and food prices. Commodity markets, especially crude oil, witnessed periods of volatility, with geopolitical developments contributing to intermittent price movements and inflationary pressures. The continuing conflicts in the Middle East remained a significant source of uncertainty, with potential implications for energy supplies, global trade routes and overall economic activity. At the same time, elevated global debt levels, higher borrowing costs and relatively tight financial conditions increased vulnerabilities across highly leveraged sectors and economies with significant external financing requirements.

Economic and strategic relations among major economies, particularly between the United States and China, continued to influence global trade and investment patterns. Tariffs, export controls, technology-related restrictions and supply-chain diversification are expected to remain important factors shaping international trade and investment decisions. Emerging and developing economies may remain exposed to risks arising from currency volatility, changes in capital flows, commodity-price movements and higher external financing costs. Technological advancements, digitalisation and the increasing adoption of Artificial Intelligence, however, continue to create opportunities for productivity enhancement, innovation and economic transformation.

For the financial services sector, including Non-Banking Financial Companies (NBFCs), the global economic environment has implications for liquidity conditions, funding costs, credit demand, asset quality and overall risk appetite. Changes in interest rates, inflation and economic activity may influence borrowing costs as well as the repayment capacity of borrowers. Accordingly, prudent credit assessment, effective portfolio monitoring, adequate liquidity and capital management, and robust risk-management practices remain critical. Overall, the global economic outlook remains cautiously resilient, although geopolitical developments, trade policies, inflation, commodity prices and global financial conditions are expected to remain key factors influencing economic activity and financial markets, including in emerging markets such as India.

Indian Economy

Despite global uncertainties, geopolitical tensions and volatility in international financial markets, the Indian economy remained resilient during FY 2025-26 and continued to be among the fastest-growing major economies. Strong domestic consumption, sustained investment activity, manufacturing and services growth supported overall economic activity. India's real GDP is estimated to have grown by 7.6% in FY 2025-26, compared with 7.1% in FY 2024-25.

The financial services sector continued to benefit from increasing formalisation of the economy, financial inclusion, digitalisation and sustained credit demand. The NBFC sector remained an important source of financing for individuals, MSMEs and corporates, complementing the banking sector through accessible and customised credit solutions.

The relatively softer interest-rate environment and improved liquidity conditions during FY 2025-26 provided a supportive backdrop for credit growth and funding conditions. However, the impact of interest-rate movements on individual NBFCs continued to depend on their funding profile, borrowing costs, asset-liability structure and repricing mechanisms.

The continued formalisation of businesses, increasing penetration of organised credit, digital adoption and financial inclusion provide growth opportunities for NBFCs, including in corporate finance, MSME financing and secured lending. For U. Y. Fincorp Limited, these developments provide a supportive operating environment to pursue sustainable business growth while maintaining prudent financial and credit practices.

At the same time, the sector remains subject to evolving regulatory requirements and risks relating to asset quality, liquidity, funding costs and credit underwriting. The Company remains focused on prudent credit assessment, effective risk management, adequate liquidity and regulatory compliance, with a balanced approach towards growth and asset quality.

OPPORTUNITIES & THREATS

OPPORTUNITIES

- **Growing Credit Demand:** Continued economic growth, rising consumption and increasing financing requirements of businesses and individuals provide opportunities for NBFCs to expand their lending activities.
- **MSME and Corporate Financing:** Increasing formalisation of businesses and the growing need for organised credit create



Management Discussion And Analysis Report (Contd.)

opportunities in MSME, corporate and other secured lending segments.

- Financial Inclusion and Digitalisation: Wider adoption of digital financial services, increasing financial inclusion and improved access to formal credit are expected to support the expansion of the NBFC sector.
- Supportive Interest-Rate Environment: Easing of interest rates and improved liquidity conditions during FY 2025-26 provide a relatively supportive environment for credit growth and may improve borrowing conditions, subject to effective transmission.

THREATS

- Credit and Asset Quality Risk: Any deterioration in borrowers repayment capacity or economic conditions may adversely affect asset quality and increase credit costs.
- Funding and Interest-Rate Risk: Changes in interest rates, liquidity conditions and availability of funding may affect borrowing costs, margins and profitability.
- Regulatory Environment: The NBFC sector remains subject to evolving RBI regulations and enhanced requirements relating to governance, capital, liquidity, risk management and customer protection.
- Competition and Market Risk: Increasing competition from banks, NBFCs and digital lending platforms may place pressure on pricing, margins and customer acquisition, while volatility in financial markets may impact funding and investment conditions.

U. Y. Fincorp Limited will continue to focus on prudent credit assessment, effective risk management, regulatory compliance and disciplined financial management to leverage available growth opportunities while mitigating the associated risks.

The business of the Company predominantly falls within a single primarily business segment viz. "Financial and Related Services" and hence the disclosure requirement under applicable Accounting Standard w.r.t. "Segment Reporting" is not applicable.

BUSINESS OVERVIEW

Your Company is a non-deposit taking non-banking financial company (NBFC) registered with the Reserve Bank of India (RBI) since April 20, 1998, with Registration No. B-05.01596 and classified as NBFC-Investment and Credit Company (NBFC-ICC) pursuant to circular DNBR (PD)CC.No.097/03.10.001/2018-19 dated February 22, 2019. Under the scale-based regulations for NBFCs, the Company has been classified as NBFCBL (Base layer) by the RBI vide press release dated September 30, 2022.

With **over 32 years of experience in the financial services sector**, the Company has established a pan-India presence and continues to expand its lending operations through a combination of its branch network and business partnerships. The Company has a significant operational presence in **West Bengal, Uttar Pradesh and Maharashtra**, where it directly operates through its branch network under the "GrowU" brand. The Company has also expanded its outreach through its collaboration with **Fintech Cloud Private Limited (FCPL)** under the "Fundobaba" brand.

The Company's financing portfolio primarily comprises **Corporate Loans, Micro-Enterprise Loans (Business Loans), Personal Loans and Loans Against Property (LAP)**. These products enable the Company to cater to the varied financing requirements of corporates, entrepreneurs, micro-enterprises and individual borrowers across different customer segments.

The Company has **disbursed loans to more than 18,000 customers across India**. Its operations are supported by its **Registered Office, Corporate Office, two branches and seven Business Correspondents**, providing an established distribution network for customer acquisition, servicing and credit delivery. In addition to our sales team, with an adequate number of sourcing correspondents, including commission based DSAs.

Liquidity risk and interest rate risk arising out of maturity mismatch of assets and liabilities are managed through regular monitoring of the maturity profiles. The critical audit observations are shared with the Audit Committee on a quarterly basis for an effective monitoring of controls and implementation of recommendations. The Audit Committee regularly reviews the audit findings as well as the adequacy and effectiveness of the internal control measures. All these measures help in maintaining a healthy internal control environment.

Report on the Audit of the Standalone Financial Statements

Opinion

We have audited the accompanying standalone financial statements of **U.Y.Fincorp Limited** ("the Company"), which comprise the Balance Sheet as at March 31, 2026, the Statement of Profit and Loss (including Other Comprehensive Income), the Statement of Changes in Equity and the Statement of Cash Flows for the year ended on that date, and a summary of the significant accounting policies and other explanatory information.

In our opinion and to the best of our information and according to the explanations given to us, the aforesaid standalone financial statements give the information required by the Companies Act, 2013 ("the Act") in the manner so required and give a true and fair view in conformity with the Indian Accounting Standards prescribed under section 133 of the Act read with the Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Rules, 2015, as amended, ("Ind AS") and other accounting principles generally accepted in India, of the state of affairs of the Company as at March 31, 2026, the profit and total comprehensive income, changes in equity and its cash flows for the year ended on that date.

Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audit of the standalone financial statements in accordance with the Standards on Auditing (SAs) specified under section 143(10) of the Act. Our responsibilities under those Standards are further described in the *Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Standalone Financial Statements* section of our report. We are independent of the Company in accordance with the Code of Ethics issued by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of India (ICAI) together with the independence requirements that are relevant to our audit of the standalone financial statements under the provisions of the Act and the Rules made thereunder, and we have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with these requirements and the ICAI's Code of Ethics. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion on the standalone financial statements.

Emphasis of Matter

We draw attention to Note no.42 of the standalone financial statements, that in absence of the financial statements of associate company M/s Purple Advertising Services Private Limited for the year ended March 31, 2026, the results of same has not been consolidated as per IND AS 28 on "Investment in Associates and Joint Ventures" in Consolidated Financial results. Consequently, the impact of the same and the value of investments in such associate are not ascertainable presently. Further, due to non availability of financials and as the said company has gone into liquidation, the company has made the impairment of said investment of Rs. 900 lakhs in the previous financial years.

Our opinion is not modified in respect of above matter.

Key Audit Matters

Key audit matters are those matters that, in our professional judgement, were of most significance in our audit of the standalone financial statements of the current period. These matters were addressed in the context of our audit of the standalone financial statements as a whole, and in forming our opinion thereon, and we do not provide a separate opinion on these matters. We have determined the matters described below to be the key audit matters to be communicated in our report..

The value of loans and advances on the balance sheet is significant and there is a high degree of complexity and judgement involved for the Company in estimating individual and collective credit impairment provisions and write-offs against these loans. The Company's model to calculate expected credit loss ("ECL") is inherently complex and judgement is applied in determining the three-stage impairment model ("ECL Model"), including the selection and input of forward-looking information. ECL provision calculations require the use of large volumes of data. The completeness and reliability of data can significantly impact the accuracy of the modelled impairment provisions. The accuracy of data flows and the implementation of related controls are critical for the integrity of the estimated impairment provisions.	We started our audit procedures with the understanding of the internal control environment related to Impairment loss allowance. Our procedures over internal controls focused on recognition and measurement of impairment loss allowance. We assessed the design and tested the operating effectiveness of the selected key controls implemented by the Company. We also assessed whether the impairment methodology used by the Company is in line with the requirements of Ind AS 109, "Financial instruments". More particularly, we assessed the approach of the Company regarding the definition of default, Probability of Default, Loss Given Default and incorporation of forward-looking information for the calculation of ECL. For loans and advances which are assessed for impairment on a portfolio basis, we performed particularly the following procedures: • tested the reliability of key data inputs and related management controls; • checked the stage classification as at the balance sheet date as per definition of default; • validated the ECL model and calculation by involving our Information Technology Expert; • calculated the ECL provision manually for a selected sample; and • assessed the assumptions made by the Company in making accelerated provision, considering forward looking information and based on the status of a particular industry as on the reporting date. For loans and advances which are written off during the year under audit, we read and understood the methodology and policy laid down and implemented by the Company in this regard along with its compliance on sample basis.

Information Other than the Standalone Financial Statements and Auditor's Report Thereon

The Company's Board of Directors is responsible for the preparation of the other information. The other information comprises the information included in the Analysis, Board's Report including Annexures to Board's Report, Corporate Governance and Shareholder's Information, but does not include the standalone financial statements and our auditor's report thereon.

Our opinion on the standalone financial statements does not cover the other information and we do not express any form of assurance conclusion thereon.

In connection with our audit of the standalone financial statements, our responsibility is to read the other information and, in doing so, consider whether the other information is materially inconsistent with the standalone financial statements or our knowledge obtained during the course of our audit or otherwise appears to be materially misstated.

If, based on the work we have performed, we conclude that there is a material misstatement of this other information, we are required to report that fact. We have nothing to report in this regard.

The Company's Board of Directors is responsible for the matters stated in section 134(5) of the Act with respect to the preparation of these standalone financial statements that give a true and fair view of the financial position, financial

This responsibility also includes maintenance of adequate accounting records in accordance with the provisions of the Act for safeguarding the assets of the Company and for preventing and detecting frauds and other irregularities; selection and application of appropriate accounting policies; making judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent; and design, implementation and maintenance of adequate internal financial controls, that were operating effectively for ensuring the accuracy and completeness of the accounting records, relevant to the preparation and presentation of the standalone financial statements that give a true and fair view and are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Further, during the course of our audit we did not come across any instance of the audit trail feature being tampered with and the audit trail has been preserved by the Company as per the statutory requirements for record retention.

Significant Accounting Policies and Notes to Standalone Financial Statements as at and for the period ended 31st March 2026

1. CORPORATE INFORMATION

U. Y. Fincorp Limited (UYFL) is a RBI registered Non-Banking Financial Company. The Company was originally incorporated with the Registrar of Companies, West Bengal on October 7, 1993 as Golden Securities Private Limited. Pursuant to Shareholders Resolution dated November 30, 1994. The Company was converted into Public Limited Company and the name was changed to "Golden Securities Limited". Fresh Certificate of Incorporation consequent to such change of name was issued by the Registrar of Companies, West Bengal vide certificate dated December 13, 1994. The name of our Company was changed to Golden Goenka Fincorp Limited and a fresh Certificate of Incorporation reflecting the new name was issued by the Registrar of Companies, West Bengal on November 21, 2011. Subsequently the name of Company was changed to its present name "U. Y. Fincorp Limited" and a fresh Certificate of Incorporation reflecting the new name was issued by the Registrar of Companies, West Bengal on December 10, 2018. Company made its public issue in the year 1995 and subsequently got its shares listed at BSE Limited and The Calcutta Stock Exchange Limited in the same year. The RBI granted a certificate of registration dated April 20, 1998, permitting the Company to carry on the business of a NBFC as a non deposit taking company. Subsequently, Company has received a fresh certificate pursuant to change of name of Company. U. Y. Fincorp Limited is primarily focused in providing inter corporate loans, personal loans and investments in securities and trading in securities.

The Company is a Non-deposit taking non-banking financial company (NBFC) registered with the Reserve Bank of India (RBI) since April 20, 1998, with Registration No. B-05.01596 and classified as NBFC-Investment and Credit Company (NBFC-ICC) pursuant to circular DNBR (PD) CC.No.097/03.10.001/2018-19 dated 22 February 2019. Under the scale based regulations for NBFCs, the Company has been classified as NBFCBL (Base layer) by the RBI vide press release dated 30 September 2022.

2(A). BASIS OF ACCOUNTING

A) Statement of Compliance

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Indian Accounting Standards ("Ind AS") as prescribed by Ministry of Corporate Affairs pursuant to Section 133 of the Companies Act, 2013 ("the Act"), read with the Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Rules, 2015 (as amended), other relevant provisions of the Act and other accounting principles generally accepted in India.

The standalone financial statements are approved for issue by the Company's Board of Directors at their meeting held on May 27, 2026. The same shall be placed before the ensuing annual general meeting for the approval of the shareholders.

B) Basis of Preparation of Financial Statement

These Standalone financial statements are prepared in accordance with Indian Accounting Standard (Ind AS) under the historical cost convention on accrual basis except for certain financial instruments, which are measured at fair values, the provisions of the Companies Act, 2013 ("the Act"). The Ind AS are prescribed under Section 133 of the Act read with Rule 3 of the Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Rules, 2015 and relevant amendment rules issued thereafter.

Accounting policies have been consistently applied except where a newly-issued accounting standard is initially adopted or a revision to an existing accounting standard requires a change in the accounting policy hitherto in use. The Material accounting policy information used in preparation of the audited Standalone financial statements have been discussed in the respective notes.

As the year to date figures are taken from the source and rounded to the nearest digits, the figures reported for the previous quarters might not always add up to the year to date figures reported in this statement.

C) Use of estimates and critical accounting judgements

The preparation of the financial statements require the use of accounting estimates which, by definition, will seldom equal the actual result. Management also needs to exercise judgement in applying the Company's accounting policies.

This note provides an overview of the areas that involved a high degree of judgement or complexity, and of items which are more likely to be significantly adjusted due to estimates and assumptions turning out to be different than those originally assessed. Detailed information about each of these estimates and judgements is included in relevant notes together with information about the basis of calculation for each affected line item in the financial statements.

Significant Accounting Policies and Notes to Standalone Financial Statements (Contd.)

D) Critical estimates and judgements

The areas involving critical estimates and judgements are :

i) Depreciation and amortisation

Depreciation and amortisation is based on management estimates of the future useful lives of the property, plant and equipment and intangible assets. Estimates may change due to technological developments, competition, changes in market conditions and other factors and may result in changes in the estimated useful life and in the depreciation and amortisation charges.

ii) Employee Benefits

The present value of the defined benefit obligations and long term employee benefits depends on a number of factors that are determined on an actuarial basis using a number of assumptions. The assumptions used in determining the net cost (income) include the discount rate. Any changes in these assumptions will impact the carrying amount of defined benefit obligations.

The Company determines the appropriate discount rate at the end of each year. This is the interest rate that should be used to determine the present value of estimated future cash outflows expected to be required to settle the obligations. In determining the appropriate discount rate, the Company considers the interest rates of Government securities that have terms to maturity approximating the terms of the related defined benefit obligation. Other key assumptions for obligations are based in part on current market conditions.

iii) Provisions and Contingencies

Provisions and contingencies are based on Management's best estimate of the liabilities based on the facts known at the balance sheet date.

iv) Impairment charges on loans and advances

The measurement of impairment losses requires judgement, in particular, the estimation of the amount and timing of future cash flows and collateral values when determining impairment losses and the assessment of a significant increase in credit risk. These are based on the assumptions which are driven by a number of factors resulting in future changes to the impairment allowance. A collective assessment of impairment takes into account data from the loan portfolio (such as credit quality, nature of assets underlying assets financed, levels of arrears, credit utilization, loan to collateral ratios etc.), and the concentration of risk and economic data (including levels of unemployment, country risk and performance of different individual groups). These significant assumptions have been applied consistently to all period presented.

v) EIR method

The Company's EIR methodology, recognises interest income / expense using a rate of return that represents the best estimate of a constant rate of return over the expected behavioural life of loans given / taken and recognises the effect of potentially different interest rates at various stages and other characteristics of the product life cycle (including prepayments and penalty interest and charges). This estimation, by nature, requires an element of judgement regarding the expected behaviour and life-cycle of the instruments, as well expected changes to India's base rate and other fee income/expense that are integral parts of the instrument.

2 (B) MATERIAL ACCOUNTING POLICY

A) Property, plant and equipment

An item of property, plant and equipment is recognised as an asset if it is probable that the future economic benefits associated with the item will flow to the Company and its cost can be measured reliably. This recognition principle is applied to the costs incurred initially to acquire an item of property, plant and equipment and also to costs incurred subsequently to add to, replace part of, or service it. All other repair and maintenance costs, including regular servicing, are recognised in the statement of profit and loss as incurred. When a replacement occurs, the carrying value of the replaced part is de-recognised. Where an item of property, plant and equipment comprises major components having different useful lives, these components are accounted for as separate items.

Property, plant and equipment are stated at cost, less accumulated depreciation and impairment. Cost includes all direct costs and expenditures incurred to bring the asset to its working condition and location for its intended use. Trial run expenses (net of revenue) are capitalised. Borrowing costs incurred during the period of construction is capitalised as part of cost of the qualifying assets.

The gain or loss arising on disposal of an asset is determined as the difference between the sale proceeds and the carrying value of the asset, and is recognised in the statement of profit and loss.

B) Intangibles

Subsequent to initial recognition, intangible assets with definite useful lives are reported at cost less accumulated amortisation and accumulated impairment losses.

C) Depreciation and amortisation of property, plant and equipment and intangible assets

Depreciation is provided on prorata basis on straight line method at the rates determined based on estimated useful lives of tangible assets where applicable, specified in Schedule II to the Act. These charges are commenced from the dates the assets are available for their intended use and are spread over their estimated useful economic lives or, in the case of leased assets, over the lease period, if shorter. The estimated useful lives of assets and residual values are reviewed regularly and, when necessary, revised. No further charge is provided in respect of assets that are fully written down but are still in use. Depreciation on assets under construction commences only when the assets are ready for their intended use.

D) Impairment

i) Tangible and Intangible Assets

At each balance sheet date, the Company reviews the carrying values of its property, plant and equipment and intangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that the carrying value of those assets may not be recoverable through continuing use. If any such indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset is reviewed in order to determine the extent of impairment loss (if any). Where the asset does not generate cash flows that are independent from other assets, the Company estimates the recoverable amount of the cash generating unit to which the asset belongs.

Recoverable amount is the higher of fair value less costs to sell and value in use. In assessing value in use, the estimated future cash flows are discounted to their present value using a pre-tax discount rate that reflects current market assessments of the time value of money and the risks specific to the asset for which the estimates of future cash flows have not been adjusted. An impairment loss is recognised in the statement of profit and loss as and when the carrying value of an asset exceeds its recoverable amount.

Where an impairment loss subsequently reverses, the carrying value of the asset (or cash generating unit) is increased to the revised estimate of its recoverable amount so that the increased carrying value does not exceed the carrying value that would have been determined had no impairment loss been recognised for the asset (or cash generating unit) in prior years. A reversal of an impairment loss is recognised in the statement of profit and loss immediately.

ii) Investment in Subsidiaries and Associates

The carrying amount of the investment is tested for impairment in accordance with Ind AS 36 Impairment of Assets as a single asset by comparing its recoverable amount (higher of value in use and fair value less costs of disposal) with its carrying amount. Any impairment loss recognised forms part of the carrying amount of the investment. Any reversal of that impairment loss is recognised in accordance with Ind AS 36 to the extent that the recoverable amount of the investment subsequently increases.

E) Leases

The Company determines whether an arrangement contains a lease by assessing whether the fulfillment of a transaction is dependent on the use of a specific asset and whether the transaction conveys the right to use that asset to the Company in return for payment. Where this occurs, the arrangement is deemed to include a lease and is accounted for either as finance or operating lease.

Leases are classified as finance leases where the terms of the lease transfers substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership to the lessee. All other leases are classified as operating leases.

Significant Accounting Policies and Notes to Standalone Financial Statements (Contd.)

The Company as lessee

(i) Operating lease – Rentals payable under operating leases are charged to the statement of profit and loss on a straight line basis over the term of the relevant lease unless another systematic basis is more representative of the time pattern in which economic benefits from the leased asset are consumed. Contingent rentals arising under operating leases are recognised as an expense in the period in which they are incurred. In the event that lease incentives are received to enter into operating leases, such incentives are recognised as a liability. The aggregate benefit of incentives is recognised as a reduction of rental expense on a straight line basis, except where another systematic basis is more representative of the time pattern in which economic benefits from the leased asset are consumed.

(ii) Finance lease – Finance leases are capitalised at the commencement of lease, at the lower of the fair value of the property or the present value of the minimum lease payments. The corresponding liability to the lessor is included in the balance sheet as a finance lease obligation. Lease payments are apportioned between finance charges and reduction of the lease obligation so as to achieve a constant rate of interest on the remaining balance of the liability. Finance charges are recognised in the statement of profit and loss over the period of the lease.

The Company as Lessor

Amounts due from lessees under finance leases are recognised as receivables at the amount of the Company's net investment in the leases. Finance lease income is allocated to accounting periods so as to reflect a constant periodic rate of return on the Company's net investment outstanding in respect of the leases.

Rental income from operating leases is generally recognised on a straight-line basis over the term of the relevant lease. Where the rentals are structured solely to increase in line with expected general inflation to compensate for the Company's expected inflationary cost increases, such increases are recognised in the year in which such benefits accrue.

F) Financial instruments

Financial assets and financial liabilities are recognised when the Company becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument. Financial assets and liabilities are initially measured at fair value. Transaction costs that are directly attributable to the acquisition or issue of financial assets and financial liabilities (other than financial assets and financial liabilities at fair value through profit and loss) are added to or deducted from the fair value measured on initial recognition of financial asset or financial liability. The transaction costs directly attributable to the acquisition of financial assets and financial liabilities at fair value through profit and loss are immediately recognised in the statement of profit and loss.

Effective interest method

The effective interest method is a method of calculating the amortised cost of a financial instrument and of allocating interest income or expense over the relevant period. The effective interest rate is the rate that exactly discounts future cash receipts or payments through the expected life of the financial instrument, or where appropriate, a shorter period.

a) Financial assets

Cash and bank balances

Cash and bank balances consist of :

(i) Cash and cash equivalents - which includes cash in hand, deposits held at call with banks and other short term deposits which are readily convertible into known amounts of cash, are subject to an insignificant risk of change in value and have maturities of less than one year from the date of such deposits. These balances with banks are unrestricted for withdrawal and usage.

(ii) Other bank balances - which includes balances and deposits with banks that are restricted for withdrawal and usage.

Financial assets at amortised cost

Financial assets are subsequently measured at amortised cost if these financial assets are held within a business model whose objective is to hold these assets in order to collect contractual cash flows and the contractual terms of the financial asset give rise on specified dates to cash flows that are solely payments of principal and interest on the principal amount outstanding.

Financial assets measured at fair value

Financial assets are measured at fair value through other comprehensive income if these financial assets are held

Significant Accounting Policies and Notes to Standalone Financial Statements (Contd.)

within a business model whose objective is to hold these assets in order to collect contractual cash flows or to sell these financial assets and the contractual terms of the financial asset give rise on specified dates to cash flows that are solely payments of principal and interest on the principal amount outstanding.

The Company in respect of equity investments (other than in subsidiaries, associates and joint ventures) which are not held for trading has made an irrevocable election to present in other comprehensive income subsequent changes in the fair value of such equity instruments. Such an election is made by the Company on an instrument by instrument basis at the time of initial recognition of such equity investments.

Financial asset not measured at amortised cost or at fair value through other comprehensive income is carried at fair value through the statement of profit and loss.

Impairment of financial assets

In accordance with Ind AS 109, the Company applies expected credit loss (ECL) model for measurement and recognition of impairment loss on the following financial assets:

- Financial assets that are debt instruments, and are measured at amortised cost e.g., loans, debt securities, deposits and trade receivables
- Financial assets that are debt instruments and are measured as at FVTOCI
- Trade receivables or any contractual right to receive cash or another financial asset that result from transactions that are within the scope of Ind AS 18.

The Company follows 'simplified approach' for recognition of impairment loss allowance on trade receivables. The application of simplified approach does not require the Company to track changes in credit risk. Rather, it recognises impairment loss allowance based on lifetime ECLs at each reporting date, right from its initial recognition.

For recognition of impairment loss on other financial assets and risk exposure, the Company determines that whether there has been a significant increase in the credit risk since initial recognition. If credit risk has not increased significantly, 12-month ECL is used to provide for impairment loss. However, if credit risk has increased significantly, lifetime ECL is used. If, in a subsequent period, credit quality of the instrument improves such that there is no longer a significant increase in credit risk since initial recognition, the Company reverts to recognising impairment loss allowance based on 12-month ECL.

Lifetime ECL are the expected credit losses resulting from all possible default events over the expected life of a financial instrument. The 12-month ECL is a portion of the lifetime ECL which results from default events that are possible within 12 months after the reporting date. ECL is the difference between all contractual cash flows that are due to the Company in accordance with the contract and all the cashflows that the entity expects to receive (i.e., all cash shortfalls), discounted at the original EIR.

ECL impairment loss allowance (or reversal) recognized during the period is recognized as income/expense in the statement of profit and loss. This amount is reflected under the head 'other expenses' in the statement of profit and loss. The balance sheet presentation for various financial instruments is described below:

Financial assets measured as at amortised cost: ECL is presented as an allowance, i.e., as an integral part of the measurement of those assets in the balance sheet. The allowance reduces the net carrying amount. Until the asset meets write-off criteria, the Company does not reduce impairment allowance from the gross carrying amount.

Debt instruments measured at FVTOCI: Since financial assets are already reflected at fair value, impairment allowance is not further reduced from its value. Rather, ECL amount is presented as 'accumulated impairment amount' in the OCI.

For assessing increase in credit risk and impairment loss, the Company combines financial instruments on the basis of shared credit risk characteristics with the objective of facilitating an analysis that is designed to enable significant increases in credit risk to be identified on a timely basis.

The Company does not have any purchased or originated credit-impaired (POCI) financial assets, i.e., financial assets which are credit impaired on purchase/ origination.

Derecognition of financial assets

The Company de-recognises a financial asset only when the contractual rights to the cash flows from the asset expire, or it transfers the financial asset and substantially all risks and rewards of ownership of the asset to another entity.

If the Company neither transfers nor retains substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership and continues to control the transferred asset, the Company recognises its retained interest in the assets and an associated liability for amounts it may have to pay.

Significant Accounting Policies and Notes to Standalone Financial Statements (Contd.)

If the Company retains substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership of a transferred financial asset, the Company continues to recognise the financial asset and also recognises a collateralised borrowing for the proceeds received.

b) Financial liabilities and equity instruments

Classification as debt or equity

Financial liabilities and equity instruments issued by the Company are classified according to the substance of the contractual arrangements entered into and the definitions of a financial liability and an equity instrument.

Equity instruments

An equity instrument is any contract that evidences a residual interest in the assets of the Company after deducting all of its liabilities. Equity instruments are recorded at the proceeds received, net of direct issue costs.

Financial Liabilities

Trade and other payables are initially measured at fair value, net of transaction costs, and are subsequently measured at amortised cost, using the effective interest rate method where the time value of money is significant.

Interest bearing bank loans, overdrafts and issued debt are initially measured at fair value and are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest rate method. Any difference between the proceeds (net of transaction costs) and the settlement or redemption of borrowings is recognised over the term of the borrowings in the statement of profit and loss.

Derecognition of financial liabilities

The Company derecognises financial liabilities when, and only when, the Company's obligations are discharged, cancelled or they expire.

Derivative financial instruments

In the ordinary course of business, the Company uses certain derivative financial instruments to reduce business risks which arise from its exposure to foreign exchange and interest rate fluctuations. The instruments are confined principally to forward foreign exchange contracts and interest rate swaps. The instruments are employed as hedges of transactions included in the financial statements or for highly probable forecast transactions/firm contractual commitments. These derivatives contracts do not generally extend beyond six months except for interest rate derivatives.

Derivatives are initially accounted for and measured at fair value from the date the derivative contract is entered into and are subsequently re-measured to their fair value at the end of each reporting period.

G) Employee benefits

Defined contribution plans

Payments to defined contribution plans are charged as an expense as they fall due. Payments made to state managed retirement benefit schemes are dealt with as payments to defined contribution schemes where the Company's obligations under the schemes are equivalent to those arising in a defined contribution retirement benefit scheme.

Defined benefit plans

For defined benefit retirement schemes the cost of providing benefits is determined using the Projected Unit Credit Method, with actuarial valuation being carried out at each balance sheet date. Re-measurement gains and losses of the net defined benefit liability/(asset) are recognised immediately in other comprehensive income. The service cost and net interest on the net defined benefit liability/(asset) is treated as a net expense within employment costs.

Past service cost is recognised as an expense when the plan amendment or curtailment occurs or when any related restructuring costs or termination benefits are recognised, whichever is earlier.

The retirement benefit obligation recognised in the balance sheet represents the present value of the defined benefit obligation as reduced by the fair value plan assets.

Compensated absences

Short term compensated expenses are charged to the Statement of Profit and Loss in the year in which the related service is rendered.

H) Provision

Provisions are recognised in the balance sheet when the Company has a present obligation (legal or constructive) as a

result of a past event, which is expected to result in an outflow of resources embodying economic benefits which can be reliably estimated. Each provision is based on the best estimate of the expenditure required to settle the present obligation at the balance sheet date. Where the time value of money is significant, provisions are measured on a discounted basis.

Constructive obligation is an obligation that derives from an entity's actions where:

- (a) by an established pattern of past practice, published policies or a sufficiently specific current statement, the entity has indicated to other parties that it will accept certain responsibilities and;
- (b) as a result, the entity has created a valid expectation on the part of those other parties that it will discharge those responsibilities.

I) Onerous contracts

A provision for onerous contracts is recognised when the expected benefits to be derived by the Company from a contract are lower than the unavoidable cost of meeting its obligations under the contract. The provision is measured at the present value of the lower of the expected cost of terminating the contract and the expected net cost of continuing with the contract. Before a provision is established, the Company recognises any impairment loss on the assets associated with that contract.

J) Income taxes

Tax expense for the year comprises current and deferred tax. The tax currently payable is based on taxable profit for the year. Taxable profit differs from net profit as reported in the statement of profit and loss because it excludes items of income or expense that are taxable or deductible in other years and it further excludes items that are never taxable or deductible. The Company's liability for current tax is calculated using tax rates and tax laws that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the end of the reporting period.

Deferred tax is the tax expected to be payable or recoverable on differences between the carrying values of assets and liabilities in the financial statements and the corresponding tax bases used in the computation of taxable profit and is accounted for using the balance sheet liability method. Deferred tax liabilities are generally recognised for all taxable temporary differences. In contrast, deferred tax assets are only recognised to the extent that it is probable that future taxable profits will be available against which the temporary differences can be utilised.

The carrying value of deferred tax assets is reviewed at the end of each reporting period and reduced to the extent that it is no longer probable that sufficient taxable profits will be available to allow all or part of the asset to be recovered.

Deferred tax is calculated at the tax rates that are expected to apply in the period when the liability is settled or the asset is realised based on the tax rates and tax laws that have been enacted or substantially enacted by the end of the reporting period. The measurement of deferred tax liabilities and assets reflects the tax consequences that would follow from the manner in which the Company expects, at the end of the reporting period, to cover or settle the carrying value of its assets and liabilities.

Deferred tax assets and liabilities are offset to the extent that they relate to taxes levied by the same tax authority and there are legally enforceable rights to set off current tax assets and current tax liabilities within that jurisdiction.

Current and deferred tax are recognised as an expense or income in the statement of profit and loss, except when they relate to items credited or debited either in other comprehensive income or directly in equity, in which case the tax is also recognised in other comprehensive income or directly in equity.

Deferred tax assets include Minimum Alternate Tax (MAT) paid in accordance with the tax laws in India, which is likely to give future economic benefits in the form of availability of set off against future income tax liability. MAT is recognised as deferred tax assets in the Balance Sheet when the asset can be measured reliably and it is probable that the future economic benefit associated with the asset will be realised.

K) Revenue Recognition

Revenue is recognised to the extent that it is probable that the economic benefits will flow to the Company and the revenue can be reliably measured, regardless of when the payment is being made. Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable net of discounts, taking into account contractually defined terms and excluding taxes or duties collected on behalf of the government.

Interest Income

Interest income from financial assets is recognised by applying the Effective Interest Rate ('EIR') to the gross carrying

amount of financial assets, other than credit-impaired assets and those classified as measured at Fair Value through Profit or Loss (FVTPL) or Fair Value through Other Comprehensive Income (FVOCI). Interest Income on credit impaired financial assets is recognised by applying the effective interest rate to the net amortised cost (net of provision) of the financial asset.

Dividend Income

Income from dividend is recognised when the Company's right to receive such dividend is established, it is probable that the economic benefits associated with the dividend will flow to the entity, the dividend does not represent a recovery of part of cost of the investment and the amount of dividend can be measured reliably.

L) Borrowing Costs

Borrowing costs consist of interest and other costs that an entity incurs in connection with the borrowing of funds including interest expense calculated using the effective interest method, finance charges in respect of assets acquired on finance lease. Borrowing cost also includes exchange differences to the extent regarded as an adjustment to the borrowing costs.

Borrowings costs directly attributable to the acquisition, construction or production of qualifying assets, which are assets that necessarily take a substantial period of time to get ready for their intended use or sale, are added to the cost of those assets, until such time as the assets are substantially ready for the intended use or sale.

M) Cash and Cash Equivalents

For the purpose of presentation in the statement of cash flows, cash and cash equivalents includes cash on hand, deposits held at call with financial institutions, other short-term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and which are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value, and bank overdrafts. Bank overdrafts are shown within borrowings in current liabilities in the balance sheet.

N) Trade Receivables

Trade receivables are recognised initially at fair value and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method, less provision for impairment, if any.

O) Segment Reporting

Identification of Segments

The management is of the view that the business of the company predominantly falls within a single primary segment viz "Financial & Related Services" and hence there are no separate reportable segments as per Ind-AS dealing with the segment reporting.

P) Earnings Per Share

Basic earnings per share is calculated by dividing the net profit or loss for the period attributable to equity shareholders by the weighted average number of equity shares outstanding during the period. For the purpose of calculating diluted earnings per share, the net profit or loss for the period attributable to equity shareholders and the weighted average number of shares outstanding during the period are adjusted for the effects of all dilutive potential equity shares.

Q) Contingent Liabilities and Assets

A contingent liability is a possible obligation that arises from past events whose existence will be confirmed by the occurrence or non-occurrence of one or more uncertain future events beyond the control of the Company or a present obligation that is not recognized because it is not probable that an outflow of resources will be required to settle the obligation. The company does not recognize a contingent liability but discloses its existence in the financial statements.

Contingent assets are not recognised in the financial statements, but are disclosed where an inflow of economic benefits is probable.

31. Employee Benefits

(a) Defined Benefit Plan - Gratuity

The Gratuity scheme is a final salary defined benefit plan, that provides for lumpsum payment at the time of separation; based on scheme rules the benefits are calculated on the basis of last drawn salary and the period of service at the time of separation and paid as lumpsum. There is a vesting period of 5 years.

Description of Risk Exposures :

Valuations are performed on certain basic set of pre-determined assumptions and other regulatory framework which may vary overtime. Thus, the Company is exposed to various risks in providing the above gratuity benefit which are as follows :

i) Actuarial Risk: It is the risk that benefits will cost more than expected. This can arise due to one of the following reasons :

Adverse salary growth experience: Salary hikes that are higher than the assumed salary escalation will result into an increase in obligation at a rate is higher than expected.

Variability in mortality rates: If actual mortality rates are higher than assumed mortality rate assumption than the Gratuity benefits will be paid earlier than expected. Since there is no condition of vesting on the death benefit, the acceleration of cashflow will lead to an actuarial loss or gain depending on the relative values of the assumed salary growth and discount rate.

Variability in withdrawal rates: If actual withdrawal rates are higher than assumed withdrawal rate assumption than the Gratuity Benefits will be paid earlier than expected. The impact of this will depend on wheather the benefits are vested as at the resignation date.

ii) Investment Risk:

For funded plans that rely on insurers for managing the assets, the value of assets certified by the insurer may not be the fair value of instruments backing the liability. In such cases, the present value of the assets is independent of the future discount rate. This can result in wide fluctuations in the net liability or the funded status if there are significant changes in the discount rate during the inter-valuation period.

Notes to Standalone Financial Statements as at and for the year ended 31st March, 2026 (Contd.)

iii) Liquidity Risk:

Employees with high salaries and long durations or those higher in hierarchy, accumulate significant level of benefits. If some of such employees resign/retire from the company there can be strain on the cashflows.

iv) Market Risk:

Market risk is a collective term for risks that are related to the changes and fluctuations of the financial markets. One actuarial assumption that has a material effect is the discount rate. The discount rate reflects the time value of money. An increase in discount rate leads to decrease in Defined Benefit Obligation of the plan benefits & vice versa. This assumption depends on the yields on the corporate/government bonds and hence the valuation of liability is exposed to fluctuations in the yields as at the valuation date.

v) Legislative Risk:

Legislative risk is the risk of increase in the plan liabilities or reduction in the plan assets due to change in the legislation/regulation. The government may amend the Payment of Gratuity Act thus requiring the companies to pay higher benefits to the employees. This will directly affect the present value of the Defined Benefit Obligation and the same will have to be recognized immediately in the year when any such amendment is effective.
